Georgia Tech Honors Faculty, Donors

t was payback time for some of Georgia Tech's finest faculty and supporters, who were honored recently by the Georgia Tech Foundation, Inc.

About 150 special guests, including Georgia Tech faculty members who hold 41 chairs and professorships representing an endowment of \$38 million and the donors who made them possible were recognized April 21 at the third annual reception and dinner.

Georgia Tech Foundation President John H. Weitnauer, Jr. served as master of ceremonies.

Georgia Tech President G. Wayne Clough pointed out the hard work accomplished by such distinguished faculty.

"It is your excellence in the classroom and your useful and innovative research that consistently drives Tech higher in national prestige and helps Tech continue to attract students of the highest caliber," he said.

He also pointed out Tech would not have achieved as much without the generosity of its donors.

"Georgia Tech has great aspirations," said Dr. Clough. "We use your funds to support curriculum development, research, and education. It is through your support that our chairholders have the flexible resources that are so vital to pursuing new ideas and new research," he said.

The Georgia Research Alliance (GRA), a partnership of six research universities, state government, and a broad cross section of the high-tech industry, was recognized for having helped fund six GRA Eminent Scholar Chairs at Tech. It was the GRA that facilitated research incorporating distance learning and biomedical

Inauguration Features High Tech Presentation

wo special multimedia pieces are being produced to help celebrate the Inauguration of President Clough at the Fox Theatre on Friday, May 12.

The first piece showcases the tenures of Tech's first nine presidents, set to the music score entitled "The White and Gold Rhapsody," which was originally commissioned for the Tech Centennial. This presentation is being developed by the College of Architecture's IMAGINE Group and produced by Tech's new Artist-in-Residence James Oliverio.

Photographic and anecdotal contributions for this historic perspective have come from Library Archivist Ruth Hale, coupled with more than 100 vintage images provided by Georgia Tech Tele-Photo. It provides a glimpse of campus life in all of the previous eras, framed in the context of significant events that marked the tenure of each of the first nine presidents. The musical accompaniment will be performed live by the Georgia Tech Symphonic Band, conducted by Bucky Johnson, head of the Music Department.

The second multimedia presentation looks toward the future, integrating a wealth of visual imagery with a new music score written especially for the occasion by composer James Oliverio, who is also serving as producer of the piece. The majority of the visuals for this presentation have been programmed by 3-dimensional computer animation specialists John Cordova and Scott Robertson of the Multi-Media Technology Laboratory, with assistance from students in Richard Braunstein's class in Alias Animation. Actual video and photographs of research being done on the Tech campus were solicited from all departments and laboratories across the campus. Many of the selected images are being incorporated into the body of the piece.

The fundamental concept behind this new piece is the constant interplay between knowledge and imagination. Oliverio likens the five-minute piece to a journey through the collective intellectual network of Georgia Tech. It moves through various centers of knowledge to a level of creativity and imagination that is below the surface. The piece then returns with a new idea or discovery to bring it into reality with design and engineering. The soundtrack for this piece is computer-generated music synchronized with the combined forces of the University Orchestra and the Tech Symphonic Band, and conducted by Professor Ron Mendola.

FutureNet Voice Phase Begins

utureNet, a project aimed at providing every room on the campus access to a broad range of services — including high-speed data, full motion video and voice, has received state funding and changes are on the way.

'University System Chancellor Stephen Portch, in his budget request, asked for and received

\$4 million for partial funding of FutureNet. Georgia Tech Foundation is providing financing for planning and initial engineering of

FutureNet. Initial construction is jointly supported through a collaboration of Georgia Tech, ACOG (Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games), and Olympic sponsors BellSouth and AT&T," said John Mullin, FutureNet program manager and director, Operations and Engineering, Georgia Tech's Office of Information Technology (OIT).

"One of the earliest visible signs of the FutureNet activity will be the impending construction. We will work closely with building owners/residents to minimize any disruption to their activities. We will be issuing an ongoing series of communiques to keep the campus informed of the FutureNet plans and progress," explained Mullin.

In addition, several important changes to the current phone service are anticipated, including the changeout of the BellSouth

central office switch that serves Georgia Tech. This changeout, which is currently anticipated for December 1995, will have significant benefits to the Tech community, but also the following



Campus Visitors Need Passes During Olympic Security Period

O. Will deliveries be allowed during the Olympic Security Period? How will I get essential office supplies?

A. For Tech employees working in the Research Controlled Area, limited deliveries will be possible. For people working in the Village Secure Area, deliveries will be very difficult. The Olympic/Paralympic Planning Office is encouraging all departments to stock up on standard office supply items prior to the Village Secure Period (July 1 - August 10, 1996). Essential deliveries which cannot be made prior to the beginning of the Secure Period must be scheduled and will be subject to a detailed security process.

Q. How will we service our copy machines and other equipment if it breaks down during the Village Secure Period?

A. If there are items which will need regular service while the campus is secured, the department should ask that a repair person be accredited to enter the Village.

All routine maintenance should be scheduled outside of the Village Secure Period. If an item breaks down while the campus is secured, a day pass will have to be secured for the repairperson. Departments will be given information on this procedure before the Secure Period begins.

Q. Will it be possible for research sponsors, potential sponsors or others to come to faculty/staff workspaces during the Olympics?

A. It will be possible to have offcampus visitors within the Research Controlled Zone via special pass arrangements. Arranging visits within the Village and Venue Security Zones will be more difficult, though not impossible. Day passes for visits within the Village and Venue Security Zones will be possible for legitimate reasons, however, it is requested that only visits which require on-campus presence be held here. Other meetings should be moved to an off-campus site if possible.

diagnostic technology that has already put Georgia Tech in the headlines worldwide.

As holder of the David S. Lewis, Jr. Chair and a Regents' Professor, Ben T. Zinn spoke to the group about the benefits of endowed chairs. Zinn is one of 12 active members of the National Academy of Engineering on the Tech faculty.

'The faculty is the engine that drives a university," said Zinn. "A superior faculty serves as a magnet to attract other great faculty, excellent students, and resources to fund educational and research pro-

Zinn emphasized how the funds provided by endow and been used by several of the faculty members to leverage their resources. He cited statistics which show that in the School of Mechanical Engineering the average outside support of a chair holder equals six to seven times the amount of funds received from the chair.

Zinn said that chair resources are also used for development of new facilities and modernization of existing facilities to remain competitive.

Activities supported by endowed chairs improve the economic competitiveness of Atlanta and the United States, he said.
