Freshman SAT Scores Top Last Year's Results

ore than 1,900 freshmen have committed to attend Georgia Tech this fall, and their recentered average SAT scores are eight points higher than last year's class.

With the new scoring system for the Scholastic Aptitude Test adopted this year, the average score of the 1996 incoming freshmen is 1,310. Before the recentering, the incoming students averaged 1,240. Last year's class averaged 1,232 before recentering. Most scores rise after being recentered.

Male-to-female ratios are almost identical to last year as 72 percent of the new class is male and 28 percent female. Ethnically, the class is 78.9 percent Caucasian, 11 percent Asian, 6 percent African-American, 3 percent Hispanic, 0.1 percent Native American and 1 percent multiracial.

"We feel we met most of our recruiting goals and that is a successful year," said Bethany Cook, assistant to the director of admissions. "We'll have the same goals next year, to continue to recruit harder in the minority area—females and minorities

"During the application and deposit processes, we actively target them [women and minorities] and try to answer their questions, but we do not change the admissions standards for them," she said.

Georgia students make up 65 percent of the incoming class, averaging 1,222 on the SATs. Out-of-state students, rounding out the other 35 percent, scored an average of 1,264. Both are original scores without recentering.

School of Biology Names New Chair

r. Gary Schuster, dean, Georgia Tech College of Sciences, recently announced the appointment of Roger M. Wartell as chair of the Georgia Tech School of Biology. Dr. Wartell assumed this role on July 1, 1996

"Biology will play in increasingly important role at Georgia Tech, not only in the sciences but in multi-disciplinary areas such as bioengineering," said Dean Schuster.

"Professor Wartell has a clear view of the importance of biology to students at Georgia Tech and to the key role that biology will play in the 21st century," he said.

Wartell served as acting chair from July, 1990 to June 1996. Under his leadership, the School of Biology received a four-year \$1 million grant from the Howard Hughes Medical Institute in 1994, and a \$330,000 National Science Foundation grant for renovation of research infrastructures in the Cherry Emerson building.

Wartell joined Georgia Tech in 1974 with appointments in the Schools of Physics and Biology. His current research involves work in the fields of nucleic acid thermodynamics and conformation, and applications of temperature gradient gel electrophoresis to mutation detection, nucleic acid stability, and gene regulation.

Tech Celebrates Olympic/Paralympic Effort

undreds of employees gathered around the Kessler Campanile last week to celebrate an ending and a beginning—post-Olympic life at Georgia Tech. The Olympic-Thank You Reception, hosted by President G. Wayne Clough, celebrated the personal and collective successes of the 1996 Olympic/Paralympic period.

To kick off the celebration, Clough invited employees to "say goodbye to the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games," and to "join together in appreciation for everyone's effort to create the world's best Olympic Village."

Dr. Clough then reinforced his gratitude by sharing "testimonials" from city, state and national officials. The following are excerpts Clough shared with audience members:

Governor Zell Miller wrote, "The Tech team turned in what can only be described as a gold medal performance. Please let your students, staff and faculty know how much I appreciate what they have done for the state of Georgia and the city of Atlanta."

Atlanta Mayor Bill Campbell's letter said, "The Atlanta Games could not have been the success that they were without the contributions of the Tech community."

Andrew Young, co-chairman of ACOG, said, "...I hope you will convey to them the most heartfelt gratitude and sincerest appreciation of ACOG. The folks at Georgia Tech were probably the most inconvenienced by the Games of any group of people and their efforts were a valuable gift to the citizens of Atlanta and the world sports community."

Billy Payne, CEO of ACOG wrote, "...Georgia Tech demonstrated its excellence to the world and deserves extraordinary credit for the success of the Games. ...Together we have established a new standard by which all future Olympic Games will be measured, and I will always be grateful for the contribution of Georgia Tech to the success of the Centennial Olympic Games."

President Bill Clinton was also pleased by Tech's Olympic effort. A paragraph from his letter states, "I

was very impressed by the Olympic Village—you have created a campus that will enhance the Georgia Institute of Technology for years to come. The Centennial Olympic Games in Atlanta were historic in many ways, and you can be proud of your part in ensuring their success."

After reading the excerpts, Clough honored Georgia Tech's Olympic and Paralympic athletes for their contributions to the Games. He also honored Olympic Basketball Coach Bobby Cremins and Georgia Tech Track Coach Grover Hinsdale for the role they played in making Olympic dreams come true.

"Clearly our Olympic adventure was a winner," said Clough. "But even though the Olympic moment burned brightly, it was brief and is gone. The famous Olympic athlete Jesse Owens once said the Olympics were a 'lifetime of training for 10 seconds of glory.' Although our preparations for the Olympics may have seemed to last a lifetime—the opposite is true for Georgia Tech. We spent just six years preparing for the Games, but the glory, global recognition, and improved infrastructure will last well beyond our lifetimes." he said

Tech Professor Shot While Aiding Neighbor

ike many of us, Ken Kahn, assistant professor, School of Management, used to live by the "it could never happen to me" philosophy. Unfortunately, now he knows it can.

