## **Q & A With Coach Alan Drosky**

### **What are the teams goals for the upcoming indoor/outdoor seasons?**

"We start every new season with the goal of winning the conference championship. You have to have the right people in place and a lot of good things have to happen in order to reach that goal, but that is what we plan for. We also strive to consistently be in the top third of the Atlantic Coast Conference year-in and year-out. At the national level, we set our sights to consistently finish the season in the top 25 at the NCAA Championships."

### **Where does Tech stack up against the other competition in the ACC?**

"The competition in the ACC this year is tighter than ever. Many of the programs have elevated their competitive ability that I see four or five teams that are capable of winning the championship. Every team has an area where they expect to score significant points, but the team that wins will be the one that finds a way to get point production in all areas. We think we're one of those teams that has a chance to win, but we also know that we have some areas that have to come through big for us. This motivates us at every practice and at every meet."

### **What are the team's strengths this year?**

"The sprints, hurdles, and jumps continue to be our strongest areas. We've had some great success over the last several years in these areas and it's not by accident. The sprints, hurdles, and jumps are areas that fit well with our philosophy. We look for young talent that has speed and versatility, the ability to compete in more than one event at the conference level and the potential to develop and compete at the national level. The throwing events also fit this philosophy well and we are working hard to develop those events. The middle distance events, where we've had some outstanding success in the past, is an area that has solidified over the past year and will continue to develop."

"In the sprints, Ashlee Kidd is a returning all-American and ACC Champion. She has the ability to compete well in any of the sprint events, as well as running the relays for us. Shantrell Moss and Antoinetta McKay have continued to develop and have great opportunities this year to score at the ACC meet. Outdoors, Jacqua Williams, who joins our team at the conclusion of the basketball season, has tremendous potential in both the sprints and the jumps, as well as running on our ACC Championship 4x100m relay last year."

"Shantia Moss and Fatmata Fofanah give us one of the best one-two punches in the hurdles in the country. Both have won ACC titles and Moss was an all-American last year. Add to that, Tenisha Griggs, who was a scorer at the conference meet last year, and who has great potential to get even better."

"In the jumps, while down in numbers from the last few years, we still have some very capable performers in Lindsey Vincent, who scored indoors in the long jump last year, and Mellany Stanislaus, who had a great freshman campaign in the triple jump. We think both of them will develop this season into significant players in their events. Raenard Dillard is a junior who has really started to develop this year and we're anxious to see how far she can go."

"We have some solid young throwers in Alana Clooten and Kimery Hern, as well as a conference scorer Jewel Welch. All three were productive at the conference meet last year and will make significant gains this year."

"In the distance events, Jenny Sims and Elena Linn return as scorers at the conference level and Nisha Kurian and Mary Chind continue to make great improvements. All had excellent cross country seasons and will carry that strength to their track events."

### **Who are the freshman that are going to make an impact on the season?**

"Tiffany Grant will have an immediate impact in the 400m and on the relays. In the high jump and combined events, Tiffany Chavis should have an excellent opportunity to score at the conference. Samantha Musil will have an impact on a number of throwing events, but most likely will redshirt indoors and throw outdoors only. Carola Conces is a distance runner who could have a great year in the longer events."

### **How do you continue to keep the program at a consistent competitive level?**

"Staying at a consistent competitive level comes down to two things, recruiting and coaching. Those two things may sound simple but they are hard work, year-round, dynamic activities."

"We work hard to find talented kids who fit our philosophy in regards to having versatility, but who also fit Georgia Tech. We look at academic and character factors. We look at how they have developed over the course of their careers. The other side to the equation is that you have to do the very best in developing the student-athletes in your program, which covers many facets from strength and conditioning, to technical development, etc. We want to work with every student-athlete to develop their given talent to the fullest, and put them in the best opportunities to display that talent."

"As coaches, we also have to keep pushing ourselves to get better, to learn more, and to never rest on past successes. In short, we are always looking to add talented student-athletes to our program and we are always looking for ways that we can do things better."

## Head Coach Alan Drosky



### Alan Drosky 16th Season Georgia Tech, 1987

Alan Drosky is entering his 12th season as the head coach of the Georgia Tech women's track and field program. He also mentors the distance runners for the Yellow

Jackets' men's track team.

Additionally, Drosky recently completed his 16th year as the head coach of both the men's and women's cross country teams at Georgia Tech.

Drosky, a two-time All-American and five-time track All-Atlantic Coast Conference performer, has been head women's coach since the 1995-96 season. He has been a part of the Yellow Jacket coaching staff since 1987, when he took a graduate assistant position while working towards a master's degree in management. After completing his graduate studies in 1989, Drosky became a full-time assistant for the 1990 season and took over the helm of the cross country program in '91.

Prior to earning a Bachelor of Science degree in industrial management in '87, Drosky was one of the most decorated middle distance performers in Tech history. He competed for the Yellow Jackets from 1985-87, serving as team captain three times. He holds the Tech school record in both the 1000 (2:22.78) and 1500 (3:43.37) meter indoor events, and is a member of Tech's outdoor record-holding 4x1600-meter relay (16:32.98).

Drosky earned All-America honors twice at the NCAA Championships, finishing sixth in the indoor mile in 1986 and 12th in the outdoor 1500 meters in 1987. He was also the 1987 ACC champion in the indoor mile.

Following his distinguished career, Drosky was inducted into the Georgia Tech Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996.

Since taking the reins of the women's program, Drosky has guided the Yellow Jackets to seven top-three finishes in the last eight years at the ACC Indoor Championships, including the program's first ACC title at the 2002 indoor ACC meet. It was just the second ACC title by any women's program at Georgia Tech and snapped nine consecutive indoor titles by North Carolina. Drosky was named Indoor ACC Coach of the Year for the second time in his career (1999).

The Jackets have been a mainstay atop the ACC standings, posting a combined nine top-three finishes at the indoor and outdoor ACC meets since 2001. Tech scored a program-best 146 points at the outdoor meet in 2004.

