The Press Box

The Georgia Tech Press Box is for working media only and admission is by credential only. The Press Box is located underneath the upper deck in the West Stands. It is accessible by entering the West concourse and taking the elevator to the press level. Also located on the press level are the photo deck, radio and TV booths, and stadium operations/security.

Press Credentials

Press credentials will be issued to members of the working media only. Working space in the

Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field Press Box is limited, and children and other non-workers are not allowed in the Press Box.

Requests for credentials should be made in writing on letterhead stationery to Director of Communications Allison George well in advance of each game. Requests via e-mail are also acceptable. Requests are accepted from Sports Editors and Directors only.

If time permits, passes may be mailed. If not, they will be held at Media Will Call.

Media Will Call is located at the Georgia Tech Ticket Office at the North End of Bobby Dodd Stadium, near the corner of Techwood Drive and Bobby Dodd Way.

Photo Credentials

Sideline passes will be issued only to photographers on assignment and working members of the television media. For admission to the sidelines at Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field, a press credential and an arm band must be displayed. Photographers must present their credential in the Press Box to receive an armband. All sideline photographers must stay behind the dotted restraining line that surrounds the playing field and are not permitted in the team bench areas.

High speed Internet access is available in the press box for photo transmission.

Telephones

The Bobby Dodd Stadium Press Box is equipped with 10 telephones, which require credit card or collect calls. Writers or photographers desiring their own phones should make the request to Bell South (800-356-3093) using Mike Stamus as the local contact for phone placement. Please inform the Sports Information Office at least two days prior to the game if you have ordered your own phone.

Parking

Media parking at Bobby Dodd Stadium is extremely limited. Requests for parking passes should be made well in advance. Media parking

is located in Peters Parking Deck across Bobby Dodd Way at the north end of Bobby Dodd Stadium, or at Alexander Memorial Coliseum in the AMC and O'Keefe Lots.

Parking on Campus

Media visiting the Georgia Tech campus for practice, press conferences or interviews must display some type of media identification on their vehicles, such as a business card in the dash or marked television vehicle. At all times, media vehicles must be parked in legal parking spaces, not on sidewalks, driveways, tow zones, metered spaces or yellow curbs.

Media attending games must have an appropriate parking pass.

Post-Game Interviews

Coach Chan Gailey and Tech players will meet the media after each home game in the new Football Players Lounge in the north end of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field. The Tech postgame interview area is accessible from the service drive at the northwest corner of the field.

Tech's football locker room is closed immediately after each game but will be open to the media 30 minutes after Coach Gailey has left the locker room for his press conference, in accordance with Atlantic Coast Conference policy.

The visitor's locker room is located on the field level of the Wardlaw Building in the south end zone. It is accessible from field level at the southwest corner of the stadium, or via the Wardlaw Center elevator.

Admittance to all post-game press conferences is by credential only.

Interview Policy

All interviews must be arranged through the Sports Information Office. To insure availability, please allow 24-hour notice. Player interviews are permitted through Wednesday during the week of a game.


Practice

Georgia Tech practices are open to the media during the preseason only.

Once the season begins, practices are closed to the media, with the exception of brief

Practices are normally held at Rose Bowl Field, located on Fowler Street adjacent to Chandler Baseball Stadium. Media should enter Rose Bowl Field at the corner of Fowler and Fifth Streets. There is no parking available inside the gates of Rose Bowl Field.

Post-Practice Interviews

Head coach Chan Gailey and Tech players are available for interviews following practice. For closed practices, interviews are conducted in front of the football complex at the north end of Bobby Dodd Stadium.

Filming at Practice

Television crews are permitted to film at Tech's open practices provided they adhere to certain guidelines. Video access is available at selected times during fundamental and individual drills at the beginning of practice. Also, no audio taping of the snap count is allowed. Tripods are not permitted on the practice field, and media must stand at least five yards off the sidelines and not in the end zones. At all times, filming at practice is at the discretion of Sports Information personnel and the coaching staff.

Weekly Press Luncheon

A press luncheon with head coach Chan Gailey and Tech players will be held each week during the football season. Although Coach Gailey and Tech players are available at selected times during the week, this is the best time for interviews.

The press conferences are normally held on Tuesdays at 11:30 a.m. in the new Football Players Lounge, followed by lunch in the Edge Center dining hall.

For Tech's Thursday games, the weekly press conference will be held on Monday.

THE GEORGIA TECH ISP SPORTS NETWORK

RADIO NETWORK

The multimedia rights for the Georgia Tech Athletic Association are handled by International Sports Properties of Winston-Salem, NC. ISP Sports and the GTAA are in a multi-year agreement that coordinates the radio broadcasts of Tech football and men's basketball as well as the coaches' radio and television shows. The package also includes the marketing of Georgia Tech athletics through corporate sponsorship, venue signage, publications and other avenues. Ben C. Sutton, Jr., is the president of ISP Sports, while Jeff Salisbury is the general manager of the property in Atlanta.

The radio broadcast team for Yellow Jacket football is headlined by play-by-play voice Wes Durham and long-time analyst Kim King.

The 2004 season will mark King's 31st year on the broadcast and his fourth different decade in the booth. His insightful commentary has been a part of over 300 Tech broadcasts since he joined the network in 1974, alongside the legendary "Voice of the Ramblin' Wreck," Al Ciraldo. It was Ciraldo who dubbed King "The Young Left-hander" when he starred at quarterback for Bobby Dodd in the 1960s and led Tech to appearances in the Gator and Orange Bowls. His accomplishments led to King being named one of Tech's "50 Greatest Athletes of the 20th Century" in 2000.

Inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1996, King was tabbed by the Athletic Association to receive its highest postgraduate honor in 1998 with the "Total Person Alumni Award." King is a highly successful real estate developer in Atlanta. Last summer he was named by *Georgia Trend* magazine as their "Most Respected CEO" for 2004.

North Carolina native Wes Durham enters his 10th season as the "Voice of the Yellow Jackets." Last winter, Durham as named "Sportscaster of the Year" in the state of Georgia for a second time by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association.

A 1988 graduate of Elon, Durham's career began at Radford University and featured stops at Marshall and Vanderbilt, prior to his arrival at Tech in 1995. Durham's father, Woody, is in his 34th season as the football and basketball announcer at North Carolina.

The football broadcast team also includes network host Cory Provus, who keeps fans updated on action from around the country, along with engineer Miller Pope and spotters Al Ciraldo, Jr. and Tommy Barber.

Each broadcast begins two hours prior to kickoff with "Yellow Jacket Countdown with Dave Braine" and concludes with head coach Chan Gailey joining Durham and King to break down the ballgame.

WQXI-AM, "SportsTalk 790 The Zone," is the home for Tech football and basketball. Recognized as "Atlanta's sports leader," the station has been managed by Big League Broadcasting since 1997. Andrew Saltzman and Stephen "Steak" Shapiro head up the management team of Big League Broadcasting. Neal Maziar is the station manager and Matt Edgar is their program director.

New for 2004, selected Tech games will be available on XM Satellite Radio through an agreement between XM Radio and the ACC. More details, including specific games and channel information, will be available during the season on Tech's athletics website, www.ramblinwreck.com and on the conference website, www.TheACC.com.



SEASON PREVIEW

Yellow Jackets Seek to Extend Streak of Seven Straight Bowl Games

ucky seven?

Georgia Tech head coach Chan Gailey certainly hopes that seven proves to be an auspicious number.

The Yellow Jackets return seven starters on offense and seven on defense from last year's squad that earned Tech's school-record seventh straight bowl game. The Jackets, who crushed Tulsa, 52-10, in the Humanitarian Bowl, also posted a seventh consecutive winning season and a seventh straight year of at least seven victories.

Offensively, the Jackets welcome back the Atlantic Coast Conference's leading rusher in junior P.J. Daniels and the 2003 ACC Rookie of the Year in sophomore signal-caller Reggie Ball, but Tech must replace two starters on the offensive line as well as play-making wideout Jonathan Smith.


The Tech defense performed well last fall, leading the ACC and ranking 12th in the nation against the run. The Jackets return two of the ACC's top defenders in senior free safety James Butler and junior defensive end Eric Henderson, both of whom should be strong candidates for all-America honors this season. The biggest question mark on defense, and perhaps for the entire team, is replacing ultra-productive linebackers Keyaron Fox and Daryl Smith.

"I'm excited about where we can be," said Gailey as he enters his third season on the Flats. "We are not there yet. We have a lot of work to do, but we have some great things to build on from last year. There is some potential, but we have a lot of work to get done.

"Our biggest concern is depth at a lot of positions. We have to find starters at the linebacker spots, and we have to develop depth at most other positions."

If Tech is to add to its seven-year run of success, it must do so against a schedule that features seven opponents that played in bowl games last fall, including new ACC members Miami and Virginia Tech, as well as Clemson, Maryland, NC State and Virginia, plus in-state rival Georgia.

Georgia Tech is one of just 11 schools in the nation to play in a bowl game each of the last seven years. After a 52-10 victory in last year's Humanitarian Bowl, Tech owns the nation's best bowl game winning percentage in bowl games with a 21-11 record.



QUARTERBACKS


1 Starter, 1 Letterman Returning

Georgia Tech welcomes back sophomore quarterback Reggie Ball, the reigning ACC Rookie of the Year. The 5-11, 195pounder from Stone Mountain, Ga., started every game as a true freshman last fall, earning the job just weeks after arriving on campus. He impressed with his poise and play-making ability while setting Tech freshman records for passing yards (1,996) and total offense (2,380) and completing 52 percent of his passes. He had 10 touchdowns passing and three rushing but also threw 11 interceptions.

"There are some fundamental things that we need to work on with Reggie," said Gailey. "Overall decision-making and teaching him to anticipate better will be the emphasis.

"We've seen improvement. He made a big jump from the last game of the season to the end of spring practice. But he has still got some work to do."

Developing a capable backup is a major priority that will continue in the preseason. Ball is the only Tech quarterback who has taken a collegiate snap. Behind him is talented redshirt freshman Patrick Carter (6-3, 190), the younger brother of NFL receiver Tim Carter who has shown promise but was limited by injuries last fall and at times during the spring. True freshman



Taylor Bennett (6-3, 213), who enrolled last January, also showed positive signs in the spring. Senior walk-on Robby Brown (6-1, 180) adds depth.

"Nobody is ever comfortable with everybody that is in a backup role, but. we have got some potential there," said Gailey. "Patrick Carter was only able to practice a few days at the end of spring practice and did some good things. Taylor Bennett showed some good things for a true freshman in spring practice. So we will have to wait and see how that all shakes out."

RUNNING BACKS

1 Starter, 3 Lettermen Returning

All-ACC junior P.J. Daniels (5-10, 210) recorded one of the top rushing seasons in Georgia Tech and ACC history with 1,447 yards last fall. The former walk-on from Houston, Texas, averaged 111.3 yards per game, becoming just the third Yellow Jacket to lead the ACC in rushing. His season total is the second-best mark in Tech history and the fourth best in conference annals.

Over his last four games, Daniels posted two of the top three single-game rushing performances in school history, including an NCAA bowl-game record 307 yards versus Tulsa in the Humanitarian Bowl. Also an Academic All-ACC honoree, Daniels scored 11 touchdowns.

Behind Daniels are a pair of players who could push for playing time in junior Chris Woods (5-10, 190) and redshirt freshman Rashaun Grant (5-10, 192).

Woods was Tech's third-leading rusher last fall after transferring from the defunct program at Morris Brown. He actually started one game when Daniels was injured and finished the year with 122 yards on 31 carries and one touchdown. Grant is a promising young player with very good speed and elusiveness.

"PJ. really picked up in spring practice where he left off in the fall, which was good," said Gailey. "We have some work yet to do with Chris Woods and Rashaun Grant. They both have talent, especially when they have their hands on the ball. But there are other facets to playing running back, blocking assignments and all those types of things that they need to continue to work on."

FULLBACKS

1 Starter, 3 Lettermen Returning

Senior returning starter Jimmy Dixon (6-1, 225) turned in a steady season at fullback last fall. Seldom called upon to carry the ball, he caught four passes for 18 yards and is a dependable blocker.

Junior Ajenavi Eziemefe (6-1, 225), a former tailback, began to see some action at fullback midway through last season and now works exclusively there. He has 335 career rushing yards, including 53 last season.

Senior Johnathan Jackson (6-2, 225), who has been a valuable special teams player, missed spring practice due to injury for the second straight year.



WIDE RECEIVERS

1 Starter, 6 Lettermen Returning

ependable senior Nate Curry (5-10, 195) returns at wide receiver, but the Yellow Jackets will miss the play-making ability of Jonathan Smith, who set Tech season records with 78 catches for 1.138 vards last fall. In addition to accounting for half of Tech's receiving yards, he led the ACC in punt returns.

The speedy Curry, an Academic All-ACC selection in 2003, was second to Smith with 37 catches for 426 yards and three touchdowns, returning to form after missing almost two years due to injury.

"We are really pleased with where Nate Curry is," said Gailey. "He is doing a great job of leadership. He is in great shape. We are excited about what he is

going to bring to our football team this year."

Senior Mark Logan (5-11, 200), 4 receptions, 55 yards, 1 TD, junior Damarius Bilbo (6-3, 225), 2-55, and sophomores Xavier McGuire (6-3, 210), 4-25, and Chris Dunlap (5-11, 200) will also vie for the starting position. This is a position where true freshmen should have an impact.

"Nobody proved themselves out of the other guys," said Gailey. "Everybody had an opportunity in spring practice and nobody really stepped to the forefront to say 'this is my job, I'm going to take it'. So we are in a dilemma right now about who will start at the other spots.

"The one guy who made a big jump in spring practice was Damarius Bilbo. He hopefully will add something to our football team. We recruited some very good receivers, but first we need to find out who on campus can play for us."

TIGHT ENDS

0 Starters, 2 Lettermen Returning

Fight end is a position at which the Yellow Jackets lack a proven player following the graduation of last year's starter and honorable mention all-ACC selection, John Paul Foschi. The most experienced returnee and the likely starter is senior Darius Williams, who showed great improvement last season, when he played primarily in two-tight end alignments. At 6-6 and 270 pounds, he has excellent size, and he caught three passes for 37 yards in 2003.

Williams is backed up by sophomore Michael Matthews (6-4, 265), who moves here after playing fullback last fall and defensive end in 2002.

Another tight end with good size is sophomore George Cooper, who stands 6-5 and 259 pounds. Also in the mix are junior Gavin Tarquinio (6-3, 250), a former offensive lineman who has been hampered by injuries for much of his career.

OFFENSIVE LINE

3 Starters, 6 Lettermen Returning

eorgia Tech lost two all-conference players on the offensive Uline in senior center Hugh Reilly and junior tackle Nat Dorsey, who elected to enter the NFL draft. Still, three veteran starters return from the unit that paved the way for the ACC's top rusher. led by senior tackle Kyle Wallace.

A 6-6, 295-pounder from Lawrenceville, Ga., Wallace is Tech's most experienced offensive player with 25 career starts and should be a candidate for all-conference honors this fall. He moves to the important left tackle position after starting on the right side the last two years.

Lining up opposite Wallace at right tackle is likely to be junior Salih Besirevic (6-7, 290), who earned the nod with a solid performance in the spring, when he was one of Tech's most improved players.


The top backup at tackle should be Kenton Johnson, a 6-6, 320-pound senior who joined the program in 2003 after transferring from the now-defunct program at Morris Brown. He played as a backup behind Dorsey last season.

Tech has a pair of experienced players at guard in returning starters Andy Tidwell-Neal, a 6-4, 315-pound senior, on the left









side and Brad Honeycutt, a 6-4, 308-pound junior, on the right side. Another veteran player is Leon Robinson, a 6-4, 318-pound senior who did not start last season but has 19 career starts.

"Kyle Wallace has played the most and played the most consistently," said Gailey. "I think Andy played well last year, had his best season by far. Brad had his best year by far, so there are three guys who are very solid for us."

At center, Tech must replace Reilly, who not only started for three years but played every single snap last season, so the Jackets turn to promising redshirt freshman Kevin Tuminello (6-4, 275). Tidwell-Neal can also play center.

"It's always a tenuous situation anytime you start a young offensive lineman," said Gailey. "Things have worked out fairly well in the past playing young linemen. Hopefully, Kevin will be able to come in and handle it. Salih Besirevic will be at the other tackle spot starting in the fall. He is an untested guy, even though he is more of a veteran guy. He is untested. We will have to see how those two guys handle their positions."

Developing dependable backups at all positions on the offensive line will be a major priority. Candidates include redshirt freshmen Matt Rhodes (6-3, 270) and Eddy Parker (6-4, 275) and sophomores Travis Kelly (6-0, 264) and Brad Brezina (6-2, 275), who moves to guard after lettering at defensive tackle last fall.

"Depth on the offensive line is a big issue right now," said Gailey. "Critical to our success this year will be how well Kevin Tuminello and Salih Besirevic develop and how well the backups develop behind them."

DEFENSIVE ENDS

2 Starters, 3 Lettermen Returning

Defensive end looks to be one of Georgia Tech's strongest positions, led by all-America candidate Eric Henderson, a 6-3, 265-pound junior from New Orleans, La.

A first-team all-ACC selection and an Academic All-ACC honoree, Henderson led the league with 11 sacks and was second with 24 tackles for loss, a Tech single-season record. After just two seasons, he has already amassed 16 career sacks and 39 tackles for loss, which ranks fifth in Rambling Wreck history.

Playing opposite Henderson will be junior Travis Parker, an honorable mention all-ACC choice while playing defensive tackle last fall, when he collected 15 tackles for loss. At 6-5 and 260 pounds, the Tech coaches feel he will be better suited to play defensive end, a position that opened up with the move of last year's starter, Gerris Wilkinson, to linebacker.

"We'll move Travis Parker out to end, which is a better position for him," said Gailey. "He's not as big and strong as you need to be inside, but he has done a great job for us inside even with his lack of size. A more natural position for him is defensive end.

"With Travis on one end and Eric on the other, people can't pay attention too much to one side."

Senior Chirod Williams (6-4, 235) and redshirt freshman Adamm Oliver (6-4, 250) are slated as the primary backups.



DEFENSIVE TACKLES

1 Starter, 3 Lettermen Returning

Assive sophomore Mansfield Wrotto returns after starting 11 games at defensive tackle last fall, making four tackles for loss and one sack. The 6-3, 305-pounder was a third-team Freshman All-America selection.

"I think Mansfield surprised a lot of people, probably even us as coaches, with the way he played and the way he developed through the course of the year," said Gailey. "I think he will take another jump this season. He is getting a lot stronger in the weight room. I am looking for bigger and better things from him next year."

With last year's other starter, Travis Parker, moving to defensive end, sophomore Joe Anoai will get a shot at defensive tackle. He played as a true freshman, working primarily on passing downs, and had three tackles for loss and two fumble recoveries.

"Joe Anaoi played well last year when he came in," said Gailey. "He is pushing that 260 mark, so we will let him use his quickness and speed in there like we used Travis Parker last year.

"One of the biggest disappointments is not having LeShawn Newberry in there this spring. There is another 300-plus pounder that you would like to see get some reps."

Newberry (6-0, 300) suffered a season-ending knee injury in preseason camp and has not been cleared for spring drills but should be ready for fall practice.

Also adding depth at defensive tackle is junior Omar Billy (6-2, 278).

"Our front four is very strong," said Gailey of the defensive line. "They all can run. They all have some ability. We have some size. This starting group is very good. We just need to develop some depth behind them and get them continually playing at a high level."

LINEBACKERS

1 Starter, 6 Lettermen Returning

Linebacker is clearly Georgia Tech's biggest question mark on defense, simply because the Jackets must replace a pair of all-ACC honorees in three-year starter Keyaron Fox and four-year starter Daryl Smith. That duo combined for 284 tackles, 35 tackles for loss, seven sacks, six forced fumbles and five pass breakups last year alone; over the last four years, they totalled 759 tackles and 88 tackles for loss. Throw in a third graduated starter in Ather Brown, and that type of experience and productivity will be difficult to replace.

Although all three starters graduated, Tech does have one returning starter to plug in as junior Gerris Wilkinson (6-3, 230) moves from defensive end back to his former linebacker spot. After making a last-minute switch to defensive end last summer, Wilkinson was very effective despite his lack of size, collecting 47 tackles and 12 tackles for loss, but he should be even better-suited to play linebacker.

He began the spring at outside linebacker before settling at middle linebacker.

At outside linebacker, the strong side also features a veteran making a position change. Junior Chris Reis was a part-time starter at safety last fall but moved to linebacker in the spring. He is somewhat undersized at 6-0 and 215 pounds, but he brings good speed as well as experience, knowledge and aggressiveness.


"We moved guys around and feel like we got good football players on the field," said Gailey. "They are not yet completely comfortable playing those spots, but they are certainly great competitors and really good athletes. I think they will bring a lot to the table when we line up in the fall."

KaMichael Hall a 6-0, 225-pound sophomore, is the leading candidate for the third linebacker position. He saw limited action on defense along with special teams duty last fall, collecting 12 tackles with two tackles for loss.

Senior Tabugbo Anyansi (6-1, 225) and sophomore Nick Moore (6-1, 228) are expected to be the primary backups, as well as important special teams contributors. An incoming freshman could certainly make an impact at linebacker as well.

Beyond the statistics that they amassed, Fox and Smith's versatility and knowledge of the game made them very effective in the multi-faceted defensive schemes fashioned by coordinator Jon Tenuta.

"We will have to adjust," admitted Gailey, "but the young guys will have to learn. You can't hold everybody back because you have some guys that don't have quite the experience. They have to learn to play within the system. And they have been in the system a year, so it's not like it's something completely new. They just have to get up to speed on everything."







SAFETIES

2 Starters, 4 Lettermen Returning


The safety position features Tech's top returning player, senior all-America candidate James Butler at free safety.

Butler should be one of the nation's top defensive players after earning first-team all-ACC honors last fall. He finished second in the ACC with five interceptions while setting a Tech single-season record for tackles by a defensive back with 119. The 6-3, 210-pounder from Climax, Ga., was a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back. He was also an Academic All-ACC selection in 2003.

"James Butler has the chance to be one of the best, if not the best in the country this year," said Gailey. "He has proven himself as a sophomore and a junior and he is going into his senior year and I expect great things from him."

Returning at strong safety is Dawan Landry, a junior from Ama, La. The 6-2, 215-pounder is a very good athlete who excels in run support. The former quarterback was Tech's fourth-leading tackler last fall with 85 hits, along with two interceptions.

Veteran backup Nathan Burton (6-2, 205) gives the Jackets good depth at the position. The senior displayed his versatility in the spring by playing both safety positions and even working at cornerback at times. He is also a key special teams player, as is sophomore backup Joe Gaston (5-10, 195). Redshirt freshman Avery Roberson (6-2, 190) is also in the mix.



CORNERBACKS

1 Starter, 3 Lettermen Returning

Reuben Houston, a 6-0, 190-pound junior, returns at one cornerback slot, but Tech must replace senior Jonathan Cox.

Houston was fifth on the team in tackles last spring with 70, including four tackles for loss. He also contributed three interceptions and a team-leading eight pass breakups.

Talented sophomore Kenny Scott (6-1, 185), also Tech's kickoff return specialist, enters the spring as the starter at the other corner. Senior Dennis Davis (6-0, 185), who saw extensive playing time as a fifth defensive back and had two interceptions, could also challenge for a starting berth. Both players should see plenty of action regardless of who starts.

Several young players will compete for backup roles, including sophomores I-Perfection Harris (5-10, 175), Brian Fleuridor (5-11, 185) and Sam Williams (5-11, 190) and redshirt freshman Finesse Usher (5-11, 195).

"We want our guys to be able to play one-on-one on the outside," said Gailey. "If they can play one-on-one outside, then that opens up some other things for you. That means they have to work really hard at proper technique and little things that go into being a great corner.

"Reuben Houston, Dennis Davis, and Kenny Scott give us three corners that we feel can walk on the field and play for us, and in this league, you need three corners that can play."

SPECIALISTS

1 Starter, 3 Lettermen Returning

Tech has had the luxury of very reliable placekickers the last several years, with Dan Burnett last fall and Luke Manget before him, but the Jackets enter the fall with no proven commodoties at either placekicker or punter.

Senior Andy Thomson (5-11, 180) ended last season as the starting punter, averaging 39.8 yards on 24 punts, but Gailey would like to see much more consistent play at that position. Senior David Smith (6-4, 210), a former track athlete, has shown a strong leg but not enough consistency.

Redshirt freshman Travis Bell (6-1, 205) left spring as the top kicker but the competition will continue. Sophomore David Jordan (6-4, 210), who handled some kickoffs last season, is a candidate to continue in that role, but he has yet to attempt a field goal or PAT.

Tech does have the luxury of senior Andrew Economos (6-1, 232) returning for this third season as the Jackets' long-snapper on punts and placements.

"We have to get the kicking game straightened out in the preseason," said Gailey. "I still don't know who will do what. Andrew Economos as the snapper is the most solid thing about our kicking game right now. Travis Bell kicked very

well in spring, so we'll will have to see if he can pick up where he left off. Our punting was totally erratic in spring practice, and a freshman, Kyle Belcher, will definitely get a look there."

Sophomore Kenny Scott returns after returning kickoffs for the Jackets last fall, averaging 22.3 yards per return, but Tech must find a punt returner to replace Jonathan Smith, who led the ACC with an 11.7-yard average, including two touchdowns.


Head coach Bobby Dodd with quarterback Darrell Crawford, 1950.


The most well-known Georgia Tech uniform is the combination of white jersey, gold pants and gold helmet (above center) that the Jackets wore during their 1950s heyday. Tech switched to a white helmet in 1964-65 (Lenny Snow, above left), and then returned to the gold helmet in 1967 (Kim King, right), adding a stripe and a GT logo.



To go along with their new commitment to the head coach, the Cowboys introduced new uniforms in '64. [Tex] Schramm, always keenly attuned to images and appearances, was displeased with the old look. He borrowed from several sources to arrive at the new look. "I wanted to get away from white pants," he said. "I liked Green Bay's uniform, with the gold pants. Then I saw Georgia Tech. They also had gold pants, but they had a real good looking white jersey with the numbers on top of the shoulder pads rather than on the arms. I thought that look was terrific. I copied Georgia Tech for the Cowboy uniform."






Georgia Tech debuted white jerseys with gold numerals in the 1997 Carquest Bowl.

THREE ALL-ACC SELECTIONS RETURN

Three Yellow Jackets who made the 2003 all-Atlantic Coast Conference honors return for Georgia Tech in tailback PJ Daniels, who led the league in rushing, defensive end Eric Henderson, who was the ACC leader in sacks, and free safety James Butler, who was second in the ACC in interceptions.

All three were also named to the ACC All-Academic football team, along with defensive end Gerris Wilkinson, wide receiver Nate Curry and safety Chris Reis.

Tech also features the reigning ACC Rookie of the Year in quarterback Reggie Ball.

POSITION CHANGES

Georgia Tech returns seven starters on defense, but two of those returnees have changed positions.

Junior Gerris Wilkinson, who had 47 tackles and 12 tackles for loss at defensive end last season, returns to his more natural linebacker position, where Tech must replace all three starters. Wilkinson had moved to from linebacker to defensive end prior to last season.

Wilkinson's move opened up a defensive end spot for junior Travis Parker, who earned honorable mention all-ACC recognition at defensive tackle.

Also making a move is junior Chris Reis, who switches from safety, where he was the top backup, to a starting position at outside linebacker.

SCHOOL-RECORD SEVENTH STRAIGHT BOWL

With its Humanitarian Bowl victory, Georgia Tech set a school record by playing in a bowl game for the seventh consecutive year.

On their current streak, the Yellow Jackets have also played in the 1997 Carquest Bowl, the 1999 and 2000 Toyota Gator Bowls, the 2000 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl, the 2001 Seattle Bowl and the 2002 Silicon Valley Classic. Tech's previous high was six straight bowl games from 1951-56 under legendary coach Bobby Dodd.

Georgia Tech is one of just 11 schools in the nation to play in a bowl each of the last seven years. Florida State and Virginia Tech are the only other Atlantic Coast Conference schools in this elite group. The list also includes Florida, Georgia, Kansas State, Michigan, Nebraska, Oregon, Purdue and Tennessee.

Interestingly, the last five national champions (LSU, Southern Cal, Ohio State, Miami and Oklahoma) cannot make this claim.

SEVENTH STRAIGHT WINNING SEASON

Georgia Tech recorded its seventh straight winning season in 2003, the second-longest string in school history, and the longest since Tech had 15 consecutive winning seasons from 1908-1922 under John Heisman and William Alexander.

BOWLING 'EM OVER

After its Humanitarian Bowl victory, Georgia Tech now owns the nation's best winning percentage in bowl games, among teams with at least 20 bowl appearances. Tech's record now stands at 21-11 for a winning percentage of .656 in postseason play. The Jackets lead Penn State (23-12-2, .649) and Southern California (27-15, .643).

Tech ranks sixth all-time in bowl victories with 21 and 13th in appearances with 32.



In 1955, the Jackets were the first team to win each of the four traditional major bowls-Rose, Orange, Sugar and Cotton.

SEVEN BOWL TEAMS ON 2004 SCHEDULE

Georgia Tech played eight of its 13 games against bowl teams last season, including victories over Auburn, NC State, Maryland and Tulsa. The Jackets also faced Florida State, Clemson, Virginia and Georgia.

Tech's 2004 slate includes seven of 11 games against teams that played in bowl games in 2003: Clemson, Georgia, Maryland, Miami, NC State, Virginia and Virginia Tech.

GOLD RUSH

After posting one of the top rushing seasons in Georgia Tech and ACC history, junior tailback PJ. Daniels vaulted into 12th place on the Yellow Jackets' career rushing list.

Daniels gained 1,447 yards last fall, the second-best season total in Tech history (Eddie Lee Ivery, 1,562 in 1978) and fourth-best in ACC annals.

THROWN FOR A LOSS

After just two seasons, junior defensive end Eric Henderson is climbing Tech's career lists for tackles for loss and sacks.

Last season, the New Orleans, La., native set a Tech season record with 24 tackles for loss. He has 39 career tackles for loss to rank fifth in Yellow Jacket annals.

Henderson has 16 career sacks, including an ACC-leading 11 a year ago. He ranks eighth on Tech's career list.

BUTLER, HENDERSON, DANIELS EARN PRESEASON ALL-AMERICA RECOGNITION

Senior free safety James Butler, junior defensive end Eric Henderson and junior tailback PJ. Daniels headline the list of Yellow Jackets to earn preseason honors from various publications.

Butler is a preseason first-team all-America selection by Phil Steele's College Football, as well as a third-team pick by Athlon Sports and Street & Smith's, which also tabbed him as a top candidate for the Jim Thorpe Award, for which he was a semifinalist last year. He was rated the best safety in the ACC by TSN, and the best in the nation by Phil Steele's.

Henderson is a preseason second-team all-America by Athlon and Street & Smith's, which identified him as a candidate for the Outland Trophy, Lombardi Award, Bednarik Award and Nagurski Award.

Daniels was rated an honorable mention all-America and Doak Walker Award candidate by Street & Smith's. He was ranked the best running back between the tackles in the ACC.

Butler, Henderson and Daniels were consensus first-team all-ACC picks.

Senior tackle Kyle Wallace was named second-team all-ACC by The Sporting News and Street & Smith's as well as third team by Athlon Sports.

Several other Yellow Jackets were tabbed to Street & Smith's honorable mention all-America team, including quarterback Reggie Ball, wide receiver Nate Curry and defensive linemen Travis Parker and Mansfield Wrotto.

Georgia Tech has an all-time record of 623-421-43 (.594). Entering their 112th year of intercollegiate competition, the Yellow Jackets rank 18th among all Division I-A teams in all-time victories.

NFL HEAD COACHING EXPERIENCE

Georgia Tech's third-year head coach Chan Gailey has 30 years of coaching experience, including 14 years in the National Football League. Gailey spent two years (1998-99) as head coach of the Dallas Cowboys, compiling an 18-14 regular-season record and leading the Cowboys to the playoffs both years, including the 1998 NFC Eastern Division title.

Gailey is one of nine current head coaches in NCAA Division I-A who have previous head coaching experience in the NFL. The others are Rich Brooks (Kentucky), Bill Callahan (Nebraska), Pete Carroll (Southern California), Mike Riley (Oregon State), Al Groh (Virginia), Lou Holtz (South Carolina), June Jones (Hawaii), and John Robinson (UNLV).


Of those nine, only Gailey and Robinson (Los Angeles Rams) have led a team to the NFL playoffs and compiled a winning NFL record. Groh (New York Jets, 2001) had a winning record in one NFL season but did not reach the playoffs, while Callahan led the Oakland Raiders to the playoffs once but did not compile a winning record.

NEW FACES ON COACHING STAFF

Georgia Tech has two new faces on its coaching staff, both on the defensive side of the ball. Giff Smith joined the Tech staff from Tulane and will coach Tech's defensive line, while Brian Jean-Mary (pronounced jon-muh-REE), who came from North Alabama, will tutor the Rambling Wreck linebackers. Jon Tenuta enters his third season as Tech's defensive coordinator.

On offense, quarterbacks coach Patrick Nix has been elevated to offensive coordinator, while wide receivers coach Buddy Geis has been promoted to assistant head coach.





Tabbed a preseason honorable mention all-America, as well as a Doak Walker Award candidate, by *Street & Smith's* magazine . . . Rated among the nation's top 10 running backs by *The Sporting News* . . . Preseason first-team all-conference selection by virtually every publication.

Recorded the seventh 1,000-yard season ever by a Yellow Jacket, including two of the top three games in Tech annals . . . Ranks 12th on Tech's career rushing list with 1,702 yards . . . Former walk-on who earned a scholarship after the 2002 season . . . Always plays with great effort and enthusiasm.

2003: First-team all-ACC selection and the league's leading rusher . . . Also named to the ACC All-Academic football team . . . Totalled 1,447 yards while averaging 111.3 yards per game . . . CHAN GAILEY

At Tech: 14-12, 3rd Year Overall: 38-23, 6th Year

Named the Georgia Tech head coach on Dec. 29, 2001, Chan Gailey is the first Yellow Jacket head coach to lead Tech to bowl games in his first two seasons.

han Gailey, a 30-year football coaching veteran, including 14 seasons in the college ranks and 16 years in professional football, was named the 11th head coach in Georgia Tech football history on Dec. 29, 2001.

Gailey guided the Yellow Jackets to bowl games in each of his two seasons on the Flats, the first Georgia Tech head coach to do so. With Tech's victory in the 2004 Humanitarian Bowl, the Jackets achieved a feat unprecedented in school history with their seventh consecutive bowl berth. Georgia Tech is one of just 11 schools in the nation to earn a bowl bid each of the last seven years.

With a balanced offense and an aggressive defense, Gailey's 2003 Yellow Jackets defied preseason predictions that suggested Georgia Tech would finish eighth in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Instead, the Jackets managed a 7-6 record, including a 4-4 mark in the ACC, despite a grueling schedule. The season was highlighted by victories over bowl-bound teams Auburn, Maryland and NC State as well as the thrashing of Tulsa in the Humanitarian Bowl.

Starting true freshman Reggie Ball at quarterback, the Tech offense featured a 1,000-yard rusher in PJ. Daniels and a 1,000-yard receiver in Jonathan Smith for the first time in school history. The Jackets' defense boasted the ACC leaders in tackles in line-backer Keyaron Fox and sacks in defensive end Eric Henderson as well as free safety James Butler, who ranked second in the league in interceptions.

Five Yellow Jackets earned first-team all-ACC honors last season, including Daniels, Fox, Butler, Henderson, and center Hugh Reilly. The 2003 slate gives Tech 12 first or second-team all-ACC selections over Gailey's two years.

