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




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Volleyball ends five match winning streak

The Jackets traveled to Kentucky this past weekend to take part in the Kentucky Volleyball Classic in Lexington, Ky. Tech joined Villanova, Toledo and the host team, Kentucky. The team started their season last week by going a 3-1 during Regency Suites Midtown Invitational.

The Jackets' first opponent of the tournament was Villanova. The Wildcats entered the tournament having lost five of six matches, but gave Tech trouble in the first game. However, Tech edged Villanova 31-29.

The Jackets seemed to have solved Villanova as they won 30-23 in the second game. In game three, they found trouble again. The team trailed by double-digits points for much of the game as Villanova bounced the Jackets 30-16.

Tech rebounded and finished off the Wildcats in the fourth game 30-26. Niekamp finished the match with 43 assists and six kills. Lindsey Grav. Talisa Kellogg, Callie Miller and Stegemann all had double digit kills for the Jackets.

In the second match of the afternoon, Tech battled the Toledo Rockets. The Jackets eased by the Rockets 30-21 in the first game, and cruised by in the second game 30-24.

Tech struggled to close out Villanova, and suffered a similar problem against Toledo. The third game featured four lead changes and three times Tech was within one point

of tying the game. Ultimately, the Jackets fell short in game three, but they won the fourth game 30-26.

It was a hard fought battle for the Jackets who swept their matches for the day and looked ahead to Kentucky.

We got great leadership from our senior libero Abby Showers and we really needed her work ethic out there at times," said head coach Bond Shymansky of Tech's second match.

On the second day of the tournament, Tech saw their five match winning streak come to a close as the Wildcats of Kentucky finished

them in four games. Junior Lindsey Gray had 14 kills and 14 digs while Allie Niekamp had 10 kills and 55 assists to lead the team. After the Jackets looked strong to open the match with a win 30-28, the Wildcats rallied to win three straight games and take the match.

Kentucky easily beat Tech 30-21 in the second game. Tech's Achilles heel this year had been the third games of matches, and it showed against Kentucky. Tech played in a game that was tied 23 times and had 10 lead changes. Unfortunately, they came up on the losing end 38-36. That proved to be the turning point as they dropped the fourth game 30-27.

"We learned what the grind is like on the road this weekend," Shymanksy said. "We are excited to come back home this weekend. We really feel good about heading into conference play after this home tournament."

"I just waited for the quarterback to throw it and intercepted it," Lewis said about the throw. "It was pretty much right at me."

With the offense starting the game with a three-and-out drive, Tech had to punt the ball into Samford territory. Two plays later, Samford receiver Josh Brennard tipped a pass from Jefferson Adcock. The tipped ball fell into the hands of Tech's Djay Jones, who returned the interception 29 yards for the touchdown.

"It happens," Coach Gailey said when asked if he was worried when the game opened with the short drive. "If you have concerns with each and every drive because it doesn't work out, you're going to end up with an ulcer."

The offense helped by adding three touchdowns before the first half was over. Reggie Ball was 10-for-16 with 83 yards, two touchdowns and an interception. Calvin Johnson recorded his third career multiple touchdown game after ending the first half with four receptions for 29 yards and two touchdowns.

"Everybody was real comfortable with [the offense]," Johnson said. "Everyone is starting to like it."

On Tech's second drive of the game, Ball demonstrated his skill as a pocket passer by completing all six of his passes for 56 yards. The possession was capped off by a six-yard touchdown run by Tashard Choice.

The Samford offense never seemed to develop a rhythm. With the help of constant blitzes, the defense was able to keep constant pressure on Adcock and Dante Williams. Often starting in the shotgun position and immediately being forced to scramble, the Yellow Jackets forced the Bulldogs to make mistakes.

The Jackets will have to perform better on kickoff coverage if they hope to be successful against more difficult competition. The unit allowed kick returns for 54, 36 and 31 yards. Both of the Bulldogs' scoring drives began with the Samford offense already in Tech territory. Poor kick returns and mistakes, like Ball's interception late in the first quarter, gave Samford easy yards and great field position. Tech's defense was able to hold Samford out of the endzone, but they were unable to keep the Bulldogs off of the scoreboard.

Tech won its first game after the loss to Notre Dame. They look to win tomorrow against a Troy team that pushed No. 9 Florida State to its limits. Ball certainly felt better about the offense and the team after Tech's first win.