Nationally, Drosky led the Yellow Jackets to their highest NCAA outdoor finish at the 2004 NCAA Outdoor Championships, finishing in a tie for 15th place in Austin, Texas. Tech posted a second top-25 finish at the NCAA Indoor Championships, finishing in a tie for 21st place in Fayetteville, Ark. The Yellow Jackets posted a pair of top-25 finishes in '05, repeating its 21st-place indoor finish and finishing 18th at the outdoor meet.


Drosky has led Tech to a total of 10 top-30 finishes, including two top-15 finishes at the NCAA Championships.

Chaunte Howard became the first Tech athlete to win three consecutive national titles, claiming the NCAA high jump crown at the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championships in '04, and winning the crown again at the 2005 NCAA Indoor Championships.

Howard became the first women's athlete to qualify for the Summer Olympic Games, finishing second at the 2004 U.S. Olympic Trials in the high jump to stamp her ticket to Athens, Greece. On a rare off day, Howard finished in a tie for 28th place at the XXVIII Olympiad. She turned professional in the summer of 2005, after her junior season, and went on to win a Silver medal in the high jump at the 2005 IAAF World Championships, in Helsinki, Finland.

In addition to his mentoring of the women's program, Drosky has also coached several of the nation's top men's distance performers. Headlining that list is David Krummy, who won the 1997 and '98 NCAA indoor 800-meter national titles, still holds four different school records and was named the 1997 and '98 ACC Indoor and Outdoor Championship MVP while at Tech. Under Drosky, Krummy won 12 individual ACC titles and captured the U.S. 800-meter national title in 2001. He has gone on to win a two more U.S. national titles in the 800 (2002-03) and captured a World indoor 800 title in 2003. Krummy ranks as the fastest American 800-1500-meter doubler of all-time and set the American record in the indoor 1000 meters in 2002.

Recent graduate Brendon Mahoney ranks among Drosky's finest



proteges. He was a three-time All-American and finished seventh in the mile at the 2002 NCAA Indoor Championships. He also finished eighth in the 800 at the 2002 U.S. National Outdoor Championships, a race won by Krummy. In 2004, Mahoney won ACC titles in the indoor 800 and mile, and the outdoor 800 and 1500 meter races en route to being named ACC Performer of the Year for both the indoor and outdoor seasons. He went on to earn All-America honors in the 1500 at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

Drosky's top women's competitors include Tech assistant coach Becky Megesi and former standout Renee Metivier. Megesi garnered All-America honors with an eighth-place finish in the 1500 meters in 1999 and was a member of the seventh-place distance medley team in 2000. She won the ACC outdoor 1500-meter title in both 1998 and '99 and qualified for the NCAA Championship meet in both the 800 and 1500 meters in 1999, as well as the 800 in 2000.

Metivier had an outstanding 2002, becoming the first Jacket to earn All-America honors in cross country, indoor and outdoor track. During the indoor season, she earned that status in the 3000 and 5000 meters. She also claimed All-America accolades with an eighth-place finish in the 5000 at the outdoor NCAA meet. Metivier now holds four school records.

Beth Mallory also earned All-America honors under Drosky, placing sixth in the mile at the 1996 NCAA Indoor Championships.

In his career, Drosky has coached his athletes to three national titles as Krummy won two in the 800 and Conrad Nichols won one in the 4x400m relay. His athletes have earned 65 NCAA All-American honors, 64 ACC championships and 142 All-ACC accolades.

In cross country, Drosky has also led the team to success in one of the nation's top cross country conferences. He has guided the women's team to a pair of NCAA Championship appearances (2000, '01), with a top finish of 26th in '01. That same season, he coached the women's team to their first-ever NCAA South Region crown, and was named South Region Coach of the Year. The Jackets' men's team also enjoyed a program-best finish of fourth at the 2001 regional championships. His top ACC finishes came in 1994 with both teams finishing third at the conference championships in Atlanta.

Drosky has mentored three cross country All-Americans and seven NCAA individual qualifiers. Additionally, he has guided Tech runners to 15 All-ACC and 34 all-region performances.

Metivier enjoyed the top season in Tech cross country history in 2001, finishing second at the NCAA Championships, winning the NCAA South Regional title and placing second at the ACC Championships.

Mallory earned All-America honors in 1995, placing 25th, and also earned All-ACC honors three times. Additionally, Megesi was an individual qualifier in '98.

On the men's side, Kevin Graham is the lone All-American in Tech history, finishing 32nd in '94. Senior Kyle Rabbitt earned All-ACC honors in cross country at the 2004 ACC Championships, finishing 14th. Rabbitt is the third Tech athlete to qualify for the NCAA Championships in 2003.

A native of Riverdale, Ga., and a former Georgia state champion in the mile at Riverdale High School, Drosky is married to the former Kim Bohanon, who ran cross country at Georgia State. The couple has two daughters: Hayley, 14, and Hannah, 11.

## Assistant Coaches



### **Allen Bradd Throws Coach/4th Season North Carolina, 1999**

Allen Bradd enters his fourth season as assistant men's and women's track and field coach at Georgia Tech. Bradd specializes in the throwing events, along with pole vault and multi events for the Jackets.

In his three seasons as throws coach, Bradd has tutored three ACC champions, 12 NCAA Region qualifiers, eight All-ACC honorees, led his athletes to six school records and took one athlete to the NCAA Championships.

On the women's side, freshman Kimery Hern qualified for the 2006 NCAA East Region Championships in the discus as well as placing third in the hammer and fourth in the discus, with a personal best mark of 158 feet, 7 inches at the USATF Junior National Championships. Freshman Alana Clooten broke the school record in the women's hammer and went on to finish fourth at the USATF Junior National Championships, while fellow freshman April Philips posted a NCAA East Regional Championships and USATF Junior National Championships qualifying mark of 47 feet, 2 1/2 inches in the shot put in '06.

In 2005 Dore Madere broke two outdoor records in the discus and hammer, along with qualifying for the NCAA Championships in the discus. Madere threw a lifetime-best of 170 feet, 9 inches at the Regional Championships to automatically qualify her for the NCAA Championships. She finished 19<sup>th</sup> at the outdoor NCAA meet.

