History

Early Years

Georgia Tech first fielded a swim team in 1918-19, when the first tryout was held at the city Y.M.C.A and about 50 men came out. According to the Blueprint, the fledgling squad featured "some of the fastest water splashers that the South has ever turned out and one that would make any Eastern college hustle to beat." The team was captained by G.R. Fraser, described as the best swimmer in the South and holder of the Southern record in both the 220-yard swim and the 50-yard swim.

Tech's first swim meet was on the road against the Clemson Tigers. In addition to Fraser, the first Tech team included Weiss, Scott, Carson, Evans and Owns, who returned with a 50 to 19 victory. Fraser swam the 220 yards in the 2:50.00, cutting four seconds off his own Southern record.

The program enjoyed success against Southern competition throughout the 1920s. In 1927, Tech defeated all Southern opposition and made a good showing against two strong eastern teams. The Jackets broke into prominence by forcing the famous Brooklyn Y team to the limit, but fell 46 to 16. Two days later, Yale handed the Jackets the short end of a 46 to 16 score.

In 2003-04, the Yellow Jackets gave birth to a brand new renovated Georgia Tech Aquatic Center. Tech opened the enclosed Olympic pool by hosting NC State on Oct. 25, 2003.

With the home fans cheering them on, the Rambling Wrecks swam past the visiting Wolfpack, 132-107 (men) and 152-91 (women).

Early Champions

The Yellow Jacket tankmen, despite the lack of an on-campus facility, won 10-straight unofficial South championships from 1926-35.

In 1927, Dave Young tied the national intercollegiate record in the 150-yard backstroke in 1:43.20.

Representing Tech in the national intercollegiate, Young set a new record of 1:46.10 seconds and in the finals established a new record of 1:44.00, finishing four seconds ahead of Spindle of Michigan to win Tech's only national championship in swimming. He also earned All-American honors with a second-place finish in the 220-yard free style.

Kenneth Thrash, Sr. (1932-35)

After playing football at Tech, Kenneth Thrash, Sr., took over the swimming reigns and led the Jackets to four straight Southern Conference Championships from 1932-35.

Almost as impressive as five consecutive conference titles, Thrash only tasted defeat once in dual meets, finishing with an astounding record of 24-1. His winning percentage of 0.960 is the best all-time in school history.

As a former football player for the Rambling Wrecks (1926-28), Thrash helped the Yellow Jackets win two conference titles (1927-28) and a national championship in 1928.



Fred Lanoue (1936-64)

Fred Lanoue, a graduate of Springfield College and former New England diving champion, began working with the Tech swimmers in 1936 and became the Yellow Jackets' full time head coach in 1938 when the Tech pool was completed.

Under Lanoue's guidance, Tech won four Southeastern Conference championships in nine years, the first in 1942 and then three in a row in 1948, 1949 and 1950. Lanoue coached the Jackets for 27 years, stepping down after the 1964 season.



Herb McAuley (1965-87)

The star of the 1942 SEC championship squad was Herb McAuley, who won the SEC 220 and 440 freestyle championships that year.

McAuley had his schooling interrupted by World War II, serving in the Army Signal Corps before graduating from Tech with a degree in electrical engineering in 1947. Upon graduation, he joined the Yellow Jacket staff as assistant coach under Lanoue, a position he held for 17 years.

McAuley succeeded Lanoue as head coach for the 1965 season. He coached the Jackets for 23 seasons, compiling a record of 169-144-1. He was inducted into the Georgia Tech Hall of Fame in 1982.

Tech competed in its first ACC Championships meet in 1980. The program took a one-year hiatus upon McAuley's retirement

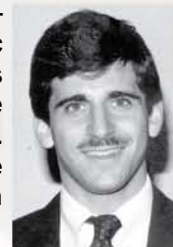


in 1987, which signaled the end of a 40-year stint on the Tech coaching staff.

Brad Lehman (1989-91)

The swimming program resumed under Brad Legman in 1988-89. In Lehman's first year, senior Tim Halligan earned All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors following his second-place finish in the 200 butterfly. Halligan qualified for the NCAA Championships in the event, finishing 21st.

Legman coached the team for three seasons, amassing an overall record of 19-13.



Bill Humber (1992-97)

Bill Humber took over the Tech program in 1991-92. In 1993, he guided the Jackets to their then-best showing at the ACC Championships with the sixth-place finish and a then school-record point total of 198.

In 1994, diver Brandon Lumm won the first ACC Championship in the program's history with his victory in the three-meter event. He earned All-ACC recognition that year and Bill Humber tallied a dual meet record of 38-45 during his six-year tenure at Georgia Tech.



