at the NCAA Championship five times in the last six years.

"It's definitely frustrating," Barbosa says. "We've been good enough to win every year [I've been at Tech], and we wish we would have been able to close the deal, but it just gives us more incentive to be the first [Tech] team to do that.'

Barbosa has been one of the most consistent players in the ACC. Last year he broke into the nation's top

100 collegiate golfers, finishing at No. 73, and the expectations are for him to move up in the rankings

But Barbosa doesn't give too much attention to the rankings. "Personally, I don't even think about [rankings]," he said. "To me, it's just a daily process of doing my routine, and then those things just come [later].'

This year's team will be led by junior Roberto Castro, a Golf Digest preseason All-American selection. Castro owns the second-lowest career stroke average ever by a Tech player, ranking him one of the best in a program that many great golfers, including Bobby Jones, have been

Fellow junior Kevin Larsen has been playing this season. Larsen is averaging a score of 71 in the first three matches. Freshman Cameron Tringale has been off to a good start also. His average of 73.11 strokes per round is fourth-best on the team.

In addition to Tringale, Tech has three players who redshirted last year as freshmen who are capable of making the leap into the lineup this season: Taylor Hall, Adam Cohan and David Dragoo.

Senior Thomas Jordan rounds out the roster. Jordan has not consistently been in the top six players on the team, but he did play in three fall events last year and averaged 74.44 with five of nine scores used in the team total.

By finishing second at the PING/ Golfweek preview, then first at the Jerry Pate National Collegiate and third at the Isleworth Invitational, the Jackets have picked up where they

left off last year despite having to fill the shoes of graduating seniors Chan Song and Nicholas Thompson,

Barbosa is certain that Tech can continue its winning ways throughout the season. "Everybody's wellprepared and confident, [and] we believe in each other," he said. "We just have a great group of people, a great team and a great atmosphere. Whenever we send five guys to a tournament, we know that those are five really good players, and there's no doubt as to whether or not we're going to do well."

with a career-high 35 kills, an ACC record for kills in a match since the current rally scoring system began in the 2001 season.

Talisa played a phenomenal match and has truly risen to be one of the best outside hitters in our conference" Shymansky said.

Kellogg's mark of 35 kills was also the highest for the team since Maja Pachale set the current record of 38 kills in 1999 against N.C. State. In NCAA Division I play, Kellogg's 35 kills ranked as the fourth highest kill total recorded this season, only four kills behind Rachel Van Meter of Illinois who posted 39 kills earlier this season.

Last Friday, the Lady Jackets defeated the Virginia Tech Hokies at O'Keefe Gymnasium in five games 30-25, 25-30, 30-20, 27-30, 15-10. Kellogg, who posted 18 kills in the match and added three total blocks, and fellow freshman Laura DeMichelis, who recorded 19 kills in the match, led the Jackets.

After taking two of first three games against the Hokies, the

Jackets dropped a tough game four but bounced back in game five to win the match while posting a .318 hitting percentage.

The Jackets started the week with a mid-week game against Clemson on Tuesday and won in three games 30-20, 32-30, 34-32. They were led by DeMichelis who logged 21 kills and had a career-high hit percentage of .444. Kellogg also chipped in with 17 kills and contributed four blocks.

'Our freshman attack of Laura and Talisa was dynamite tonight, and they both came up with key kills for us during the night," Shymansky said.

The Jackets out hit the Tigers .300 to .147 and recorded 21 more kills on the road to victory. Tech has won 10 out of their last 12 games, and an impressive nine out of the last 10 after starting the season with a 3-5 record.

The team returns to action tonight, as they travel to Durham, North Carolina to take on the Duke Blue Devils at 7 p.m. They will con $tinue\,the\,road\,trip\,at\,Winston-Salem$ to battle the Wake Forest Demon Deacons Saturday at 6 p.m.

Men's tennis finishes fall play

Last weekend members of the men's tennis team took part in the ITA Mideast Regionals at the University of North Carolina. The ITA regional event brought to a close the fall competition for this school year.

In doubles play sophomores George Gvelesiani and Jordan Delass fell in a heartbreaker to a team from Furman 9-8. Scott Blackmon and Zachary Rath took their doubles bid into the round of 32 but fell to the duo of Jamie Cueller and Geraldo Knorr of South Carolina 8-4.

