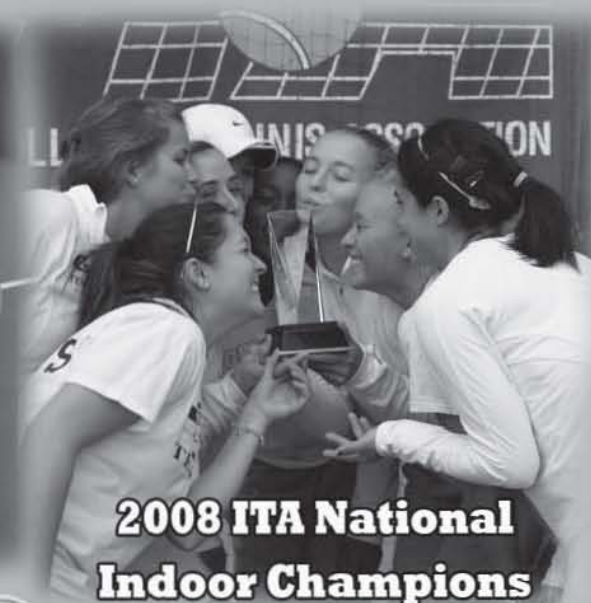

ITA NATIONAL INDOORS

The Yellow Jackets opened the 2007 season in Madison, Wisc., competing in the USTA/ITA National Team Indoor Championships. After Tech knocked off No. 13 Pepperdine, 7-0, in the opening round, senior Alison Silverio posted a comeback, three-set victory to help the Jackets to a 4-3 win against No. 7 North Carolina in the quarterfinals.

Georgia Tech faced Stanford, the nation's top-ranked women's tennis team, in the semifinals and snapped the Cardinal's NCAA-record 89-match winning streak in the process. Stanford, the three-time defending national champion, lost the doubles point before senior Tarryn Rudman and freshmen Kirsten Flower and Amanda Craddock posted key singles wins to lift the Yellow Jackets to the championship match with a 4-3 win.

The Yellow Jackets earned the doubles point against No. 4 Notre Dame and received singles wins from Flower, Craddock and sophomore Christy Striplin to become just the second school from the Atlantic Coast Conference to win the USTA/ITA National Team Indoor Title.

ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS

After opening their 2007 conference schedule with a 4-3 loss at Clemson, the Yellow Jackets finished off the regular season by winning 12 straight matches, 10 of which came against ACC opponents, to finish in a first-place tie with the Tigers for the regular season title. During that run, the Jackets notched their first-ever victory against the Duke Blue Devils, who they would defeat, 4-0, in the quarterfinals of the 2007 ACC Championships for their second win against the vaunted program. Georgia Tech went on to stop North Carolina for the third time on the season, 4-2, in the semifinals and met Miami for the third-straight season in the finals, with Georgia Tech recording a 4-1 win to earn its third-consecutive conference crown.

ROAD TO NCAA TITLE BEGAN IN ATLANTA

Georgia Tech hosted an NCAA Women's Tennis Regional for the third-consecutive year and for the third consecutive year, advanced to the NCAA Championships with a pair of match wins at the Bill Moore Tennis Center.

Tech opened the 2007 tournament against Furman and cruised to a 4-0 win behind the stellar play of Tarryn Rudman (left), who notched a 6-0, 6-0 singles win and teamed with Kirsten Flower for an 8-2 doubles victory against the Paladins as the Jackets advanced to the round of 32.

Amanda McDowell (right) posted a 6-0, 6-0 singles win the following day and Kristi Miller added singles and doubles victories to lead Tech to a 4-0 win against #33 Kentucky as the Jackets advanced to the round of 16 in Athens.

FINAL: TECH 4, #12 UCLA 2

Kristi Miller, Amanda McDowell and Christy Striplin won singles matches before senior Alison Silverio provided the clinching victory at No. 2 singles to give Georgia Tech a 4-2 win over No. 12 UCLA in the NCAA championship match. The championship is the first NCAA title in any sport for Georgia Tech, which has also won four national championships in football via wire service polls.

Tech fell behind by losing the doubles point and then trailed 2-1 before Miller and Striplin put the Jackets back on top 3-2 with Silverio just beginning her third set. Tech trailed in the remaining match on court six when Silverio finished off 40th-ranked Tracy Lin with a dominating 6-1 win in the third. Silverio had won the first 7-5 but dropped the second, also 7-5. Silverio was named the Most Valuable Player of the NCAA Tournament.

McDowell earned Tech's first singles win with a 6-1, 6-0 blitzing of Ashley Joelson at No. 4 singles. One day after clinching Tech's semifinal win over California, Striplin again provided a key victory as she rallied for a three-set win over Alex McGoodwin at No. 5 singles. After losing the first set, Striplin won 12 of the final 14 games for a 4-6, 6-1, 6-2 victory. McDowell, Striplin and Silverio were all named to the NCAA all-tournament team.

Miller, ranked sixth in the nation, defeated No. 15 Riza Zalameda at No. 1 singles, 6-3, 7-6.

SEMIFINAL: TECH 4, #10 CALIFORNIA 2

Freshmen Amanda Craddock and Amanda McDowell won their singles matches after Tech breezed through doubles, and then sophomore Christy Striplin (right) rallied from a 4-1 deficit in the third set to clinch a 4-2 victory for Georgia Tech over No. 10 California, putting the Yellow Jackets in the national championship match for the first time in school history. Craddock teamed with senior Alison Silverio to open doubles play with an 8-2 win before Kristi Miller and Whitney McCray polished off the doubles point with an 8-6 victory.

