

2004 OUTLOOK

A New Era Begins

After two of the most successful seasons in school history, the Georgia Tech softball program welcomes its seventh and newest head coach in Ehren Earleywine. Earleywine joined the Tech staff as the top assistant in 2002, guiding the Yellow Jackets to a school record 52 wins and one win shy of the College World Series. Last season, Earleywine was part of a Tech squad that made a second straight appearance in the NCAA Regional Tournament, finishing fourth in the Tuscaloosa Regional.

This year, rookie head coach Earleywine wants his team to take the next step.

"I think after having been to the Regional Tournament the past two years, the obvious next step is going to the World Series," said Earleywine. "Obviously, winning an ACC Championship is our primary goal, getting back to NCAA Regionals is number two and winning the regional will be the third."

The Jackets have a wealth of leadership returning to this year's lineup, led by five seniors-Tara Knudsen (Thornton, Colo.), Soraya Reddick (Tampa, Fla.), Erin Voeltz (Westlake, Calif.), Tasha Waugh (Talala, Okla.) and Sara Wissmann (El Dorado Hills, Calif.).

"The strength of this team is experience," said Earleywine. "We have a pretty solid junior and senior class. Those athletes all have two years of regional tournament experience. They

can create their own destiny this year."

In order to get ready for the Atlantic Coast Conference, which added a sixth team for softball in NC State this year, the Yellow Jackets will face one of the toughest schedules in the country. Tech will play against 10 teams that made the NCAA Regional Tournament in 2003 and three-Alabama, Arizona and Louisiana-Lafayette-that advanced to the College World Series.

"I would be real surprised if this wasn't the hardest schedule that Tech has ever had. That definitely sets us up in terms of preparing for the ACC, NCAA Regional Tournament and hopefully the World Series. We've taken on the philosophy that in order to be the best, you have to play the best. That's how our schedule has been arranged and we look forward to the challenges."

Here's a look at Tech position by position:

PITCHERS

After breaking the school career and single-season records in strikeouts, junior Jessica Sallinger (Kennesaw, Ga.) returns as the top pitcher for the Jackets. Sallinger garnered All-ACC honors last season after leading the league in strikeouts (337), finishing 11th in the nation in strikeouts per game (9.5) and 36th in Earned Run Average (1.26).

"Jessica is a proven collegiate pitcher," said Earleywine. "She was the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2002 and an All-ACC performer in 2003. She has all the tools. I think her attitude is much improved this year and she's ready to accept the responsibility of leading this team on and off the field."

Another part of the pitching tandem for Tech will be Voeltz. She finished last year with a record of 13-6 and an ERA of 2.53. Voeltz tallied her first perfect game of her collegiate career last year in the regional tournament against Southern University on May 15, 2003.

"Erin is a senior with a lot of experience," said Earleywine. "She did not allow a single earned run this fall. The biggest improvement for her is the development of a change up. Credit has to go to our pitching coach, John Bargfeldt, for helping her along with that development. By adding a change up, she has really gone to the next level."

Freshman Sarah Wood (Marietta, Ga.) will also see some time on the mound for the Yellow Jackets. A 2003 graduate of Walton High School, Wood fired 52 consecutive scoreless innings in the state playoffs a year ago, earning all-state, all-county and all-area honors.

"Sarah has a great deal of potential," said Earleywine. "She used four or five pitches in high school and we're asking her to cut down on the amount pitches and focus on trying to master two or three. If she can do that, then she will be tough for opposing hitters to handle."

CATCHERS


Heading up the duties behind the plate will be Waugh. She split time with All-ACC catcher Lindsay Wood last year, starting in 37 games. She hit five home runs for the Jackets last year and only allowed three passed balls. Waugh will also see action as the designated player and first baseman for the Jackets.

"Waugh brings experience," said Earleywine. "She is the team mom. I would like for her to become a little more verbal and take more command of this team and I feel that she is ready to do that."

Sharing time with Waugh at catcher will be sophomore Lauren Schlechte (St. Louis, Mo.). Schlechte has one of the strongest arms on the team and is one of the more versatile players.

"We really saw a huge improvement this fall in Schlechte's overall attitude," said Earleywine. "She established a certain level of comfort behind the plate and kind of settled into that role. She will improve throughout the spring because she has so much upside."

Backing Waugh and Schlechte up behind the plate will be junior Liz Bartle (Coral Springs, Fla.). Bartle saw time for Tech as the designated player a year ago and should do the same in 2004. She drove in eight runs a year ago and had one home run in 70 at bats.

"Liz had an extremely good fall," said Earleywine. "She just needs to be able to take her 'A' game from practice to the game. If she can accomplish that, she will have a good chance of hitting in the four or five hole for us."

FIRST BASE

Incoming freshman Kristina Hull (Colorado Springs, Colo.) is the projected starter for Tech at first base. Hull was named Player of the Year at Doherty High School as a senior and garnered all-area and all-county honors.

"Hull is a good defensive first baseman and is a good target for the infielders to throw to," said Earleywine. "She has a lot of enthusiasm and creates life on the infield."

A group of players that could see action at first base as well will be Waugh, Sallinger, Wood and Bartle.

"There are a whole slew of players that can play this position for us this year. Many of them still need some work over there, but if they are hitting well, then we are going to have to find a place for them."