The team of David North and Marko Rajevac advanced to the round of 16. The road there included a convincing 8-3 win over Ned Samuelson and Alex Stone of Duke and another 8-3 win over a team from N.C. State in the round of 32. North and Rajevac fell in a close 9-7 game in the round of 16 to a team from Old Dominion University.

In singles competition Jordan Delass beat Ben Zink of N.C. State 6-0, 7-6. Then in the second round he picked up a three-set win over Alex Conjanu of William & Mary 3-6, 7-5, 6-4. Delass lost to Todd Paul of Wake Forest 6-3, 6-2. Paul is ranked No. 33 in the nation. "I was pretty happy with my result," said Delass, who also stated that this tournament had the toughest competition the team has faced this year.

Gvelesiani beat Mason Schermerhorn of N.C. State in a close match 6-7, 7-5, 6-3 in the first round before losing in the second round to Florida State's Maciek Sykut 7-5, 6-4.

Rath defeated Alex Stone of Duke 6-1, 6-7, 6-3 in the first round before losing to No. 45 Darrin Cohen of Virginia 7-6, 6-1.

Senior Marko Rajevac received a first-round bye but lost to Colin O'Brien of William & Mary in the

second round. O'Brien took both sets in tie breakers 7-6, 7-6.

North also received a first-round bye but fell to Geraldo Knorr of South Carolina 6-4, 7-6. Sophomore Scott Blackmon lost to Damon Gooch of Elon 6-4, 6-0 in the first round.


Earlier in the year, Blackmon and Rath were runners-up to the nationally ranked doubles squad from Duke, 8-6, in the Southern Intercollegiate Competition at the University of Georgia. It was the first tournament finals appearance at Tech for both players.

At the Polo Ralph Lauren Invitational Tournament North and Rejevac secured a doubles consolation title. They defeated two nationally ranked opponents on their way to the title—the No. 30 team of Brett Joelson and Bryan Wooten of Texas A&M 8-5 and the No. 45 team of Chad Tsuda and Eric Molnar from Colorado 8-3.

The team will continue to practice during the mid-season. Delass acknowledged the team's chance to improve its play, especially as a result of the instruction from Head Coach Kenny Thorne.

Last spring the team finished with a 14-9 record overall and were sixth in the ACC with a 5-5 record. This year the favorite to win the conference is Virginia.

The Jackets will open their spring season Feb. 8 with a home match against Furman, which is scheduled to begin at 2 p.m.

Clemson rivalry adds to homecoming fun

While the University of Georgia will always remain Tech's biggest rival, Tech's enmity with Clemson ranks just behind that of the Clean Old-Fashioned Hate. Two things make the rivalry with Clemson so strong. First, this is a conference game. Second, most games have been close battles that were often decided in the final moments of play.

Tech's first clash with Ćlemson on the gridiron dates back to 1898, when the Tigers beat the Jackets 23-0 in Augusta. It was just the 11th football game Clemson had ever played. Since then, Tech has dominated the series, going 44-22-2 in the 68 meetings over the intervening years. It should also be noted that 54 of the 69 games in the series have been played in Atlanta, and that Tech is 39-13-2 at home. Since 1983, when the two schools began competing against each other as members of the Atlantic Coast Conference, Clemson has won 12 of the 22 matchups.

While the rivalry has always been intense, the competitiveness between the two teams has increased in recent years, as each successive contest seems to be more thrilling than the

last. Eight of the last nine meetings between the Tigers and Jackets have been decided by five points or less. That includes a streak from 1996 to 2001 when each game was decided by

exactly three points! It is against this backdrop that some of the most memorable moments in Tech football history have been forged.

In 1990 Tech was a college foot-

ball juggernaut, finishing the year undefeated and earning a share of the national title. However, all of that might be different if not for one missed field goal. Clemson trailed Tech 21-19 late in the fourth quarter when the Tigers ran out of downs at midfield with a minute left. They decided to give kicker Chris Gardocki a shot at a game-winning 60-yard field goal. The kick fell short, however, and the Jackets cruised on to be national champions.

In 1991 Clemson trailed Tech 7-2 with just over two minutes remaining in the fourth quarter, but Tiger running back Ronald Williams was able to scamper into the end zone with 2:06 on the clock, making it 9-7 in Clemson's favor. This time Tech would have to drive downfield on Clemson, and they did, setting up game-winning field goal attempt with only eight seconds to play. But the kick was blocked. Clemson linebacker Wayne Simmons blocked Scott Sisson's 44-yard attempt as the Tigers held on to win 9-7.