On the men's side, a former walk-on Eric Massey broke the school record in the men's wt. throw with a mark of 62 feet, 2 1/2 inches last year. Massey also qualified for the NCAA East regional championships with a throw of 201'11" in the hammer throw. Redshirt freshman Andy Powlen posted a mark of 57 feet, 11 inches at the ACC indoor Championships to finish fourth and went on to

qualify for the NCAA East Regional Championships where he finished eighth with a mark of 57 feet, 1 1/2 inches. Additionally, Powlen was an ACC Championships finalist in the discus and posted a season-best of 162'3". Nico Shaner, in just his second year of javelin throwing, posted an All-ACC Championships mark to finish third with a personal-best of 216 feet, 4 inches. Shaner's mark was also a NCAA Regional Qualifier.

In 2005 Bradd guided Zeb Sion to an indoor school record in the shot put with a mark of 59 feet, 3/4 inch and led Greg McCormick to a new record score of 4,869 points in

the heptathlon at the Indoor ACC Championships. Anthony Hoover became the seventh All-ACC athlete under Bradd's tutelage, finishing third at the ACC Outdoor Championships in the javelin.

In his inaugural season as throwing coach, Bradd tutored Sion and Marcus Canty to their first ACC Championship titles in the shot put and javelin, respectively. Canty finished the season with the 23rd best javelin mark in the nation. Bradd also guided the Yellow Jackets to six All-ACC honors and 16 ACC Championship finalists in 2004.

Prior to coming to Tech, Bradd coached at Syracuse University. While guiding the Orangemen throwing events, Bradd led four athletes to NCAA Championship Provisional qualifying marks in the discus, shot put and weight throw. He had a men's shot putter capture the Big East Conference title and an ECAC Discus championship during his stint. He also led a freshman women's discus thrower to the 22nd best mark in the nation. Later that same season, she went on to qualify in the discus for the World Junior Championships.

Before coaching at Syracuse, Bradd was an assistant men's and women's track and field coach at Murray State University for one season. While at Murray State, he tutored three All-OVC honors in the shot put and discus at the Ohio Valley Conference Championships. Also garnering All-OVC honors under Bradd was a men's pole vaulter who finished runner-up at the OVC meet in back-to-back seasons.

Bradd has also had excellent success coaching at the post-collegiate level. During the 2005 season he coached Lavern Eve to a 10th place finish in the women's javelin at the World Championships in Helsinki, Finland, and a fourth-place finish at the IAAF World Athletics Final in Monaco where she threw a season best of 203'3". He has also guided an athlete who qualified for the 2001 U.S. National Championships in the women's hammer and another to the 2000 Olympic Trials in the women's discus, finishing in 14th place.

Bradd attended the University of North Carolina, where he became a two-time All-American in the shot put. He was a five-time individual ACC champion in the shot put and two-time hammer ACC champion. Bradd was elected team captain in the 1998-99 season and was a member of the UNC Student-Athlete Council Member board. After graduation, Bradd competed for the Mizuno Klub Kiehas during the 1999-2000 track and field seasons. In 1999, he finished 12th at the USATF Outdoor National Championships in Eugene, Ore., and had a fourth-place finish in the shot put at the USA/Canada Challenge in Flag Staff, Ariz.

A native of Downs, Ill, Bradd graduated from North Carolina with a Bachelor's degree in sports exercise and science in 1999. He is married to the former Angie Joy and the couple has a two-year old son, Logan.



### **AuDrey Dempsey-Branch Sprints Coach/2nd Season Alabama A&M, 1997**

AuDrey Dempsey-Branch enters her second season as assistant coach for the Georgia Tech women's track and field program. The former

Tech standout coaches the sprinters, 400 hurdlers and coordinates the combined events, along with assisting with recruiting for those events and administrative duties.

In her first year on the Flats, Dempsey-Branch helped guide Ashlee Kidd to two ACC Indoor titles, as she broke the ACC record in the 200m (23.37) and 400m (52.61), on her way to being named the MVP of the 2006 ACC Indoor Championships. Kidd qualified for both the Indoor and Outdoor NCAA Championships, garnering All-America honors by placing fifth (51.57) in the 400m at the outdoor championship.

Prior to returning to Tech, Dempsey-Branch served as an assistant at Clemson (2001-04). She turned the Tiger sprinters and relay teams into one of the best in the country. The Lady Tigers captured the 4x400-meter relay titles at the 2004 indoor and outdoor ACC Championships. Dempsey-Branch also guided the 4x400m relay team to All-America honors at the '04 NCAA Indoor Championships and a ninth-place finish at the '05 indoor NCAA meet. Two of her pupils, Silja Ulfarsdottir and Christina Smith were national qualifiers. Ulfarsdottir finished ninth in the 400m hurdles at the 2004 NCAA Outdoor Championships and 12th in the 400 meters at the '04 NCAA Indoor Championships. Smith was a U.S. World Junior qualifier in the 400m hurdles and an outdoor national qualifier at NAAs during the '04 season. During her stint at Clemson, Dempsey-Branch tutored four All-America performers, five regional qualifiers, three individual ACC champions and 11 all-conference honorees.

Before Clemson, Dempsey-Branch served as an assistant men's and women's track coach at the University of Kentucky from 1999-2001. There she handled sprints, hurdles and jumps, and had three school records fall under her watch. Simidele Adeagbo highlighted her work with the Wildcats, finishing fourth at the 2001 NCAA Indoor Championships and earning All-America honors.

Previous to becoming an assistant at Kentucky, Dempsey-Branch worked as an assistant coach at West Virginia University. There she turned the Mountaineer sprint program into a force in the NCAA, qualifying athletes for the championships in the 100- and 200-meter

dash events, 400m hurdles, along with the 4x100m relay.

