### Rose Bowl Victory Is Credited to Ga. By Crosby

"Just one of those things," said "Bing" Cosby, Tech sophomore, when asked to explain an error made by his well-known singing "cousin" on last week's Kraft Music Hall program, during which the more famous "Bing" mentioned 1929 as "the year when Georgia won the Rose Bowl tilt."

It seems that Mr. Crosby, in introducing his vocal rendition of "Can't We Be Friends?" hit song of '28 and '29, committed the near-unpardonable mistake of leaving the "Tech" out of "Georgia Tech," giving the Bulldogs credit due Tech's famous Rose Bowl aggregation. Far from being Rose Bowl champs, the Georgians of 1928 were just one more team that was moaning, "Can't We Be Friends?" in the general direction of the boys from the Flats. In fact Georgia has never really won a Southeastern Conference championship.

### Vacation Period of Fifteen Days Given

Tech has been favored this year with the longest Christmas vacation in many years—starting Saturday, December 19, 1936, and extending to January 1, 1937—a grand slam of fifteen solid days of leisure. This lengthy holiday came about because of Christmas and New Year falling on Friday, thus making it inadvisable to break into a week before or after.

However, rules regarding cuts on the day before or the day after the holidays will be in force as usual. Those failing to report to class on Saturday, December 19, or Monday, January 4, will be given an offense, says H. H. Caldwell, registrar of the school.

Yesterday the department received a sectionalized Plymouth motor, 1937 model, mounted on a standard chassis. This is a gift from the Chrysler Corporation, obtained through Dr. Brittain, for experimental purposes in the labs. The car has been on display at the New York Auto Show. fl

Mr. Henry Ford personally presented to the M. E. Dept. one of his newest type V-8 engines. It will be mounted in the lab for testing work. All senior mechanicals and aeronauticals will be given an opportunity to use the motor, and to find out just exactly what it will do. His band, presenting smooth and individual arrangements, is one of the most popular in Chicago, where he is now playing at the Trianon Ballroom. This trend brought matters to a head. Science versus romance. There were no two ways about it. Since the men were unyielding the girls had to "kiss and make up."



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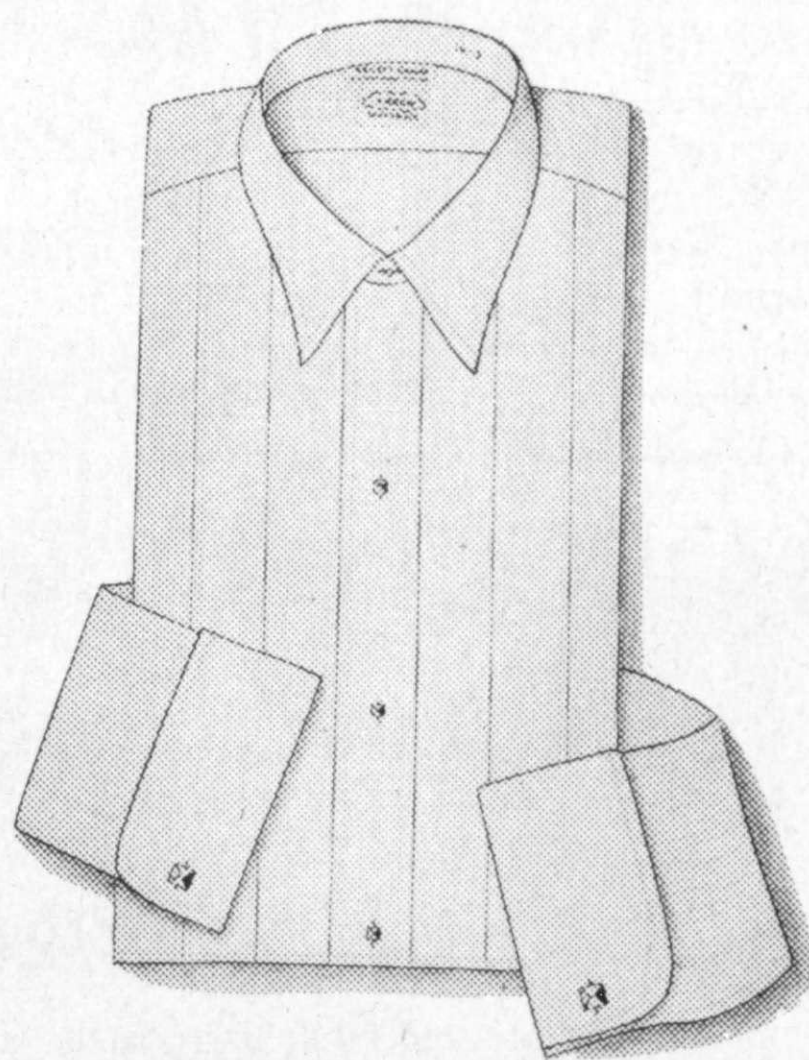