Seth Baron (1998-2005)

In August 1997, Tech hired Seth Baron to take the helm of the men's swimming and diving program. The Jackets' women's program devuted in 2001-02, and Baron took on the combined program. Baron, formerly an assistant coach at South Carolina and Auburn, also previously worked with the U.S. National Swim Team and was the head coach for the U.S. squad at the 1997 and 2001 World Maccabiah Games in Tel Aviv, Israel.

Under Baron's direction, the Tech men finished in the top five at the ACC Championships in five consecutive seasons, including a third-place finish in his final season as head coach in 2005. Tech finished 32nd at the 2005 NCAA Championships, cracking the Top 35 for the fifth straight year.

In just four seasons of existence, the women's program tallied a 33rd-place



finish at the 2004 NCAA Championships and crowned its first All-American in Vesna Stojanovska. The Jackets posted three consecutive sixth-place finishes at the ACC meet, tallying a program-best 285.6 points in 2008-09. The Jackets also qualified two swimmers for the 2005 NCAA Championships for the first time in program history; Stojanovska and the freshman Elizabeth Stowe. Junior Sam Morgan qualified for his third consecutive NCAA meet after winning his first ACC title in the mile at the 2006 ACC meet, hosted in the Georgia Tech Aquatic Center. Morgan Garnered his second straight All-American honors, finishing 14th in the mile.

Stojanovska advanced to her second straight NCAA meet in 2005, after becoming the first women's athlete to win an ACC title, doing so in the 200 fly. Stowe garnered All-ACC honors in the mile, making her and Stojanovska the first all-conference tandem at the conference championship.

Along with collegiate accomplishments, the Tech combined program witnessed its first two Olympians in 2004 as Stojanovska (Macedonia) and incoming freshman Onur Uras (Turkey) competed at the Summer Olympics in Athens, Greece. Joining them in Athens were former men's swimming standouts Leo Salinas (Mexico) and volunteer coach Jorge Oliver (Puerto Rico).

Tech recorded its most successful season to date in 2001-02. Tech's men tallied 580.5 points to finish a program-best second at the ACC Championship, as a record five Jackets earned All-ACC honors. Tech also placed 27th at the NCAA Championships, led by Shilo Ayalon's eighth-place finish in the 1650 free. He earned All-American accolades for the second consecutive season.

In 2000-01, the Yellow Jackets placed third at the ACC Championships, scoring 434.50 points. Four swimmers earned All-ACC accolades: Shilo Ayalon, David Laitala, Scott Lenyk and Tomonori Tsuki.

Tech also scored its first points in NCAA competition in 2001. Ayalon placed 11th in the 1650 free, while Tsuji finished 13th in the 200 breast to become the program's first All-Americans.

The Jackets went 11-3 in dual-meet competition, and 16 school records were established, led by Ayalon's four marks.

In 2000, Baron and the Yellow Jackets finished the regular season with a 5-6 dual-meet record. Laitala became the first Yellow Jacket swimmer in 11 years to earn All-ACC recognition, placing second in the 100 butterfly at the ACC Championships.

In his first season at Tech, Baron guided the team to a 4-7 dual-meet record and a seventh-place finish in the ACC Championships.

As an athlete, Baron also competed for the U.S. National Team, winning 10 gold medals in international competitions, including the 1985 World Maccabiah Games and the 1983 Pan Am Maccabiah Games in Sao Paulo, Brazil. He participated in the U.S. Olympic Trials in 1984 and qualified for the 1988 Trials.



**Stu Wilson
(2005-2009)**

Stu Wilson was named men's and women's swimming and diving head coach on June 8, 2005.

In his seven years with the Tech program, Wilson guided seven different swimmers to the NCAA Championships and tutored three Atlantic Coast Conference champions.

In 2008-09, Wilson led the women's team to its highest finish at the NCAA Championship in school history and both the men's and women's teams combined to break 19 school record throughout the course of the season. Seven Yellow Jackets earned All-ACC honors in 2007-08, while seven student-athletes were named to the ACC All-Academic team. Junior Mickey Malul was an ACC champion in the 100-breast as the men's team finished fourth at the ACC Championships. Three swimmers and two divers went to the NCAA Championships in Columbus, Ohio and senior Elizabeth Stowe placed 28th in the mile as the Jackets finished 30th in the nation. Agatha Kwasnik and Noah Copeland also represented Tech along with divers Stephanie England and Hannah Krimm.

Sam Morgan ended his career as a two-time All-American in the 1650-yard freestyle and became the first Yellow Jacket to qualify for the NCAA Championship meet in four consecutive seasons under Wilson's guidance.