As an athlete, Dempsey-Branch was a three-year letterwinner for the Yellow Jackets. She won three ACC championships in the 100m hurdles and 4x400m relay events, and continues to be part of the indoor and outdoor 4x400m relay records at Tech, set in 1992. That same season, Dempsey-Branch ran a leg of the Tech record-setting Sprint Medley Relay team that clocked the eighth-best time in the world. She earned a total of four All-ACC honors in those events, along with the 400m hurdles, and qualified for the NCAA Indoor Championships in the 4x400m relay, and outdoor NCAA meet in the 4x400 and 400m hurdles. That summer Dempsey-Branch competed at the '92 Olympic Trials in the 400m hurdles.

Dempsey-Branch graduated from Alabama A&M in 1997 with a bachelor's degree in nutrition. After graduating magna cum laude, she became head coach at Spellman College for the 1997-98 season.

She is USA Level II certified in the sprints and hurdles.

The Atlanta native is married to Terrence Branch, a former Reebok track and field athlete, who competed at Southeast Missouri State University. The couple has a two-year-old daughter, Colleen, born on May 19, 2004.



### **Becky Megesi** **Distance Coach/6th Season** **Georgia Tech, 2001**

One of the top middle distance runners in Tech history, Becky Megesi enters her sixth year as an assistant for the Jackets cross

country and track teams. She primarily works with the distance runners as well as the cross country teams for both men and women. Additionally, she handles many administrative functions as well as being in charge of recruiting the women's distance events.

As an athlete, Megesi garnered All-America honors in the 1500 meters, finishing eighth at the 1999 NCAA Outdoor Championships in Boise, Idaho. She again earned All-America honors in 2000, anchoring Tech's Distance Medley Relay to a seventh-place finish at the NCAA Indoor Championships in Fayetteville, Ark. Megesi also qualified for the Outdoor NCAA meets in 1999 and 2000 in the 800. In 1998, she became the third Tech individual qualifier for the NCAA Cross Country Championship in Lawrence, Kan. In 2000, Megesi was a qualifier for the U.S. Olympic Trials in the 800 meters.

Megesi won ACC Championships in the 1500 in 1998 and '99, earning All-ACC honors six times during her career. She currently holds school records in the outdoor 800 (2:04.63), the indoor DMR (11:21.48), and the outdoor 4x800m relay (8:56.94).

She earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Management in 2001.



### **Nat Page** **Jumps/Hurdles Coach** **11th Season** **Cal Poly, 1991**

Nat Page is in his 11th year as an assistant coach for the Georgia Tech track and field program. Page is responsible for coaching field events, including high jump, long jump and triple jump, as well as the men's and women's sprint hurdle events.

Since joining the Tech staff in 1997, Page has mentored Tech student-athletes to 32 ACC titles, 32 All-America performances and three national titles. Page was named Mondo Women's Jumps/Multi Events Coach of the Year in 2004.

His latest prodigy, Chaunte Howard captured three consecutive national titles in the women's high jump at the 2004 indoor and outdoor NCAA Championships, and '05 indoor NCAA Championships. She became the first women's athlete to qualify for the Summer

Olympics, finishing second at the '04 U.S. Olympic Trials, earning a spot on the U.S. team.

In Athens, Greece, Howard finished in a tie for 28th place on a rare off day. She ended her career at Tech as a six-time ACC champion, six-time All-American, three-time NCAA champion and three-time ACC Most Valuable Performer. Howard signed a professional contract with NIKE, forgoing her senior season, but continues to train under Page and attend classes at Tech. She went on to earn a Silver medal at the 10th IAAF World Championships, in Helsinki, Finland, with a lifetime-best mark of 6'6.75" in the high jump. Howard currently ranks sixth in the world and is the top American in the high jump.

Andria King, a former assistant coach at Tech, was another highlight under coach Page's tutelage. Page coached King to four NCAA national runner-up finishes in the 60- and 100-meter hurdles in 1998 and '99. She formerly held the American collegiate record in the 60 hurdles with a time of 8.00 in 1999. King was a five-time All-American and three-time ACC MVP.

Other Yellow Jacket All-Americans under Page are Eric Bowers (indoor long jump, 1997), Lynn Houston (indoor high jump, 1999), Malcolm Leason (outdoor triple jump, 2000), Shantrell Moss (4x100, 2005) Montrell Person (110m HH, 2004/60m HH, 2005), Clayton Porter (indoor long jump, 2000), Dana Rogers (4x100, 2004, '05/60m HH, '05), Amandi Rhett (4x100, 100, 200, 2005), Brandy Depland (triple jump 2005, '06), Shantia Moss (60m HH, 100m HH, '06), Andriane Lapsley (60m, 100m, 4x100, '06) and Jerome Miller (high jump, '06).

On the conference level, he has guided four men to conference titles: Bowers (indoor long jump, 1997), Leason (outdoor triple jump, 2000), David Riley (indoor triple jump, 1997) and Person (60m HH, 110m HH, 2004-05).

On the women's side, Page has coached 25 conference championship performances, in addition to King's three hurdle and sprints titles. Lynn Houston won both indoor and outdoor high jump titles in 1997. Mishanta Reyes won the indoor long jump crown in 2001, while Shanta Smith won the indoor triple jump and Jennifer Ledbetter claimed the outdoor high jump title in '02. Howard won a total of six high jump titles in three seasons. The women's 4x100m relay team finished first at the 2005 ACC Outdoor Championships, while Dana Rogers won the indoor 60m hurdles in '05. Lapsley claimed the indoor 60-meter dash and the 90-meter dash at the '05 ACC Championship meets. In 2006, Lapsley garnered first-place finishes in the 60m, 100m, 200m and Shantia Moss won the 100m HH. The 4x100m relay also finished first at the 2006 ACC Outdoor Championships.

In addition to his work at Tech, Page founded Nat's Athletic Training and Career Experiences in September 1993. He has coached eight World Championship team members and a trio of Olympians: Natasha Gibson, Howard and Tisha Waller, who is now the American indoor record holder in the high jump. Page has also worked with Wenda Vereen, who was a member of the U.S. 4x100 team, which won a Silver medal and set an American record at the 1993 World Championships. Howard captured a Silver medal at the 2005 IAAF World Championships in Helsinki, Finland, with a lifetime-best leap of 6'6.75" in the high jump.