the day following the Kentucky game for California, writes that the Golden Bears have quite a powerful team, probably the best team that has appeared in Atlanta this season.

This will be the fourth meeting between Tech and the University of California. The first meeting occurred on January 1, 1929, when the great Tech team of that year beat them in the Rose Bowl at Pasadena, California, 8 to 7, to win the national championship. The other two games were won by California, one of which was played here in Atlanta on the 26th of December, 1931, ending with the score 19 to 6. The next year in Berkeley, the score was 27 to 7.

The records for the two teams for this year have been about equal as California has won 6 and lost 4 games in comparison to 4 and 5 for Tech. Both teams have greatly outscored their opponents this year, also California has 140 to 51 points and Tech holds the big end by 238 to 96. While Tech's record of outgaining every opponent speaks for itself. California proudly points to the fact that they beat Stanford 20 to 0. Stanford held the U. of Washington, the West's choice to the Rose Bowl, to a tie.

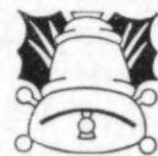

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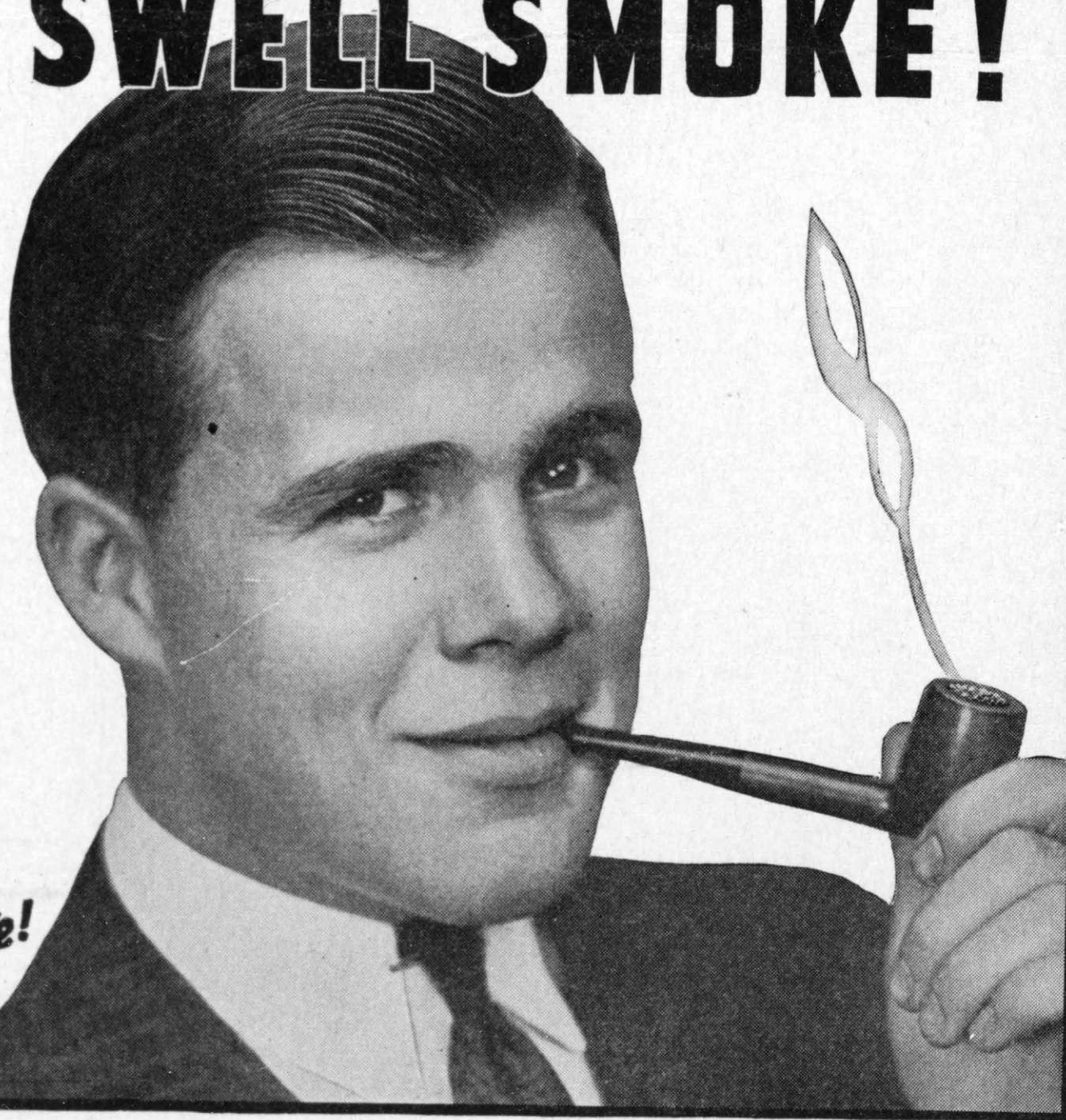