QUARTERFINAL: TECH 4, #7 NOTRE DAME 2

The Yellow Jackets captured the doubles point with a pair of easy wins at the top of the lineup before Amanda Craddock and Alison Silverio (below, far right) pulled Georgia Tech to within one point of the victory with straight-set singles wins. Amanda McDowell (below, second from right) then polished off the Jackets' 4-2 win over No. 7 Notre Dame with her ninth-straight singles victory to advance to the semifinals of the 2007 NCAA Women's Tennis Championships.

ROUND OF 16: TECH 4, #14 FRESNO STATE 2

After Amanda McDowell, Tarryn Rudman and Christy Striplin all posted 6-3, 6-1 singles wins, senior Alison Silverio (right) battled for a 7-6 (5), 6-4 singles victory to lead Georgia Tech to a 4-2 win over No. 14 Fresno State and the Yellow Jackets' first appearance in the NCAA quarterfinals in history.

Tech had appeared in the round of 16 in each of the prior two seasons, but failed to advance to the quarterfinal round on both occasions.

2009 Outlook - A Commitment to Excellence

A year and a half removed from winning the 2007 NCAA Championship, Georgia Tech women's tennis head coach Bryan Shelton has assembled a new group of Yellow Jackets to once again make a run at the title. The youthful group with only two upperclassmen lost two All-Americans in the offseason to graduation, but that has not put a damper on the coach's expectations for the upcoming season.

"I believe we have a special group assembled this year," Shelton said. "This team has a new and fresh identity. I believe with our youth comes a lot of excitement and energy. I suspect we will make steady progress throughout the year and will surprise some people late. We'll make some mistakes along the way, but you will see huge improvements throughout the season."

After four seasons anchored by perennial All-American Kristi Miller and her solid and steady doubles partner Whitney McCray, the Yellow Jackets will need to try and replace over 210 career singles and doubles victories.

"We can not replace those two All-Americans," Shelton said. "They both made the program what it is today. We move forward with a new team with different strengths and a new identity. It keeps coaching interesting and fun. I do believe we can be just as successful."

Shelton is optimistic for good reason. He returns 2008 NCAA Singles Champion Amanda McDowell, a junior from Atlanta, Ga., who won a school record 45 singles matches in 2008. McDowell was named the 2008 ITA National Player of the Year and earned the 2008 Honda Award for Tennis as the nation's top player. The most challenging road ahead for McDowell is supplanting Miller as the team's leader and holding down the No. 1 position in the Yellow Jackets lineup.

"She has to adopt a leadership role for this team and become more vocal,"

Shelton said of McDowell. "Her goal is to play professionally and we have identified the areas she must improve. Amanda is fully committed and she is a winner in every way."

Shelton will also have dependable senior Christy Striplin, who has won at least 25 matches in each of her first three seasons at Tech. Striplin just may be the x-factor that catapults this season's team towards another NCAA crown.

"Christy is going to step forward and play some amazing tennis," Shelton stated. "She moves like a deer and I expect her to exceed even her own expectations. She is going to push this team over the top."

The Yellow Jackets upperclassmen will be joined by two other returning letterwinners in sophomores Sasha Krupina and Noelle Hickey. Krupina was a valuable doubles player as a freshman, combining with Kristi Miller at the top spot in the lineup. Hickey enjoyed a very successful rookie season, cracking the singles lineup and winning 25 singles matches.

"Sasha has made some nice gains with her maturity as a tennis player," Shelton said. "She is extremely powerful and is figuring out how to harness it all. Once she locks into that perfect balance, watch out. I hope it happens this year. (The fire isn't quite there yet), but I can see she is thinking about really getting after it. With her size and athletic ability she could have the most potential of anyone I have worked with."

"Noelle is a pure ball striker. We are just working on her belief system to match her striking ability. Put that together with improved footspeed and

you have a winning combination. She is working on getting that competitive edge that makes athletes great."

Joining the mix in 2008 is Jupiter, Fla., native Irina Falconi, Hillary Davis of Austin, Texas and a pair of international standouts in Viet Ha Ngo and Lynn Blau. Shelton has once again recruited some of the most talented athletes to play tennis at the Bill Moore Tennis Center. He is just not ready to proclaim who will have the biggest impact on the upcoming season.

"It's way too early to talk about line-up with this team," Shelton said. "I don't want to label anyone at this point, but our freshmen are hard working and very talented. That is a great combination. Oh by the way, they are great students as well. We definitely struck gold with this class."

With such a young team, Shelton will not only coach the team on the court, he is interested in helping his team grow in the classroom and hopefully make an impact that will last after their last match in a Yellow Jacket uniform.

"We continually are teaching our players things that will help them in the classroom, on the court and in life," Shelton added. "I've got the greatest job in the world and also a serious responsibility which I don't take lightly."

Shelton will test his young team early and often in the coming season with non-conference matches against some of the top teams around the nation and an always tough Atlantic Coast Conference slate.

"We always have the toughest schedule in the country and this year is no exception," Shelton said. "We'll play at least 15 schools in the top 20 when all is said and done."

In the end, the Jackets will look to work as a team and stay committed to continuing the success of the program.

"Our number one goal for this team is to enjoy the process and stay committed to excellence," Shelton said. We are focused on the big picture and refuse to sacrifice our long term goals for today's short term gain."

Bryan Shelton Head Coach • 10th Season • Huntsville, Ala. • Georgia Tech, 1989

In just his 10th season at the helm of the Yellow Jacket women's tennis program, Bryan Shelton is already one of the most successful coaches in school history - he is one of just five coaches in the history of Georgia Tech Athletics to guide a team to a national title, and the only one to capture an NCAA Team Championship. The 2007 ITA National Coach of the Year and four-time Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year has directed the Yellow Jackets to three national titles - one outdoor (NCAA) and two indoor (ITA) - over the last two seasons, and his teams have captured at least a share of the ACC regular season title in each of the last four seasons.