SECOND BASE

Taking over second base for the Yellow Jackets will be junior Katie Donovan (Marietta, Ga.). Donovan led Tech in the

post-season with a .381 batting average in the NCAA Regional and ACC Tournaments. She was named to the ACC all-tournament team.

"Katie was moved from first over to second base where she played all through high school," said Earleywine. "In the fall she was a little uncomfortable because she had not been there in awhile, but she settled in and did an excellent job for us by the end of the fall."

THIRD BASE

Schlechte will start at third base when she is not performing duties behind the plate. She carried a .941 fielding percentage over at the hot corner last year, starting in 28 games.

"Lauren is a great defensive player with a very strong arm," said Earleywine. "She will be wearing many hats for us this year but we feel that she is capable to play anywhere we need her to."

Also seeing time at third base for the Jackets will be converted outfielder junior Kirin Kumar (Santa Ana, Calif.). Kumar hit .238 in 2003, starting in 55 games in the outfield.

"Kirin has done well with the transition from the outfield to third base, where she has never played before," said Earleywine. "She still needs work over there, but her short game coverage is excellent."

SHORTSTOP

Knudsen headlines the shortstop position for the Yellow Jackets. She was recently drafted by San Antonio in the 2004 National Pro Fastpitch draft held in December. Knudsen led the ACC in home runs for the second time in as many years last season and earned All-ACC honors for the second consecutive season.

"Tara is a returning All-American," said Earleywine. "She is a great defender and hits a ton for us. She has already made her mark on the Tech record books and should continue to do so this spring."

OUTFIELD

Wissmann and Reddick both return as starters in the outfield for the Jackets. Wissmann started in 56 games for Tech last year, ranking second on the team with eight stolen bases in 10 attempts.

Reddick ranked third on the Tech squad with a .248 batting average and started in 57 games for the Yellow Jackets. She committed one error in 68 chances last year.

"When you mention Sara and Soraya, you're talking about two girls with a ton of experience," said Earleywine. "They both have speed and good range in the outfield."

Sophomore Amy Hosier (Lakewood, Colo.) should be the third starting outfielder for the Rambling Wreck. Hosier saw limited action last season, starting in nine games for Tech.

"Amy saw a little bit of playing time as a freshman," said Earleywine. "We've added to her game, with the ability to slap, bunt for a hit and swing away. We believe with those three elements she will be a positive contributor to our offense."


Other players that could see time out in the outfield will be Kumar and Hull.

"We could be playing musical chairs out there," said Earleywine. "We're just going to wait and see who is swinging a hot bat and who comes ready to play everyday."

As a Junior (2003): Started in all 62 games for Tech at shortstop ... Hit .364 in the NCAA Regional in Tuscaloosa, Ala., with one home run and two RBIs ... Ended the post-season 8-for-22, with a home run and three RBIs ... Led the team for the second straight year with a .309 batting average ... Named All-ACC for the second consecutive season ... Led the ACC with 13 home runs ... Ranks second all-time at Tech with 34 career homers ... Ranked third in the league in total bases (107), fourth in RBI (39) and walks (33), seventh in hits (56) and eighth in doubles (12) ... Currently holds the highest career slugging percentage (.583) in Tech history ... Had a sturdy .925 fielding percentage in the middle of the diamond ... Stands third in career RBI (102), fourth in career batting average (.323) and career doubles (30) ... Had 11 multi-hit games during the course of the season and 10 multi-RBI games ... Tied the school record with four hits in a single game against Mercer on March 30, ending 4-for-4 with three RBIs ... Drove in a season-high five Tech runners against Harvard on March 26, ending 2-for-3 with two home runs ... Named ACC Player of the Week on March 31, after hitting .667 (8-12), scoring eight runs and smashing two homers in four games.

As a Sophomore (2002): Earned third-team NFCA All-America honors at short stop, becoming just the second such honoree in program history ... Also garnered first-team All-Southeast Region and All-Atlantic Coast Conference accolades ... Enjoyed one of the finest offensive seasons in Tech and conference history ... Her 16 home runs tied the

Tech and ACC single-season record ... Posted the second-highest single-season totals in program history with 80 hits, a .687 slugging percentage and 46 runs scored ... Had 51 RBI to stand third on the single-season record chart ... Set a school record with 37 walks ... Started all 70 games at shortstop ... Led the team in batting average, runs, hits, home runs, runs batted in, total bases, slugging percentage, walks and on-base percentage ... Ranked among the league's top five in nine offensive categories ... Opened the season with an 11-game hitting streak ... Led the team with 25 multi-hit games ... as three hits in a game on four different occasions ... Homered twice against Georgia State on February 20 and at North Carolina on April 5 ... Had a game-winning, walk-off, two-run homer to defeat Long Beach State in the National Invitational Softball Tournament on March 8 ... Her two-run homer against No. 25 Georgia proved to be the difference in a 2-1 Tech win on April 28 ... Had multiple hits in two of Tech's five games in NCAA Regional play ... Showed improved defense with 13 errors in 239 chances at shortstop ... Posted a .946 fielding percentage.

