O'Keefe Gymnasium, the home of the Yellow Jacket volleyball team since 1995, is one of the premier volleyball facilities in the Southeast. The site of 15 Georgia Tech matches in 2007, including the Regency Suites/Georgia Tech Classic, O'Keefe Gymnasium is known for its rowdy atmosphere, excellent sight lines and loud acoustics.

Over the years, O'Keefe Gym has served multiple purposes. Originally utilized as the gymnasium for O'Keefe High School in the 1950's, the gym was given to Georgia Tech in the 1960's and served as the location for many club sports for the Institute.

Since 1995, the gym has undergone various renovation projects, including a new floor, which was added following the 2003 season, and a new locker room, which was added prior to last season.

O'Keefe Gymnasium underwent nearly a one-million dollar renovation prior to the 2006 season, which included adding new home and visitors locker rooms to the facility, a coaches lounge, training room, players' lounge and student-athlete study area. The Yellow Jackets' new lounge and lockerroom area comes complete with leather couches, big screen TV's, work stations, and a pool table, and serves as a location for team meetings before and after matches and practices.





From the introductions to the pep band to post-match autographs, Georgia Tech is known for having the most loyal volleyball fans throughout the South.





YELLOW JACKETS

Seven Yellow Jackets have earned All-America distinction since the program first began in 1980, with all seven players having played for current Yellow Jacket head coach Bond Shymansky. The list is highlighted by first-team All-America Kele Eveland, the only female in school history to have her jersey retired, and three-time All-America Lynnette Master, one of just six females in school history to earn the honor on three occasions.

◆ Lynnette Master

2002 - Second Team
2003 - Third Team
2004 - Third Team

Lynnette Master is Georgia Tech's all-time leader in kills, notching 1,859 in her career on the Flats from 2001-04. The outside hitter became the first player in the history of the program to earn All-America honors when she was tabbed to the AVCA Second Team in 2002. By earning third-team All-America honors in 2003 and 2004, she became the only three-time All-American in the history of the program and one of just six females in school history to earn All-America honors on three occasions. Master's accolades include being tabbed the ACC Player of the Year in 2004, earning first-team All-ACC honors on three occasions (2002, 2003, 2004) and receiving second-team All-ACC accolades as a defensive specialist in 2001. In addition to holding the top mark in school history in kills, Master stands second in the career record books in kills per game (4.02), tied for second in service aces per game (0.42), third in service aces (193), digs (1,456) and digs per game (3.15) and fifth in hitting percentage (308). In 2002, she led the ACC and finished 17th in the nation in kills per game (5.20) and shattered the Yellow Jacket single-season mark by posting 629 kills during the season. Two years later, she recorded the second-best mark in a single-season with 585 kills.

◆ Kele Eveland

2003 - First Team

The Yellow Jackets' only first-team volleyball All-America is setter Kele Eveland, who played for the Yellow Jackets from 2000-03. The only female in the history of Georgia Tech Athletics to have their jersey retired, Eveland shattered Yellow Jacket career marks in assists and assists per game (13.38) in her four years on the Flats. Her 6,464 career assists from 2000-03 was the fourth-best mark in the history of NCAA volleyball and set a new record in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Eveland's accolades include being named the ACC Player of the Year in 2003 and the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2000 and earning first-team All-ACC honors in 2003 after being tabbed to the All-ACC second team in 2001 and 2002 and the All-ACC Freshman team in 2000. Eveland ended her career ranked sixth on the Yellow Jackets' career digs list (1,275), seventh in block assists (259) and eighth in total blocks (286). The Yellow Jacket standout broke the school record for assists in a season with 1,905 in 2002 and set a new school record for assists in a match when she tallied 93 against North Carolina on Nov. 11, 2001. Eveland was a third-team Academic All-America in 2003, the same year that she led the Yellow Jackets to the NCAA Elite Eight while leading the nation in assists per game (14.93), guiding an offense that finished the year ranked first in the country in kills per game (18.26) and assists per game (17.05).

◆ Alexandra Preiss

2003 - Honorable Mention

Alexandra Preiss became the first middle hitter in Georgia Tech history to be tabbed an All-American when she earned honorable mention honors in 2003. A two-time All-ACC honoree, Preiss helped the Yellow Jackets to the NCAA Sweet 16 in 2002 before guiding Tech to the NCAA Elite Eight in 2003, a season in which she led the team and finished seventh in the nation in hitting percentage. Her .417 hitting percentage in her senior season was the second-best mark in Atlantic Coast Conference history. Preiss concluded her career on the Flats holding the school record in hitting percentage (.364), standing fifth in total blocks (441) and blocks per game (1.09) and ninth with 1,251 career kills. Her .364 career hitting percentage currently stands third all-time in the ACC career record books. Preiss' accolades also include being named to the All-ACC first team in 2003, and the All-ACC second team in 2002 as well as becoming the only player in school history to record a perfect 1.000 hitting percentage with more than 10 attempts, when she was a perfect 11-for-11 with no errors against Virginia in a match on Oct. 4, 2003.

T ALL-AMERICAS

◆ Lauren Sauer

2003 - Honorable Mention

As one of four All-Americans for Georgia Tech in 2003, Lauren Sauer left her mark on the Flats as one of the top hitters in school history. She ranks fourth in the Yellow Jacket record books with 1,706 career kills and fifth with 3.60 kills per game. She also posted 368 total blocks and 269 block assists from 2001-04, with both marks still standing seventh in the Yellow Jacket career record books. Sauer was named to the All-ACC second team in 2003 and 2004 after becoming just the second volleyball player in Georgia Tech history to be named the ACC Rookie of the Year. In 2002, she posted the second-best mark in NCAA history (for matches with 15+ attempts) when she hit .944 (17-0-18) in a match against NC State on Oct. 1. Sauer was tabbed an honorable mention All-America in 2003 after finishing the season tied for the team lead with 541 kills while standing tied for second in the ACC with 4.23 kills per game.