Ball was named the ACC Rookie of the Year, Tech's first winner since 1991, while Reilly was selected as a finalist for the Dave Rimington Trophy and Butler was tabbed a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award.

In 2002 in his first season at the helm of the Tech program,

Gailey steered the Rambling Wreck through adversity, including season-ending injuries to the team's top offensive and defensive players, to a sixth consecutive bowl berth in the 2002 Silicon Valley Classic. His first Yellow Jacket edition posted a sixth straight year of seven or more wins, highlighted by an improbable victory at eighth-ranked NC State.

In two seasons on the Flats, Gailey has posted a record of 14-12 (.538).

Gailey, 52, brought to Tech a history of success at every stop in his coaching career, including three seasons as a college head coach at Troy State University and Samford University in Alabama, as well as two years as the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys and two at the helm of the Birmingham Fire of the World League of American Football. He made a name for himself as an innovative offensive mind during NFL stops in Pittsburgh, Dallas and Miami, among others.


Entering his sixth season as a college head coach, Gailey has compiled a record of 38-23 (.623), including a 19-5 mark in two years at Troy State and a 5-6 slate at Samford.

"Chan Gailey is the right fit for Georgia Tech at this time," said Tech Director of Athletics Dave Braine upon Gailey's hiring. "Besides all the great qualities he possesses as a football coach, he's an even better human being."

Gailey came to Tech after two seasons (2000-01) as offensive coordinator for the Miami Dolphins under head coach Dave Wannstedt.

"How many times does a guy like myself get a chance to come to an institute like this?" said Gailey on the day he was introduced. "It's something that you can believe in, and when you talk to somebody you know what you're selling and you know what you're talking about. What's up here with the alumni and the people that are involved? Every day I get to go to work with people that exude character and class. That's an enjoyable situation.





NFL EXPERIENCE: Chan Gailey is one of nine current Division I-A head coaches who have NFL head coaching experience. He led the Dallas Cowboys to the playoffs in each of his two seasons as head coach.

"I did ask, 'Do we have the ability to win a national championship?' because I want to win and that's part of the process. I want to win a championship. That's why you play. That's why you line up and that's why you go out and work and lift weights in the off season, to have a chance to be the best of the best and that's one of the goals. I get a chance to come back to my home state and I get an opportunity to work in a great city and to be involved with an unbelievable institute."

Gailey joined the Dolphins after spending the previous two years (1998-99) as the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys. Under Gailey, the Cowboys compiled a composite regular season record of 18-14 in his two seasons, qualified for the playoffs both years, and captured the NFC Eastern Division title in 1998. In addition, the Cowboys finished in the top five in the NFL in both fewest turnovers and fewest interceptions in each of Gailey's two seasons as head coach, including a number one ranking in both categories in 1998. In Gailey's first season with the Dolphins, he helped guide a running game which amassed 1,894 yards, the most by a Dolphin team since 1984. Lamar Smith finished tenth in the AFC with 1,139 yards rushing, the second-highest single-season total by a Dolphin, marking just the seventh time (fifth player) that a Miami player reached the 1,000-yard plateau.

In seven of the eight seasons that Gailey was either a coordinator or head coach in the NFL, he had a player attain the 1,000yard rushing mark each time, including Jerome Bettis of the Steelers and Emmitt Smith of the Cowboys.

Before joining the Cowboys in 1998, Gailey spent the previous four seasons (1994-97) with the Pittsburgh Steelers, including each of the last two as offensive coordinator. His first two years there were spent tutoring the club's wide receivers. In Gailey's four seasons with the Steelers, the team won the AFC Central Division crown each time, appeared in the AFC Championship Game on three occasions and made one trip to the Super Bowl. Pittsburgh finished second in the NFL in rushing offense in 1996, averaging 143.7 yards per game. In Gailey's final season with the Steelers, he presided over the league's top-ranked rushing team, one that amassed an average of 154.9 yards per contest.

The NFL team with which Gailey coached reached postseason play each of his last eight years in the league, and 11 of his 14 seasons overall.

Gailey got his start in the NFL coaching ranks as an assistant with the Denver Broncos in 1985. He served as a defensive assistant and special teams coach in his first season there before moving to the offensive side in 1986. He served two years (1986-87) as the Broncos' special teams and tight ends coach prior to taking over the task as quarterbacks coach in 1988. He was promoted to offensive coordinator/receivers coach in 1989, and served two years in that position.

"I think Chan is one of the best around, and I've worked with a lot of them in different places. He's a great communicator and is great at simplifying things to let guys go out and play football."

During Gailey's six-year stay in Denver, the team finished first or second in the AFC West on five occasions and made three Super Bowl appearances. Following his tenure in Denver, Gailey was named head coach with the Birmingham Fire of the World League in 1991, and in his two seasons there, the Fire qualified for the playoffs both times. A stop as head coach at Samford University in 1993 preceded his stint with the Steelers.

Gailey began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at the University of Florida in 1974, where he spent the next two years. From there, he moved on to his first full-time position, as secondary coach at Troy (Ala.) State, where he served from 1976-78. That was followed by a four-year stint (1979-82) at the Air Force Academy, the final two as defensive coordinator under Ken Hatfield. He returned to Troy State in 1983 and spent the next two seasons there as head coach. He led the team to a Division II national championship in 1984.

Born January 5, 1952 in Gainesville, Ga., Gailey was an allstate quarterback at Americus High School, and went on to letter three years (1971-73) as a quarterback at the University of Florida. He graduated from Florida in 1974 with a degree in physical education. Gailey and his wife, Laurie, have two sons, Tate and Andrew.

Offensive Line *3rd Year at Tech*

oe D'Alessandris, who possesses a wide range of experience at the collegiate and professional levels, enters his third season as Georgia Tech's offensive line coach.

In 2003, D'Alessandris' offensive line has paved the way for 1,000-yard rusher P.J. Daniels. Center Hugh Reilly was a first-team all-Atlantic Coast Conference selection and a finalist for the Dave Rimington Trophy as the nation's top center. Reilly became the second Tech offensive lineman to earn all-conference honors under D'Alessandris, following tackle Nat Dorsey in 2002.

Dorsey was a fourth-round selection of the Minnesota Vikings in the 2004 NFL Draft, while Reilly signed a free agent contract with the Tennessee Titans.

D'Alessandris came to Tech in 2002 after coaching the offensive line at Duke the previous five years (1997-01). Five linemen that he coached during that time went on to the NFL in center






Patrick Mannelly (5th round, Chicago, 1998), guard Lennie Friedman (2nd round, Denver, 1997), center Troy Andrew (free agent, Miami, 2001), Shawn Lynch (free agent, Kansas City, 2002) and John Miller (free agent, Houston, 2002). In addition, D'Alessandris coached on the Gray squad at the 1999 Blue-Gray Classic.

He went to Duke after serving as offensive line coach at the University of Pittsburgh in 1996, and with the Memphis Mad Dogs of the Canadian Football League in 1995. Prior to his Memphis position, he was the offensive line coach at Texas A&M in 1994, helping the Aggies to a 10-0-1 record. He has also held posts with the World League Birmingham team (1991-92) and the CFL Ottawa team (1990).

A native of Aliquippa, Pa., D'Alessandris, 50, was a four-year letterman and a three-year starting offensive guard at Western Carolina, where he earned a bachelor's degree in 1977 and added a master's degree in 1979. As a senior, he received the Catamounts' Big Cat Award as the football team's most valuable player and served as team captain. He began his coaching career at Western

2nd Year at Tech


ayne "Buddy" Geis, who joined the Georgia Tech staff in 2003, was elevated this season to assistant head coach. He will continue to coach Tech's wide receivers.

Geis has been reunited with Tech head coach Chan Gailey, under whom he worked in the National Football League as an assistant with the Dallas Cowboys.

Last fall as passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach, Geis worked with all-Atlantic Coast Conference wideout Jonathan Smith, who enjoyed one of the top seasons in Tech history. Smith set school records for receptions and receiving yards and was selected by the Buffalo Bills in the 2004 NFL Draft.

Geis spent three seasons with the Cowboys, coaching the Dallas quarterbacks in 1998-99 under Gailey and then directing the offensive nickel package under Dave Campo in 2000. During his stint as quarterbacks coach, the Cowboy signal callers threw only 21 interceptions in two seasons, the lowest total in the NFL during that





span. In 1998, the quarterback trio of Troy Aikman, who missed five games due to injury, Jason Garrett and Mike Quinn totalled just eight interceptions, fewest in the league. The following year, Aikman and his backups were second in the NFL with just 13 interceptions, and Aikman passed for 2,964 yards despite missing two games.

Before going to Dallas, Geis spent two years (1996-97) as offensive assistant and assistant quarterbacks coach with the Indianapolis Colts, where he worked with Colts' quarterback Jim Harbaugh, who recorded the second-best quarterback rating of his career under Geis in 1997.


Geis broke into the NFL as receivers coach for the Green Bay Packers from 1988-91 under Lindy Infante. While with the Packers, Geis tutored all-pro receiver Sterling Sharpe, who led the NFL with 90 receptions in just his second season (1989) in the league. Under Geis' tutelage, Sharpe totaled 281 receptions for 4,280 yards and 23 touchdowns in four seasons.

Geis also coached in the Canadian Football League, serving as offensive coordinator for the Memphis Mad Dogs in 1995 on the staff of former Tech head coach Pepper Rodgers, and in the USFL with the Jacksonville Bulls, spending two years (1984-85) on Infante's staff.

Geis' college coaching experience includes one year each as

the offensive coordinator at Tulane (1994) and Duke (1993) and two seasons as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Memphis State (1986-87). He originally worked with Infante during his first stint with Tulane (1977-82), which followed a three-year stop at Arizona (1974-76).

A native of Altoona, Pa, Geis earned his degree in health and physical education from Lock Haven University in 1972. He added a master's in education and administration at Arizona in 1976. He and his wife, Jere, have two children, Adam and Jeni, and one grandson, Jered.

rian Jean-Mary begins his first season at Georgia Tech as linebackers coach.

Jean-Mary (pronounced jon-muh-REE) came to Tech after one season coaching the defensive backs at North Alabama, one of the top programs in NCAA Division II.

Last fall, he helped the Lions to a 13-1 record, the Gulf South Conference title and a berth in the semifinals of the NCAA Division II playoffs. North Alabama's defense ranked sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.1 points per game, well as 25th in pass defense and 26th in total defense.

Jean-Mary, 28, previously spent two years (2001-02) as a defensive graduate assistant at South Carolina under Lou Holtz and




one year (2000) as a graduate assistant on the strength and conditioning staff at Louisville.

urtis Modkins is in his second year as Georgia Tech's running backs coach and his third year on the Tech staff after working with defensive backs in 2002.

Last fall, Modkins tutored the leading rusher in the Atlantic Coast Conference, first-team all-ACC selection PJ. Daniels, a former walk-on who gained 1,447 yards.

In 2002, Modkins coached Tech's only first-team all-ACC honoree in 2002, free safety Jeremy Muyres.

Modkins joined head coach Chan Gailey's staff in January of 2002 after four seasons as cornerbacks coach at the University of New Mexico.

In 2001, Modkins' cornerbacks helped New Mexico rank 18th in the nation in total defense and haul in 15 total interceptions, and senior Stephen Persely was named to the all-Mountain West Conference team with six interceptions.

From 1998 to 2000, UNM's passing yardage allowed declined each year.

In 1999, Modkins served a summer internship with the Dallas Cowboys, whose head coach at the time was Chan Gailey.

Modkins went to New Mexico from Texas Christian University, where he was a graduate assistant for one year (1995) and a fulltime assistant coach for two years (1996-97).


Upon the completion of his playing career, Modkins served for three years on Pat Sullivan's staff. He was a graduate assistant in

In 2002, Nix was Tech's running backs coach and recruiting coordinator. He helped the offensive backfield overcome the seasonending injuries to its top three tailbacks, including standout Tony Hollings, the nation's leading rusher after four games.

Nix came to Tech in 2002 after one year as wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at Samford University.

Prior to his one season at Samford, Nix was the head coach at Henderson State University, an NCAA Division II school in Arkadelphia, Ark., for two years (1999-2000). Under Nix, the HSU offense set 18 school records, four Gulf South Conference records and three national records.


Nix began his coaching career with a three-year stint at Jacksonville State University, serving as running backs coach in





Last fall, Robinson coached honorable mention all-conference tight end John Paul Foschi, the Jackets' third-leading receiver who signed a free agent contract with the New York Jets following the season.

Robinson came to Tech in 2002, reuniting with Tech head coach Chan Gailey, for whom he played at Troy State and worked as an assistant coach with the Dallas Cowboys.

In 2002, Robinson worked with standout receivers Kerry Watkins and Will Glover, who both finished among the top five receivers in Georgia Tech history. Watkins earned all-ACC honors.

Robinson spent the 2001 season as the running backs coach






at Oklahoma State after serving three years as an offensive assistant with the NFL's Cowboys, working with wide receivers and special teams.

Smith has strong ties to the state of Georgia. A native of the Atlanta suburb of Mableton, he attended Pebblebrook High School and then played and coached at Georgia Southern.

A 1991 graduate of Georgia Southern, Smith was a member of three NCAA I-AA national championship teams at the school in 1986, 1989 and 1990. A three-time all-America defensive end, he helped the Eagles to a perfect 15-0 mark in 1989, and as a senior in 1990, he served as team captain.

He later spent three seasons at his alma mater, working with the wide receivers in 1996 and then the secondary in 1997-98. During his time on the staff, the Eagles won a pair of Southern Conference titles (1997-98) and advanced to the NCAA I-AA national championship game in 1998.





Smith began his coaching career in 1991 as a graduate assistant at Arkansas, where remained three years before moving to Georgia for two seasons.

Smith, 35, was inducted into the Georgia Southern University Athletic Hall of Fame in 2000. He is married to the former Jennifer Erickson.



JON TENUTA

Defensive Coordinator / Defensive Backs

ASSISTANT COACHES

3rd Year at Tech

ntering his third season as Georgia Tech's defensive coordinator, Jon Tenuta has brought to the Rambling Wreck an aggressive, attacking scheme, forged in his 23 years of experience as a defensive coach.

He also coaches the Yellow Jackets' defensive backs.

Tenuta's defensive unit performed very well in 2003, particularly in victories over bowl-bound Auburn (three points, 230 total yards allowed) and Maryland (three points, 253 yards) and a one-point loss to ACC champion Florida State (251 yards). Tech led the ACC and ranked 12th in the nation in rushing defense while ranking 20th nationally in total defense and 27th in scoring defense.

Under Tenuta, the Tech defense featured three first-team all-ACC selections in linebacker Keyaron Fox, who led the league in tackles, defensive end Eric Henderson, who stood atop the ACC in sacks, and free safety James Butler, who was second in the ACC in interceptions while becoming a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back. Linebacker Daryl Smith and defensive tackle Travis Parker were honorable mention all-ACC picks. Smith (second round) and Fox (third round) were selected in the 2004 NFL draft.

Two Tech defenders also earned all-ACC honors in 2002 in free safety Jeremy Muyres and linebacker Recardo Wimbush.

Tenuta came to Tech in 2002 after one season at North Carolina, which he guided to become the top-rated defense statistically in the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2001. Under Tenuta, the Tar Heels led the ACC in total defense and pass defense while ranking third in run defense and scoring defense. Two members of that defense were first-round picks in the 2002 NFL draft.



Tenuta has previously served as a defensive coordinator at five other schools, including Marshall (1987), Kansas State (1988), SMU (1990-94), Ohio State (2000) and North Carolina (2001).

He has helped develop several defensive backs into NFL players, including first-round draft picks Shawn Springs, Antoine Winfield, Ahmed Plummer and Nate Clements from Ohio State. Springs was the 1996 Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and a first-team all-America, while Winfield won the 1998 Jim Thorpe Award.

Ohio State's pass defense was consistently ranked among the nation's best during Tenuta's tenure.

Tenuta began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Virginia (1981-82) and Maryland (1983), and then served as an assistant coach at Vanderbilt (1984-85), Marshall (1986-87), Kansas State (1988), SMU (1989-94) and Oklahoma (1995). At SMU, Tenuta was the defensive backs coach in 1989 before being promoted to defensive coordinator in 1990. At Ohio State, he was the defensive backs coach from 1996-1999 before being elevated to the defensive coordinator post in 2000.

A native of Columbus, Ohio, Tenuta is a graduate of Virginia. He lettered three years as a defensive back for the Cavaliers and earned the team's John Acree Memorial Football Trophy and Kevin Bowie Award.

Tenuta and his wife Dori have three sons, Zach, Matt and Luke.





DAVID WILSON

Special Teams / Recruiting Coordinator

3rd Year at Tech

avid Wilson is in his third year at Georgia Tech but his second on the coaching staff as special teams coach and recruiting coordinator.


ASSISTANT COACHES

Tech's special teams made several big plays last fall, including a blocked punt for a touchdown, two blocked field goals and two punt returns for touchdowns. Jonathan Smith led the ACC in punt return average.

Wilson came to Tech in 2002 and spent one year as the Yellow Jackets' Director of Football Operations before moving to a coaching position.

Wilson joined the Tech staff after five years at Mississippi State, including the last year as the Bulldogs' Coordinator of Football Operations. 
Wilson served two one-year stints at Florida State in 1996 and



utch Brooks, a member of the Georgia Tech athletics staff since 1998, was named director of football operations in February of 2003.

Brooks, 57, came to Tech in 1998 as director of high school relations after spending 18 years as head football coach, athletics director and head golf coach at Washington-Wilkes High School in Washington, Ga. During that time he compiled a football record of 144-55, a .723 winning percentage, earning berths in the state football playoffs in 13 of his last 17 seasons at Washington-Wilkes.

In 1985, he was named the Atlanta Touchdown Club AA Coach of the Year, and in both 1991 and 1997, he was named the state AA Athletic Director of the Year.

During his time at Washington-Wilkes he coached the football team to six region championships and four appearances in the state championships while leading his golf teams to eight region titles.

Prior to his tenure at Washington-Wilkes, Brooks spent nine years (1971-80) as an assistant football coach and six years (1974-

80) as head baseball coach at Valdosta High School. While head of Valdosta's baseball program, he was named coach of the year in Georgia in 1977 and 1978 and led the team to four regional championships and the state AAA title in 1978. His overall baseball coaching record was 127-33, a .793 winning percentage.

Brooks is a native of Whiteville, N.C. and is a 1972 graduate of Valdosta State University, where he later earned a master's in Administration and Supervision.

He is married to the former Kathy Zelenka of Pascagoula, Miss., and the couple has three children, Rookie Gage, Farrah Sinclair, and Laura Norton, and four grandchildren.

BOB GRIFFITH

Director of Clinics, Camps & Events

B ob Griffith is in his second year as Georgia Tech's Director of Clinics, Camps and Events.

A long-time high school football coach in the state of Georgia with more than 200 victories, Griffith came to Tech in 2003 after four years (1999-2002) as head football coach and director of athletics at Appling County High School in Baxley, Ga. That was his second stint at Appling County, where he



also served as head football coach and head track coach from 1973-77.

He also spent 18 years (1981-98) as head coach and director of athletics at Effingham County High School in Springfield, Ga., following three years (1978-80) in the same position at Colquitt County High in Moultrie, Ga.

In his most recent stay at Appling County, Griffith led the school to the state playoffs all four years, including a berth in the state semifinals in 1999, and he was named Athletic Director of the Year in Region 2-AAA in 1999 and in Region 1-AAA in 2002. His tour at Effingham County was highlighted by an appearance in the state championship game in 1987.

He entered the Georgia high school ranks in 1970 as an assistant coach at Northside High School in Warner Robins.

GEORGIA TECH

Shaped by the work of generations into one of the nation's most prominent public universities, the Georgia Institute of Technology has entered an unprecedented time of opportunity for innovation and leadership.



U.S. News & World Report ranks Georgia Tech among the nation's top ten public universities and its College of Engineering among the top five programs.

Shaped by the work of generations into one of the nation's most prominent public universities, the Georgia Institute of Technology has entered an unprecedented time of opportunity for innovation and leadership. "Although technology may have helped create many of the global problems we face, technology is also essential to many of the solutions," says President G. Wayne Clough. "The world needs scientists and engineers who understand the social and political implications of the technology they create. It needs management strategies, public policies, and structures that put technologies to positive, effective use."

Georgia Tech's goal is to become a source of the innovation that creates a sustainable, prosperous future for the Earth's inhabitants, and there are many signs that the Institute is on the fast track. U.S. News & World Report ranks Tech among the nation's top ten public universities and its College of Engineering among the top five programs.

Factors like strong national rankings, a rigorous curriculum, a world-renowned faculty, and endowed scholarships enable the Institute to recruit outstanding students. Admission test scores and grade point averages are among the highest at the nation's public universities. Over the past two years Tech students have won virtually all of the world's most prestigious scholarships, including the Rhodes, Fulbright, British Marshall, Churchill, Truman, Gates Cambridge, and Goldwater scholarships.

As the caliber of its students has increased, the Institute has worked deliberately to strengthen and improve the undergraduate experience. At many major universities, research takes priority over teaching. However, Georgia Tech views itself as a community of learners, all engaged together in the discovery of knowledge. All faculty, even senior eminent scholars, are directly engaged with undergraduates in an effort to offer them the best of both worlds: the attention to quality teaching of a liberal arts college and the exciting dynamics of discovery in the research lab.

The faculty is also achieving new levels of excellence, and 54 new faculty chairs endowed by the Campaign for Georgia Tech are enabling the Institute to attract some of the brightest minds in science and technology. Young faculty won 11 CAREER Awards from the National Science Foundation during the past year, bringing the total number of CAREER Award winners on the Tech faculty to 83, second highest in the nation. Senior faculty also continue to win awards, many of them the highest honors offered in their fields.

Diversity is the key to creative thinking, innovation, and problem solving in a global environment, and Georgia Tech is the national leader in graduating African American and Hispanic engineers. In 2002 the Institute marked the 50th anniversary of the enrollment of women, and Tech also leads the nation in number of engineering degrees awarded to females.

The Institute opened its doors in 1888 with 129 students-all



white males, all but one from Georgia. Today, Tech's enrollment of more than 16,500 includes students from all 50 states and more than 2,900 international students from over 137 countries. Female enrollment has grown from two in 1952, when the first women students were admitted, to nearly 4,500, and minority enrollment is nearly 6,000.

Since 1888, when only a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering was offered, Tech's academic programs have expanded to include six world-class colleges: Architecture, Computing, Engineering, Liberal Arts, Management, and Sciences. Tech now offers degrees in 31 undergraduate programs, 51 master's degrees and 29 doctoral degree programs.

While most Tech students pursue their studies in Atlanta, a growing number earn degrees without ever setting foot on the Midtown campus. GT Lorraine, Tech's campus in Metz, France, enrolls 240 graduate students and offers an undergraduate degree program during the summer. Georgia Tech degrees can be earned in Singapore through a partnership with the National University of Singapore, and in southeast Georgia, where more than 450 students are enrolled at the newly constructed Georgia Tech-Savannah campus, home to the Georgia Tech Regional Engineering Program. Other students earn master's degrees in engineering over the Internet through programs designed specifically for online delivery.

Another aspect of Georgia Tech's enlarged vision is reflected in the Institute's increasing involvement in national policy discussions. Beyond creating new technology, Tech seeks to put it to work in responsible ways to promote a sustainable quality of life for all people. This effort to place technology in its broader societal context begins with President Clough, who serves on President Bush's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology and the executive committee of the U.S. Council on Competitiveness, and extends to faculty members like Aris Georgakakos, whose computerized monitoring system for the Nile River is designed to guide the nations through which it flows in making responsible policy decisions about water usage.

More than a century ago, Georgia Tech shops produced castings, fittings, and gears for industry. Today Tech helps industries with the innovation that will keep them competitive in the new knowledge economy of the 21st century. Georgia Tech ranks among the nation's top universities in the percentage of research it conducts with industry and is considered the nation's best at transferring new technology from the research lab into practical applications and commercial products. "We are moving rapidly in our quest to become a leader that others want to emulate, but our success will come from balancing that quest with a steadfast commitment to the core values and traditions that have made Georgia Tech great."

To shape a campus worthy of its aspirations, Georgia Tech continues not only to build innovative state-of-the-art facilities, but also to gather related programs in strategicallv located interdisciplinary "neighborhoods" in a sustainable, "living" campus. Georgia Tech's new Technology Square, which opened in 2003, is a lively, mixed use development that extends the campus right into the middle of the Midtown Atlanta business community. The complex is home to the new Management Building with executive education and interdisciplinary centers: the 252-room Georgia Tech Hotel and Conference Center; and the Global Learning Center, which offers on-site professional education programs and distance learning facilities that connect Georgia Tech to the world. It also includes research centers and labs, as well as several retail outlets, most notably Barnes and Noble at Georgia Tech.

Closer to the heart of campus in the new Biotechnology Technology Complex, the Ford Environmental Science and Technology Building, the largest academic structure in Tech history, has opened along with the new the U.A. Whitaker Biomedical Engineering Building. Toward the western end of campus where many residence halls are located, is the new Campus Recreation Center, which features a new main gym, weight room and cardio fitness area as well as the Olympic Aquatic Center. Next door in the new Joseph B. Whitehead Building,

OLYMPIC GAMES LEGACY

Georgia Tech's role as the site for the Olympic village in 1996, as well as venues for boxing and aquatics, provided a unique opportunity to showcase the Institute to the entire world.

nd Georgia Tech did just that, with thousands of news reports about the Institute broadcast or published around the United States and throughout the world. From its unique role as host of the Olympic village, to studies of the impact of sports drinks on Olympic athletes, to the analysis of world class divers from the 10-meter platform, Georgia Tech was spotlighted around the world.

The centerpiece of Georgia Tech's Olympic efforts was the Olympic Village. The majority of the more than 10,000 Olympic athletes were housed on the Tech campus during the Games. In preparation, Tech's housing facilities underwent a \$170 million facelift that resulted in the construction of 4,700 new student beds.

The new housing features apartment-style accommodations with private bathroom, kitchen and sitting area in each suite. New facilities include the Undergraduate Living Center, Graduate Living Center, Eighth Street Apartments, Sixth Street Apartments, Center Street Apartments, Hemphill Apartments and Fourth Street Apartments, as well as the University Apartments, now used by Georgia State University. Existing housing facilities were also renovated for the Games.

FutureNet, the largest fiber optic cable system on any college campus in the country is being used to supplement teaching, tap the Internet, and improve electronic delivery of information.

The Georgia Tech Plaza was constructed

on the Tech campus to provide recreational and social activities for the athletes. The seven-acre plaza is located at the heart of campus and includes the Alumni Fountain, a 150-foot tall campanile, a 300-seat amphitheater and a large lawn area to accommodate outdoor events.

Olympic competition was held on the Tech campus in boxing and aquatic events, which included swimming, diving, synchronized swimming, water polo and the swimming portion of modern pentathlon. These events featured nearly 1,500 athletes competing in 50 medal events.

To host the aquatic events, a new state-ofthe art natatorium was constructed on the west side of campus. Located adjacent to the Callaway Student Athletic Complex (SAC), the Georgia Tech Aquatic Center was officially dedicated August 1, 1995, at a cost of \$21 million, funded entirely by ACOG. The facility was covered but open-air for the Games, seating 14,000 and providing a dramatic setting for the competition.

Tech now reaps the benefits of a worldclass aquatic facility capable of hosting major competitions. Opening in 2003 is a new student recreation center surrounding and enclosing the swimming facility.

Tech's prominent role in the Olympics enabled the Athletic Association to upgrade practically every one of its major facilities in a very short period of time.

Boxing was held on campus in the re-

created Alexander Memorial Coliseum at McDonald's Center, the home of Georgia Tech basketball. Tech's historic arena, built in 1956, reopened on Jan. 21, 1996, after undergoing a nine-month, \$13-million facelift that upgraded virtually every aspect of the interior and exterior. The result is a modern, first-class arena that seats 10,000 while preserving the intimacy and tradition of the "Thrillerdome."

Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field was not used for Olympics competition, but Tech's football facility provided a meeting and recreational area in the Village.

Also completed in time for the Olympics was the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance, a unique facility that offers athletes the latest technology to improve performance levels. Olympic athletes were treated in Georgia Tech's main training facility on the ground floor of the Center for Sports Performance.

TECH TRADITION

It was September 30, 1961. The opponent was Rice University for the home opener. For the first time, the official Rambling Wreck car was unveiled to 43,501 fans at Grant Field, leading the Georgia Tech football team onto the field. It has happened at every home game since.

he event did not establish a new tradition at Georgia Tech, but it cemented one. The vehicle, a restored 1930 Model A Ford Sport Coupe, was Tech's first official Rambling Wreck car.

Since that time, the Rambling Wreck car has joined a much older tradition—the Yellow Jacket—as an official school mascot.

The current Wreck is the latest in a line of distinctive white and gold cars on campus. Before the official Rambling Wreck appeared in 1961, several fraternities took turns driving such vehicles.

The first reference to a Rambling Wreck was applied to a 1914 Ford owned by Floyd Field, Dean of Men. The Technique student newspaper was the first published reference to the car as the "Rambling Wreck" in 1927. The paper spoke out against Field when he considered trading the car that year, but he disposed of it anyway.

The Technique maintained the tradition by sponsoring a yearly collegiate auto race from Atlanta to Athens, beginning in 1929, known as the "Old Ford" race or the "Flying Flivver" race. As the years went by, though, the race became too dangerous, and it was discontinued.

In its place, the school instituted the familiar Rambling Wreck Parade, which is still held every year during Homecoming Weekend. The event challenges students to produce outlandish "mechanical monstrosities" capable of traversing a short course on campus.

Tech officials decided in the late 1950s that the school needed an official car that would be known forever as the Rambling Wreck. Vice President and Dean of Students James Dull began a search for a pre-1940 vintage model, and finally found one—parked in front of his apartment building. The owner, Capt. Ted J. Johnson, a Delta Air Lines pilot, had just finished restoring the 1930 Ford Cabriolet Sport Coupe, which he intended to give to his son as a gift.

Johnson decided to let Tech have the car for \$1,000 in May, 1961. He later returned the purchase price of the Wreck to the Athletic Association in the form of a contribution to the Alexander-Tharpe Fund, fulfilling a desire to go on record as having given the Rambling Wreck to Georgia Tech.

The Wreck was completely restored again in 1982, under the supervision of Tech alumnus Pete George, manager of the Ford assembly plant in Hapeville, Ga.



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I'm a Ramblin' Wreck from Georgia Tech

t is doubtful that anything has ever meant as much to an American college as has this Georgia Tech fight song, a curious mixture of words and music that grew out of an old folk ballad, "The Sons of the Gamboliers." Since the early 1900s, it has been one of the most important vehicles in making Tech's name known around the world and in the development of the school as one of the most cosmopolitan institutions of higher learning in America.

Howard D. Cutter, a member of the first four-year graduating class who earned his mechanical engineering degree in 1892, wrote in the November-December 1942 issue of the Georgia Tech Alumnus that the "Ramblin' Wreck" had its beginnings during the first two years after Tech opened in 1888, inspired when almost the entire student body traveled to Athens to see Tech's baseball team defeat Georgia.

By the early 1900s, "Ramblin' Wreck" was an established tradition. The earliest existing published version of the song appeared in the Blueprint, the Institute's yearbook, in 1908.

In 1910, Michael A. Greenblatt, Tech's first bandmaster, discovered the band playing "Ramblin' Wreck" to the tune of "Sons of the Gamboliers," and made his first arrangement of the song in the form of a handwritten manuscript.

When Frank Roman succeeded Greenblatt as bandmaster in 1911, he wrote a new adaptation of "Ramblin' Wreck," accompanied by many trumpet flourishes, that was played by every name band in the country and became nationally known on radio. His is the version that continues to be popular today.

The fame of the song spread to such proportions that in 1959 it was sung by Richard Nixon and Nikita Khrushchev at their historic face-to-face meeting in Moscow.

In 1984, the law firm of Newton, Hopkins & Ormsby investigated the copyright situation as it applied to "Ramblin' Wreck" and found that a number of people have had various versions of the song copyrighted. The original version of the song is in the public domain and can be played without the payment of royalties.

I'm a Ramblin' Wreck from Georgia Tech and a hell of an engineer, A helluva, helluva, helluva, hell of an engineer, Like all the jolly good fellows, I drink my whiskey clear, I'm a Ramblin' Wreck from Georgia Tech and a hell of an engineer. Oh, if I had a daughter, sir, I'd dress her in White and Gold, And put her on the campus, to cheer the brave and bold. But if I had a son, sir, I'll tell you what he'd do. He would yell, "To Hell with Georgia," like his daddy used to do.

Oh, I wish I had a barrel of rum and sugar three thousand pounds, A college bell to put it in and a clapper to stir it around. I'd drink to all good fellows who come from far and near. I'm a ramblin', gamblin', hell of an engineer.

TECH TRADITION

White & Gold

n the fall of 1891, before Georgia Tech organized a football team of its own, a game was scheduled between Auburn and Georgia. Due to the rivalry established in baseball games between Tech and Georgia, the Tech students were invited to the game to cheer, of course, for Auburn.

The students appointed a committee to recommend colors to be worn and cheers to be used at the game. The committee suggested white and gold, and about 200 students attended the game wearing those colors for the first time.

In 1893, when Tech's football team played Georgia for the first time, a group of young women from the Lucy Cobb Institute for Girls, dressed in white and gold, attended the game to cheer for Tech. These ladies were some of the earliest Tech supporters to show their allegiance by wearing white and gold.

Oh well it's up with the White and Gold Down with the Red and Black Georgia Tech is out for the victory We'll drop the battle axe on Georgia's head When we meet her, our team is sure to beat her Down on the old farm there will be no sound Till our bow-wows rip through the air When the battle is over, Georgia's team will be found With the Yellow Jackets swarming around.

Rat Caps

Tech has several customs especially created for its freshman class members. One of the oldest freshman traditions, wearing Tech's goldcolored rat cap, originated with the ANAK society in 1915. The term rat, originally used for first-year military students, gradually expanded to include all freshmen.

The rat cap has been a distinctive symbol of membership in Tech's freshman class. Freshmen are to decorate their rat caps by writing winning football scores upright, losing scores upside down, and tie scores sideways. Co-ops circle the top button.

George P. Burdell

n 1927, a Tech tradition began when a mythical student named George P. Burdell appeared on class rosters, registration forms and grade reports, and he has since become one of Tech's most notable students.


The most accurate accounts claim that Burdell was the creation of student Ed Smith. While completing an application form, Smith was struck

with the impish idea of enrolling a nonexistent student. He even turned in separate exam papers for Burdell, convincing professors that George was a student in good standing. Burdell received a bachelor's degree from Tech and later a master's degree.

Since Smith's graduation, other students have kept George P. Burdell alive. In the spring of 1969, the first quarter that Tech used completely computerized registration, George beat the system by registering for every course the school offered—more than 3,000 credit hours.

Today, members of the Tech band delight in having George P. Burdell paged in opposing stadia.





The Yellow Jacket

The Yellow Jacket nickname and mascot are two of the most beloved trademarks of Georgia Tech athletic teams, but many conflicting accounts exist as to the origins and beginnings of the Yellow Jacket.

One thing that is clear, however, is that the nickname did not grow out of the familiar six-legged insect, but that the insect mascot, known as "Buzz," grew out of the nickname. As far as can be determined, the first reference to Tech students as "Yellowjackets" appeared in the *Atlanta Constitution* in 1905 and came into common usage at that time.

Historians say the name, spelled as one word, was first used to describe supporters who attended Tech athletic events, dressed in yellow coats and jackets. The actual mascot was conceived at a later date, still undetermined.

Other nicknames which have applied to Georgia Tech teams include Engineers; the Tecks, the first known nickname which was phased out around 1910; and the Blacksmiths, which was common between 1902 and 1904 and is thought to be an invention of sportswriters at the time.