"It feels a lot better after this game than the last game. It's always nice to put those numbers up in the left hand column," Ball said after the game. "A win is a win."

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Volleyball hosts invitational

After being a bit rusty in their first game against Mississippi State, Tech ran off five victories in a row before being humbled by Kentucky last week in the Kentucky Volleyball Classic. Tech's record currently stands at 5-2 and they are led by their preseason All-ACC players sophomore Talisa Kellogg and junior Ulrike Stegemann. Each has amassed 84 kills to lead the team.

New setter Allie Niekamp has filled in nicely, recording a tripledouble in the first game of the season. Lone senior, Abby Showers, has been solid as the new libero. She is averaging over four digs a game and provides senior leadership for the young team. Freshman Chrissy DeMichelis has given Tech a breath of fresh air and has averaged 3.09 kills per game in the five matches in which she has participated. She is the younger sister of sophomore Laura DeMichelis who has not played this year because of a knee injury.

South Florida

Aftersufferingthreelosingstreaks of at least seven games in 2005, the Bulls of South Florida are looking to bounce back with a solid season. In three tournaments this year, South Florida sports a 3-5 record. They are just one win away from matching their 2005 win total after a record of 4-22.

The Bulls are lead by redshirt freshman Marcela Gurgel. She has totaled 142 kills in eight matches and is averaging 4.9 kills a game, which is good enough for the 16th highest kill rate in the nation. She is also a threat as a server, netting 24 aces in 29 games. Her 0.83 aces per game is good for seventh best in the nation. Although Gurgel has 142 kills, she has committed 67 hit errors and has had 384 attempts, giving her a sub-par .195 hitting percentage.

As a team, the Bulls sport a hit percentage of .181 while opponents are hitting at a rate of .202.



Stetson

The Hatters started the season 1-5. They currently sport a 3-6 record coming off of a 2-1 effort at the Stetson Invitational. The Hatters have struggled offensively this year as they are hitting only .085 while the opponent is hitting .336. The

opposition has amassed 141 more kills and have committed 37 fewer hitting errors than Stetson, which accounts for the large discrepancy in hit percentage.

In each of their first five losses, the opposition swept the Hatters in three games and in their first victory, Stetson battled to five games after falling behind 2-1. Setting the pace for Stetson is sophomore Rebecca Orzechowiczwholeads the team with 47 kills. The most efficient hitter on the team is sophomore Julie Fleming who sports a hit percentage of .228, but is averaging under one kill a game.




Sam Houston State

The Bearkats of Sam Houston State have a 3-4 record coming into the Regency Suites Midtown Invitational. Senior Lindsey Roebken leads the offense with 73 kills, averaging just under three kills per game. In seven matches this year, the Bearkats are hitting at a rate of .155 but have been solid defensively by holding opponents to that same mark of .155.

In the middle, Jackie Melinder steers the offense with 231 assists, averaging 11 assists pergame. Inaddition, Megan McNamara has 84 assists and averages 7 assists per game. The Bearkats are an aggressive team from the service line, netting 62 aces on the season, but have committed 92 service errors

Defensively, Sam Houston State has 25 fewer blocks than their opposition as a team. The Bearkats have yet to play a five game match this season and two of the three wins this season have been sweeps.

of them. I was nervous and shaking. I made a couple plays, a pass breakup, a couple tackles and a fumble recovery."

Tech wound up losing the game after taking a slim lead into the fourth quarter. During that game, the Seminoles' William McCray fumbled inside the Tech 15 yard line. Cox recovered the fumble, securing his first turnover.

As a true freshman, Cox was a big part of the 2000 team. He played in every game as a sophomore and started every game as a junior and

During his junior year, he blocked the only field goal kick of his career, something that had not happened at Tech since 1996.

He was the only returning starter in the secondary during his senior season.

Off the field, Cox had his direction set as soon as he arrived on the Flats. Cox was recognized as possessing great technical skills. He started Tech enrolled in engineering with an interest in the sciences.

'The workload was extensive, but I could handle it. I went to a good high school and put in a lot of hard work. I was in engineering at first, so all my classes were directed towards that," Cox said of Tech's academics.

There was another important event that occurred while Cox was at Tech. Coach Georgia O'Leary resigned to pursue other opportunities and Gailey was hired as the head coach.