◆ Jayme Gergen

2004 - Honorable Mention

Jayme Gergen, a middle hitter for the Yellow Jackets from 2001-04, was one of the top blockers to ever play for the Yellow Jackets, as her marks of 157 block assists and 169 total blocks in 2002 still stand as single-season records today. Gergen earned honorable mention All-America honors following a successful senior season in which she earned first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors and finished first in the ACC and 11th in the nation with a .393 hitting percentage, which is the second-best single-season mark in Georgia Tech history. Gergen also led the squad and ranked seventh in the ACC with 1.30 blocks per game in 2004. The dynamic player finished her career ranked second on Georgia Tech's career hitting percentage list (.353), fifth in total blocks (473) and block assists (426), and fourth with 1.18 blocks per game in her career.

◆ Lindsey Laband

2004 - Honorable Mention

2005 - Honorable Mention

Lindsey Laband became just the second player in Georgia Tech volleyball history to earn back-to-back All-America honors when she was tabbed honorable mention All-America in both 2004 and 2005. A setter that finished her career with 3,130 assists, which stands fourth in school history, and 12.93 assists per game, which ranks third in the Yellow Jacket career record books, Laband led the nation in assists per game (15.40) in 2004 while guiding an offense that finished the year leading the country with 18.64 kills per game and 17.34 assists per game. The team also finished the year ranked fifth in the nation with a .300 hitting percentage. Laband was twice named to the All-Atlantic Coast Conference second team during her career and was an all-District III region performer in both 2004 and 2005.

◆ Ulrike Stegemann

2006 - Honorable Mention

Ulrike Stegemann, the only current Yellow Jacket to have received All-America honors, was tabbed to the honorable mention team in 2006 after helping the Yellow Jackets to a 20-12 record during the season. After the team began conference play by dropping their first six matches, Stegemann was instrumental in the turnaround of the Yellow Jackets' season, helping Georgia Tech to a nine-match winning streak late in the year. The right side hitter finished second on the team with a .311 hitting percentage during the season and finished with 283 kills and 1.89 digs per game. Stegemann earned first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors in 2006 after being tabbed to the second team in 2005 and the ACC All-Freshman team in 2004.

◆ Bond Shymansky on the 2007 Yellow Jackets

Prior to the start of fall practice, Bond Shymansky answered a few questions regarding the 2007 team, which is his sixth since being tabbed the head coach in 2002. Here's what the Yellow Jacket head coach had to say:

As you prepare for the beginning of the 2007 season, what is the biggest difference from this time last year to now?

"There is still a lot of excitement building around our team, and I know that they are anxious to get out there and see what they can do. I think the biggest difference is the overall maturity and the stronger mindset for accomplishing something. Some people would call that seniority. We do have a lot of returning starters this year, so we've created more seniority within our team, but I just see a general maturity among our players for understanding what the workload is, what the output should be, and what the effort level should be."

On the Right Side

Returning for her senior year is one of the nation's top rightside hitters in Ulrike Stegemann. How much will this team rely upon her to lead them again in 2007?

"There were times last year when she carried us, but as things balanced out we began to win more. I think that was an important lesson for our whole team to learn - that we can't rely upon one player alone. Ulli has made remarkable improvements in her backrow skills, and that is going to be very important in helping us remain consistent offensively. Obviously she is a go-to hitter for us, so teams are still going to have to find a way to stop her."


Brittany Roderick converted from middle hitter to the right side towards the end of last season and seems to have really embraced that position. How has she improved since that conversion and what can she bring to the court this season?

"Rick has the fortune of learning by watching the best rightside hitter in the conference. She's improved a lot in terms of her footwork, hitting ability and dimensional hitting, and will definitely see court time this season. We like the idea of having not one, but two Ulli's to go to. Rick will give us that added dimension of a rightside attack in three-hitter phases at all times."

"The biggest thing for her is getting more reps, and the trip to Europe really helped her get exposure to playing more on the right side. She made great improvements this spring, and we're expecting her to contribute in a big way this fall."

In the Middle

Nikki Kaminskas, Callie Miller and Erin Birmingham, your three middle hitters, really seemed to step up their offense towards the end of last season. What challenge have you given them headed into 2007?


"We were very aggressive in working with the middles during the spring and emphasized to them the importance of focusing on technical components of their attacking that would help them be more effective. The work they put in during the spring drills really helped them zero in on a day-to-day basis and we saw big improvements in all three players. We know that production from our middles is going to be a crucial part of our offense in general, and we are counting on that this fall."

"Nikki solidified her role as a vocal and emotional leader on the team during the course of last season. She really started hitting the ball hard during the spring, and good things happen when you hit the ball hard. Watching her develop in strength and her determination makes her a more formidable attacker. The final thing about Nikki is that her blocking ability is superior. She has a good vision for it, which is why it remains her strongest attribute."



Junior Middle Hitter Callie Miller

"Callie is a go-to terminator for our team. She is a player that we feel very comfortable setting the ball with when we most desperately need the point. She's fast and strong, she jumps high, and she's done a lot of great things as an attacker. She has been working extremely hard to become a strong blocker, and we look at Callie as a definite All-ACC level performer."

"Erin's strongest attribute is her speed. She developed a lot more confidence this spring as far as what she can do with that speed as a weapon. She also has great tenacity and spirit on the court, and her offensive diversity is going to make her a valuable part of the team this fall."

On the Left Side

The depth of this team is at the outside hitter position. How has the depth at this spot challenged each of the four players to ramp up their games over the last year?

"It is interesting because all four players do something a little different from each other. We don't have two that are alike. That's good in that they each have a different value to the team, but it's also a challenge because it propels each of them to get better at different areas and aspects of the game."

"Lindsey Gray is our best ball-control player. She has strong defensive skills and passing ability and is an excellent server. She really understands how to attack the ball with intelligence."

"Talisa Kellogg can just get up and go. She has the ability to hit over the block and is a very strong blocker herself, with a powerful jump."

"Laura DeMichelis has catlike reflexes. We watched her come back from rehabbing her knee injury this summer, and her defensive ability and quickness is unlike any other leftside that we have. Her ability to hit smart, to chisel, or hit holes in, the block, and hit off the block is better than any other leftside hitter that we have."

"Chrissy DeMichelis, our youngest leftside hitter, just has raw power and jumping ability. She has a beautiful, high arm swing and a lot of power behind the ball. She can hit the hard angle as well as hard line, and she's clearly our best leftside blocker."

