## Solution To Activities Problem?

CAMBRIDGE, MASS.—(ACP)—Participation by a few individuals in many activities is being attacked on the Massachusetts Institute of Technology campus by a special committee which is drawing up a plan of action which will limit the number of activities in which any student may be active.

The basis of the plan is a set system of points which is allotted to each activity, and no student may amass more than a set total during any one year.

The Tech, student newspaper, summarized the advantages of the plan:

"By limiting the number of activities in which any one person holds positions, more men will be enabled to hold such positions, limiting the number of such positions any one person can hold, it will prevent him from spending too much time on activities and so reduce the scholastic mortality rate among such leaders; by so limiting the number of activities possible for one man, it will prevent an activity from having a leader who is too busy to give that activity the time and energy necessary for its progress; by making a full list of available positions, the system will act as an encouragement to the freshmen and sophomores who would like to get somewhere in activities.

"It is possible that instead of assigning a varying number of positions to each activity, the activities will be classified into three grades. Students would be allowed to hold only one office in the first rank, two in the second and still more in the third. Whichever plan is adopted, enough latitude will be allowed so that undergraduates will be able to hold several offices, though only one of major rank."

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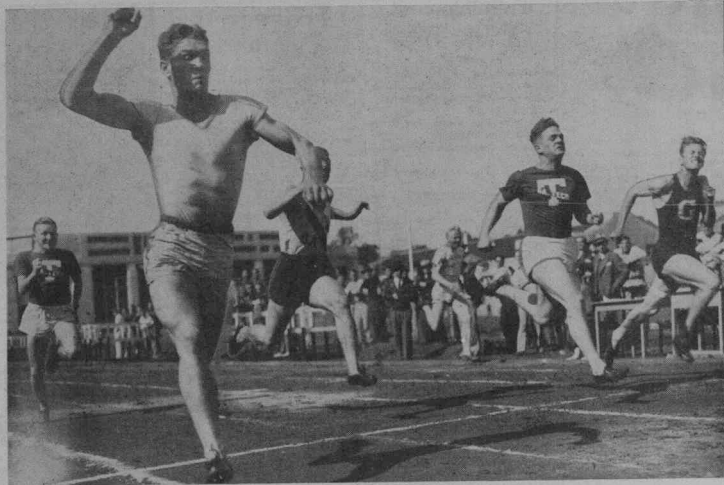

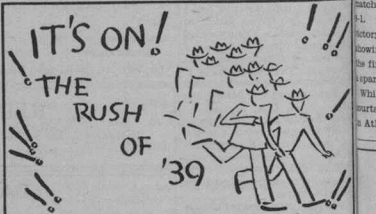

atches began today on the Tech press in the annual Georgia Tech Athletic Association tennis meet. In addition to turning out the courts for the meet, Tech athletic athletes and coaches will assist and sponsor the field and track meet under the lights tonight at Grant Field.

On Tech's track victory over Georgia, Saturday, was the culmination to Coach George Griffin's efforts for several years to develop a well-balanced track squad capable of defeating an ever powerful Bulldog team. Saturday's action was the triumph of a well-balanced, capable team over one of outstanding and versatile veterans. The Bulldogs lost to Tech for the first time since 1934.

Atlanta Georgia's defeat would have been such a much more defeat had it not been for the disability of Tom Bates, brilliant linemen, who is outstanding in the first places, broad jump, and the 440 in 20 seconds. He is extremely impressive to the eyes of the crowd. Bates, Conley and his little Sam Hall have all experienced illness broad across.

The meet itself was a display of the talent of the under talent in the South—Bilcher, Cate, Sam, People, Fredericksen, Stevens, Jones, Plaxico, heard, and a host of others, made a Tech display of stars that would be difficult to equal anywhere in the country. The success of Vassie Cate, Bulldog, who won three firsts, is the story of a force, dogged determination to win, backed by complete control over powerful physique. In the high and low hurdles, Monroe Plaxico, fine sophomore star, could not have run a more beautiful race, but he was nosed out by Cate, who seemed to refuse to say die. The highlight of the day was

the triumph of Henry Fredericksen, the Durable Dane, who matched stride for stride with Small and Pearce to win the grueling mile and half-mile runs. Mauler and Conley, of Tech, were paragons of endurance in winning the first and second places respectively in the two-mile grind.

It seems that Georgia was the underdog all the way around last weekend. The promising freshman netters ended completely routed the Bull Pups, losing only one match. Johnson, Lindsey, First, and Graham compose a quartet which is sure to favorably augment the varsity squad next year. A review of the prospects for next year's team indicates that Coach Bertelli will have a good chance to recover the S. E. O. tennis crown that Tech has yielded this year. #### Win Over Auburn After Losing to Vandy

After three postponements, Tech finally played the opening home game of the season last Saturday and lost to Vanderbilt by the score of 10-4. The main feature of the game was the wildness of the four pitchers used. Although no one was killed, two batters received flesh wounds by being hit with the ball. Then, also, 14 walks were issued and three wild pitches uncorrelated with possibly more.

Jack Chivington relieved Red Oliver, who suffered his first loss, in the seventh inning and pitched until he hurt his arm at the ninth frame. But Gilmer then went into the game to give up one run, to get a hit and score a run.

A fine play in the eighth and when Billy Gibson flew far to his right to get Turner's grounder and then to force Perkins at second. Another grand play was Voorhies' backing up Burpo at first when a throw by Oliver was not within several feet of Burpo. Cy Perkins, Vandy's wilder, went the full nine innings to win his 19th college victory over three years. His victory Saturday was his sixth straight this year. Georgia Tech gave Cy Perkins his only defeat in college competition last year.
