Returning Favor Led Trujillo Back to Tech

Imagine Al Trujillo's surprise when, as a Georgia Tech student, he received a congratulatory letter (and a hefty check) stating he'd been awarded a scholarship — that he didn't apply for.

"Dr. Ducoffe was head of Aerospace Engineering when I was an undergrad in the late 70s and early 80s," said Trujillo, who is now president and chief operating officer of The Georgia Tech Foundation. "He was always pushing me to do more, to the point that I wondered if he really liked me."

But Trujillo was wrong. Ducoffe was the one who had nominated him for the scholarship.

"I remember telling him how surprised and honored I was that he'd done this," Trujillo said. "He looked at me and said, 'I surprised you ... maybe you'll surprise me someday."

Years later, Trujillo was sitting in his

office overlooking Sydney Harbor in Australia when he received another letter from Tech — this time asking for help in establishing an endowed chair position in Ducoffe's name.

"I hadn't been a regularly involved alumnus, but this was a turning point," Trujillo said. "I reconnected with the Institute as a volunteer with the Alumni Association, a

path that led to where I am now."

PRACTICAL GUY VS. ADVENTURER

Trujillo assumed his role at The Foundation in July 2013 after a colorful career leading companies that handled everything from waste to documents.

"When it comes to making career decisions, I've always had a practical guy sitting on one shoulder telling me to analyze my choices carefully — and another guy on the other shoulder telling me to lighten up and be adventurous," he said.

As a teenager, Trujillo learned how to fly airplanes, which resulted in him graduating from Tech with a bachelor's degree from the School of Aerospace Engineering.

After college, Trujillo dabbled in designing rocket motors for Lockheed and realized how much he enjoyed managing others. He headed to Stanford University, where Trujillo earned an MBA.

Since then, he has lead companies from the United States to Australia, eventually ending up in Norcross.

"Although it was the letter I received in

Computing, ISyE First to Reach Campaign Goals

OFFICE OF DEVELOPMENT

In late November, the College of Computing became the first college to reach its goal within the \$1.5 billion Campaign Georgia Tech.

The \$40 million mark was quietly topped with a commitment from Google in support of faculty research within the School of Computer Science related to monitoring free and open access to information on the Internet.

Days later, the H. Milton Stewart School of Industrial and Systems Engineering (ISyE) followed suit, becom-


ing the first school to reach its campaign goal. Thanks to a bequest provision from an alumnus, ISyE surpassed \$60 million.

These milestones are crossroads of sorts for both. They are at once celebrating great success and also looking ahead to the ongoing philanthropic work that remains. The campaign began in July 2004, with an original goal of \$1 billion and a December 2010 conclusion date. That year, the goal was expanded to \$1.5 billion and a December 2015 conclusion date. In the two years

Tech Launches Africa Atlanta 2014 Initiative

The ripple spread across universities, visual and performing arts organizations, African Diaspora heritage communities, governmental organizations and agencies (local, state, national, and international), nongovernmental organizations, business, and industry.

Taking a cue from the highly successful model for France-Atlanta, Royster chose a holistic approach and included activities spanning not only arts and culture, but education, business and innovation, and global affairs.

"The idea is to see the arts as a lens for understanding cultures more robustly within a global context," she said. "We are thrilled to have one of the world's foremost collections of African art to anchor this initiative. We are also thrilled to add many other amazing artistic and cultural activities."



about what to expect at Georgia Tech, current postdocs can learn about career opportunities and how to apply for grants and fellowships, and faculty mentors can review best practices."

The Office of Postdoctoral Services, which is under the Office of the Vice Provost for Graduate Education and Faculty Affairs, is charged by the Office of the Provost to invest in the culture of postdoctoral fellows, also called "postdocs," to help build their skills so that they can move on to rewarding permanent positions. A postdoc holds a doctoral degree, is in a temporary position pursuing research with a faculty mentor, and is acquiring the professional skills needed for career advancement. Of the 355 postdocs at Tech, half are in the College of Engineering and one-third are in the College of Sciences. "The excitement from around the campus about the creation of the postdoc office has been striking," said Susan Cozzens, vice provost of Graduate Education and Faculty Affairs. "Postdocs are key to the success of many of our research areas. To attract the best, we need to offer a strong range of career development opportunities and favorable conditions of work. We want our postdoctoral scholars to move into productive career pathways and become ambassadors who build Georgia Tech's international reputation."