As a Freshman (2001): Emerged as one of Tech's top offensive and defensive players as a rookie ... Played in 48 games, making 47 starts, at short stop ... Led the team with a .259 batting average and posted 35 hits to share the team lead with Erin Hawley ... Her five home runs also equaled the team lead, while her five doubles were fourth ... Also drove in 12 runs, which ranked third on the squad ... Had a .904 fielding percentage from her position in the middle of the Yellow Jacket infield ... Part of an impressive infield that turned a conference-best 27 double plays ... Owned seven multi-hit games, including a 3-for-4 performance with two runs, an RBI and a double in Tech's win over Georgia State on March 2 ... Most dramatic home run of the season lifted the Jackets to a 2-1, extra-inning win over 16th-ranked Florida State ... Also had a three-run homer to propel Tech to a 4-3 victory over Maryland on April 15.

High School: Earned four letters in both softball and basketball while at Westminster High School, also lettered for one year in volleyball ... Was a two-year captain of both the softball and basketball teams ... Earned softball all-conference recognition at shortstop in each of her four years at Westminster, was also an all-state pick in 1998 and '99, while earning All-Colorado honors in 1999 under coach Rich Archer ... Garnered all-conference honors on the hardwood from 1998-2000 ... Was selected to play in the CCGS All-State Game as a senior ... Named the 1998 Player of the Year in the ASA 18 & under National B Division ... Cites winning the 2000 USSSA World Tournament in North Carolina with the Colorado Stars travel team as her most memorable athletic achievement ... Graduated with honors and in the top five percent of her class from Westminster, as she was 12th in her class of 265.

HEAD COACH EHREN EARLEYWINE



After serving as the top assistant coach in the two most successful seasons in Georgia Tech softball history, Ehren Earleywine enters his first season as head coach.

A member of the U.S.A men's fastpitch softball squad, Earleywine served as the Yellow Jackets' hitting and infield coach, as well as the squad's first base coach in 2002 and 2003.

Tech made its only NCAA Tournament appearances in these two seasons and captured the team's first Atlantic Coast Conference title in 2002. Tech won 90 games in that span, including a school record 52 in 2002 where the Yellow Jackets came within one win of the College

World Series.

Under his guidance, Tech broke 16 hitting records and tied two ACC records. As the infield coach, Earleywine helped guide the Jackets to a school record .974 fielding percentage in 2002 and a final ranking of fourth in the country. Georgia Tech's defense led the ACC in both 2002 and 2003.

A standout in men's major fastpitch softball, Earleywine has been a four-time member of Team U.S.A (1998, '99, 2002, '03), including being named captain for the last two years. In 2002, Team USA captured its first-ever Gold Medal in the Pan Am Qualifier, where he hit .429. At the 2003 Pan Am Games, hosted by the Dominican Republic, Earleywine helped lead the United States to a Silver Medal. He is a six-time ASA All-American and was an All-World selection in 1999 by the International Softball Congress.

Prior to coming to Tech, Earleywine was an assistant baseball coach at Texas A&M-Corpus Christi in 2000. He guided the Islander offense to a team batting average of .322 in their inaugural season.

Before Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, Earleywine was head coach at Westminster College from 1997-99. He led the Blue Jays to an overall record of 65-44 and one conference title during his tenure. He also served as an assistant coach from 1994-97, under the guidance of former Major League Baseball outfielder, Phil Bradley.

Earleywine played one year of collegiate baseball at Southwest Missouri State before transferring to Westminster College for the remainder of his collegiate career. During his three seasons for the Blue Jays, Earleywine set seven school records and became a two-time all-conference selection.

A graduate of Westminster College in 1994, Earleywine earned a bachelor's degree in business administration.

A native of Jefferson City, Mo., Ehren and his wife Lisa, reside in Atlanta with their son Connor.

John Bargfeldt enters his first season as assistant coach at Georgia Tech. Bargfeldt will handle the pitchers and catchers for the Yellow Jackets.

Bargfeldt has taught in a baseball/softball academy over the last three years in Indianapolis, Ind. The camps emphasized pitching, catching, hitting and fielding.

Before getting into softball, Bargfeldt was an assistant baseball coach at Anderson College in 1981. He worked with the pitchers and helped guide the team to its best winning percentage in school history.

As a collegian, Bargfeldt was a three-year letterwinner in baseball and football at Anderson University. He was named most valuable player in baseball in 1976 and football in 1977. He has since been inducted into the school's Hall of Fame.

Bargfeldt was drafted in the 31st round by the Chicago Cubs in 1977 as a pitcher/outfielder and played minor league baseball for three seasons.

Bargfeldt recently served on the ASA Men's National Selection Committee and helped select the team that won the first ever Gold Medal at the 2002 Pan AM Games Qualifier. He has also served on the ASA Board of Directors from 2000-02 and was an ASA National Player Representative for that same two-year span.

Bargfeldt participated in men's fastpitch for 17 years and was an ASA All-American five times. He helped lead his major fastpitch team to an ASA National Championship in 1999 and a World title in 2000.

A 1981 graduate of Anderson University, Bargfeldt earned a bachelor's degree in physical education. The Fishers, Ind., native resides in Kennesaw, Ga., with his wife, Barbara, daughter Alexya (14) and son Jeb (8). His oldest son, Kenny (19), is on a baseball scholarship at Ball State University.