In his first season as head coach in 2005-06, Wilson led the Jackets to their fourth straight top-five finish in the ACC, tallying a fourth-place finish at the 2006 ACC Championships, in College Park, MD. Tech boasted one ACC champion and Morgan garnered all-conference honors in the mile for the second straight season.

Wilson helped the Yellow Jacket men to four consecutive top-35 finishes at the NCAA Championships, posting a 33rd-place finish at the 2006 Men's NCAA Champion-

ships, hosted by Georgia Tech.

Tech sent four swimmers to the 2005 NCAA Championships, the second most in school history, and five of the second All-American honors earned by Yellow Jackets have come during Wilson's tenure.

Former Tech standout Shilo Ayalon and Morgan both garnered All-American honors under Wilson's tutelage. Ayalon holds four school records and was named ACC Most Valuable Performer that the 2003 ACC Championships.

In 2006, Rob Miller, Morgan and Elizabeth Stowe all qualified for the NCAA Championships under Wilson's guidance. Morgan won his first ACC title in the men's 1650-yard freestyle and Miller finished fifth. Stowe posted a third-place finish in the women's 1650 free to earn All-ACC honors. All three clocked lifetime-best times in their respective events for Yellow Jackets.

Prior to joining the Yellow Jacket staff in 2002, Wilson spent 11 years with nationally-prominent club team Swim Atlanta from 1990-2001, serving as the team's Head Senior Coach for his last four seasons there. In this position, he planned and implemented strength and conditioning programs for swimmers age 12-and-over. He also handled administrative duties, including fundraising, travel arrangements, public relations and record-keeping. He worked as a head age group coach with Swim Atlanta from 1990-98.

Wilson coached several successful swimmers at Swim Atlanta, including 2004 U.S. Olympian Amanda Weir, who set national age-group records (11-12 and 13-14) in the 50 free. Additionally, he mentored swimmers that posted more than 50 national top-16 age-group performances.

As an athlete, Wilson competed at the University of Georgia from 1984-88, reaching the finals of the SEC Championships in the 200 and 500 free in each of his last three seasons. He was an NCAA qualified in the 400 free relay and held the school record in the 200 free at one time. Wilson also qualified for U.S. Nationals in his final six seasons of competitive swimming.

A native of Atlanta, Wilson, graduated from Georgia with a Bachelor of Arts in Economics in 1989. He married the former Meg Gordon in the summer of 2008 and the couple resides in Atlanta.

Courtney Shealy Hart enters her third season at the helm of the Georgia Tech swimming program. An assistant coach for two years, Hart was named head coach of the Yellow Jackets' on April 30, 2009 and is the eighth head coach in the history of the program.

In year two, Hart helped to bring the ACC Championships back to the Georgia Tech Aquatic Center breaking eight school records in the process. Alongside Diving Coach John Ames, Hart helped to coach Brandon Makinson to the NCAA Championships where he participated in the 1 and 3-meter dives. The Jackets also faced off against some of the toughest competition in the country as Hart scheduled six ranked teams and four teams receiving votes into Atlanta for the Georgia Tech Invite as well as some dual meets with SEC powers Florida and Georgia and perennial ACC powerhouse, Florida State.

Her first year as the head of the swimming and diving program in 2009-10, saw Hart lead the men's team to a fifth place performance and the women's team to a ninth place showing at the ACC Championships. The men's meet was highlighted by three first place finishes by Gal Nevo while the women broke four school records. Nevo's success continued into the NCAA Championships where Hart helped the senior to All-American status in each of his races, a runner-up finish up in the 400-IM for the second-straight season, and a school record time in the 200-Fly in his final race as a Yellow Jacket to give Tech a 23rd finish at the event.



In two seasons as an assistant coach, Hart worked primarily with the middle distance free and stroke group and also served as recruiting coordinator. The Georgia Tech swimming programs enjoyed unprecedented success in the two year's since Hart's arrival and she has worked with multiple NCAA participants. In 2007-08, the women's team finished 30th at the NCAA Championships for the best finish in program history.

In 2008-09, the men's squad turned in its best NCAA effort with a 19th-place finish. Nevo was an All-American in both the 200-IM and 400-IM as well as being named ACC Swimmer of the Year. His mark in the 400-

IM was the second-fastest in NCAA history and third-fastest in the world. Nigel Plummer was named the ACC Freshman of the Year, the first time a Georgia Tech swimmer earned either swimmer of freshman of the year awards in school history. All told, 24 school records were broken during the 2008-09 season and a school-record nine men's swimmers participated in the NCAA Championships.