While other members of the Tech community were welcoming the world to the Olympics, Kahn was being rushed to DeKalb Medical Center after coming to the aid of a neighbor who was shot while working in her garden.

"My wife and I were getting ready to go to a party when we heard something outside," Kahn explained. "After a few more shots and a scream, we realized

"After a few more shots and a scream, we realized what we heard must be gunfire."
Without hesitating, the couple called 911 and rushed outside to find their neighbor Sonya White lying wounded on the ground. Drawing upon her

nurse's training, Ms. Kahn began treating White's

wound. Professor Kahn stood beside her while a crowd of concerned neighbors knelt nearby.

After a few minutes, Kahn noticed another neighbor, Stephen John Hersey Jr., standing on his porch holding a rifle.

"Oh my God, he's gonna shoot," Kahn yelled. Followed by, "Hit the deck!" While the others had time to heed the warning, Ken was not able to get out of the way. Hersey allegedly fired a shot, hitting and damaging the back of Kahn's hand.

"The next thing I knew the crowd scattered in a desperate attempt to find cover," Kahn explained.

At that point the police arrived and Hersey allegedly continued firing, injuring DeKalb police officer, W.D. Harvey. A gun battle ensued, ending in Hersey's death.


Ms. White, Officer Harvey and Professor Kahn were rushed to the hospital.

"I guess we were all fortunate, Kahn said, "Our injuries were bad, but they could have been worse." All three victims are presently recovering at home.

According to Homicide Lt. D.E. Bolton, it was not known what provoked Hersey. He said Hersey exited his front door armed with two weapons and began firing at parked cars. He then saw White and fired on her, Bolton said.

Kahn said he is hopeful about his recovery. Currently he is undergoing intense occupational therapy while working from home. He is scheduled to resume teaching this fall.

"It's going to be a long recovery, Kann explained, but doing my best to remain positive so far. All of my physicians say they are pleased with the progress I'm making," he said. He said he will continue therapy at least another year.

And what would he change if he had to do it over? "Life is full of a lot of curves. I never would have imagined the turn that afternoon took. But, if we had it to do over, we would do the same thing."

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Scholars Choose Tech

he Georgia Tech tradition of attracting and educating some of the world's best students continues with the incoming freshman class, which includes a Tandy Scholar, a Westinghouse Scholar and a Presidential Scholar.

"A continuing shift toward a commitment from the entire campus to help recruit outstanding students and to meet their needs has really made a difference in this freshman class," said Randy McDow, President's Scholarship coordinator. "Attracting three students recognized at the highest level of achievement in one year is something of which we can all be proud. I hope this trio will serve as a foundation of excellence for years to come," he said.

Outstanding students coming to Tech include:

- Juliet DeVeaux-Geldi, Presidential Scholar. A resident of Osprey, Florida, DeVeaux-Geldi was among 141 scholarship recipients chosen from a national pool of 2,700 students asked to apply. (Sixty-one of the 141 recipients are enrolling at Harvard University.) She is an awardwinning pianist, a Spanish scholar and figure skater who plans to study aerospace engineering.

Presidential Scholars (not to be confused with the Georgia Tech President's Scholarship) are selected by a White House committee as the nation's highest honor roll, to recognize "intellectual determination and civic commitment." Although the scholarship has no financial

component, the award itself is considered among the most prestigious.

- Matthew Graham, Westinghouse Scholar. A resident of Orange Park, Florida, Graham won third place out of 1,800 entries by engineering a method for de-icing airplane wings. He received a \$20,000 scholarship and caught the attention of the Federal Aviation Administration which is interested in his work. A graduate of Stanton College Prep, Graham taught karate, served as captain of the academic team, and volunteered with the American Cancer Society throughout high school.

- Andrew Ozment, Tandy Scholar. A resident of Huntsville, Alabama, Ozment wrote a winning essay on restoring America's passion for space exploration. He was one of 100 students selected for the \$1,000 Tandy Scholarship, which is based on excellence in mathematics and science courses, extracurricular activities, and recommendations, in addition to the essay. Seventy-eight percent of all U.S. high schools nominate at least one student for this award. A graduate of Grissom High, Ozment plans to study engineering.

Earlier this year, Georgia Tech signed 75 President's Scholars, the most since 1988 when 80 students received the scholarship. The President's Scholarship is Georgia Tech's premier, merit-based scholarship, awarding up to \$26,000 in support. To apply, students must score at least 1,400 on the SAT or 32 on the ACT.