"As an athlete, I went through two different head coaches and four different position coaches. It was challenging trying to deal with

everything and change my technique according to what each coach liked," Cox said.

Despite these huge changes, he found some stability with defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta.

"For the last two years, my technique was structured around what [Tenuta] did. He's a really good coach if you know anything about him. I learned a lot from him and honestly, I probably took more from him than any coach ever, including the NFL. As a coach you have to work with what you have He's good at doing

that," Cox said.

After his eligibility expired, Cox entered the NFL draft. The Tennessee Titans called him saying they would draft him in any one of the later rounds. As the draft went by, he became very antsy about it. Unfortunately, the draft ended and he found himself without a team.

A week later, his agent arranged a tryout with the San Diego Chargers and "in a matter of days [the Chargers} went from them calling me '39' to them calling me 'hey

Europe to play for the Rhein Fire in Dusseldorf. When he returned, he had to try out for the Chargers

When I went over to Europe, they kind of made adjustments and did other things without me being there. So they kind of put me on the backburner. It was very frustrating because you're dealing with a lot of politics as opposed to my pure talent. I was cut on the last cut day," Cox said.

Cox's football career struggled to take off after he was cut. He went through three different agents, but all of his attempts to get back into the game ended in disappointment.

"Everything was going against me. It was a lot of trouble dealing with everything, and I guess it just wasn't meant to be. I just moved on. I wanted to do other things with my life anyway, and I didn't want to waste time trying to do something that's 50/50," Cox said.

After handling the situation well, where others had failed, Cox decided it was time to pursue a different route: the academic one.

While he originally wanted to become an engineer, he changed his mind the second time around. He enrolled in the school of management this past fall.

He enjoys his return to Tech and his thirst for knowledge keeps him going. One of his former coaches described him as a very technicallyoriented person.

Cox's future plans involve entrepreneurship and living in a big city. A few of his ideas involve opening up a restaurant or a gym.

Being in the real world, you realize that you need a degree. And honestly, I wanted to learn more because I want to open my own business" Cox said.

In a 38-6 rout of Samford, Tech's defense outscored the Bulldog's offense by returning two interceptions for touchdowns. The team's defense accomplished the feat for the first time since Bobby Dodd led the Jackets to a 35-17 win against Tulane at Grant Field in 1966.

"They played a lot of people in the second half, and we're glad they did that. But we needed to come out and establish some things on both

sides of the ball. And I'm sure they answered some things on their side by playing their younger kids," said Samford Head Coach Bill Gray.

Jamal Lewis was feeling historic after he returned the second of the team's two interceptions 97-yards for a touchdown with 2:47 to play in the first half. The return by Lewis was the fourth-longest in Tech history and the longest since Jeff Ford set the school record against Notre Dame with a 102-yard return in 1969.


Four Key Questions

After nearly upsetting the Seminoles last week, the Trojans look to rebound against an equally-determined Tech squad. How will Troy's cornerbacks match up with Calvin Johnson?

Troy's starting cornerbacks Leodis McKelvin and Henry Chubb are each 5-foot 11, giving Tech's Calvin Johnson a six inch height advantage. However, do not underestimate the two corners as they are fast and quick off the snap.

The fact remains that Johnson's 6-foot 5 frame can easily overpower the two defenders in the hope of making big plays. It is up to Reggie Ball to continue to utilize Johnson's size and athleticism to get him the ball and open up big play opportunities.

Can fans expect another big week from the defense?

It was clear last week that Tech's defense came to play, allowing only 11 yards rushing and forcing two interceptions that were returned for touchdowns. However, any Tech fan can tell you that the defense can be great one week and then have an off week the next.

"I think Coach Tenuta and his staff do a wonderful job of teaching and coaching and getting their guys to understand their responsibility within the defense," said Tech football Head Coach Chan Gailey.

The defense may have to go without safety Djay Jones tomorrow because he is listed as doubtful with a thigh injury. Jones was one of two Jackets to return an interception for a touchdown last week.

• Will anyone other than Calvin Johnson step up this week?

For the past two weeks, Tashard Choice made some big plays in the running game for Tech. This is good news for Tech because it offers a variety of options in the offensive playbook other than just Calvin Johnson.

However, a second or third wide receiver, like James Johnson, Chris Dunlap or Greg Smith, will have to step up and take the pressure off of Calvin Johnson to deter the double and triple coverage that he often sees. Tech has to incorporate a mix of plays to keep the opposing defense guessing and allow other players, including Calvin Johnson, to make big plays.