One year after guiding the women's tennis team to its greatest achievement to date -- winning the 2007 NCAA Championship -- Shelton added another first to his already-long resume: coaching the first Yellow Jacket to win an NCAA Individual title as sophomore Amanda McDowell swept through the NCAA Singles Championships en route to capturing the crown.

When Bryan Shelton returned to his alma mater as the head coach for the women's team in 2000, the Yellow Jackets had yet to even appear

conclude the season, culminating with NCAA Championship in May.

Georgia Tech earned at least a share of the ACC regular season title for the third-consecutive season in 2007, finishing 10-1 in the league to tie with Clemson. Tech breezed to its third ACC Championship with a 4-0 victory over Duke in the quarterfinals and a 4-2 win against North Carolina in the semis before dispatching Miami in the title match for the third straight year, 4-1. Almost a month later, Shelton's squad began its run to the championship with a pair of 4-0 victories against Furman and Kentucky in the NCAA Atlanta Regional before moving on to Athens, Ga., home of longtime rival the University of Georgia, for the remainder of the NCAA Championships.

In Athens, Shelton relied on a steady mixture of energetic underclassmen and experienced veterans to continue advancing through the tournament. The Jackets received key singles victories from seniors Alison Silverio and Tarryn Rudman, as well as underclassmen Christy Striplin and Amanda McDowell, to get the team over the hump of the NCAA Sweet 16, where Tech had seen its title hopes end in 2005 and 2006. Shelton's squad then went on to post 4-2 victories over Notre Dame, California and UCLA over the next three days to earn the former Yellow Jacket All-American his first national title.

The national championship didn't come as a surprise to most people surrounding the program, as Shelton had steadily built a championship team over the seven years prior. As a matter of fact, his .703 winning percentage is the sixth-highest among ALL coaches in Georgia Tech history, behind former football coaches John Heisman (.779) and Bobby Dodd (.713), former softball coach Ehren Earleywine (.722), former volleyball coaches Shelton Collier (.704) and Bond Shymansky (.729).

Since his return to the Flats, Shelton has recruited some of the most elite players and student-athletes in the nation to the Institute, including the first four All-Americans in the program's history as well as the first Academic All-American in Georgia Tech women's tennis history and first NCAA Individual Champion.

He has had 15 All-ACC honorees, one conference Player of the year and two conference Rookies of the Year during his tenure and has twice been named the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's South Region Coach of the Year while being tabbed the ACC Coach of the Year on four occasions. Under his tutelage, one player has been named the ITA National Player of the Year, ITA National Player to Watch and South Region Rookie of the Year, seven have been named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District Teams, and 44 have

been named to the ACC Honor Roll. Five of his student-athletes have earned the prestigious Bobby Dodd Scholarship while two have earned the coveted Honda Award for Tennis.

in an NCAA Tournament, had yet to finish higher than fourth in the ACC, and had yet to have a player earn All-America honors. Since his arrival, Georgia Tech has made nine NCAA Tournament appearances, captured four ACC regular season titles, won three ACC Tournament championships, and had nine All-America and 17 All-ACC selections.

When Bryan Shelton returned to his alma mater to coach the women's tennis team in 2000, the Yellow Jackets had yet to appear in an NCAA Tournament, had yet to finish higher than fourth in the Atlantic Coast Conference, and had yet to have a player that would become one of the nation's elite.

Since his arrival, everything has changed. Now in his 10th year as the head coach, Shelton is the only coach in the history of Georgia Tech to guide a team to an NCAA National Championship. Of Tech's 17 sports, only football has earned national titles (four), but no sport had earned the distinction of "NCAA Champion" -- until 2007.

After a successful fall campaign, the Yellow Jackets embarked on a gruelling dual-match schedule that began in Madison, Wisc., where they snapped the three-time defending national champion Stanford Cardinal's NCAA-record 89-match winning streak with a thrilling 4-3 victory in the semifinals, then shut down Notre Dame, 4-2, in the championship match to capture the USTA/ITA National Team Indoor title in early February. The Jackets went on to post an 8-3 record in the month of February and, after dropping a 4-3 match at Clemson to begin the month of March, embarked upon a 21-match winning streak to

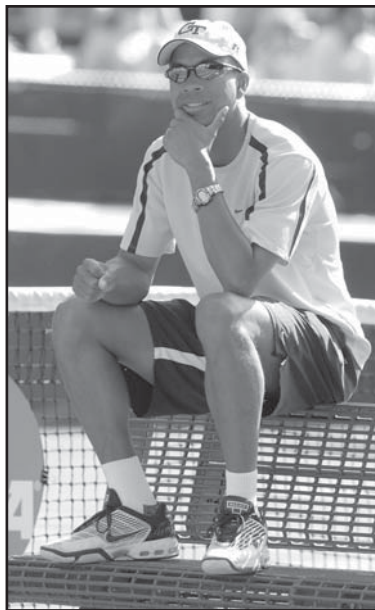
Now entering his tenth season, Shelton's team has a tough task ahead of them - defending their back-to-back ITA National Team Indoor and NCAA titles in 2008. The Jackets lost four key players in Kristi Miller, Whitney McCray, Kirsten Flower and Maya Johansson, but have added four talented freshmen in Lynn Blau, Hillary Davis, Irina Falconi and Viet Ha Ngo to the mix.

In his first season at the helm, Shelton guided Georgia Tech to the first NCAA Tournament berth in school history, recording a victory over 25th-ranked Washington in the first round of the 2000 NCAA Regional in Los Angeles, Calif. The Yellow Jackets' No. 29 national ranking in the final polls was the highest end-of-the-year ranking ever for Georgia Tech. Under Shelton's guidance, Jaime Wong earned the first of her three all-ACC honors, while Laura Ozolins garnered first-team GTE Academic All-District III accolades.

