## Naval R.O.T.C. To Begin Summer Cruise June 13

### Juniors To Embark On Broome, Basic Students On Wyoming

The Tech Naval Unit will embark June 13 on its annual summer training cruise, in Charleston, South Carolina. The advanced course will be on board the destroyer, U.S.S. Broome, and the basic course students will embark on the U.S.S. Wyoming, a battleship.

The cruise will then proceed to New York City and will have liberty there for two days, June 17 and 18. Sailing from New York, they will arrive in Portland, Maine, June 22, and leave June 24 for Annapolis, Maryland, to see the Naval Academy and visit Washington.

They will leave Annapolis and run to the Southern Drill grounds, where target practice will be fired by both advanced and basic course students. They will then proceed back to Charleston, arriving July 7.

Lieutenant Commander P. R. Coloney and Lieutenant W. S. Heald will be aboard the Wyoming with the basic course students. They will be assisted by C. G. M. Criswell and C. S. K. Howard. Lieutenant G. W. Ashford will be the officer in charge of the Tech unit on board the Broome and will be assisted by C. S. M. Fickes.

The Tech unit has won the competition every year since the units have competed, and from all indications, it looks as though they're ready to put forth effort to again bring the honors home.

## Graduation Invitations To Be On Sale April 6-17; College Inn To Take Orders

### To Be Of Two Types And In Three Price Ranges; Will Contain Pictures

The officers of the Senior Class wish to announce that orders will be taken for graduation invitations beginning April 6 and closing April 17. Orders will be taken in the College Inn every day from 8:00 to 1:00 o'clock.

Invitations are of two types and of three price ranges. The booklet invitation contains pictures of Dr. Brittain, Dean Skiles, and various scenes of the campus as well as the Commencement Day program, roster of graduating seniors, and rosters of our most prominent scholastic and social organizations. It will be covered either by leather, which sells for thirty cents, or by cardboard, which sells for twenty cents. In addition, a folder will be offered at ten cents which will include a scene on the campus and the Commencement Day program. The inclusion of this program page is unique in that it has never been included in any previous Tech folder invitation.

Two envelopes will be given with each invitation, one of which will be of a special postage saving variety. This envelope will cut the cost of postage two-thirds on the "booklet" invitation.

## Jack Teagarden To Bring Band To Tech For Program April 23 As Part of Entertainment Series

### Outstanding Orchestra To Feature "Swing Concert"; First Show Of Kind To Be Presented At Tech

Jack Teagarden will bring his famous orchestra to the Tech gymnasium Tuesday night, April 23, it was announced this week by Dr. Harold B. Friedman, chairman of the Entertainment Committee. Appearing as the feature of this year's new student program series, Teagarden will stage a "swing concert." First in the history of Tech, the attraction should prove to be the most popular single event of the term.

All properly-enrolled Tech students are eligible to receive one free ticket to the show, which will last for two hours. As in the past, tickets will be distributed in advance; however, it will be necessary this time for all those signing for tickets to identify themselves at the door. None will be allowed to sign for somebody else's ticket, and those wishing to bring dates must purchase date tickets at forty cents each.

The popular trombone-playing band leader will bring with him the band which made such a hit at a local theater recently, and which has played for Interfraternity dances at Auburn and other southern schools. Selected by *Down Beat's* musicians' poll as the best swing trombonist in the world, Teagarden leads a sensational band which features a seven-man brass section on hot swing numbers. However, there will be plenty of the famous Teagarden vocalizing, along with novelty numbers and renditions of the tunes which the band has recorded recently.

Mack Conway, leader of the Technicians, will serve as master of ceremonies, and will endeavor to explain the Teagarden technique in engineering terms for the benefit of the audience. ## Tech Delegates To Attend Congress In New Orleans

### Student Government, College Publications To Be Discussed

The nineteenth annual Congress of the Southern Federation of College Students and Publication Representatives will meet in New Orleans, La., on April 11 and will continue through April 13. Convention headquarters will be at the Jung Hotel. Hosts for the Congress will be Tulane University and Newcomb College. Last year the representatives met at Charleston. Members that will attend the Congress in New Orleans are made up of the representatives of the colleges and universities in thirteen Southern states.

#### To Discuss Problems

The purpose of the Congress is for the representatives of the colleges and universities to discuss problems on student government and publications.

Whetsell, Agnes Scott College, women's vice-president; Martin Schmidt, Tulane University, chairman press division; and Graham Elliott, The Citadel, chairman yearbook division.