Waller joined Howard on the 2004 U.S. Olympic Team in the high jump after capturing her second U.S. title at the U.S. Olympic Trials in Sacramento, Calif.

A native of Evanston, Ill., Page was a NCAA Champion high jumper at the University of Missouri in 1979. He was ranked in the top 10 in the world from 1979-81 and earned a spot on the United States' 1980 Olympic team after finishing second at the U.S. Olympic Trials.


Additionally, Page also competed at a world-class level in the both the high and intermediate hurdles from 1984-92. From 1990-92, he was ranked in the top 10 in the world in the 400 intermediate hurdles. A member of the United States' 1992 World Cup team, Page was a finalist at the U.S. Track and Field Championships every year from 1985-91.

He was inducted into the University of Missouri Athletic Hall of Fame in 1999, where he was a five-time All-American and a four-time Big 8 high jump champion. He was named outdoor MVP of the Big 8 Championship in 1978.

From 1988-91, Page served as assistant coach at California State Polytechnic University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in physical education.

Page resides in Atlanta with his stepchildren, Tyler and Ryan.

## Administrators



**Dr. G. Wayne Clough**  
**Institute President**  
**Georgia Tech, 1963**

The chief engineer of Georgia Tech's determined effort to provide technological leadership in a changing world is Dr. G. Wayne Clough, the Institute's 10th president and the first alumnus to serve in that capacity.

Dr. Clough received a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering in 1964 and then added a master of science in civil engineering from the Institute in 1965. He later earned his Ph.D. in 1969 from the University of California at Berkeley.

Clough's skills as a civil engineer are evident in reshaping the campus to meet the needs of Tech's world-class programs and students. He has overseen the construction of more than a dozen academic and research buildings, with several more on the drawing board. The campus is fully wired with 1,700 miles of fiber-optic cable and offers a comprehensive wireless environment as well.

To provide the additional resources required to reach this goal, Clough engineered the Campaign for Georgia Tech, which raised a record \$712 million in five years for 54 endowed faculty chairs, 233 endowed scholarships, 11 new buildings, and a host of academic, research and athletic programs.

Beyond campus, he gives Georgia Tech a face and voice in Washington, D.C., as a member of the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology and the executive committee of the U.S. Council of Competitiveness, and as chair of the National Academy of Engineering committee on the Engineer of 2020.

Clough came to Georgia Tech from the University of Washington, where he was Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs. In this capacity, he served as chief budget officer and chief academic officer for the University, with responsibility for all budget and capital planning as well as the implementation of academic programs. Before moving to Seattle, Clough spent 10 years at Virginia Tech, first as Head of the Department of Civil Engineering, then as Dean of the College of Engineering. He has also been a member of the faculties of Duke University and Stanford University.

Dr. Clough has been the recipient of numerous awards and honors for teaching and research, including the 1986 George Westinghouse Award from the American Society of Engineering Education and the 1991 State-of-the Art Award from the American Society of Civil Engineers. He was elected to the National Academy for Engineering in 1990. In addition, he has served on the NCAA Division I Board of Directors since September of 2001, representing the ACC.

A native of Douglas, Ga., Dr. Clough has been married to Anne Robinson Clough for more than 30 years, and the couple has two grown children.



**Dan Radakovich**  
**Director of Athletics**  
**IU-Pennsylvania, 1980**

Named Georgia Tech's Director of Athletics on February 22, 2006, Dan Radakovich brings nearly two decades of experience in collegiate athletics management positions to Tech's nationally-prominent program.

Radakovich comes to Georgia Tech after five years as senior associate athletics director at Louisiana State (2001-06), and he previously served as the athletics director at American University in Washington, D.C., in 2000-01. That followed stints as associate athletics director at South Carolina (1994-2000) and Long Beach State (1989-94) as well as two years as the athletics business manager at Miami (1983-85).

Just the seventh Director of Athletics in Tech history, Radakovich was named by Institute President Dr. Wayne Clough to succeed Dave Braine, who retired after nearly nine years in the post. Radakovich also follows in the footsteps of storied names such as John Heisman, Bobby Dodd and Homer Rice.

In his position at LSU, Radakovich was responsible for the day-to-day operation of an athletics program with an annual budget of more than \$50 million, encompassing 20 sports and more than 450 student-athletes. He directly supervised LSU's men's basketball and baseball programs.

LSU athletics reached unparalleled heights during his tenure, highlighted by the 2003 national championship in football and the basketball team's berth in the 2006 NCAA Final Four, as well as national titles in men's and women's track and field and top five national rankings in baseball, women's basketball, softball and gymnastics.

In his stint as athletics director at American, he coordinated the school's move into the Patriot League.

As associate athletics director at South Carolina, Radakovich directed financial operations for a \$30 million athletics budget while supervising financing and logistics for \$33 million in facilities improvements. He also worked closely with then-South Carolina athletics director Mike McGee in laying the groundwork for the new \$70 million Colonial Center Arena in downtown Columbia, S.C.

At Long Beach State, where he served as senior associate athletics director from 1989-94, Radakovich managed a \$5 million budget while reorganizing the department operations and coordinating the production and sales of radio broadcasting packages. He also supervised the men's basketball and baseball programs.

Radakovich began his career in athletics administration as the athletics business manager at Miami from 1983-85. He then worked in the private sector for four years before moving to Long Beach State in 1989.

A native of Monaca, Pa., Radakovich, 47, was a football letterwinner and student coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, where he graduated in 1980 with a bachelor of science degree in finance. He added a master's degree in business administration from Miami in 1982. He also completed the Sports Management Institute's executive education program in 1992.

He is married to the former Marcie McDonald, and the couple has two children, Christian, 16, and Grant, 12.

# The Atlantic Coast Conference

## The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 54th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

## 2005-06 in Review

The 2005-06 academic year concluded with the league pocketing an all-time high six national team titles and 15 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 57 national team titles over the last 16 years. The ACC has won two or more NCAA titles in 24 of the past 26 years.