Shelton guided Tech to its second NCAA Tournament appearance in 2001, while Wong was named to the all-conference team for the second-straight season. Ozolins also garnered conference honors in 2001, winning the ACC Flight 6 Singles Championship.

The Jackets made their third NCAA appearance, reaching the second round of the postseason tournament, in yet another successful season for Georgia Tech in 2002, while climbing to a record-high 17th in the nation in the polls. The No. 17 ranking was the first time in program history that the Yellow Jackets had been ranked in the top-20, and Tech concluded the year ranked 21st in the nation after finishing with a 15-10 dual-match record. That same season, Wong became the first Yellow Jacket to represent the Institute in the NCAA Singles Championships, and Shelton became the first Georgia Tech women's tennis coach to earn ACC Coach of the Year honors.

The 2003 team proved to be even more successful for Georgia Tech, concluding the season with a 14-7 dual-match record and the school's fourth consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament. The Jackets also set a record with five wins against ACC opponents in 2003, while Wong earned her second straight appear-



ance in the NCAA Singles Championship after earning her third all-ACC honor. That same season, Kelly Anderson became the first Georgia Tech women's tennis player to earn ACC Rookie of the Year honors.

Shelton guided his 2004 team to the NCAA Tournament for the fifth time in his five-year tenure, advancing to the second round for the fourth time in the program's history. The Yellow Jackets accumulated numerous honors during the year, beginning with earning the inaugural ITA National Team Sportsmanship Award in March and concluding with winning the ACC Sportsmanship Award and being named an ITA All-Academic Team for the first time in school history. With both Anderson and Lyndsay Shosho earning all-conference honors, 2004 marked the first time since 1989 that two players earned all-ACC honors in the same season. Shosho became just the second player in the program's history to represent Georgia Tech in the NCAA Singles Championship, while Anderson garnered GTE/CoSIDA Academic all-District III accolades and was named the prestigious Bobby Dodd Scholarship recipient. She also joined Sekita Grant, Maria Nieto and Alison Silverio as ITA Scholar-Athlete honorees.

The 2005 team accomplished multiple "firsts" for the program, including first ACC Regular Season Championship, first ACC Tournament Championship, and first appearance in the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Championships. The Jackets concluded 2005 with a record-breaking 21 wins and nine conference victories en route to the first ACC Tournament Championship for any Yellow Jacket tennis team. Shelton was named the ACC and ITA South Region Coach of the Year and had three all-ACC honorees in Kristi Miller, Dasha Potapova and Alison Silverio, while Miller also wrapped up the ACC and ITA South Region Rookie of the Year honors. The 2005 season also provided another "first" in the program's history, as Miller became the first Yellow Jacket to earn All-America honors when she was selected as one of the 16 seeds in the 2005 NCAA Singles Championship, where she advanced to the Sweet 16. She also teamed with Silverio to become the first tandem to represent Georgia Tech in the NCAA Doubles Championship.

The team reached as high as No. 4 in the polls during the season and concluded the year ranked sixth in the nation, both of which were new marks for any women's sports team in Georgia Tech history. Anderson again earned GTE/CoSIDA Academic all-District honors, and joined Miller as Georgia Tech's ITA Scholar-Athlete recipients for 2005. The team also earned its second straight ACC Sportsmanship Award and was named an ITA All-Academic Team for the second consecutive year.

The winning tradition continued in 2006, as Georgia Tech again captured the ACC Championship and made its second-straight appearance in the Sweet-16 at the NCAA Championships. For his work, Shelton was again named the ITA South Region Coach of the Year, and the Yellow Jackets finished the season with a record-high 23 victories and a final ranking

of No. 7 in the nation. He had two players to earn All-America honors, as Kristi Miller was named a singles and doubles All-American while Lyndsay Shosho earned Doubles All-America honors in her final season on the Flats. Miller also achieved another first for the program, as she became the first Yellow Jacket to earn the No. 1 ranking in singles play, before finishing the season ranked No. 2. For her outstanding performance, Miller accumulated numerous awards, including the Honda Award for Tennis and the ITA National Player to Watch. She also became Tech's first Academic All-American, while Kelly Anderson was named CoSIDA Academic All-District for the third-straight year. Rounding out the accolades for the Jackets were ITA South Region Cissie Leary Award for Sportsmanship winner Alison Silverio and Academic All-ACC members Anderson, Miller, Shosho and Silverio.

Five Yellow Jackets finished the year with singles rankings, while Miller and Shosho concluded 2006 ranked 14th in the nation in doubles.

Georgia Tech concluded the 2007 ranked atop the national rankings for the first time in history and had a pair of players earn All-America honors. Whitney McCray earned her first All-America honor by earning the No. 3 seed in the 2007 NCAA Doubles Championships, teaming with Kristi Miller, who earned All-America honors in both singles and doubles for the second-consecutive season. Overall, Shelton had two members of the squad compete in the NCAA Singles Championships at the season's end, while two doubles teams also played in the NCAA Doubles Championships. Miller was again tabbed an Academic All-American in 2007, while seniors Alison Silverio and Tarryn Rudman took home the ITA's South Region Sportsmanship Awards. Seven members of the team finished the season ranked in the top 100 in singles, while three Yellow Jacket doubles teams earned national rankings at the season's end.

Prior to returning to his alma mater, Shelton spent over a year as a national coach with the United States Tennis Association. Before joining the USTA coaching ranks, Shelton spent nine years on the ATP Tour, winning two singles and a pair of doubles titles prior to his retirement following the 1997 U.S. Open.

Shelton's hiring in the summer of 1999 reunited him with former Georgia Tech teammate and doubles partner Kenny Thorne, who serves as Georgia Tech's head men's tennis coach.