#### Tech Delegates

Tech will be represented by seven men: Howard Ector, Roane Beard, and Charles McKinnon will be the senior representatives; the first two representing student government and the last publications. Frank Allcorn, Tom Kell, and Bob Weatherford, all juniors, will represent The Technique and Warren Taylor, a sophomore, will convene with the student government group.

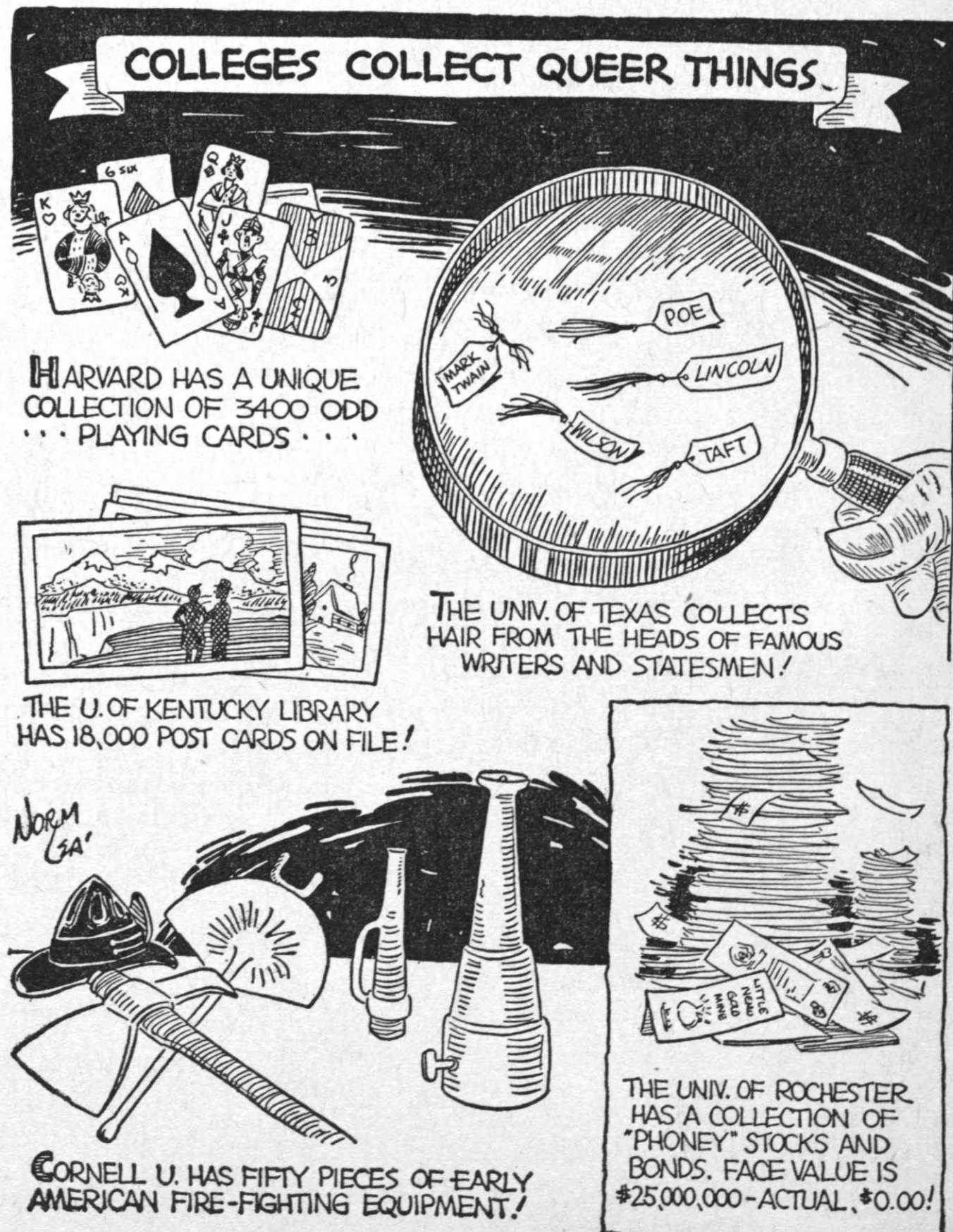

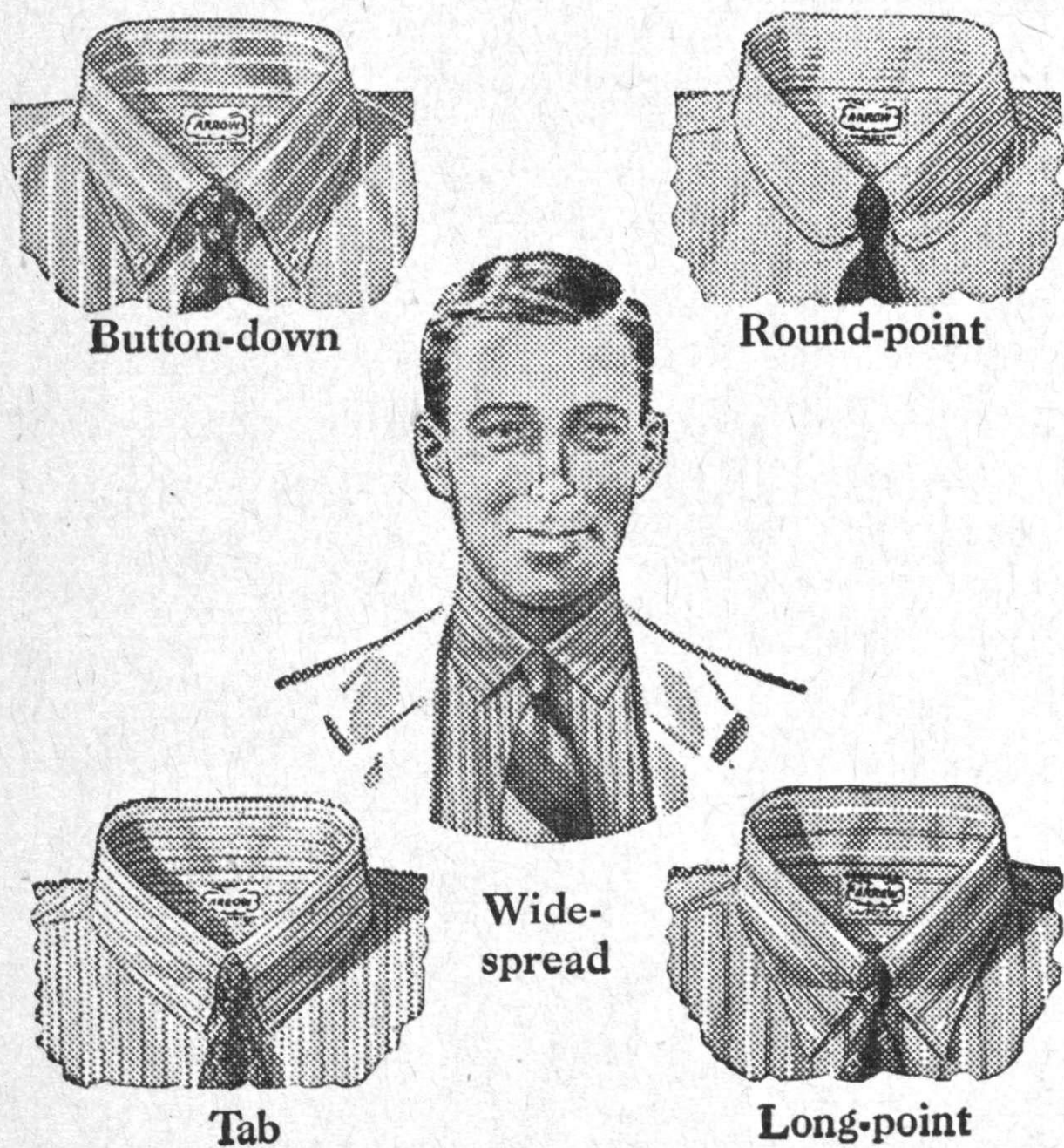

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## Rifle Team Leads Fourth Corps Area In Hearst Match

Firing the best score in their history, the Yellow Jacket Rifle Team placed first in the Fourth Corps Area, in the William Randolph Hearst National Trophy Match. At the present time it is not known how the Jackets rank nationally, but on the basis of previous years it can be reasonably assumed they will be no lower than fourth.

The Jackets fired the remarkable total of 945x1000 to beat their nearest competitor by nine points, The University of Tennessee who fired the total of 936x1000. The Crimson Tide of Alabama took third honors with a score of 935x1000, while The Citadel came in fourth with 933x1000.

Twenty-seven teams from the Fourth Corps Area competed in this match, and approximately the same number from each of the other eight Corps Areas participated.

Climaxing a long and outstanding record of firing on the Rifle Team at Georgia Tech, Captain Harold A. Dye fired 195x200 to lead his team to the heights. Of all the excellent scores Dye has fired during the past four years, this was the best and the most timely. Dropping only five points out of a possible 200, his 195 was the

spark needed to put his teammates on their mettle. His 195x200 was the highest score fired in the Corps Area, and as a result he will be awarded a trophy as high individual in this match. Firing the second highest score in the Fourth Corps Area, President of the Georgia Tech Rifle Club, Mark C. Hageny, shot 194x200.