Hart spent one season (2006-07) as an assistant coach at North Florida prior to arriving on The Flats. She helped guide North Florida to a fifth-place finish at the Pacific Coast Swimming Conference Championships and led nine individuals to top-16 finishes at the meet. Shealy Hart guided one athlete to a top-eight finish in the conference championship.

Before heading into the coaching scene, Hart participated in the 2000 Summer Olympic Games for the United States. She took home a pair of gold medals in Sydney, Australia, in the 400-meter medley relay and 400-meter freestyle relay.

Hart also competed on the international scene in the Pan-American Games (1999, 2003), Pan Pacific (2002) and the United States World Cup Teams (2000-04).

At the University of Georgia, Hart led the Bulldogs to NCAA team championships in 1999 and 2000. She was named the 2000 NCAA Female Swimmer of the Year after capturing individual national titles in the 50-free, 100-free and 100-back. She also captured NCAA titles as a member of the 400-free relay and 400-medley relay teams. She finished her NCAA career with 26 All-America honors the most in UGA history, plus two more honorable mention citations.

Hart won nine individual Southeastern Conference titles, 10 SEC relay crowns and set five conference records. She was named SEC Female Swimmer of the Year in 2000.

Hart played volleyball for the Bulldogs and lettered from 1997-99. She was named the team's most valuable player in 1998 and was the first NCAA Division I female student-athlete to compete in two sports on the same day, accomplishing that feat three times at Georgia.

After graduating from Georgia in 2001 cum laude with a degree in sports studies/communications, Hart worked as a motivational speaker for the NCAA, Coca-Cola, Healthsouth and Arby's, and served as the director of the Golden West Swim Lessons Program in Huntington Beach, Calif., before heading to North Florida. Hart earned her master's degree from UGA in sports management in 2005. A native of Columbia, S.C., Hart, and her husband Justin, reside in Atlanta.





John Ames

Diving Coach

11th Season

Ames is in his 11th year as the Diving Coach for the Jackets.

The 2010-11 season saw the fall of all three men's diving school records, each toppling at the Georgia Tech Aquatic Center. Brandon Makinson broke the 1 (360.35) and 3-meter (408.10) diving records while Chris Khosravi took down the platform diving (375.90) record at the ACC Championships, for his efforts Makinson earned All-ACC honors in the 3-meter dive. Ames also helped to coach four of his five divers to the NCAA Zone 'B' Diving Championships where Makinson took eighth place earning a spot at the NCAA Championships.

The 2009-10 season included the conclusion of the career of the swimming and diving team's most decorated female athlete, Hannah Krimm. Krimm's distinctions consist of NCAA All-America honors on the 3-meter springboard, NCAA 1-meter Honorable Mention All-America, All ACC Honors on the 1-meter and four time CSCAA NCAA Academic All-America honors. Krimm made the finals in six out of the eight Springboard events at the ACC Championships during her career, and was the high individual point scorer for the women's program in each of her last two seasons.

The 2009-10 season was a very successful rebuilding year for the men's divers. The freshmen duo of Brandon Makinson and Chris Khosravi finished the dual meet season as the 4th and 5th individual point leaders for the Men's Swimming and Diving program. They duplicated that effort at the ACC Championships, with the highlight being Khosravi's 4th place finish in the Platform event.

In 2008, he coached Tech's first female diving All-American as then-sophomore Krimm finished seventh on the three-meter springboard. Krimm was also recognized as a honorable mention All-American on the one-meter board, while then-senior Stephanie England was a honorable mention All-American in the three-meter and platform events. The Tech divers accounted for all 21 of the Jackets' total points at the NCAA Championships helping them to a 30th-place finish – it's highest in program history.

At the 2007-08 ACC Championships, Ames led Krimm to a second-place finish on the one-meter board, while England was second in the platform and third in the three-meter. Krimm, England and then freshman Michele Bertolino all qualified for the NCAA Zone Championship, with Krimm and England moving on to NCAA's in Columbus, Ohio.

Under Ames' tutelage, Evan Stowers became the first Tech diver to qualify for the NCAA Championships in 2006. In the Georgia Tech Aquatic Center, Stowers again made history by finishing seventh on the men's platform, becoming the first Tech diver to garner All-America honors. In 2007, Stowers returned to the NCAA Cham-

pionships, earning All-America honors for the second consecutive season.

At the 2006 ACC Championships, Stowers became just the second GT diver, first under Ames, to win an ACC championship as he captured the men's three-meter springboard. He also became the first diver to earn All-ACC honors on both springboards. Besides Stowers, Krimm and England, two other Tech divers have garnered all-conference honors under Ames' guidance. Former men's diving standout Paul McCarty (2001-04) earned All-ACC honors on the one-meter springboard in 2002, while former diver Tony Burkhardt accomplished that same feat at the '05 ACC Championships.

