ast week Tech's College of Engineering inducted 90 alumni into the founding class of the Council of Outstanding Young Engineering Alumni. Membership is reserved for alumni under 40 years of age who have demonstrated outstanding professional achievements.

"Our inductees are truly on the "fast-track," stated Dr. John A. White, dean of engineering. "They have driven Georgia Tech's Ramblin' Wreck at record speeds; their accomplishments to date demonstrate that Georgia Tech's 'helluva engineer' reputation is in very good hands."

Among the inductees are a general manager from an electronics plant in China, the president of a construction firm in Puerto Rico, a head of design for an Italian automobile company, a principal and a fellow in the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy, an investment banker, a manager for the 1996 Atlanta Paralympic Games, a manager for the Olympic Games, and two presidents of software firms.

The Whistle Available On World Wide Web

ne year ago, *The Whistle* became one of a growing number of campus newspapers that decided to augment its circulation with electronic distribution. With the February 15, 1994, issue, *The Whistle* was available as a resource on the Georgia Tech network and remains there today.

The program used to distribute *The Whistle* at that time was called Gopher. With the advance of technology the user can now use the new World Wide Web to browse *The Whistle*. In the past year, the number of organizations using the World Wide Web has grown so fast as to become uncountable. Estimates place the number of servers around 5,000.

The World Wide Web is based on the client/server program model. This means that a user needs a special program, called the client, to access the information, which resides on the server. These programs are available for many platforms including IBM-PC, Macintosh, and UNIX. Users needing to have one of the clients installed on their computers can contact their computer service representative or call HelpDesk at 894-7173.

Light And Life Program Accepting Applications

o you know an 11th or 12th grader looking for an exciting and challenging summer science experience on the Georgia Tech campus? Introduce them to "Light and Life," a three-week biology mini-course beginning July 10. It will meet weekdays from 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. during which high school students will participate in daily hands-on laboratory experiments after morning lectures and demonstrations.

The course will be taught by Dr. Edward Yeargers of the School of Biology. It will examine the effects of light and other forms of radiation on living systems at levels from molecular biology to ecology. Both the positive effects of radiation, as in photosynthesis and medical diagnosis, and the negative effects, as produced by nuclear wastes and solar ultraviolet light, will be studied

The course is being sponsored under the auspices of the Howard Hughes Medical Institute, Georgia Tech's School of Biology, and CEISMC (the Center for Education Integrating Science, Mathematics and Computing).

Applications are encouraged from students historically underrepresented in mathematics and science. Application deadline is March 17.

ACC Tournament Coverage Plays On World Wide Web

here's something new on the World-Wide Web, "The ACC Tournament: Wired." "The ACC Tournament: Wired" is the official web site of the Atlantic Coast Conference and the Men's Basketball Championship Tournament.

"The ACC Tournament: Wired" is being put together by the Greensboro, N.C. News & Record and InfiNet. The tournament will be played in Greensboro for the next three years.

According to News & Record officials, "The ACC Tournament" is the first college sporting event and the third sporting event of any type represented on the Internet. Super Bowl XXIX was the first such site. Coverage began March 1.

"The site will grow every day, to include background and stats on all the ACC teams, highlights of the souvenir program, live chat groups and even an interactive trivia contest with prizes said Dave Stroble manager of *News & Record* Voice Information Services.

"While the tournament is in progress March 9 through 12, the *News & Record* will update the scores on line continuously, and they'll post news accounts of each game soon after the final buzzer, giving Inter-

net surfers an overnight jump on the next day's papers," Stroble said.

The site will remain available on the Web through the month of March and is slated to include: a continuously updated scoreboard, with scores, posted realtime, and commentary about what's happening on the court; a Tournament trivia contest, which guests will enter to compete for prizes; key excerpts from the official souvenir program, which can be ordered on line; a Tournament discussion group, featuring live chat areas; The Souvenir Stand, with official merchandise, also can be ordered on line; background information about the Atlantic Coast Conference; game stories; photographs, play-by-play, coaches comments and statistics, all filed within minutes of games' conclusions; details of Tournamania, a fan celebration planned in conjunction with the Tournament; and team rosters, season-ending statistics and the history of the Tournament.

