ITA NATIONAL INDOORS

The Yellow Jackets opened the 2007 season in Madison, Wis., competing in the USTA/ITA National Team Indoor Championships. After Tech knocked off No. 13 Pepperdine, 7-0, in the opening round, senior Alison Silverio posted a comeback, three-set victory to help the Jackets to a 4-3 win against No. 7 North Carolina in the quarterfinals.

Georgia Tech faced Stanford, the nation's top-ranked women's tennis team, in the semifinals and snipped the Cardinal's NCAA-record 89-match winning streak in the process. Stanford, the three-time defending national champion, lost the doubles point before senior Taryn Rudman and freshman Kirsten Flower and Amanda Craddock posted key singles wins to lift the Yellow Jackets to the championship match with a 4-3 win.

The Yellow Jackets earned the doubles point against No. 4 Notre Dame and received singles wins from Flower, Craddock and sophomore Christy Shipin to become just the second school from the Atlantic Coast Conference to win the USTA/ITA National Team Indoor Title.

season's MVP was Tech Jackets freshman Amanda Craddock, who went 3-0 in singles and 2-0 in doubles. Freshman Amanda McDowell and sophomore Christy Shipin also won singles matches against Miami.



ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS

After opening their 2007 conference schedule with a 4-3 loss at Clemson, the Yellow Jackets finished off the regular season by winning 12 straight matches, 10 of which came against ACC opponents, to finish in a first-place tie with the Tigers for the regular season title. During that run, the Jackets notched their first-ever victory against the Duke Blue Devils, who they would defeat, 4-0, in the quarterfinals of the 2007 ACC Championships for their second win against the vaunted program. Georgia Tech went on to stop North Carolina for the third time on the season, 4-2, in the semifinals and met Miami for the third-straight season in the finals, with Georgia Tech recording a 4-1 win to earn its third consecutive conference crown.



ROAD TO NCAA TITLE BEGAN IN ATLANTA

Georgia Tech hosted an NCAA Women's Tennis Regional for the third consecutive year and for the third consecutive year, advanced to the NCAA Championships with a pair of match wins at the Bill Moore Tennis Center.

Tech opened the 2007 tournament against Furman and cruised to a 4-0 win behind the stellar play of Taryn Rudman (left), who notched a 6-0, 6-0 singles win and teamed with Kirsten Flower for an 8-2 doubles victory against the Paladins as the Jackets advanced to the round of 32.

Amanda McDowell (right) posted a 6-0, 6-0 singles win the following day and Kristi Miller added singles and doubles victories to lead Tech to a 4-0 win against #33 Kentucky as the Jackets advanced to the round of 16 in Athens.

FINAL: TECH 4, #12 UCLA 2

Kristi Miller, Amanda McDowell and Christy Striplin won singles matches before senior Alison Silveria provided the clinching victory at No. 2 singles to give Georgia Tech a 4-2 win over No. 12 UCLA in the NCAA championship match. The championship is the first NCAA title in any sport for Georgia Tech, which has also won four national championships in football via wire service polls. Tech fell behind by losing the doubles point and then trailed 2-1 before Miller and Striplin put the Jackets back on top 3-2 with Silveria just beginning her third set. Tech trailed in the remaining match on court six when Silveria finished off 40th-ranked Tracy Lin with a dominating 6-1 win in the third. Silveria had won the first 7-5 but dropped the second, also 7-5. Silveria was named the Most Valuable Player of the NCAA Tournament.

McDowell earned Tech's first singles win with a 6-1, 6-0 blitzing of Ashley Iwazon at No. 4 singles. One day after clinching Tech's semifinal win over California, Striplin again provided a key victory as she rallied for a three-set win over Alex McGowan at No. 5 singles. After losing the first set, Striplin won 12 of the final 14 games for a 4-6, 6-1, 6-2 victory. McDowell, Striplin and Silveria were all named to the NCAA all-tournament team.

Miller, ranked sixth in the nation, defeated No. 15 Riza Zolomado at No. 1 singles, 6-3, 7-6.

Freshmen Amanda Craddock and Amanda McDowell won their singles matches after Tech breezed through doubles, and then sophomore Christy Striplin (right) rallied from a 4-1 deficit in the third set to clinch a 4-2 victory for Georgia Tech over No. 10 California, putting the Yellow Jackets in the national championship match for the first time in school history. Craddock teamed with senior Alison Silveria to open doubles play with an 8-2 win before Kristi Miller and Whitney McCray polished off the doubles point with an 8-6 victory.

Amanda McDowell (below, second from right) then polished off the Jackets' 4-2 win over No. 7 Notre Dame with her ninth-straight singles victory to advance to the semifinals of the 2007 NCAA Women's Tennis Championships.