Serita Brooks enters her first season as assistant coach at Georgia Tech. Brooks works with the outfielders and assists with hitting and recruiting.

Before coming to Tech, Brooks worked at Champions Fastpitch Academy for the past year as an instructor for hitting and fielding.

The former All-American played for two seasons at Florida State and ranks among the school's all-time leaders in career stolen bases and batting average. She led the Seminoles to two straight NCAA Regional finals and final rankings of 15 and 17, in 2001 and 2000, respectively.

Brooks helped the Seminoles win the 2000 Atlantic Coast Conference Championship en route to garnering All-America (2nd team), all-region, All-ACC and All-ACC Tournament honors. Brooks was a two-time All-ACC, all-region and All-NCAA Tournament performer for the Seminoles from 2000-01.

In 2000, Brooks led the ACC in batting average (.401), hits (99), triples (8) and stolen bases (42). She also led the league in runs scored (58), triples (5) and stolen bases (55) in 2001. Brooks ranks fourth in Seminole history with 97 career stolen bases and a lifetime batting average of .351. She stands fifth in the ACC in career stolen bases.

Prior to attending Florida State, Brooks lettered for two seasons at North Florida C.C., earning all-conference honors in both seasons.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Brooks graduated from Florida State University with a bachelor's degree in sports management in 2002. She received an associate's degree from North Florida Community College in Art in 1999.



Felicia Coursey enters her first season as volunteer assistant coach at Georgia Tech. Coursey will work with the infielders and assist with hitting and on-campus recruiting.

Coursey was a two-year letterwinner for the Yellow Jackets from 2002-03. She ended her career with a lifetime batting average of .245 and a .982 fielding percentage at second base. Coursey hit 13 doubles, eight triples, four home runs and drove in 29 runs over the course of two seasons.

As a senior, Coursey started in all 62 games for the Jackets at second base. She hit .245 and led the team with 11 stolen bases. Posted a .985 fielding percentage in the middle of the infield. Ranked second on the team with 10 doubles, while driving in 18 runs, hitting two triples and two home runs. Tallied 13 multi-hit games for the Jackets.

DR. G. WAYNE CLOUGH PRESIDENT

The chief engineer of Georgia Tech's determined effort to provide technological leadership in a changing world is Dr. G. Wayne Clough, the Institute's tenth president and the first alumnus to serve in that capacity.

His leadership has made undergraduate education more dynamic. He implemented a required computer initiative for all students, and oversaw the revision of the curriculum to include web-based enhancements. The next step was a broad initiative to engage students more fully with faculty in the classroom and research lab, and to create more student leadership opportunities. The positive impact is reflected in higher quality students and higher retention rates.

Sponsored research has also increased every year since Clough became president. Research expenditures now exceed \$340 million a year as Tech moves into exciting interdisciplinary fields like bioengineering, sustainable technology, and nanoscience.

Clough's skills as a civil engineer are evident in reshaping the campus to meet the needs of Tech's world-class programs and students. He has overseen the construction of more than a dozen academic and research buildings, with several more on the drawing board. The campus is fully wired with 1,700 miles of fiber-optic cable and offers a comprehensive wireless environment as well.

To provide the additional resources required to reach this goal, Clough engineered the Campaign for Georgia Tech, which raised a record \$712 million in five years for 54 endowed faculty chairs, 233 endowed scholarships, eleven new buildings, and a host of academic, research and athletic programs.

Beyond campus, he gives Georgia Tech a face and voice in Washington, D.C., as a member of the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology and the executive committee of the U.S. Council on Competitiveness, and as chair of the National Academy of Engineering committee on the Engineer of 2020.

Since September, 2001, he has represented the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) on the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division I Board of Directors.

A native of Douglas, Georgia, Wayne Clough received his bachelor's and master's degrees in civil engineering from Georgia Tech in 1964 and 1965. He earned a Ph.D. in civil engineering from the University of California, Berkeley in 1969.

He was provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University of Washington in Seattle when he answered the call to return to his alma mater as president in September of 1994. Prior to that, he had spent a decade at Virginia Tech as head of the Department of Civil Engineering, then as Dean of the College of Engineering. He also served on the faculties of Duke and Stanford universities.

A specialist in geotechnical and earthquake engineering, he is the author of more than 120 papers and reports, six book chapters, and several widely used geotechnical computer codes. He is presently a consultant to the San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit System for ongoing major seismic retrofitting. His other interests include technology and higher education policy, economic development, diversity in higher education, and technology in a global setting.

Closer to home, he serves on the Board of Advisors for Noro-Moseley Partners, the Southeast's largest venture capital fund, and on the Board of Directors of Total System Services of Columbus, Ga. He is a member of the executive committees for the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce and Central Atlanta Progress, and a trustee of the Georgia Research Alliance. Georgia Trend magazine routinely includes Clough on its list of the 100 most influential Georgians.

Among his many national awards for teaching and research, Clough holds seven from the American Society of Civil Engineers and is one of a select few to have been twice awarded the Norman Medal, civil engineering's oldest honor. In 2001 he received the National Engineering Award from the American Association of Engineering Societies. He has been a member of the National Academy of Engineering for more than a decade.