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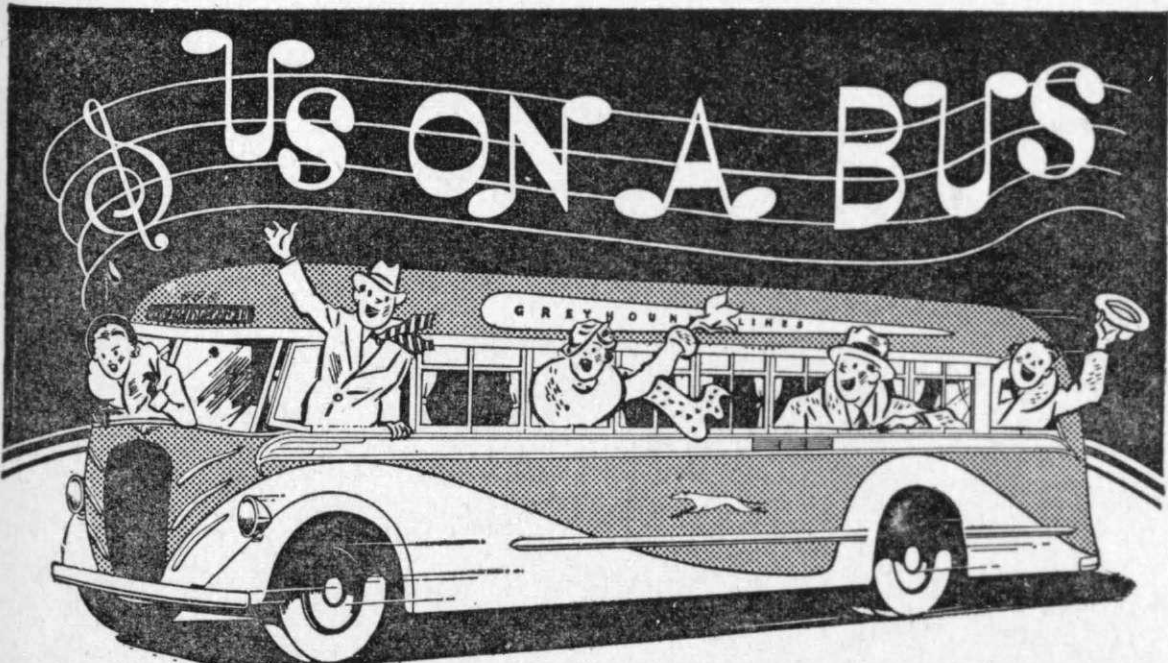

Tech's vast group of friends who are so constantly helping the school in one way or another should be congratulated, for it is through their efforts that the school is enabled to maintain its good reputation.

