Electronic Thesis and Dissertation (ETD) Usage Statistics

As of May 19, 2004, usage of Georgia Tech's ETD Collection was as follows:

There were 18,022 viewings of ETD pdfs since the site went live in the Fall semester 2003, an average of 2,250 viewings per month and an average of 30 viewings per ETD. For the 2 years prior to the ETD program, the most any Georgia Tech paper thesis or dissertation had circulated was 9 times.

There are currently 161 Georgia Tech ETDs from the fall 2003 semester and 435 IPST ETDs (through 1998). The spring 2004 Georgia Tech ETDs had not yet been released by the Graduate School as yet.

The individual ETD with the most viewings had 1639. It is an Aerospace Engineering dissertation by Caihua Cao entitled *Damage and Failure Analysis of Co-Cured Fiber-Reinforced Composite Joints*. Eight ETDs were viewed over 500 times each. The two highest viewings for IPST ETDs were 161 and 141 times.

The ETD website can be accessed at: http://etd.gatech.edu/. The opportunities for growth in the use of this collection are stunning when you look at the California Institute of Technology (CalTech) data at: http://gwaihir.caltech.edu/statistics/etd.html. Their ETD database has been available since summer 2001 and contains 1,256 titles. The total accesses are 926,862, averaging over 26,000 views per month.

The major aims of ETDs and the NTLTD (the Networked Digital Library of Theses and Dissertations): http://www.ndltd.org/ are as follows: 1) for graduate students and universities to learn about electronic publishing and digital libraries; 2) for universities to unlock the potential of their intellectual property; 3) for graduate education to improve through more effective sharing; 4) for technology and knowledge sharing to speed up, as graduate research results become more readily and completely available; 5) to help universities build their information infrastructure; and 6) to extend the value of digital libraries.

Flag Day

The Fourth of July was traditionally celebrated as America's birthday, but the idea of an annual day specifically celebrating the flag is believed to have originated in 1885. A Wisconsin schoolteacher, arranged for pupils to observe June 14, the 108th anniversary of the official adoption of The Stars and Stripes, as "Flag Birthday."

Encouraged by local patriotic groups, the Superintendent of Public Schools of Philadelphia, directed that Flag Day exercises be held on June 14, 1893 in Independence Square.

School children were assembled, each carrying a small flag and singing patriotic songs.

On June 14th, 1894, under the auspices of the American Flag Day Association, the first general public school celebration of Flag Day in Chicago was held, with more than 300,000 children participating. Adults, too, participated in patriotic programs.

Inspired by these three decades of state and local celebrations, Flag Day — the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777 — was officially established by the Proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30, 1916; however, it was not until August 3rd, 1949, that President Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14th of each year as National Flag Day.
