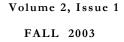

This segment of the newsletter will cover recent statistics of the Office of Student Integrity. The focus will be on the latest trends at Tech regarding academic integrity. STATS will be run semesterly and yearly for the newsletter and other various research based projects. The data is divided into colleges.

Term: First day of a semester through the day before the next semester. Primary Violation: The most important and underlying aspect/charge of the case.

Charges Data: Each case is calculated by the primary violation of the case, therefore there may be more

charges within one case. Additional charges are not reflected in this data.

In Summer 2002 there was a total of 93 cases resolved.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Currently the GT Honor Code requires faculty to report any instances of academic dishonesty to the Office of the Dean of Students (ODOS).
- If you injure a student academically without due process (reduce a grade for cheating without working with ODOS); *you* have legal liability.
- The Honor Code contains broad definitions, therefore <u>you</u> must define what is acceptable for your course and each assignment. Eg: unauthorized collaboration.

- When preparing your syllabi for the spring semester, please make sure to clearly articulate your policies for *each type* of assignment to discourage cheating.
- If you are asked, please allow Council members 3-5 minutes during your first spring semester class to talk about academic integrity and the services the Honor Advisory Council provides.

RESPONDING TO ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

- **Forwarding a case:** You are now able to send a case to OSI using the online *Academic Incident Reporting Form* at the OSI website by clicking on the *Faculty & Staff* icon, then clicking on the *Report A Violation* icon. OSI website is: http://www.deanofstudents.gatech.edu/integrity/
- All students found responsible for academic misconduct in Academic year 03-04 will be sanctioned to the Academic Integrity Seminar. The seminar is partly online using Web CT, and the in-class group meetings are facilitated by faculty.

AROUND THE WORLD IN ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

One reason to keep academic integrity in the forefront of your mind, in and out of the classroom. . .

- Students see the use of the internet differently: 38% of 18,000 students across 23 college campuses acknowledged engaging in internet plagiarism; almost half of these students consider this behavior trivial or not cheating at all—2003 survey conducted by Don McCabe, management professor at Rutger's University and founding President of the Center for Academic Integrity; New York Times, September 3, 2003.
 - * Be clear on your expectations, do not assume they will know better.

THIS MONTH'S HELPFUL CLASSROOM HINTS. . .

A FEW POINTERS REGARDING COLLABORATION AT TECH:

Some of the most difficult Honor Code cases are those involving allegations of unauthorized collaboration. The <u>American Heritage Dictionary</u> defines collaborate as:

- 1. To work together, especially in a joint, intellectual effort;
- To cooperate treasonably, as with an enemy occupying one's country. Just as this definition has good and bad connotations, so does the concept of collaboration at Tech.

There is no one definition of collaboration that is specifically outlined by the Institute. It is defined by each faculty member, for each assignment. Some faculty bar all collaboration, while others encourage, or even require it. Many faculty allow collaboration, but require unique work for each individual student. The latter can be quite confusing to students, who may not understand where the acceptable "line" is, and they often believe that if they collaborate, their work will look similar.

Here are some suggestions for your syllabus and classroom:

- ⇒ Clearly define in your syllabus the amount of collaboration you will allow
- ⇒ Define what constitutes an individual or unique effort, so students will know the difference between collaboration and copying
- ⇒ If the amount of collaboration that is authorized differs with each assignment, clearly state this policy
- ⇒ Define with whom students may collaborate; i.e. class mates, across sections, with TAs, with Tutors, and with students who had the course before
- ⇒ Define the acceptable use of "word." Can they only use what you provide them?

FACTORS IN SANCTIONING STUDENTS:

When you refer academic integrity cases to our office, we will want to know what you think is a fair sanction if the student is found in violation of the Honor Code. We will strongly consider your suggestion. However, there are many additional factors to be considered when sanctioning offenders. Following are some of the sanctioning considerations:

- ⇒ Outcome suggested by faculty
- ⇒ The nature of the violation
- ⇒ The degree of the student's involvement in the violation
- ⇒ The weight of the assignment toward the final course grade
- ⇒ The sanctioning of similar cases historically
- ⇒ The degree of honesty the student shows during the investigative process
- ⇒ The level of understanding that the student shows; i.e do they "get it"
- ⇒ The previous disciplinary history of the student
- ⇒ Any aggravating or mitigating circumstances