Shelton and Thorne both lettered for the Yellow Jackets from 1985-88 and helped Georgia Tech to an overall 70-38 dual-match record and a 20-7 ACC mark during their four seasons. As seniors in 1988, the duo guided Tech to a school-record 26 wins, which included a 7-0 run through the ACC, a second place finish in the conference tournament and Tech's first appearance in the NCAA Championships.

Shelton earned all-ACC honors in each of his four seasons on the Flats and garnered All-America honors in 1988. He advanced to the quarterfinals of the 1988



NCAA Singles Championship, falling to eventual champion Robbie Weiss.

Shelton ranks second on the Jackets' career singles wins list with 101 victories and was inducted into the Georgia Tech Athletic Hall of Fame in 1993 and the Georgia Tennis Hall of Fame in 2002. He was also inducted into the Huntsville-Madison County Athletic Hall of Fame in 2007.

Following his collegiate career, Shelton won his first tour title at the Hall of Fame Championships in 1991, becoming the first African-American to win an ATP event since Arthur Ashe in 1978. He repeated as the singles champion at Newport in 1992 and also claimed a pair of doubles titles, winning the 1994 Mexican Open with Francisco Montana and the 1997 Australian Hardcourt Championship with Patrick Rafter. In 1993, Shelton was a finalist in the Mixed Doubles at the French Open.

A six-time participant at Wimbledon, Shelton defeated second-seeded Michael Stich in the first round of the tournament in 1994 en route to a berth in the Round of 16.

Shelton climbed as high as 55th in the ATP singles rankings and also played in seven U.S. Opens, six Australian Opens and four French Opens while posting victories against the likes of Andre Agassi, Thomas Muster, Richard Krajicek and Todd Martin.

After retiring from the tour, Shelton coached MaliVai Washington, a 1996 Wimbledon finalist, until being named a USTA National Coach. With the USTA, Shelton assisted with the development of some of the top juniors in the Southeast, covering North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, Tennessee and Kentucky.

Born in Huntsville, Ala., Shelton currently resides in Smyrna, Ga., with his wife Lisa, and their children, Emma and Benjamin. He earned his degree in industrial engineering from Georgia Tech in 1989.

Assisting head coach Bryan Shelton in player development, recruiting and general day-to-day activities related to the women's tennis program is Anca Dumitrescu, who is in her second year as an assistant coach at Georgia Tech.

Dumitrescu was instrumental in the Yellow Jackets' team and individual success in 2008, as a school-record four Yellow Jackets received All-Atlantic Coast Conference accolades in her first year on staff. She is no stranger to the ACC, as the former Florida State standout played No. 1 singles for the Seminoles from 2001-04, earning top-60 national rankings in each of her four years in college. A two-time All-ACC honoree, Dumitrescu led the Seminoles to a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances and participated in the NCAA Singles Championships on two occasions. She amassed multiple awards during her tenure at Florida State, including earning the 2003 Golden Nole Award as the Seminoles' Most Valuable Player and the 2004 ITA South Region Senior of the Year Award. She was also the recipient of the ITA South Region Arthur Ashe Sportsmanship Award in 2004.

Following her playing career at Florida State, Dumitrescu spent two years as a manager and graduate assistant coach at her alma mater before earning her first full-time coaching job at East Tennessee State, where she served as the assistant coach in 2007.

Prior to college, Dumitrescu competed on the WTA Tour, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 514 in the world during the 1997-98 season. After qualifying for the French Open as a junior in 1998, the Romania native won the singles and doubles titles in the 1999 Romanian Junior Tennis Championships.

Dumitrescu not only excelled on the courts in Tallahassee, but also in the classroom, earning a dual degree in communications and multinational business as a Magna Cum Laude graduate in 2004 before earning her masters in communication from Florida State in 2006. A recipient of the ACC's Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship, Dumitrescu spent a year teaching public speaking at Florida State while completing her masters degree.

As an undergraduate, Dumitrescu completed an honors theses regarding media propaganda in the Romanian press and was selected to present her thesis at the Southern States Communication Association Conference in 2004. In graduate school, she completed her Master's thesis on the representation of female athletes in the Romanian and American media and was selected to present her thesis at the National Communication Association Conference in 2006.

Dumitrescu, 27, is fluent in Romanian, English, German and French and can also understand and speak Italian. Aside from tennis, she is active in the Atlanta community, placing second among all women at the 2008 Atlanta Marathon, winning the Tri-States Park Sprint Duathlon in 2007 and finishing fourth in the 24-30 age group in the 2006 Atlanta Marathon. She also posted a third-place finish in the Regional Collegiate Cycling Championships, held in Florida in 2006, and climbed Mont Blanc, the highest mountain in Europe (located in France), in 2005.

Homer Rice Center For Sports Performance



The J.C. "Bud" Shaw Sports Complex houses one of the most complete athletics facilities in the nation, encompassing the Arthur B. Edge, Jr., Center, home of the Georgia Tech Athletic Association and Alexander-Tharpe Fund; the Andrew Hearn, Sr., Academic Center, the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance; the George W. Mathews, Jr., Conference Center and the new complex that houses the Yellow Jacket football program.

Georgia Tech's Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance is a unique facility for testing and improving performance. The Homer Rice Center focuses on five components: sports physiology, nutrition, sports medicine, psychology and vision. Opened in 1998, the \$8 million facility also includes the Howard Candler Jr., Football Conference Center and the George W. Mathews Jr., Athletic Heritage Center.

Bill Moore

Bill Moore came to Georgia Tech in October, 1934, on a tennis scholarship and earned his living expenses performing a variety of campus jobs. He teamed with Russell Bobbit to win the SEC doubles crown in 1938 and helped the Yellow Jackets capture the SEC team title. Inducted into the Georgia Tech Athletic Hall of Fame in 1972, Moore lost only one singles match during his career.