## The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2006-07 academic year - 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

## A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name

became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

**MARYLAND** — Charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921, charter member of the ACC in 1953.

**MIAMI** — Charter member of the Big East Football Conference in 1991; joined the ACC in July, 2004.

**NORTH CAROLINA** — Charter member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association in 1894, charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921, charter member of the ACC in 1953.

**NC STATE** — Charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921; charter member of the ACC in 1953.

**VIRGINIA** — Charter member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association in 1894, charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921, resigned from Southern Conference in December 1936, joined the ACC in December, 1953.

**VIRGINIA TECH** — Charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921; withdrew from the Southern Conference in June, 1965; became a charter member of the Big East Football Conference in Feb. 5, 1991; joined the ACC in July, 2004.

Chaunte Howard won a Silver medal at the 2005 IAAF World Championships, in Helsinki, Finland, with a personal-best leap of 6 feet, 6 3/4 inches, in the finals of the women's high jump. She qualified for the 2004 Athens Olympics and finished in a tie for 28th place. Howard finished her Tech career as a three-time NCAA national champion, three-time ACC MVP and six-time ACC champion.

## History

Georgia Tech fielded its first track and field team in 1986 under the direction of Dee Todd. Tech started the program with nearly 20 athletes on its squad, led by Kathy Harrison of Atlanta. In the Yellow Jackets first year of competition, Tech tallied 28 points and finished in sixth place in the league standings. Even more amazing was the fact that Tech's Harrison scored all 28 points as she finished either second or third in four different events.

Tech hosted the Outdoor Atlantic Coast Conference Championships on April 15-18, 1987 at the new George C. Griffin Track. The Jackets welcomed Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, NC State, Virginia and Wake Forest in its first opportunity to host an event since joining the league in 1979.

In 1987, Virginia became the first ACC school to clinch both indoor and outdoor conference titles. UVa won the inaugural indoor ACC meet with 132 points. Tech finished fifth that season, totaling 35 points. Harrison was tabbed ACC Meet Most Valuable Performer after winning the long jump.

In 2002, the Rambling Wreck reached a milestone as the Jackets captured the first ACC track and field - men's or women's - championship under the direction of head coach Alan Drosky. The Jackets outscored nine-time defending champion North Carolina, 122-113, in UNC's new Eddie



Smith Field House.

In the modern era, Tech has become a force on both the conference and national scenes. The Yellow Jackets have finished in the top-three at the conference meet 10 times in the last nine years. Tech has also posted four consecutive top-25 finishes at the NCAA Championships during the indoor and outdoor seasons of 2004 and '05.

Chaunte Howard became the first athlete to win three consecutive national titles, posting her third in the high jump at the 2005 NCAA Indoor Championships with a school record-tying mark of 6 feet, 3.50 inches. Howard finished her career with six consecutive ACC high jump titles and garnered six All-America honors during her three seasons. Howard also became the first athlete to compete in the Summer Olympic Games, finishing in a tie for 28th at the 2004 Athens Olympics and went on to earn a Silver medal at the 10th IAAF World Championships in Helsinki, Finland, in 2005.

The Jackets have had 13 All-America performances at the last three NCAA Outdoor Championships in 2004, '05 and '06 and finished an outdoor program-best tie for 15th place at the 2004 NCAA Outdoor Championships.



### Dee Todd (1985-88)

Todd joined the Georgia Tech staff in August, 1985, to become the first women's head coach for track and cross country teams. In her initial season, Todd guided Tech to a sixth-place finish at the Outdoor ACC Championships, coaching two-time All-ACC performers Kathy Harrison (track) and Bridget Koster (cross country). Todd was later recognized by the league by being named ACC Coach of the Year in 1987.

After coaching for three seasons at Tech, Todd left the Yellow Jackets to take over as assistant commissioner at the Atlantic Coast Conference.

During her tenure, Tech posted three top-five finishes at the Indoor ACC Championships and two straight top-four finishes at the Outdoor ACC Championships. Harrison won four ACC titles, two All-America honors and was the first Jacket to qualify for the NCAA Championships.

### Buddy Fowlkes (1989-92)

The Director of Georgia Tech Track and Field, Buddy Fowlkes oversaw the women's track and field team for four seasons. During that time, Fowlkes guided the Jackets to four consecutive top-five finishes at the indoor and outdoor ACC Championships.

Under Fowlkes' watch, Natasha Alleyne became the first national champion in program history. Alleyne won the 1992 indoor high jump with a then-school record mark of 6'2.50".

That same season, the Yellow Jackets tallied their highest indoor finish ever at a NCAA Championship meet, posting a seventh-place finish in Indianapolis, Ind. Tech finished in a tie for 29th place at the Outdoor NCAA Championships in Austin, Texas.



### Wendy Truvillion (1993-95)

Truvillion took over the reigns as head coach of the Tech program in 1993. During her stint, she tutored five All-Americans, 13 ACC champions and 14 All-ACC honorees.

Nelrae Pasha and Janeen Jones earned a total of five All-America honors and six ACC titles between them under Truvillion's direction.

### Alan Drosky (1995-present)

A two-time ACC Coach of the Year, Alan Drosky has brought the women's track program into the spotlight in his 11 seasons as head coach. The former Tech All-American and Hall of Fame inductee, took over the program in 1995.

On the national scene, Drosky guided the Jackets to four consecutive top-25 finishes at the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships. His athletes have earned 18 All-America honors during that span, including a record-tying seven at the 2005 NCAA Outdoor Championships.

At the conference level, Drosky has led the Jackets to 10 top-three finishes in the last nine years, including the program's first ACC title in 2002.

During his tenure, Tech athletes have earned three national titles, 59 All-American honors, 75 ACC titles and 146 All-ACC honors.

Natasha Alleyne became Tech's first national champion in the high jump at the 1992 Indoor NCAA National Championships. Chaunte Howard became the first Yellow Jacket to win three consecutive national titles in the high jump at the 2004 indoor and outdoor NCAA Championships and the 2005 indoor NCAA meet.

# GEORGE C. GRIFFIN TRACK

The George C. Griffin Track and Field Facility, already considered one of the top sites in the Southeast for outdoor collegiate track competition, was improved as part of Georgia Tech's preparation for the Centennial Olympic Games.