"So each of them has a little bit different to offer, and we're counting on that diversity in player skills to help us in different situations when we need it this fall."

Was there any way that Laura DeMichelis benefitted from having to take last year off after her knee injury?

"Nobody benefits from having knee surgery, but the silver lining to that is her ability to better understand the game. She gained perspective on the game by having to watch from the sidelines. She knows that she can no longer just jump over the opponent, but she has learned how to hit smart shots and play a smarter game. She needed that anyway, but now she has been forced to do that and has somewhat taken it as her mission."

"The biggest advantage that the injury given her is her overall willpower. She knows that she's going to have to work very hard to get back into that lineup, but we are definitely counting on her. She is a big part of our future with Georgia Tech volleyball."

What has it been like, having a pair of sisters on the team?

"They are great. They do a great job of communicating with each other and supporting each other, but they've also really opened up to the team in a good way. They were roommates last year for Chrissy's first year here, but they came in this year and said that they wanted to branch out and live their own lives. I certainly respect that. They are both easy people, they are both really fun, outgoing and very nice, and they are great to have on the team."

With the graduation of Abby Showers, you lost not only your libero but also your team captain. Who are you looking to for that role of directing the team on-court this season?

"Towards the latter part of last season, Lindsey Gray stepped forward as a vocal leader and an intensity leader, and we're going to count on her to do that again this fall."

"I also see (Michelle) Kandell driving our backrow defense with her passing, so she's holding to a high standard back there. She will be able to anchor our passing, as will as our youngest player, Jordan McCullers. Jordan did a great job this spring, coming in and training. She has a great attitude and a nose for the ball defensively and is absolutely fearless. That's a good combination for a backrow player."

"I suspect that Talisa Kellogg will continue to be a great vocal leader on the court with a positive attitude. Those are character traits that we not only rely on, but that their teammates are drawn to, so they are extremely valuable to us."

On the Back Row

Michelle Kandell has spent two seasons roaming the back row for the team. Are you expecting her to step into that libero position vacated by Abby Showers?

"Right now it looks that way. We are anticipating that she'll play libero and that Jordan McCullers will get some time at that spot as well. We like the fact that there is some competition back there for that position. We expect for them to continue to push each other to be stronger passers and to really push the whole team to have a defensive and digging mindset - that every ball that comes over the net will be dug."

Stephanie Robbins is perhaps the hardest workers and toughest competitors that you have on this squad. What will her role be in 2007?

"Steph has such a strong ethic and such great character. She's played at rightside as a defensive specialist and will continue to do that this fall. She knows the position really well and functions very well there."

"We are also counting on Steph to be a leader for this team, in practice and in match situations."

The Setters

Allie stepped into a tough position last year, following a pair of All-Americans in Kele Eveland and Lindsey Laband. Talk about her performance in her first year as a starter and what she has improved upon in the offseason?

"Allie had a bit of an up-and-down year in her first campaign, but she learned a lot, not only about the game, but also about herself and her teammates. She clearly improved as the season progressed, and you could see her confidence improve and understanding for what we were trying to do develop over the season."

The Schedule

The pre-conference schedule consists of 2006 NCAA teams in all three tournaments. What was your thought process when constructing the schedule this season?

"With this many returning starters, we felt like we should ramp up our pre-conference schedule again. This is similar to a schedule that we had back in 2003 (when then Yellow Jackets advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight), and we feel like we are ready to go to the highest level we need to play against the best caliber teams that we can find. We are really excited about the upcoming schedule and feel like it will be a great test for us. If our team has the mental and emotional ability to manage themselves, win or lose, we know that we will be in a good position to make a strong run in the ACC and in the postseason NCAA Tournament."

Quite a few ACC teams return the bulk of their lineups from the 2006 season. How good will this league be in 2007?

"This is going to be a great year for the Atlantic Coast Conference. We know that the top five or six teams our going out and competing against some national-caliber opponents before starting conference play. During the course of the season, I think there will be some surprises out there, especially with a 22-match schedule, which is an absolute marathon. There will be a lot of things that shift and change, but what we know for sure is that we will be at the top of that pile and that we are going to push forward to stay at the top. We believe that we have all of the components. We have a great preparation schedule for our team to come out and compete for the ACC title."

With the highest winning percentage among current Atlantic Coast Conference coaches as well as an average of 26 wins per season in his five years at the helm of the program, Bond Shymansky begins his sixth season as the head coach of the Yellow Jackets, and eighth on the Flats after arriving as an assistant coach prior to the 2000 season. His .747 winning percentage stands 13th in the nation among active head volleyball coaches and is second all-time in ACC history.

Shymansky's squads have won at least 20 matches in four of his five years as the head coach, and in five seasons since his arrival in Atlanta. Since being tabbed the sixth head coach in the history of Georgia Tech volleyball, he has guided the Yellow Jackets to three NCAA Tournament appearances, including NCAA Elite Eight and NCAA Sweet 16 showings in 2003 and 2004, an ACC Tournament championship and two ACC regular season championships. The 2004 AVCA East Region and ACC Coach of the Year has coached seven players that have earned AVCA All-America accolades on 10 occasions, nine players that have earned All-ACC nods on 17 occasions, two ACC Players of the Year and four All-ACC Freshman selections.

While his success on the court has been well-documented, perhaps more impressive is his work on the recruiting trail, where he has lured no fewer than 10 *Volleyball Magazine* "Fab 50" recruits since arriving in Atlanta. The 2007 season will be no different, as the Yellow Jacket freshman class of Mary Ashley Tippins and Jordan McCullers was rated Highest Honorable Mention as one of the top-45 recruiting classes in the nation, according to Prepvolleyball.com. Of the 12 returnees to the 2007 team, six have been named "Fab 50" recruits in the past, including sophomores Erin Birmingham, Chrissy DeMichelis and Laura DeMichelis, and juniors Talisa Kellogg, Allie Niekamp and Callie Miller. Four of his first six recruiting classes have been ranked in the top 25 nationally, led by the 2005 class, which featured Laura DeMichelis, Kellogg, Niekamp and Miller and was ranked No. 4 by *Volleyball Magazine* and eighth in the nation by Prepvolleyball.com, marking the highest class ranking in ACC history.

