Tech Hosts Trials for '96 Paralympics

ver 150 athletes from 19 countries competed in the International Paralympic Swim Trials (IPST), held August 17-20 at the Georgia Tech Aquatic Center. The event was part of the one-year out Paralympic Countdown Celebration, hosted by the Atlanta Paralympic Organizing Committee (APOC) and the Shepherd Center of Atlanta.

In all, there were 154 medal events, designed to provide an opportunity for athletes to obtain international classification and a chance to establish a qualification time for the 1996 Atlanta Paralympic Games, scheduled for August 16-25, 1996.

The U.S. had the largest showing with over 90 swimmers competing. Australia had the next largest contingency with a total of 25 athletes. China and Japan each sent 20 swimmers. Other countries represented include Argentina, Canada, Cuba, Guinea, Iraq, Korea, Kuwait, Malaysia, Nepal, New Zealand, Nigeria, Peru, Swychelles and Thailand, according to APOC officials.

Paralympic events range from wheelchair basketball to swimming and tennis. Participants are comprised of amputees, quadriplegics, paraplegics, visually impaired, dwarfs, cerebral palsy, and les autres (those with disabilities difficult to categorize). Each competitor must be selected by his or her national team before gaining eligibility for the international event.

The first Paralympic Games were held in Rome in 1960 and have been held every Olympic year since, usually in the city or country hosting the Olympic Games. The Paralympics and the Olympics share most of the same venus and many of the same sporting competitions.

Police Handle Package with Special Care

he Georgia Tech Post Office experienced a false alarm Saturday, August 12, upon receipt of a suspicious package with no return address. The package, addressed to the School of Earth and Atmospheric Sciences, was wrapped in tape, with wires protruding through the wrapping.

It was essentially two packages taped together, with a metal ring sticking out, said Jack Vickery, Georgia Tech police chief. "We notified city officials just to be safe," he said.

The package met the city's profile for "suspicious packages" and was opened remotely. At this point, it was determined the suspicious parcel was a weather balloon package produced by the College of Earth and Atmospheric Sciences.

School officials identified the contents as an ozone sunde, a device used to measure ozone in the stratos-

The device is one cubic foot, styrofoam object with an antenna that attaches to a balloon. Researchers attached the device to a balloon and sent it up about 125,000 feet, according to Michael Rodgers, associate

Teachers Integrate Problem Solving Techniques

recent School of Electrical and Computer Engineering (ECE) workshop reminded high school teachers "people are the real problem solvers, not machines."

The "Integrated Problem Solving Workshop" emphasized the blending of science and mathematics courses, and encouraged the use of integrated calculation methods.

"We think it is important for educators to take an integrated approach to problem solving by combining the use of pencil and paper, modern calculators, and computers," said Thomas Gaylord, Regents' Professor, School of Electrical and Computer Engineering. "The strengths and weaknesses of each, and how they fit with each other, is crucial to solving real world problems," he said.

One of the themes of the workshop was, "the problem solver, not the calculating device, is the key to problem solving," according to Gaylord.

Twenty high school science and mathematics teachers assembled at Tech for the three-day intensive hands-on workshop. Participating teachers represented private and public high schools from several metro Atlanta counties.

The workshop, taught by a

combination of ECE and North Springs High School instructors, was based on senior-level problems in chemistry, physics, and business. Instructors used the applications to introduce problem solving methods and tools. Participants analyzed and solved the problems using pen and paper, graphics calculators and computer software.

"A lot of teachers don't have the time or resources to keep up to date with the available instructional tools," Gaylord said. "We hope that the computer and technical training we provided will help them to broaden their teaching methods," he said.

Several ECE professors served as workshop instructors. Participating professors included Gaylord, Dave Hertling, and Jim McClellan. José Cruz-Rivera, Ph.D. candidate, also served as a workshop instructor. High school instructors were Jan Gaylord and Patricia Walker, both from North Springs High School.

"Putting the workshop material together and refining our training techniques was the hard part," said Gaylord.
"Assuming our sponsorship needs are fulfilled, we will be able to offer the workshop on a regular basis."

Participants responded positively to the workshop, said Diana Fouts, workshop coordinator. Written evaluations revealed that 100 percent of the high school teachers who attended "would recommend this course to others."

Seventy high school teachers applied for the workshop. To ensure each teacher would receive individual instruction, only 20 were selected.

Participants were chosen, said Gaylord, with favor given to those schools that were able to send both a science teacher and mathematics teacher.



professor, Earth and Atmospheric Sciences. The balloon pops and the device parachutes back to earth, Rodgers explained.

This particular ozone sunde was launched in Nashville, Tennessee during the month of July.

For recycling purposes, said Rodgers, the department attaches a request with each device that indicates the item should be returned if found. "The person who found this one [the ozone sunde] didn't exactly follow our instructions," Rodgers said. The attached request advises senders to clearly label the outside of the package, he said.

The device was blown up by the Atlanta Bomb Squad before the contents were identified. This is the second incident involving the ozone sunde. Last month the Nashville Bomb Squad destroyed a package that a local post office recovered.