In addition to launching and maintaining a new website, the Office of Postdoctoral Services has several other projects underway, including:

- Collaborating with the Center for the Enhancement of Teaching and Learning to offer a Tech to Teaching workshop based on the principles of learner-centered teaching.
- Creating a road map of activities for postdocs to follow, from the initial conversation to career development.
- Writing a strategic plan that will address postdocs' concerns identified in the Campus Climate Survey and a 2011 survey of post-docs.

"We're looking for other opportunities to collaborate across campus and also with other institutions and organizations," said Stone, who is vice-chair of the National Postdoctoral Association's 2014 meeting. "We welcome all suggestions that will help us improve the postdoctoral experience at Georgia Tech."

Volunteers Keep Cat Population in Check

"Adopt a Tech kitten or cat ... Reduced adoption fees for employees, students, and affiliates." This ad in *The Whistle* classifieds has left some members of the campus community puzzled. Georgia Tech has cats?

The short answer to that question is yes. "Every place has cats," said Marilyn Smith,

professor in the School of Aerospace Engineering. "No matter where." It's a fact, but it doesn't have to be a problem — and that's where Smith and other volunteers come in. This small, unofficial group, known as Campus Cats, has worked since 1997 to keep Tech's cat population as small and healthy as possible.

Back then, cat sight-

ings were alarmingly frequent due to a number of construction projects that disturbed their secluded habitats. A few concerned Auxiliary Services staffers put out a call for volunteers, and the group's first inventory revealed close to 200 feral cats living on Tech's 450 acres.

Volunteers began capturing, spaying or neutering, and vaccinating the feral cats before releasing them back onto campus. Any kittens or newly abandoned (i.e., tame) cats that were discovered were rescued, treated, and put up for adoption. Central to this effort were feeding stations — set up off the beaten path to avoid compromising the campus aesthetic — to ensure the cats were nourished and also to give volunteers a means to monitor the population.

One fecund feline in particular, Mama Calico, has eluded capture for almost 10 years, but hundreds more have been caught and fixed or adopted out.

Through these methods (sanctioned by the Humane Society of America), the campus cat population has been greatly reduced. In recent years, it has been holding steady at about 40 to 50 cats, estimated Josie Giles, marketing and communications manager for Robotics and Big Data. Giles coordinates Campus Cats activities and runs Krazy About Kats, a nonprofit organization (not affiliated with Tech) that helps many Tech rescues find a home.

In time, the campus cat population may get even smaller, but nature guarantees it will never be zero. "If you actually trapped all the cats and moved them somewhere else, you will get more cats here," Giles said. "Nature does hate a void."

Having a healthy population of cats staking out Tech territory helps discourage abandoned or feral cats from surrounding neighborhoods from migrating onto campus, Giles pointed out. Unfortunately, she added, some cats are deliberately "dumped" on campus.

"Research by the Humane Society shows that campuses are the No. 3 place people dump animals, after vets and shelters," Giles said. "And honestly, statistically, quoting the Humane Society, many of the animals that are dumped come from students themselves." Smith said there's a misconception that

campuses are a safe place to abandon a cat. "Please let everybody know that dumping a cat on campus is not appropriate," she said. "If they've [the cat] been inside, they don't know how to adapt. There are predators. They might get killed by a fox or run over."

Another misconception, Smith said, is that the cats might pose a threat to humans or birds. "These cats are not hungry, they're healthy, so they're only going to go after the easy ground prey — voles, moles, and rats — things we don't want on campus," she said. "And they're not going to menace anybody. They don't come to me, and I feed them! They're certainly not going to go after students."

achieved something great.
