

Jackets Entrain for Birmingham To Meet Strong Alabama Team

Capacity Crowd Expected To Witness Tough Contest

Tech Seeks Revenge For Last Defeat

Georgia Tech's Yellow Jackets, riding the crest in the Southeastern Conference title race, will journey to Birmingham tomorrow to meet Alabama's Crimson Tide in Legion Field at 2:30 P. M. Central Standard Time.

The Jackets have not forgotten their last trip to Birmingham—that memorable game in 1937 when an official ruled Tech's rather obvious score out on the grounds that Ed Jones' knees hit the ground before he crossed the goal. Neither have they forgotten last year's battle on Grant Field when 'Bama tied the score in the waning minutes on an intercepted pass. A conference title this year would be the first since '28 and oh so sweet to Engineer supporters—Captain Buck Murphy and Company are thinking of all this as they leave for the game.

Alabama has a powerful team again this year though it is hardly in the class with the teams of the past few years. Their record this year is none too impressive, but they have played some of the South's best teams already. In "Herky" Mosely and Gene Boswell they have two of the South's outstanding backs. Their big formidable line gives them an unusually strong defense.

Coach Alexander of Tech is expected to start his usual lineup of Rob Ison and George Webb, ends; Eston Lackey and Charlie Wood, tackles; Bob Aderhold and "Hawk" Cavette, guards; Roane Beard, center; Howard Ector, quarterback; Billy Gibson and Johnny Bosch, halfbacks; and Captain Buck Murphy, fullback.

Dr. Hendricks Speaks At Monthly Chemical Meeting

Following a dinner to be held in the Brittain Dining Hall at 7:15 o'clock on Monday, November 20, the Georgia section of the American Chemical Society will present Dr. Sterling B. Hendricks as the principal speaker. All Tech students are invited to attend the lecture, which will begin at eight o'clock.

Dr. Hendricks, who is essentially a physical chemist, has specialized in the X-ray study of materials and is one of the few American scientists contributing to the rapid advance in the knowledge of the solid state. Supplementing his remarks, Dr. Hendricks will use slides and models to illustrate his points.

At the December meeting, the Georgia Section of the American Chemical Society will have Dr. H. B. Hass from Purdue University, who will lecture on organic chemistry.

Air Raid! Scabbard and Blade Initiates Help Football Team To Down Invaders




10 WAYS TO HAVE A GOOD TIME FOR 5¢

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


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ISON TAKES OFF!



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

Of course, the whole thing depends on how we come out in the remainder of our games, but chances look pretty rosy at present. The invitation seems fairly certain of being offered if we defeat Alabama, and for once in our lives we are not admitting that there is a chance of anything else occurring. There is some doubt as to whether the bid would be accepted if it were offered, because of the post-season game scheduled with California, but chances are that it would be accepted, since the California game can be postponed a year. Looks like the Rambling Wreck is regaining the reputation it possessed ten years ago.

In fact, everyone seems to be coming around to the fact that the Jackets have a real football team this year except one Mr. Paul B. Williamson. Mr. Williamson, as you know, is the well-known compiler of national football ratings. According to Mr. Williamson, Tech now has the wonderful position of twenty-ninth in the nation, as compared with Alabama, which is thirteenth on the list. Notre Dame and Duke are rated twenty-seventh and twenty-fourth respectively. According to his system of predictions, Tech doesn't have the ghost of a chance of even a tie with the Red Elephants, who so far have victories over Howard, Fordham and Mississippi State to their credit. Or maybe Mr. Williamson should attend a football game and find out what it is all about.

Although the school will not grant a general Holiday Saturday, the students have not let this discourage them, and apparently half the student body will be in watch as it is to play, and there is plenty of action. Over at Alabama, where they had a league last year, it attracted more interest than any other intramural sport, of which they have a full calendar.

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

At the same time the freshman team defeated the Georgia freshmen 15 to 40. Captain Wilson, of Tech, set a new course record for the freshmen. His time for the course was 12 minutes and 22 seconds.

On comparative scores Tech should be a touchdown better than the Tide, using Kentucky as the basis of comparison. The Tide tied the Wildcats 7-7 while Tech dumped the Cats from the undefeated ranks last week 13-6.

Past records show, however, that paper advantages are worthless when the two teams tangle on the gridiron. Last year a highly-favored Tide was rushed off its feet in the first half and had to fight from behind to earn a

14-14 tie. The year before a last period score gave Coach Thomas' team the margin of victory. In '36 the Tide ran up 20 points in the first half only to have the Engineers come back to throw a 16 point scare into the Crimson followers.

Although 'Bama has been beaten by Tennessee and Tulane and tied by the Wildcats, the coaching staff has been unanimous in praising the work of the Tide. Coach Thomas said after the Tulane game that his charges played their best game of the year despite the 13 point licking.

Another hopeful sign for Tide backers was the success of the Tide passing game which functioned effectively against Tulane last week. The Engineers gave up a touchdown on a pass against Kentucky and it is expected Coach Thomas will stress work on the aerial game for the Tech tilt Saturday.



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
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