"I knew I was in for a tough match," Miller said. "At this stage of the season, most every match is tough. After I won the first set, I knew she would start playing better."

"I didn't respond as well as I would have liked in the second set, but I think I pressed too much in the second set, but I made some good corrections in the third set. I just tried to get some solid base and play longer points and keep her on the defense."

Miller plays fourth-seeded Lindsay Nalson of USC today. Miller's coach, Bryan Shelton, was named the ITA National Coach of the Year after guiding his team to 35 victories and an NCAA championship.

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2007-08 Outlook - Champions Work Together for Common Goal

Several months after directing his team to Georgia Tech's first NCAA Team Championship - in any sport - Bryan Shelton looks back on the women's tennis program's title run in 2007 and knows there was one reason the team accomplished everything that it did - the definition of the word 'team' and how important teamwork is for a program to accomplish its goals.

"It is what separates winning from losing in the end," Shelton says. "It is how well our student-athletes perform and work together as a team. When we put eight to ten players together to try to accomplish something special, we all have to be united. We all have to have the same mission, working together and pulling for one another, encouraging each other, not just during the match but before and after."

The unity was evident in last season's run to the championship, as teammates lined the court at Dan Magill Tennis Complex in anticipation of senior captain Alison Silverio completing her three-game comeback against UCLA's Tracy Lin to lift the Yellow Jackets to their first national championship.

"There's no other place that I would have been," Kristi Miller, one of two seniors on the Jackets' 2008 team, said. "We shared the hard work of winning and depending on each other all season, so it was only natural that we would all be out there, together, when we accomplished our ultimate goal - winning that national championship."

The majority of that 2007 title team is back together in 2008, and continues to build its chemistry with the addition of three newcomers and under the direction of Shelton, who is in his ninth year at the helm.

"Although we have some great senior leadership, I still feel like we have a pretty young team this year," Shelton said. "It probably should have felt the same way with three freshmen last year, but this team feels a little bit younger. But they are excited, and this team possesses the same type of talent that we had last year. The question is really how we are going to perform under pressure."

If the 2007 fall campaign is any indication, Shelton has an exciting spring to look forward to. Tech's eight team members recorded 73 singles wins in a challenging fall schedule, which included the Georgia Tech and Florida State Fall Invitationals, the ITA South Region Championships and two national events - the ITA All-American Championships and ITA National Intercollegiate Indoor Championships.

Miller and fellow senior Whitney McCray will graduate as the top singles and doubles players to ever compete in the White and Gold. Miller already holds the school record with 127 career singles victories in her three years at Georgia Tech and stands second with 92

career doubles wins, just seven shy of the school record. McCray's .705 career winning percentage in doubles is more than 25 points higher than teammate Christy Striplin, who stands second in Tech's annals.

"Kristi and Whitney are two great leaders for this program, and they are going to make sure that the rest of the team follows in their footsteps this season," Shelton said. "You can't really look past them when you look at the success of our program over the last three to four years."

"It's safe to say that we owe Kristi a lot, because she's a big part of the reason that we've had such great recruits come in after her. She's been loyal and has set the bar very high, not only on the tennis court but also in the classroom. To have someone like her who is such an icon is amazing."

"Earning All-American honors last year was special for Whitney, and she knows that this is her last year to accomplish those individual goals that she set when she arrived on campus. With her improved work ethic she has seen what a great tennis player she is, and I think that she is starting to see that she has the ability to repeat as an All-American again this year - in both singles and doubles."

The Yellow Jacket senior duo will be joined by three other returning letterwinners in Striplin, Amanda McDowell and Kirsten Flower. Striplin's clutch performance in the semifinals propelled Tech to the NCAA title match in 2007 while McDowell quietly put together the most successful season of

anyone on that championship team - ending the year on an 11-match winning streak, 10 of which were in straight sets. Over the fall she picked up where she left off last spring by winning 17 of her 19 singles matches, including a straight-set win over Miller in the finals of the ITA South Region Championships.

"Amanda McDowell was our catalyst last year," Shelton said. "She didn't only win, she won emphatically. Her role will change a bit this year, but she's a money player. When the match is on the line, you want her out there because she can get it done. Just looking at her results from the fall, she's put herself up there near the very top.

"Luna (Striplin) had a tough match against Notre Dame (in the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championships) and didn't compete well, but was able to turn it around in a little over 24 hours to clinch the berth into the championship match for us. She's a competitor and a winner because she, like Amanda, can get it done under pressure.