Wayne and Anne Robinson Clough have been married for more than 30 years and have two grown children.



DAVE BRAINE DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

A national leader in his field, Georgia Tech Director of Athletics Dave Braine has made a career out of building successful programs. As he enters his seventh year at Tech, he has overseen tremendous growth in the Yellow Jackets' overall athletics program while positioning Georgia Tech for the future with ambitious building projects.

Braine, 60, has steered the Georgia Tech Rambling Wreck into the new millennium in successful fashion, using the Yellow Jackets' rich tradition as a guiding light along the way. He follows in the footsteps of four Tech greats of the past—John Heisman, William Alexander, Bobby Dodd and Dr. Homer Rice.

The centerpiece of Tech's current building campaign is the expansion of the historic football facility, Bobby Dodd Stadium at Grant Field, which will be complete this fall. The \$70 million project that raises capacity to 55,000 while adding numerous other amenities and improvements was completed in less than two years.

Also part of the project is the new Russ Chandler Baseball Stadium, a \$9.1 million facility completed in 2002 that seats 4,157 and is one of the nation's finest baseball parks.

This fall, Tech's men's and women's swimming and diving programs will move into one of the nation's most impressive aquatics venues. The Georgia Tech Aquatics Center will feature the competition pool from the 1996 Olympic Games in an enclosed, 1900-seat arena capable of hosting major national events.

Georgia Tech's overall athletics program has enjoyed unprecedented success during Braine's tenure, highlighted by a school-record bowl streak for the football program as well as remarkable growth in women's athletics and continued excellence in sports such as baseball and golf.

Other athletics highlights during Braine's tenure include six Top 10 national team finishes, No. 1 national rankings in baseball and golf, and nine Atlantic Coast Conference team titles in six different sports. Individual accomplishments range from Troy Matteson's 2002 NCAA title in golf to four NCAA runner-up finishes in women's track and cross country to Angelo Taylor's gold medal in track at the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games.

The addition of women's swimming and diving in 2001-02 is further evidence of Georgia Tech's commitment to women's athletics under Braine. In U.S. News & World Report's inaugural ranking of collegiate athletics programs in 2002, Tech was rated number two in the nation in gender equity.

Braine began his administrative career in 1978 when he was named an assistant director of athletics at Virginia. He then took a similar post at Fresno State in 1983 and was promoted to associate athletics director a year later. In 1985, Braine became Director of Athletics at Marshall University, where he remained until he was named Director of Athletics at Virginia Tech on January 1, 1988.

Braine's career as an assistant football coach included a two-year stint as the secondary coach at Georgia Tech in 1974-75 under Pepper Rodgers and also featured stops at Virginia (1976-77), VMI (1969-70) and Richmond (1971-73).

The Grove City, Pa., native earned both his bachelor's (1965) and master's (1966) degrees from the University of North Carolina, where he was a three-time football letterman. Braine is married to the former Carole Bowles of Richmond, Va., and the couple has four children and five grandchildren.



2003: A Return to the NCAA Tournament

After advancing to the NCAA Regional final in 2002, the Georgia Tech softball team made its second straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament last season, receiving an at-large bid. The Yellow Jackets were selected as the No. 4 seed in the Tuscaloosa Regional, finishing in fourth place with a 2-2 mark.

Tech ended the season with an overall record of 38-25. It was the seventh time in school history that the Yellow Jackets surpassed the 30-win plateau.

At the NCAA Tournament, Tech opened play against Big Ten opponent Illinois on May 15. Despite pounding out eight hits and overcoming a three-run deficit in the second inning, Tech dropped the opening game of the regional to the Fighting Illini, 5-3.

In Tech's next ballgame, junior pitcher Erin Voeltz (Westlake, Calif.) was perfect, throwing the first perfect game/no-hitter of her collegiate career against Southern University, as the Jackets cruised in five innings, 9-0. Voeltz struck out a career-high 11 in the game. Providing offense for Tech were juniors Tara Knudsen (Thornton, Colo.) and Tasha Waugh (Tulala, Okla.) each smashing two home runs.

Not to be outdone by her counterpart in the next game, sophomore Jessica Sallinger (Kennesaw, Ga.) answered Voeltz's perfect game with a no-hitter against perennial power Stanford as Tech squeaked by the Cardinal, 1-0, in nine innings on May 16. Senior Lindsay Wood (Marietta, Ga.) delivered the game-winning hit as she sent a ball into the corner for a double to provide the Jackets with the only run of the game. Sallinger ended the game with three strikeouts and four walks.

Game 11 of the NCAA Regional pitted Georgia Tech against Massachusetts. Sallinger threw another gem for the Jackets, allowing just two hits in the game while striking out eight. However, that was not enough for the Rambling Wreck as UMass starter Kaila Holtz fired a three-hitter to propel the Minutewomen to a 2-0 victory and end Tech's season.

Earning NCAA all-tournament honors for the second consecutive season was Sallinger. She ended the NCAA Tournament with an overall record of 1-2, striking out 17 batters in 22 innings and carrying an ERA of 1.91.

The 2003 Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament was held in Tallahassee, Fla., where Tech claimed its first ACC title in 2002. As the No. 3 seed, Tech knocked off No. 2 seed North Carolina in the opener by a 3-1 tally. Waugh delivered the game-winning two-run homer for the Jackets to send Tech to the semifinals against top-seeded Florida State.

