## Professor wins Cancer Scholar

Ravi Bellamkonda, a professor in The Wallace H. Coulter Department of Biomedical Engineering at Georgia Tech and Emory University, is one of 13 scientists named as a Georgia Cancer Coalition Distinguished Cancer Scholar for 2007.
He will receive $\$ 150,000$ in funding annually for five years to support his research efforts. The coalition selects scientists engaged in the most promising areas of cancer research. Bellamkonda's area of interest is nanotechnology for cancer imaging and therapy.

## Tech faces security breach

On Feb. 21, 3000 letters and notices were sent to several former and current Tech employees. The notices warned that a massive security breach had taken place, and that sensitive data including social security information could have been compromised.

Much of the information that is known about the incident was within a press release issued by Tech's Public Affairs Office. Currently, the investigation is ongoing and as a result much of what is known about the case is not being talked about. However, there are a few specifics that are known in addition to the information present in the
press briefing. The breach was first noticed

ity violation was known. Matt Nagel, media relations specialist for ICPA, said, "Basically the reason that the information was released when it was, instead of late Feb. 13, is because it was an ongoing investigation and Tech had to determine the scope of the information in the computer account that had been breached."

On Feb. 21 in addition to sending out those notices Tech also contacted the Georgia Bureau of Investigation and the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Nagel stated that a breach of Tech's computer system occurred from off campus. The thieves managed to gain access to names, address, social security

The greatest strength of SGA is our ability to truly debate the issues that matter to everyone using input from many sectors of campus. Only then can we truly represent your voice," Graab said.

UHR's elections committee oversees the entire elections process. "Elections are a good way for students to get involved and find out what is going on around campus. It is a good time for people to hear from who is going to be their leaders and find out how they plan to make things better," said Will Welch, a fourth-year International Affairs major and this year's elections committee chair.

## Senate funds six bills, postpones two

The Graduate Student Senate met Tuesday. Six bills were passed and two were postponed.
The first bill brought before the senate was the joint allocation to the Table Tennis Association. The bill was back from conference committee where the differences between the senate and the house versions of the bill were settled. The bill passed by unanimous acclamation

The second bill brought before the senate was the joint allocation to Culture Tech. This bill was also returning from conference committee and it, too, passed by unanimous acclimation.
The third bill brought before the senate was the joint allocation to AIAA. Theywere requesting money to help fund a National event in Savannah. The bill was amended to match the Joint Finance Committee (JFC) policy for travel expenses and number of students attending. The bill passed.

The fourth bill was the joint allocation to the Student Center. The group was requesting $\$ 70,683.00$ to purchase tables for the conference rooms on the third floor. Claudia

UHR postpones bylaws again

The Undergraduate House of Representatives (UHR) met Tuesday.Seven billswere passed, two were tabled and one bill was withdrawn. Within the bills presented to the UHR was the Amendments to the Bylaws that had been tabled from the week before.

The first bill brought before the House Feb. 27 was the joint allocation to the Table tennis association, which had been sent to committee after the House and Senate passed it in different versions. After no discussion, the bill passed unanimously.

The second bill brought before the House was the joint allocation to Culture Tech, which had also been sent to committee. Again, the bill required no discussion and passed unanimously with 34 votes.

The third bill presented was the joint allocation to the AIAA, or the American Institute for Aeronautics and Astronautics. They were requesting money to help fund a National event in Savannah.

The bill was amended to match JFC policy for travel expenses and number of students attending. The final format of the bill, after one failed amendment to increase the amount allotted, was $\$ 1,430.20$. The bill passed with 28 yays, 3 nays, nd 3 abstentions.

The next bill on the agenda was the amendments to the bylaws, but a motion passed to move them six bills down in the agenda. As such, the fourth bill brought before the house was the Joint allocation to the Student Center.

The group was requesting $\$ 70,683.00$ to purchase tables for the conference rooms on the third floor. Claudia Jones, JFC Chair, informed the group that JFC policy would not allow any funding for

this, as "Non-emergency capital expenditures are things that can be planned for in advance and paid for with budgetary rollovers over time."
There was a motion to ignore JFC policy and amend the bill down to $\$ 43,000$. After debate, the bill was tabled.

The fifth bill presented was the Joint allocation to the India club for $\$ 995.95$ to pay for a broadcasting of the World Cup cricket Match. JFC recommended that the bill be amended down to $\$ 695.95$ as the group indicated $\$ 300$ from fundraising. The bill passed with 23 votes in favor, eight votes opposed and zero

## OHR restructures organization

The Office of Human Resources (OHR) has begun a restructuring process to improve their efficiency and to develop a better understanding about the ways to serve Tech's employee base. The restructuring will focus on adding critical talents and skills to OHR that will allow them to implement the professional level services under their strategic plan.
"We needed to change our focus from a transactional organization to one that is a proactive organization," said Chuck Donbaugh, associate vice-president of human resources.

As part of a series of retreats over the last three to four years, OHR, with the Division of Administration and Finance, identified the areas where OHR performed well and the areas where improvement was warranted. The context under which these conversations were held focused on transforming OHR from a "good" organization to a "great" organization said Donbaugh.
"The realization was that [OHR] did a really good job with the transactional, everyday human resources [duties]. We got people on the payroll. We got people promoted. We got them paid... In terms oflooking at the broader ramifications of an employment relationship, there were a number of things we needed to do much better," Donbaugh said.
A more aggressive stance toward recruitment and the creation of
metrics to determine whether Tech was attracting and retaining the right people were areas identified as needing improvement. These needs extended both domestically and internationally as a better understanding of the international employment issues was also an important highlighted topic.
"As part of becoming a more proactive organization, we needed

to recognize that foreign nationals, both employees and students, were a desirable and important part of our workforce. We needed to be more experienced and more efficient in how we assist those people," Donbaugh said.

One of the visible changes to come out of the restructuring that intends to improve services for all employees will be the creation of a customer service center to become the one-stop-shop to handle all work related problems.
"Ifthe student has a problem with payroll, if[foreign national employees] have issues with a tax treaty or any other work related problem, they can come to the customer service center and someone will be there to assist them. They won't have to go from, place to place to find out an answer," Donbaugh said.

A big part of this process was to make sure OHR became a more professional and efficient human resource organization said Donbaugh. OHR is raising questionsabout how to recruit in the 21st century, how to maintain a presence in China, South Korea, Singapore, Ireland, etc. Understanding different employment rules and conditions become vitally importance as the need to work with these countries increases.
"In a very generic sense, what we are trying to do is to find better ways to deliver top notch human resource services. We arelooking a technology to make us more efficient... We are also trying to look at all of the worklife issues that affect how well people can do their jobs. For example, these can include dealing with the issue of childcare," Donbaugh said.
In the new model being adapted by OHR, they looked at corporate modelsandalso the model being used by Duke. The use of an industrial model is unique said Donbaugh. The only other university with a similar basis for human resources was the aforementioned Duke.

cricket Match. JFC recommended that the bill be amended down to $\$ 695.95$ as the group indicated $\$ 300$ from fundraising. The bill passed with only two negative votes.

The next bill brought before the senate was the joint allocation to the Mars Society. The funding was for travel and equipment shipping to the Mars desert research Center. The group requested $\$ 3,070$. The travel expenses in the bill were amended to $\$ 805.14$ in compliance with JFC travel expense policy, the JFC also recommended striking all other funding in the bill. The senate went against policy and kept the rest of

numbers, and 400 state purchasing card numbers.

The 3000 people affected by the breach are predominantly from the School of Electrical and Computer Engineering. He does however state that some students may also have been affected. "Students could be involved if they were employees of the department," Nagel said.

The 3000 people affected have been told to take the proper precautions with their credit reporting agencies to makesure that it is known that their personal information may have been compromised and could be used in a fraudulent fashion.

Currently, the FBI is in charge
the funding in the bill and passed the bill in that form.

The elections code, which contains all of the rules governing this year's elections, is included in the Elections Packet, available on the SGA website. The elections committee will hear any violations cases filed against candidates and ensure that the elections process runs smoothly. Campaigning begins March 26 and ends April 11. Students can vote on-
line once elections open April9 until they close April 11 at 4 p.m. Graab said it is important for all students to be involved in the elections process, whether they run or not.
"Tech is fortunate to have exceptional students with innovative ideas. If you are passionate about Tech, care about the students around you, and want to make a difference with your time at Tech, run for office in SGA. If you choose not to run for office, make the most of
your vote, by being educated about the candidates running and their strengths," Graab said.

In addition to the elected positions there are many other options available to students after the elections who still want to be in SGA. Students can apply to be committee chairs, an appointed Vice President, run for member at large in the fall, serve on a committee or apply to be on the Undergraduate Judiciary Cabinet.

abstentions.
The sixth bill bought before the House was the Joint allocation to the Mars Society. The funding was for travel and equipment shipping to the Mars desert research Center. The group requested $\$ 3,070$, but the bill was amended to $\$ 805.14$ in compliance with JFC travel expense policy. The bill passed unanimously with 31 votes in favor.

The seventh bill brought before the House was the joint allocation to the Student Planning Association.

They were requesting $\$ 3,000$ in travel and miscellaneous expenses for 19 students to attend a conference in Philadelphia in April. JFC recommended amending the bill up to $\$ 3,021$, and it passed with 31 votes for, 3 votes against, and no abstentions.
The eighth bill discussed was the amendments to the bylaws introduced last week. Tim Gallagher presented the amendments agreed upon by the ad-hoc committee created after last week's two-hour discussion.

The amendments covered such topics as the veto power of the president, and emergency legislation. As there are currently 43 members in the house, the bill required 29 votes in favor, or a $2 / 3$ vote to pass.

The Undergraduate House of Representatives (UHR) has once again postponed the vote on amending the UHR bylaws. With all the discussion surrounding the proposed changes, it is obvious that some sort of amendment is necessary, and UHR needs to move forward with the process. If UHR expects the bill to be failed, they should go ahead and fail it instead of continually postponing the vote. This way, they would be able to introduce a new version and restart the process.
Unfortunately, postponing the vote is not the only way in which UHR has been wasting time with the bill to amend the bylaws. They have also made several amendments to the bill throughout the process; if UHR will ultimately fail the bill, the amendments are a waste of time.
Considering that part of the reason the vote has been postponed is to ensure that enough representatives in favor of the bill will be present to vote, it is evident that some representatives should be taking their jobs more seriously. As obvious as it may seem, the student body elects its representatives to represent them in UHR sessions. Representatives need to attend meetings for this to happen.
Not only that, but the younger members should find their voices and stop allowing a smaller number of upperclassmen to dominate UHR. It seems that just a few seniors are standing in the way of amending the bylaws; they should not be able to use their seniority to sway younger representatives, who should instead make their own decisions so that the student body as a whole is better represented.
As students continue to watch UHR deliberating over the amendments, they should keep the upcoming Student Government Association (SGA) application deadline, March 16, in mind. SGA can always use new members with fresh ideas and dedication to the process. Every semester, there are majors with representative seats still open and others for which the same representative runs uncontested term after term.

Getting involved with SGA is a great way for any student to get involved on campus and make a positive impact. While voting to pass the bill to amend the UHR bylaws may not seem like a huge change for the Institute, but these changes will affect things like the mandatory Student Activity Fee allocation policies. Tech needs those changes to ensure fairness for all organizations requesting money from SGA.
Not only that, SGA also sponsors events such as GT Night at Six Flags, Finding Common Ground, and One Night Stand. Through funding decisions and programs, SGA affects every student.

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Do your parents know what you do on weekends? For a fairly large proportion of the student body, the answer to this question is "No, and thank God they don't!"

As college students, we've honed our skills at avoiding certain lines of questioning, thereby hiding the myriad activities our parents would not approve of.

Still, one would think that most students' parents aren't utterly clueless enough to not be able to figure out there's something they've not been told when their son or daughter shows up at home at 5 a.m. and staggers to bed every week. How is it, then, that students are able to continue their deception for years, even though in many cases they don't hide it well at all?

In my experience, students have an unexpected ally in keeping parents uninformed about the poor decisions they may be making: the parents themselves. Parental naiveté has become a bulwark of life both for American college students and, increasingly, younger people as well.

The parental insistence on ignoring the potsmoking, binge drinking, Free Love bacchanalia of their little angels has led to a variety of repercussions. Luckily, most of these do nothave wider societal implications; rather, these include parents being comically surprised by unwanted pregnancies or by having to pick their son or daughter up from the hospital after an emergency medical intervention.

One particular result of this parental naiveté has had wide-ranging effects on almost all aspects of an American child's upbringing, however: abstinence-only sex education.

Abstinence-only sex education is essentially the teaching of refraining from sex as the only method for avoiding pregnancy and sexuallytransmitted diseases (STDs), while

explicitly not instructing students on safe sex and the use of contraceptives. It's a major issue because a vast proportion of federal education funding is tied to the teaching of this castrated version of sex ed.

The most fascinating aspect of the tie of money for education to abstinence programs is that these programs have been repeatedly shown to fail at their stated goals. The government explicitly funds programs that advocate saving sex for marriage, and despite their increasing prevalence the average age at which Americans first have sex has held steady at 17 .

The average age for marriage, on the other hand, remains at 25 years old for women and 27 years old for men, according to information from the Guttmacher Institute. Indeed, according toa 2003 study presented at the American Psychological Society (APS)'s annual meeting, over 60 percent of students whohad pledged virginity in middle or high school failed to keep their vow to remain sex-free until marriage.

Furthermore, thereare increasing concerns that abstinence-only sex education programs leave teenagers more, not less, vulnerable to STDs. Because they do not teach about the use of condoms or other methods for having safe sex, and because the teenagers are having sexanyway, they can find themselves more at risk.

The issue is complicated even further by the fact that the American insistence on abstinence has created
a massive false dichotomy between vaginal penetration and other sexual acts like oral or anal sex. A survey conducted by Seventeen magazine in 2003 found that more than half of 15 - to 17-year-olds believed that having oral sex did not mean breaking a vow of abstinence, and the APS study reported that students who pledged abstinence were no more likely to refrain from types of sex other than vaginal.

And these programshave resulted in disturbing statistics, such as 62 percent of males having sex before they were ever shown how to put on a condom, according to a 2002 study.

The body of evidence supporting the superiority of comprehensive sex education that includes a thorough explanation of contraceptives and their effectiveness is extensive. So why is it that the president, a fair proportion of the Senate, and vast numbers of parents support the less effective programs?

The only explanation I can come up with is that despiteall the evidence to the contrary, parents continue to blindly believe their own children remain daisy-fresh while their neighbors raise a brood of trollops. Well, dear parents of America, it's time to accept it-your children are having sex, and they're doing it at much earlier ages than you seem to believe.

Unfortunately, DanceTech is currently facing serious troubles due to various problems, including a lack of student participation.

"DanceTech brought in a few very talented ballet-trained freshmen, butwe also have an old-time shim sham danceand capoeria [a Brazilian martial arts style that is centered around dance]," DeLiso said.
Although DanceTech has planned a bright future for Tech's dancers, it is now facing significant problems in making that future a reality.
"Our main challenge right now is building a strong base of choreographers, dancers and leaders that are committed to putting on a great show and ensuring the financial and membership aspects of DanceTech," DeLiso said.
One of the major issues DanceTech is facing is the lack of a dedicated team and financial support.
"The members we have right now are great. But most club members just want to dance and not lend a hand in helping to run the club [or do things] like fundraising. Since the CRC started charging for studio space, weare at a loss for good practice rooms,"

However, the DanceTech team is working together to find solutions to these problems so the club can continue on campus.
"Weare holding more regular teaching workshops to try to increase the diversity of our dancesand interest in DanceTech from beginner dancers," DeLiso said.

DeLiso outlined other plans to improve the organization's situation.
"To raise money and increase attendance atour shows, we plan on holding raffles at our shows and better publicizing our club," she said.

Many DanceTech members think it is absolutely crucial to have the organization around on campus. They say that dancing is not only fun, but it is a great way to relax and get away from books and labs.
"I think that creativity is the basis for innovation, so why not start with the most creative outlets there are? [Being creative] helps build rounded and cultured people who are aware of the importance of every aspect of life," said Joanna Futral, a second-year Applied Mathematics major.

## Math contest recruits for future

Find the units digit of the following expression: 2007^2007^2007. Finalists had two minutes to solve this problem in the decisive tiebreaker round of the 2007 Tech High School Math Competition, which was held this past Saturday in the Instructional Center (for the mathematically-minded, the answer to the tiebreaker is seven).
More than 270 talented high school and eighth grade students from seven states competed in a series of math tests for trophies, bragging rights and, most notably, a total of $\$ 10,000$ in scholarships to Tech.

This year's event was hosted by Pi Mu Epsilon, Club Math and the School of Mathematics, and was meant in part as a recruitment tool to attract high-quality students to Tech and its math department.

Besides the stipulation that the awarded scholarships can only be used if the recipients matriculate at Tech, the event organizers also offered campus tours and admissions information for students who were not yet convinced that Tech is the right school for them.

First held in the fifties, the competition has changed significantly. Back then, the top prize was a brand new television set; last week, it was a \$2,500 individual scholarship.

Whathas stayed constantover the

years, however, has been the caliber of the contestants.

Harrison Brown, a junior at Centennial High School, won the top individual prize for the varsity competition, but only after grueling practice and preparation for the long day of testing.

Brown had to arrive at eight in the morning, take two hour-and-a-half long exams before being posted as a semifinalist and endure another
rigorous, two-hour, proof-based exam afterwards to be declared the winner.
"[However, it] was well worth the experience and the scholarship," Brown said.
Not surprisingly, Brown's high school also won the first place team award, besting the efforts of top contenders Rockdale Magnet and

## Students work on Blue

For every problem there is a solution, and in a world where problems seem to increase exponentially, solutions are hard to come by. So what if someone told you that a cure for the world's single largest cause of human sickness anddeath had been discovered, and that 25,000 peopleaday, 400 children an hour, could be saved?

The problem: water is essential to life and sup-
ply is scarce. The solution here is the Blue Planet Run, an international relay event developed by the Blue Planet Foundation.
"Awareness is the biggest problem with this issue right now, because we have a solution. We have the ability to solve the problem, but in order to solve the problem we need funds, and you don'tget funds unless people
know about it," said Patricia Breed, a former Tech student who now works as communications coordinator for ignition Inc., the experimental marketing agency hired to market and produce the Blue Planet Run, which will raise money and awareness for

the water issue.

The Blue PlanetFoundationitselfis a non-profit whose main goal is to provide clean, sustainable water to third-world countries. It transports drinking water to areas in need through a structure called the Pure Water Exchange, which works with small, local nongovernmental organizations as well as larger ones.

These organizations facilitate getting the water out to villages that pass the application process and are then reviewed on a yearly

basis.
Currently, the Blue Planet Foundation is looking into global expansion. With 23 water projects already under its belt, the foundation is trying to set up more programs. Although the Blue Planet Run itself does not track into Georgia, the foundation is looking for ways to engage the people in the state, especially on college campuses, and it is also looking for people who want to contribute or maybe even start their own local relay for the cause.
The reality of the matter is that thousands of people die every day for lack of something as simple as clean water.

Also because of this, women are locked into roles that require them to walk up to six hours a day to find food and fresh water.
"It's very dangerous. Sometimes these women have to leave late at night or early in the morning, because they can't afford to be late. The water might run out," Swanburg said.

The foundation encourages people to help by donating to its cause. Just 25 dollars has the potential to provide safe drinking water to a person for the rest of his or her life.
"Twenty-five dollars is like going to lunch two days a week, and

Last year, Rokhlin was invited to work as an intern on the Blue Planet Run project at ignition Inc. Immediately after being introduced to it, she realized that this was what she wanted to do.

It's a dream come true. You only hope that something can be so moving and so inspiring. I never knew you could combine philanthropy with business in such a cohesive way. To feel like what I'm doing, like the hours that I'm putting in, is working towards a common goal that will make a difference in the world is all that I can ask for," Rokhlin said.

So what exactly is the Blue Planet Run, and how does it work towards solving the problem?

The concept of this global relay challenge was devised by the Blue Planet Foundation's founder and chairman, Jin Zidell, who was inspired by the FIFA World Cup to use a sporting event to promote awareness, raise funds and draw people to the cause.

Millions of people lack access to this simple resource, a situation that creates many physical, social and economic hardships.Specifically, the Blue Planet Foundation seeks to improve the efficiency and efficacy of the allocation and distribution of funds to programs that target rural and semi-rural communities that are otherwise overlooked by large drink ing water projects.

To raise more awareness and money for its cause, the Foundation is hosting the first ever global relay, the Blue Planet Run, this June with 20 runners.

simplest thing. It's actually really 41st parallel.
symbolic because women spend hours walking to get clean water, so the physical act of running really has something to do with it. Also, running is something someone can relate to on every continent; it's kind of like a universal non-verbal gesture," Rokhlin said.
Starting June 1st of this year in what is to be the first official Blue Planet Run, 20 qualified runners fromallwalks oflife willjoin together and embark upon a journey that will take them through 16 countries and approximately 14,000 miles around the world in less than 100 days.
"The whole idea behind this project is incredible. The fact that there are people who want to do this, who believe in this, is amazing. [The Blue Planet Run] is something that's never been done
before, and it sets the stage for events in the future," said MattSwanburg, a fifth-year Management major at Tech and an ignition Inc. intern who is also working on the Blue Planet Run project.

The 20 runners were chosen out of hundreds of applicants from around the world.
The current runners hail from six different continents, and the countries that they will blitzthrough include the United States, Poland, Belarus, Czechoslovakia, Mongolia, China, Japan and Russia.

Beginning the relay course in New York, the athletes will work their way east, roughly across the

They will run through countries that are in need of water as well as countries that are not. According to Breed, the relay will essentially include five teams of four runners, and it will operate in an almost leapfrog-like system.

When one team is running, another team will be sleeping, and there will be an entire support force that travels alongside the runners.

The daily routine of the relay will vary slightly. Typically, the runners will get up, have breakfast and run. Each participant must run for 90 minutes and then will ride in the van for four and a halfhours. After the group runs, they will return to the hotel, rest and eat, and by the time theyarefinished running, the other team will start.

The athletes will run for four days and then rest forone. The course in any given 24 hour period will cover 160 miles, and each team will be responsible for a six-hour block of running every day.

Because of this coordinated system, the support team will always be readily available to any of the participants, and there will be time for sponsor talks, activation and media.

The Blue Planet Foundation is planning to hold the relay every other year for the next 20 years, so thisupcoming 2007 Blue Planet Run will be the first of many to come.

## Béla Fleck, Chick Corea visit campus

The Ferst Center was host to the comedy and ruse of a dynamic duo that the world has only very recently had the pleasure of seeing together.

The jazz community was proud to see multiple Grammy Awardwinning American jazz pianist and composer Chick Corea performing with world renowned virtuoso banjo player Béla Fleck.
Friday Jan. 23 the Ferst Center witnessed a sold-out acoustic set by Béla Fleck and Chick Corea that
reminded fans why it is that these two have been held in such high esteem since their early successes.

Many were surprised to find out that Fleck was not accompanied by the Flecktones: his main front band accompanied by arguably one of the best bassists of our time, Victor Wooten.

On a similar note, Corea has typically performed in the last three decades either as a soloist or with a full band.

However, the leap from their fully instrumented bands to an awkwardly instrumented duo proved unbelievably successful.

At the opening of the concert, Béla Fleck admitted with a tone of admiration, "How can I describe Chick...intimidating."

In fact, Corea's career precedes Fleck's by approximately two decades.
No summary of Corea's accomplishments can capture how great and influential he has been in the music scene for the last four decades.
Hehastaken the stage with the greatest musicians both in and outside of the jazz community. Some of these include trumpeter Miles Davis, vibraphonist Lionel Hampton, bassist John Patitucci, and now aggregated to the list, banjoist Béla Fleck.
Only someone with the appreciation and talent that Corea has displayed since he took up drums at age 8 could tastefully and successfully blend such eclectic instrumentation into his avant-garde style of jazz.
Fleck's achievements do not fall short of this standard.
Best known for his work with his band Béla Fleck and Flecktones, Fleck began his career with his first solo album in 1979, Crossing the Tracks. This was a first step towards the progressive-bluegrass style.
... the duo managed to create and maintian a rhythmic and percussive foundation using any and every object at their disposal to create new and fresh sounds...

He has played and collaborated with several big names such as John Williams, Victor Wooten and Evelyn Glennie and has produced music ranging from classical to jazz to bluegrass.

Fleck's ability to cross over stylistic barriers is not surprising considering Corea is one of his main musical influences along with other great names like Charlie Parker and Earl Scruggs (another prominent banjo player).
Butitwas the combination of both musical geniuses, Corea and Fleck, that lent itself to an exceptionally pleasing result onstage.
Corea and Fleck gave the audience a taste of a wide array of composition, style, and most certainly delivery.

Their tour's repertoire spans music from Corea's traditional and mellow compositions from the 80s such as "Children's Songs" to the more recent jazz fusion of Brazil in the style of Bossa Nova.

The fusion requires a sound blend of banjo and piano, which ensures an entirely refreshing sound from the dynamic duo.

Noir, simply put, encompasses the genre where the protagonist is thrown into an unusual situation and must sorthis way out. And the audience simply follows the protagonist through all his breakthroughs and breakdowns.

What's interesting in Zodiac is not the individual parts of the film, but the film in its entirety. The seamless way that Fincher transitions between the three narrative styles creates a complete film greater than the sum of its parts. And there is the narrative connections through plot cohesion and repetitive characters common in each piece: mainly Robert Downey r. and Elias Koteas.

Fincher's not stupid, though. He realizes the potential of using both
actors, mainly Downey, as anchors in time progression. Their characters bend to fit the narrative style, creating layers of genre characters within one character developed through the passing of time. Even more interesting in differentiating the narratives is the use of different actors to play Zodiac for each different story.

You can never see their faces but their appearance and voice are slightly different, marking both the change in narrative and in plot where later, Zodiac's claimed murders cannot be directly linked to just one man.

My only detraction from Zodiac would be the obvious lack of Fincher's visual style from his previous films. We're missing the roaming CG shots and crispness from both Fight Club and Panic Room, but his excellent use of dark lighting, thankfully, is still present.

And he does manage to create one of the most entertaining and shortest two-hour-and- 40 minute films in its place, which is a high honor for a film within the hackneyed genre of the crime drama.

## PS2 game provides gateway to RPGs

There seems to be a recent trend in increasing complexity in role-playing games (RPGs). Developers are eschewing simple battle systems in place of added gauges and all kinds of conditions. This is likely due to the fact that most people who play RPGs get bored by seeing the same old format repeated.

However, this does little to help anyone else get into the genre. Artonelico: Melody of
Elemia attempts to bridge this experience.

This new game for the PlayStation 2, produced by Gust and Banpresto and published by Nippon Ichi Software America (NISA), is set in Earth's far future, where civilization has risen and fallen twice. Now, only a floating continent supported by the massive Tower of
 Ar tonelico remains.

## Thanks to the rem

 nants of the fallen civilization, life is able to continue and build itself back up.At the upper level of the Tower, the city of Platina protects the continent from malevolent viruses that may attack at any time. This
is where the main character, a knight named Lynerbegins his adventure.

When an extremely dangerous virus attacks, Lyner is sent to the continent to find an important artifact to defeat it. Later he will meet two particular 'Reyvateils' or song maidens, Auricaand Misha. Lyner and his companywillhave toget the artifact back to Platina and stop any further trouble along the way.

The battle system, as mentioned earlier, is a mix of standard RPG mechanics with a few interesting differences to keep it
fresh. There are random battles, but after each one, a gauge at the lower corner of the screen empties a bit. When it is completely drained, there will be no more encounters for that area.The party is arranged into three frontline attackers with a Reyvateil at the back. The party attacks in the usual turn-based fashion, while the player controls when to have the Reyvateil act.

The Reyvateils' songs are like magic attacks, but they need to build in strength before they do any appreciable effects. Another usual element of RPGs are leveling up and gaining new skills. However, for a Reyvateil to gain new magic skills, the Dive system must be used. This involves exploring the subconscious of the Reyvateils, which is called their "Soulspace", and plays out like

an interactive novel. By using Dive Points gained in battle and helping the Reyvateil overcomeher problems, she will learn new skills.

Ar tonelico's aesthetics are very Japanese, but the artwork is very detailed and colorful.

The music is excellent as well, matching the futuristic yet primal settings of the game. NISA did a great job of translating and throwing in a fair amount of wit in the script as well, never taking itself too seriously.

Voice acting does its job decently, too. Unfortunately, the game is alittle short, but there are multiple endings to encourage multiple playings

Anyone who is either too daunted by games like Final Fantasy XII or Rogue Galaxy, or has already beaten them, will likely enjoy this game.,

The Jackets had to fight a lot harder down the stretch in game two of the series. The Dukes got a run in the firstinning on a tripleand an RBI ground out and another run in the third inning on back-to-back doubles by Brian Bernardo and Eric Morrison.
Junior center fielder Danny Payne gave Tech its first run in the bottom of the third as he scored on an RBI ground out while freshman Matt Harper, who was making his first collegiate start of his career, gave Tech the lead for good with a two-RBI double in the fourth inning, 3-2.

Leading 5-4late in the ballgame, Tech called upon Payne, originally a center fielder, but also a part-time closer, to tryandshutdown the Dukes for the final two innings. Payne did the job in the eighth inning.
Tech grabbed five insurance runs in the bottom of the eighth inning to takea 10-4lead. Seemingly with the game in hand, Coach Danny Hall relieved Payne back to his center field position and called upon freshman Andrew Robinson, to give the rookie some valuable playing experience in his first collegiate game.

The stint did not go very well as Robinsonallowed three runs on two hits in just $2 / 3$ of an inning.

With the score 10-6, runners on base and the game hanging in the balance, Coach Hall recalled Payne to get the final out of the game with the tying run on deck. Payne was able to close out of the game and end the

Dukes scoring threat.
The win gave Tech a 4-3 mark on the season, the first time the Jackets have had a winning record.

Michael Hutts, Zach Von Tersch and Brad Rulon came on in relief to try to keep Tech in the ball game, but the mountain was too high to climb as Tech fell 10-7.

The Jackets scored six runs in the eighth to cut a $10-1$ deficit to just three runs. Representing the tying run in the bottom of the sixth inning, Murton sent a Greg Holland offering a long way to right field. However, it fell into the glove of right fielder Steven Strausbaugh to end the Tech threat.

The design team had to pay special attention to the Georgia Dome, the location where the Final Four will be played this year.
"[The Georgia Dome] was a pretty significant model for us to make because it's so huge," Stalling said.
The team works year round with schools like Tech to create a more authentic experience within the game.

One aspect that is given more attention than others is the mascot, like the Jackets' own Buzz.
"Wehired the Memphis Grizzlies mascot. We showhim a lot of Buzz's antics, like the ones he performs at half time. He puts those sensors on and we capture them using Maya. We take that into the game and we create high-level character models of all the mascots," said Stalling.

Maya, a program used for digital animation and modeling, is regularly
used by game designers to recreate the motions of the players and the mascots within the game.
"We usually render out artwork from the game and send those to the schools and ask ifitlooks right or not. It's actually kind of funny because a lot of schools will tell us that it doesn't and we send it back to them and keep working. We definitely don't have a blank check. We really try and get as close to authenticity," Stalling said.

Thedepartment must thoroughly research every aspect of the game in order to recreate the experience of actually watching the game inside of each school's stadium.
"We work with the publicity departments of most of the schools and the NCAA, the collegiate licensing company. We go through reference materials.

We have media guides for the past five years for 300 plus basketball teams and we go through those. We have research analysts to contact the school," Stalling said.

While Stalling has been able to live out many of Tech students' dream job by becoming a lead producer on a major video game, he began as just another basketball fan during his time at school.
"I was such a basketball nut at

Tech. I was there during the Lethal Weapon 3 and the first Final Four round. I actually asked Brian Oliver ifI could come to his dorm room and have him and Kenny Anderson and Dennis Scott sign a jersey for me.

It's one of my most prized possessions. I just ate and breathed college basketball while I was at Tech," said Stalling.
After graduating, Stalling went on to work for another company, but he was unable to stop thinking about pursuing one of his passions: video games.
"I was promoted to vice president of marketing but couldn't shake my love for video games. Much to my wife's chagrin, I left the company as vice president of marketing in 2002 and started my own video game company, an independent company that made sports simulations," Stalling said.
Stalling learned the video game industry and was soon on the EA Sports team helping produce other games like NFL Head Coach.
His opportunity to recreate the sport he loved in college came when he was assigned to work in Vancouver on NCAA March Madness 2007.

In the technical field of the video game industry, Stalling doesn't have
something that many people think is a prerequisite to getting a job: an engineering or technology based degree. Stalling graduated from Tech with a degree in International Relations.

I did not [graduate with an engineering degree]. You don't have to have an engineering degree to get into video games," Stalling said.

Still, with the diverse background of people in the video game industry, Stalling stresses that the most important factor in pursuing a job is not the degree, but the motivation.

For people who are interested in the computer science part of it, if you have any computer science or technology degree from Georgia Tech, you could probably walk right into the front door of EA. It's not just about having a 4.0 and being able to code in C++. There are people here from the art background, design background, cinematography background, software engineering background. It's a really cool industry to work in," Stalling said.

While Miller took the first set, 6-4, Frazier won the next two, taking the second set after an 11-9 tiebreaker. Frazier won the nextset and the match after a $10-5$ tiebreaker.

Before dropping the match against Georgia, Tech had won the last two contests between the two teams. Last season, the Jackets beat the Bulldogs 6-1 at home. Georgia leads the overall series with 15 wins to the Jackets two.
Earlier in the week, Tech beatNo. 51 Denver at the Bill Moore Tennis Center, 6-1. Tech won all but one singles match, with Flower falling to Ute Schnoy, 0-6, 7-5, 7-5.
Alison Silverio led the victory with a straight set shut out of Marisa Mechem, 6-0, 6-0.

Amanda McDowell, Christy Striplin,Whitney McCray and Kristi Miller all won their singles matches.

In doubles, the No. 18 Miller and McCray won their match, 8-3. Amanda Craddocand Flower helped secure the doubles point with their victory, 8-4.

During the second half, the Cavaliers had five chances to make a three-point play, and they successfully converted each one.

Before the run, Virginia only led once during the second half, pulling ahead 50-49. The lead would be short-lived as Tech regained control and built a lead before failing to seal the victory in the end.
Virginiaguard and leading scorer Mike Singletary shot just seven of 21 from the floor, but still scored 24 points.
Tech'sdefense allowed Singletary to score four of his points during the game-ending stretch.

The Jackets trailed by as much as 14 in the first half, but battled back and took a four-point lead at the end of the first half.

Freshman Thaddeus Young led his team with 15 points. Javaris Crittenton and Ra'Sean Dickeywere the other two Tech players to reach double figures.

As a team, Tech dominated the boards, snatching 35 rebounds to Virginia's 27 rebounds. The teamalso shot better overall from the field.

Tech's loss assures the Jackets of another woeful season on the road, with no non-conference road wins and just one road victory over all.

The Jackets are now just 1-2 in its last three games after winning four in a row. Almost all of Tech's losses came at the hands of a team ranked sometime this season. The team's only loss to an unranked team came on the road against Wake Forest on Jan. 30.

Tech returned to the Coliseum yesterday in a game against No. 8 NorthCarolina and will play Boston College on Sunday for Senior Day.