The Golden Tornado is another former nickname thought to be created by sportswriters when John Heisman led Tech to its first national

championship in football in 1917. Any Tech team thereafter which approached the same level of excellence was referred to as the Golden Tornado. The nickname was used as late as 1929, when Tech defeated California in the Rose Bowl.

Georgia Tech



Georgia Tech's storied football facility has been a cornerstone of college football for 90 years. Cozily nestled among Atlanta's skyscrapers, Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field is easily one of the nation's most unique settings for college football.

riginally built in 1913 by members of the Georgia Tech student body, Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field is the oldest on-campus stadium in NCAA Division I-A, but the venerable stadium has added another chapter to its storied history with a new look and an expanded capacity.

Completed in 2003, a two-year expansion and renovation raised capacity to 55,000 seats and added numerous amenities. The \$75 million endeavor included the expansion and renovation of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field and the rebuilt Russ Chandler Stadium, Tech's 4,157-seat baseball facility.

The focal point of the project was the new North end zone structure, which seats 15,678 in two levels and also includes 10 luxury suites as well as the Howard Ector Letterwinners Lounge. The North end zone also features a new 7,000-square foot locker room, a 3,300-square players' lounge and media area, and football coaches' offices that overlook the playing field.

In addition to the rebuilt seating area, the new lower East structure features 20 executive suites as well as 2,040 chairbacked club seats between the 25-yard lines and a private air-conditioned lounge for those patrons. The popular upper East stands remain in place with cosmetic improvements.

At the South end of Bobby Dodd Stadium, 2,970 seats were added in front of the Wardlaw Building, providing seating in the South end zone for the first time since 1985. The new South end zone seating and the lower levels of the East and North stands form a three-sided bowl.

Construction began following the 2001 season, with the first phase completed for the 2002 season, when capacity was 43,719. The first phase saw the completion of the lower bowl seating in the South, East and North areas of the stadium.

Also as part of phase one, a new natural grass playing surface and drainage system was installed, and the field was shifted approximately 30 feet to the north and 15 feet to the west.

Program management was provided by Carter/Turner, a joint venture of Carter & Associates and Turner Construction, while HOK Sport was the project's architect.

Georgia Tech's football facility was known as Grant Field until April of 1988, when the Georgia State Board of Regents voted to add the name Bobby Dodd Stadium in honor of the legendary coach who guided the Rambling Wreck to its most illustrious football era. The "Gray Fox," a member of the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame, compiled a 165-64-8 record from 1945-66, and tutored 21 all-Americas as he led Tech to 13 bowl trips during his 22-year stay as head coach.

Dodd served as Tech's director of athletics from 1951-76 and then worked as a consultant for the alumni association until his death in 1988 for a 57-year association with the Institute.

The name change was the first for the facility since it was named Hugh Inman Grant Field in 1914 after a gift from John W. Grant, a member of the Tech Board of Trustees and a well-known Atlanta merchant

The Grant family did not give the land on which Grant Field is built. However, they did give the initial \$15,000 used in 1913 to build the first permanent concrete stands on the west side of the field. In gratitude for the gift, the Board of Trustees named the field Hugh Inman Grant Field in memory of Grant's deceased son.



The students who built Grant Field 90 years ago wouldn't recognize the home of Georgia Tech football if they saw it now. Not only has the skyline around the stadium changed dramatically, but the facility has steadily grown and improved during its rich history.

The original concrete West Stands were largely built by Tech students and seated 5,600. The concrete East Stands were completed in time for the 1924 season. A year later, the South Stands were finished, bringing the seating capacity to approximately 30,000.

Growth of the stadium has been steady through the years. In 1948, the West Stands were rebuilt, which raised the capacity to 40,000, and a new press box, then the largest in the South, was constructed. The all-steel North Stands were erected in 1958 to bring the seating to 44,105.

A second deck was added to the East side in 1962, increasing the stadium capacity to 53,300. The facility was expanded again in 1967, when the West Stands were double-decked to bring capacity to its high of 58,121. That project also included new press and photo levels, including an elevator. New scoreboards were added prior to the 1982 season.

Following the 1985 seasons, the historic South Stands, which formed the familiar Ushape on North Avenue, were razed. In their place is the William C. Wardlaw Center, a multi-purpose facility for Georgia Tech's athletic and academic departments that was opened for the 1988 season. Seating capacity was reduced to 46,000.

A major renovation of the stadium was completed prior to the 1992 season with the construction of the Bill Moore Student Success Center behind the West Stands, as well as the addition of 32 executive suites and the renovation of the President's Box and press level.

This project also included the Roy Richards Festival under the West Stands, a unique concession and concourse area modeled after the design of Underground Atlanta. The Georgia Tech Letterwinners Club was housed on the Terrace Level of the Richards Festival before moving in 2003 to the North end zone.

Natural grass returned to Grant Field in 1995 after 24 seasons with artificial turf. The field was originally surfaced with Astroturf in 1971 and resurfaced in 1979, and then new artificial All-Pro Turf was installed in 1988.

Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field is located at the heart of the Georgia Tech campus on Techwood Drive, bordered by North Avenue on the south and Bobby Dodd Way on the north.

Tech has hosted numerous crowds which have exceeded capacity, the largest of which was the 60,316 spectators for the Georgia game in 1973.




WARDLAW CENTER

One of the cornerstones of the Georgia Tech campus, the William C. Wardlaw Center in the South end zone of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field serves many purposes for Rambling Wreck athletics and the Institute.

ntil the conclusion of the 1985 football season, the South end of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field was enclosed by a 12,000-seat grandstand. The familiar U-shaped South Stands, originally built in 1925, were torn down following Tech's seasonending victory over Georgia to make room for the Wardlaw Center, a multi-million dollar facility that was completed for the 1988 football season.

The Wardlaw Center took on a new look beginning in 2002 with the addition of approximately 3,000 seats in the South end zone of Bobby Dodd Stadium.

The 70,000 square-foot, six-level, multi-use facility was built at a cost of \$12 million. Work on the project began in the summer of 1986, after the South Stands were razed in March of 1986.





ID BOB

The Wardlaw Center serves as the gateway for the campus at North Avenue. The building is dedicated to 1928 Tech alumnus William C. Wardlaw, Jr., a long-time associate of the Georgia Tech Athletic Association as a member of the Athletic and Alexander-Tharpe Fund boards. He was also the past president of the Investment Committee of the Georgia Tech Foundation.

The ground floor of the building houses the Hugh Spruill Strength and Fitness Center, widely regarded as one of the top facilities of its kind in collegiate athletics. A locker room for visiting football teams is in the same area.

> Television and photography studios are also located on the ground floor, while two levels of parking occupy the second and third floors.

> The fourth floor, entered through an attractive plaza on North Avenue, houses the Georgia Tech Foundation offices along with the Frank Gordy Room, a large banquet facility. On this level, large windows and a terrace along the back side of the building allow guests to look out on Grant Field.

The fifth floor houses several Georgia Tech departments while the sixth level is divided into 12 luxurious suites for viewing Rambling Wreck football.


BILL MOORE STUDENT SUCCESS CENTER



The Bill Moore Student Success Center is a unique facility that serves both Georgia Tech's academic and athletics needs and is utilized by the Tech community throughout the entire year. This project is a joint effort between Academics and Athletics, which joined hands to bring Georgia Tech a world-class, multipleuse facility that gives the Institute the best of both worlds. Tech officials say that to the best of their knowledge, the integration of the Student Success Center and existing and renovated athletic facilities was the first of its kind.

Part of an extensive stadium renovation completed in the fall of 1992, the Bill Moore Student Success Center was built on the site of what was the Knowles Building on the west side of Bobby Dodd Stadium. The building now forms an attractive entrance plaza into the stadium.

The Student Success Center, which opened in January of 1993, houses Georgia Tech's departments of Admissions, Student Recruiting, Student Financial Services and several activities of the Placement Center, providing a centralized location for prospective students as well as those already enrolled at the Institute. Another key feature is the Eugene M. Clary Theater.



THE BELL NOOKE STUDENT SUCCESS CENTER

The Bill Moore Student Success Center is the focal point of Phase II of the renovation of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field, which also included a new look for the West stands. Thirty- two enclosed suites were added to the West Stands prior to the 1992 season. The President's Suite was expanded and refurbished and integrated directly into the Success Center so that it COULD be used for numerous functions.


The Richards Festival concourse area under the West Stands connects Bobby Dodd Stadium to the Student Success Center.

HUGH SPRUILL STRENGTH CENTER

Outstanding Facility & Programs Help Student-Athletes Reach Their Potential

n integral component in Georgia Tech's 17-sport athletic family is the strength and conditioning program, and the most visible sign of Tech's commitment in this area is the Hugh Spruill Strength Center, one of the finest facilities in the nation.



It houses the finest free weight and machine equipment, custom-designed and

built to the needs of the strength and conditioning staff

conditioning staff. In addition to the weight equipment, a u d i o - v i s u a l instruments have been incorporated to assist in technique instruction, and a computer system assists in handling data and developing weight programs.

A 3,000-square foot exercise room is also a part of the complex, complete with an Astroturf surface for plyomet-ric, flexibility and agility drills.


Director of Player Development Eric Ciano is in his first season at Georgia Tech.

The strength and conditioning staff also includes Damon Harrington, Scott McDonald, Eddie Lee Ivery, Steve Tamborra, Neal Peduzzi and Melissa Moore.

The facility, which was recently remodeled, contains a tribute to the late Dave Pasanella, Tech's former Director of Player Development and a Rambling Wreck letterman in 1983-84. The "Strongest Man in the World" and the holder of 14 world weightlifting records, Pasanella died tragically in an automobile accident in 1990.

The aim of the strength program is to aid the student-athlete's performance by improving his strength and conditioning level, thus allowing him to better perform particular sports skills.

"Strength and conditioning is as important as any sport we have at Georgia Tech," says Director of Athletics Dave Braine.

The Andrew Hearn, Sr., Center is the model academic setting in Georgia Tech's commitment to helping each student-athlete earn a degree.

onveniently located on the third floor of the Edge Athletics Center, the Hearn Center houses staff offices and facilities to support the academic endeavors of Tech student-athletes. The academic support unit includes seven advisors who are available throughout the day and evenings until 10 p.m.

The academic support program is under the direction of Jim Stevens, Director of Academic Services, a Georgia Tech graduate who lettered in football and basketball, a U.S. Air Force veteran and a former member of the Tech faculty. The staff includes associate directors Cedric Stallworth and Troy Peace, assistant director Tonya Simpson and academic advisors Lynn Houston, Shane Olivett, Kristina Wilhelm, Robert Smith and Trudy Wheeler.

The Hearn Center, which originally opened in 1984, underwent a major renovation in 1995 and now includes over 5,000 square feet of open and self-contained work area. Eighteen rooms of varying sizes flank a glass enclosed computer cluster that contains both Macintosh and IBM-compatible hardware, Internet access and laser printers. A smaller computer room is available for tutoring courses that require computing or software to enhance learning. Hardware and software are continuously updated.

The staff of the Hearn Center coordinate scholarships, academic awards and honors for student-athletes. Assistance with graduate school applications and degree completion programs is also provided.

Study and tutoring rooms vary in size and offer secluded environments in which to work. Tutoring for classes ranging from calculus to advanced engineering courses is scheduled nightly, Sunday through Thursday.

The Hearn Academic Center, staff and programs offer the finest and most innovative educational advantages in the country. Student-athletes are provided a convenient place to study, access computers, and meet with tutors and advisors.



DEGREE COMPLETION

One day the cheers from the stands will stop, but the support for Rambling Wreck student-athletes continues in the form of Georgia Tech's degree completion program.

Georgia Tech offers its studentathletes one of the most comprehensive academic support systems in the country. Academic support is available until a diploma is attained through Georgia Tech's degree completion program. This program allows former studentathletes to continue toward their degrees after they have completed their athletic eligibility or left Tech for professional athletics.

Former Tech athletes who have returned to school through the program and earned their degrees include NFL veterans such as Eddie Lee Ivery, Pat Swilling, Al Richardson, Gary Lee, William Bell, Ryan Stewart, as well as NBA standouts John Salley and Tom Hammonds and major league baseball player Riccardo Ingram.

The program provides for 100 percent reimbursement of academic costs upon earning a passing grade in courses required for graduation. In exchange for financial support, the students work as interns in the Athletic Association, thereby gaining valuable work experience.

HOMER RICE CENTER FOR SPORTS PERFORMANCE

FACILITIES

In an effort to keep the Georgia Tech program at the forefront of collegiate athletics and carry the Rambling Wreck into the 21st century, the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance, a unique facility for testing and improving athletic performance, opened in 1996.

ocated at the north end of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field, the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance is comprised of six sports performance clinics which occupy 44,000 square feet of the Arthur B. Edge Intercollegiate Athletics Center at the J.C. "Bud" Shaw Sports Complex. The \$8 million facility also includes the Howard Candler, Jr., Football Conference Center and the George Mathews Athletic Heritage Center, a museum of Tech's rich athletics history.

The Center is in partnership with the Institute to establish a research and development entity focused on the studies of human movement. The Center's efforts concentrate on performance enhancement for student-athletes participating in the sports programs of the Georgia Tech Athletic Association with services also available for Tech students, faculty and staff.

"The Sports Performance Center and the programs it encompasses will take us to the next level to provide our student-athletes with total development—academically, athletically, professionally and personally," said Rice, who retired in 1997 after 17 years as Tech's Director of Athletics.

The Center, under the direction of Rob Skinner, utilizes the philosophy that goals must first be defined before they can be reached. To accomplish this, a staff of highly trained specialists uses the latest in sports and medical technology to measure and record the current status of the athlete's physical and mental condition. The measurement data from each of the six performance clinics is combined to construct a comprehensive "performance profile" of the athlete. This detailed blueprint of each athlete's individual potential provides a specific starting point to customize and implement strategic goals as well as an optimum training regimen for reaching them.

The facility currently focuses on six areas related to performance: sports physiology, nutrition, sports medicine, psychology, motion analysis and vision.

The ground floor houses the Sports Medicine, Sports Physiology and Vision departments, while the second floor contains areas for Sports Psychology and Motion Analysis. Nutrition is located adjacent to the athletic dining hall in the Edge Center.



THE BOD POD is used to analyze an athlete's body composition.

The Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance focuses on the following six areas related to athletic performance:

Sports Physiology

An athlete's undeveloped potential will be assessed by determining aerobic and anaerobic capacity, specific power outputs, biochemical profile, body composition and specific exercise tolerance levels. The optimum training regimen can now be established according to the current conditioning capacity of the athlete. Operated by Cardiology of Georgia, P.C., the medical clinic staff includes a sports cardiologist and an exercise scientist

Motion Analysis

Athletes can fine-tune skills by comparing their motion dynamics for optimum standards. Through the American Sports Performance Institute, the clinic is staffed by a biomechanist and a senior research engineer, who use high-speed, motioncapture equipment to assess human movement in terms of speed, position, timing and force.

Sports Rehabilitation

Injury prevention and rehabilitation are delivered to achieve complete recovery while maintaining optimum conditioning, ensuring that peak performance is regained as soon as possible. The clinic is staffed by a sports physical therapist, athletic trainers and a consulting sports medicine surgeon.



QUALITY CARE FOR STUDENT-ATHLETES

Georgia Tech's sports medicine department offers an experienced staff and the finest equipment and techniques available to care for Tech's student-athletes.

eorgia Tech offers a comprehensive quality care package. All 17 varsity sports fall under the jurisdiction of Director of Sports Medicine Jay Shoop and his staff.

Shoop has more than 30 years of experience in athletic training at the collegiate and professional levels. His staff includes assistant athletic trainers Clay Farr, Tim Hansen, Josephine Lee, Carla Gilson,



Sports Psychology

By applying mental performance techniques to the "whole person," the sports psychology clinic, anchored by a sports psychologist, assists the athlete in opening a clear mental pathway for enhancing concentration and confidence.

Sports Nutrition

A personal plan is developed based upon a comprehensive computerized nutrition analysis and is supported by nutritional counseling. Body composition analysis and biochemical profile results from the Sports Physiology Clinic are used to address nutritional needs. The staff includes a registered dietitian as director, and a consulting nutritionist and nutrition scientist.

Vision


The latest addition to the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance is the Sports Vision Center. Through a partnership with Dr. Barry L. Seiller, M.D. of the Vision Institute of Vernon Hills, III., and CIBA Vision, student-athletes are provided with on-site vision testing, vision correction and vision training. David Kloehs and Walter Smith and physical therapist Charlie Ridgeway. They are assisted by 12 or more student trainers.

Student-athletes are treated by team physicians Dr. Angelo Galante and Dr. Frank Pickens; Dr. John Xerogeanes, the team physician for orthopedics; and Dr. Aaron King, the team dentist who fits each football player with a custom-made mouthpiece. These specialists attend practices and games and are on call for all sports. Along with the Student Health Service on campus, Atlanta offers a number of facilities available 24 hours a day for emergency care, most within blocks of the Tech campus.

Headquartered on the ground floor of the Arthur B. Edge Center, Tech's sports medicine department moved into an expanded and improved facility in 1996 in conjunction with the opening of the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance. The training room now covers 5,000 square feet, housing the finest equipment available for the prevention, treatment and rehabilitation of athletic injuries.

The latest addition to the sports medicine department was the hydro-therapy area, which features an underwater treadmill and deep-water running and exercise tank. The facility also includes Cybex testing equipment for evaluating and rehabilitating joint and muscle injuries as well as many other state-of-the-art pieces of equipment.

Georgia Tech was one of the first institutions in the country to initiate a drug screening program for its athletes, a practice which has been followed by many other programs.



J.C. "BUD" SHAW SPORTS COMPLEX

Located at the corner of Techwood Drive and Bobby Dodd Way, the J.C. "Bud" Shaw Sports Complex houses one of the most complete athletics facilities in the nation, encompassing the Arthur B. Edge, Jr., Center, the home of the Georgia Tech Athletic Association and the Alexander-Tharpe Fund; the Andrew Hearn, Sr., Academic Center, the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance, the George W. Mathews, Jr., Athletic Heritage Center, the Howard Candler, Jr., Football Conference Center, and the new North End Zone complex that now houses the football program.

FACILITIES

A former Tech basketball player, J.C. "Bud" Shaw graduated from Georgia Tech in 1950 with a degree in Textile Engineering and has been affiliated with the textile industry since his graduation. He is currently Chairman of the Board Emeritus of Shaw Industries, the world's largest carpet manufacturer.

Landscaping for the J.C. Shaw Sports Complex was provided through the generosity of John A. Williams and Post Properties, Inc. Williams, founder and former Chairman of the Board of Post Properties, Inc., is a 1961 graduate of Georgia Tech in Industrial Management.







THE EDGE CENTER

The Arthur B. Edge, Jr., Intercollegiate Athletics Center is the headquarters for the Georgia Tech athletics family. The four-story, seven million dollar facility, which opened in February, 1982, is part of the J.C. "Bud" Shaw Sports Complex. The Edge Center contains more than 65,000 square feet of space and houses administrative offices, the Hearn Academic Center, training room, and dining hall, plus a number of other facilities.

Financed entirely by gifts and contributions from Georgia Tech alumni and friends, the Edge Center was dedicated on Oct 30, 1982. Since then, the facility has undergone several facelifts, most notably the addition of the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance in 1996.

The latest renovation in 1999 involved the move of the Georgia Tech Ticket Office, which is now accessible from street level on Bobby Dodd Way. Directly above the ticket office are the administrative offices of Director of Athletics Dave Braine and his senior staff.

Offices for various administrative departments and sports programs are located on the first floor. The dining hall is located on the second floor, which connects to the Howard Candler, Jr., Conference Center.

The Andrew Hearn, Sr., Academic Center comprises the majority of the third floor. Another feature is a chapel, displaying an etched glass mural of Tech athletes in a praying stance.

The ground floor of the Edge Center includes Tech's primary training room, which connects to the new North End Zone complex that houses the football offices and locker room.

Perhaps it is not what is in the Edge Center which makes it so unique, but the way the center houses it. A visitor can't help but be impressed upon entering the building through the entrance plaza to the first floor and seeing the lobby rise through the top floor to a glass atrium.

The lobby is decorated with the "Circle of Champions," honoring all of Tech's national championships, including four national football

FOOTBALL COMPLEX

The newest addition to the J.C. "Bud" Shaw Sports Complex is the new complex in the North end zone of Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field, which now houses the football program.

The ground floor of the two-story structure features a new locker room, equipment room and players' lounge. The locker room covers 7,000 square feet, while the players' lounge, which includes a media room, is 3,300 square feet.

The second floor is a new office suite for the football coaches' and staff that overlooks the playing field. On the third floor is the Howard Ector Letterwinners' Lounge.

titles. The "Circle of Champions" leads to the George W. Mathews, Jr., Athletic Heritage Center, a museum that chronicles Tech's rich athletics history. The Heritage Center is part of the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance, which was built as an extension to the Edge Center.

The Edge Center is named in honor of Arthur B. Edge, Jr., a prominent Tech alumnus and former president of Callaway Mills.



GEORGE W. MATHEWS, JR. ATHLETIC HERITAGE CENTER

Preserving and telling the story of Georgia Tech's rich athletic heritage for future generations of Yellow Jacket fans is the mission of the George W. Mathews, Jr., Athletic Heritage Center.

Located within the J.C. Shaw Sports Complex on the second floor of the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance, the Center chronicles Tech's history in all sports, with emphasis on the accomplishments of the football program. Static displays of trophies and memorabilia are augmented by video kiosks and interactive displays that bring to life Tech's storied athletic past.

Opened in May of 1996, the Center also includes a theater where Tech fans can view highlight films covering achievements such as Tech's 1990 national championship in football, the 1990 NCAA men's basketball Final Four, and the 1994 College World Series.

A 1948 graduate of Georgia Tech in Indus-


trial Management, George W. Mathews, Jr., played football for two of Tech's legendary coaches, William Alexander and Bobby Dodd, participating in the Orange Bowl in 1945 and 1948 and the 1947 Oil Bowl. Mathews is retired from Intermet Corporation, the \$500 million company he founded and the largest independent foundry in North America. The George W. Mathews, Jr., Athletic Heritage Center was made possible by a gift from the Intermet Corporation upon Mathews retirement in 1994.



Fuller E. Callaway, Jr., Plaza & Gateway to Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field

The Fuller E. Callaway, Jr., Plaza and Gateway to Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field provides an attractive entrance to Georgia Tech's historic football facility. The Plaza was temporarily relocated during the stadium expansion but will return to the North end zone.

The Plaza was dedicated in memory of Fuller E. Callaway, Jr., an internationally-recognized leader in the textile industry and a 1926 Textile Engineering graduate of Georgia Tech. His personal gifts and contributions from the Callaway Foundation, Inc., totalling millions of dollars, have funded professorships, scholarships and numerous facilities for students on the Tech campus.



Howard Candler, Jr., Football Conference Center

The Howard Candler, Jr., Football Conference Center provides Georgia Tech with one of the best football conference centers in the nation. In addition to eight meeting rooms of various sizes, the Conference Center also houses state-of-the-art video facilities which allow the entire Center to be connected together as one, or be used as separate meeting rooms.

The late Charles Howard Candler, Jr., was a lifelong Atlantan with widespread interests in business, real estate and education. He served for 27 years as a Director of the Coca-Cola Company and also sat on several Boards, including Trust Company Bank of Georgia and the Atlantic Steel Company. The Howard Candler, Jr., Football Conference Center, which opened in May of 1996, was funded by a gift from his widow, Lee Edwards Candler.



From national titles to Olympic medals, Georgia Tech's nationally-renowned athletics program has produced many champions. More importantly, through the Total Person Program, Tech is developing well-rounded student-athletes who go on to winning performances in a wide range of endeavors.

hrough this multifaceted program, the brainchild of retired Director of Athletics Dr. Homer Rice, Rambling Wreck studentathletes have the opportunity to learn the elements of success beyond the classroom or playing field. Athletic careers are fleeting, but Tech student-athletes gain skills that remain with them for a lifetime, preparing for the career and personal challenges ahead.

During his 17-year stay on the Flats from 1980-97, Rice rebuilt Georgia Tech's athletic fortunes with an emphasis not just in fund-raising and facilities but in equally important areas such as academic support, career placement and life skills.

Since Rice started the Total Person Program in 1980, it has developed into the most comprehensive student-athlete support system in the country. Rice's model has been adopted nationwide as the foundation for the NCAA's Life Skills Program. Because of the success of the Total Person Program, Georgia Tech was one of three schools chosen to consult with the NCAA on this project.

Current Director of Athletics Dave Braine has built upon the foundation laid by Rice with a continued emphasis on all aspects of the student-athlete's life.

"The concerns of the student-athlete must always come first," says Braine. "I want to make sure that all student-athletes have an opportunity to graduate. It is always our goal to give back a better person than we brought in."

Addressing virtually every area of a wellrounded educational experience, the Total Person Program, under the direction of Rob Skinner, focuses on the following components:

Life Skills

The foundation of the Life Skills component is the ASPIRE program: Athletes' Successful

Planning in Reaching Excellence. It is an interactive workshop that challenges student-athletes to live up to their potential in every area. Incorporated with the program is training and discussion on choices, habits, life mission and goal-setting.

All freshmen student-athletes participate in the ASPIRE program by attending weekly seminars, on topics ranging from time management and media training to drug and alcohol awareness and diversity.

Academic Support & Degree Completion

Georgia Tech offers one of the most comprehensive academic support programs in the country, giving every student-athlete the best possible opportunity to earn a degree that will open doors for a lifetime.

The centerpiece of the academic support program is the Andrew Hearn, Sr., Academic Center, an ultramodern facility for studying and tutoring located in the Edge Athletic Center. Tutoring is available in a wide range of subjects, and a highly-qualified staff of academic advisors monitor academic progress.

Academic support does not end when a student-athlete's playing career is over. The degree completion program focuses on student-athletes who have completed their eligibility and provides a means for returning to school and completing any remaining coursework in order to earn a degree. Many former athletes have benefited from the program.


Career Planning & Placement

The career planning and placement program, headed by Director of Student Life Lucius Sanford, provides guidance well before the student-athlete's graduating quarter. Programs are offered in resume writing, interviewing skills

and dressing for success, and networking luncheons put students in contact with local business leaders. Studentathletes are assisted in the pursuit of summer employment opportunities that provide meaningful work experience to prepare them for the challenges of a competitive workplace.

Counseling & Wellness

The wellness program addresses a studentathlete's physical, mental, emotional and spiritual needs. In addition to a highly-qualified sports medicine program to treat and prevent injuries, student-athletes are educated in areas such as nutrition, drug and alcohol awareness, and stress management. Christian Fellowship meetings are held.

Leadership

T ech student-athletes have the opportunity to develop leadership skills through the Student-Athlete Advisory Board, a group of representatives from each team that meets with athletic department administrators to help shape policies and address issues of concern.

Senior Nate Curry and junior Chris Reis represent the football team on the SAAB, and Curry also serves on the Atlantic Coast Conference Student-Athlete Advisory Board.

Honors

Through institutional, conference and national awards, student-athletes are recognized for outstanding efforts in athletics and academics and are encouraged to pursue postgraduate scholarship awards. Through the annual Total Person Awards, two seniors are honored based on outstanding athletic achievement, scholarship and character, and a former student-athlete who utilized the principles of the Total Person Program is recognized. Other annual awards include the Bobby Dodd Scholarship, the Robert Cup and Director of Athletics Dave Braine's All-Academic Team.

Community Outreach

Student-athletes are encouraged to give back to the community through a variety of service projects, including a mentoring program with local school children.



he chief engineer of Georgia Tech's determined effort to provide technological leadership in a changing world is Dr. G. Wayne Clough, the Institute's tenth president and the first alumnus to serve in that capacity.

His leadership has made undergraduate education more dynamic. Sponsored research has also increased every year since Clough became president. Research expenditures are now exceed \$370 million as Tech moves into exciting interdisciplinary fields like bioengineering, sustainable technology, and nanoscience.

Clough's skills as a civil engineer are evident in reshaping the campus to meet the needs of Tech's world-class programs and students. He has overseen the construction of more than a dozen academic and research buildings, with several more on the drawing board. The campus is fully wired with 1,700 miles of fiber-optic cable and offers a comprehensive wireless environment as well.

To provide the additional resources required to reach this goal, Clough engineered the Campaign for Georgia Tech, which raised a record \$712 million in five years for 54 endowed faculty chairs, 233 endowed scholarships, eleven new buildings, and a host of academic, research and athletic programs.

Beyond campus, he gives Georgia Tech a face and voice in Washington, D.C., as a member of the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology and the executive committee of the U.S. Council on Competitiveness, and as chair of the National Academy of Engineering committee on the Engineer of 2020.

represented the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) on the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division I Board of Directors.

A native of Douglas, Georgia, Clough received his bachelor's and master's degrees in civil engineering from Georgia Tech in 1964 and 1965. He earned a Ph.D. in civil engineering from the University of California, Berkeley in 1969.

He was provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University of Washington in Seattle when he answered the call to return to his alma mater as president in September of 1994. Prior to that, he had spent a decade at Virginia Tech as head of the Department of Civil Engineering, then as Dean of the College of Engineering. He also served on the faculties of Duke and Stanford universities.

A specialist in geotechnical and earthquake engineering, he is the author of more than 120 papers and reports, six book chapters, and several widely used geotechnical computer codes. He is presently a consultant to the San Francisco



Bay Area Rapid Transit System for ongoing major seismic retrofitting. His other interests include technology and higher education policy, economic development, diversity in higher education, and technology in a global setting.

Closer to home, he serves on the Board of Advisors for Noro-Moseley Partners, the Southeast's largest venture capital fund, and on the Board of Directors of Total System Services of Columbus, Ga. He is a member of the executive committees for the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce and Central Atlanta Progress, and a trustee of the Georgia Research Alliance. *Georgia Trend* magazine has included Clough on its list of the 100 most influential Georgians for the last seven years.

Among his many national awards for teaching and research, Clough holds eight from the American Society of Civil Engineers and is one of a select few to have been twice awarded the Norman Medal, civil engineering's oldest honor. In 2001 he received the National Engineering Award from the American Association of Engineering Societies. He has been a member of the National Academy of Engineering for more than a decade.

Wayne and Anne Robinson Clough have been married for more than 30 years and have two grown children.

ADMINISTRATION

DR. GEORGE NEMHAUSER Faculty Representative for Athletics

eorge Nemhauser, a professor in Georgia Tech's School of Industrial and Systems Engineering, is in his 10th year as the Rambling Wreck's Faculty Representative for Athletics.

Nemhauser, who has served on the Georgia Tech Athletic Association Board since 1989, has been a member of the Tech faculty since 1985. He came to the School of Industrial and Systems Engineering as the A. Russell Chandler Professor and was appointed Institute Professor in 1991.

The author of three books and more than 100 research papers, Nemhauser's principal research interests lie in the area of discrete optimization. He is currently working on several applications for large-scale mixed integer programming problems, especially in the area of crew and fleet scheduling in the airline industry, and he is one of the developers of MINTO, a software system for solving mixed-integer programs.

His software has been used to develop basketball schedules for the Atlantic Coast Conference and other leagues.

Nemhauser's distinctions include membership in the National Academy of Engineering as well as the Kimball Medal and the Lanchester Prize, which he received twice from the Operations Research Society of America.

Nemhauser began his academic career in 1961 as Assistant Professor of Operations Research and Industrial Engineering at Johns Hopkins University. In 1970, he was appointed Professor of Operations Research and Industrial Engineering at Cornell University, where he later served as School Director from 1977-83.


He has also held visiting faculty positions at the University of Leeds, U.K., and the University of Louvain, Belgium, where he worked at the Center for Operations Research and Econometrics



while serving as Research Director for two years.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

CARRYING ON THE LEGACY OF HEISMAN, ALEXANDER, DODD & RICE

One of America's most respected athletics leaders, Dave Braine has taken the Georgia Tech program into the new millenium in successful fashion, using the Yellow Jackets' storied past as a guiding light along the way.

national leader in his field, Georgia Tech Director of Athletics Dave Braine has made a career out of building successful programs. As he enters his eighth year at Tech, he has overseen tremendous growth in the Yellow Jackets' overall athletics program while positioning Georgia Tech for the future with ambitious building projects.

Braine, 61, has steered the Georgia Tech Rambling Wreck into the new millennium in successful fashion, using the Yellow Jackets' rich tradition as a guiding light along the way. He follows in the footsteps of four Tech greats of the past–John Heisman, William Alexander, Bobby Dodd and Dr. Homer Rice.

Georgia Tech's overall athletics program has enjoyed unprecedented success during Braine's tenure, highlighted by the men's basketball team's 2004 NCAA runner-up finish and a school-record bowl streak for the football program as well as remarkable growth in women's athletics and continued excellence in sports such as baseball and golf.

The 2003-04 school year proved to be the most successful campaign in Tech history. Yellow Jacket teams combined for a schoolrecord 31st place finish in the annual NACDA Director's Cup standings, which ranks the overall success of athletics programs based on NCAA finishes in each sport. Tech's No. 31 finish shatters its previous high of 45th place in 1994.

Highlighting the 2003-04 year was, of course, the remarkable performance by the Rambling Wreck basketball team, capped by Tech's first appearance in the NCAA Championship game. With many of the key players returning and head coach Paul Hewitt signed to a long-term contract, the program is poised to remain among the nation's elite.

In addition to the magical season by the basketball team, Tech's women's volleyball and track and field programs enjoyed watershed years, with the volleyball team reaching the NCAA Elite Eight, and the track team winning two national titles and placing 15th at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

The Tech football program won its 21st bowl game, reclaiming the nation's best winning percentage in bowl games. The golf team posted its fourth Top Five NCAA finish in the last five years, while the baseball team earned its 19th postseason berth in the last 20 years. The softball and men's and women's tennis teams extended their NCAA streaks, and the men's and women's swimming and diving and men's track and cross country programs sent individuals to the NCAA Championships.

Fifteen of Tech's 17 sports programs reached postseason play in 2003-04. In fact, Georgia Tech was the only school in the nation to win a football bowl game as well as NCAA Regionals in men's basketball and baseball, and one of only three programs to win a bowl game and at least one game in the NCAA basketball and baseball tournaments.

The Rambling Wreck football team has played in a bowl game in each of Braine's seven seasons on the Flats, an accomplishment that places Georgia Tech along with only 11 other schools in the nation. Tech's current streak betters the previous school record of six straight from 1951-56 under the legendary Bobby Dodd.

Other athletics highlights during Braine's tenure include 14 Top 10 national team finishes, No. 1 national rankings in baseball and golf, and nine Atlantic Coast Conference team titles in six different sports. Individual accomplishments range from Chaunte Howard's pair of national championships in the high jump in 2004 to Troy Matteson's 2002 NCAA title in golf to Angelo Taylor's gold medal in track at the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games.

Matteson is also among Tech's 25 Academic All-America honorees in the last seven years, including three in 2003-04. The football team placed a school-record eight student-athletes on the 2003 ACC All-Academic team.

Building for the Future

Braine strives to provide first-class athletics facilities for every sport, which not only help Georgia Tech attract top-notch student-athletes, but also provide amenities for Yellow Jacket fans.

The centerpiece of Tech's recent building campaign is the expansion of the historic football facility, Bobby Dodd Stadium at Grant Field, which was completed in 2003. The \$75 million project that raised capacity to 55,000 while adding numerous amenities and improvements was completed in less than two years. Also part of the project is the new Russ



Chandler Baseball Stadium, a \$9.1 million facility completed in 2002 that seats 4,157 and is one of the nation's finest baseball parks.

Also in the past year, Tech's men's and women's swimming and diving programs moved into one of the nation's most impressive aquatics venues. The Georgia Tech Aquatics Center features the competition pool from the 1996 Olympic Games in an enclosed, 2000-seat arena capable of hosting major national events, including the NCAA Championships, which Tech will take place at Georgia Tech in 2006.