Following a successful conclusion to the 2006 season, Shymansky's 2007 squad is primed for another great year on the Flats. After winning eight of their first 10 matches, the Yellow Jackets dropped their first six Atlantic Coast Conference matches in 2006 before breaking into the win column with a 3-0 victory over North Carolina at home in mid-October. Tech later rattled off a nine-match winning streak, beginning with a thrilling 3-2 victory over 25th-ranked Duke at O'Keefe Gym. That win marked the fifth-consecutive year that the Yellow Jackets had posted a victory over a top-25 opponent, and it was the only conference loss for the Blue Devils in 2006.

Georgia Tech ended the season with a 20-12 overall record and a fifth-place finish in conference play. The Jackets had a player named to the All-America team for the fifth-consecutive year, as first-team All-ACC standout Ulrike Stegemann was tabbed AVCA Honorable Mention All-America for the first time in her career. Joining Stegemann on the all-conference team was outside hitter Lindsey Gray, who earned second-team honors for the first time in her career.

In his first season at the helm of the program, Shymansky guided Georgia Tech to a 33-6 record and the 2002 ACC Championship. The team advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament and concluded the season ranked

17th in the final AVCA/USA Today Coaches Poll, marking the first time in seven years that the Yellow Jacket volleyball team had been ranked in the final poll. Georgia Tech had four players named to the all-conference team while Lynnette Master became the first player in the program's history to be tabbed an AVCA All-American.

The following year, Shymansky's squad opened the season with a school-record 23 consecutive wins and went on to earn a record-breaking 34 match victories. The team advanced to the Elite Eight of the 2003 NCAA Tournament before falling to No. 2 Hawai'i, marking the first time in conference history that an ACC school competed for the right to play in the Final Four. The Yellow Jackets opened the season ranked 12th in the nation and moved as high as No. 4 in the polls, marking the highest ranking in ACC history. Tech finished the season ranked eighth in the nation, which was the highest final ranking for a team in conference history while also marking the first time that the Yellow Jackets

had been ranked in every poll throughout the season. Tech defeated four nationally-ranked opponents during the year while advancing to the ACC Championship match for the second-consecutive season.

The squad finished the season leading the nation in assists (17.05) and kills (18.26) per game and ranking fifth in hitting percentage (.331), while setter Kele Eveland led the nation with 14.93 assists

per game. Four members of the 2003 squad earned AVCA All-America accolades, including Eveland, who became the first player in ACC volleyball history to earn first-team All-America honors. Joining Eveland on the All-America team was second-team honorable Master, while Alexandra Preiss and Lauren Sauer both earned honorable mention accolades.

Shymansky's 2004 team earned a preseason ranking of No. 12 in the nation, but had a tough beginning to the season, opening 2-5 with losses to nationally-ranked USC, Colorado State, Wisconsin and Ohio State. Following the loss to the Buckeyes, the Yellow Jackets reeled off 21 straight victories, which included 16 consecutive ACC wins to mark the first time in school history that a team had gone undefeated in conference play and the first time since 1996 that it had been accomplished by an ACC school. Georgia Tech earned a bid to the NCAA Tournament for the sixth straight year and upset 13th-seeded Santa Barbara to advance to the Sweet 16 for the second-consecutive year before falling to No. 4 Minnesota in an exciting five-game match to conclude the season with a 27-7 record.

Three members of the team earned AVCA All-America honors, including Master, who finished her career as the most decorated volleyball player in school history, earning All-America honors on an ACC-record three occasions. Shymansky's team once again led the nation in assists (17.34) and kills (18.64) per game and concluded the season ranked seventh with a .300 hitting percentage. Lindsey Laband, Tech's honorable mention All-America setter, also led the nation with 15.40 assists per game. For his efforts, Shymansky was tabbed the 2004 AVCA East Region and the ACC Coach of the Year.

Despite losing five members of the 2004 NCAA Sweet 16 team to graduation, the 2005 Yellow Jackets finished fourth in conference play with a 12-10 ACC record and closed out the season with a 16-15 overall mark. Tech started as many as five freshmen during the year and played just three upperclassmen for the majority of the season, but still had four players earn conference accolades at the season's end, as

both Laband and Stegemann were named to the All-ACC second team and Kellogg and Miller garnered ACC All-Freshman honors. Laband became just the second player in the history of the program to earn repeat AVCA All-America honors, as she was named to the honorable mention team for the second-consecutive season.

Shymansky, who initially joined the Georgia Tech coaching staff as an assistant coach under Shelton Collier in February, 2000, served as the team's defensive and blocking coordinator in his first two seasons on the Flats. He was also responsible for scouting opponents, team travel and summer camps and assisted in the training of Maja Pachale, the 2001 ACC Player of the Year, Sauer, the 2001 ACC Rookie of the Year, and Eveland, the 2003 ACC Player of the Year and 2000 ACC Rookie of the Year. Following his arrival, the Yellow Jackets experienced two of their finest seasons in history, as the 2000 team finished 25-8 while earning the ACC regular season championship before advancing to their first NCAA Tournament appearance in four years, and the 2001 squad posted a 19-8 record with another NCAA Tournament bid.

Prior to his arrival at Georgia Tech, Shymansky spent two seasons on the coaching staff at Iowa State, including a four-month stint as the interim head coach in 1999.

In addition to his collegiate coaching experience, Shymansky has coached in both the high school and club ranks. He served as the head coach at Iowa City High School from 1996-97, guiding his squad to the state semifinals in his second season.

A staple on the O'Keefe sidelines for the last five years, Ben Bodipo-Memba is in his sixth season as an assistant under Bond Shymansky and his first as the associate head coach of the Georgia Tech volleyball team. A favorite among players and coaches alike, Bodipo-Memba brings a high-energy, upbeat mentality to the courts, which meshes well with Shymansky's up-tempo style of volleyball.

Since his arrival, the Yellow Jackets have made three NCAA appearances and captured the 2002 Atlantic Coast Conference Championship as well as the 2003 and 2004 ACC regular season titles.