Chief Vickery suggests individuals take the following precautions when mailing on or off campus:

- · always put a complete return address on every package; · use a label to verify content,
- · and use packaging with a professional appearance. "Following these procedures," said Vickery "will help reduce unnecessary suspicions."

Pedestrians and Bicyclists Should Take Safety Precautions

raveling on foot or by bike can be invigorating, but with daily construction and other Olympic-related activity on campus, bicyclists and pedestrians need to take special precautions to avoid accidents.

The following safety tips should be followed by all types of Tech travelers:

 Pedestrians should look both ways before crossing the street and entering or exiting a bus. Vehicles sometimes pass the bus while it is loading or unloading.

 Pedestrians should always approach intersections with extreme caution, and never assume the bicyclists or vehicles are going to stop.

• Drivers should yield the right of way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway whether the person is in or outside of a crosswalk.

Bicyclists should stop before entering the crosswalk, to allow pedestrians to cross before proceeding. Bicyclists riding on the sidewalks should approach pedestrians or other cyclists slowly, or they may become frightened and move into your path. When passing from behind make yourself known by sounding a horn or bell, and by saying "On your left (or right)." This will ensure they do not turn into your path.

 Pedestrians and drivers should always be aware of who or what else occupies the area in which they are traveling.

Employees Urged to Plan for the Summer 1996 Commute

ost Tech employees have already responded to a survey regarding their needs to access campus during the summer of 1996. Now, employees must decide how they intend to get to the campus.

Employees who need to get to Georgia Tech during the Olympic Secure Period (July 1 - August 10, 1996) will have several commuting options. The one which is most encouraged is MARTA.

Georgia Tech employees who commit to using MARTA rail and bus campus service will receive a free MARTA card, entitling the card holder free train and bus service, as well as free parking in MARTA-operated lots and additional satellite lots, being run by ACOG for specific MARTA stations.

Transportation from the Midtown and/or North Avenue MARTA station to the campus entry control points will be provided. The MARTA pass will be good for all travel within the MARTA system during the period June 15 - August 15, 1996, allowing employees who choose this option to ride MARTA free to any point in the city.

There has recently been a change in the plan for street closures around Georgia Tech. 10th Street will now be a limited access street between Northside Drive and the 1-75/85 connector, meaning that the general public will not be able to use the street. Buses carrying spectators, official vehicles, Georgia Tech employee shuttles and vehicles with a specific need to access a point on 10th Street will still be allowed. North Avenue (between the I-75/85 connector and Luckie Street) and Tech Parkway will be closed with no public access

Satellite parking lots will be available for employees who are unable to use MARTA. The location of these lots has not yet been determined.

Employees who use these lots will drive to the parking lot, board a shuttle bus for the ride to Georgia Tech, and then pass through the entry control point at either the Village Secure Zone or the Research Controlled Area.

A senior design team from industrial and systems engineering is currently conducting a transportation survey that will aid in the planning of Georgia Tech satellite parking lots. The survey results will also be used in the employee shuttle planning process.

The surveys were sent to each campus functional area planner. Employees who have not been contacted regarding their transportation plans for the summer of 1996 should seek guidance from their department or unit planners, as there will only be enough parking spaces for those who indicate that they need one.

Georgia Tech will keep employees informed of changes to the transportation plan which may affect traffic patterns in the Georgia Tech area as well as other things which may affect each employees commute to and from campus.



lympic athletes are not the only ones testing their skills at Atlanta Sports '95. Volunteers are also being tested to see if they are able to deliver what the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games requires.

No stranger to volunteerism, Candy Carson, director of Georgia Tech Olympic Committee, shares her experience as a volunteer at the NationsBank Pan Pacific Swimping Competition.

Q.) What type of work did you perform during the event?

A.) I was a photo marshall, which is part of ACOG's press operations division. My main responsibility was to make sure reporters and photographers stayed within the area, or zones, for which they were credentialed.

Q.) What was your work sched-

A.) I worked August 10-13 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Q.) What type of preliminary training did you receive?

A.) The training was broken down into two segments. First volunteers attended a general meeting, that provided an overview for everyone who would be working at a swimming event.

Second, there was a combined meeting and dress rehearsal where each volunteer was debriefed and walked through their specific posts.

Over 200 volunteers attended the five-hour dress rehearsal, held at the Aquatic Center the Sunday preceding the event.

Q.) What are your comments concerning the organization of the event?

A.) Through the course of the week event planners and volun-

teers seem to establish a rhythm and operations ran relatively smoother than the first day.

One of the goals of the preview events is to see what areas need to be improved from the smallest detail, like how many sodas and sandwiches each volunteer will consume. Once these details are ironed out, future planning will be done accordingly. Along those lines, from an operational viewpoint the event was a success.

Q.) What did you gain personally, by participating in the event?

A.) I learned about a new area, dealing with the media, and that will help me do a better job during the '96 Games.

Carson, who has been involved with the Olympic Volunteer effort since 1991, also donated her time during the Paralympic Swim Trials, held August 17-20.