In the semifinals, the 10th-ranked Seminoles held a 5-0 lead heading into the seventh inning. After a pair of infield singles and a hit-batsman, Tech loaded the bases with nobody out. The Seminoles, who hadn't won an ACC crown in two straight seasons (North Carolina 2002 and Georgia Tech 2003), brought in All-ACC pitcher Casey Hunter to nail the door shut.

After an RBI fielder's choice by Amy Hosier (Lakewood, Colo.), senior Felicia Coursey (Conyers, Ga.) and pinch hitter Liz Bartle (Coral Springs, Fla.) came through with singles to score two more runs to cut the deficit to two, 5-3. Hunter then retired the final out of the game on a strikeout as the Seminoles advanced to the title game.

For the right to meet FSU in the finals, Virginia and Georgia Tech met for the first time since the regular season split in Charlottesville, Va., back on April 5.

Holding a 3-1 lead heading into the bottom of the sixth inning, Jackets' ace Sallinger had things under control. Then lightning struck as Tech committed two errors and a passed ball as UVA tied the score at 3-3. The Cavaliers then scored the go ahead run on a botched run down by the Jackets as Virginia scored three runs on one hit to down Tech 4-3.

Tech ended the regular season 35-21. The Yellow Jackets faced six ranked opponents and earned a split with No. 17 Alabama. Georgia Tech had many close calls

against ranked opponents as defending national champion, No. 8 California, downed the Jackets 1-0, while Pac-10 powers Oregon State (No. 17) and Oregon (No. 23) escaped with one and three-run wins, respectively.

The Jackets put together two five-game winning streaks and had a season-high six-game streak from March 9-18. During the six-game span, Tech dropped non-conference opponents Virginia Tech (6-0), Georgia State (5-1, 7-3), Princeton (8-1, 4-0) and Arkansas (3-2). The Razorbacks ended the streak in the second game of the doubleheader with a narrow 3-2 win in the nightcap.

Georgia Tech finished the year with a record of 6-3 against in-state foes. No. 8 Georgia held home turf against the Jackets 6-0 and 1-0, returning the favor delivered by Tech the year before in Atlanta. The Rambling Wreck outscored the Peach State opponents 44-15.

Collecting hardware for the Yellow Jackets were Knudsen and Sallinger. Knudsen garnered All-ACC honors for the second straight season, leading the league in home runs per game (0.21). Sallinger led the league with 337 strikeouts, tying her school record from a year ago en route to being named All-ACC.

Tech led the ACC in fielding percentage (.970) for the second straight season and the pitching staff broke the school record with 459 strikeouts.

THE ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 51st year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 86 national championships, including 43 in men's competition and 42 in women's, while 121 men and 35 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

2002-03 IN REVIEW

During the 2002-03 academic year, the ACC won three national team titles and 10 individual NCAA crowns.

The ACC's 2002-03 national champions were Wake Forest in field hockey, Virginia in men's lacrosse and Clemson in men's golf. Overall, 101 ACC teams took part in post-season play and compiled a 75-57-2 record (.567).

A total of 168 student-athletes from the ACC earned first, second or third team All-America honors this past year. In addition the ACC produced three national Players of the Year, one national Rookie of the Year



On May 8, 1953, the Atlantic Coast Conference was formed in Greensboro, N.C. In the 50 years since, the league has developed into a national leader in intercollegiate athletics. During the 2002-03 season, the ACC commemorated 50 years of excellence in intercollegiate athletics. Fiftieth Anniversary Teams were selected in all of the conference's sports.

Georgia Tech's Anne Knobbe, Stephanie Weitman and Laura Williams were selected to the Anniversary team.

and four national Coach of the Year recipients.

The ACC placed at least one team in the top 10 nationally in 15 of the 21 sports sponsored by the league for which polls were available. In all, 27 ACC teams finished their season with a top 10 ranking.

The Championships

The ACC will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during in 2003-04, including 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954, at NC State. The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship held in tennis at Wake Forest, October 6-8. Championships for women are now conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., when the seven charter members—Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest—withdrew from the Southern Conference. On June 14, 1953, those seven schools met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of by-laws was adopted and the name officially became the Atlantic Coast Conference, which was suggested by Duke's Eddie Cameron and unanimously approved.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971 when South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The conference operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.







THE TOTAL PERSON PROGRAM

PREPARING OUR ATHLETES FOR TODAY AND TOMORROW

From national titles to Olympic medals, Georgia Tech's nationally-renowned athletics program has produced many champions. But more importantly, as a result of the Total Person Program, Tech is developing well-rounded student-athletes who go on to winning performances in a wide range of endeavors.

Through this multifaceted program, the brainchild of retired Director of Athletics Dr. Homer Rice, Rambling Wreck student-athletes have the opportunity to learn the elements of success beyond the classroom or playing field. Athletic careers are fleeting, but Tech student-athletes gain skills that remain with them for a lifetime, preparing for the career and personal challenges ahead.

During his 17-year stay on the Flats from 1980-97, Rice rebuilt Georgia Tech's athletic fortunes with an emphasis not just in fund-raising and facilities but in equally important areas such as academic support, career placement and life skills.