"Kirsten has grown a lot in the last year. She got a taste of what it feels like to be at the very top early in her freshmen season, and a taste of what it felt like to fall. That was such a valuable experience for her, and very similar to what I went through as a student-athlete at Georgia Tech. I fell off the map after a strong freshman year, but when I came back I appreciated it a lot more and didn't take things for granted. She won't either. She's taking the lessons of last year and is realizing that she can only control herself, which she is doing very well right now.

Joining the mix in 2008 is New Jersey native Noelle Hickey and a pair of international standouts Maya Johansson and Sasha Krupina.

"We knew after a few fall practices that Maya is a very solid player," Shelton said. "To see her go out there and be as successful as she was in the fall makes it a little easier to fill those shoes left by Alison, Tarryn Rudman and Amanda Craddock. She's someone that can go out there and play with anyone in the country, and the great thing is that she's still learning what it takes to be successful here."

Johansson opened the fall by winning her first 12 matches, seven of which came against ranked opponents, before finishing with a 15-3 singles mark. She advanced through the prequalifying and qualifying draws to the semifinals of the ITA All-American Championships before suffering her first loss of the season.

Hickey won her first four matches of the year and advanced to the finals of the 2007 Seminole Invitational, receiving valuable court time in her first collegiate season.

"Noelle is one of the most honest people that I've ever coached," Shelton said. "She wasn't quite comfortable or sure of her abilities coming in, but I think that through playing outside competition she realized how good she is and how good she can be. It's been great to see her confidence grow and seeing her realize that she gets to practice with the best players in the country every day, so when she goes out to play other teams she has that confidence on the court.

"Sasha has so many physical gifts, including her height (6-1) and strength. She was progressing very quickly throughout the fall until she was sidelined with injuries, so I'm excited to see how her game develops once she's healthy."

Despite all of the team's successes and individual achievements however, Shelton continues to stress the importance of unity for the continued success of the program.

"It starts with recruiting," Shelton said, "and once they get here it's the open lines of communication and allowing the members of this team to take responsibility for what happens. This isn't my program, and it's not (assistant coach) Anca Dumitrescu's program. It's theirs. They have a big role to play and everyone's voice needs to be heard, and we stress that from day one. They then understand that they can be part of something special. Ten, 15 and even 30 years down the road, they won't remember who they won matches against, but rather the time they spent together and what they did during that time. Those relationships will be the memories that will last, and those are the special things that we make sure they understand while they are here."

For seniors Kristi Miller and Whitney McCray, it will be even more special to conclude their successful careers on a winning note. While they've brought many great memories, an NCAA Title, ITA National Indoor Championship and three conference titles isn't enough for these focused student-athletes.

"There is usually only one team with a win to end the season," Miller said. "We'd like that to be ours again in 2008."

Jackets went on to post an 8-3 record in the month of February and, after dropping a 4-3 match at Clemson to begin the month of March, embarked upon a 21-match winning streak to conclude the season, culminating with NCAA Championship in May.

Georgia Tech earned at least a share of the ACC regular season title for the third-consecutive season in 2007, finishing 10-1 in the league to tie with Clemson. Tech breezed to its third ACC Championship with a 4-0 victory over Duke in the quarterfinals and a 4-2 win against North Carolina in the semis before dispatching Miami in the title match for the third straight year, 4-1. Almost a month later, Shelton's squad began its run to the championship with a pair of 4-0 victories against Furman and Kentucky in the NCAA Atlanta Regional before moving on to Athens, Ga., home of longtime rival the University of Georgia, for the remainder of the NCAA Championships.

In Athens, Shelton relied on a steady mixture of energetic underclassmen and experienced veterans to continue advancing through the tournament. The Jackets received key singles victories from seniors Alison Silverio and Tarryn Rudman, as well as underclassmen Christy Striplin and Amanda McDowell, to get the team over the hump of the NCAA Sweet 16, where Tech had seen its title hopes end in 2005 and 2006. Shelton's squad then went on to post 4-2 victories over Notre Dame, California and UCLA over the next three days to earn the former Yellow Jacket All-American his first national title.

The national championship didn't come as a surprise to most people surrounding the program, as Shelton had steadily built a championship team over the seven years prior. As a matter of fact, his .692 winning percentage is the sixth-highest among ALL coaches in Georgia Tech history, behind former football coaches John Heisman (.779) and Bobby Dodd (.713), former softball coach Ehren Earleywine (.722), former volleyball coach Shelton Collier (.704) and current volleyball coach Bond Shymansky (.747).

When Bryan Shelton returned to his alma mater to coach the women's tennis team in 2000, the Yellow Jackets had yet to appear in an NCAA Tournament, had yet to finish higher than fourth in the Atlantic Coast Conference, and had yet to have a player that would become one of the nation's elite.