Following his graduation, Moore worked for W.H. Kelley in the lab at Glidden Paint Co. before joining the Navy during World War II, where he served two years in the South Pacific as an officer on a destroyer. After his military service, he convinced Kelley, who had retired, to join him in business, thus forming Kelley-Moore Paint Co. After six years of steady growth Kelley again retired, with Moore buying him out. This business went on to become the largest privately-held company in the United States. Moore also developed the Broken O Ranch, the largest irrigated acreage in Montana, and served as the chairman of the Calmutual Insurance Co.

The Bill Moore Tennis Center was opened for the 1988 tennis season and serves as the home of the Georgia Tech tennis teams. The center was officially dedicated in honor of Bill Moore, whose efforts were vital in the construction of the impressive facility, on Oct. 28, 1988. The center has three lighted indoor courts and two tiers of outdoor courts, six of which are lighted and have grandstand seating for 1,500. Well-suited for hosting tournaments, the Bill Moore Tennis Center has been the site of numerous events over the last 11 years, including the NCAA Region Championships in 1997, 2005, 2006, 2007 and 2008, the ACC Championships in 1988 and the ITA Rolex South Region Championships.

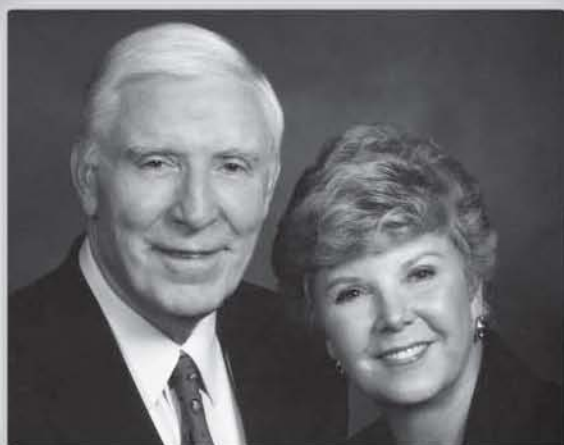
Athletic Scholarship Endowment

September 30, 1961 versus Rice. For the first time, the official Rambling Wreck car led the Georgia Tech football team onto Grant Field. It's happened at every home game since.

The event did not establish a new tradition at Georgia Tech, but it cemented one. The vehicle, a restored 1930 Model A Ford Sport Coupe, was Tech's first official Rambling Wreck car.

Since that time, the Rambling Wreck car has joined a much older tradition—the Yellow Jacket—as an official school mascot.

The term Rambling Wreck was first applied to a 1914 Ford owned by Floyd Field, Dean of Men. In the first published reference to the car as the "Rambling Wreck" in 1927, the Technique student newspaper spoke out against Field when he considered trading the car, but he did it anyway.

The Technique maintained the tradition with a yearly collegiate auto race from Atlanta to Athens, known as the "Old Ford" race or "Flying Flivver" race, which began in 1929 but was discontinued when it became too dangerous. In its place is the familiar Rambling Wreck Parade, which is still held every year at Homecoming. The event challenges students to produce outlandish "mechanical monstrosities" capable of traversing a short course on campus.

Tech officials decided in the late 1950s that the school needed an official car that would be known forever as the Rambling Wreck. Dean of Students James Dull began a search for a pre-1940 vintage model, and finally found one—parked in front of his apartment building. The owner, Capt. Ted J. Johnson, a Delta Air Lines pilot, had just finished restoring the 1930 Ford Cabriolet Sport Coupe, which he intended to give to his son as a gift.

Johnson decided to let Tech have the car for \$1,000 in May, 1961. He later returned the purchase price in the form of a contribution to the Alexander-Tharpe Fund, fulfilling a desire to go on record as having given the Rambling Wreck to Georgia Tech.



For many years, one of the most popular pranks by students was the stealing of the "T" from the top of Tech Tower.

THE YELLOW JACKET

Conflicting accounts exist as to the origins and beginnings of the Yellow Jacket, but the nickname did not grow out of the familiar six-legged insect; rather, the insect mascot, known as "Buzz," grew out of the nickname. The first known reference to Tech students as "Yellowjackets" appeared in the Atlanta Constitution in 1905 and came into common usage at that time. The name, spelled as one word, was first used to describe supporters who attended Tech athletic events, dressed in yellow coats and jackets. The actual mascot was conceived at a later, undetermined date.

Other nicknames which have applied to Tech teams include the Engineers; the Tecks, the first known nickname which was phased out around 1910; the Blacksmiths, common between 1902 and 1904; and the Golden Tornado, thought to be created by sportswriters when John Heisman led Tech to its first national title in 1917.



TRADITIONS

The Ramblin' Wreck Fight Song

The Georgia Tech fight song grew out of an old folk ballad, "The Sons of the Gamboliers."

Howard D. Cutter, a member of Tech's first graduating class (Mechanical Engineering, 1892), wrote in the November-December 1942 issue of the Georgia Tech Alumnus that the "Ramblin' Wreck" had its origins during the first two years after Tech opened in 1888, inspired when the entire student body traveled to Athens to see Tech's baseball team defeat Georgia.

By the early 1900s, "Ramblin' Wreck" was an established tradition. The earliest existing published version of the song appeared in the Blueprint, the Institute's yearbook, in 1908.

In 1910, Michael A. Greenblatt, Tech's first bandmaster, discovered the band playing "Ramblin' Wreck" to the tune of "Sons of the Gamboliers," and made his first arrangement of the song in the form of a handwritten manuscript.

When Frank Roman succeeded Greenblatt as bandmaster in 1911, he wrote a new adaptation of "Ramblin' Wreck," accompanied by many trumpet flourishes, that became nationally known. His is the version that continues to be popular today.

