Welcome: Tech Beautification Day 2015

Serve-Learn-Sustain is our new Institute-wide Quality Enhancement Plan. We officially introduced it early this month. The QEP is a required component of our reaccreditation, which we

have to go through every 10 years. We're now in the final stages of that rigorous process.

I encourage you to go online and learn a little more about Serve-Learn-Sustain. Today, as we go about beautifying our campus, we'll hit all three benchmarks. Our faculty, staff and students all helped devise Serve-Learn-Sustain, and its concepts are already imbedded in the Georgia Tech ethos. Tech Beautification Day is a prime example of those values.