Since his arrival, all that has changed. Now in his ninth year as the head coach, Shelton is the only coach in the history of Georgia Tech to guide a team to an NCAA National Championship. Of Tech's 17 sports, only football has earned national titles (four), but no sport had earned the distinction of "NCAA Champion" - until 2007.

After a successful fall campaign, the Yellow Jackets embarked on a grueling dual-match schedule that began in Madison, Wisc., where they snapped the three-time defending national champion Stanford Cardinal's NCAA-record 89-match winning streak with a thrilling 4-3 victory in the semi-finals, then shut down Notre Dame, 4-2, in the championship match to capture the USTA/ITA National Team Indoor title in early February. The

Since his return to the Flats, Shelton has recruited some of the most elite players and student-athletes in the nation to the Institute, including the first three All-Americans in the program's history as well as the first Academic All-American in Georgia Tech women's tennis history.

He has had 13 all-ACC honorees and two conference Rookies of the Year during his tenure and has twice been named the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's South Region Coach of the Year while being tabbed the ACC Coach of the Year on three occasions. Under his tutelage, one player has been named the ITA National Player to Watch and South Region Rookie of the Year, six have been named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District Teams, and 40 have been named to the ACC Honor Roll. Five of his student-athletes have earned the prestigious Bobby Dodd Scholarship while one has earned the coveted Honda Award for Tennis.

Now entering his ninth season, Shelton's team has a tough task ahead of them - defending their ITA National Team Indoor and NCAA titles in 2008. The Jackets lost a trio of key players in Alison Silverio, Tarryn Rudman and Amanda Craddock, but have added three talented freshmen in Noelle Hickey, Maya Johansson and Sasha Krupina to the mix.

In his first season at the helm, Shelton guided Georgia Tech to the first NCAA Tournament berth in school history, recording a victory over 25th-ranked Washington in the first round of the 2000 NCAA Regional in Los Angeles, Calif. The Yellow Jackets' No. 29 national ranking in the final polls was the highest end-of-the-year ranking ever for Georgia Tech. Under Shelton's guidance, Jaime Wong earned the first of her three all-ACC honors, while Laura Ozolins garnered first-team GTE Academic All-District III accolades.

Shelton guided Tech to its second NCAA Tournament appearance in 2001, while Wong was named to the all-conference team for the second-straight season. Ozolins also garnered conference honors in 2001, winning the ACC Flight 6 Singles Championship.

The Jackets made their third NCAA appearance, reaching the second round of the postseason tournament, in yet another successful season for Georgia Tech in 2002, while climbing to a record-high 17th in the nation in the polls. The No. 17 ranking was the first time in program history that the Yellow Jackets had been ranked in the top-20, and Tech concluded the year ranked 21st in the nation after finishing with a 15-10 dual-match record. That same season, Wong became the first Yellow Jacket to represent the Institute in the NCAA Singles Championships, and Shelton became the first Georgia Tech women's tennis coach to earn ACC Coach of the Year honors.

The 2003 team proved to be even more successful for Georgia Tech, concluding the season with a 14-7 dual-match record and the school's fourth consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament. The Jackets also set a record with five wins against ACC opponents in 2003, while Wong earned her second straight appearance in the NCAA Singles Championship after earning her third all-ACC honor. That same season, Kelly Anderson became the first Georgia Tech women's tennis player to earn ACC Rookie of the Year honors.

Shelton guided his 2004 team to the NCAA Tournament for the fifth time in his five-year tenure, advancing to the second round for the fourth time in the program's history. The Yellow Jackets accumulated numerous honors during the year, beginning with earning the inaugural ITA National Team Sportsmanship Award in March and concluding with winning the ACC Sportsmanship Award and being named an ITA All-Academic Team for the first time in school history. With both Anderson and Lyndsay Shosho earning all-conference honors, 2004 marked the first time since 1989 that two

players earned all-ACC honors in the same season. Shosho became just the second player in the program's history to represent Georgia Tech in the NCAA Singles Championship, while Anderson garnered GTE/CoSIDA Academic all-District III accolades and was named the prestigious Bobby Dodd Scholarship recipient. She also joined Sekita Grant, Maria Nieto and Alison Silverio as ITA Scholar-Athlete honorees.

The 2005 team accomplished multiple "firsts" for the program, including first ACC Regular Season Championship, first ACC Tournament Championship, and first appearance in the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Championships. The Jackets concluded 2005 with a record-breaking 21 wins and nine conference victories en route to the first ACC Tournament Championship for any Yellow Jacket tennis team. Shelton was named the ACC and ITA South Region Coach of the Year and had three all-ACC honorees in Kristi Miller, Dasha Potapova and Alison Silverio, while Miller also wrapped up the ACC and ITA South Region Rookie of the Year honors. The 2005 season also provided another "first" in the program's history, as Miller became the first Yellow Jacket to earn All-America honors when she was selected as one of the 16 seeds in the 2005 NCAA Singles Championship, where she advanced to the Sweet 16. She also teamed with Silverio to become the first tandem to represent Georgia Tech in the NCAA Doubles Championship.

