

The degree, a B.S. in Computational Media, promises to encompass all aspects of the computer, from practical programming and design to theoretical analyses and criticism.

Upon completion of a core group of required courses, Computational Media students will specialize in one of four areas: Interactive Games Design, Film and Digital

Derek Kellenberg and Mikhail Klimenko will teach in the School of Economics. Kellenberg, an assistant professor, earned his PhD from the University of Colorado, Boulder, His research interests include international trade and multinational corporations.

Klimenko, an associate professor, recently taught at the University of California, San Diego. His research interests focus on regulation of telecommunications and information technology.

The School of Modern Languages picked up three new assistant professors: Stuart Goldberg, Kyoko Masuda, and Cecilia Montes-Alcalá. Goldberg specializes in Russian, Masuda in Japanese, and Montes-Alcalá in Spanish.

Marco Castillo and Michael Hoffman joined the School of Public Policy. Castillo, an assistant professor, specializes in agriculture and applied economics, while Hoffman, an associate professor, focuses on the interplay between philosophy and mathematics.

Amanda Damarin will teach as an assistant professor in the School of History, Technology and Society. She received her PhD in sociology from Columbia University and did her dissertation on labor markets in a web environment.

Last fall, the Ivan Allen College began offering a new B.S. degree called Global Economics and Modern Languages (GEML).

GEML is a joint program between IAC's School of Modern Languages and the School of Economics and combines foreign language training with economics to prepare its students for toparing the participants for graduate studies in related fields of law, international business and public policy.

There are still more interdisciplinary programs in the works. Two more IAC schools are also in the early stages on another joint degree program.