The addition of women's swimming and diving in 2001-02 is further evidence of Georgia

Tech's commitment to women's athletics under Braine. In U.S. News & World Report's inaugural ranking of collegiate athletics programs in 2002, Tech was rated number two in the nation in gender equity.

The major role Georgia Tech plays on the national collegiate athletics landscape under Braine's leadership was clearly evident following a highly successful run as the host of back-toback NCAA Basketball Championships with the 2002 Men's Final Four and the 2003 Women's Final Four in Atlanta.

Braine currently serves on the NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee, and he previously served a two-year appointment as chairman of the NCAA Special Events Committee in 1995-96.

Total Person Concept

Winning records and all-star honors, however, are just part of the Braine athletics program. Just as he did earlier as director of athletics at Marshall and Virginia Tech, he emphasizes much more, especially the Total Person Concept, a comprehensive support program that stresses academics and life skills.

"Everything we do is designed to enhance the college experience of the student-athlete," says Braine. "We want to make sure that all Georgia Tech student-athletes have an opportunity to graduate. It is our goal to give back a better person than we brought in."

Braine takes special pride in the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance. "We are doing things there for our student-athletes that are totally unique," he said. "No other school in the country has the wide variety of Total Person programs that we do."

Through the Total Person Program, Tech student-athletes benefit from a number of enrichment programs ranging from life skills and career planning to wellness and community outreach. The Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance offers a motion analysis lab, a medical clinic and psychology lab, a nutrition center and a sports vision center.

Braine is also proud that Georgia Tech was named the recipient of the first-ever Atlantic Coast Conference Sportsmanship School of the Year Award in 2004. The Yellow Jackets won individual sportsmanship awards in four sports: women's indoor track and field, women's tennis and men's and women's outdoor track and field.

Second Tech Tour of Duty

First ired by President Dr. G. Wayne Clough, Braine was named Georgia Tech's director of athletics on June 3, 1997, succeeding Rice, who retired after serving as AD from 1980 until 1997. Tech's other fabled leaders of the past included Heisman (1904-1919), Alexander (1920-1950), and Dodd (1950-1976).

This is a second tour of duty for Braine at Georgia Tech. He originally came to the Flats in 1974 as defensive secondary coach on the football staff of Pepper Rodgers. He served in that capacity for two years, coaching one of the nation's top secondaries in 1974 which featured three-time all-America Randy Rhino.

Now in his 21st year as an athletics director, Braine was AD at Marshall from 1985 through 1987, during which time he oversaw the revitalization of a football program which had not had a winning record in many years. In Braine's last season, Marshall advanced to the I-AA national championship game before losing to Northeast Louisiana.

He moved to Virginia Tech and made a name for himself in a 10-year tenure in which he helped change the face of Hokie athletics. It was under Braine's leadership that Virginia Tech gained membership in the Big East Football Conference, which proved to be a stepping stone to full membership in the league.

In addition to spearheading a vast athletics building campaign, Braine saw the Hokies vault into national prominence in football while winning the National Invitation Tournament title in men's basketball and capturing the Atlantic 10 all-sports trophy five straight years.

Football Standout at UNC

A native of Grove City, Pa., Braine earned his bachelor's degree (1965) as well as a master's of arts and teaching (1966) at the University of North Carolina, where he was a three-time football letterman. He was a defensive back and placekicker on the Tar Heel team that defeated the Air Force Academy in the 1963 Gator Bowl.

After teaching and coaching at Manatee High School in Bradenton, Fla., he joined the Virginia Military Institute football staff as a freshman coach in the spring of 1967, kicking off his long career in collegiate athletics. Later he coached at Richmond from 1971-73, highlighted by the Spiders' 1971 Southern Conference title and Tangerine Bowl berth.

After two seasons as an assistant coach at Tech, Braine moved to Virginia as administrative assistant and secondary coach under Dick Bestwick in 1976. In 1978, he became assistant athletic director at Virginia. He took a similar position at Fresno State in 1983 and was promoted to associate athletic director in 1984. It was from there that he moved on to become the athletics director at Marshall in 1985.

Braine received a high honor in 1993 when he was inducted into the Mercer County

PAUL GRIFFIN

Senior Associate Director of Athletics

Paul Griffin, formerly the Director of Athletics at Arkansas State University and the University of South Florida, is in his third year as Senior Associate Director of Athletics at Georgia Tech.

Griffin is responsible for the Athletic Association budget and oversees several departments, including the ticket office, sales and marketing, sports information and several Olympic sports.

Previously a member of the Tech staff as Special Consultant to the Director of Athletics from July through December of 2001, Griffin assisted with Tech's efforts in hosting the 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Final Four until he was named Director of Athletics at Arkansas State in January of 2002.

Griffin, 57, spent 15 years as the Director of Athletics at South Florida (1986-2001), where he was instrumental in the university's charter membership in Conference USA. He was also responsible for developing the plan which initiated South Florida's football program in NCAA Division I-AA and then readied the program for its move to Division I-A in 2001.

Honored as the 1999 Southeast Region Athletics Director of the Year for Division I-AA/I-AAA by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics, Griffin represented Conference USA on the NCAA Championships Cabinet. He was subsequently appointed to the subcommittee for football certification, which certifies bowl games and preseason events.

Before his time at South Florida, Griffin served five years (1981-86) as director of athletics at Jacksonville (Fla.) University. Prior to that, he spent nine years (1972-81) at Roanoke (Va.) College, including the last four years (1977-81) as Director of Athletics. He also served as the lacrosse coach throughout his nine-year tenure at Roanoke College.

Griffin earned a bachelor's degree in education from the University of Maryland in 1969 and added a master's degree in education from Long Island University (C.W. Post Center) in 1973.

A native of Baldwin, N.Y., Griffin and his wife, Maureen, have one son, Michael.

MARY McELROY

Senior Associate Director of Athletics & Senior Woman Administrator

Ary McElroy, Senior Associate Athletic Director and Senior Woman Administrator, is in her sixth year on the staff of the Georgia Tech Athletic Association. She serves on various Atlantic Coast Conference and Georgia Institute of Technology committees and was recently appointed



to the NCAA Division I Volleyball Committee, which is responsible for

administering the Division I Volleyball Championship.

McElroy is the senior staff member responsible for overseeing NCAA Compliance, the assignment of student-athlete housing and Title IX Compliance, and also has game-day operations responsibilities for football and men's basketball games. She serves as the sport administrator for four sport programs assisting with overall management and providing budgetary guidance to men's basketball, men's and women's tennis, and women's softball.

McElroy originally came to Tech in 1999, as Director of Compliance and was elevated to Assistant Athletic Director and Associate Athletic Director prior to her current appointment.

McElroy also served one year as the Naval Academy Alumni Association's Director of Alumni Services, before moving to Atlanta.

A native of Great Mills, MD, McElroy earned a Bachelor of Science degree from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1987 and then served as a supply officer in the U.S. Marine Corps for five years, attaining the rank of Captain. She completed a Master of Science in Management degree at Georgia Tech in 2000 while working full-time at the athletic Association and completed the Sports Management Institute in January 2004.

She is married to Terry McElroy and the couple has two sons, Darrin and Austin.

LARRY NEW

Senior Associate Director of Athletics

A long-time member of the Georgia Tech staff, Larry New was promoted to Senior Associate Director of Athletics in 2003. He oversees the sports of football and baseball.

New retired from the Tech football coaching staff following the 1997 season and then spent more than five years as Director of the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance. He was elevated to Assistant Director of Athletics in 2001.



In 1999, Georgia Tech's Total Person Program, which New directed from 1998-2003, was awarded the "Program of Excellence Award" by the Division I-A Athletic Directors Association.

New's career as an assistant football coach spanned over three decades, including two stops at Georgia Tech for a total of seven seasons, serving under George O'Leary and Bill Curry. He also coached at Alabama, Arkansas, Kentucky, Missouri, South Carolina, Virginia and Wheaton College. In 2002, New was inducted into the "Club 35" of the American Football Coaches Association for 35 years of membership and was awarded of lifetime membership to the organization.

A native of Seminole, Okla., New earned an associate's degree in music, a bachelor's degree in music and physical education, and a master's degree in physical education.

New, 60, is married to the former Mary Kibert of Morgantown, W. Va.



BOBBY ROBINSON

Senior Associate Director of Athletics

Bobby Robinson, the former Director of Athletics at Clemson University, enters his second year at Georgia Tech as Senior Associate Director of Athletics. Robinson, who joined the Tech

staff in August of 2003, oversees facilities and game operations.

Robinson spent 17 years as Clemson's Director of Athletics, serving from 1985 until stepping down on June 30, 2002.

During his time at Director of Athletics, the Tigers won 56 Atlantic Coast Conference team titles as well as the 1987 NCAA championship in men's soccer, and Clemson student-athletes captured 24 individual national titles and over 400 all-America citations. The Clemson football team went to a bowl game in 14 of his 17 years, and the men's basketball program advanced to postseason play 12 of 17 years.

Over his career, 16 of the 19 Tiger sports programs had at least one final top 10 national ranking, and Clemson finished in the top 30 of the national all-sports rankings in nine of Robinson's 17 years.

Tiger student-athletes also made great strides academically during Robinson's tenure, thanks in large part to the construction of Vickery Hall, Clemson's student-athlete enrichment center. In addition to that facility, Robinson also launched an \$82 million fundraising project to enhance all of Clemson's athletics facilities, including Clemson Memorial Stadium and Littlejohn Coliseum.

Robinson first went to Clemson in 1970, working in the housing office until moving to the athletics department three years later. After serving the athletics department in various capacities, he was named business manager in 1975. He was promoted to assistant athletic director in 1977 and then associate athletic director in 1980. He served in that capacity until being named Director of Athletics in March of 1985.

Along with his administrative duties, Robinson served as Clemson's golf coach from 1974-83, guiding the Tigers to one ACC title and three NCAA Tournament appearances.

A native of Columbia, S.C., Robinson was honored by the State of South Carolina with the Order of the Palmetto, the highest honor a resident of the state can receive, and in 2002, he was inducted into the Clemson Hall of Fame.

Robinson earned a bachelor of arts degree in business and political science from Furman in 1968.



JACK THOMPSON

Senior Associate Director of Athletics

J ack Thompson, Georgia Tech's Associate Director of Athletics for Development, is in his 37th year on Tech's athletics staff.

Thompson serves as Executive Vice President of the Alexander-Tharpe Fund, Inc., the fund-raising arm of the Georgia Tech Athletic Association. He is past president of the National Association of Athletic Development Directors and a member of the Executive Board of the Midtown Alliance



Over the past 10 years, Georgia Tech has consistently been at the top of the ACC in per capita fund-raising. Tech is one of the leading universities in America in per capita athletic fund-raising with annual gifts to the A-T Fund totalling more than \$18 million.

Thompson joined the Tech staff in January, 1968, from the University of South Carolina. During his first 10 years at Tech, he served as director of football recruiting for seven years and assistant to the head football coach for three seasons. He was named Assistant Athletics Director in 1977 and was promoted to an associate position in 1982.

At South Carolina, Thompson was the head swimming coach, physical education instructor and part-time recruiter, and he also worked in the athletic business and sports information offices. Prior to his four-year stay at USC, Thompson served as head swimming coach and recruiter for all sports at Fork Union Military Academy in Virginia.



Game 1: BRIGHAM YOUNG 24, GEORGIA TECH 13

Aug. 28, 2003 LaVell Edwards Stadium Provo, Utah

BYU quarterback Matt Berry completed 31 of 46 passes for 276 yards and three touchdown passes to lead the Cougars to a 24-13 victory over Georgia Tech in a Thursday night game at Provo, Utah.

Tech held a 13-7 lead at the half on a pair of Dan Burnett field goals and a blocked punt that the Jackets' Nathan Burton recovered for a score, but BYU opened the second half with a pair of touchdown drives to take the lead. The Jackets squandered three fourth-quarter drives inside the BYU 30 with two fumbles and an interception.


Despite the loss, true freshman quarterback Reggie Ball opened his Tech career with an impressive performance. The first true freshman quarterback ever to start a Tech season opener, he completed 15 of 24 passes for 147 yards while rushing five times for 39 yards. His most impressive play was a 33-yard run down to the BYU four-yard line to set up a score.

Berry was shaky in the first half, but settled down in the second half and was very effective with a series of short passes and screens that the Cougars were able to spring for bigger gains. Berry, who started the final six games last season as a freshman, finished 31-for-46 with one interception.

After trailing at halftime, BYU regained the lead in the opening series of the third quarter when Berry rolled to his left, waited and threw a 15-yard touchdown pass to Daniel Coates to cap a seven-play, 80-yard drive with 11:12 left.

On the kickoff, Tech freshman Kenny Scott fielded the ball in the end zone and started to take a knee, but changed his mind and tried for a return. He was stopped at the five-yard line and the Jackets were forced to punt, setting up BYU at the Tech 43. Berry took advantage of the short field, and from the 14-yard line, he lofted a pass to Toby Christensen, who made a diving grab in the corner of the end zone for another touchdown to make it 21-13.

Tech took a 13-7 lead in the second quarter when Scott blocked Matt Payne's punt at the 18 and Burton scooped it up and ran untouched for the score early in the second quarter. The touchdown appeared to wake up the BYU offense. Berry led the Cougars on a drive that ate up 9:47 and made it to the Tech 11-yard line, but ended with Payne's 28-yard field goal attempt going wide to the right. Although Tech's defense held, the long drive took its toll as the Jackets wore down in the second half, the result of a 39-21 minute time of possession advantage for BYU, coupled with the altitude.

Tech had several scoring chances in the fourth quarter that were thwarted by turnovers. Trailing 21-13, Ball drove the Jackets to a first down at the BYU 20 early in the final quarter, but fullback Jimmy Dixon fumbled at the 11-yard line.

After a pair of sacks and a short punt, Tech got the ball back at the BYU 40, but after one first down, Ball's pass was intercepted at the seven-yard line.

The Cougars were able to eat up much of the remaining time with a 16-play, 86-yard drive that lasted more than six minutes and resulted in Matt Payne's 24-yard field and a 24-13 lead with 2:32 left.

Ball moved the Jackets down the field one last time before wide receiver Nate Curry fumbled at the BYU 15-yard line.

Game 2: GEORGIA TECH 17, AUBURN 3

Sept. 6, 2003 Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field Atlanta, Ga.

The Georgia Tech defense turned in a superb performance, allowing just 230 yards of total offense, and freshman quarterback Reggie Ball threw for one touchdown and set up two other scores as the Yellow Jackets knocked off 17th-ranked Auburn, 17-3, before a sellout crowd of 55,000 in the first game at the expanded Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field.

The win was the second over a ranked team for head coach Chan Gailey, following last year's victory at eighth-ranked NC State, and it prompted Tech's students to storm the field and tear down the goal posts. Tech defeated the Tigers in the first meeting between the schools in 16 years. Auburn (0-2) began the season ranked sixth in the Associated Press rankings, and at least one magazine picked the Tigers as the best team in the country.

Ball completed nine of 21 passes for 149 yards, rushed for 26 yards and showed poise far beyond his 18 years, but the story was the Tech defense, which sacked Auburn quarterback Jason Campbell seven times and held the Tigers to just 40 yards rushing.

Ball set the tone on Tech's first offensive play with a 54-yard completion to Nate Curry to set up Dan Burnett's 22-yard field goal, giving the Jackets a lead they would not relinquish.

Tech extended its advantage to 10-0 on P.J. Daniels' one-yard touchdown run with 6:37 left



in the second quarter. Daniels' score, set up by Ball's 12-yard scramble to the one yard-line, capped a 12-play, 50-yard drive on which the Jackets twice converted on fourth down.

On fourth-and-one at the Auburn 41. Tech lined up to punt, but the Jackets called for the fake, snapping the ball directly to the up-back, safety Chris Reis, who ran for four yards and a first down. Then Ball snuck one yard to convert on fourth-and-one at the 28, and the precocious freshman also alertly recovered a fumble by Daniels to keep the drive alive.

The Jackets made a key defensive stand late in the first half, forcing Auburn to settle for a field goal after driving deep into Tech territory to a first down at the six-vard line. Brown ran for two yards, then Campbell threw two straight incompletions before John Vaughn booted a 22yard field goal with 33 seconds left in the half for the Tigers' first points of 2003.

Another crucial defensive sequence came in the third quarter after Auburn stopped the Jackets on fourth-and-one at the Tech 41. The Tigers took over and faced third-and-two at the Tech 33 when Daryl Smith and Eric Henderson tackled the Tigers' Carnell Williams for a threevard loss, and then Smith sacked Campbell on fourth down.

After an exchange of punts, Ball connected with a diving Mark Logan for a 26-yard touchdown pass that extended Tech's lead to 17-3 with 1:53 remaining in the third quarter.

Auburn ventured into Tech territory three times in the fourth quarter. An intentional grounding penalty, forced by a sack by Ather Brown, and then another sack by Kevaron Fox thwarted one possession, and cornerback Reuben Houston's pass breakup on fourth down ended another threat. Dennis Davis' interception at the Tech 27 on Auburn's final possession sealed the victory.

Tech defensive end Eric Henderson had three sacks, four tackles for loss and a forced fumble and was named the Bronco Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week as well as ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week. Outside linebacker Keyaron Fox had a career-high 16 hits, a sack and two tackles for loss and was honored as ACC Defensive Back of the Week Ball earned ACC Rookie of the Week honors.

Auburn featured a highly-touted running attack, but Georgia Tech blitzed heavily and dared the Tigers to win through the air. Amid all the punishment, Campbell managed to complete 20 of 33 passes for 184 yards. Williams ran 13 times for 37 yards, while Ronnie Brown was held to 47 yards on 11 carries.

The schools are among the oldest rivals in the Deep South, meeting for the first time in 1892. But the series ended in 1987 because of scheduling difficulties. After waiting 16 years to get another crack at the Tigers, Georgia Tech made the most of its opportunity. The victory was its first over Auburn since 1978



Game 3: FLORIDA STATE 14, **GEORGIA TECH 13**

Sept. 13, 2003 **Doak Campbell Stadium** Tallahassee, Fla.

The Georgia Tech defense turned in another outstanding performance against a ranked team, but No. 10 Florida State managed two touchdowns in the final seven minutes to escape with a 14-13 victory at Doak Campbell Stadium.

One week after knocking off 17th-ranked Auburn behind a stellar defensive effort, Tech (1-2, 0-1 ACC) held a 13-0 lead on the Seminoles after P.J. Daniels' 47-yard touchdown run with 12:26 to play in the game, but Chris Rix led FSU (3-0, 3-0 ACC) to a pair of scores. The junior quarterback capped an 82-yard drive with a three-yard touchdown run with seven minutes to play, then tossed the game-winning five-yard touchdown pass to P.K. Sam with 2:57 left.

Tech held the Seminoles to 91 yards rushing and 251 yards of offense, but FSU gained 130 of those yards in the decisive fourth quarter. The Jackets outgained FSU 171 yards to 26 in the first half, but Tech could only manage a pair of Dan Burnett field goals. Daniels rushed for a careerhigh 113 yards on 19 carries, while freshman quarterback Reggie Ball was 11-for-24 for 116 yards but was sacked six times while committing three turnovers

The Yellow Jackets had Florida State bamboozled most of the first half, running 42 plays to only 15 for the Seminoles. Tech had the ball for 23:06, compared to Florida State's 6:54, and the Seminoles lone first down of the half came on a penalty.

But Georgia Tech lost a great scoring opportunity in the first quarter when it failed to score on four running plays from the Florida State two. Ball drove the Jackets down the field, completing four passes for 51 yards on the 72yard drive, before Daniels' 18-yard run gave Tech a first down at the FSU two.

Burnett's field goals, covering 35 and 45 yards, gave Georgia Tech a 6-0 halftime. The second three-pointer was set up by a fake punt, the second time in as many weeks that the Jackets converted on fourth down with a fake. Facing fourth-and-nine at the FSU 38, Tech lined up to punt, but punter Hal Higgins took the snap and found Dawan Landry for a 12-yard completion on the left sideline.

Florida State's first offensive threat of the game came early in the third quarter after a pass interference penalty gave the Seminoles a first down at the Tech 28. But Landry, who also recoverd a fumble on FSU's first play of the game, intercepted Rix at the seven and returned it 26 yards.

The Seminoles again drove deep into Tech territory early in the fourth quarter, but on thirdand-three at the three-yard line, Reuben Houston's leaping interception of Rix's pass intended for Thorpe in the end zone snuffed out the threat. Houston raced down the sideline out to midfield, setting up Daniels' 47-yard scoring run two plays later. The touchdown, the first allowed by the FSU defense all season, gave the Jackets a 13-0 lead with 12:26 to play.

Florida State took the ensuing kickoff and put together a 12-play, 82-yard drive, capped by Rix's three-yard scoring run with 7:09 to play as the Seminoles averted their first home shutout in coach Bobby Bowden's 28 seasons. The key plays on the drive were Rix's nine-yard scramble for a first down on third-and-five, followed by a 26yard completion to Dominic Robinson down to the Tech 14.

After forcing Tech to go three-and-out, the Seminoles took over on their own 43 with five minutes to play, and Rix quickly moved FSU into scoring position. On second-and-goal at the five, he found Sam in the corner of the end zone, and then Xavier Beitia's extra point put the Seminoles ahead.

Tech had two final possessions in the final three minutes. Ball's fumble gave FSU the ball at the Tech 17, but the Jackets' defense held, forcing an incomplete pass on fourth-and-17. Tech took over at the 23-yard line with two minutes to play and moved into Florida State territory, but Ball was intercepted by Pat Watkins at the Seminoles 20 with 29 seconds left to seal the victory.

The victory left Florida State coach Bobby Bowden as the most winning coach in ACC play with 86 career conference victories, one more than former Virginia coach George Welsh. Florida State is 12-0 against Georgia Tech since joining the league in 1992.

Game 4: CLEMSON 39, GEORGIA TECH 3

Sept. 20, 2003 Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field Atlanta, Ga.

Charlie Whitehurst threw for 298 yards and three second-quarter touchdowns, leading Clemson past Georgia Tech, 39-3, at Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field in an unusually one-sided game for the Atlantic Coast Conference rivals.

The Tigers (3-1, 1-0 ACC) won their third in a row by throwing deep against Georgia Tech (1-3, 0-2), which fell apart after splitting two wellplayed games against powerhouses Auburn and Florida State.

Whitehurst threw touchdown passes of nine yards to Tony Elliott, 12 yards to Kevin Youngblood and 33 yards to Airese Currie in the decisive second quarter, the last with just 12 seconds left in the first half to give the Tigers a commanding 23-3 lead.

Whitehurst added a rushing touchdown late in the game, sneaking over from the one to give Clemson its largest victory over the Yellow Jackets since a 73-0 rout in 1903.

The margin was quite a change from the last seven years. From 1996-01, every game was decided by a field goal. Last year, the Tigers won by a slightly more comfortable margin, 24-19, but this one wasn't close.

Clemson used its talented group of

receivers to throw downfield. Whitehurst tried to go deep to Currie on the Tigers' first play from scrimmage, overthrowing the open receiver, but the Clemson sophomore soon got rolling and finished 23-of-38. The Tigers also rushed for 138 yards, finishing with 436 total yards.

He found Derrick Hamilton all alone over the middle for a 47-yard reception, leading to the scoring pass to Elliott. The receiver was closely guarded by Reuben Houston, but leaped up and ripped the ball away from the cornerback to make it 10-0.

On Clemson's next possession, Whitehurst hooked up with Youngblood on a 44-yard pass, the 6-foot-5 receiver jumping over 5-10 cornerback Jonathan Cox to bring it down. Four plays later, Whitehurst completed a quick pass to Youngblood, who bounced off one defender and draqged Cox into the end zone for a 17-0 lead.

The Yellow Jackets finally scored on Dan Burnett's 20-yard field goal with 41 seconds left in the half, having squandered first-and-goal at the Clemson 10.

As it turned out, Georgia Tech left too much time on the clock. Tech tried to squib the kickoff, but it went right to Hamilton, who returned it yards to the Clemson 45. Whitehurst completed a 22-yard pass to Youngblood, then found Currie all alone down the middle of the field for his third touchdown pass of the quarter. Aaron Hunt missed the extra point after a penalty.

Georgia Tech couldn't get anything going offensively, its futility culminating when freshman quarterback Reggie Ball was sacked in the end zone for a safety by Maurice Fountain and Vontrell Jamison in the third quarter.

Ball struggled against the blitzing Tigers, completing just 19-of-42 for 248 yards, but he did not have much help; the Yellow Jackets rushed for only 45 yards and Ball was sacked five times.

Tech's lone bright spot was senior wide receiver Jonathan Smith, who recorded career highs with nine receptions for 170 yards.

Reggie Ball passed for 108 yards and rushed for 103 yards, including the tying touchdown pass with 32 seconds left in regulation and the winning 25-yard touchdown run in overtime, to lift Georgia Tech to a 24-17 win at Vanderbilt.

P.J. Daniels added 105 yards rushing, including a two-yard touchdown, and Ball became only the third quarterback in Tech history to rush and pass for 100 yards in the same game.

Tech trailed 17-10 after Vanderbilt scored 17 straight points, including a two-yard touchdown run by Norval McKenzie that gave the Commodores their first lead with just 2:12 to play.

The Jackets took over on their own 11, and on third-and-three from the 18, Ball scrambled 45 yards to the Vandy 37. Five plays later, he hit tight end John Paul Foschi for a six-yard touchdown pass to tie the score with just 32 seconds left. Ball accounted for 86 of the 89 yards on the drive with 54 yards rushing and 32 yards passing on four completions. Also catching passes on the march were Mark Logan, Xavier McGuire and Jonathan Smith, who made a tough catch at the six-yard line to set up the touchdown, which came on second-and-two.

After a squib kickoff, Vanderbilt needed just two completions to get into field goal

range, but Tech's Eric Henderson blocked a 44yard attempt by Tolga Ertugrul on the final play of regulation.

On the first play of the overtime, Ball faked right, then bootlegged left and dove into the end zone for the score. Free safety James Butler sealed the win with a leaping interception at the goal line on Vandy's first play.

Tech took a 10-0 first quarter lead. Dan Burnett's 35-yard field goal capped a 10-play, 71yard drive that got the Jackets on the board with 4:49 left in the first quarter.

A bobbled kickoff pinned Vanderbilt at its own six-yard line, and the Jackets forced a threeand-out. Following a 38-yard punt and a 20-yard return by Jonathan Smith, Tech took over at the Commodores' 31-yard line. The Jackets needed just four plays--all runs by Daniels--to reach the endzone as Daniels scored from two yards out for a 10-0 lead with 1:03 left in the first quarter.

Vanderbilt did not make its first first down of the game until the final play of the first quarter, but that put the Commodores on their way to an eight-play, 66-yard drive, capped by McKenzie's nine-yard scoring run, which cut Tech's lead to 10-7 early in the second quarter. The key play on the drive was Cutler's 32-yard scramble down to the Tech 12.

The Commodores tied the score at 10-all on the final play of the half on Ertugrul's 32-yard field goal.

The third quarter featured just two first downs and eight punts by the two teams. Tech had a chance to take the lead early in the fourth quarter, but Burnett's 42-yard field goal was just

The Jackets had another scoring chance after stopping the Commodores, on fourth down at the Vandy 34-yard line, but Ball was intercepted by Moses Osemwegie at the 14.

Vanderbilt began its go-ahead drive at its own 24-yard line with five minutes to play as Cutler drove the Commodores 76 yards on eight plays. He converted a third down with a 14-yard scramble to the Tech 38, then hit Brandon Smith with a 33-yard completion down to the five-yard line to set up McKenzie's second touchdown.

The victory extended Tech's unbeaten streak against Vanderbilt to 11 games and evened the Jackets' all-time record in overtime games at 3-3. Ball and Daniels became the first pair of Yellow Jackets to top 100 yards rushing in the same game since 1999.

Game 6: GEORGIA TECH 29, NC STATE 21

Oct. 4, 2003 Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field Atlanta, Ga.

Freshman quarterback Reggie Ball passed for 283 yards and two touchdowns and rushed for one score, and the Georgia Tech defense held NC State more than 20 points below its scoring average in the Yellow Jackets' 29-21 victory over NC State at Bobby Dodd Stadium.

Tech downed the Wolfpack for the eighth time in the last nine years and for the seventh straight year in Atlanta, where NC State has not won since 1988.

The Wolfpack (3-3, 1-2 ACC), behind Heisman Trophy candidate Philip Rivers at quarterback, came in averaging 43.4 points a game - third-best in Division I-A - and 366 yards passing. But the Yellow Jackets (3-3, 1-2) executed their gameplan to perfection, blitzing from all angles and quickly tackling the receivers after they caught the ball.

Rivers was 31-of-46 for 344 yards and two touchdowns, including a meaningless score with six seconds left. Leading receiver Jerricho Cotchery had just five catches, and the Wolfpack managed only minus-8 yards rushing, with tailback T.A. McLendon out for the second straight game with a pulled hamstring. The minus-8 rushing total by the Pack was the best peformance by the Tech defense since 1995 and the fifth-best ever.

Ball, who completed 24 of 37 passes with no interceptions, enjoyed the best game of his young career. He was particularly effective on third down, completing 8-of-11 passes for 106 yards on third down plays, including successful conversions on five occasions when Tech faced third and seven or more yards.

He gave Tech the lead for good by hitting Jonathan Smith for a 42-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter that made the score 7-3, capping an 80-yard drive. The Jackets extended their lead to 13-3 in the second quarter on a pair of field goals by Dan Burnett, who booted a career-long 48-yarder with 12:34 to play in the second quarter and then followed with a 26-yarder after Chris Reis recovered an NC State fumble on the kickoff.

After NC State pulled within 13-10 on Jerricho Cotchery's 15-yard touchdown catch, freshman Kenny Scott returned the ensuing kickoff 90 yards, Tech's longest kickoff return since 1998. The Jackets had to settle for another Burnett field goal, this time from 25 yards, but led 16-10 with 4:28 left in the half.

A delay of game penalty and a bobbled shotgun snap forced the Wolfpack to punt from their own 15, so Tech took over on the NC State 45 with 1:44 left. Ball moved the Jackets into

scoring position with completions of 18, 16 and 13 yards to Smith. On second-and-goal from the five, Ball threw a perfect fade pass to Nate Curry, who made a diving catch in the corner of the end zone with just 15 seconds left in the first half. Burnett missed the extra point, leaving Tech with a 22-10 lead at the intermission.

Smith finished with nine catches for 155 yards, including eight catches for 143 yards in the first half. Curry added seven receptions for 76 yards, and tailback PJ. Daniels rushed for 99 yards on 23 carries.

In the second half, Tech thwarted the Pack on three consecutive trips inside the Jackets' 15yard line, allowing just a field goal.

The Wolfpack got within 22-13 with a 21yard field goal by Adam Kiker on their opening drive of the second half. They had a chance to get closer after holding Georgia Tech to a threeand-out, but Kiker hooked a 29-yard attempt to the left. NC State again drove near the end zone on its next possession, but on third-and-one from the 29, Andy Bertrand was stopped for a two-yard loss by Jonathan Cox after catching a swing pass from Rivers. On fourth down, which was the first play of the fourth quarter, Cotchery fell down just as Rivers' pass came to him, and the ball fell incomplete.

The Jackets then drove 69 yards for the clinching score, thanks to 45 yards in penalties by the Wolfpack, including a roughing the punter that kept the possession alive. Ball used a good block from Daniels to dive into the end zone from four yards out, giving Georgia Tech a 29-13 lead with 12:35 left in the game.

The Jackets overcame their own problems,

most on special teams. Burnett missed an extra point, the first time that's happened to Georgia Tech since 1998. Punter Hal Higgins struggled, too, averaging only 26 yards on four kicks. There also were two fumbles on punts, one recovered by NC State.

Following the game, Smith was named ACC Offensive Back of the Week, while Ball earned his third ACC Rookie of the Week Award.

Game 7: GEORGIA TECH 24, WAKE FOREST 7

Oct. 11, 2003 Groves Stadium Winston-Salem, N.C.

P.J. Daniels rushed for 175 yards and one touchdown and Jonathan Smith caught seven passes for a career-high 194 yards, including a 65-yard touchdown, to lead Georgia Tech to its third straight victory, a 24-7 win at Wake Forest.

Tech piled up 216 yards rushing and 225 yards passing for a season-best 441 yards of total offense, while the Tech defense held the Deacons to 277 total yards and a season-low seven points.

Freshman quarterback Reggie Ball completed 12 of 24 with two touchdowns and no interceptions for the Jackets. Daniels and Smith gave Tech a 150-yard rusher and a 150-yard receiver in the same game for the first time in school history.

The Jackets took a 7-0 lead on their opening possession as Ball hit Smith for a 55yard completion to the Wake 11, then found tight end John Paul Foschi in the end zone for a 10yard touchdown.

Free safety James Butler helped Tech take that lead into the intermission as he had an interception and two forced fumbles in the first half. The junior from Climax, Ga., then blocked Ryan Plackemeier's 25-yard field goal attempt on the final play of the half.

Tech opened the second half with a 14-play, 70-yard drive but had to settle for Dan Burnett's 44-yard field goal, giving the Jackets a 10-0 lead with 6:09 left in the third quarter.

Wake Forest pulled within 10-7 on a fouryard touchdown run by Chris Barclay, who keyed the drive with a 46-yard run down to the Tech 18yard line.

The Jackets answered as Ball found Smith on the left sideline, and the senior wideout leaped to catch the pass between two defenders, then dashed 40 yards for the 65-yard scoring play, Tech's longest play of the season. That extended Tech's lead to 17-7 with 2:16 remaining in the third quarter.

Tech sealed the win grinding out an eightminute drive that was capped by Daniels' one-yard touchdown with just 1:40 left. All 16 plays on the 78-yard drive were on the on the ground as the Tech offensive line asserted itself. Daniels had 10 of his career-high 33 carries for 54 yards on the march, while Ball rushed for two third-down conversions.

Barclay led the Deacons with 124 yards rushing, while quarterback Cory Randolph completed 14 of 28 pass attempts for 132 yards, throwing two interceptions.

Smith was named ACC Offensive Back of the Week for the second straight week, center Hugh Reilly was selected ACC Offensive Lineman of the Week, and Ball earned his fourth ACC Rookie of the Week Award.

Game 8: GEORGIA TECH 7, MARYLAND 3

Oct. 23, 2003 Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field Atlanta, Ga.

Freshman Reggie Ball's fourth-quarter scoring pass to Jonathan Smith was the game's only touchdown as Georgia Tech used a stellar defensive effort to defeat Maryland, 7-3, in a Thursday night game at Bobby Dodd Stadium/ Grant Field.

The Yellow Jackets (5-3, 3-2) won their fourth straight game to come within one win of bowl eligibilty, while Maryland (5-3, 2-2) had a five-game winning streak snapped as coach Ralph Friedgen lost to his former employer for the first time. The Terrapins had won two in a row over the Yellow Jackets since Friedgen, a Tech assistant for nine years, returned to his alma mater.

"A win is a win is a win," coach Chan Gailey said after the game.

In a game dominated by defense and plagued by turnovers, Georgia Tech came up with most crucial takeaway late in the third quarter.

Redshirt freshman Joel Statham, filling in for injured Maryland quarterback Scott McBrien, fumbled when hit from behind by linebacker Keyaron Fox. One Maryland player and two Georgia Tech defenders tried - and failed - to recover the bouncing ball before Tech cornerback Jonathan Cox finally corralled it at the Terrapins 35, returning it 17 yards.

"We had our hands on the ball all night," Gailey said. "I'm glad we finally got one."


Georgia Tech had first-and-goal at the eight as the fourth quarter began. Ball threw an incompletion and gained four yards on a draw before dropping back on third down.