The team reached as high as No. 4 in the polls during the season and concluded the year ranked sixth in the nation, both of which were new marks for any women's sports team in Georgia Tech history. Anderson again earned GTE/CoSIDA Academic all-District honors, and joined Miller as Georgia Tech's ITA Scholar-Athlete recipients for 2005. The team also earned its second straight ACC Sportsmanship Award and was named an ITA All-Academic Team for the second consecutive year.

The winning tradition continued in 2006, as Georgia Tech again captured the ACC Championship and made its second-straight appearance in the Sweet-16 at the NCAA Championships. For his work, Shelton was again named the ITA South Region Coach of the Year, and the Yellow Jackets finished the season with a record-high 23 victories and a final ranking of No. 7 in the nation. He had two players to earn All-America honors, as Kristi Miller was named a singles and doubles All-American while Lyndsay Shosho earned Doubles All-America honors in her final season on the Flats. Miller also achieved another first for the program, as she became the first Yellow Jacket to earn the No. 1 ranking in singles play, before finishing the season ranked No. 2. For her outstanding performance, Miller accumulated numerous awards, including the Honda Award for Tennis and the ITA National Player to Watch. She also became Tech's first Academic All-American, while Kelly Anderson was named CoSIDA Academic All-District for the third-straight year. Rounding out the accolades for the Jackets were ITA South Region Cissie Leary Award for Sportsmanship winner Alison Silverio and Academic All-ACC members Anderson, Miller, Shosho and Silverio.

Five Yellow Jackets finished the year with singles rankings, while Miller and Shosho concluded 2006 ranked 14th in the nation in doubles.

Georgia Tech concluded the 2007 ranked atop the national rankings for the first time in history and had a pair of players earn All-America honors. Whitney McCray earned her first All-America honor by earning the No. 3 seed in the 2007 NCAA Doubles Championships, teaming with Kristi Miller, who earned All-America honors in both singles and doubles for the second-consecutive season. Overall, Shelton had two members of the squad compete in the NCAA Singles Championships at the season's end, while two doubles teams also played in the NCAA Doubles Championships. Miller was again tabbed an Academic All-American in 2007, while seniors Alison Silverio and Tarryn Rudman took home the ITA's South Region Sportsmanship Awards. Seven members of the team finished the season ranked in the top 100 in singles, while three Yellow Jacket doubles teams earned national rankings at the season's end.

Prior to returning to his alma mater, Shelton spent over a year as a national coach with the United States Tennis Association. Before joining the USTA coaching ranks,

Shelton spent nine years on the ATP Tour, winning two singles and a pair of doubles titles prior to his retirement following the 1997 U.S. Open.

Shelton's hiring in the summer of 1999 reunited him with former Georgia Tech teammate and doubles partner Kenny Thorne, who serves as Georgia Tech's head men's tennis coach.

Shelton and Thorne both lettered for the Yellow Jackets from 1985-88 and helped Georgia Tech to an overall 70-38 dual-match record and a 20-7 ACC mark during their four seasons. As seniors in 1988, the duo guided Tech to a school-record 26 wins, which included a 7-0 run through the ACC, a second place finish in the conference tournament and Tech's first appearance in the NCAA Championships.

Shelton earned all-ACC honors in each of his four seasons on the Flats and garnered All-America honors in 1988. He advanced to the quarterfinals of the 1988 NCAA Singles Championship, falling to eventual champion Robbie Weiss.

Shelton ranks second on the Jackets' career singles wins list with 101 victories and was inducted into the Georgia Tech Athletic Hall of Fame in 1993 and the Georgia Tennis Hall of Fame in 2002. This past year, Shelton was inducted into the Huntsville-Madison County Athletic Hall of Fame in Alabama.

Following his collegiate career, Shelton won his first tour title at the Hall of Fame Championships in 1991, becoming the first African-American to win an ATP event since Arthur Ashe in 1978. He repeated as the singles champion at Newport in 1992 and also claimed a pair of doubles titles, winning the 1994 Mexican Open with Francisco Montana and the 1997 Australian Hardcourt Championship with Patrick Rafter. In 1993, Shelton was a finalist in the Mixed Doubles at the French Open.

A six-time participant at Wimbledon, Shelton defeated second-seeded Michael Stich in the first round of the tournament in 1994 en route to a berth in the Round of 16.