In 1993 Tech kicker Tyler Jarrett had a chance for the game-winning field goal, but missed his 41-yard attempt with three minutes left on the clock. The Jackets would never recover and lost 16-13.

Tech lost by wide margins in 1994 and 1995, but

the two schools found them $selves\,engaged\,in$ adifficult contest again in 1996. Tech led for most of the game that year and held a 25-21 lead over the Tigers with under five min-

utes to go in the game, but Clemson quarterback Nealon Greene took over on the final drive, passing and running his team downfield. He capped that game-winning drive with a one-yard touchdown run that came at the 4:10 mark in the fourth quarter as Clemson held on to win 28-25.

The year 1997 marked the beginning of Tech's recent advantage in the series, when Jacket kicker Brad Chambers drilled a 20-yard field goal with 1:54 left in the game, giving Tech a 23-

20 home victory. Tech prevailed again in 1998 after Joe Hamilton led the Jackets down the field in the game's final two minutes, culminatingwith a one-yard Joe Burns run that made the score

24-21 in Tech's favor.

Hamilton lit up the Tigers again in 1999, this time connecting for five touchdown passes and 322 passing yards. Yet the game was still a close contest. Sophomore strong safety Chris Young tipped away a Clemson Hail Mary in the end zone on Clemson's final play, ensuring a 45-42 Jacket win. Of course, these fantastic finishes don't represent the greatest victories in the series, which are the come-from-behind victories.

While many current Tech students consider Calvin Johnson's extraordinary touchdown reception that won last year's game (more on that later) to be "The Catch," the original and definitive "Catch" was actually made four years earlier on a sunny afternoon in Death Valley.

Clemson led 28-24 before quarterback George Godsey would lead the come-back drive. On the drive he completed seven of 11 passes for 72 yards, and he finished the drive by throwing the pass that became "The Catch." With 13 seconds to play Kerry Watkins stretched out, diving for Godsey's 16-yard throw into the end zone, and made a spectacular, one-handed grab that gave the Jackets an improbable 31-28 victory, one that forever ensured Watkins a place in Tech history.

Clemson made magic of their own in the 2001 barn-burner, agame which went into overtime and ended

when Dantzler dashed 11 vards into the end zone for a "walk-off" score. Tech had another chance to beat Clemson late in the 2002 game after staging a furious rally that brought them

back from a 24-6 deficit, but A.J. Suggs was picked off deep in Clemson territory with only 1:12 left in the game and the Jackets trailing 24-19, effectively ending the game. After a Clemson blowout in 2003, though, Tech pulled out some of their best heroics for the 2004 installment of

the rivalry.
It was "The Catch, Part II" that truly propelled Calvin Johnson into the national limelight. After Johnson cut Clemson's lead to 24-21 with an 8 yard TD reception from Reggie Ball, an improbable botched snap on a Tiger punt left Tech at Clemson's 11-yard-line with just 11 ticks on the clock and a chance to pull off a huge road upset. Johnson didn't disappoint, as he came down with Ball's throw, making the score 28-24 in Tech's favor.

The 70th meeting in the series is the first time in a decade that the matchup has been the homecoming game. This should ensure that what has been a terrific rivalry over the years gets even better this weekend. Don't be surprised if it again comes down to the final play of the game.

CLEMSON (4-3) VS. GEORGIA TECH (4-2)



The Tigers are looking for revenge for last year's defeat in Death Valley. Coach Tommy Bowden has a 3-3 record against Tech. Clemson will need several other key players to step up in addition to Reggie Merriweather, Charlie Whitehurst, and Tye Hill. One of these key players to look out for will be senior free safety Jamaal Fudge. He will be responsible for helping Hill with over-the-top coverage of Calvin Johnson. Freshman wide receiver Aaron Kelly is also a player to watch. He has 401 yards receiving on 31 receptions with one touchdown. Kelly averages 57.3 yards per game which ranks him as No. 7 in the ACC.

Four Key Questions

Will the Jackets be able to contain Clemson's rushing attack?

Despite the fact that Clemson's star running back James Davis, who has 449 rushing yards for the season, will not be available for this game, the Tiger running game is still a force to be reckoned with. Tech fans should remember Davis's backup, Reggie Merriweather from last year's game. Merriweather had several key runs including a 62 yard touchdown in the second half of last year's thriller at Clemson. Last week against Temple, Merriweather had 108 yards rushing including one touchdown. While the Jackets are usually strong against the run, the Tigers have a history of creating problems for the Jacket front seven.