After directing the offense and training the Yellow Jacket middle blockers for his first five seasons on the Flats, Bodipo-Memba begins his first year coordinating the Yellow Jackets' defensive efforts and brings a wealth of experience to the role, having been a starting middle blocker for various U.S. National and Olympic Festival Teams in the past.

Under his guidance, two former Yellow Jacket middle blockers have earned honorable mention All-America honors while four have been named All-ACC.

In his first season in Atlanta, Georgia Tech was the only school in the ACC to have two middle blockers ranked in the top-10 in both blocks per game and hitting percentage, while two of his 2003 middle blockers concluded the season ranked in the top-25 in the nation, and first and second in the conference, in hitting percentage. That same year, the Yellow Jackets finished third in the ACC and 46th in the nation with 2.69 blocks per game while honorable mention All-American Alexandra Preiss concluded the year ranked seventh in the nation with Jayme Gergen checking in at 25th in hitting percentage. Bodipo-Memba again directed one of the nation's top hitters in 2004, as Gergen garnered honorable mention All-America honors by finishing 12th in the nation in hitting percentage.

Since his arrival, the Yellow Jacket offense has led the nation in assists per game and kills per game on two occasions and has finished in the top-10 in hitting percentage twice. He has also coached two setters that led the nation in assists per game - first team All-American Kele Eveland in 2003 and honorable mention All-American Lindsey Laband in 2004.

After playing collegiately at San Diego State and Grossmont College in the late 1980's, Bodipo-Memba started at middle blocker for the U.S. Olympic Festival Silver Medal team in 1990 and spent three years (1993-95) as a member of the USA National Team. He has also participated in the U.S. Open Championships in 1993, 1996,


1998, and from 2000-06 and played a year of professional volleyball in Finland as a member of Raison Loimu in 1996.

While still competing on the national level, Bodipo-Memba began his coaching career in the San Diego area, spending eight years at the high school level. In his last four years on the West Coast (1994-97), Bodipo-Memba also coached with the San Diego Volleyball Club, guiding the program's top 17-and-under and 14-and-under teams. His final prep assignment came at Francis Parker High School, serving as the head coach for the junior varsity team while assisting with the varsity squad that won a C.I.F. Championship.

Bodipo-Memba earned his first collegiate coaching position in 1997 at Western Carolina, where he remained until receiving the call from Shymansky to head to Atlanta.

After a 10-year hiatus from the U.S. National Team, Bodipo-Memba returned to the organization in 2005 as a coach when he was asked to assist U.S. Women's National Team head coach Jenny "Lang" Ping for the Pan American Cup. Following the team's training in Colorado Springs, Colo., over the summer, the Novato, Calif. native accompanied the team to the Dominican Republic, helping the squad qualify for the 2006 World Grand Prix.

Bodipo-Memba has spent five years representing the ACC on the AVCA Assistant Coaches Committee and is also a member of the AVCA Education and Publication Committee, representing all assistant volleyball coaches. He continues to play in the annual U.S. Open Adult Championships, where he helped his 2005 squad to the bronze medal. An avid musician, Bodipo-Memba enjoys playing the guitar in his spare time.

Beginning her first season as an assistant coach under Bond Shymansky is Jennifer Carey, a former standout setter at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa. Carey will serve as the Yellow Jackets' offensive coordinator while also assisting in recruiting and operations for the program.

Carey's primary work will be with Allie Niekamp, the starting setter for the Yellow Jackets in 2006, and incoming freshman Mary Ashley Tippins, who was tabbed an AVCA High School All-American setter in 2006. The two players are expected to flourish under Carey, who was a three-time All-Western Athletic Conference setter from 1999-2002.

Carey arrived at Georgia Tech by way of Texas A&M, where she was the director of volleyball operations from 2005-06. As a member of the Aggie volleyball staff, Carey was responsible for planning team travel and maintaining the equipment budget while serving as the liaison between the program and the academic, financial aid and business offices.

During her tenure at Texas A&M, Carey also served as the tournament director for the 2005 NCAA College Station Regional as well as all home tournaments for the Aggies, and occasionally joined the radio broadcasts for Aggie volleyball matches.

In addition to her work at Texas A&M, Carey was the head coach of the Brazos Valley Volleyball Club in College Station from 2005-06 and led the squad to a 27-2 record over the two-year period. Prior to moving to College Station, she also served as the head coach for the Saddleback Valley Volleyball Club in Lake Forest, Calif., where she guided the team to a 32-3 record from 2004-05.


Carey began school at Hawai'i in 1999 and became the Rainbow Wahine's starting setter as a freshman, earning All-Western Athletic Conference second-team honors while leading the team to a 29-2 record, an NCAA Regional Semifinal appearance and a No. 8 final ranking. She went on to direct the Rainbow Wahine to two NCAA semifinal appearances, two No. 3 final rankings and a 123-12 record in her four-year career. She was a three-time member of the All-WAC second team and concluded her career ranked fourth in the Rainbow Wahine's record books with 3,540 assists in her four years in Honolulu.

Georgia Tech Administration



Dr. G. Wayne Clough
Institute President

The chief engineer of Georgia Tech's effort to leverage the opportunities inherent in economic, cultural, social, and technological transitions, G. Wayne Clough is the Institute's tenth president and the first alumnus to serve as president.

His leadership continues to make undergraduate education more dynamic. After implementing a required computer initiative for all students, he oversaw the revision of the curriculum to include Web-based enhancements. The next step was a broad initiative to engage students more fully with faculty in the classroom and research lab, expand study abroad programs, and create more student leadership opportunities. The positive impact is reflected in higher quality students and higher retention rates.

Sponsored research has also increased every year since Clough became president, doubling over the past decade to \$441 million last year, as Tech moves into exciting interdisciplinary fields like bioengineering, sustainable technology, and nanoscience.

Clough's skills as a civil engineer are evident as the campus is reshaped to meet the needs of Tech's world-class programs and students. He has overseen an ambitious \$1 billion building program, with the construction of more than a dozen academic and research buildings.