The freshman quarterback was crushed by Leroy Ambush and D'Qwell Jackson but managed to get off a wobbly pass, which made it to Smith standing all alone in the back of the end zone with 14:10 remaining.

"We found a way to win," said Ball, who was 12-of-28 for 98 yards. "It was ugly, but we found a way to pull it out against a tough team.

"I knew after the first few series we were going to have to gut it out. Give it to our defense. They kept us in the game."





JAMES BUTLER had two interceptions in Tech's 7-3 win over Maryland and was named ACC Defensive Back of the Week.

After the Jackets took the lead, the defense forced a Maryland punt, but the Terps pinned Tech at its own four-yard line with 12 minutes to play.

Ball found wide receiver Nate Curry for two key third-down conversions as the Jackets managed to move out to the Maryland 44-yard line and eat up nearly seven minutes before punting.

The Terps took over at their own 27 with five minutes left, but on third-and-12, Statham's pass was intercepted by Tech free safety James Butler to end Maryland's last real chance. Butler also had Tech's first interception off McBrien on the Terps' first offensive possession.

Georgia Tech ran off all but the final 24 seconds, giving Maryland the ball back at its own 11 with no timeouts.

Appropriately, the game ended with Statham getting hit by Daryl Smith while trying to throw, the incompletion falling harmlessly to the turf.

Nick Novak had given Maryland a 3-0 lead on a 35-yard field goal with 3:14 left in the third quarter. But the Terrapins couldn't overcome five fumbles - they lost two - and two interceptions.

After averaging more than 37 points a game during its winning streak, Maryland was held to its lowest-scoring game since a 22-0 loss to Notre Dame in the 2002 season opener. The Terrapins were limited to 253 yards of total offense, including just 96 yards rushing, while Georgia Tech won with a 228-yard effort.

While running the option, McBrien took a big hit from Dawan Landry late in the first half. He was hit again on Maryland's next series and staggered to the sideline, unable to return to the game because of a concussion.

While backup quarterback Orlando Evans suspended for the game, Friedgen called upon with Statham, a redshirt freshman who had thrown only one pass in his career. The native of Chatsworth, Ga., played respectably under the circumstances, going 10-of-22 for 93 yards.


The first half was scoreless, marking the first time the Yellow Jackets have been involved in a scoreless first half since Tech's 6-3 victory over Virginia Tech in 1990.

Maryland was held to 117 yards, hurting itself with two turnovers. Georgia Tech managed only 106 yards and Ball threw his first interception in three games, breaking a streak of 73 consecutive passes without being picked off.

Novak squandered the only scoring threat of the half, missing a 39-yard field goal.

Following the game, Butler was honored as ACC Defensive Back of the Week, and Fox, who had a game-high 15 tackles along with the forced fumble, was named ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week.

Game 9: DUKE 41, GEORGIA TECH 17

Nov. 8, 2003 Wallace Wade Stadium \cdot Durham, N.C.

Chris Douglas ran for a career-high 218 yards and two scores, and Malcolm Ruff had a 42-yard interception return for a touchdown to lift the Blue Devils to a 41-17 win against Georgia Tech.

Duke (3-7, 1-5) had not won an ACC game since beating Wake Forest 48-35 on Nov. 13, 1999, a league-record losing streak of 30 games. But the Blue Devils ended that run by constantly rotating quarterbacks against the Yellow Jackets (5-4, 3-3) and relying on Douglas' career effort.

Behind Douglas, the Blue Devils rushed for 253 yards against a defense allowing a leaguebest 94.8 rushing yards per contest.

It was the Blue Devils' first win under interim coach Ted Roof, the former Tech player and assistant.

Mike Schneider and Chris Dapolito rotated every few plays and finished with 141 passing yards and a touchdown with just one interception.



P.J. Daniels rushed for 108 yards and a touchdown for the Yellow Jackets, who were looking for their fifth straight win.

Freshman quarterback Reggie Ball finished with 247 yards passing, but he committed two second-half turnovers that led directly to Blue Devil touchdowns.

Duke scored the first 10 points of the game and took a 17-10 halftime lead.

Leading 20-10 midway through the third quarter, Matt Zielinski stripped Ball on a keeper in Georgia Tech territory. Brendan Dewan recovered the ball at Georgia Tech's 36, and Douglas ran it in from 12 yards out four plays later for a 27-10 lead with 4:02 left in the period.

Georgia Tech closed the gap to 27-17 on a two-yard touchdown by Daniels. The Tech defense forced a punt, and Tech took over on its own 23 with 10 minutes to play, but Ruff intercepted Ball's pass and weaved through defenders for a 42-yard touchdown and a 34-17 lead.

The Blue Devils marched 62 yards on 10 plays to open the game. Cedric Dargan ended the drive with a one-yard touchdown run with 9:57 left in the first quarter.

After getting a fourth-down stop on Georgia Tech's first drive, the Blue Devils put together a 39-yard drive, ending with Brent Garber's 43-yard field goal for a 10-0 lead with 44 seconds left in the opening quarter.

Tech answered on its next drive with Ball's one-yard keeper with 11:47 left in the half.

Duke pushed the lead to 17-7 midway through the quarter when Dapolito connected with Andy Roland for a seven-yard touchdown with 8:01 left in the half. Dan Burnett's 42-yard field goal with 43 seconds left in the half cut Duke's lead to seven at the break.

Game 10: GEORGIA TECH 41, NORTH CAROLINA 24

Nov. 15, 2003 Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field Atlanta, Ga.

P.J. Daniels ran for a career-high 240 yards– 155 in an overpowering second half–and Jonathan Smith accounted for touchdowns via passing, receiving and returning as Georgia Tech defeated North Carolina, 41-24, at Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field. The win was Tech's sixth in a row over the Tar Heels, and it made the Yellow Jackets bowl eligible for a school-record seventh consecutive year.

Freshman quarterback Reggie Ball passed for just 122 yards but threw three touchdown passes as Tech recorded season highs for points, rushing yards (298) and total offense (446).

Daniels, who carried 36 times and scored on an eight-yard reception, had what was at the time the second-best rushing game in Tech history. Only Eddie Lee Ivery, who set a then-NCAA record with 356 yards versus Air Force in 1978, gained more yards in a Tech uniform, but Daniels would get even closer with 307 yards in the Humanitarian Bowl.

Nate Curry caught two touchdown passes, one from Ball and one from Smith, who threw a 26-yard touchdown pass off a reverse, caught a 30-yard touchdown from Ball and then returned a punt 73 yards for a score, all in a seven-minute span in the fourth quarter.

Darian Durant threw two touchdown passes and ran for another score for North Carolina (2-9, 1-6), which gave up at least 40 points for the fourth time this season.


After North Carolina's Dan Orner kicked a 39-yard field goal to tie the game at 17 in the third quarter, Georgia Tech drove 81 yards in 17 plays—all but two on the ground--for a go-ahead field goal.

The drive took the final six minutes of the third quarter and spanned eight seconds into the fourth, with Daniels gaining 46 yards and Ball rushing for 32 yards. Dan Burnett's kick from 31 yards made it 20-17.

The Tar Heels then drove deep into the Yellow Jackets' territory, but Jacque Lewis fumbled after catching a pass from Durant. Linebacker Keyaron Fox punched the ball loose, and the fumble was recovered by cornerback Reuben Houston, whose second-quarter interception set up Tech's first touchdown.

The Jackets took over at their own 14-yard line and again turned to Daniels. He gained 52 yards on the possession, as Tech moved to the UNC 26-yard line. On second-and-two, Smith took a pitch from Ball on an end-around. He faked off the defensive end and then lofted a pass down the right sideline, connecting with Curry for a 26yard touchdown, putting the Jackets ahead, 27-17, with 9:51 still to play.





REUBEN HOUSTON had an interception and a fumble recovery against the Tar Heels and was named ACC Defensive Back of the Week.

North Carolina again closed within three on an eight-yard touchdown pass from Durant to Lewis, but Ball sealed it on the next drive, throwing 30 yards to a streaking Smith for a 34-24 lead with 4:25 remaining in the game.

After Tech forced the Tar Heels to go threeand-out, Smith fielded David Wooldridge's punt at the 27-yard line and headed straight up the field. After making the first defender miss, he raced down the left sideline almost untouched for a 73-yard touchdown. That was Tech's first punt return for a touchdown since 1998.

Tech got on the scoreboard on its first possession on Burnett's 35-yard field goal, but North Carolina answered with Durant's one-yard touchdown run to take a 7-3 lead with 4:53 left in the first quarter.

The Tar Heels were driving again, when Durant's pass bounced off the hands of intended receiver Jawarski Pollock, and Houston made a one-handed interception. He returned the ball 18 yards to the UNC 29, and eight plays later, Tech scored its first touchdown on an eight-yard pass from Ball to Daniels, putting the Jackets ahead, 10-7, with 4:59 remaining in the half.

The Tar Heels took a 14-10 lead into the intermission after a two-yard pass from Durant to Bobby Blizzard with 50 seconds left in the half. Tech opened the second half with 12-play, 67-yard scoring drive that last more than five minutes and was capped by Ball's 16-yard touchdown pass to Nate Curry.

Smith became the first player in school history to account for touchdowns via passing, receiving and returning in a single game and was named ACC Specialist of the Week. Houston, who had an interception, fumble recovery and a sack, was honored as ACC Defensive Back of the Week, and Ball earned his fifth ACC Rookie of the Week award.

Game 11: VIRGINIA 29, GEORGIA TECH 17

Nov. 22, 2003 Scott Stadium · Charlottesville, Va.

Matt Schaub passed for 239 yards and a touchdown to help Virginia beat Georgia Tech, 29-17, in Charlottesville, Va.

The Cavaliers (6-5, 4-4) held PJ. Daniels, the leading rusher in the conference, to 76 yards on 18 carries.


Heath Miller finished with six catches for 110 yards, setting an ACC record for tight ends with 53 receptions in a season.

The Yellow Jackets (6-5, 4-4) haven't won at Scott Stadium since beating top-ranked Virginia in 1990.

After trailing 23-7 at the intermission, Georgia Tech closed the gap to 23-17 in the third quarter.

Jonathan Smith's 80-yard punt return made the score 23-14 with eight minutes left in the third quarter. Smith had a 73-yard touchdown return one week earlier to become the first player in Tech history to return punts for scores in backto-back games.

After the Tech defense forced a three-andout, the Jackets drove to the Virginia 20-yard line but had to settle for Dan Burnett's 37-yard field goal. Still, Tech pulled within 23-17 with 1:07 still left in the third quarter.



JONATHAN SMITH accounted for touchdowns passing, receiving and returning against UNC, including this 73-yard punt return for a score.



Aided by a crucial roughing the passer penalty, Virginia managed to hold the ball for 15 plays before Conner Hughes' 30-yard field goal extended the Cavaliers' lead to 26-17 with 10:31 to play.

But on Tech's next possession, Almondo Curry intercepted Reggie Ball at the Tech 35-yard line, leading to another Virginia field goal.

Ball was 16-of-30 for 157 yards and one interception. He also rushed for 46 yards for 203 yards of total offense.

Virginia held Georgia Tech scoreless in the first quarter and opened a 23-7 lead by halftime.

Schaub hit Miller on a 10-yard pass for the Cavaliers' first score, and the Jamaine Winborne stripped Daniels on the following drive to set up Hughes' 31-yard field goal.

After another Virginia field goal, PJ. Daniels charged 15 yards untouched for Tech's first score, pulling the Jackets within 1307 with seven minutes left in the half. Daniels' run capped an eight-play, 76-yard drive.

But the Cavaliers answered with a 50-yard field goal by Hughes, one of five three-pointers on the day for the freshman kicker.

Virginia then forced Tech to punt, and Marques Hagans fielded Andy Thomson's kick at the 26-yard line and returned it 53 yards to the Jackets' 21. Five plays later, Hagans, the Cavaliers' backup quarterback, took the snap on secondand-goal at the two and plunged over for the touchdown and a 23-7 halftime lead for Virginia.

Game 12: GEORGIA 34, GEORGIA TECH 17

Nov. 29, 2003 Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field Atlanta, Ga.

David Greene completed 16 of 22 passes for 235 yards and one touchdown, and freshman tailback Kregg Lumpkin scored on a 13-yard run and an 11-yard reception to lead No. 5 Georgia to a 34-17 victory over Georgia Tech.

The Bulldogs got off to a quick start, scoring two touchdowns less than two minutes apart in the first quarter.

Greene set up the first score by completing a 46-yard pass to Fred Gibson, fooling the Yellow Jackets by faking a handoff and holding the ball against his hip. But the Bulldogs needed a little luck to get it in the end zone.

On first down at the four, Greene tried to run it in but fumbled short of the goal line. The ball rolled into the end zone, where freshman center Nick Jones fell on it for his first career touchdown.

On Georgia Tech's ensuing possession, Bryan McClendon broke through the line untouched and blocked Hal Higgins' attempted punt. Georgia recovered at the 13, and Kregg Lumpkin ran it in on the next play to give the Bulldogs a 14-0 lead.

Tech put together a 14-play, 75-drive but had to settle for Dan Burnett's 20-yard field goal early in the second quarter. Georgia kicker Billy Bennett answered with a pair of second-quarter field goals to send the Bulldogs to the locker room with a 20-3 lead.

Tech freshman quarterback Reggie Ball had an interception and a fumble in the first half and then was knocked out of the game with a concussion, turning the game over to senior AJ. Suggs, who had not taken a snap all year.

Suggs passed for 175 yards and two long touchdown passes in the second half, but he also had two interceptions that led to Georgia touchdowns.

Suggs hit Jonathan Smith for a 35-yard scoring with five minutes to play in the third quarter, then threw a 43-yard touchdown pass to Levon Thomas late in the game.

Lumpkin rushed for 64 yards on 14 carries to earn bragging rights over Ball, his former high school teammate. Georgia also got a surprising contribution from fullback Jeremy Thomas, known primarily for his blocking. He scored on a oneyard dive and also caught five passes for 51 yards.

Jonathan Smith, the senior from Argyle, Ga, stood out in his final home game, catching nine passes for 108 yards. But PJ. Daniels, the Atlantic Coast Conference's leading rusher, played sparingly after missing much of the week of practice due to injury and gained only 30 yards.

Game 13: GEORGIA TECH 52, TULSA 10

Humanitarian Bowl · Jan. 3, 2004 Bronco Stadium · Boise, Idaho

Most Valuable Player PJ. Daniels rushed for 307 yards and four touchdowns and the Georgia Tech defense recovered six fumbles and allowed just 144 yards as the Yellow Jackets crushed Tulsa, 52-10, in the Humanitarian Bowl in Boise, Idaho.

Daniels, who carried 31 times, established an NCAA record for rushing yards in a bowl game with the second-best game in Tech history. He scored on runs of nine, one, 33 and 38 yards to tie the Tech record for touchdowns in a game.

Daniels was virtually all the offense needed by the Jackets, who finished with just 19 yards passing while playing four quarterbacks but set a school record for points in a bowl game.

The Jackets collected seven sacks and 14 tackles behind the line of scrimmage as Tulsa netted minus-56 yards rushing, a Tech school

record. Tulsa managed 103 of its 144 yards and its only touchdown in the fourth quarter after the Jackets emptied their bench.

Tech led just 10-3 at the intermission despite holding the Golden Hurricane to 20 yards of offense (minus-29 yards rushing) in the first half. On Tech's first offensive play of the second half, Daniels raced 61 yards to the Tulsa four and then scored three plays later. The Tech defense then sacked Tulsa quarterback James Kilian and forced him to fumble, recovering at the eight-yard line to set up another score, this one a two-yard plunge by Chris Woods, for a 24-3 lead.

Tech's next drive started at its own 10-yard line, but Daniels ripped off a 34-yard gain to the Tulsa 47, then six plays later, he broke loose for a 33-yard scoring run around the right side. That carry, on which Daniels plowed through several tacklers downfield, put him well over 200 yards on the day, and gave the Jackets 31-3 advantage with 1:12 left in the third quarter.

After the Jackets recovered another Tulsa fumble, Daniels needed just one play to score his fourth touchdown of the day, a 38-yard jaunt for a 38-3 lead with 14:10 to play in the game.

With the scoreboard showing Daniels' total at 292 yards, Tech players implored head coach Chan Gailey to let him go for 300. He didn't have to wait long for his chance as Dawan Landry came up with Tech's fourth fumble recovery of the day at the Tulsa 21.

Daniels carried once for five yards and then left the game after a 10-yard scamper put him over the 300-yard mark. His effort ranks second in Georgia Tech history, trailing only Eddie Lee Ivery's then-NCAA record 356 yards against Air Force in 1978, and third among ACC players.

Fifth-year senior Jermaine Hatch closed out the scoring with two fourth-quarter touchdowns, both set up by Tulsa fumbles.

Freshman Joe Anoai had two of Tech's six fumble recoveries, and another fumble was caused and recovered by wide receiver Jonathan Smith, who played a few series on defense.

Starting quarterback Reggie Ball sustained a minor injury late in the first half, so senior AJ. Suggs started the second half but threw only two passes. He gave way to senior Brian Camp, and then walk-on Robby Brown finished the contest.

Tech's 42 second-half points tied the school record for the modern era.





ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

A Tradition of Excellence

ow in its 52nd year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 91 national championships, including 47 in women's competition and 44 in women's. NCAA individual titles have been won by ACC student-athletes 116 times in men's competition and 57 times in women's action.

The conference had an immediate impact on the national college football scene in the fall of 1953 when Maryland captured the first of what would eventually be four national football titles for the ACC. Clemson laid claim to the league's second national title in 1981, Georgia Tech followed suit in 1990 while Florida State pocketed the ACC's fourth and fifth national titles in 1994 and 1999. In addition, new ACC member Miami has laid claim to five national gridiron titles over the past 21 seasons.

The 11 schools that take to the field this fall under the ACC banner have produced 474 first or second team gridiron All-Americas and 68 first-team academic all-Americas.

The current 11 ACC teams have had 1,911 players selected in the annual professional football draft, including 173 first round selections. A year ago, the nine ACC institutions had 160 former players on NFL rosters during the regular season or playoffs.

The ACC is the nation's winningest bowl conference as the 11 current teams are a combined 119-106-5 (.528) in post-season play.

Following its 5-1 bowl mark in 2003, the ACC is the only conference to have a winning bowl record in each of the past three seasons. Over the past three years, the ACC is 13-6 in post-season play and has the best bowl winning percentage (.684) among all BCS conferences. In 2003, the ACC set an NCAA record when seven of its nine teams (.78%) received bowl bids.

Georgia Tech is the winningest bowl team in Division I-A history. Following its 52-10 win over Tulsa in last year's Humanitarian Bowl, the Yellow Jackets are 21-11 (.656) while USC (.642) is second.

For the first time in league history, ACC schools surpassed the 3,000,000 mark in total attendance in 2003 and for the fourth-straight year, the league set new single season records in attendance. In 58 home games during the 2003 season, ACC teams drew 3,006,841 fans, breaking the existing record of 2,944,936 set during the 2002 season.

2003-04 In Review

D uring the 2003-04 academic year, the ACC won three national team titles and six individual NCAA crowns. The conference has won 48 national team titles over the last 14 years. The ACC's 2003-04 national champions were Wake Forest in field hockey, North Carolina in women's soccer and Virginia in women's lacrosse.

The ACC produced three national Players of the Year, one national Rookie of the Year and four national Coach of the Year recipients, while 167 ACC student-athletes earned first, second or third-team All-America honors

The Championships

The ACC will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during in 2004-05, including 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954 a NC State. The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship held in tennis at Wake Forest, October 6-8. Championships for women are now conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

Georgia Tech Wins Sportsmanship Award

Georgia Tech was named the recipient of the first-ever Atlantic Coast Conference Sportsmanship School of the Year Award.

The Yellow Jackets won sportsmanship awards in 2004 in women's indoor track, women's tennis and men's and women's outdoor track. A traveling trophy will be on display at Georgia Tech for one year.

The concept of the sportsmanship awards was created by the ACC Student Athlete Advisory Committee to recognize teams who earned the utmost regard from their peers during competition.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C. when the seven charter members-Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest-withdrew from the Southern Conference. On June 14, 1953, those seven schools met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name officially became the Atlantic Coast Conference, which was suggested by Duke's Eddie Cameron and unanimously approved.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971 when South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The conference operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2004, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting with the 2005-06 academic year.



















1945 Orange Bowl

1929 ROSE BOWL

Georgia Tech 8, California 7 January 1, 1929 Rose Bowl, Pasadena, Calif.

The Golden Tornado of Georgia Tech completed a perfect 10-0 season by stunning California, 8-7, in one of the strangest Rose Bowl games ever played.

The margin of victory for Tech was provided in the second quarter. With the score tied 0-0, Tech's Stumpy Thomason was hit by the Golden Bears' Benny Lom and fumbled around the Tech 35-yard line. California center Roy Riegels scooped up the ball and raced for the end zone. But in the confusion, Riegels got turned around and was heading toward the wrong end zone. He ran 64 yards, reaching the California oneyard line before he was tackled by his own teammate, Lom. On the next play, Tech's Vance Maree broke through the line and blocked Lom's punt for a safety.

Thomason scored on a 15-yard run early in the third quarter but his extra-point try was no good. Still, Tech led 8-0. California added a late score on Lom's 10-yard touchdown pass.

After an early Tiger score, Howard Ector completed a long, determined drive to knot the score at 7-7. Rob Ison raced 59 yards for a second-quarter Tech touchdown to give the Jackets the lead for good. Earl Wheby went around the end for 34 yards and another Tech TD in the third period.

Missouri drove once to the Jackets' oneyard line in the fourth quarter, but Tech snuffed out the attack and finished its season with an 8-2 record and a No. 16 national ranking by the Associated Press.

The Longhorns took a 14-0 advantage into the fourth quarter, with the help of a 60-yard punt return, when Tech began to make its move. Davey Eldredge scored for the Jackets on a fourthdown Statue of Liberty play, and Tech drove to the Texas 3-yard line in the closing seconds, but threw three incomplete passes. Tech completed the season ranked fifth in the nation by the Associated Press with a 9-2 record.

The Jackets scored on a 51-yard pass from Broyles to Johnny McIntosh and a two-yard run by Rumsey Taylor to complete an 8-3 season.

Georgia Tech (12-0) extended its unbeaten streak to 26 games and was named national champion by International News Service after beating Mississippi, 24-7, in its first Sugar Bowl appearance since 1944.

The Tech defense, which had given up fewer than five points a game during the season, allowed the Rebels to score on their first possession for a 7-0 lead, but shut them out the rest of the way behind the play of George Morris and Sam Hensley.

Quarterback Pepper Rodgers was the hero for the second straight year with a touchdown pass and a field goal to lead the Jackets, while Bill Brigman and Leon Hardeman each rushed for touchdowns.

Georgia Tech, playing in a major bowl game for the third consecutive year, unleashed a recordbreaking aerial attack to down the Mountaineers. The Jackets, 9-2 and ranked eighth by the Associated Press, set Sugar Bowl records for pass attempts (35), completions (20) and passing yards (268), and rolled up 438 yards in total offense.

Pepper Rodgers, always at his best in bowl games, was the central figure in the offensive attack, accounting for 23 points with his kicking and passing. He completed 16 of 26 passes for 195 yards, threw three TD passes and kicked one field goal and two extra points.

Sam Hensley led the Tech receiving corps with four catches for 76 yards and one touchdown, Dave Davis had four catches for 43 yards, and Henry Hair caught three passes for 29 yards and one touchdown.

Georgia Tech (10-1) and Pittsburgh met in bowl competition for the second time in less than a year, and the fourth-ranked Yellow Jackets won their sixth consecutive bowl game in six seasons, a college record which would stand for the next 17 years.

The decisive score came after Pittsburgh fumbled the second half kickoff and Tech's Wesley Gibbs recovered. That set up a 37-yard drive, capped by Paul Rotenberry's five-yard touchdown run to give Tech a 21-7 lead.

In the second half, Pitt never drove past the Jackets' 32-yard line, which it reached at the closing gun. The Panthers collected 313 yards in total offense but were hurt by two fumbles and two interceptions.

Ken Owen scored the first Tech touchdown on a two-yard dive with 8:39 left in the opening period. George Volkert took a pitchout from guarterback Toppy Vann and hit Jerry Nabors for the second score with 2:02 left in the half. Stan Flowers led the Tech ground attack with 63 yards on just four carries, setting up the Jackets' second TD with a 34-yard jaunt.

Tech's Wade Mitchell was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

Backup quarterback Jim Stevens completed 12 of 15 passes for 157 yards and three touchdowns and was named the game's Most Valuable Player as Georgia Tech won a thriller over Iowa State in its only Liberty Bowl.

Stevens was nearly the goat, however, when the Cyclones recovered his errant pitchout and drove 33 yards for a touchdown with 1:36 left in the game. But Iowa State quarterback George Amundson threw a two-point conversion pass away under pressure and left his team trailing by a point. Tech's Mark Fields recovered the ensuing onsides kick, and the Jackets ran out the clock to seal the win.

Tech, ranked 20th, struck first after recovering an Iowa State fumble with a 32-yard field goal by Cam Bonifay. But the Cyclones then scored twice for a 14-3 lead after one quarter. Tech rallied on a Stevens-to-Jimmy Robinson pass and a Gary Faulkner interception return to trail at the half, 21-17.

Stevens passed to Rob Healy for a touchdown in the third quarter to give the Jackets' the lead again, 24-21, then hit Kevin McNamara for a score in the fourth period for Tech's final points.





King ran for 122 yards on 16 carries, including the decisive touchdown with just 1:50 remaining in the game to complete the comeback. King's five-yard burst capped his best game of the season, and his 56-yard jaunt in the second quarter set up Tech's other touchdown, a oneyard sneak by Rampley.

Rampley, a sophomore replacing starter John Dewberry, completed 12 of 23 passes in his first collegiate start, while David Bell connected on a 40-yard field goal in the fourth period, his eighth consecutive successful attempt.

Tech's defense allowed White, the nation's leading rusher, his due with 158 yards but limited the rest of the Spartans to just 75 total yards.

The victory gave Tech a 9-2-1 record, its best since the Bobby Dodd Era, and gave the Rambling Wreck a No. 18 ranking in the final national poll.

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



Underdog Georgia Tech clinched the UPI national championship with a dominating 45-21 win over 13th-ranked Nebraska in Orlando, Fla., on New Year's Day as MVP Shawn Jones collected 318 yards of total offense and running back William Bell gained 127 yards on the ground. Tech completed a storybook season as the nation's only undefeated team with an 11-0-1 record.

"This is the greatest team I've ever coached," said national Coach of the Year Bobby Ross. "To me, they'll always be national champions."

Jones, who threw for a career high 277 yards and two touchdowns, directed Tech to a 21-0 lead with scoring tosses to Bell and Emmett Merchant in the second quarter. A Scott Sisson 37-yard field goal gave the Jackets a 24-14 halftime lead.

Nebraska threatened on its first possession of the second half, but Keith Holmes blocked a field goal attempt which led to a one-yard touchdown run by Jones. Bell added two touchdown runs, including a brilliant 57-yard jaunt. The 45 points is the most ever scored by Tech in a bowl game.

Strong safety Thomas Balkcom was voted the defensive MVP with two sacks. Also contributing to the outstanding defensive effort were linebackers Calvin Tiggle and Marlon Williams and cornerback Willie Clay.

1991 ALOHA BOWL

Georgia Tech 18, Stanford 17

December 25, 1991 Aloha Stadium, Honolulu, Hawaii

Jimy Lincoln's two-point conversion run with just 14 seconds remaining in the game provided Georgia Tech with an 18-17 come-from-behind victory over Stanford, making the final game of the Bobby Ross era a successful one before 34,433 fans at the 10th annual Jeep Eagle Aloha Bowl in Honolulu.

Willie Clay's 63-yard punt return set up Tech's game-winning 31-yard, seven play drive which was capped by a one-yard touchdown run by quarterback Shawn Jones with 14 seconds remaining. Disdaining the game-tying kick, Jones optioned to his right, pitching the ball to Lincoln, who cut back inside and dove across the goal for the game-winning points.

The win was Tech's third straight in bowl game competition and its second bowl victory in two seasons, boosting its all-time bowl record to 17-8 and its NCAA-best bowl winning percentage to .680. The game was also the final contest at Tech for Ross, who on Jan. 2 accepted the head coaching position with the San Diego Chargers of the NFL.

Stanford, ranked 17th, jumped to an early, 7-0 lead marching 48 yards in 6 plays for the score, a six-yard touchdown run by fullback Tommy Vardell.

The Jackets responded on their first possession, marching 60 yards in 10 plays for the tying score, a two-yard TD toss from Jones to tailback Michael Smith and with 8:33 remaining in the first quarter, the score was tied at 7-all.

Tech broke on top with 22 seconds left in the opening stanza when a Scott Sisson 24-yard field goal capped off a 74-yard, 11-play drive, all on the ground.

Stanford evened the game on its opening possession of the second half with a 38-yard field goal by Aaron Mills at the 9:21 mark for a 10-10 tie. Then Vardell, who rushed for a game-high 104 yards on 21 carries, put the Cardinal on top, 17-10, with a two-yard TD run with 5:50 to go in the quarter.

The Jackets saw one potential scoring threat thwarted on the final play of the third quarter when freshman fullback Rodney Wilkerson fumbled at the Cardinal one. Stanford's defense then held Tech to just three first downs in the second half until the game-winning drive.



Sophomore quarterback Joe Hamilton ran and passed for 356 yards and three touchdowns to lead Georgia Tech to a 35-30 victory over West Virginia in the 1997 Carquest Bowl at Pro Player Stadium in Miami, Fla.

Hamilton was named the game's Most Valuable Player after completing 19 of 36 passes for 274 yards and a touchdown while rushing for 82 yards on 14 carries, including scoring jaunts of nine and 30 yards.

GEORGE O'LEARY was involved in six Tech bowl appearances and four wins as defensive coordinator or head coach.

Tech, which piled up 484 total yards, built a 28-14 halftime advantage, then withstood a West Virginia comeback in the second half to claim its fourth straight bowl victory and increase its all-time bowl record to 18-8, the best winning percentage for teams with 10 or more bowl appearances.

The Jackets held Amos Zereoue, who entered the contest as the nation's third-leading rusher, to just 84 yards, 66 below his average.

Tech took the opening kickoff and marched 80 yards in 15 plays. Hamilton set up the touchdown, scrambling for 21 yards to the WVU nine on fourth down and 17. Four plays later, on fourth and goal, freshman fullback Ed Wilder scored from one yard out for a 7-0 advantage with 9:05 remaining in the quarter.

The Mountaineers wasted little time in retaliating, taking just six plays to cover 61 yards for a touchdown. Quarterback Marc Bulger, who completed 25 of 40 passes for 353 yards and two scores, completed three passes on the drive and Zereoue scored from 14 yards around right end to knot the score at 7-all with 6:26 remaining in the quarter.

The Jackets came right back on their next possession, driving 76 yards in seven plays with Hamilton completing a 17-yard, third down pass to tailback Charlie Rogers to keep the drive alive. Hamilton then covered the final 30 yards for the score on a quarterback draw at the 2:58 mark of the quarter, giving Tech a 14-7 lead it would not relinquish.

After Tech's defense stopped the Mountaineers, Hamilton engineered a 94-yard, 12-play drive which culminated in a three-yard touchdown pass to tight end Mike Lillie as Tech opened a 21-7 advantage with 19:11 remaining in the first half. West Virginia trimmed the margin with a 51-yard, seven play drive late in the second quarter. A 15-yard personal foul penalty gave the Mountaineers a first down at the Tech 21, and three plays later Bulger connected with wide receiver Jerry Porter for a 21-yard touchdown pass to cut the Tech lead to 21-14 with 4:45 to play before intermission.

The Jackets quickly marched 74 yards in 11 plays with Hamilton scoring from nine yards out with just 27 seconds on the clock to carry a 28-14 lead into halftime. The 28 first half points by Tech were its most in any half in its 26 bowl appearances as well as a Carquest Bowl record.

West Virginia began its comeback in the third quarter as Zereoue accumulated 63 yards and Bulger threw for 249 yards after intermission.

Zereoue scored from 19 yards out on a Statue of Liberty play with 9:26 remaining in the third quarter to trim Tech's lead to 28-21. Late in the quarter, West Virginia drove 93 yards, only to stall at the Tech three as linebackers Keith Brooking and Ron Rogers came up with big tackles to keep the Mountaineers out of the end zone. Jay Taylor's 21-yard field goal with 42 seconds in the quarter made the score 28-24.

Tech regained control in the fourth quarter as Hamilton led a 66-yard, seven-play drive, capped by a five-yard touchdown run by tailback Charles Wiley with 4:44 remaining in the game for a 35-24 lead.

West Virginia needed just 55 seconds to score as Bulger completed a short pass to Porter, who dodged two Tech defensive backs on the near sideline and sped 74 yards for a touchdown with 3:49 to play. The Mountaineers elected to go for the two-point conversion, but the pass failed, leaving Tech with a 35-30 advantage.


Georgia Tech 35, Notre Dame 28

January 1, 1999 Alltel Stadium, Jacksonville, Fla.

Quarterback Joe Hamilton threw three touchdown passes and caught another one and split end Dez White hauled in two long scoring passes to lift 11th-ranked Georgia Tech to a 35-28 victory over No. 17 Notre Dame in the 1999 Toyota Gator Bowl.

The win, before 70,791 fans at Alltel Stadium in Jacksonville, Fla., gave the Yellow Jackets their first 10-win season since the 1990 national title and just their second since 1956.

White, playing in his hometown, and Hamilton shared the Most Valuable Player honors after hooking up for the game-winning score on a 55-yard pass with 7:55 to play. That pass capped a nine-play, 91-yard scoring drive after Notre Dame had roared back from a 21-7 halftime deficit to tie the score on tailback Autry Denson's third touchdown of the day early in the fourth quarter.

Notre Dame dressed in green jerseys for the first time since the 1995 Fiesta Bowl, but the Jackets jumped in front early. On Tech's second possession, Hamilton, who completed 13 of 20 passes for 237 yards, led a 12-play, 87-yard drive that ate up nearly five minutes. The junior signal caller hit four passes on the drive, including a 28-yarder to tight end Russell Matvay and a 19yard strike to White, before he found himself on the receiving end of a five-yard touchdown pass. On second and goal at the Notre Dame five, Hamilton pitched to freshman tailback Joe Burns on a toss sweep to the right, and Burns threw back across the field and found Hamilton alone on the left side of the end zone. Brad Chambers added the extra point, and the Jackets led 7-0 with 6:22 left in the first quarter.

Notre Dame answered by driving 65 yards in six plays for a nine-yard touchdown run by Denson, who rushed for 130 yards on the day. Quarterback Jarious Jackson, returning from a sprained knee suffered in the Irish's 10th-game, keyed the drive with a 33-yard pass to Bobby Brown.

Tech dominated the remainder of the first half with a pair of long touchdown drives.

First the Jackets ate up 5:20 with a 10-play, 78-yard drive, highlighted by a 26-yard pass from Hamilton to Charlie Rogers. Phillip Rogers capped the drive with a two-yard dive over the top, giving Tech a 14-7 lead with 13:45 in the half.

Later in the second quarter, Hamilton drove the Jackets 84 yards on 10 plays, almost exclusively on the ground, including Charlie Rogers' 26-yard scamper around the left end. On second-and-five from the Irish nine, Hamilton hit senior Mike Sheridan for the score and a 21-7 lead with 4:26 left in the half.

Aided by a personal foul penalty after the Jackets had stopped Notre Dame on third down, the Irish threatened late in the first half, but Jim Sanson was short and wide on a 44-yard field goal attempt.