Griffin Track was renovated with a state-of-the-art Mondo surface, similar to those used at Olympic Stadium and at the sites of the World Championship, U.S. Track and Field Indoor Championships and NCAA Outdoor Championships.

The track was the workout track for the Olympic Village, which offered Tech the opportunity to renovate its facilities.

Fifteen Griffin Track records (eight women's and seven men's marks) were set at the 1996 Georgia Tech-Reebok Invitational, the first event held on the new surface.

The Georgia Tech track team's locker rooms were also renovated as part of the \$10 million re-creation of the Alexander Memorial Coliseum at McDonald's Center, which served as the boxing venue during the Games.

In addition to Griffin Track's state of the art surface and locker rooms, the facility is enhanced by a scenic location, which combines natural beauty with Atlanta's modern skyline. The eight-lane, ultramodern Griffin Track is located between Tech's Rose Bowl practice football fields and the



Bill Moore Tennis Center on Fowler Street.

Griffin Track was originally built in the summer of 1985 and remains one of the few tracks in the United States that meet international standards.

The facility is named after national Hall of Fame coach George C. Griffin, who guided both the Yellow Jacket track and cross country programs from 1921-25 and 1934-43 and remained the cross country coach until 1974.

The Tech track and field program experienced unprecedented success during the Griffin era, winning six Southeastern Athletic Association Championships and one Southeastern Conference Championship.

Griffin also guided the cross country team to new heights, winning 10 SEC titles, including six in a row from 1935-40.

Two of Griffin's athletes competed in the Olympic Games. Homer Welchel competed in the javelin in 1924, and Ed Hamm won a Gold medal and set a world record in the long jump in 1928.



The state of Georgia honored Dean George Griffin on May 16, 1964, with the following proclamation...

"His service to amateur athletics as a track and cross country coach at Georgia Tech, and as a guiding force behind the Georgia AAU track meets, has established him as one of the State's most important figures in the promotion of physical fitness among our youth.

"Because of his great and sincere love of people, his unfailing sense of humor, and his ability to deal with others, he has become the best-known and most-loved personality in the 76-year history of the Georgia Institute of Technology."

# MORRIS BRYAN STADIUM



Morris Bryan Stadium, which completes the George C. Griffin Track and Field Facility, provides the Rambling Wreck with the one of the finest total track and field complexes in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The facilities at Morris Bryan Stadium include a 1,500-seat grandstand along with judges stands, a press box, concession stands, storage areas and restrooms.

The grandstands bring fans close to the action and give them an excellent view of the track as well as the Atlanta skyline.

The area around the track is magnificent, as you can see the Atlanta skyscrapers and the Tech Tower.

The stadium's namesake, the late Morris Bryan, is the former president of the Jefferson Mills.

A 1941 graduate of Georgia Tech, Bryan competed for three years as a hurdler on legendary coach George Griffin's track teams.

Bryan was widely known as the "Father of the Georgia Olympics," an all-classification state high school track and field championship meet that has been held in Jefferson, Ga., since 1972.

"The family and company wanted to make this a first-class facility," said Tom Bryan. "We are highly honored to name the stadium in memory of my brother."

The stadium was officially dedicated when Tech hosted the ACC Outdoor Track and Field Championships for the first time in school history in April 1987.

A contribution from the Bryan family and the Jefferson Mills in large part funded the building of the stadium.

Former Director of Track Buddy Fowlkes also solicited donations from Tech track and field alumni. Donors have had their names etched on a plaque and were honored at the dedication ceremony.

## 1996 OLYMPIC GAMES

*Georgia Tech's role as the site for the Olympic Village in 1996, as well as venues for boxing and aquatics, provided a unique opportunity to showcase the Institute to the entire world.*

The centerpiece of Georgia Tech's Olympic efforts was the Olympic Village. The majority of the more than 10,000 Olympic athletes were housed on the Tech campus during the Games. In preparation, Tech's housing facilities underwent a \$170 million facelift that resulted in the construction of 4,700 new student beds.

Olympic competition was held on the Tech campus with boxing at Alexander Memorial Coliseum and aquatic events, including swimming, diving, water polo, synchronized swimming, and modern pentathlon, at the Georgia Tech Aquatic Center. These events featured nearly 1,500 athletes competing in 50 medal events.

Georgia Tech mechanical engineering associate professor Sam Shelton built the Olympic torches for the 1996 Games in Atlanta as well as the 2002 Winter Games in Salt Lake City, Utah.





# ALL-AROUND EXCELLENCE


Ashlee Kidd captured three of Georgia Tech's 11 individual ACC Championships and was named the ACC Indoor Track Most Valuable Performer for 2006

Cameron Tringale (above) earned low-medalist honors at the 2006 ACC Championships after being named the Conference Rookie of the Year.


Andrew Gardner (left) was one of two Yellow Jackets to earn Freshman All-America honors in 2005-06

Conveniently located on the third floor of the Edge Athletics Center, the Andrew Hearn, Sr. Academic Center houses staff and facilities to support the academic endeavors of Tech student-athletes. The academic support program is under the direction of Associate Director of Athletics Phyllis LaBaw.

# TECH TRADITION

***September 30, 1961 versus Rice. For the first time, the official Rambling Wreck car led the Georgia Tech football team onto Grant Field. It's happened at every home game since.***

The event did not establish a new tradition at Georgia Tech, but it cemented one. The vehicle, a restored 1930 Model A Ford Sport Coupe, was Tech's first official Rambling Wreck car.

Since that time, the Rambling Wreck car has joined a much older tradition—the Yellow Jacket—as an official school mascot.

The term Rambling Wreck was first applied to a 1914 Ford owned by Floyd Field, Dean of Men. In the first published reference to the car as the "Rambling Wreck" in 1927, the *Technique* student newspaper spoke out against Field when he considered trading the car, but he did it anyway.