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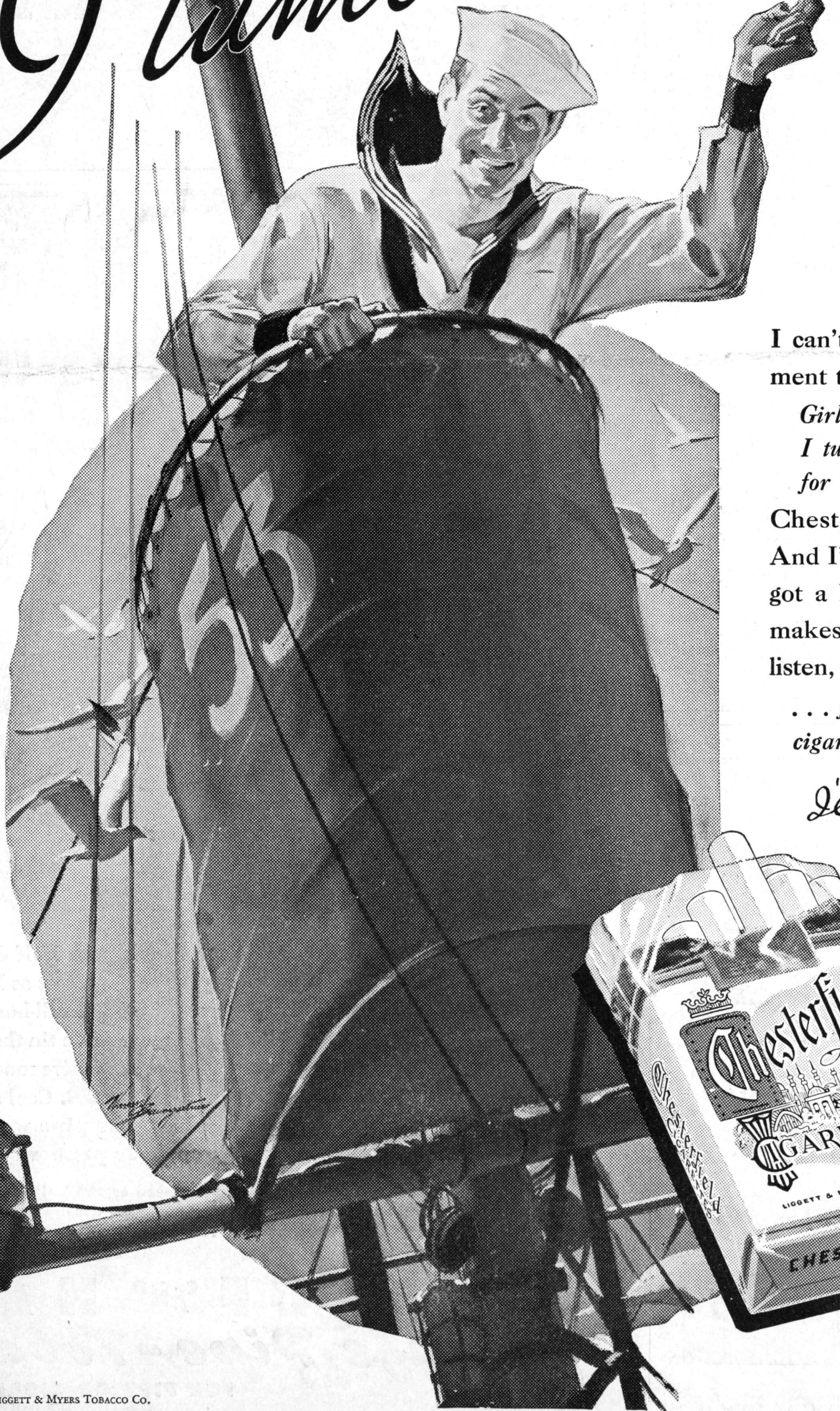