After the intermission, Notre Dame took the second half kickoff and drove 80 yards, all but eight of them on the ground by either Jackson or Denson, who scored on a one-yard run to cut Tech's lead to 21-14 with 10:47 remaining in the third quarter.

Fullback Virgil Johnson fielded Hunter Smith's high, short kickoff and rambled nine yards before fumbling, and Tony Driver recovered for Notre Dame at the Tech 26-yard line. The Irish took advantage of the turnover, using eight plays to cover the 26 yards as Jackson scored from two yards out.

Kofi Smith raced around the right end to block Sanson's extra point, but at 7:23 of the third quarter, Notre Dame had pulled within 21-20 without allowing Tech an offensive play in the second half.

The Jackets took over on their own 29 and quickly moved into Notre Dame territory. Tech faced third-and-10 at the ND 44 when Hamilton hit White, who beat cornerback Ty Goode down the left sideline for a 44-yard touchdown. The



seven-play, 71-yard drive took 3:41 and gave Tech a 28-20 advantage with 3:42 to play in the third quarter.

But Notre Dame continued to run the ball on Tech's defense and drove to midfield when, on the final play of the third quarter, Jackson hit Jay Johnson for 27 yards and a first down at the Tech 28.

Three plays later, Tech appeared to have the Irish stopped after Jackson threw incomplete on third-and-eight at the Tech 26, but a controversial personal foul penalty gave Notre Dame a first down at the 13. Denson covered the final 13 yards on three plays, the last a one-yard scoring run. After Jackson hit Brown for the twopoint conversion, the score was tied at 28 with 11:56 to play. The drive took 88 yards, 12 plays and nearly seven minutes.

Tech again had trouble handling the kickoff as the ball popped out of Sean Gregory's arms, but Mel Whatley recovered for the Jackets at the nine-yard line, where Tech began its gamewinning march.

Twice Hamilton kept the drive alive by connecting with Charlie Rogers for third-down conversions. Then on first down at the Tech 45, Hamilton froze the defense with a play-fake and found White open over the middle, and the speedy sophomore raced past safety Benny Guilbeaux and cornerback Deveron Harper for a 55-yard touchdown. After Chambers added the PAT, Tech was back in front, 35-28, with 7:55 left in the game.

Notre Dame had three possessions in the final 7:55 but netted minus-11 yards. On the Irish's final play, Tech defensive end Nate Stimson

sacked Jackson for a two-yard loss and knocked the ball loose, and Tech's Jesse Tarplin recovered at the Notre Dame 10-yard line with 49 seconds left to seal the win.

Tech's fifth straight bowl victory and third Gator Bowl win improved the nation's best bowl record to 19-8 (.704).

Freshman tailback Clinton Portis ran for 117 yards on just 12 carries, including a 73 yard touchdown run in the second quarter, and junior tailback James Jackson added 107 yards on 21 carries to lead Miami to a 28-13 victory over 16th-ranked Georgia Tech in the 55th Annual Toyota Gator Bowl in Alltel Stadium before a

crowd of 43,416 fans.

Tech's all-America quarterback Joe Hamilton was harried throughout the game by the Hurricanes' pass rush and managed to complete 20 of 40 passes for 245 yards but had two intercepted.

Miami took the opening kickoff and drove 66 yards in seven plays for the game's first score. James totaled 50 yards on five carries on the drive, including an eight-yard burst around left end for the score and a 7-0 lead with 12:23 left in the opening quarter.

Tech's defense twice held the Hurricanes in Yellow Jacket territory following an interception and a blocked punt. Tech drove 52 yards on seven plays before stalling at the Miami 27, and placekicker Luke Manget was wide left on a 44yard field goal attempt.

Miami quickly moved 73 yards on seven plays as quarterback Kenny Kelly hit Santana Moss for a 30-yard completion and then found Andre King for a 15-yard touchdown pass on the first play of the second quarter, giving the Hurricanes a 14-0 lead.

The Jackets finally got on the scoreboard late in the second quarter with a 77-yard, 10-play drive. Hamilton completed three passes on the drive to junior split end Dez White and then scored the touchdown on a 17-yard option run to cut the deficit to 14-7 with 4:12 remaining before intermission.

But Miami wasted little time in answering. Just two plays later, Portis broke two tackles at the line of scrimmage and then outran Tech's defenders to the end zone for a 73-yard jaunt that gave the Hurricanes a 21-7 lead with 3:09 left in the half.

The Jackets took the opening kickoff of the second half and moved 69 yards on 11 plays as Hamilton completed three passes for 39 yards. But the drive stalled at the Miami eight-yard line, and Tech was forced to settle for Manget's 25-yard field goal that trimmed the Hurricane advantage to 21-10.

With the help of a pair of 15-yard penalties and a 13-yard option run by Hamilton, the Jackets moved to the Miami 24, but on fourth down, Manget's field goal attempt was blocked by UM's Chris Campbell. Tech, though, got the ball back in just two plays as Jamara Clark intercepted a Kenny Kelly pass at the Miami 44. After Tech advanced to the Miami 19, Manget booted a 36yard field goal to cut the score to 21-13.

Miami reasserted itself early in the fourth quarter, marching 63 yards in 12 plays. Portis made clutch runs and backup quarterback Ken Dorsey completed four passes, including a 17yard touchdown to split end Reggie Wayne with 9:18 remaining in the game for the final 28-13 margin.

The Jackets, who saw their five-game bowl winning streak snapped, threatened twice in the game's waning moments, but one possession ended with an interception and the other fizzled when White, who had eight catches for 100 yards on the day, was stopped short on fourth down.



Miami's defense, which limited Tech to its lowest point total in 16 games, sacked Hamilton three times and held the Heisman Trophy runnerup without a touchdown pass for the first time in 14 games.

2000 CHICK-FIL-A PEACH BOWL

LSU 28, Georgia Tech 14 December 29, 2000 Georgia Dome, Atlanta, Ga.

Rohan Davey, taking over at quarterback in the second half, threw three touchdown passes to lead LSU to a 28-14 upset of No. 15 Georgia Tech in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl before a record crowd of 73,614 in the Georgia Dome.

Quarterback George Godsey and the Tech offense struggled after the month-long layoff since ending the regular season with a 27-15 victory at Georgia, committing six turnovers on four fumbles and two interceptions. Tech had only 12 turnovers during the regular season, six interceptions and six fumbles, one of the reasons the Yellow Jackets were able to average 435 yards and 33.8 points per game. Despite the loss, Georgia Tech finished with a 9-3 record in what many had expected to be a rebuilding year. The Jackets' fourth straight bowl was a first for the program since 1951-56.

LSU (8-4), playing in its first bowl since 1997 under first-year coach Nick Saban, rallied from a 14-3 halftime deficit.

After managing just 117 yards in the first half with starter Josh Booty at quarterback, the Tigers turned to Davey, who had been injured since October, to start the second half. He also had more protection up front as right tackle Brandon Winey, who wasn't even dressed in the first half because of a wrist injury, donned his pads to beef up LSU's line.

With Davey completing five passes, the Tigers went 70 yards in nine plays for their first touchdown, a three-yard completion to Tommy Banks.

LSU scored the go-ahead touchdown in the opening minute of the fourth quarter on a brilliant catch by Josh Reed, who jumped as high as he could to pull down the nine-yard pass, his right foot tapping inside the line just before he fell out of bounds.

John Corbello kicked a career-best 49-yard field goal, set up by a Tech fumble at its own 17-yard line before Davey finished the comeback with another three-yard touchdown pass to Banks. The scoring play with 3:12 remaining completed a 13-play, 91-yard drive that consumed more than seven minutes and clinched the offensive MVP award for Davey, who was 17-of-25 for 174 yards.

The Jackets slumped to their lowest-scoring game of the year and were shut out in the second half. They had two turnovers, managed just 100 yards and did not cross midfield in the second half until a drive in the waning minutes reached the LSU four-yard line.

But Godsey was knocked out with a knee injury and the drive stalled.

Godsey threw for 2,906 yards and 23 touchdowns during the regular season with only six interceptions but was just 19-of-36 for 177 yards, throwing two interceptions and losing two fumbles.

Georgia Tech could have buried LSU in the first half if not for four turnovers and a motion penalty that wiped out a 59-yard touchdown pass from Godsey to Kelly Campbell.

Instead, the Jackets settled for a 14-3 lead. Joe Burns' 32-yard run capped a nine-play, 80yard drive and gave Tech a 7-3 lead with 5:32 left in the first quarter. A nine-yard scoring run by Baton Rouge native Jermaine Hatch extended the lead to 14-3 with 1:15 remaining before halftime. Meanwhile, the Tech defense held firm despite the turnovers and held the Tigers to seven yards rushing.

LSU linebacker Bradie James, who missed nearly a week of practice after the death of his father, was selected the defensive MVP. He recovered two fumbles and had a sack.

2001 SEATTLE BOWL

Georgia Tech 24, Stanford 14

December 27, 2001 SAFECO Field, Seattle, Wash.

George Godsey passed for 266 yards and a touchdown, Kelly Campbell scored twice and the Georgia Tech the defense made a key goal-line stand as the Yellow Jackets defeated No. 11 Stanford, 24-14, in the inaugural Seattle Bowl.

The Jackets, under interim head coach Mac McWhorter, made their fifth straight bowl appearance before a crowd of 30,144 at Safeco Field. Tech (8-5) improved its bowl record to 20-10 for a winning percentage of .667 that ranks first in the nation.

"There had been so much negative attention given to this team," said Godsey, who was named the Most Valuable Player of his final game in a Tech uniform. "We pulled together. We wanted to salvage this season."

Campbell's second touchdown was a twoyard run on a reverse play with 1:29 left, capping a 13-play, 63-yard drive that sealed the victory after the Cardinal had pulled within three points. "When the play was called, I knew then that



I was going to score," said Campbell, Tech's alltime leading receiver who finished with 10 catches for 106 yards. "I got the ball and there was nothing in front of me but the end zone."

Tech dominated the first half to take a 17-3 lead at the intermission, but Stanford (9-3) drew to 17-14 with 11:39 remaining when backup quarterback Chris Lewis threw a four-yard touchdown pass to Teyo Johnson, then added a two-point pass to Ryan Wells.

The Rambling Wreck defense set the tone on the game's first drive, stopping Stanford three times at the Tech one-yard line. Brian Allen was stopped on two runs from the one, and linebacker Daryl Smith dropped Kerry Carter for a two-yard loss on fourth down.

Tech took over and drove 97 yards, their longest drive of the season that used 16 plays and 6:16 on the clock, capped by Will Glover's five-yard touchdown run.

"When the defense stopped them, we knew the offense had to make a statement," said Georgia Tech running back Sean Gregory, who rushed for a game-high 91 yards in place of all-ACC back Joe Burns, who was academically ineligible for the bowl. "We did. There is nothing more beautiful than a 97-yard touchdown drive."

Godsey, who completed 23 of 37 passes on the day, set the tone on Tech's first snap with a play-action pass from his own end zone, hitting Gregory for 14 yards. The senior signal-caller connected on seven of nine passes for 80 yards on the drive, the key play a 26-yard completion to Jonathan Smith down to the four-yard line.


Stanford needed 16 plays and seven minutes to drive from its own 20 to the Tech 18, but again the Rambling Wreck defense held, forcing the Cardinal to settle for Mike Biselli's 35yard field goal at the start of the second quarter.

Godsey engineered another long drive, this time covering 81 yards on seven plays as he teamed with Campbell for a 34-yard touchdown pass to give Tech a 14-3 lead with 9:33 left in the half. One play earlier, Godsey and Campbell hooked up for an 18-yard completion on fourthand-10 to set up the score.

After forcing a Stanford punt, Tech took over on its own 20 with a new wrinkle, inserting backup quarterback Andy Hall to run a series of option plays. Hall gained 18 yards on three carries, sandwiched around a 54-yard jaunt by Gregory to set up Luke Manget's 20-yard field goal with just two seconds left in the half. That sent Tech to the locker room with a 17-3 advantage.

Both offenses stalled in the third quarter, when Tech defense came up with another goalline stand. The Cardinal had a first down at Georgia Tech's two but managed a 26-yard field goal by Biselli.

Trailing 17-6, Stanford started the fourth quarter by inserting Lewis in place of starting quarterback Randy Fasani, who was 11-for-21 for 115 yards and was sacked three times. Despite three false start penalties on his first five snaps,

Lewis managed completions of 41 and 34 yards to move the Cardinal to the Tech five-yard line, setting up Johnson's leaping touchdown catch. Lewis finished 6-for-13 for 110 yards and one TD.

After an exchange of punts, Tech took over on its own 37-yard line, clinging to a three-point lead with 6:26 to play. Just as it had all afternoon, the Tech offense mixed run and pass to move the chains, including a key conversion on third-andone when Godsey lineup up in the shotgun and hit Smith for a seven-yard gain. A 16-yard completion to Smith moved Tech to the Stanford six, and two plays later, Campell took a reverse pitch from Godsey and raced into the end zone untouched for the clinching score.

The first football game at Safeco Field, home of the Seattle Mariners, was played with one end zone in left field and the other near home plate-the infield dirt was part of the field. The teams lined up side by side, sharing a sideline in the outfield.

Fresno St. 30, Georgia Tech 21

December 31, 2002 Spartan Stadium, San Jose, Calif.

Rodney Davis ran for 153 yards and two touchdowns and Fresno State held off Georgia Tech's second-half rally to defeat the Yellow Jackets, 30-21, in the Silicon Valley Classic.

Asen Asparuhov kicked a 33-yard field goal with 3:43 left, one of his three in the game, and Davis, who carried the ball 37 times, secured the win with a 28-yard touchdown run just over a minute later for the Bulldogs (9-5), who won their first postseason game since 1992 with a depleted roster. Seven players, including five starters, did not participate because of academic problems.

The Fresno State defense weathered the strong second-half comeback attempt by Georgia Tech freshman backup quarterback Damarius Bilbo.

Bilbo passed for one touchdown and ran for another after replacing AJ. Suggs, but Bilbo also threw four interceptions as the Yellow Jackets (7-6) committed seven turnovers.

Tech entered the second half trailing 13-7, but Bilbo put the Jackets ahead, 14-13, with a one-yard touchdown run midway through the third quarter.

Fresno answered on its next possession with Davis' three-yard touchdown run, which capped a six-play, 80-yard drive that was highlighted by Paul Pinegar's 68-yard completion to Gilbert.

Tech regained the advantage on Bilbo's 42yard touchdown pass to Smith, putting Tech ahead, 21-20, with just 51 seconds left in the third quarter.



Midway through the fourth guarter, the Bulldogs put together a 12-play, 63-yard drive that not only resulted in Aparuhov's 33-yard field goal and a 23-21 Fresno State lead, but ate up more than seven minutes on the clock.

Tech took over at its own 20 with 3:38 to play, but the Jackets were unable to move the ball and the possession ended when, on fourthand-two at the Tech 28, Bilbo's pass fell incomplete. On the next play, Davis sealed the win by going 28 yards for the touchdown and a 30-21 advantage.

The Jackets got the ball game two more times, and Bilbo moved Tech to the Fresno 33 with a 47-yard pass to Bridges, but both possessions ended with interceptions.

The game was a muddy mess from the start after hard rain fell the night before. It took only a few plays for Tech's gleaming white uniformsthe Jackets wore their traditional white jerseys with white pants for the first time since 1994to turn a dull brown, and there were plenty of slips and missed plays.

Suggs hit Kerry Watkins for a 35-yard touchdown pass late in the first half, and with Fresno managing only a pair of field goals, Tech led 7-6 and appeared ready to take the advantage into the intermission. But on secondand-six from the Tech 24-yard line with just 26 seconds left, Suggs' pass down the right sideline was underthrown and intercepted by Dee Meza, who returned its 48 yards for the touchdown and a 13-7 Fresno State lead.

After its school-record sixth straight postseason appearance, Georgia Tech is now 20-11 (.645) in bowl games.

Tech placekicker Luke Manget made three extra points to give him 160 straight PATs, one shy of the NCAA record for consecutive extra points of 161, set by John Becksvoort of Tennessee from 1991-94.



2004 HUMANITARIAN BOWL

Georgia Tech 52, Tulsa 10

January 3, 2004 Bronco Stadium, Boise, Idaho

Most Valuable Player PJ. Daniels rushed for 307 yards and four touchdowns and the Georgia Tech defense recovered six fumbles and allowed just 144 yards as the Yellow Jackets crushed Tulsa, 52-10, in the Humanitarian Bowl in Boise, Idaho.

Daniels, who carried 31 times, established an NCAA record for rushing yards in a bowl game with the second-best game in Tech history. He scored on runs of nine, one, 33 and 38 yards to tie the Tech record for touchdowns in a game.

Daniels was virtually all the offense needed by the Jackets, who finished with just 19 yards passing while playing four quarterbacks but set a school record for points in a bowl game.

The Jackets collected seven sacks and 14 tackles behind the line of scrimmage as Tulsa netted minus-56 yards rushing, a Tech school record. Tulsa managed 103 of its 144 yards and its only touchdown in the fourth quarter after the Jackets emptied their bench.

Tech led just 10-3 at the intermission despite holding the Hurricane to 20 yards of offense (minus-29 yards rushing) in the first half. On Tech's first offensive play of the second half, Daniels raced 61 yards to the Tulsa four and then scored three plays later. The Tech defense then sacked Tulsa quarterback James Kilian and forced him to fumble, recovering at the eight-yard line to set up another score, this one a two-yard plunge by Chris Woods, for a 24-3 lead. Tech's next drive started at its own 10-yard

line, but Daniels ripped off a 34-yard gain to the Tulsa 47, then six plays later, he broke loose for a 33-yard scoring run around the right side. That carry, on which Daniels plowed through several tacklers downfield, put him well over 200 yards on the day, and gave the Jackets 31-3 advantage with 1:12 left in the third quarter.

After the Jackets recovered another Tulsa fumble, Daniels needed just one play to score his fourth touchdown of the day, a 38-yard jaunt for a 38-3 lead with 14:10 to play in the game.

With the scoreboard showing Daniels' total at 292 yards, Tech players implored head coach Chan Gailey to let him go for 300. He didn't have to wait long for his chance as Dawan Landry came up with Tech's fourth fumble recovery of the day at the Tulsa 21.

Daniels carried once for five yards and then left the game after a 10-yard scamper put him over the 300-yard mark. His effort ranks second in Georgia Tech history, trailing only Eddie Lee Ivery's then-NCAA record 356 yards against Air Force in 1978, and third among ACC players.

Fifth-year senior Jermaine Hatch closed out the scoring with two fourth-quarter touchdowns, both set up by Tulsa fumbles.

Freshman Joe Anoai had two of Tech's six fumble recoveries, and another fumble was caused and recovered by wide receiver Jonathan Smith, who played a few series on defense.

Starting quarterback Reggie Ball sustained a minor injury late in the first half, so senior AJ. Suggs started the second half but threw only two passes. He gave way to senior Brian Camp, and then walk-on Robby Brown finished the contest.

Tech's 42 second-half points tied the school record for the modern era.





TECH 17, AUBURN 3

September 6, 2003

The Georgia Tech defense allowed just 230 yards of total offense as the Yellow Jackets knocked off 17th-ranked Auburn, 17-3, before a sellout crowd of 55,000 in the first game at the expanded Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field. Freshman quarterback Reggie Ball's 54-yard completion to Nate Curry on Tech's first offensive play set up Dan Burnett's 22-yard field goal. Tech extended its lead to 10-0 on PJ. Daniels' one-yard touchdown run in the second quarter, and then Ball added a 26-yard touchdown pass to Mark Logan.

Ball completed nine of 21 passes for 149 yards and rushed for 26 yards, but the story was the Tech defense, which sacked Auburn quarterback Jason Campbell seven times and held the Tigers to just 40 yards rushing. The Jackets made a key defensive stand late in the first half, forcing Auburn to settle for a field goal after driving deep into Tech territory to a first down at the six-yard line. Another crucial sequence followed in the third quarter after Auburn stopped the Jackets on fourth-and-one at the Tech 41. The Tigers took over and faced third-and-two at the Tech 33 when Daryl Smith and Eric Henderson tackled the Tigers' Carnell Williams for a three-yard loss, and then Smith sacked Campbell on fourth down. Henderson, Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week, had three sacks, four tackles for loss and a forced fumble, while Smith added 10 tackles and Keyaron Fox had 15 hits, a sack and two tackles for loss.

TECH 24, VANDERBILT 17, OT

September 27, 2003

Reggie Ball threw the tying touchdown pass with 32 seconds left in regulation and then scored the winning touchdown in overtime in Georgia Tech's 24-17 win at Vanderbilt P.J. Daniels added 105 yards rushing, and Ball became only the third quarterback in Tech history to rush (103 yards) and pass (108 yards) for 100 yards in the same game.

Tech trailed 17-10 after Vanderbilt scored 17 straight points to take their first lead with just 2:12 to play. The Jackets took over on their own 11, and on third-and-three from the 18, Ball scrambled 45 yards to the Vandy 37. Five plays later, he hit tight end John Paul Foschi for a six-yard touchdown pass to tie the score. After a squib kickoff, Vanderbilt needed just two completions to get into field goal range, but Tech's Eric Henderson blocked a 44-yard



attempt. On the first play of overtime, Ball faked right, then bootlegged left and dove into the end zone for the score. Free safety James Butler sealed the win with a leaping interception at the goal line on Vandy's first play.

TECH 24, NC STATE 17


November 2, 2002

Gordon Clinkscale's 14-yard touchdown run with 9:23 to play capped Georgia Tech's fourth-quarter rally as the Yellow Jackets won 24-17 to hand eighth-ranked NC State its first loss. Trailing 17-9 in the fourth quarter, Tech drove 80 yards on nine plays, capped by a twoyard touchdown pass from A.J. Suggs to tight end John Paul Foschi. Suggs then added a twopoint conversion pass to Jonathan Smith, who made the key play on the drive with a 28-yard reception when Tech was facing third-and-19 at its own 11. After forcing NC State to go threeand-out, Kelley Rhino's 26-yard punt return to the Wolfpack 22-yard line set up Clinkscale's go ahead touchdown two plays later. The Tech defense made several key plays down the stretch, including a fumble recovery and a fourth-down pass breakup by Reuben Houston and an interception by Jeremy Muyres on NC State's final possession.

TECH 31, CLEMSON 28

October 28, 2000

George Godsey passed for 454 yards, including the game-winning touchdown to Kerry Watkins with just seven seconds left, to lift Georgia Tech to a 31-28 victory at fourth-ranked Clemson, the highest ranked team that Tech has beaten since knocking off top-ranked Virginia in 1990. Clemson took a 21-16 lead on Brian Mance's 88-yard punt return at the end of the third quarter, but Godsey quided the Jackets on two 80-yard scoring drives in the final 10 minutes. First he hit Kelly Campbell for a 48-yard touchdown with 6:35 to play. After Clemson went ahead 28-24 on a Willie Simmons-to-Rod Gardner touchdown pass with 1:52 left, Godsey took over at his own 20 and completed seven of 11 passes for 72 yards, capped by a 16-yard touchdown to Watkins, who was knocked down on the play before making a spectacular one-handed catch in the corner of the end zone. Watkins caught four passes for 51 yards on the final drive, while Campbell finished the game with 209 yards receiving on a school record-tying 14 catches. The Tech defense held the Tigers to 354 total yards—138 yards below their average—and 14 points (Clemson had a punt return for a touchdown and a blocked punt that gave them the ball inside the one-yard line). On 14 offensive possessions, Clemson scored twice, and the Tigers ran 64 offensive plays to 97 for Tech.

TECH 51, GEORGIA 48, OT

November 27, 1999

Luke Manget's 38-yard field goal in overtime capped a dramatic ending and lifted 16th-ranked Georgia Tech to a 51-48 victory over No. 20 Georgia. The Bulldogs overcame a 41-24 deficit in the second half and appeared to have the game won in regulation. After Tech tied the game at 48-all on Joe Hamilton's sixyard touchdown pass to Will Glover with 2:37 left, Georgia drove down the field to a first-andgoal at the Tech two-yard line with just 20 seconds on the clock. Rather than try the gamewinning field goal, Georgia ran tailback Jasper Sanks up the middle, but Sanks fumbled in the pile, and Tech's Chris Young recovered to force overtime.

After Georgia's overtime possession ended with Marvious Hester's interception in the end zone, Tech opted for a 38-yard field goal try on third down. Manget's kick was blocked by Kendrell Bell, but holder George Godsey recovered the ball behind the line of scrimmage and returned it to the UGA 21. That gave Tech another chance on fourth down, and this time Manget's kick was good. The 99 points marked the highest scoring game in the 95-year history of the series, and the two teams combined for 1,104 yards of offense.

TECH 31, N. CAROLINA 24, OT

October 9, 1999

Luke Manget's 36-yard field goal with five seconds left forced the first overtime game in Georgia Tech history, and Joe Hamilton scored the winning touchdown on a six-yard run, giving the Rambling Wreck a 31-24 win over

TECH 21, GEORGIA 19

November 28, 1998

Brad Chambers' 35-yard field goal with just two seconds left capped a 14-point fourthquarter comeback and lifted 17th-ranked Georgia Tech over No. 12 Georgia, 21-19, in Athens for the Jackets' first win over their archrival since 1990. Tech trailed 19-7 when a one-yard touchdown run by Joe Burns and a two-point conversion by quarterback Joe Hamilton made the score 19-15 with 13 minutes to play. Chambers hit a career-long 49yarder with 5:01 left to pull the Jackets within one, and after Tech stopped the Bulldogs on three plays, Chambers' game-winning field goal capped a 52-yard, 10-play drive.

TECH 24, CLEMSON 21


November 12, 1998

Freshman tailback Joe Burns' one-yard run with 1:00 left gave 23rd-ranked Georgia Tech a 24-21 victory at Clemson in an ESPN Thursday night game. Burns' score capped a 57-yard, seven-play drive engineered by quarterback Joe Hamilton, who completed three passes for 53 yards on the drive, including a 28-yard, thirddown completion to Charlie Rogers to the Clemson 19. He then connected with Dez White for 15 yards to the four and ran three yards to the one.

TECH 41, VIRGINIA 38

October 17, 1998

Georgia Tech rallied from a 21-point thirdquarter deficit to upend sixth-ranked Virginia, 41-38, on Dez White's 54-yard touchdown reception with 4:40 left at Bobby Dodd Stadium. Tech trailed 38-17 when Delaunta Cameron's 34-yard fumble return, resulting from Nate Stimson's sack of UVa quarterback Aaron Brooks, cut the margin to 38-24 with 3:09 left in the third quarter. After Brad Chambers' 47yard field goal made it 38-27, Tech quarterback Joe Hamilton hit White for a 35-yard touchdown with 8:13 to play, bringing the Jackets within 38-33. After forcing Virginia to punt, Tech began its game-winning drive at its own 31, and on third-and-seven from the Tech 46, Hamilton

found White, who turned a short slant pass into his third touchdown of the game. Tech had to weather a final threat that ended when a 54yard field goal attempt by Virginia's Todd Braverman fell just short with 21 seconds left. The Jackets forced the long field goal because one play earlier, Stimson wrapped up Brooks and drew an intentional grounding penalty that resulted in a 12-yard loss. White set a school record with 243 yards receiving and Tech won despite being outgained, 600-370.

TECH 23, CLEMSON 20

September 27, 1997

Backup kicker Brad Chambers booted the game-winning, 20-yard field goal with just 1:54 left to lift Tech over 17th-ranked Clemson. The Jackets led for most of the contest until the Tigers tied the score at 20-20 with eight minutes to play. With less than four minutes left, Tech's Harvey Middleton set up the winning score as he returned a punt 21 yards to the Tiger 44, and then on first down, he made a diving 39-yard reception at the five-yard line.

TECH 13, VIRGINIA 7

October 5, 1996

Georgia Tech used outstanding special teams and a strong defensive effort that forced five turnovers to upset 12th-ranked Virginia, 13-7. Tech scored all its points in the game's first 20 minutes on a pair of field goals, including a 53-yarder by Dave Frakes, and a touchdown by C.J. Williams, and then held on despite managing only 32 yards of offense in the second half. Rodney Williams punted nine times for a 40-yard average, including a 77-

yard blast, and six times pinned the Cavaliers inside the 20. Tech's defense made four interceptions and a fourth-quarter stand after the Cavs drove to the Tech 18-yard line in the final minutes.

TECH 27, NC STATE 19

November 11, 1995

Backup quarterback Brandon Shaw guided Tech to 21 fourth-quarter points as the Jackets rallied from 13 points down. Tech trailed 19-6 with 2:54 left in the third when starting QB Donnie Davis left with a shoulder injury. Facing third-and-17 from his own eight, Shaw moved Tech down the field in 17 plays, capped by CJ. Williams' five-yard run with 11:24 to play. On State's next possession, Ryan Stewart recovered a fumbled pitch at the NCS 28, and two plays later, Tech went ahead for good on Williams' eight-yard touchdown run with 10:04 left. He added another score, his fourth of the day, at the 4:50 mark.

TECH 16, NC STATE 13

October 3, 1992

Scott Sisson's 29-yard field goal on the game's final play, set up by a 54-yard pass from Shawn Jones to Keenan Walker, lifted 23rd-ranked Georgia Tech over No. 21 NC State. Tech had taken over on its own 34-yard line with just 11 seconds left after State's Steve Videtich missed a potential game-winning 51-yard field goal. Sisson also kicked a 36-yard field goal to tie the score with just 2:27 left in the game.

TECH 18, STANFORD 17

December 25, 1991, Aloha Bowl

Quarterback Shawn Jones scored on a one-yard run with just 14 seconds left and tailback Jimy Lincoln added the winning points with a two-point conversion run to give Tech an 18-17 win over 17th-ranked Stanford in the Aloha Bowl. Stanford took a 17-10 lead on Tommy Vardell's second touchdown of the game with 5:50 left in the second quarter, and the score remained that way until the game's final seconds. With 1:57 remaining, Tech's Willie Clay, fielded a punt at the his own six-yard line and returned it 63 yards to the Cardinal 31, setting up the Jackets' seven-play drive for the win.

TECH 19, FURMAN 17

November 9, 1991

Furman held the ball and a 17-16 lead with less than two minutes to play when Tech OLB Marlon Williams sacked Paladin QB Hugh Swilling and caused a fumble that was recovered by Tech's Coleman Rudolph at the Furman 22. Three plays later, Scott Sisson kicked the game-winning, 37-yard field goal with 21 seconds left.

TECH 24, VIRGINIA 21

September 19, 1991

Scott Sisson beat Virginia on a last-second kick for the second straight year, this time booting a 33-yarder on the game's final play for the 24-21 win. The Cavaliers tied the score on a 19-yard touchdown from Bobby Goodman to Aaron Mundy with just 1:56 left, but Shawn Jones drove Tech 58 yards in 11 plays, hitting a 19-yard pass to Jason McGill to set up Sisson.

TECH 6, VIRGINIA TECH 3

November 10, 1990

Scott Sisson kicked two field goals in the final five minutes, including the game-winner from 38 yards out with just eight seconds left to keep the Yellow Jackets undefeated on the road to their 1990 national championship.

TECH 41, VIRGINIA 38

November 3, 1990

In a game which has been called the greatest in Atlantic Coast Conference history, Tech fell behind the nation's No. 1-ranked team, 28-14, at the half before rallying to win on Scott Sisson's 37-yard field goal with just seven seconds left. Tech tied the score at 28-28 in the third quarter on Jerry Gilchrist's 12-yard reverse and Shawn Jones' 26-yard touchdown pass to Emmett Merchant. After Virginia regained the lead on a 63-yard bomb from Shawn Moore to

Herman Moore, Tech pulled even again on William Bell's eight-yard touchdown run, and then Sisson put the Jackets ahead, 38-35, with a 32-yard field goal with seven minutes to go. UVa had a firstand-goal at the one but were forced to settle for a tying field goal with 2:34 left to set the stage for Sisson's heroics.

TECH 21, CLEMSON 19

October 13, 1990

Eighteenth-ranked Georgia Tech used Kevin Tisdel's 87-yard kickoff return and a dramatic goal-line stand to knock off 15th-ranked Clemson for its ninth straight win. A pair of Shawn Jones touchdown passes gave Tech a 14-3 halftime lead, but Clemson chipped away with three second half field goals by Chris Gardocki. Tisdel's return set up T.J. Edwards' five-yard touchdown for a 21-12 advantage with 13:53 left. Clemson drove to the Tech one-yard line, but linebacker Calvin Tiggle keyed a goal-line stand on fourth down. The Tigers managed a touchdown two minutes later after recovering a fumble at the Tech 41, and then the Jackets weathered Gardocki's 60-yard field attempt, which fell just short with 59 seconds left.

TECH 13, BOSTON COLLEGE 12

November 25, 1989

Scott Sisson kicked two 35-yard field goals in the final six minutes, including the gamewinner with 42 seconds left, as Tech escaped with a 13-12 victory. Sisson's winning field goal capped a nine-play, 56-yard drive keyed by Shawn Jones, who had scrambles of 15 and 10 yards and completed an 18-yard pass to Brent Goolsby on the drive.

TECH 17, NORTH CAROLINA 14

October 21, 1989

With Georgia Tech trailing 14-10 and facing third-and-11, Shawn Jones scrambled 30 yards for the winning touchdown with just 51 seconds left. Tech led 10-0 late in the third quarter, but UNC went ahead by recovering a blocked punt in the end zone with 6:35 left.

TECH 30, CLEMSON 14

October 14, 1989

Shawn Jones passed for 223 yards and two touchdowns and the Georgia Tech defense forced five turnovers to knock off 14th-ranked Clemson, 30-14, the Tigers' first homecoming loss in 19 years. Jones threw scoring passes of 81 yards to Bobby Rodriguez and eight yards to Jerry Mays, who also rushed for 97 yards and a score. Tech's defense had two interceptions, two fumble recoveries and a blocked field goal while holding the Tigers to 111 yards rushing.

TECH 28, MARYLAND 24

October 7, 1989

Shawn Jones threw four touchdown passes, three of them in the third quarter, as Georgia Tech overcame deficits of 14-0 and 21-7 to snap a 16-game ACC losing streak. Tech fell behind 14-0 before getting on the board with a touchdown just 18 seconds before half-time. Maryland regained its 14-point lead with a score early in the third quarter before Jones tossed three touchdowns in an eight-minute span, two of them to tight end Tom Covington.

TECH 34, SOUTH CAROLINA 0

October 15, 1988

Andre Thomas grabbed two of Georgia Tech's four interceptions, returning one 51 yards for a touchdown, as the Yellow Jackets stunned eighth-ranked South Carolina, 34-0, at Bobby Dodd Stadium. Thomas was named the national Defensive Player of the Week by *Sports Illustrated* and *The Sporting News*. Jerry Mays rushed for 130 yards and Stefen Scotton scored two touchdowns on the ground. Quarterback Todd Rampley completed 14 of 22 passes for 170 yards, including a 12-yard touchdown to Steve Davenport.

TECH 20, GEORGIA 16

November 30, 1989


Gary Lee's electrifying 95-yard kickoff return proved to be the game-winning play as Georgia Tech downed 20th-ranked Georgia on a foggy night at Grant Field. Tech jumped out to early leads of 3-0 and 10-3 before watching the Bulldogs dominate the second and third quarters by piling up 341 yards rushing. But after Georgia took a 16-10 lead with a field goal, Lee authored the game-winning play on the ensuing kickoff. Taking the ball at the five, the junior speedster raced down the East sideline and, after a crucial block from Damian Burke, sped untouched into the end zone for a 17-16 advantage with 4:25 left in the third quarter. The Jackets added insurance on David Bell's 46-yard field goal, but the game was not decided until Tech linebacker Jim Anderson recovered a fumble by UGA quarterback James Jackson at midfield in the closing minute.