Georgia Tech Hosting State Academic Decathlon

ighteen secondary school teams from around the state will square off academically at the ninth annual Georgia Academic Decathlon March 10 - 11 here on the Georgia Tech campus.

Sponsored by the Professional Association of Georgia Educators (PAGE), the decathlon seeks to stimulate the intellectual curiosity of students, broaden their academic horizons and promote their ability to communicate effectively.

"The Decathlon activities provide an opportunity for these young people to realize their true intellectual potential and to appreciate, maybe for the first time, the intrinsic value of academics," said Tom Wommack, director of Leg-

islative Services for PAGE, a nonunion, statewide professional association of more than 31,000 teachers, administrators and support personnel members.

Pam Steinberger, administrative director of the Ivan Allen College of Management, Policy and International Affairs, and Milton Stombler, director of program development for the Center for Education Integrating Science, Mathematics and Computing (CEISMC), are assisting PAGE as campus Decathlon coordinators.

Each Decathlon team is comprised of nine students — three honor students (GPA 3.75 to 4.00); three scholastic students (GPA 3.00 to 3.74); and three varsity students (GPA 0.00 to 2.99). The competition, to be held at various sites across campus,

consists of 10 individual and team events, including the fast-paced "Super Quiz" before a cheering audience.

The winning team will advance to the U.S. Academic Decathlon April 20-23 in Chicago, where it will face off with other teams from around the nation. Georgia Tech is slated to host next year's national competition in April 1996

Opening ceremonies will be at 8:15 a.m., Saturday, March 11, at the Theater for the Arts. The Super Quiz competition will get under way at 2:30 p.m. at the theater, and the awards banquet will be at 7:30 p.m. in the ballroom of the Renaissance Hotel, 590 W. Peachtree St., N.W.







here will you find your favorite math professor during the summer of 1996? Well, you might just find him or her downstairs in the Skiles Classroom Building dancing the night away to the tunes drifting in from the disco. Skiles, home of the School of Mathematics and others, will be transformed into a dance club when the Olympic athletes come to town.

By the Village opening on July 6, 1996, Georgia Tech must be metamorphasized into a completely sustainable mini-city complete with athlete citizens

The center of campus will see the most change. All surfaces will be decorated to reflect the Olympic look. Colorful banners and flags as well as all sorts of other adornments will combine to create a very

In order to accomplish the required 24-hour meal service for all 15,000 athletes, coaches and officials, the School of Management parking lot will be covered with a large tent and outfitted with tables

The Skiles Classroom Building will serve two purposes. By day, tables and chairs in the breezeways will help to create the Village Coffee House. At night, the building will become the Village Dance Club, complete with music and an appropriate atmosphere.

The Instructional Center, with its large sloping classrooms, will be the site of the Village Cinemas, showing movies from around the world. The Language Services Center and Sports Information Center will also be housed in the complex.

Peter's Parking Deck will be outfitted with security cages for storage. Each attending country will have a secure location in which to store equipment and other

The Textiles Engineering building, initially slated to be removed before the Games, will be NBC's broadcasting hub. NBC's "Today Show" will be broadcast live from the site while the Village is open.

The Student Center, Student Services and the bookstore area is critical to the success of the Village. Some of the existing merchants will be relocated in order to make way for a variety of shops offering everything from flowers to Olympic souvenirs to haircuts. The Student Services Building will become a sort of "City Hall" where Village officials will have offices. Athletes and other visitors will be able to take advantage of Georgia Tech's existing Student Center recreation area as well.

Swimming anyone?

As all members of the Georgia Tech community know, the new Georgia Tech Aquatic Center will host Olympic swimming, diving, synchronized swimming and water polo. However, athletes who want to get a break from the Atlanta heat between competitions can use a recreational pool that will be built into the large grassy area between the Boggs Chemistry Building and the Instructional Center.

Clearly, the campus will be a different place during the summer of 1996. ACOG, of course, is responsible for restoring all landscapes and buildings back to its initial state before fall quarter begins - unfortunate news for those who might like to enjoy a spot of tea, a quick tango, or a dip in the pool during

ACOG has created a model depicting the campus during the Olympics. The Village model will be on display in the Student Success Center soon.

Some 15,000 people take the exam annually, with only about 1,000 receiving passing scores.