His emphasis on creating well-rounded college graduates was recently recognized by best-selling author Thomas Friedman. In the second edition of his 2005 book *The World Is Flat*, Friedman praises Clough's efforts as "the right stuff," holding up Clough's balance of left-brain research activities with right-brain creative endeavors as a model for other college educators.

Outside of the Tech campus, Clough is also recognized as a leader. He gives Georgia Tech a voice in Washington, D.C., as the only person to serve on both the National Science Board and the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology (PCAST). He is also vice chairman of the U.S. Council on Competitiveness and chaired the National Academy of Engineering's Engineer of 2020 initiative.

In January 2006, Clough was asked to lend his expertise to the city of New Orleans, which was devastated by Hurricane Katrina in 2005. Named chair of the National Academies/National Research Council Committee on New Orleans Regional Hurricane Protection Projects, Clough leads the sixteen-member committee in reviewing the designs and plans for rebuilding the flood protection systems around New Orleans and overseeing studies into why levee failures occurred in the city. Under Clough's leadership, Georgia Tech also helped evacuees and students displaced by the hurricane, allowing campus buildings to be used as shelter spaces, among other emergency-response initiatives. Hundreds of Tech students continue to volunteer in New Orleans during breaks in the academic year.

A native of Douglas, Georgia, Clough received his bachelor's and master's degrees in civil engineering from Georgia Tech in 1964 and 1965. He earned a PhD in civil engineering from the University of California-Berkeley in 1969.

Clough was provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University of Washington in Seattle when he answered the call to return to his alma mater as president in September of 1994. Prior to that, he had spent a decade at Virginia Tech as head of the Department of Civil Engineering, then as dean of the College of Engineering. He also served on the faculties of Duke and Stanford universities.

A specialist in geotechnical and earthquake engineering, he is the author of more than 130 papers and reports, six book chapters, and several widely used geotechnical computer codes. He is presently a consultant to the San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit System for ongoing major seismic retrofitting and serves on the International Advisory Board of King Fahd University of Petroleum & Minerals. His other interests include technology and higher education policy, economic development, diversity in higher education, and technology in a global setting.

Closer to home, he serves on the Board of Advisors for Noro-Moseley Partners, the Southeast's largest venture capital fund, and on the Board of Directors of TSYS of Columbus, Georgia. He is a member of the executive committee of the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce and a trustee of the Georgia Research Alliance. Georgia Trend magazine has regularly included Clough on its list of the 100 most influential Georgians.

Among his many national awards for teaching and research, Clough holds eight from the American Society of Civil Engineers and is one of a select few to have twice been awarded the Norman Medal, civil engineering's oldest honor. In 2001, he received the National Engineering Award from the American Association of Engineering Societies, and in 2004 the American Society of Civil Engineers' Outstanding Projects and Leaders (OPAL) lifetime award for his contributions to education. He has been a member of the National Academy of Engineering since 1990.

G. Wayne and Anne Robinson Clough have been married for more than forty years and have two grown children and one grandchild.



Dan Radakovich
Director of Athletics

Now entering his second year as Georgia Tech's Director of Athletics, Dan Radakovich has brought a new vision for excellence to the Yellow Jackets' storied athletics tradition.

His first year at Tech has seen many successes by the Yellow Jackets' teams. Tech's women's tennis team captured the Institute's first-ever NCAA championship in 2007 and its third straight Atlantic Coast Conference title. The football team won the ACC Coastal Division and went to its 10th straight bowl game, the men's basketball team earned its third NCAA Tournament bid in the last four years, the women's basketball team posted its finest season ever with 21 wins and a berth in the NCAA Tournament, and the golf team won a share of the ACC title for the second straight year.

Outside the competition venues, many projects are underway, including an overhaul of the annual giving and donation structure for Tech athletics, anchored by the new TECH Fund, which establishes minimum giving levels tied to season tickets in various seating areas of Bobby Dodd Stadium and Alexander Memorial Coliseum. Also in the planning stages are a new stadium for Tech's softball team, which will be located next to the O'Keefe building and open in 2009, as well as a transformation of Tech's former football locker room on the ground floor of the Edge Athletics Center into a new Technology Center facility to benefit academic support services for Yellow Jacket student-athletes.

Named Georgia Tech's Director of Athletics on February 22, 2006, Radakovich possesses nearly two decades of experience in collegiate athletics management positions. He came to Georgia Tech after five years as senior associate athletics director at Louisiana State (2001-06), and he previously served as the athletics director at American University in Washington, D.C., in 2000-01. That followed stints as associate athletics director at South Carolina (1994-2000) and Long Beach State (1989-94) as well as two years as the athletics business manager at Miami (1983-85).

Just the seventh Director of Athletics in Tech history, Radakovich was named by Institute President Dr. Wayne Clough to succeed Dave Braine, who retired after nearly nine years in the post. Radakovich also follows in the footsteps of storied names such as John Heisman, Bobby Dodd and Homer Rice.

"Dan Radakovich brings a unique combination of enthusiasm for sports, concern for student athletes, experience in athletic administration, business experience and communication skills that are needed in today's complex world of intercollegiate athletics," said Dr. Clough.

In his position at LSU, Radakovich was responsible for the day-to-day operation of an athletics program with an annual budget of more than \$50 million, encompassing 20 sports and more than 450 student-athletes. He directly supervised LSU's men's basketball and baseball programs.

Early in his tenure, Radakovich was instrumental in developing LSU's football ticket donation program which resulted in more than \$9 million in new annual revenue. He also participated with the Tiger Athletic Foundation in the most ambitious capital improvement initiative in school history, including a \$90 million renovation of the Tigers' historic football stadium.

LSU athletics reached unparalleled heights during his tenure, highlighted by the 2003 national championship in football and the basketball team's berth in the 2006 NCAA Final Four, as well as national titles in men's and women's track and field and top five national rankings in baseball, women's basketball, softball and gymnastics.

As associate athletics director at South Carolina, Radakovich directed financial operations for a \$30 million athletics budget.

At Long Beach State, where he served as senior associate athletics director from 1989-94, Radakovich managed a \$5 million budget and supervised the men's basketball and baseball programs.