• Will quarterback Reggie Ball and the receiving corps minimize the number of turnovers?

Quarterback Reggie Ball has improved this season compared to last year when it comes to turnovers. Against Clemson last season Ball had a very good performance completing 20-36 with four touchdowns and only one interception. Ball has thrown three touchdowns but five interceptions in his last three games. In the first three games, Ball only had one interception. Judging from last year's game, the Jacket receivers have the advantage over the Tiger secondary. In last year's game, two of Calvin Johnson's three touchdown receptions were against the coverage of Tye Hill, Clemson's top corner back. Hill will again likely be covering Calvin for the majority of the game. If the Jacket offense can limit their turnovers will beat Tigers. This is true for almost every game played.

Can Tech's special teams continue to improve?

The Jackets showed improvement against Duke on special teams. Kickoff specialist Mohammed Yahiaoui kicked five touchbacks on six kickoffs. Punter Ben Arndt has shown to have a much more consistent leg as well. With an average of 42.4 yards per punt, he currently ranks third in the ACC. Good punts and touchbacks on kickoffs will give Tech's defense some breathing room.

• Can the Jacket secondary hold up against Charlie Whitehurst and the Tiger passing attack?


Tech's weakness on defense all season has been the secondary. Airese Currie was the main deep threat a year ago for the Tigers, but he has since graduated. Chansi Stuckey and Curtis Baham lead this year's team, but do not have the speed that Currie did.

Charlie Whitehurst will be in the shotgun early and often in this game. This heavy use of the shotgun will give defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta's blitz-heavy defensive scheme different look tomorrow.

The Jackets are coming off an unexpected off week and should be healthy after an extended rest. Tech has won nine straight homecoming games. Coincidentally, the last time Tech lost a homecoming game was to Clemson in 1995. For the past 15 years, Tech and Clemson have been pretty evenly matched. Tech has not defeated Clemson by more than four points since 1989. This game is a pivotal one for the Jackets, because they have a tough schedule ahead with home games against a scrappy Wake Forest team and Georgia, as well road trips to Virginia and Miami.







Collier's agent, Richard Howell, said he has been told his client may have had an enlarged heart. Specific information, however, has not yet been revealed. His family asked that autopsy results for the 7-foot, 260 pound center be kept private until

after the funeral, which was held on October 19. Forsyth County Coroner Lauren McDonald said the full autopsy report may not be complete for several weeks.

Collier grew up in Springfield, Ohio, where he started playing basketball at the age of four. He led Catholic Central High School to the 1996 state basketball championship before heading to Indiana to play for Bobby Knight and the Hoosiers. A month into his sophomore season at Indiana, he chose to transfer to Tech to play under Bobby Cremins. His father, Jeff Collier, also played at Tech under Dwane Morrison from 1972 to 1976.

In his two years of play for the Jackets, Collier averaged 17.1 points and 8.3 points, respectively, and is among the school's all-time leaders

in career scoring and rebounding averages. He also earned second-team all-ACC honors both years at Tech.


Bobby Cremins described Collier as a "happy-go-lucky kid." "He married an Atlanta girl and adopted Atlanta as his hometown," he told the AP. "He came back and got his degree, which I was very proud of."

Current director of basketball operations, Willie Reese, who was Colliers' assistant coach in his senior season said, "He's the type of guy you wish would play in the NBA for 10 years, because he's a professional and is a good role model. That's the type of person you want in the NBA, and the type of person you want at Georgia Tech."

"I would have let Jason watch my kids all day, and I think that says a lot," Reese said in a released statement from Tech. "He was a humble guy and a very hard worker. We used to have to kick him out of the gym."

"Jason was a devoted family man who deeply loved his wife Katie, daughter Elezan (Ella), his parents and siblings. He was also a tremendous friend to the Hawks employees who spent time with him, and a hard-working and dedicated teammate to many NBA players over his five seasons in the league," Knight said in a relased statement from the Hawks.

Tech athletics director Dave Braine said, "We are deeply, deeply stunned and saddened by the tragic death of Jason Collier. It's another reminder of how precious life is. I had the pleasure of getting to know Jason when he was here at Georgia Tech. What a great young man and a great representative of Georgia Tech. He overcame a lot to make it in the NBA and had a bright future of ahead of him."