The fame of the song spread to such proportions that, in 1959, it was sung by Richard Nixon and Nikita Khrushchev at their historic face-to-face meeting in Moscow.

In 1984, the law firm of Newton, Hopkins & Ormsby investigated the copyright of "Ramblin' Wreck" and found that a number of people have had various versions of the song copyrighted. The original version of the song is in the public domain and can be played without payment of royalties.

I'm a Ramblin' Wreck from Georgia Tech and a hell of an engineer,

*A helluva, helluva, helluva, helluva, hell of an engineer,
Like all the jolly good fellows, I drink my whiskey clear,
I'm a Ramblin' Wreck from Georgia Tech and a hell of an engineer.*

*Oh, if I had a daughter, sir, I'd dress her in White and Gold,
And put her on the campus, to cheer the brave and bold.
But if I had a son, sir, I'll tell you what he'd do.*

He would yell, "To Hell with Georgia," like his daddy used to do.

Oh, I wish I had a barrel of rum and sugar three thousand pounds,

*A college bell to put it in and a clapper to stir it around.
I'd drink to all good fellows who come from far and near.
I'm a ramblin', gamblin', hell of an engineer.*

White & Gold

In the fall of 1891, before Georgia Tech organized a football team of its own, a game was scheduled between Auburn and Georgia. A rivalry was already established in baseball between Tech and Georgia, so Tech students were invited to the game to cheer, of course, for Auburn.

The students appointed a committee to recommend colors to be worn and cheers to be used at the game. The committee suggested white and gold, and about 200 students attended the game wearing those colors.

In 1893, when Georgia Tech's football team played Georgia for the first time, a group of young women from the Lucy Cobb Institute for Girls attended the game to cheer for Tech, dressed in white and gold.

*Oh well it's up with the White and Gold
Down with the Red and Black
Georgia Tech is out for the victory
We'll drop the battle axe on Georgia's head
When we meet her, our team is sure to beat her
Down on the old farm there will be no sound
Till our bow-wows rip through the air
When the battle is over, Georgia's team will be found
With the Yellow Jackets swarming around.*



ALL-AMERICANS

Four Yellow Jackets have earned All-America distinction since the program first began in 1977, with all four student-athletes having played for current head coach Bryan Shelton. The list is highlighted by six-time All-America Kristi Miller, the first women's tennis player to earn All-America honors and one of three females to earn the honor in at least three different years.

Amanda McDowell 2008 - Singles

Amanda McDowell became the first Georgia Tech women's tennis player to win an individual national title when she captured the 2008 NCAA Singles Championship. Only the second Yellow Jacket to earn All-America accolades in singles, McDowell finished her sophomore season with a school record 45 singles wins. She was named the 2008 ITA National Player of the Year and was the 2008 Honda Award recipient for women's tennis.

Kristi Miller 2005 - Singles 2006 - Singles & Doubles 2007 - Singles & Doubles 2008 - Singles

Kristi Miller became Georgia Tech's first women's tennis All-American when she earned All-American honors in singles as a freshman. The Marysville, Mich., native went on to become the most decorated student-athlete in school history, as she own's Tech's career marks in singles victories (152) and doubles wins (110). A six-time All-American (four-times singles, two-times doubles), Miller has also earned the prestigious Honda Award for Women's Tennis (2006) and is a four-time all-Atlantic Coast Conference honoree. Miller's accolades include being named the 2008 ACC Player of the Year, the ITA National Player to Watch and ACC Tournament MVP in 2006 and the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2005. Miller is a three-time CoSIDA/ESPN the Magazine Academic All-American and finished her four-year degree with a perfect 4.0 grade point average at Georgia Tech.

Whitney McCray 2007 - Doubles

Whitney McCray earned All-American accolades in doubles during the 2007 season when she teamed with Kristi Miller to earn the No. 3 seed in the NCAA Doubles Championships. The Yellow Jacket duo, which reached as high as No. 3 before finishing the season at No. 7 in the national rankings, were ranked in the top-10 for the last three months of the season. McCray ranks second all-time in the Yellow Jacket record books with 101 career doubles wins. She was part of all three ACC Championships and was a key member of Tech's NCAA Championship team in 2007.

Lyndsay Shosho 2006 - Doubles

Lyndsay Shosho became the Yellow Jackets' second women's tennis All-American when she teamed with Kristi Miller to advance to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championships in her senior season (2006). The same year, Shosho set the then school record for singles wins in a season with 35 while breaking the mark for doubles victories at Tech. She currently stands fourth in Tech's record books with 83 career doubles wins and eighth with 84 career singles wins. In addition to earning All-America honors, Shosho was twice named All-Atlantic Coast Conference and helped lead Tech to its first two Atlantic Coast Conference Championships.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 56th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 109 national championships, including 57 in women's competition. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 92 times in women's action.

Women's tennis made a significant contribution to that success in 2008, as Georgia Tech's Amanda McDowell became the second straight player and fourth all-time from the Atlantic Coast Conference to win the national individual singles title. It was the first year that McDowell, who was seeded seventh nationally, had competed in the NCAA singles championship. The sophomore also became the fourth ACC women's tennis player to receive the prestigious Honda Sports Award.