Shelton climbed as high as 55th in the ATP singles rankings and also played in seven U.S. Opens, six Australian Opens and four French Opens while posting victories against the likes of Andre Agassi, Thomas Muster, Richard Krajicek and Todd Martin.

After retiring from the tour, Shelton coached MaliVai Washington, a 1996 Wimbledon finalist, until being named a USTA National Coach.

With the USTA, Shelton assisted with the development of some of the top juniors in the Southeast, covering North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, Tennessee and Kentucky.

Born in Huntsville, Ala., Shelton currently resides in Smyrna, Ga., with his wife Lisa, and their children, Emma and Benjamin. He earned his degree in industrial engineering from Georgia Tech in 1989.

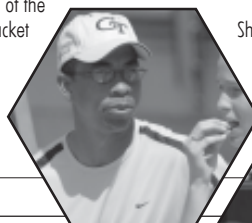

In her first season as an assistant coach for the Georgia Tech women's tennis team is former Florida State tennis standout Anca Dumitrescu, who played for the Seminoles from 2001-04. Dumitrescu assists head coach Bryan Shelton in player development, recruiting and general day-to-day activities related to the program.

Dumitrescu excelled on the courts in Tallahassee, playing No. 1 singles for the Seminoles and earning top-60 national rankings in each of her four years in college. A two-time All-Atlantic Coast Conference honoree, she led the Seminoles to a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances and participated in the NCAA Singles Championships on two occasions. Dumitrescu amassed multiple awards during her tenure at Florida State, including earning the 2003 Golden Nole Award as the Seminoles' Most Valuable Player and the 2004 ITA South Region Senior of the Year Award. She was also the recipient of the ITA South Region Arthur Ashe Sportsmanship Award in 2004.

Following her playing career at Florida State, Dumitrescu spent two years as a manager and graduate assistant coach at her alma mater before earning her first full-time coaching job at East



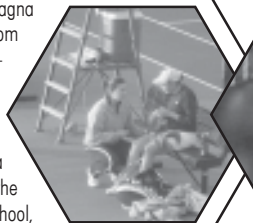
Tennessee State, where she served as the assistant coach in 2007.

Prior to college, Dumitrescu competed on the WTA Tour, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 514 in the world during the 1997-98 season. After qualifying for the French Open as a junior in 1998, the Romania native won the singles and doubles titles in the 1999 Romanian Junior Tennis Championships.

Dumitrescu not only excelled on the courts in Tallahassee, but also in the classroom, earning a dual degree in communications and multinational business as a Magna Cum Laude graduate in 2004 before earning her masters in communication from Florida State in 2006. A recipient of the ACC's Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship, Dumitrescu spent a year teaching public speaking at Florida State while completing her masters degree.

As an undergraduate, Dumitrescu completed an honors thesis regarding media propaganda in the Romanian press and was selected to present her thesis at the Southern States Communication Association Conference in 2004. In graduate school, she completed her Master's thesis on the representation of female athletes in the Romanian and American media and was selected to present her thesis at the National Communication Association Conference in 2006.

Dumitrescu, 26, is fluent in Romanian, English, German and French and can also understand and speak Italian. Aside from tennis, she is active in the Atlanta community, winning the Tri-States Park Sprint Duathlon in 2007 and finishing fourth in the 24-30 age group in the 2006 Atlanta Marathon. She also posted a third-place finish in the Regional Collegiate Cycling Championships, held in Florida in 2006, and climbed Mont Blanc, the highest mountain in Europe (located in France), in 2005.



Robin STEPHENSON

Robin Stephenson, a former All-American at the University of Alabama and current professional tennis player, is in her second season as a volunteer assistant coach for the Georgia Tech women's tennis team.

Stephenson's experience and talent were great assets to the Yellow Jackets in 2006, as she helped guide Georgia Tech to its first NCAA Title in any sport. Prior to her arrival, the Yellow Jackets had yet to advance past the Round of 16 at the NCAA Championships, but in her first season as an assistant on Bryan Shelton's staff, Georgia Tech captured its third Atlantic Coast Conference title as well as the ITA National Indoor Team Championship in addition to the NCAA Title.

Stephenson competed for the Tide from 2002-06 and reached as high as No. 4 in the ITA Singles Rankings during her senior season. She set the school record for most singles wins in a career (95) and is also a part of the school's top doubles tandem in history, earning 67 victories with teammate Ashley Bentley in her four years. A three-time participant in the NCAA Singles Championships and two-time competitor in the NCAA Doubles Championship, Stephenson was named the 2005 ITA South Region Player to Watch and 2006 ITA South Region Senior Player of the Year.