TECH 17, MICHIGAN STATE 14

December 31, 1985, All-American Bowl

Malcolm King, who rushed for 122 yards, scored the winning touchdown on a five-yard run with 1:50 left. With four players suspended, including starting QB John Dewberry and starting SE Gary Lee, Tech trailed 14-7 until David Bell's 40-yard field goal with 7:08 in the game cut the deficit to 14-10. The winning drive, covering 42 yards in eight plays, was set up when Tech's Pat Swilling recovered a fumble by Spartan tailback Lorenzo White at the MSU 42.





TECH 28, CLEMSON 21

September 29, 1984

Fullback Chuck Easley's one-yard plunge with just 33 seconds left capped a nine-play, 54-yard drive-all on the ground-to lift 18thranked Tech to a 28-21 upset of 12th-ranked Clemson, ending the Tigers 20-game ACC winning streak. Tech led 21-0 at the half, but Clemson stormed back to tie the score with 10 minutes to play.

TECH 24, ALABAMA 21

September 12, 1981

Robert Lavette scored the winning touchdown on a two-yard run with 3:57 left as Tech shocked fourth-ranked Alabama in the season opener at Legion Field in Birmingham. Alabama led 10-0 and 13-7 early and took a 21-14 into the fourth quarter before Ron Rice's 28-yard field goal brought Tech within 21-17. The winning drive covered 80 yards, keyed by a 54-yard completion on third down from Mike Kelley to Ken Whisenhunt. Alabama's 50-yard field goal attempt on the game's final play fell short.

TECH 3, NOTRE DAME 3

November 8, 1980

In one of three matchups with No. 1ranked teams in 1980, Georgia Tech shocked top-ranked Notre Dame with a 3-3 tie at Grant Field. Freshman guarterback Ken Whisenhunt's 23-yard completion to Jeff Keisler set up Johnny Smith's 39-yard field goal with 6:11 left in the second quarter. Late in the game, Notre Dame's Stacey Toran intercepted Ted Peeples' pass and the Irish moved downfield for Harry Oliver's game-tying field goal with just 4:44 left to play.

TECH 6, SOUTH CAROLINA 3

October 7, 1978

Johnny Smith's 34-yard field goal with just 57 seconds left gave Tech a 6-3 win. With the score tied at 3-3, Tech took over with 4:55 to play and covered 53 yards in nine plays to set up the winning kick.

TECH 23, NOTRE DAME 14

November 6, 1976

With quarterback Gary Lanier directing Tech's wishbone attack, the Jackets knocked off 11th-ranked Notre Dame. 23-14. without throwing a single pass. Tech trailed 14-3 late in the first half when Drew Hill's 46-yard reverse set up a score by Lanier. In the second half, the Jackets held Notre Dame to just 21 yards rushing while scoring 13 unanswered points. David Sims led Tech with 122 yards and two touchdowns, while Eddie Lee Ivery added 81 vards rushing.

TECH 29, NORTH CAROLINA 28

October 12, 1974

Adrian Rucker scored from seven yards out with just 36 seconds left and then Rudy Allen hit Jimmy Robinson for the two-point conversion to give Georgia Tech a 29-28 victory over North Carolina at Grant Field. The Tar Heels had gone ahead on Chris Kupec's fiveyard touchdown with 2:34 to play, but Randy Rhino returned the kickoff 57 yards and then Allen completed three straight passes to Robinson for a first down at the UNC seven with 43 seconds left. David Sims, who rushed for 134 yards on 15 carries, scored twice and fullback Jimmy Murray added another touchdown to give Tech a 21-14 lead, before UNC answered with a touchdown run by Kupec to knot the score at 21-21.

TECH 31, IOWA STATE 30

December 18, 1972, Liberty Bowl

Tech trailed 14-3 after one quarter and 21-17 at the half before taking a 24-21 lead on a 22-yard pass from Jim Stevens to Rob Healy with seven minutes left in the third quarter. After Iowa State tied the game with a field goal, Stevens tossed the game-winning touchdown, a three-yard completion to Kevin McNamara with 11:28 to play. Iowa State had a chance to win the game, however, after recovering Stevens'

errant pitch and then driving 33 yards for a touchdown with 1:36 left. But the Cyclones failed on the two-point conversion, and Tech's Mark Fields recovered the ensuing onside kick.

TECH 21, MICHIGAN STATE 16

September 23, 1972

Georgia Tech quarterback Eddie McAshan threw for 239 yards and two touchdowns, including a 77-yard touchdown strike to flanker Jimmy Robinson on Tech's first play of the game, to lead the Yellow Jackets to a 21-16 victory at 18th-ranked Michigan State. McAshan, who completed 16 of 26 passes, also hit Robinson for a 36-yard touchdown that gave Tech a 21-3 lead at the end of the third quarter. The Spartans fought back with a pair of fourthquarter touchdowns and were driving for another score when all-America cornerback Randy Rhino ended the threat with an interception at the Tech 14.

TECH 17, BAYLOR 10

September 27, 1969

Tech scored the winning touchdown on a 21-yard pass from Charlie Dudish to Steve Harkey with just 44 seconds left. With the game tied at 10, an interception by David Polk gave Tech possession at its own 46-yard line with 1:37 to play, and six plays later the Jackets scored. Baylor then drove into Tech territory but Jeff Ford sealed the win with an interception at the Tech 11.

TECH 6, GEORGIA 0

November 29, 1969

Jack Williams sneaked over from one-yard out for the game's only touchdown in the second quarter as Georgia Tech upset bowlbound Georgia at Grand Field, Tech's first shutout of the Bulldogs since 1956. Jeff Ford ended Georgia's only serious scoring threat with an interception in the end zone with six minutes left, while Bubba Hoats tied the Tech record with three interceptions.

TECH 23, TULANE 19

October 26, 1968

Jack Williams hit Kenny Bounds for a seven-yard touchdown pass with just 45 seconds left as the Jackets overcame Tulane's 12-point rally in the final six minutes. Tech led 16-7 late in the game but the Green Wave drove 80 yards for a touchdown with 2:52 left and then recovered the ensuing onside kick at the Tech 44, leading to the go-ahead touchdown and a 19-16 lead with just 1:59 to play before the Jackets began their winning drive at the Tulane 23.

TECH 21, AUBURN 20

October 19, 1968

Tech trailed 14-0 at the end of the first quarter and 20-14 at the end of three quarters before scoring the winning touchdown on a three-yard run by Kenny Bounds with six minutes left. The Jackets withstood Auburn's 29yard field goal attempt with 57 seconds left.

TECH 6, TENNESSEE 3

October 8, 1966

Bunky Henry's two second-quarter field goals, including a career-long 41-yarder, proved to be the difference as ninth-ranked Georgia Tech knocked off No. 8 Tennessee, 6-3, in a nationally televised contest at Grant Field. After Tennessee kicker Gary Wright gave the Volunteers the early lead with a 27-yard field goal, John Sias returned the kickoff 49 yards and then Tech quarterback Kim King, who was named National Player of the Week, hit three passes to Steve Almond down to the UT seven to set up Henry's first field goal from 22 yards out. On the Vols' next possession, linebacker W.J. Blane intercepted a pass at the UT 45 and returned it to the 32, leading to Henry's second field goal. Blane preserved the victory with his second interception of the day at the Tech 23yard line with two minutes to play. Tech won despite being outgained, 244-127 yards.

TECH 7, ALABAMA 6

November 17, 1962

In a classic showdown that head coach Bobby Dodd called his greatest victory, Georgia Tech ended top-ranked Alabama's 26-game unbeaten streak with a 7-6 victory before 52,971 fans at Grant Field, at the time an Atlanta record football attendance. Tech dominated the first half, taking a 7-0 lead on Mike McNames nine-yard touchdown run with 4:22 in the second quarter while allowing the Crimson Tide to cross midfield just once. McNames had set up his score by intercepting a Joe Namath pass and returning it 26 yards to the Bama 14.

The Tide managed its only score in the fourth quarter when Billy Lothridge bobbled the snap on a punt and was ruled down at the nine-yard line. Four plays later, Cotton Clark's two-yard touchdown made the score 7-6 with 5:31 to play. Alabama elected to go for two, but end Jack Hurlbut was tackled by McNames and Ed Griffin. After the Tide recovered the onsides kick at the Tech 33, Namath's first pass was intercepted by Frank Sexton, who returned it to the Alabama 42, where his fumble was recovered by the Tide. Namath moved his team to a first down at the Tech 14 with less than two minutes to play. Rather than set up a field goal, Namath threw for the end zone and his pass was picked off by Don Toner with 1:05 left, preserving Tech's first win over a Bear Bryant-coached Alabama team.

TECH 14, TENNESSEE 7

November 5, 1960

Billy Williamson's 93-yard kickoff return late in the first quarter gave Georgia Tech the lead for good and the Rambling Wreck defense made it stand up as Tech recorded a 14-7 upset over eighth-ranked Tennessee at Grant Field. The Jackets returned a punt 26 yards to the 16yard line, and on the next play, halfback Chick Graning found the end zone for a 7-0 lead. After the Vols tied the score, Williamson's return gave the Jackets a lead they would not relinquish. Led by Billy Shaw and Larry Stallings the Tech defense limited the Vols to just 58 yards in total offense over the final three quarters of play and only 139 yards for the game.

TECH 16, SMU 12

September 26, 1959

Quarterback Fred Braselton passed for 73 yards and two touchdowns and rushed for 59 more to lead 16th-ranked Georgia Tech to a 16-12 victory over sixth-ranked SMU at Grant Field. Trailing 12-7, Braselton set up the winning score with a 33-yard run and then hit Fred Murphy for a 10-yard scoring pass to put Tech ahead for good, 13-12, late in the third quarter.

TECH 17, BAYLOR 14

January 1, 1952, Orange Bowl

Pepper Rodgers' six-yard field goal with 2:56 left in the game broke a 14-14 tie to give Tech a 17-14 victory over Baylor in the Orange Bowl. The Yellow Jackets had tied the game on a touchdown pass from Darrell Crawford to Buck Martin with six minutes to play.





COACHING HISTORY

BOSS ROSS: Bobby Ross was the head coach of Tech's 1990 national championship team.

Chan Gailey is the 11th full-time football coach in school history. Prior to 1904, when John Heisman became the school's first permanent head coach, the team was "coached" by professors, interested townspeople or one of the players.

Professor Ernest E. West, a Naval College graduate, directed Tech's first football team in 1892. In 1893 and '94, the squad was coached by volunteers Frank O. Spain, a Mathematics professor, and Lt. Leonard Wood (who later became famous as the colonel in command of Roosevelt's Rough Riders and as Governor General of Cuba), then stationed at Ft. McPherson in Atlanta. The rules were rather lax in those days, so Spain and Wood also played on the team.

The next volunteer coach of record was R.B. "Cow" Nalley in 1898, a "Mr. Collier" in 1899, Dr. Cyrus W. Strickler in 1901, and John McKee in 1902.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP RECOGNITION

Georgia Tech has won four national championships. Tech's four titles are by virtue of a national wire service (1952 & 1990) or by consensus of polls available at the time (1917 & 1928).

Tech's undefeated 1951 squad did not win a wire service title (Tennessee won the AP and UPI crowns), but the Jackets, along with Illinois, earned national championship recognition by the Boand System. William Boand of Tucson, Ariz., developed a mathematical formula that was published in newspapers from 1930-60.

Tech's 1951 and 1956 teams also earned national championship recognition by the Berryman system, a mathematical formula developed by Clyde Berryman of Washington, D.C. in 1990. Berryman named predated national champions from 1940-89.





GOVERNOR'S CUP

Trophy Presented to Winner of Rivalry Game Between Tech & Georgia

rom 1933 through 1993, a freshmen and then in later years, a junior varsity football game was played between Georgia Tech and the University of Georgia to benefit the needy children at Scottish Rite Children's Hospital. This game was played annually at Georgia Tech's Grant Field on Thanksgiving Day and moved the Atlanta Constitution's legendary journalist Ralph McGill to coin the off-repeated phrase, "Strong legs will run so that weak legs may walk." This became the motto for the game.

The idea for the charity game was fostered in 1930 with an all-star game by teams representing the Northern and Southern Divisions of the old Southern Conference. The quarterback that day for the Northern team just happened to be Bobby Dodd. In 1933, Georgia Tech coach William Alexander and Georgia coach H.J. Stegeman asked a group of Atlanta businessmen to form a committee to sell tickets to the freshman game and give the proceeds to Scottish Rite, and an Atlanta tradition was born.

The proceeds of this game actually met the annual operating expenses of the hospital and kept the doors of this nationally recognized institution open for years.

The winner of this game was given the Governor's Cup, which was kept by the winning school until the following year.

In 1993, NCAA mandated scholarship and total player limitations forced the discontinuation of the game and the Governor's Cup was retired. In 1994, a "Legends Game" was played between the two teams to keep the tradition alive, and

appeals were made by the two athletic departments to the NCAA to continue the Governor's Cup presentations with the Varsity football game.

The NCAA now recognizes the Georgia-Georgia Tech varsity football game as a "special event." Beginning in 1995, this allows the hospital, now Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, to present the Governor's Cup annually to the winner of this game. In addition, the seniors on both teams receive a watch commemorating their participation and the seniors on the winning team receive a personalized, engraved replica of the actual Governor's Cup.







Georgia Tech Head Coach, 1904-19 Record: 102-29-7 (.779) · 16 years

The coach who ran it up 222-0 on poor Cumberland College was also the man who sent out nightly for ice cream for Woo, the family poodle. Yes, John W. Heisman was as complex as he was brilliant, alternately rigid and innovative. And he was the unquestioned father of football's Holy Trinity at Georgia Tech: Heisman, Alexander and Dodd. • by Jack Wilkinson, Atlanta Journal-Constitution

ohn Heisman was a disciplinarian who loathed profanity and fumbling, and loved conformity on the field. Yet he was also an aspiring actor who spent several summers working in summer stock. And while he made his players take cold showers after practice-hot water was reserved for game days-Heisman also helped usher football, if not indoor plumbing, into the modern era.

A legendary football coach, John W. Heisman coached at eight colleges but forged much of his legend on The Flats. He was head coach at Tech from 1904-19 and no one, not William Alexander, not even Bobby Dodd, has ever approached Heisman's success. The Jackets were 102-29-7 under him. Tech won the first of its four national championships in 1917. If Heisman wasn't the most modest of men, he also had ample reason to be proud.

Heisman's father was a German immigrant and son of a man named Baron von Bogart. The Baron disapproved when his son married a peasant girl from Alsace-Lorraine and disinherited him. In turn, the son took his wife's name "Heisman" and moved to America. Well, to Cleveland. And Johann Wilhelm Heisman was born there on October 23, 1869.

Wizard's Wisdom

Heisman formulated his ideas about football and distributed them to the football squad. They read:

ALWAYS

ALWAYS play with your head. ALWAYS listen for signal. ALWAYS block your opponent at any cost. ALWAYS start as fast as you can. ALWAYS be where the ball is. ALWAYS win the game.

DON'T

DONT lose your head. DONT fumble the ball. DONT tackle high. DONT stop running because you are behind. DONT hesitate about falling on the ball. DONT let a runner escape you after you have him. DONT lose the game.

CAN'T

You CANT play football without brains.
You CANT play too aggressively.
You CANT afford to waste time talking.
You CANT play ball with a swelled head.
You CANT win without using these principles.

NEVER

NEVER drop the ball. NEVER get excited. NEVER give up. NEVER forget that a football player may be a gentleman.





Heisman discovered football at Brown University and later Penn. where he transferred and then earned a law degree. He never used it. While playing for Penn in an indoor football game at the old Madison Square Garden, Heisman's eyes were injured by the Garden's galvanic lighting system. The team doctor prescribed a twoyear rest for Heisman's eyes. So instead of joining a law firm in 1892. Heisman became the first football coach at Oberlin College in Ohio. Goodbye, jurisprudence. Hello, hidden ball trick.

Heisman temporarily left Oberlin for Buchtel College (later the University of Akron) before returning to Oberlin and eventually moving South in 1895. At Buchtel, he'd conceived the center snap. At that time, the center rolled the ball on the ground to the quarterback.

That was cumbersome for Buchtel's 6-4 quarterback, so Heisman had his center snap the ball through his legs and through the air.

At the Alabama Polytechnic Institute-later known as Auburn-Heisman first used the hidden ball trick against Vanderbilt.

He told his quarterback to slip the ball under his jersey and bend down to tie his shoelace while everyone else scattered. Even then, Vandy had problems defensively. The quarterback scored easily.

At Clemson, as at Auburn, Heisman offset his teams' lack of size by stressing speed and quickness. He also razzle-dazzled opponents with lateral passes, backward passes, reverses, onside kicks and even a pulling guard for sweeps.

In 1902, Heisman and Clemson cost Tech fans a bundle of money. The day before the game, Clemson hopped off the train in Atlanta, checked into a hotel and proceeded to party until dawn. Tech fans who saw all this and couldn't wait to bet on the game didn't see another train of Clemson players-the varsity, not the decoy scrubs-arrive Saturday morning. The varsity, well-rested after a quiet night in Lula, Ga, trounced Tech 44-5.

By the time Heisman came to Tech in 1904, his reputation was firmly established, which is why on Thanksgiving, 1903, after he'd agreed to take the job, Tech students joyously unfurled a banner reading, "Tech Gets Heisman for 1904." No Tech player has ever won the Heisman. But in '04, Tech got Heisman.

He was the first paid coach in the country, with a salary of 2,250 plus 30 percent of the gate receipts.

While at Clemson, Heisman had married a widow named Evelyn McCollum Cox, an actress in the summer stock company in which Heisman also acted. (Apparently, Heisman was a slightly better coach than actor; a contemporary writer called him a "terrible Thespian.") In Atlanta, the Heismans lived near Tech on Ponce de Leon Avenue with Evelyn's son, Cox, and Woo, the family poodle whose ice cream urge was indulged nightly by Heisman.

His first Tech team was an immediate success. Just 2-5 in 1903, Tech went 8-1-1 under Heisman. And the Heisman legend at Tech began.

It was enhanced by his language and his formal, stilted, actor-of-theday speech. Once while walking on North Avenue, Heisman called to one of his players, George Griffin, to cross the street. "Griffin, you are a great disappointment to me," Heisman said. When Griffin asked why, Heisman replied, "Well, I always expect you to get away for a long run, but you never do."

Heisman once tried to recruit Tech students at chapel thusly: "Gentlemen, we are destitute of people. If you weigh 150 pounds or more, please come out for football."



His rituals included an earlyseason practice speech. Holding up a football, Heisman would ask his players, "What is this? It is a prolate spheroid, an elongated sphere-in which the outer leather casing is drawn tightly over a somewhat smaller rubber tubing. Better to have died as a small boy than to fumble this football."

Fumbling was a cardinal sin. Sinners were forced to bounce a football 100 times against the fence that bordered the practice field. Fumbling was also featured prominently in Heisman's two-page list of football bromides. DON'TS included, "Don't fumble the football." NEVERS included "Never drop the ball." There were also ALWAYS ("Always play with your head") and CAN'TS ("You can't win without using these principles").

Heisman was a demanding

perfectionist and peerless strategist. His teams used the Heisman shift, or jump shift, the forerunner to the T and I formations. His Tech teams didn't huddle; instead, the quarterback shouted plays, or called a series of plays. Or sometimes, Heisman illegally hand-signaled plays from the sideline. He helped fight to legalize the forward pass, the essence of modern football.

And he masterminded the most lopsided, memorable game in college football history. In the spring of 1916, Tech's baseball team (Heisman also coached baseball and basketball) was humiliated 22-0 by a Nashville pro team masquerading as Cumberland College. That fall, Cumberland decided to drop football, its athletic program in disarray. But Heisman was determined to avenge the baseball loss and embarrass the sportswriters who awarded the national championship to the highestscoring team.

So Heisman offered Cumberland a \$500 guarantee and an allexpenses-paid trip to Atlanta. Cumberland accepted and 19 players (most members of Kappa Sigma fraternity, with scant football knowledge) left Lebanon, Tenn., by train for Atlanta. Only 16 arrived, three getting lost in Nashville.

By the time it was over, Tech had scored 32 touchdowns and 222 points in just 45 minutes of play. And Heisman had proven his point about pointless point totals.

The following year, the Golden Tornado were 9-0 and national champs, the third straight unbeaten team for Heisman. When Tech finally lost 32-0 to Pitt in the next-to-last game of the '18 season, it ended a 33-game unbeaten streak, including two ties. During that stretch, Heisman's teams outscored opponents 1,599-99.

Heisman's last season at Tech was 1919, when the Jackets finished 7-3. After a 14-7 loss to Auburn in the finale, Heisman announced that he was leaving Atlanta. He and his wife were divorcing. "I have agreed that wherever Mrs. Heisman wishes to live, I will live in another place. This will prevent any social embarrassment." When his wife chose to stay in Atlanta, Heisman had no choice but to leave.

He returned to Penn, his alma mater. Heisman would never duplicate his success in the South, though. Not at Penn, nor later at Washington and Jefferson and finally Rice. After resigning from Rice in 1926, Heisman became director of athletics at the Downtown Athletic Club in New York.

In 1935, the first Downtown Athletic Club Trophy was awarded to Jay Berwanger of Chicago, judged the nation's best college football player. On October 3, 1936, John Heisman died after a brief illness. He was 66. Two months later, the second DAC trophy was awarded. It now had a new name: the Heisman Memorial Trophy.

WILLIAM ALEXANDER

Georgia Tech Head Coach, 1920-1944 Record: 134-95-15 (.580)

"Bill Alexander's life was an eloquent illustration of the phrase, 'It matters not whether you win or lose, but how you play the game'," wrote Ralph McGill, editor of the Atlanta Journal.



t was in 1906 that a 16-year-old boy walked into the registrar's office at Georgia Tech, saying that he was William Anderson Alexander from Mud River, Ky., and he wanted to study engineering. He was admitted as an apprentice student, because his high school background was lacking.

When Bill Alexander died in his sleep on April 23, 1950, he was still at Georgia Tech, not as an engineer, but as one of the most respected figures in the history of college athletics.

Alex hadn't been good enough to play varsity football, but in 1908 Coach John Heisman appointed him captain of the scrubs, and in his senior year he got into the Georgia and Clemson games long enough to win a letter. Later Heisman, whose name lives on the trophy presented annually to the outstanding player in college football, added Alex to his coaching staff.

In 1917, when Heisman produced an undefeated Tech team, Alex was in World War I, serving in France as a young officer instructing troops in the mathematics of field artillery. In 1920, after his return to Atlanta and after Heisman decided to become coach of his alma mater, University of Pennsylvania, Alex was named the Georgia Tech head coach.

A tough, clever taskmaster, with his teams to match his character, Bill Alexander knew glorious years on The Flats. It was not until his fifth season as head coach, in 1924 that one of his teams lost to a Southern opponent, to Alabama, coached by Wallace Wade.

Alex was the first coach whose teams appeared in all four of the major bowls: the Rose in 1929, Orange in 1940, Cotton in 1943 and Sugar in 1944. It was Notre Dame's Knute Rockne who said: "Bill Alexander gets more out of less than any coach in America."

Notre Dame and Georgia Tech played each other from 1922 through 1929. When the series was scheduled, Alex said, "They will beat us about nine times out of ten, but in losing we will learn a lot of football. We will gain a lot of prestige nationally. And when we win, it will be a mighty sweet victory." Tech won only in 1928, 13-0.

Alex's overall record as a head coach, from 1920 through 1945, was 134-95-15. It was during his dismal seasons, such as 1931 when Tech lost to Vanderbilt, 49-7, that people, especially newspapermen, came to know the real Bill Alexander. He was genuine.



Nothing riled Alex more than criticism of his players. In the locker room after Alabama beat his 1933 team, 12-9, on a last-minute interception, an assistant coach lacerated the Tech squad for its lapse. Alex couldn't stand it. "Get out!" he thundered at his aide. "This is your team only when it wins. Now it's my team. Get out before I throw you out!"

Yet Alex had his full share of fun. Whenever he diagramed a football play, he always chalked tiny "x's" to denote Tech players and huge circles to represent the opposing team.

A favorite of Alex was Bill Fincher, a giant Tech tackle who had one glass eye. Occasionally, after the first two or three plays had been run in a game and some physical contact established, Fincher would surreptitiously slip his eye into his hand, then suddenly show his face to the lineman opposite him and growl: "So that's the way you wanna' play, huh?"

Alex was a bachelor until in his 50s. Fiercely independent, he turned down many invitations to eat Christmas dinner at the home of good friends, fearing he might be imposing on family gatherings. On more than one Christmas Eve morning, he would board the "Dixie Flyer" train in Atlanta and settle comfortably into a Pullman seat, reading a newspaper or sometimes a magazine or book, and enjoying the scenery. Late in the afternoon in Nashville, one of his longtime friends, a dining car steward, would climb aboard, greet Alex warmly and prepare to assume his duties en route to Chicago. Except, as both knew so well, there are mighty few if any passengers riding a train on Christmas Eve night. Both being convivial gentlemen and slow sippers, Alex and his friend savored the leisure and enjoyed probably the most unhurried meal and the fullest service in the history of railroad dining. The next day both men would head back South on the same "Dixie Flyer," content in their placid way of alleviating loneliness at Christmas time.

Perhaps the severest test of Alex's equanimity happened shortly after his marriage. Coming to breakfast early and alone one morning, he said to the cook: "I'll eat the rest of that barbecue hash that we had last night. Just heat it up a little and put it on toast"

Several minutes later, drinking his second cup of coffee after having eaten the barbecue, Alex welcomed Mrs. Alexander to the table after she had first visited the kitchen. She informed him that he had eaten not barbecue, but a half-can of dog food.

"Well, it was a little flat, but not bad," Alex said, with insouciant calm. This was the same Bill Alexander whose composure during probably the wildest bit of action in the history of post-season bowl games remains a conversation piece among the still living members of that unbeaten 1928 Georgia Tech team. In the Rose Bowl on New Year's Day, 1929, Tech

and the University of California were tied 0-0 in the second quarter with Tech in possession of the ball on its 23-yard line. Running back Stumpy Thomason fumbled and Roy Riegels, California center, grabbed the ball while it was still in the air. In turning to avoid a tackle, Riegels somehow lost his direction and headed towards his own goal. As Riegels was being chased by teammate Benny Lom, it was delirium on the sidelines. Except for Coach Alexander, who said to his excited players jumping up and down near the Tech bench: "Sit down. Sit down. He's just running the wrong way. Every step he takes is to our advantage."

Riegels stepped 64 yards before Lom caught him and spun him. The ball went into the end zone, but the officials placed it on the one-yard line. When Cal tried to punt from its end zone, Tech tackle Vance Maree blocked the kick for a safety and two points. The final score was Tech 8, California 7.

After being recognized as 1928 national champions, Tech only won three games in 1929

and two in 1930. Coach Alex began looking for a bright young assistant. He had heard and read about the University of Tennessee's lanky, bold senior All-American quarterback, Bobby Dodd.

In midseason, 1930, Alex had sent his line coach, Mac Tharpe, to scout future opponent North Carolina, playing Tennessee in Knoxville. Tharpe's automobile broke down en route and by the time he reached Knoxville, the game was over. Tharpe sought information from Tennessee head coach Bob Neyland, who suggested that he talk to Dodd. When Tharpe got back to Atlanta he told Alex: "Dodd's analysis of Carolina is better than any scouting report that I could have made."

Alex admitted that he also was most impressed after reading a newspaper story about how Dodd, seemingly trapped behind Tennessee's goal line for a big loss in the final game of his college career, had escaped to throw an impromptu touchdown to Buddy Hackman for the decisive play in a 13-0 defeat of Vanderbilt.

On Dec. 28, 1930, Tech signed Robert Lee Dodd as an assistant football coach. The salary was \$300 a month, but Alex offered a \$600 bonus if Bobby would report in time for spring football practice.

"That \$600 was more money than I had ever seen," Dodd said. "I used about \$500 of it paying off debts I had accumulated in Knoxville. And you know, in all the years I was at Georgia Tech, I never had a contract."

"Coach Alex was wonderful to me. He could growl and snap, but when it came to an emergency, he was your quy. He enabled me to

purchase the home my family and I lived in so many years. And he did the same thing for our black trainer, Porto Rico.

"The Old Man was a clearing-house for everybody in the Tech family, from toothaches to funerals to household quarrels. He had the story-telling ability of Mark Twain, the accumulated miscellaneous information of John Kieran and the sympathetic understanding of Dorothea Dix."

It is remarkable that Alexander and Dodd coached at only one university. It is more remarkable that Alex was on the Tech scene as student, assistant coach, head coach, and athletic director for a total of 44 years, and Dodd as an assistant coach, head coach, athletic director and finally fund-raiser for 58 years, until his death in 1988 at age 79.

I often thought that life's most rewarding satisfaction for Bill Alexander, and later for Bobby Dodd, was in hearing so many old players say that the happiest days of their lives were when they were playing football at Georgia Tech.





BOBBY DODD

Georgia Tech Head Coach, 1945-1966 Record: 165-64-8 (.713) 22 years

Robert Lee Dodd brought a different style to coaching, an emphasis on craftsmanship, finesse, well-rehearsed execution and sideline genius. Many a time have I heard it said, "Bobby Dodd was the best sideline coach I ever saw." by Furman Bisher, Atlanta Journal-Constitution

The way I get the story, Bobby Dodd came to Atlanta with the Tennessee basketball team for the tournament that ended the 1931 season in the old Southern Conference, and never left. He had been hired, very quietly, as a football assistant at Georgia Tech. Spring practice was about to begin, and he brought along his few belongings and bunked in with Ed Hamm, who had won the Olympic gold medal in the broad jump in 1928.

Dodd, as a crafty All-American quarterback at Tennessee, had been in great demand as a coach once his eligibility had played out. Bob Neyland had expected him to move onto his staff at Knoxville, and the renowned Wallace Wade, then breaking in at Duke, had made overtures. But it was Bill Alexander who won him, through the solicitous services of Chip Robert, extolled as a scatback at Tech in the early 1900s, and who had generated great wealth in the architectural world. It was said that General Neyland never forgave Dodd for turning him down, and when Dodd's third Georgia Tech team thoroughly trounced the Vols in 1947, the abyss was deepened.

> But so much for old wounds. On to the grandeur of the Days of Dodd at Georgia Tech, the stuff of which fables are woven. To try to compress in a few pages the glorious times of Dodd as football coach at Georgia Tech is likened to the Biblical parable of passing a camel through the eye of a needle. So I can only tell it as I saw it, lived it and have reminisced it.

Dramatic events took place in the lives of both of us in 1950. I moved from Charlotte to join the Atlanta newspapers. I arrived in town one weekend, Bill Alexander died the next weekend, so I never knew the man. Dodd ascended to the athletics directorship and he was launched on a glorious run that ended with his withdrawal from coaching in February 1967.

Robert Lee Dodd brought a different style to coaching, an emphasis on craftsmanship, finesse, well rehearsed execution and sideline genius. Many a time have I heard it said, "Bobby Dodd was the best sideline coach I ever saw."

He didn't believe in leaving your game on the practice field, so Dodd teams enjoyed their weekday afternoons. While some coaches left their teams bruised and battered with the idea that they were making them tough for Saturday's game, Dodd left his men on the edge of condition, hungering for some contact. He wasn't always that easy, but it was more the rule than the exception.



He also de-emphasized his own role in coaching. His assistants coached, he supervised, kept track of drills and entertained his guests from the press, usually aloft on his tower, the first of those things I ever saw. We once did an article for *Look* magazine titled, "Head Coaches Don't Coach Any More." He was ahead of his time, far ahead.

Dodd was a reluctant student, from the time he first made acquaintance with football at Kingsport High in Tennessee. Don't consider him a Tennessean. "I'm a Virginian," he said. "That's my home." He was born in Galax. Add a "y" to it and you've still got a scruffy mountain town in southwest Virginia. He was probably the only star it ever produced. At Kingsport, he was so happy playing high school football that, "I planned to make that my career," he said often in the annual presentation of the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year Award.

When his playing time ran out at Tennessee, he was still a firstquarter junior. It was later that he began to realize the gross mistake he'd made, and how errant he'd been having no college diploma. He turned on the academically uninspired like a reformed alcoholic turns on boozers. He preached education, demanded education, provided a tutor for his less accomplished classroom athletes, and hounded them until they left Georgia Tech with diploma in hand.

He approved of marriage for his players, another forerunner among coaches. Most coaches frowned on wedlock. A player got married at Mississippi, John Vaught kicked him off the squad.

"Keeps them off the street," Dodd said. "You know where they are at night."

At one time, golf was Dodd's main avocation, fancied himself as quite a player, and especially a putter. Fred Hooper, the legendary horseman, takes credit for 'curing' him of golf. "I played him in Miami one year and beat him out of \$700. He wrote me a check, put his clubs in the car and told me he'd never play again," Hooper said.

He did, one more time, for four holes at Peachtree Golf Club a few years before his death. Frank Broyles was in town and Dodd went along for a few holes until it wasn't fun any more. "Now I know why I quit this game," he said, put his club back in the bag and walked the rest of the round with us.

Fishing succeeded golf, bass fishing. He was a master at it. Dodd didn't take up anything he couldn't master. We were preparing for a magazine story on Dodd's fishing when the accompanying photographer, Kenneth Rogers, said, "Just throw out a line so I can see if I'm in focus."

Dodd made a casual cast with a top-water lure, something snapped at the lure, made a run with it, the reel singing a tune happy to any angler's ears, and Dodd pulled in a six-pound bass, just practicing.



Tennis? The tennis stories about Dodd are legend. He had an unorthodox style, a swing like somebody falling out of a tree, but he was a smashing doubles partner. He covered the court and his best shot was a protective one. The week after two South African girls had won the U.S. Open doubles at Forest Hills, they came to town and played a match against Dodd and Joe Becknell, a local pro, both twice as old as the two champions. Dodd and the pro had the girls on the ropes in the second set, an ace away from winning, but youth and agility eventually won out over the two



tiring elders. It was a match to remember, though.

You know the records. They're all in the book, how many games he won, all those bowl games he won—six in a row at one time before Broyles, his old pupil and assistant, then at Arkansas, broke it in the Gator Bowl—all the statistics, all the glory and the honors. What isn't in there is Dodd the Person because you can't translate a man's personality, his grace, and how he can charm those around him, into figures. Old Georgia Bulldogs hated him because he made it look so easy. Over one stretch of the '50s Dodd beat Georgia eight games in a row. It seemed that Georgia might never beat Georgia Tech again. But then it seemed there would be a Dodd at Georgia Tech forever. Nobody could imagine it otherwise, but time and its wretched allies take care of such fantasies. A street has been named for him, and the stadium gathered around Grant Field, all attempts to prolong the legend, but the best of it are the memories that warm the heart.

Coaches have come and coaches have gone since, some who played for him and walked in his shadow, and long the search will continue, but when the final chapter is written, there will have been only one Bobby Dodd at Georgia Tech, the place those who reach back in sentiment call The Flats.

AL CIRALDO

For 43 seasons, legendary radio voice Al Ciraldo made expressions like, "Toe Meets Leather" as much a part of Georgia Tech football as Buzz and Bobby Dodd.

eorgia Tech has lost a legend," said Tech Director of Athletics Dave Braine upon Al Ciraldo's death on Nov. 7, 1997 at the age of 76. "He was a legend in Georgia Tech athletics, just like Bobby Dodd."

Ciraldo retired from Tech's broadcast team in 1997, completing an on-air career that began in 1935 as play-by-play voice for the minor-league baseball Akron Yankees and spanned 62 years, the last 43 of them with Georgia Tech.

Ciraldo stepped down from play-by-play announcing prior to the 1992-93 season but served as host for Tech's pregame, halftime and postgame shows.