Since Rice started the Total Person Program in 1980, it has developed into the most comprehensive student-athlete support system in the country. Rice's model has been adopted nationwide as the foundation for the NCAA's Life Skills Program. Because of the success of the Total Person Program, Georgia Tech was one of three schools chosen to consult with the NCAA on this project.

Current Director of Athletics Dave Braine has built upon the foundation laid by Rice with a continued emphasis on all aspects of the student-athlete's life.

"The concerns of the student-athlete must always come first," says Braine. "I want to make sure that all student-athletes have an opportunity to graduate. It is always our goal to give back a better person than we brought in."

Addressing virtually every area of a well-rounded educational experience, the Total Person Program focuses on the following components:

Life Skills

The foundation of the Life Skills component is the ASPIRE program: Athletes' Successful Planning in Reaching Excellence. It is an interactive workshop that challenges student-athletes to live up to their potential in every area. Incorporated with the program is training and discussion on choices, habits, life mission and goals.

All freshmen student-athletes participate in the ASPIRE program by attending weekly seminars, on topics ranging from time management and media training to drug and alcohol awareness and diversity.

Academic Support & Degree Completion

Georgia Tech offers one of the most comprehensive academic support programs in the country, giving every student-athlete the best possible opportunity to earn a degree that will open doors for a lifetime.

The centerpiece of the academic support program is the Andrew Hearn, Sr., Academic Center, an ultra-modern facility for studying and tutoring located in the Edge Athletic Center. Tutoring is available in a wide range of subjects, and a highly-qualified staff of academic advisors monitor academic progress.

Career Planning & Placement

The career planning and placement program provides guidance well before the student-athlete's graduating semester. Programs are offered in resume writing, interviewing skills and dressing for success, and networking luncheons put students in contact with local business leaders. Student-athletes are assisted in the pursuit of summer employment opportunities that provide meaningful work experience to prepare them for the challenges of a competitive workplace.

Counseling & Wellness

The wellness program addresses a student-athlete's physical, mental, emotional and spiritual needs. In addition to a highly-qualified sports medicine program to treat and prevent injuries, student-athletes are educated in areas such as nutrition, drug and alcohol awareness, and stress management. Christian Fellowship meetings are held weekly.

Leadership

Tech student-athletes have the opportunity to develop leadership skills through the Student-Athlete Advisory Board, a group of representatives from each team that meets with athletic department administrators to help shape policies and address issues of concern.

Honors

Through institutional, conference and national awards, student-athletes are recognized for outstanding efforts in athletics and academics and are encouraged to pursue postgraduate scholarship awards. Through the annual Total Person Awards, two seniors are honored based on outstanding athletic achievement, scholarship and character, and a former student-athlete who utilized the principles of the Total Person Program is recognized. Other annual awards include the Bobby Dodd Scholarship, the Robert Cup and the All-Academic Team.

Community Outreach

Student-athletes are encouraged to give back to the community through a variety of service projects, including a mentoring program with local school children.

TECH TRADITIONS

I'M A RAMBLIN' WRECK FROM GEORGIA TECH

"I'm a Ramblin' Wreck from Georgia Tech and a Hell of an Engineer..."

It was Sept. 30, 1961. The opponent was Rice University for the home opener. For the first time, the official Rambling Wreck car was unveiled to 43,501 fans at Grant Field, leading the Georgia Tech football team onto the field. It has happened at every home game since.

The event did not establish a new tradition, but it cemented one. The restored 1930 Model A Ford Sport Coupe was Tech's first official Rambling Wreck, and it was an instant success. Since that time, the Rambling Wreck car has joined a much older tradition—the Yellow Jacket—as the official school mascot.

The current Wreck is the last in a line of distinctive white and gold cars on campus. While there was no official Rambling Wreck before 1961, several fraternities took turns driving various such vehicles.

Tech administrators decided in the late 1950s that the school needed an official car that would be known forever as the Rambling Wreck. Vice President and Dean of Students James Dull began a search for a pre-1940 vintage model, and finally found one—parked in front of his apartment building.

The owner, Capt. Ted J. Johnson, a Delta Air Line pilot, had just finished restoring the 1930 Ford Cabriolet Sport Coupe, which he intended to give to his son as a gift.

In May 1961, Johnson decided to let Tech have the car for \$1,000. He later returned the purchase price of the Wreck to the Athletic Association as a contribution to the Alexander-Tharpe Fund, fulfilling a desire to go on record as having given the Rambling Wreck to Georgia Tech. The Wreck was again completely restored in 1982 under the supervision of Tech alumnus Pete George, manager of the Ford assembly plant in Hapeville, Ga.

THE YELLOW JACKET

The Yellow Jacket nickname and mascot are two of the most beloved trademarks of Georgia Tech athletic teams, but many conflicting accounts exist as to the origins and beginnings of the Yellow Jacket.

One thing that is clear, however, is that the nickname did not grow out of the familiar six-legged insect, but that the mascot, known as "Buzz," grew out of the nickname. As far as can be determined, the first reference to Tech students as "Yellowjackets" appeared in the Atlanta Constitution in 1905 and came into common usage at that time.