Since graduating from Alabama with her degree in 2006, Stephenson has been playing professional tennis full time, winning seven doubles titles and advancing to the finals in six other doubles championships. She has also been a semifinalist on three occasions in singles, and six others in doubles. Stephenson won her first WTA doubles title in a 10K Hilton Head tournament in 2005, knocking off the top three seeds of the tournament in the final three rounds to win the championship. By the end of 2007, Stephenson had reached as high as No. 202 in the world in doubles and was rated in the top-450 in singles, according to the WTA.

A native of Kitchener, Ontario, Stephenson, 23, graduated from Alabama with a degree in communication and information sciences and a minor in psychology.

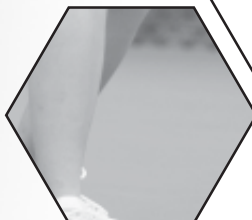

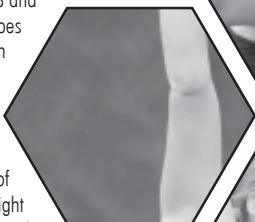

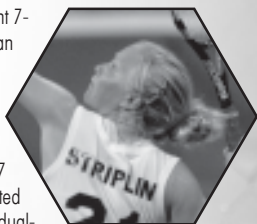

BILL MOORE

Bill Moore came to Georgia Tech in October, 1934, on a tennis scholarship and earned his living expenses performing a variety of campus jobs. He teamed with Russell Bobbit to win the SEC doubles crown in 1938 and helped the Yellow Jackets capture the SEC team title. Inducted into the Georgia Tech Athletic Hall of Fame in 1972, Moore lost only one singles match during his career.

Following his graduation, Moore worked for W.H. Kelley in the lab at Giddens Point Co. before joining the Navy during World War II, where he served two years in the South Pacific as an officer on a destroyer. After his military service, he convinced Kelley, who had retired, to join him in business, thus forming the Kelly-Moore Paint Co. After six years of steady growth Kelly again retired, with Moore buying him out. The business went on to become the largest privately-held company in the United States. Moore also developed the Broken O Ranch, the largest irrigated acreage in Montana, and served as the chairman of the Calmutual Insurance Co.

The Bill Moore Tennis Center was opened for the 1988 tennis season and serves as the home of the Georgia Tech tennis teams. The center was officially dedicated in honor of Bill Moore, whose efforts were vital in the construction of the impressive facility, on Oct. 28, 1988. The center has three lighted indoor courts and two tiers of outdoor courts, six of which are lighted and have grandstand seating for 1,500. Well-suited for hosting tournaments, the Bill Moore Tennis Center has been the site of numerous major events over the last 10 years, including the NCAA Region Championships in 1997, 2005, 2006 and 2007, the ACC Championships in 1988 and the ITA Rolex South Region Championships.

The Bill Moore Student Success Center was made possible through the financial support of several donors, including a \$5 million gift from Bill Moore, who said that his gift expressed his strong belief in the Total Person Concept and the intention to spread the concept to the entire Tech student body. "The center will be used to recruit all students, not just athletes," Moore said at the time of his donation. "Its ongoing programs should help Tech attract the best and brightest candidates from the pool of potential students."

The Bill Moore Student Success Center currently houses Career Services, Student Financial Services and Planning, Corporate Liason Program, Special Programs and Undergraduate Admissions, and is located adjacent to the football stadium.

THE SWARM

Made up entirely of Georgia Tech students, "The Swarm" can be found in their bright yellow t-shirts in prime seating locations at every home game for the Georgia Tech football, volleyball and men's basketball teams. They have also hit the road with the Yellow Jacket tennis team for matches at Clemson and Georgia.

STEALING THE "T"

For many years, one of the most popular pranks by students was the stealing of the "T" from the top of Tech Tower.



THE YELLOW JACKET

Conflicting accounts exist as to the origins and beginnings of the Yellow Jacket, but the nickname did not grow out of the familiar six-legged insect; rather, the insect mascot, known as "Buzz," grew out of the nickname. The first known reference to Tech students as "Yellowjackets" appeared in the Atlanta Constitution in 1905 and came into common usage at that time. The name, spelled as one word, was first used to describe supporters who attended Tech athletic events, dressed in yellow coats and jackets. The actual mascot was conceived at a later, undetermined date.

THE RAMBLING WRECK

On September 30, 1961 in the football home opener against Rice University, the official Rambling Wreck car was unveiled to 43,501 fans at Grant Field, leading Georgia Tech onto the field. The event did not establish a new tradition, but cemented one, as it has led the team onto the field in every home game since.