A 1948 graduate of the University of Florida with a degree in Radio Broadcasting, Ciraldo actually came to Atlanta in 1949 as the play-by-play announcer for

the University of Georgia's basketball broadcasts at WGBE-Radio. He joined the staff at WGST-Radio and broadcast his first Tech football game in 1954 against Tulane. His first Tech basketball game was against Sewanee that same year. Over the next 38 seasons, he called 416 football and 1,030 basketball

games for the Rambling Wreck. In 1984. Ciraldo moved with Tech from WGST to WCNN.

"Everyone knows how much Al Ciraldo's meant to Georgia Tech," said former Tech basketball coach Bobby Cremins. "But he's meant so much to Bobby Cremins as well.

"As far as I'm concerned, he's a legend and a part of Georgia Tech that can never be replaced. The Al Ciraldos of his time only come around once in a lifetime."

Dr. Homer Rice, who retired in 1997 after 17 years as Tech's Director of Athletics, said of Ciraldo, "His deep-seated love for Georgia Tech was matched only by the affection of Georgia Tech and its fans, friends and alumni towards him."

Kim King, Ciraldo's longest radio partner as the two teamed on Tech football for 17 years, said "It will be hard to imagine Georgia Tech without Al Ciraldo in the radio booth. But I admired him more than as just a radio announcer. He was a unique individual who stood for old-fashioned values and virtues you don't see a lot of these days."

Thad Horton was his first partner in 1954, and during the 1960s, Pat Williams, future NBA general manager, worked with Ciraldo for two seasons.

The Al Ciraldo Fund was established to benefit athletic and non-athletic scholarships at Georgia Tech, and the Carlyle Fraser Heart Center at Crawford Long Hospital.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP RECOGNITION

Georgia Tech has won four national championships. Tech's four titles are by virtue of a national wire service (1952 & 1990) or by consensus of polls available at the time (1917 & 1928).

FLORIDA CITRUS BOWL ORLANDO

Tech's undefeated 1951 squad did not win a wire service title (Tennessee won the AP and UPI crowns), but the Jackets, along with Illinois, earned national championship recognition by the Boand System. William Boand of Tucson, Ariz., developed a mathematical formula that was published in newspapers from 1930-60.

Tech's 1951 and 1956 teams also earned national championship recognition by the Berryman system, a mathematical formula developed by Clyde Berryman of Washington, D.C. in 1990. Berryman named predated national champions from 1940-89.

Georgia Tech added another chapter to its storied football tradition in 1990 with a Cinderella-like rise to the top of the college football world, culminating in the school's fourth national title.

Coached by Bobby Ross, the unanimous choice as National Coach of the Year, the Rambling Wreck staged an amazing turnaround. Just two years removed from 2-9 and 3-8 campaigns in 1987 and 1988, Tech entered the 1990 season unranked but finished as the only unbeaten team in major college football to earn No. 1 honors from the United Press International coaches' poll, as well as The Sporting News and Scripps-Howard News Service. The many magical moments were plentiful: the dramatic goal-line stand against Clemson, the heart-stopping victory at No. 1-ranked Virginia, last minute heroics against North Carolina and Virginia Tech, and a second straight win over Georgia, capped by the convincing victory over Nebraska in the Florida Citrus Bowl.

Tech 21, NC State 13

Utilizing a stingy defense and the clutch play of quarterback Shawn Jones, Georgia Tech scored 14 fourth-quarter points to grab a 21-13 come-from-behind win in the opener.

Tech 44, UTC 9

Jones threw for 265 yards and the Tech defense forced seven turnovers as the Jackets captured their eighth straight home win.

Tech 27, South Carolina 6

Tech's defense allowed just 196 yards of total offense, including only 40 on the ground, and extended its streak to 12 consecutive quarters without allowing a touchdown in upending 25th-ranked South Carolina at Bobby Dodd Stadium.

Tech 31, Maryland 3

A relentless defense bagged a school-record 11 sacks, including five by Marco Coleman, and Tech held Maryland to minus-20 yards rushing in steam-rolling the Terps, 31-3, at College Park, Md. Jones passed for a season-best 276 yards.

Tech 21, Clemson 19

The 18th-ranked Jackets used an 87-yard kickoff return by Kevin Tisdel and a dramatic goal-line stand to slip by 15th-ranked Clemson in Atlanta. With its ninth straight win, Tech moved to 5-0 for the first time since 1966. The Tech defense extended its touchdown-less string to 19 quarters before allowing a fourth-quarter score.

Tech 13, North Carolina 13

Costly turnovers and near perfect North Carolina special teams play forced 13th-ranked Tech to settle for a 13-13 tie in Chapel Hill, N.C, despite outgaining the Tar Heels, 435 yards to just 151.



William Bell rushed for 166

yards and Kevin Tisdel struck again with an 85-yard kickoff return for a touchdown to spark Tech to a 48-31 Homecoming win.

Tech 41, Virginia 38

Scott Sisson's 37-yard field goal with just seven seconds remaining capped a dramatic comeback and lifted the Jackets to a stunning upset over No. 1-ranked Virginia in what many considered the greatest game in ACC history. Tech rallied from deficits of 13-0 and 28-14, and, after a dramatic goal-line stand by the Tech defense forced the Cavs to settle

for a game-tying field goal with 2:34 left, Jones engineered a 56yard drive to set up the winning field goal. The vaulted Tech from 16th to 7th in the national polls.

Tech 6, Virginia Tech 3

Sisson was the hero for the second straight week as he booted two field goals in the final five minutes, winning the game on a 38-yard kick with just eight seconds left for a 6-3 victory in Atlanta that extended the Jackets unbeaten streak to 13 games.

Tech 42, Wake Forest 7

A potent Rambling Wreck attack rolled up 452 yards of offense as Tech downed the Deacons, 42-7, in Winston-Salem, N.C., to win its first Atlantic Coast Conference title.

Tech 40, Georgia 23

Jones passed for 225 yards and tied his career-high with four touchdown passes as the Jackets rallied from a 9-0 deficit for a 40-23 road win, Tech's second straight victory over its arch-rivals. Tech finished the regular season as the nation's only unbeaten team and ranked second.

Tech 45, Nebraska 21

Georgia Tech, an underdog despite its No. 2 ranking, capped a Cinderella season with a dominating 45-21 victory over 13th-ranked Nebraska in the Florida Citrus Bowl on New Year's Day. Jones totalled 318 yards of total offense and was selected the game's MVP, and Bell added 127 yards rushing and scored three touchdowns for the Jackets, who improved their bowl record to 17-8. One day later, the Jackets were crowned national champions after leaping Colorado for the No. 1 position in the UPI coaches' poll.

1952 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

"The best football team that I coached," said Bobby Dodd of his 1952 squad that recorded a perfect 12-0 season and beat Ole Miss in the Sugar Bowl. The Jackets were voted number one by the International News Service while finishing second to Michigan State in the AP and UPI polls.

Tech 54, The Citadel 6

The game turned into such a one-sided affair that in the second quarter a public address announcement went out for a student named Cecil Davis. By the third quarter, Davis, a freshman defensive back from Griffin, was dressed in a uniform. Not only did he play in the game, but he made an interception.

Tech 17, Florida 14

After Tech tied the game at 14-14, head coach Bobby Dodd predicted that placekicker Pepper Rodgers would win the game on a field goal just like the previous Orange Bowl, a 17-14 win over Baylor. Ditto.

Tech 20, SMU 7

Called the greatest offensive showing in Texas since Doak Walker, Tech's two-horse team of Leon Hardeman and Bill Teas ran wild over the Mustangs for 246 yards. "I never did see two young halfbacks make such a mess out of a football game in my whole life," remarked an old Texas fan.

Tech 14, Tulane 0

Tech's "Rambling Rookies," described as the youngest and sharpest backfield combination among the nation's top teams with three sophomores and two juniors, totaled 405 yards against the Green Wave.

Tech 33, Auburn 0

The Engineers' defense, ranked second in the nation in points allowed, played its best game of the season while recording the shutout. Defensive back Bobby Moorhead intercepted two passes and returned both for touchdowns on runs of 46 and 41 yards.

Tech 30, Vanderbilt 0

The Commodores had a player named Bobby Dodd (no relation) but Bobby Dodd's Tech team mastered Vanderbilt behind the rushing of Leon Hardeman (102 yards) and the linebacking corps of Larry Morris and George Morris.

Tech 28, Duke 7

Life magazine featured the game with the headline "Tech Barbecues Duke." Blue Devil head coach Bill Murray called Tech "the greatest team in the country" as the Jackets rolled over Duke in front of bowl scouts.

Tech 45, Army 6

With a Sugar Bowl bid in hand, Tech routed the Cadets of West Point. Tech's Dave Davis had an 80-yard punt in the game. The accolades continued for the Engineers as Army Coach Red Blaik said, "I never compare teams, but I repeat, this team could play in any league."

Tech 7, Alabama 3

The newspaper headline read, "How a Little Man Charged an Elephant and Saved a Football Game for Tech." Jakie Rudolph (above), a 5-7, 155pound defensive back, stopped 'Bama's Bobby Marlow on a fourth down play from the four-yard line that turned the tide as Tech, ranked second, knocked off the 12th-rated Crimson Tide.

Tech 30, Florida State 0

Tech's winning streak reached 24 straight games as the Jackets played "just fair" according to Bobby Dodd in their warmup for the final regular season game against Georgia.


Tech 23, Georgia 9

Tech's Chappell Rhino made the most of his only play in the game. With the undefeated Yellow Jackets trailing 7-3 in the third quarter, "One-Play Rhino" entered the game on fourth-and-four at the Georgia 10-yard line.

Quarterback Bill Brigman faked a belly play to Glenn Turner and then pitched to Rhino, who had lined up at left halfback. Rhino threw a 10-yard touchdown pass to Buck Martin in the corner of the end zone to give Tech the lead for good.

Tech 24, Mississippi 7

Culminating a perfect season, Tech downed the Rebels in the Sugar Bowl behind a strong defense. Pepper Rodgers threw a touchdown pass and kicked a field goal for the Jackets, while Leon Hardeman and Bill Brigman added touchdowns.



1928 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

The most glorious football season Georgia Tech's Yellow Jackets have ever experienced came to an end on last New Year's day, when the gallant sons of the red clay hills won the national championship by a brilliant victory over the University of California at the famous Rose Bowl in Pasadena, California. by Morgan Blake, Atlanta Journal sports editor

Previous to this battle Tech had won the Southern Conference championship by sweeping through a very strong field. In addition the Jackets finally conquered their old foes, the pesky Irishmen of Notre Dame.

It was the second straight conference championship for Coach Alex and his noble band, and the Jackets were worthy of all the laurels that they won.

The Jackets started off their season without any particular splash. They won a two touchdown victory over V.M.I. in a broiling hot sun, and then they invaded New Orleans for a battle with Tulane. The Greensbacks on the previous Saturday had slaughtered the Mississippi Aggies, and the Pelican fans were all excited over what they figured would be a victory over the famous foe from the Empire State. Tech however was too much for the Louisianians.

The next Saturday the Notre Dame Irishmen, with six straight victories over Tech under their belts, came to town. The Jackets started off with a burst of offensive speed which included two beautiful passes, and swept over a touchdown in the first few minutes. Shortly afterwards Bob Randolph made a long run taking the ball within the enemy's five-yard line. It looked like a rout at this stage. But the Irish made a gallant stand and took the ball away on downs.

From that point, Tech waged a defensive fight against the traditional brilliant and versatile attack of Rockne. Three times the Jackets, fighting like wild men took the ball away from the enemy within the five-yard zone. Finally in the closing moments one of the desperate passes of the Irish was intercepted by Father Lumpkin, who ran it back to within a few yards

of the goal, from which point the Jackets pushed it over to make assurance of victory doubly sure.

The following Saturday Tech went to Chapel Hill to play North Carolina. In the first half Coach Alex gave his regulars, worn out from the Notre Dame encounter, a rest. He sent into the field a team composed largely of sophomores, and three touchdowns were scored on the Tarheels.

At the end of the half it seemed like a rout, but the second half was different. Not only did the Jackets fail to score again, but they had their goal line crossed for the first time during the season. It was a brilliant comeback on the part of North Carolina but it was futile as Tech had too big a lead.

The next game was with the plucky Petrels of Oglethorpe. These boys gave the Jackets a big scare in the first half, the teams going to recess in a 7 to 7 tie. But in the next half the Jacket Juggernaut began to rumble and the Petrels were smothered.

Then came the game with Vanderbilt. It was a desperate battle with honors even up to the last few minutes of the first half when Tech pulled that



famous quadruple pass Mizell to Thomason to Jones to Mizell. It resulted in a long gain for a touchdown and completely bewildered the Vandy team. In the second half Mizell went wild and ran the Commodores ragged. In the game he advanced the ball over 200 yards himself.

In the Alabama game, Tech got a real scare. It was a weird fantastic game, full of both brilliance and bone-headedness and mechanical blunders by both teams. At the end of the third quarter the teams were tied 13-13.

Then Stumpy Thomason broke the tie with one of the most brilliant runs he had ever pulled in which he bowled over five tacklers between him and the goal. The Alabama defense crumpled after this and Tech made two more touchdowns. Mizell continued his brilliant running and piled up a total over 200 yards again.


The Auburn game on Thanksgiving day was a rout, the Plainsmen unable to stop the furious thrusts of the great Tech backfield. The Tigers fell 54-0.

The greatest crowd of the local season was on hand to see Georgia play Tech on Grant Field. The Bulldogs were not given a chance but they set their supporters crazy with joy when they scored the first touchdown of the game. The Jackets however refused to get excited. They went about their business in their usual cool and effective manner and scored three touchdowns before the game ended.

Then came the California trip and the National Championship.

Not only did Tech have a brilliant and resourceful backfield, but the Jackets had one of the greatest lines the South had seen. Peter Pund was practically the unanimous choice of every critic for All American center. Warner Mizell was almost as popular a choice for All American halfback, and Frank Spear, tackle, won the Associated Press composite selection for All American tackle. Raleigh Drennon received prominent mention. Mizell, Thomason, Spear, Jones, Pund and Drennon made all Southern, and the only reason that Maree, Waddey, Thrash, Westbrook, Lumpkin, and Durant didn't make it was because the critics figured it would look too bad to have everybody on the Tech team on the mythical eleven.

Frank Spear was an all-America tackle in 1928.

Pennsylvania in a newspaper resume of the Tech-Penn game—and he was about right. No team that met or did not meet Tech in football last fall had a chance.

Now we do not want to "crow" too much over our world's championship football team; but even modesty has a limit and we have a right to feel quite proud of our team and the records it established.

But Tech does not have to do the "bragging"—surely we will be pardoned if we allow others to speak for us.

Right after the Penn game early in the season, the papers all over the country and letters between sport lovers became full of praise for our team.

Coach Folwell, Pennsylvania's head coach, said, "Tech is the best team in the land today. No team will even come close to beating it, unless it lets down and takes things easy. Its big scoring games last year were on their merit, I am certain."

And right in accord with him, the *Philadelphia Ledger* told the world that, "Georgia Tech, champions of the South, will now rank with the season's best on the gridiron, and the dopesters will have to look farther South than the Mason-Dixon line for All-American material."

All this and "gobs" more came in the early part of the season.

After the Davidson game, George King, Davidson's captain, had only words of highest praise for our team. He said, "I consider Georgia Tech the best football team I have ever played against or ever expect to play against. We met both Tech and the Navy elevens and I think the Jackets are a better team offensively and just as good defensively."

Talking to Coach Bill Fetzer, he says Tech has the best backfield he has ever seen, taking them along all lines of the game. "Tech is not only a great team, but clean football players and good sports in the best sense of the word."

Captain Alf Adams, the star right end of the Vandy aggregation, like the true sport that he is, has nothing but praise for the Tech team. He said, "Tech's magnificent machine won easily over Vanderbilt. It was simply the matter of a splendid eleven winning over an unseasoned, inexperienced team."


"Tech played hard, clean football, and we were surprised to meet such a fast, aggressive team."

Captain Barnes of the Tulane team was glad to say:

"I consider Tech the best team I have ever seen, and it would have little difficulty in beating most of the teams in the country this year."

Even *The Red and Black*, weekly paper of our ancient rival, in an editorial in the midst of the season, paid our team one of the greatest tributes of all. We print only part of this comment.

"Tech has undoubtedly one of the best teams this year the South has ever produced, and although conditions are such that it is perhaps impossible to judge fairly the relative strength of the various college teams, it is




a safe bet that the Yellow Jackets would rank high with the best America could produce."

We could go on and on giving quotation after quotation but space is limited. Allow us to conclude by giving the following from the *New York Sun*, dated November 30th.

"Football, once an eastern specialty, now is a national sport, and in recognition of that fact we are glad to acclaim Georgia Tech the greatest eleven in the country.

"If there are any doubts as to the supremacy of the 'Golden Tornado' after the 68 to 7 beating Tech handed to Auburn, we suspect them of suffering from the effects of a Thanksgiving turkey hangover.

"With a total of 491 points in nine games-an average of nearly 55 points a contest, with a 41 to 0 victory over Pennsylvania, a 98 to 0 triumph over Carlisle, a 63 to 0 romp over Washington and Lee, and Thursday's overwhelming victory over the eleven which had fought Ohio State to a scoreless tie-Georgia Tech looms up as one of the truly great teams of all time."

CLINT CASTLEBERRY The Mystery of a Lost Legend

For one fleeting season in 1942, Clint Castleberry blazed across the football field like a 'crazed jackrabbit.' Some said he could have been the greatest Tech player in history—if it weren't for World War II and a plane that disappeared off the West African coast without a trace.

e flashed across the fields at Notre Dame and Navy that fall of '42, leading Georgia Tech's shocking onslaughts, while Sir Bernard Montgomery flashed across North Africa in pursuit of Erwin Rommel, and the Russians made their goal-line stand at Stalingrad.

He had played only one college football game when Notre Dame scout Wayne Millner warned coach Frank Leahy that "the most dangerous runner in America" would invade South Bend.

As a freshman, he finished third in the Heisman Trophy balloting.

And then he was gone.

The figure that cast the tall shadow

through the decades, spawned the legend that will not rest, was in fact small, even by football standards of the time. He was 5 feet 9, 155 pounds.

But he was, wrote the Journal's Ed Miles

in that autumn of gathering storm, "a crazed jackrabbit."

Had Clint Castleberry lived, Bobby Dodd maintained until his own death in 1988, "he'd have probably been an All-American for three years and been the greatest back in Georgia Tech history . . . He was a great football player. He might have been the best of them all, had he lived.

"But what is more important is this: He was a great boy-gentle and brave, manly yet sweet."

And in that other time, of good boys and great unselfishness, there was no thought—none—that a football career, however glorious, however destined for Heisman acclaim, amounted to a hill of beans any more than the problems of Humphrey Bogart and Ingrid Bergman did when they stood on that runway.

And so six weeks after playing sparingly, hurt, in the Cotton Bowl, Clint Castleberry was in the Army Air Corps.

"When he joined, there was no question about it in the family," said his brother, Jimmy. "There was no discussion. That was just the thing that you did. Everybody was anxious to get in. It was a given. You'd have to have lived in that time to know that the only thought was beating the Germans."

His progress in flight school flashed word-of-mouth through the service. Howard Ector, off the 1939 Tech team that would see 10 of its 33 players killed in World War II, had transferred from Army artillery and was just behind Castleberry in flight school.

At every station, at every training stage, men from across the nation—the Midwest, where Castleberry had stormed Notre Dame; the East, where Castleberry had devastated Navy—would learn that Ector was a former Tech player and tell him proudly, "Castleberry was here." Castleberry finished third in the Heisman Trophy race as a freshman.

On Nov. 7, 1944, voters at home overwhelmingly sent Franklin Delano Roosevelt to an unprecedented fourth term in the White House.

Hours before the polls opened, at 2:20 a.m. Atlanta time (7:20 a.m. in West Africa), two B-26G "Marauder" bombers took off from Roberts Field, Nigeria, continuing their ferrying run up the coast toward Dakar, Senegal.

The co-pilot of one was Lt. Clinton Dillard Castleberry, Jr. of Atlanta, Ga.

The bombers were never heard from again.

Jimmy Castleberry, by then also enlisted, arrived by train in San Francisco and telephoned the family, which included Clint's pregnant wife.

"The first thing they told me was, We've just received a wire that your brother is missing in action'," says Jimmy Castleberry.

American planes, aided by the Royal Navy and Royal Air Force, searched off the West African coast for six days.

Atlanta and the college football world waited.

Tech coach Bill Alexander and Dodd, his top assistant, were among the regular visitors to the Castleberry household.

O.B. Keeler chronicled the watch in barely veiled obituary form for The Atlanta Journal, but injected a glint of hope from Castleberry's old coach at Boys High, Shorty Doyal, who said that "if Castleberry had any sort of chance at all, he'll come through."

"My father never gave up hope that he was alive—that somehow they'd gone down close enough to land, and Clint was somewhere in Africa," says Jimmy Castleberry. "For many, many, many years, he held on to the barest hope."



The hope died with Clinton Castleberry Sr. in 1961.

At first Clint Castleberry's young wife Shirley held hope: "Certainly. Yes," she says now, though she is very reluctant to talk about that longago sadness in her life, now that she has been Mrs. Fred Avery of St. Louis for these many years.

The U.S. War Department gave up hope on Nov. 23, 1944, changing Castleberry's status from "missing" to "killed," though the only evidence was a blotch of unidentified wreckage spotted on the ocean by an RAF plane.

Atlanta, the football world and most of the Castleberry family accepted the War Department's opinion.

And so Clint Castleberry became a memory.

O.B. Keeler wrote: "The football achievements of Clint Castleberry very naturally were focused nationally on his performances against Navy and Notre Dame in 1942, especially the former game, when he ran 95 yards to a touchdown after intercepting a pass . . ."

A living Frank Merriweather, he had risen as a perfect model in Atlanta's eyes.

A straight-A student at old Boys High, he never played in a losing football game in three varsity seasons there.

A younger boy, George Brodnax, who later played at Tech, saw Castleberry of Boys High "play against Charlie 'Choo-Choo' Justice's high school team, Central of Charlotte. Clint scored five touchdowns the first five times he touched the ball."

In that time of the platoon system, Castleberry usually played less than half of each game. Yet in his senior year, he averaged 171 yards per game rushing and scored 102 points.

Both Navy and Notre Dame had considered recruiting him, but backed off after learning his size.

Besides, "he was either going to Georgia or Georgia Tech," says his brother. "He elected to go with Coach Aleck, and the major reason was that he was in love and wanted to stay in Atlanta."

Because the war was already draining rosters, the Southeastern Conference ruled freshman eligible to play in 1942.

By the week before the opening game against Auburn, ranked eighth in preseason polls, the sports writers of Atlanta were pounding out predictions that it would be next to impossible for Alexander and Dodd to keep this tiny freshman out of the starting lineup as a singlewing tailback.

He did not start, but after the game, the Journal's Ed Miles noted that 'Tech's Old Guard on the shelves of the West Stands hailed the freshman Castleberry as the fanciest runner to hit the Flats since they have forgotten when."

And Millner left Grant Field and boarded a train for Chicago and South Bend to warn Leahy, in preparation for Saturday's game, of this "most dangerous runner in America."

Yet, on Wednesday evening, when the travel squad was posted for the trip to Notre Dame, Castleberry was surprised and elated to see his name on the list

It was from South Bend that the nation would learn what Atlanta already knew.

Angelo Bertelli, Notre Dame's star back and punter, was ordered by Leahy from the outset to direct his punts away from the little Tech freshman, and most of them sailed out of bounds.


In the third quarter, Bertelli fumbled, Castleberry (who played both offense and defense) recovered at the Irish 27, and Tech pounded quickly in to score on Castleberry's pass from the eight as he sprinted outside.

In the fourth quarter, one of Bertelli's punts was fielded at last by Castleberry, who returned it 18 yards to set up the winning touchdown.

The final score was Tech 13, Notre Dame 6-the first time the Yellow Jackets had ever beaten the Irish in South Bend. And that Sunday's Atlanta papers divided their excitement between the hand-to-hand fighting at Stalingrad and little Castleberry's romps at Notre Dame.

A Tech team which in the preseason had been expected to fare

poorly was 4-0 by mid-October, ranked sixth by the Associated Press and bound for Annapolis. NBC and CBS would broadcast the game to the nation, Armed Forces Radio to the world.

And so it was that American troops just-landed in North Africa under Eisenhower and Patton, and sailors and pilots who'd recently turned the tide in the Pacific at the Battle of Midway, and Marines in their death grip with the Japanese on Guadalcanal, would hear, live . . .

Second guarter, still 0-0. Navy in an obvious passing situation. Long pass. Intercepted by Castleberry at the Tech 5.

And then what the troops around the world heard, mostly, was the anxious roar of thousands of Midshipmen urging their players to stop him, somehow . . .

They did not stop him. It was 7-0. It would end 21-0 Tech, and even with that final score on the board, Castleberry would run out the clock with a 51-yard run.

Georgia, with Charlie Trippi and Frank Sinkwich, was ranked No. 1 in the polls, and Tech was climbing through the top five. The situation boiled toward what promised to be a national championship confrontation between No. 1 Georgia and No. 2 Georgia Tech.

But one game short of their meeting, Georgia was upset by Auburn and Castleberry suffered a knee injury during a tough win over Florida. The great showdown was spoiled.

Early in the game at Athens, Sinkwich intercepted a Castleberry pass and returned to the Tech 36 to set up a Georgia score. But on Georgia's next possession, it was Castleberry who intercepted Sinkwich. And it was Castleberry who moved Tech quickly to the Georgia 41 before re-injuring his knee and leaving the game.

The exhausted, overachieving Tech team was finished without Castleberry. Georgia won 34-0 and went to the Rose Bowl.

After the Georgia game, a bold but broken-hearted worshipper of Clint Castleberry, 10-year-old Franklin Cullen "Pepper" Rodgers of Atlanta, felt compelled to telephone his hero.

"I told him, 'I'm sorry you lost that game," says Rodgers, a former Georgia Tech coach. "He was so nice to me on the telephone. He was my hero . . . Ty Cobb, Jeb Stuart, Clint Castleberry-only heroes I ever had."



356! Eddie Lee Ivery Sets NCAA Record

Ivery's mark stood as the NCAA record until 1984, when it was bettered by Reuben Mayes of Washington State.

On a day when ice skates would have been more appropriate footwear than cleated shoes and when an agitated stomach threatened his very presence in Georgia Tech's lineup, senior tailback Eddie Lee Ivery made college football history. by David Davidson, Atlanta Journal-Constitution

n 26 rushes, Eddie Lee Ivery gained 356 yards, more yards in a single game than any other major college back ever, on a field that required de-snowing by a street sweeper twice before the game. In fact, the field was made even more treacherous by 20-degree temperatures augmented by a 20 mph wind (making the chill factor zero degrees) which turned the Falcon Stadium turf into a frozen tundra.

Complicating lvery's plight was his stomach. After a nifty reversal of direction, which resulted in a 73-yard touchdown run early in the second quarter giving Tech a 14-0 advantage, lvery could be seen on the sidelines doubled over at the waist, vomiting and in obvious pain.

"It must have been the eggs I ate this morning," he said afterwards. "I just couldn't get my breath."

The thinner air of Colorado Springs, which is approximately 7,000 feet above sea level, compared with about 1,200 in Atlanta, no doubt contributed to Ivery's breathing difficulties. A simple action, like climbing two flights of stairs, in this atmosphere can be taxing.

At halftime, lvery had 122 yards on 12 carries, but his status for the second half was very much in doubt.

An 80-yard touchdown run with 6:08 left in the third quarter gave lvery 240 yards and broke Brent Cunningham's school rushing record of 217 yards set in 1970 against Clemson.

With 10:25 left in the game, lvery scored on a 57-yard run, giving him 309 yards. Besides giving Tech a 35-21 lead against a team that obviously was not going to surrender without a fight, it put lvery within 41 yards of the NCAA single game record of 350 yards set by Michigan State's Eric Allen against Purdue in 1971.

At that point, Tech sports information director Jim Schultz passed the word to assistant coaches Dave Fagg and Al Lavan in the scouting box, who in turn relayed the message to head coach Pepper Rodgers.

"I told him I didn't care how many yards Ivery had," Rodgers said later. "I was worried about the score."

At that time, Tech was having difficulty containing Air Force quarterback Dave Ziebart, who was completing 11 passes to split end Cormac Carney for 204 yards and two touchdowns.

When an Air Force drive fizzled at Tech's eight-yard line on an incomplete pass, Rodgers told the team he'd let lvery run the ball until he got the record. Ivery crashed over right tackle for 13 yards, leaving him just 28 yards short of the record. A run around right end gained another 13. Only 15 to go. Adding to the drama, Ivery's stomach began to churn again at that point, to the extent he had to leave the game.

His replacement, Ray Friday, shocked everyone by bolting 66 yards straight up the middle for his second touchdown of the day.

Until then, Ivery had not

allowed himself the luxury of thinking about the NCAA record.

More than six minutes remained when Don Bessillieu kicked off to Air Force with a 42-21 lead, plenty of time to retrieve the ball and let lvery get the record.

The chance came prematurely when linebacker Henry Johnson intercepted a Ziebart pass at the Air Force 41-yard line.

lvery trotted back onto the field and rushed 21 yards with his first carry, giving him the record. That he fumbled at the end of the run was of no consequence to anyone.

"I want you to go back in and get 44 more yards, make the record an even 400," Johnson told Ivery. "If you pop a long one, just fall down after 44."

"Don't do it," laughed Bessillieu, half seriously. "You never know, you might lose some yards."



Wrong Way Riegels THE 1929 ROSE BOWL

The most stunning single play in the history of the Rose Bowl propelled Georgia Tech to its first bowl victory when Roy Riegels' infamous Wrong Way Run turned out right as the Rambling Wreck beat California, 8-7, in the 1929 Rose Bowl.

arly in the second quarter, with the score tied 0-0, Tech halfback Stumpy Thomason was hit by the Golden Bears' Benny Lom. He fumbled around the Tech 35-yard line, and Riegels scooped up the bouncing ball. For Riegels, a center and captain of his Golden Bear team, fate had sent him running free and clear. He got a good block from a teammate, slipped off a tackler and spun around. But something was wrong.

"Stop, Roy! You're running the wrong way," yelled teammate Bennie Lom. Riegels heard, but did not understand. He thought the speedier Lom was asking for a lateral. "Get away from me," he said. "This is my touchdown."

At the 10-yard line, Lom grabbed Riegels, but Riegels shook him loose. Finally, at the one-yard line, Lom pulled Riegels down amid a wave of Tech players, but not before Riegels had gone 64 yards into immortality.

California still had the ball. On the first play, the Golden Bears attempted to punt the ball out of the end zone with Riegels snapping to Lom. However, the left side of the California line collapsed and Tech's Vance Maree blocked the punt, which rolled out of bounds for a safety.

Those two points turned out to be the winning points as both teams traded touchdowns in the second half, and the Rambling Wreck eventually prevailed, 8-7, in one of the strangest games ever played. At the time, the impact of Riegels' Wrong Way Run had not yet taken shape. All he said was, "Now why did I do something like that?"


Of course, the play attracted national attention. It was said that 450,000 column inches of newspaper space were written on Riegels' gaff. He received mountains of mail with sympathetic letters, offers of marriage and money, editorials in the papers and sermons from the pulpit.

Riegels got over his fluke play, but he was never allowed to forget it. He again served as captain of the California team as a senior and even made a few all-America teams.

Tech's Rose Bowl win capped a perfect 10-0 season, the first undefeated season for head coach William Alexander, and the Rambling Wreck captured its second national title.

And though the Yellow Jackets have won many more bowl games since then, none were as unusual as the first.

Cumberland University was located in Lebanon, Tenn., and the Cumberland squad was actually comprised of professional players from nearby Nashville. Georgia Tech head coach John Heisman was not amused, and the Tech students and alumni howled for revenge, so Heisman offered the Bulldogs a \$500 guarantee to come to Atlanta for a football game.

On the Pullman ride from Lebanon, the 16-man Cumberland team stopped in Nashville to recruit players from Vanderbilt University to join the crusade. Not only were there no takers, but three Cumberland players decided to jump ship and remain in Nashville.

During that era, Cumberland had fielded championship football teams in 1903 and 1904, but by 1916, the school was more renowned for its law school than its gridiron record. Meanwhile, Tech was building a national power under "The Wizard" John Heisman.

In fact, Morgan Blake, writing for the Atlanta Journal, assessed the strength of the Cumberland squad as follows: "With all due regard to the Tech team, it must be admitted that the tremendous score was due more to the pitifully weak opposition than to any



unnatural strength on the part of the victors. In fact, as a general rule, the only thing necessary for a touchdown was to give a Tech back the ball and holler, 'Here he comes' and There he goes.'

"The Lebanon boys were absolutely minus any apparent football virtues. They couldn't run with the ball, they couldn't block and they couldn't tackle. At spasmodic intervals they were able to down a runner, but they were decidedly too light and green to be effective at any stage of the game."

It took about one minute before Everett Strupper scored Tech's first touchdown, one of nine touchdowns in the first quarter. The all-America Strupper led Tech with six touchdowns on the day, but he gave up a chance for a seventh. Hal Reynolds of the *Atlanta Constitution* described Strupper's generosity as follows:

"Among those who shared in the glory of making a touchdown was "Canty" Alexander, who has been trying to carry the ball over for the past three years. He attempted three bucks in the Mercer game with the ball on the five-yard line, but couldn't carry it over. Yesterday, Strupper got away on an end run of 20

yards and could have made a touchdown, but stopped instead and placed the ball within one foot of the goal. From this point, Canty bucked it over and placed it between the posts. It was a big day for Canty."

Cumberland, since it was losing yardage faster than it was gaining real estate, began to kick the football back to the Jackets immediately after Tech kicked off to them.

Heisman agreed to shorten the periods from 15 to 12 and a half minutes, but Tech had scored 180 points by the end of the third quarter to eclipse the previous world record of 153 points by one college team, set by Michigan four years earlier. The Jackets added 42 points in the last stanza for the final total of 222.

In the game, Tech scored 32 touchdowns, averaged 3.8 points per minute, carried the ball for 978 yards, and never threw a pass. Amazingly, neither team made a first down in the game because Tech scored within four downs on every possession.

To make matters worse, Heisman had agreed with the alumni to split his team into two platoons and alternate quarters. The squad that rolled up the biggest score would be rewarded with a steak dinner.

At the game's conclusion, Heisman blew his whistle and put his team through a hard, half-hour scrimmage. Then, acknowledging that Tech had played a "fairly good game," he rewarded everyone with a steak dinner.

Meanwhile, Cumberland collected its \$500 guarantee and proceeded to see the sights of Atlanta.

LIGHTS, CAMERA, ACTION!

Georgia Tech has had not only its stars, but its starlets.

ose Bowl Field, where Tech holds its practices, was like a Hollywood movie lot with visits from Sandra Dee, Annette Funicello and Ann-Margret, among others. Even part of the movie, "Bear," starring Gary Busey as Alabama head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant, was filmed at Rose Bowl Field.

The starlets visited Rambling Wreck stars such as Billy Martin and Billy Lothridge in the 1950s and 1960s when they came to perform at Atlanta's Fox Theatre. The manager of the Fox was a Tech fan who would hang team pictures in the lobby. The movie stars stayed at the Biltmore Hotel, just blocks from the Tech campus.

One such starlet even graced the cover of the Georgia Tech football media guide. In 1952, publicist Ned West, trying to make a big impression in his first year on the job, managed to get a picture of Marilyn Monroe. Her agent said she was too busy to come to Atlanta, so West sent a Tech sweater and pennant to Monroe's agent in New York, where the photo was taken.

Of course, the Jackets went on to have a perfect season in 1952 and were crowned National Champions. West wanted to use the same photo in 1953, but head coach Bobby Dodd thought West was pushing his luck. So began a streak where Dodd appeared on the cover of the guide every year until his retirement in 1966.