A two-time NCAA Team Championship All-Tournament selection, McDowell was named to the all-tournament squad at the No. 2 position. She received all-tourney honors in 2007 at the No. 4 singles position.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

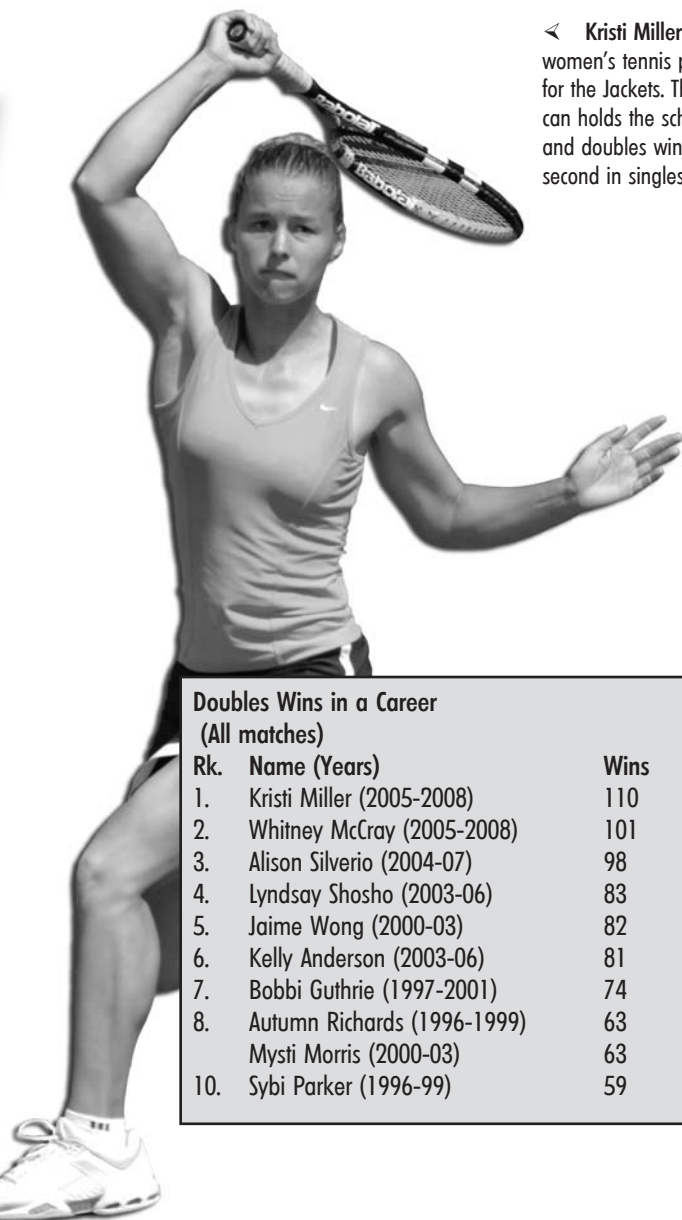

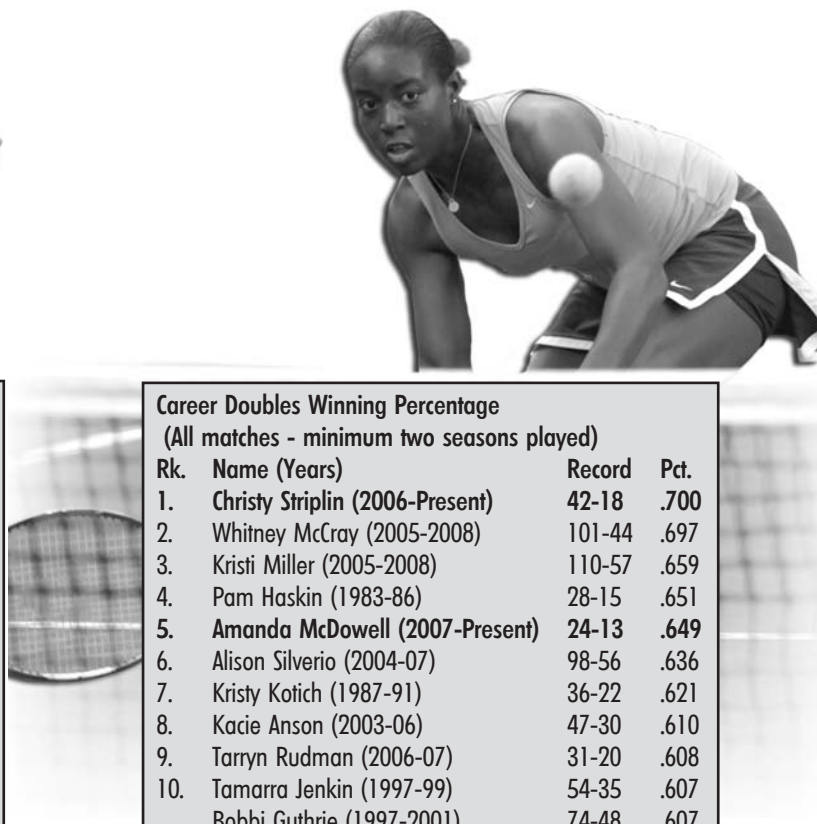

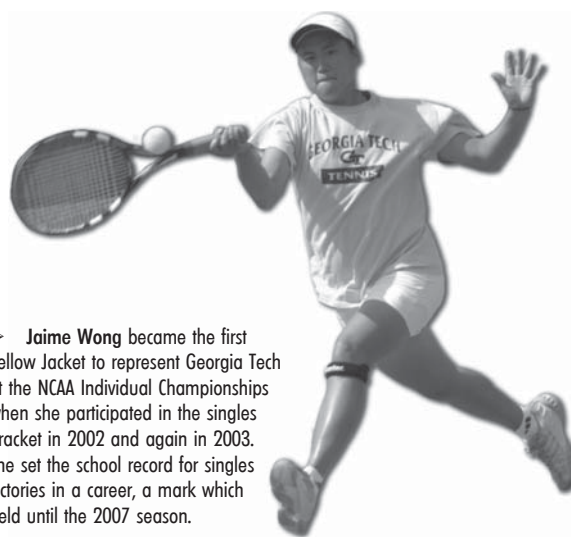