• Will the Trojans be able to put together another solid game against a major Division I foe?


The performance by Troy last weekend was not an aberration. In just the last three years, the Trojans have played against six BCS conference teams. They have managed to stay close to their opponent at least until halftime and put scares into four of the six opponents in the final minutes.

In 2004, the Trojans knocked off Missouri 24-14 in their home opener. A few weeks later, they traveled to Death Valley and lost to Louisiana State by a slim 24-20 margin.

Tech is coming off of a solid win against Samford where the defense returned two interceptions for touchdowns in the game. This was the first time that had happened in 40 years. Last week Reggie Ball connected with preseason All-American receiver Calvin Johnson for two touchdowns in the victory. With a 29 point lead at halftime, Tech's second team got a chance to earn some playing time to add experience to the depth chart early in the season. Former Troy Head Coach Chan Gailey "wasn't terribly shocked" after hearing the news of Troy's near upset of Florida State.

Softball names Perkins head coach b

With the departure of Ehren Earleywhine to Missouri two weeks ago, Tech Director of Athletics Dan Radakovich was charged with making his first coaching hire. The search concluded when Sharon Perkins was announced on Tuesday.

For Earleywhine, the job offered him a return to his home state. Perkins will have big shoes to fill as she will be replacing a coach that led the Jackets to an ACC regular season and tournament championship in 2005 and NCAA tournament bids in all five seasons that he was with the program. Earleywhine's overall record in three seasons as head coach

"The coaches in the past have laid the foundation to keep it going and make it a great program," said new Head Coach Sharon Perkins at her press conference Tuesday.

"Now we are to this point where I don't want to come in here and change everything. I think it's on the right track and I would like to just keep this thing going and get it to the next level," Perkins said.

Before coming to Tech, Perkins played softball and earned a bachelor's degree in Biology at Nicholls State University from 1992

In 1998, she began her coaching career as an assistant coach at Southern Miss, and was hired in 2001 at Georgia as an assistant when current Georgia Head Coach Lu Harris-Champer was hired. Perkins has worked with Harris-Champer since she was a student assistant at

Nicholls State in 1995.

"I think it will be pretty fun going up against [Harris-Champer]. There has been a rivalry between Georgia and Georgia Tech the last few years, so it will be fun. We think a lot of the same ways, so we might do a lot of the same things on the

Last season at Georgia, Perkins helped guide the Bulldogs to a 54-15 overall record. The season ended with a loss to the No. 2 ranked Florida State Seminoles to fall short of the NCAA Super Regionals.

Perkins also helped lead Georgia to two SEC championships in the last four seasons and five consecutive NCAA Tournaments bids. This included the last two seasons that saw Georgia host NCAA Regionals.

One of the main concerns of Tech's softball program has been the need to update the current facilities for the sport. At her press conference, Perkins commented on this issue.

We talked about it, and I know we'll be discussing it more. They have to look into the situation. I did not come here because of the facilities. What they have is a great start and I think we can keep going from that. We went to the World Series when I was at Southern Miss [as a coach] and we did not even have our own field on campus,"Perkins said.

Perkins will have help in her first year as head coach for the Jackets; Several key players from last year's team are returning.

These players include ACC Freshman of the Year Whitney Haller, who set the school record for home runs last season, All-ACC outfielder Cailtin Lever and Sarah Wood.

The Jackets have gone six consecutive games without scoring points in the fourth quarter. In those games, the team has totalled only 17 points after halftime. The last time Tech scored in the fourth quarter, it was courtesy of a field goal by Travis Bell against Wake Forest last year.


The last time Tech put up more than a touchdown in the fourth quarter was against North Carolina State on Nov. 6, 2004 when the team scored 17 points to win 24-14.

Current Tech Head Coach Chan Gailey led the then Division II Troy State Trojans to a national championship in 1984. In his second and final year, he led the team to a 12-1 record.

In his first season with the Trojans, Gailey led the team to a 7-4 record in 1983. He left Troy State after the 1984 season to join Dan Reeves staff with the Denver Broncos. After spending five years with the Broncos, Gailey coached two seasons with the World League's Birmingham Fire before returning to the NFL. Gailey also made stops with the Pittsburgh Steelers, Dallas Cowboys and Miami Dolphins before coming to Tech.