The *Technique* maintained the tradition with a yearly collegiate auto race from Atlanta to Athens, known as the "Old Ford" race or "Flying Flivver" race, which began in 1929 but was discontinued when it became too dangerous. In its place is the familiar Rambling Wreck Parade, which is still held every year at Homecoming. The event challenges students to produce outlandish "mechanical monstrosities" capable of traversing a short course on campus.

Tech officials decided in the late 1950s that the school needed an official car that would be known forever as the Rambling Wreck. Dean of Students James Dull began a search for a pre-1940 vintage model, and finally found one—parked in front of his apartment building. The owner, Capt. Ted J. Johnson, a Delta Air Lines pilot, had just finished restoring the 1930 Ford Cabriolet Sport Coupe, which he intended to give to his son as a gift.

Johnson decided to let Tech have the car for \$1,000 in May, 1961. He later returned the purchase price in the form of a contribution to the Alexander-Tharpe Fund, fulfilling a desire to go on record as having given the Rambling Wreck to Georgia Tech.

## THE YELLOW JACKET

Conflicting accounts exist as to the origins and beginnings of the Yellow Jacket, but the nickname did not grow out of the familiar six-legged insect; rather, the insect mascot, known as "Buzz," grew out of the nickname. The first known reference to Tech students as "Yellowjackets" appeared in the *Atlanta Constitution* in 1905 and came into common usage at that time. The name, spelled as one word, was first used to describe supporters who attended Tech athletic events, dressed in yellow coats and jackets. The actual mascot was conceived at a later, undetermined date.

Other nicknames which have applied to Tech teams include the Engineers; the Tecks, the first known nickname which was phased out around 1910; the Blacksmiths, common between 1902 and 1904; and the Golden Tornado, thought to be created by sportswriters when John Heisman led Tech to its first national title in 1917.



## THE RAMBLIN' WRECK FIGHT SONG

The Georgia Tech fight song grew out of an old folk ballad, "The Sons of the Gamboliers."

Howard D. Cutter, a member of Tech's first graduating class (Mechanical Engineering, 1892), wrote in the November-December 1942 issue of the Georgia Tech Alumnus that the "Ramblin' Wreck" had its origins during the first two years after Tech opened in 1888, inspired when the entire student body traveled to Athens to see Tech's baseball team defeat Georgia.

By the early 1900s, "Ramblin' Wreck" was an established tradition. The earliest existing published version of the song appeared in the Blueprint, the Institute's yearbook, in 1908.

In 1910, Michael A. Greenblatt, Tech's first bandmaster, discovered the band playing "Ramblin' Wreck" to the tune of "Sons of the Gamboliers," and made his first arrangement of the song in the form of a handwritten manuscript.

When Frank Roman succeeded Greenblatt as bandmaster in 1911, he wrote a new adaptation of "Ramblin' Wreck," accompanied by many trumpet flourishes, that became nationally known. His is the version that continues to be popular today.

The fame of the song spread to such proportions that, in 1959, it was sung by Richard Nixon and Nikita Khrushchev at their historic face-to-face meeting in Moscow.

In 1984, the law firm of Newton, Hopkins & Ormsby investigated the copyright of "Ramblin' Wreck" and found that a number of people have had various versions of the song copyrighted. The original version of the song is in the public domain and can be played without payment of royalties.

*I'm a Ramblin' Wreck from Georgia Tech and a hell of an engineer,*

*A helluva, helluva, helluva, helluva, hell of an engineer,  
Like all the jolly good fellows, I drink my whiskey clear,  
I'm a Ramblin' Wreck from Georgia Tech and a hell of an engineer.*

*Oh, if I had a daughter, sir, I'd dress her in White and Gold,  
And put her on the campus, to cheer the brave and bold.  
But if I had a son, sir, I'll tell you what he'd do.  
He would yell, "To Hell with Georgia," like his daddy used to do.*

*Oh, I wish I had a barrel of rum and sugar three thousand pounds,  
A college bell to put it in and a clapper to stir it around.  
I'd drink to all good fellows who come from far and near.  
I'm a ramblin', gamblin', hell of an engineer.*

## WHITE & GOLD

In the fall of 1891, before Georgia Tech organized a football team of its own, a game was scheduled between Auburn and Georgia. A rivalry was already established in baseball between Tech and Georgia, so Tech students were invited to the game to cheer, of course, for Auburn.

The students appointed a committee to recommend colors to be worn and cheers to be used at the game. The committee suggested white and gold, and about 200 students attended the game wearing those colors.

In 1893, when Georgia Tech's football team played Georgia for the first time, a group of young women from the Lucy Cobb Institute for Girls attended the game to cheer for Tech, dressed in white and gold.

*Oh well it's up with the White and Gold  
Down with the Red and Black  
Georgia Tech is out for the victory  
We'll drop the battle axe on Georgia's head  
When we meet her, our team is sure to beat her  
Down on the old farm there will be no sound  
Till our bow-wows rip through the air  
When the battle is over, Georgia's team will be found  
With the Yellow Jackets swarming around.*



# TOTAL PERSON PROGRAM

*At Georgia Tech, the day the cheering stops will still be a time of celebration. An athlete's playing days will end, but the Total Person Program ensures that Yellow Jacket student-athletes will be prepared for the career and personal challenges ahead.*

Through this multifaceted program, the brainchild of retired Director of Athletics Dr. Homer Rice, Rambling Wreck student-athletes have the opportunity to learn the elements of success beyond the classroom or playing field. They gain skills that remain with them for a lifetime, preparing for the career and personal challenges ahead.

During his 17-year tenure from 1980-97, Rice rebuilt Georgia Tech's athletic fortunes with an emphasis not just in fund-raising and facilities but in equally important areas such as academic support and life skills.

Since Rice started the Total Person Program in 1980, it has developed into the most comprehensive student-athlete support system in the country. Rice's model has been adopted nationwide as the foundation for the NCAA's Life Skills Program.

Addressing virtually every area of a well-rounded educational experience, the Total Person Program, under the direction of Rob Skinner, focuses on the following components:

- Life Skills
- Career Planning and Placement
- Counseling and Wellness
- Leadership Development
- Honors
- Community Outreach