Historians say the name, spelled as one word, was first used to describe the fans who attended Tech athletic events, dressed in yellow coats and jackets. The actual mascot was conceived at a later date, still undetermined.

Other common nicknames which have applied to Georgia Tech teams include Engineers, which is still used by some writers; the Techs, the first known nickname which was phased out sometime around 1910; and the Blacksmiths, which was common between 1902 and 1904 and is thought to be an invention of sportswriters.

The Golden Tornado is another nickname believed to be created by sportswriters. In 1917, Coach John Heisman led Tech's football team to its first national championship. Tech was the first team from the South to earn the honor, which was bestowed by the International News Service. Any subsequent Tech squad which approached that level of excellence was referred to as the Golden Tornado. The nickname was used as late as 1929, when Tech defeated California in the Rose Bowl.

THE RAMBLIN' WRECK SONG

It is doubtful that anything has ever meant as much to an American college as has this Tech fight song, a curious mixture of words and music that grew out of an old folk ballad, "The Sons of the Gamboliers." Since the early 1900's, it has helped make Tech's name known around the world.

The late Howard D. Cutter, a member of the first four-year graduating class who received his mechanical engineering degree in 1892, wrote in the November-December 1942 issue of the *Georgia Tech Alumnus* that the "Ramblin' Wreck" had its beginnings during the first two years after Tech opened in 1885, specifically, inspired when almost the entire student body traveled to Athens to see Tech's baseball team defeat Georgia.

In 1910, Michael A. Greenblatt, Tech's first bandmaster, discovered the band playing "Ramblin' Wreck" to the tune of "The Sons of the Gamboliers" and made his first arrangement of the song in the form of a handwritten manuscript.

When Frank Roman succeeded Greenblatt as bandmaster in 1911, he wrote a new adaptation of "Ramblin' Wreck," accompanied by many trumpet flourishes, that was played by every name band in the country and became nationally known on radio. His is the musical version that continues to be popular today.

The fame of the song spread to such proportions that in 1959 it was sung by Richard Nixon and Nikita Khrushchev at their historic face-to-face meeting in Moscow.

OLD GOLD AND WHITE

In the fall of 1891, before Georgia Tech organized a football team of its own, a game was scheduled between Auburn and Georgia. Due to the rivalry established in baseball games between Tech and Georgia (which remains strong after more than 100 years), the Tech students were invited to the game to cheer, of course, for Auburn.

At a mass meeting, the students appointed a committee to recommend colors to be worn and cheers to be used at the game. The committee suggested white and gold, and about 200 students attended the game wearing school colors for the first time.

GEORGE P. BURDELL

In 1927, a mythical student named George P. Burdell appeared on class rosters, registration forms and grade reports. He has since become one of the Institute's most notable students.

Burdell was the creation of student Ed Smith. While filling out an application form, Smith was struck with the impish idea of enrolling a non-existent student. He even turned in separate exam papers for Burdell, convincing professors that George was a student in good standing. Burdell received a bachelor's and later a master's degree from Tech.

Since Smith's graduation, other students have kept George P. Burdell alive at Tech and elsewhere. In the spring of 1969, the first quarter that Tech used completely computerized registration, Burdell beat the system by registering for every course the school offered—more than 3,000 credit hours.

RAT CAPS

Tech has several customs especially created for its freshmen. One of the oldest and proudest freshman traditions, wearing Tech's gold-colored rat cap, originated with the ANAK society in 1915. The term "rat" originally referred to first-year military students.

The rat cap has been a distinctive symbol of membership in Tech's freshman class. Freshmen decorate their rat caps by writing winning football scores upright, losing scores upside down, and tie scores sideways. Co-ops circle the top button.

The home of the Yellow Jacket softball team is Glenn Field, located near the Georgia Tech campus just off 14th and Mecaslin Streets.

With a seating capacity of up to 500 spectators, Glenn Field has been home to the Tech softball program since the inception of fastpitch play in 1987. The dimensions of the field are 190 feet to left, 220 feet to center and 190 feet to right.

The Jackets have experienced great success at Glenn Field, winning nearly 58 percent of their contests there since the field was constructed. Tech has gone 31-6 over the last two seasons for a program-best .838 winning percentage for any two-year stretch.

Glenn Field, maintained by Georgia Tech sports turf manager Shawn Teske and his crew, is continually being improved. Recent improvements include a warning track expansion, improved drainage and the addition of full windscreens.

A new, state-of-the-art scoreboard was added for the 2002 season.

New turf for Tech's batting cages was added for this season.

Over the last few seasons, a warning track was added around the outfield and in front of the dugouts. A trailer was installed behind the backstop, housing a public address booth, concession stand and restroom.

Also, wall signage and flags of the ACC schools that compete in softball were added to enhance the appearance of the outfield.

Other recent improvements include a new irrigation system and

a second phone line for radio broadcasts.

Prior to the 1995 season, a new public address system was installed and the outfield fence was moved in, creating space for home and visitor bullpens and two batting cages.

The Yellow Jackets also enjoy an outstanding locker room facility in Alexander Memorial Coliseum at McDonald's Center. The locker room was given a facelift as part of an 11-month, \$10 million renovation of the building, which was the site of the boxing competition during the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games.




RECORD-SETTING CROWD:



