The History

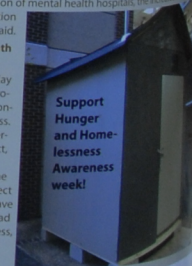
The Mad Housers first emerged in 1987, founded by graduate students Michael Connor and Brian Finkel, of Georgia Tech's College of Architecture to address the problem of homelessness in Atlanta. Their first project was based on their vision of improving upon other types of makeshift housing being erected for the homeless. Both Connor and Finkel were inspired by causes for homelessness, citing multiple socioeconomic issues, including deinstitutionalization of mental health hospitals, the reduction of federal housing aid,

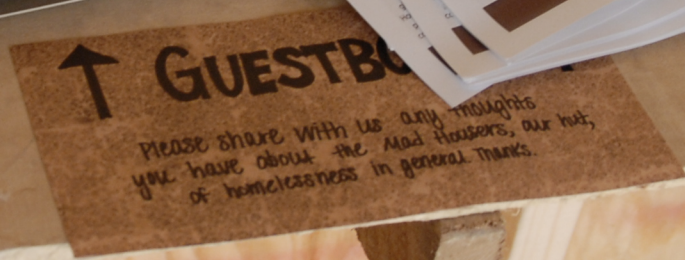
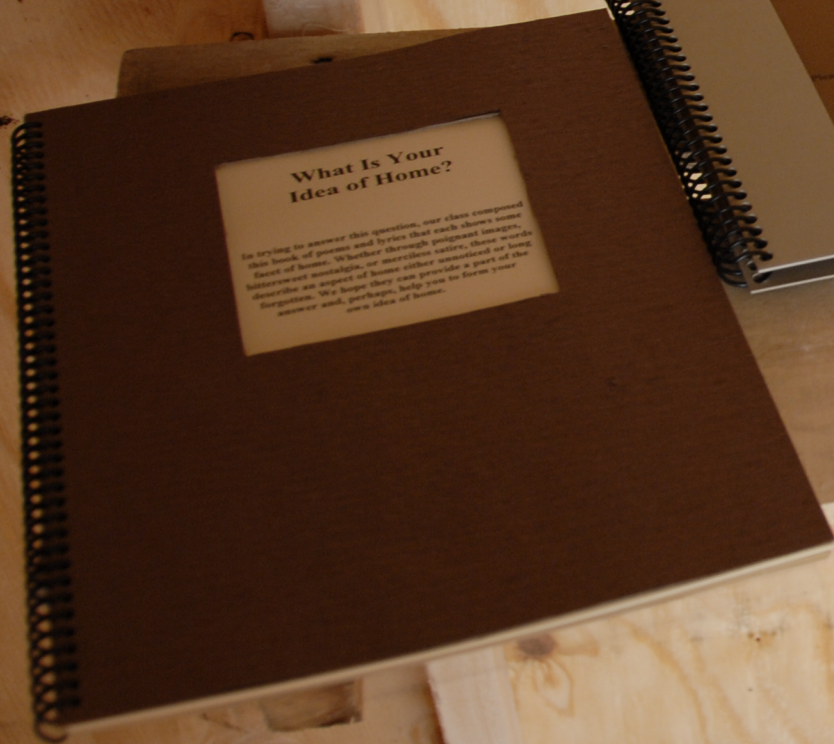

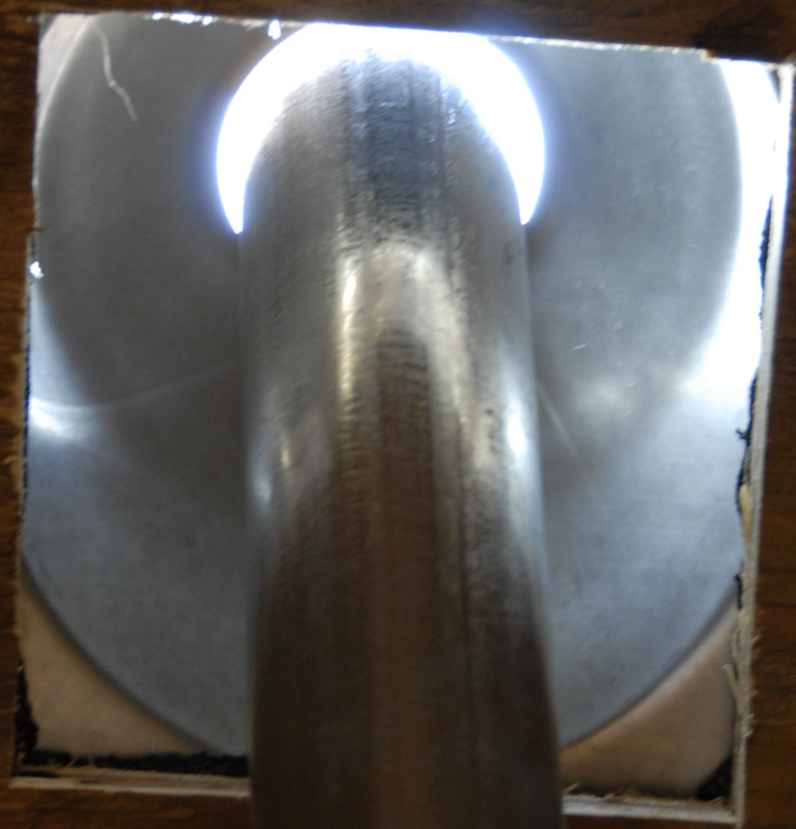

The Mission:

In our attempt to better understand homelessness and how it both affects individuals and reflects upon our society as a whole, the participants in this project adopted a variety of approaches. From clicking a mouse to swinging a hammer, a diverse array of focus areas emerged. In exploring the issue of perceptions and mediation of homelessness, music proved to be a very rich and fascinating medium for examination. Tales of personal experience, songs for change and classic depression era ballads all provide unique insight into how individuals perceive homelessness and society's role in addressing it.

"Sometimes you'll see the Average Joe walking down the street and noticing a homeless guy on the street asking for money or just being cold and sitting there wrapped in a blanket or a newspaper. More times than not, you're going to see that Average Joe walk around him, look away, look down, look up... avoid him. It's fear of the unknown. That homeless person, first of all, is a person. That person fell on some hard times. Homelessness doesn't discriminate. It doesn't know if you're black or white, rich or poor, Catholic, Muslim, or Jew. It doesn't know if you're a great novelist or former CEO of a company. Homelessness is the classic case of not judging a book by its cover. And to remind someone not to judge a book by its cover is the greatest contribution I can make."

Mad Housers Hut Display

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The Mad Housers first emerged in 1987, founded by graduate students, Michael Connor and Brian Finkel, of Georgia Tech's College of Architecture to address the problem of homelessness in Atlanta. Unlike the "sweat equity" required by which some housing programs such as Habitat for Humanity (where inhabitants are required to take part in the construction of their future dwelling), Mad Houser shelters are provided free of any charge or obligation to their inhabitants. The name "Mad Housers" came from the Mad Bomber in New York. The idea was that he struck in secret just like they came in secret and erected huts for the homeless.

Please take a few minutes to immerse yourself in what some formerly-homeless Atlantans now call home. Also take a look at various artifacts that have been installed about homelessness in general.

This house was built by Hugh Crawford's ENGL 1102 (Honor's Program section) class for their project on homelessness.