Radakovich began his career in athletics administration as the athletics business manager at Miami from 1983-85. He then worked in the private sector for four years before moving to Long Beach State in 1989.

A graduate of Center High School near Aliquippa, Pa., and a member of its Alumni Hall of Fame, Radakovich, 49, became a football letterwinner and student coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, where he graduated in 1980 with a bachelor of science degree in finance. He added a master's degree in business administration from Miami in 1982. He also completed the Sports Management Institute's executive education program in 1992.

He is married to the former Marcie McDonald, and the couple has two children, Christian, 17, and Grant, 13.

In her seven seasons as the head coach, Wenzel led the Saints to five consecutive Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference titles (2001-05) before relinquishing her coaching duties following the 2005 campaign when she was promoted to associate director of athletics.

Wenzel spent three years (1994-97) as an assistant women's basketball coach at Canisius College in Buffalo, NY, and also served an internship with the National Invitation Tournament.

A basketball letterwinner at Marquette, Wenzel earned her bachelor of science degree in business administration in 1991. She added a Master's degree in sport administration from Canisius in 2000.





STEALING THE "T"

For many years, one of the most popular pranks by students was the stealing of the "T" from the top of Tech Tower.

GEORGE P. BURDELL

In 1927, a mythical student named George P. Burdell first appeared on class rosters, registration forms and grade reports, and he has since become one of Tech's most notable students. Burdell was the creation of Ed Smith, who actually turned in separate exams for him, convincing professors that Burdell was a student in good standing. Burdell received a bachelor's and later a master's degree from Georgia Tech. Since Smith's graduation, students have kept George P. Burdell alive at Tech, including the Georgia Tech band, who has him paged at every road football game during the season.

THE YELLOW JACKET

Conflicting accounts exist as to the origins and beginnings of the Yellow Jacket, but the nickname did not grow out of the familiar six-legged insect; rather, the insect mascot, known as "Buzz," grew out of the nickname. The first known reference to Tech students as "Yellowjackets" appeared in the Atlanta Constitution in 1905 and came into common usage at that time. The name, spelled as one word, was first used to describe supporters who attended Tech athletic events, dressed in yellow coats and jackets. The actual mascot was conceived at a later, undetermined date.

THE RAMBLING WRECK

On September 30, 1961 in the football home opener against Rice University, the official Rambling Wreck car was unveiled to 43,501 fans at Grant Field, leading Georgia Tech onto the field. The event did not establish a new tradition, but cemented one, as it has led the team onto the field in every home game since.

2006 Season Review

Make That 16-Straight

With a late-season resurgence, the Yellow Jackets finished with a winning record for the 16th-consecutive season, ending the year at 20-12. The 16-straight winning seasons is a record for the Yellow Jacket volleyball program, and dates back to 1990, when the team concluded the year with an 8-30 mark.

Knocking Off the Nation's Best

Perhaps the most impressive win of the season was the Yellow Jackets' 3-2 thriller over 25th-ranked Duke on Oct. 27 at O'Keefe Gymnasium. With the victory, Georgia Tech has posted at least one victory over a ranked opponent in each of head coach Bond Shymansky's five years on the Flats.

Duke was the only ranked team that the Yellow Jackets faced in 2006, and the team is now 11-10 against ranked foes under Shymansky.

Jackets' Win Over Duke Worth Thousands

The Yellow Jackets' match against the Duke Blue Devils in late October was about more than just a victory over a ranked opponent - The Georgia Tech volleyball team partnered with the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation and corporate sponsor Mizuno in an effort to raise awareness and funds to help fight the cause of breast cancer.

Georgia Tech chose the Oct. 27 match against Duke to "Dig for the Cure," accepting donations and pledges for every dig the Yellow Jackets recorded to raise money for breast cancer research.


That evening, the Yellow Jackets posted a blistering 80 digs in the inspired, five-set victory (23-30, 30-27, 15-30, 30-28, 24-22) against the Blue Devils, and, along with a raffle of golf clubs donated by Mizuno, helped to raise more than \$6,000 in its first year of participating in the event.

Stayin' Alive in Five

Georgia Tech played 10 five-set matches during the season and posted victories in seven of the 10 matches. Eight of the Yellow Jackets' 10 five-set matches came against Atlantic Coast Conference opponents, with the Yellow Jackets winning the last five five-setters on the season.

A Hot Finish

Despite opening the season with an 8-2 record in non-conference matches, the Yellow Jackets struggled at the beginning of Atlantic Coast Conference play, dropping their first six matches. Tech rallied in mid-October though, posting a pair of 3-0 wins over North Carolina and NC State at home for their first conference victories and weekend sweep of the year. After falling in two of their next three matches, the Jackets went on a nine-match winning streak, beginning with the 3-2 win over Duke Oct. 27.

Tech finished the season by winning nine of its last 11 matches to finish the season with a 20-12 overall record and a 12-10 mark in conference matches.

Ulrike Stegemann Named AVCA All-American

Ulrike Stegemann became the seventh different Yellow Jacket to earn AVCA All-America honors when she was named to the honorable mention team following her ultra-successful junior season.

The right side hitter averaged 2.83 kills and 1.89 digs per game while hitting .311 on the season. Her .291 career hitting percentage is tied for ninth in the Georgia Tech record books. She also posted 22 service aces and 69 assists on the season while playing in 125 of the Yellow Jackets' 127 total games in 2006.

Stegemann & Gray Garner All-ACC Honors

Ulrike Stegemann was named to the all-Atlantic Coast Conference Volleyball first team while Lindsey Gray was tabbed to the all-ACC second team following a season in which the junior tandem led the Yellow Jackets to 20 wins.

Stegemann's nod marks the first time since 2004 that the Yellow Jackets had a player named to the first team and is the third ACC honor for the Schwerin, Germany native. She was named to the all-freshman team in 2004 and second-team all-ACC in 2005.

It was the first conference honor for Gray.

Three Tabbed to ACC All-Academic Volleyball Team

Three Yellow Jackets - Allie Niekamp, Abby Showers and Ulrike Stegemann - were named to the ACC All-Academic Volleyball Team, as decided by the Atlantic Coast Conference at the conclusion of the season. All three players maintained at least a 3.0 grade point average throughout their entire careers.

Fans Help Tech Lead the League in Attendance

With over 20,000 fans attending Georgia Tech's 18 home matches during the season, the Yellow Jackets averaged 1,154 fans per home match, which was tops in the Atlantic Coast Conference while ranking **28th in the nation**.

The Yellow Jackets defeated the University of Georgia before a sold-out crowd of 2,000 the first weekend of the season, marking the third-straight year that Georgia Tech played a match at O'Keefe Gymnasium in front of a standing-room only capacity.

Tech had at least 1,000 fans in attendance at 13 of its 18 home matches, including all nine Atlantic Coast Conference matches to end the year.

How They Matched Up in the ACC

At least one Yellow Jacket finished in the top 10 in five of six categories in the Atlantic Coast Conference's final rankings.

Setter Allie Niekamp concluded the year ranked third in the league in assists (11.76/game) and sixth with 0.40 service aces per game, while Lindsey Gray finished fifth with 0.42 service aces per game in 2006.

Tech had two players ranked in the top seven in the ACC in hitting percentage including Callie Miller, who led the squad and finished sixth in the league with a .319 mark, and Ulrike Stegemann, who ranked seventh with a .311 hitting percentage.

Senior libero Abby Showers ended her career on the Flats by averaging 4.00 digs per game, which was seventh in the league in 2006, while Talisa Kellogg's 3.64 kills per game ranked 10th in the standings.

Serving Them Up

Lindsey Gray led the Yellow Jackets with 53 service aces in 2006, and Allie Niekamp wasn't far behind - posting 51 on the season - to become the first Georgia Tech tandem to record 50 service aces in the same year.

Niekamp currently stands fourth in the Georgia Tech career record book with 0.37 service aces per game, while Gray ranks fifth with 0.35.

Niekamp Cracks the 1,000 Assists Mark

With 47 assists against Virginia in mid-October, sophomore Allie Niekamp became the eighth player in school history to break the 1,000 assists mark in a career.

The Findlay, Ohio native finished her sophomore campaign with 1,494 assists to push her career total to 1,583, which stands seventh in the Georgia Tech annals. Her 11.39 assists per game ranks fourth in the Yellow Jacket career record books.

A Wall at the Net

Junior Nikki Kaminskas and sophomore Callie Miller led the Yellow Jackets' blocking efforts in 2006, with Miller leading the squad with 98 blocks on the season while Kaminskas posted 90 in her third year on the Flats.

Both players rank in the top-10 in career blocks per game, as Kaminskas stands eighth with 1.08 blocks per game while Miller appears at No. 10 at 0.98.

She Blocks AND Hits

Speaking of Callie Miller, the sophomore also led the Yellow Jackets with a .319 hitting percentage in 2006, raising her career hitting mark to .299, which stands seventh in the Georgia Tech record books. Miller finished the season with 251 kills (2.35/game) and just 83 errors in 526 attempts.

Kellogg Climbing Kills Charts

After breaking the Yellow Jackets' freshman mark with a team-leading 457 kills in 2005, Talisa Kellogg was at it again in her sophomore campaign, leading Georgia Tech with 440 kills on the season.

For her career, the Westerville, Ohio native has posted 897 career kills and stands fourth in the Yellow Jacket career record books with 3.83 kills per game.

Niekamp Member of Elite Trio

Competing in just the eighth match of her collegiate career and only the first match of the season, setter Allie Niekamp became just the third player in school history to record a triple-double when she tallied 10 kills, 44 assists and 10 digs against Mississippi State in the season opener.

Rochelle Komula posted the Yellow Jackets' first triple-double in 1996 while All-American Kele Eveland became the first Yellow Jacket setter with a triple-double when she did so in 2003.

Polhamus Tapped Winthrop Head Coach

After five successful seasons as a top recruiter on the national level and defensive coordinator for the Yellow Jackets, Sally Polhamus was named the new head coach at Winthrop.







The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 55th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 105 national championships, including 56 in women's competition and 49 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 139 times in men's competition and 86 times in women's action.

Volleyball made its debut in the ACC in 1980, with conference play beginning in 1981. Now in its 28th season, the ACC has enjoyed vast success both on and off the court.

The ACC has had six AVCA All-Americans, including Georgia Tech's Kele Eveland, who in 2003 became the league's first player to earn first-team accolades, and Lynnette Moster, who became the ACC's only three-time recipient of All-America honors in 2004. The conference has also produced 22 Academic All-Americans, seven Region/District Freshmen of the Year and 12 Region/District Coaches of the Year. A total of 154 student-athletes have been selected to the All Region/District team, while 62 have been honored on the All-Academic Region/District team.

Since the inception of the AVCA Division I Coaches Poll in 1982, seven ACC schools (Clemson, Duke, Florida State, Georgia Tech, Maryland, North Carolina and NC State) have been ranked in at least one final poll. Two schools have finished in the top 10 in the nation when Florida State completed the 1995 season ranked sixth and Georgia Tech concluded the 2003 season ranked eighth.

The ACC sent a team to the NCAA Championship Regional Round in three of the last five seasons. In 2002, North Carolina advanced to the Regionals, becoming the first ACC school to advance to the Regional Round since Duke in 1994. Georgia Tech made ACC history in 2003 when it advanced to the Regional Finals of the NCAA Championship, marking the farthest run of any ACC team in NCAA Championship play. The Yellow Jackets again reached the Regionals in 2004, falling to eventual NCAA finalist Minnesota in five games.

2006-07 in Review

The 2006-07 academic year concluded with league teams capturing five national team titles and 24 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 39 national team titles over the last 11 years. The ACC has won two or more NCAA titles in 25 of the past 27 years.

A total of 137 ACC teams placed in NCAA post-season competition in 2006-07. League teams compiled a 109-70-7 (.605) mark against non-conference opponents in NCAA championship competition. In addition, the ACC had 181 student-athletes earn first team All-America honors this past year. Overall, the league had 250 first, second or third team All-Americans. In addition, the ACC produced nine national Player of the Year and six national Coach of the Year honorees.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 24 sports during the 2007-08 academic year - 12 for men and 12 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.