Capt. Dye's unusually high score was made possible by his firing 49

out of a possible 50 in the standing position. This is the best standing score ever fired at Georgia Tech and it will probably remain so for many years.

The other three team members, James T. Scanlan, William R. Sander-son, and Alvin E. Raettig all acquitted themselves creditably in this match. The only freshman to fire on the first Hearst team in several years, Scanlan shot 189x200.

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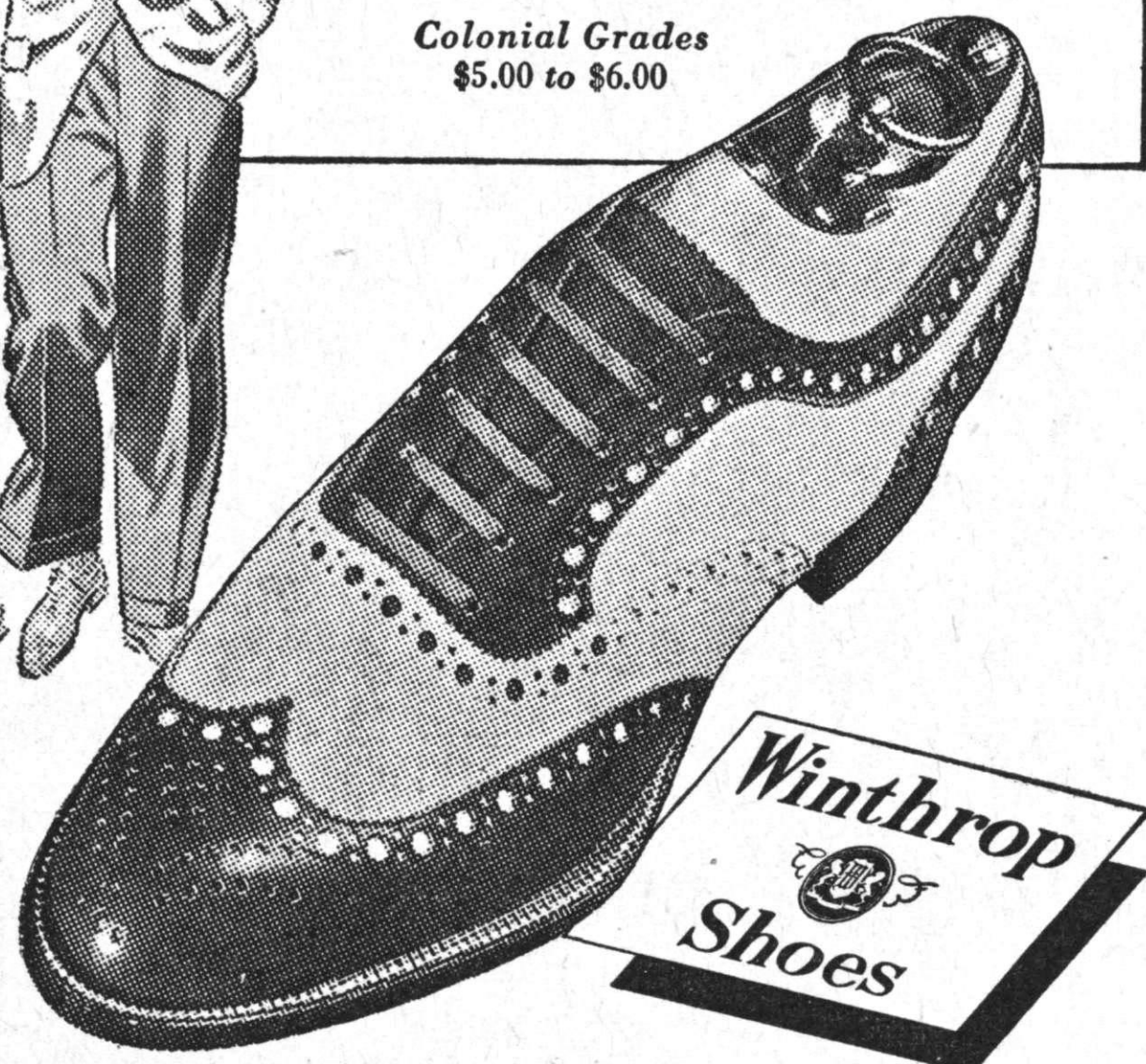


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## Pi Kappa Phi Defeats Delta Sigma Phi By Score Of 5-1 To Win Interfrat Softball Crown; Cup To Be Given