Jason Collier quickly gained the respect of the fans at Tech. He finished his college degree, despite continuing his career in the NBA.

Collier was drafted by the Milwaukee Bucks in the first round with the 15th pick overall in the 2000 NBA draft, and was soon traded to the Houston Rockets. After three seasons in Houston and a stint in the NBDL, the National Basketball Development League, he joined the Atlanta Hawks in 2003.

In his five-year career in the NBA he averaged 5.6 points and 2.9 rebounds per game. This year, he would have been the longest tenured member of the Hawks, a young team this year.

The team has devoted this season to its teammate, and they are honoring him by leaving his uniform in his locker through the season. They will also wear black shoulder patches on their uniforms. In addition, the Atlanta Hawks organization has started the Jason J. Collier Charitable Fund in his honor.

Collier is the second member of the 2000-2001 team to pass away. Michael Isenhour died during the summer of 2002 from leukemia.



Freshman outside hitter, Talisa Kelloggled the Tech volleyball team as the Jackets completed a threegame sweep of ACC competition last week by defeating Clemson, Virginia Tech and Virginia.

With the three wins, the Jackets improved to 13-7 overall, 9-2 in

the ACC, and moved into a second place tie with North Carolina in the conference standings. Tech trails first-place Maryland the standings, whom the Jackets defeated in five games three weeks ago.

"This was a huge win for us

and keeps us in striking distance of our ultimate goal, which is to be ACC Champions," Shymansky said, as reported by ramblinwreck.com.

In a thrilling match up of two of the conference's top teams, the Jackets defeated the Virginia Cavaliers in an exciting five games 30-20, 30-27, 17-30, 28-30, 22-20.

The Jackets were able to take

the first two games of the match, but then struggled in game three, something that has not been uncommon recently. So far this season, the team is 8-12 in the third game of matches, losing by an average of over 10 points in those games. After dropping a tough game four, they fell behind 8-14 in game five as the Cavaliers had game point.

The Jackets, however, fought back and saved six consecutive Cavalier match points. Down 8-14, the Jackets came back with a service error from Virginia, a Kelloggkill, a combo block from Nikki Kaminskas and Lindsey Laband, another error by Virginia, a ser-

vice ace from Jennifer Randall and a final kill from Kellogg tied the game at 14.

Despite the comeback, the Jackets still had to fight, as Virginia then held off six Tech match points before none other than Kellogggot the final kill to vault the Jackets to victory Saturday evening. Kellogg finished the night

Golf takes third at Isleworth



The Tech golf team finished third at the Isleworth Invitational in Windemere, Fla. and seems to be repeating the success the team has enjoyed in recent years.

The golf program at Tech has one of the finest traditions in the sport, boasting such famous alumni as Stewart Cink and David Duval, who have now become familiar names on the PGA Tour. This fall the Jackets have been making quite a name for themselves, at least in the world of college golf.

In August Golf Digest ranked Tech as having the top golf program of all NCAA Division I schools, taking into account team accomplishments, facilities, climate and coaching staff. Then in early October, Golfweek cited the team's "habit of beating the best" as evidence for its stake at the top spot. All of this comes in addition to a Sports Illustrated article in February that named Tech the third-best program over the last 20 years, including the NCAA's "hottest program" since 1999.

Ŭnder Head Coach Bruce Heppler, who has been leading the team since 1995, the Jackets have been one of the best teams in the country for each of the past few seasons. Last year the Jackets finished second at the NCAA Championship. Prior to that the team finished fifth place in 2004, second place in 2002 and 2000, fourth place in 2001 and third place in 1998.




Senior golfer Mike Barbosa shot 80, 73 and 77 at the Isleworth Invitational, which concluded in Windermere, Fla. on Tuesday.

Mike Barbosa is one of two seniors on this year's team, and he mentions the high expectations the team has had over the course of his career.

very good for a long time."

But while ACC titles and individual honors have been plentiful in the Heppler era, the national championship has remained elusive; the Jackets have never won an NCAA title despite finishing in the top five



game, Tech returns to Bobby Dodd Stadium tomorrow to face Clemson at 3:30 p.m. The Tigers look to avenge last year's 28-24 defeat in Death Valley. The Jackets have four tough games to play next month and look to pick up their fifth win en route to becoming bowl eligible.