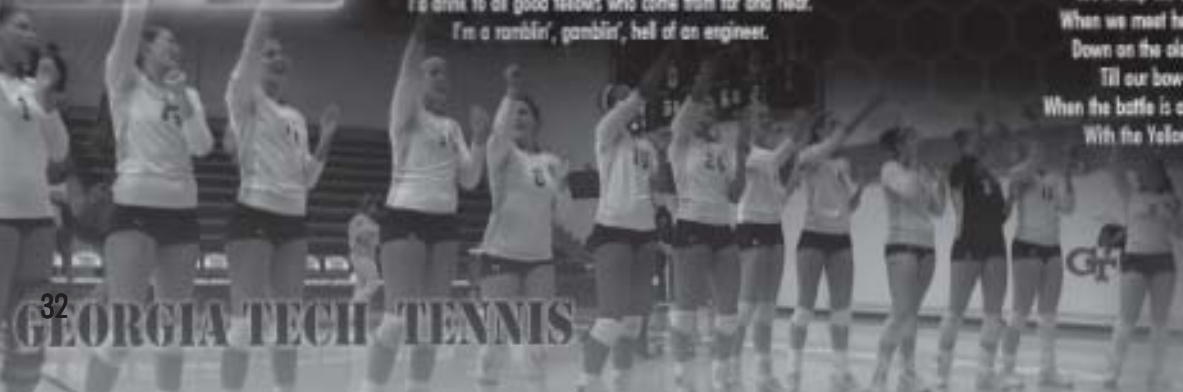

ALL-AMERICANS

Three Yellow Jackets have earned All-America distinction since the program first began in 1977, with all three student-athletes having played for current Yellow Jacket head coach Bryan Shelton. The list is highlighted by five-time All-America Kristi Miller, the first women's tennis player to earn All-America honors and one of just three females in school history to earn the honor in at least three different years.

◆ Kristi Miller

Kristi Miller became Georgia Tech's first women's tennis All-American when she earned All-America honors in singles as a freshman. The Marysville, Mich. native has gone on to become the most decorated student-athlete in school history, as she owns Tech's career marks in singles victories (117) and winning percentage (.801) and stands second with over 90 career doubles victories. A five-time All-American (three times-singles; twice-doubles), Miller has also earned the prestigious Honda Award for Tennis (2006) and is a three-time all-Atlantic Coast Conference honoree. Miller's accolades include being named the ITA National Player to Watch and ACC Tournament MVP in 2006 and the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2005. A 2005 U.S. Open participant in doubles, Miller is a two-time CoSIDA/ESPN the Magazine Academic All-American the holds a perfect 4.0 grade point average at Georgia Tech.

◆ Lyndsay Shosho

2006 - Doubles

Lyndsay Shosho became the Yellow Jackets' second women's tennis All-American when she teamed with Kristi Miller to advance to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championships in her senior season (2006). The same year, Shosho set the school record for singles wins in a season with 35 while breaking the mark for career doubles victories at Tech. She currently stands third in Tech's record books with 83 career doubles wins and seventh with 84 career singles victories. In addition to earning All-America honors, Shosho was twice named All-Atlantic Coast Conference and helped lead Tech to its first two Atlantic Coast Conference Championships.

◆ Whitney McCray

2007 - Doubles

Whitney McCray earned All-America accolades in doubles during the 2007 season when she teamed with Kristi Miller to earn the No. 3 seed in the NCAA Doubles Championships. The Yellow Jacket duo, which reached as high as No. 3 before finishing the season at No. 7 in the national rankings, were ranked in the top-10 for the last three months of the season. McCray holds the Georgia Tech records for doubles winning percentage in a season (.810 in 2005) and career (.693) and stands seventh in the Yellow Jacket annals with 70 career doubles wins. She has been a part of all three ACC Championships and was a key member of Tech's NCAA Championship team in 2007.

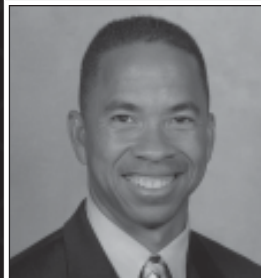

The Atlantic Coast Conference

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964. The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting with the 2005-06 academic year.



The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2007-08 academic year - 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

ACC Tournament Notes: From 1977 to 1982 the conference champion was determined solely on the basis of a post-season tournament with points awarded on individual play. From 1983 to 1985 the conference champion was based on points awarded for both regular-season and tournament play. The regular season results accounted for approximately 40 percent of the total and the tournament, the remaining 60 percent. From 1986 to 1989, the conference champion was determined by a three-day, single-elimination dual match tournament with a playback to determine places one through eight. Since 1990 the conference champion has been determined by a single-elimination dual match tournament with no playback.

The Tradition

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 55th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 105 national championships, including 56 in women's competition and 49 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 139 times in men's competition and 86 times in women's action.