In 2005, the women's diving program took its first steps towards being a force at the ACC Championships, as junior Laurissa Prystaj and England both finaled on the three-meter board, making it the highest scoring event for Tech in women's diving history. The duo of England and Krimm trumped that performance when both Yellow Jacket divers qualified for the finals in all events. The duo then took another step forward when they combined to garner All-ACC in every diving event at the 2008 conference championships, and followed that up with All-American honors.

Along with his coaching duties at Tech, Ames also mentors the Atlanta Diving Association, which has quickly become the top United States Diving program in the state of Georgia. This season, his divers won three individual National Championships, while one went on to qualify for Junior World Championships.

Hired in August 2001, Ames came to Tech from George Washington University and the Montgomery Dive Club, one of the largest

diving programs in the nation. Prior to his stint with Montgomery and George Washington, Ames served as an assistant coach with the Northern Virginia Dive Club. He also worked as a graduate assistant and diving coach at Western Illinois University.

Ames graduated from Ohio University in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in psychology after completing his collegiate diving career with the Bobcats. He earned a Master of Science degree in sport administration while at Western Illinois.





Marty Hamburger Assistant Coach Seventh Season Iowa, 1991

Marty Hamburger is in his seventh season as assistant coach at Georgia Tech. Hamburger works with Alumni Relations and is in charge of fundraising while assisting with recruiting. In the pool, he works primarily with the sprint group.

In the 2010-11 season, Hamburger aided each of the sprint relay groups to NCAA "B" cut times with his coaching of Bo Hatchett, Matthew Vaughan and Garrett Robberson in the 200-Medley Relay, Nigel Plummer and Robberson in both the 200 and 400-Free Relay, and Robberson in the 200-Medley Relay. Both Robberson and Plummer notched "B" cut times in the 50-Free and Vaughan did the same in the 100-Breast.

In the 2009-10 season, Hamburger's sprint group had two men with NCAA "B" cuts: Nigel Plummer (50, 100-Free) and Matt Vaughan (100, 200-Breast). Plummer also contributed on three "B" cut relays: 200-Medley, 400-Free and 400-Medley. Vaughan swam breaststroke on the 200-Medley as well.

The sprint group also contributed to a new school record in the women's 200-Free Relay. Three of the women on that relay were members of Hamburger's sprint corp: sophomore Jessie Mason and freshmen Alexis Weber and Kate Riley. Weber and Riley also swam legs on the 400-Free Relay for an NCAA "B" cut.

To date, Hamburger's sprinters have seriously impacted Tech's Top Times lists. At the conclusion of the season, here is how his sprinters ranked "All-Time":

Men's 50 Freestyle: All three of the top three swimmers and four of top six

Men's 100 Freestyle: Two of the top three

Men's 100 Breaststroke: Two of the top three and four of the top six

Women's 50 Freestyle: Three of the top seven

Women's 100 Freestyle: Three of the top six

Women's 100 Breaststroke: Two of the top three

The 2008-09 season saw unprecedented success for Hamburger and his sprint group. The men's team was undefeated in the 50-free through the entire dual meet season. Their dominance in the event culminated with freshman Nigel Plummer's winning the ACC Championship on his way to being selected Freshman of the Year. Sophomore Garrett Robberson was third in the 50-free at ACC's, while senior Mauricio Sousa placed fifth. All three men applied their talents in the 200 free relay and along with senior Noah Copeland, captured the ACC Championship, setting a new ACC record in the process.

Robberson recorded the second fastest relay split in ACC history as he anchored the 200 medley relay in 18.89. Mickey Malul swam the breaststroke leg of the same relay in 23.29, one of the fastest 50-breast splits in NCAA history. Malul also made his first automatic NCAA cut as he defended his 100 breaststroke title at the ACC Championship. Malul's swim of 52.81 lowered his own school record. Malul, Plummer, Robberson and Sousa were all part of the largest team (nine) that the Georgia Tech Men's Team has ever sent to the NCAA Championship.

Freshman Jessie Mason became the second fastest woman in GT history as she posted a 23.35 at the ACC Championship. Mason was a member of the school record setting 200 free relay and 200 medley relay, leading off the later in a team-leading 25.77. Lisa Pucci continued her success in the breaststroke events, posting the third fastest time in school history in the 100 at ACC's. She also swam the breaststroke leg of the record 200 medley relay.

In the 2007-08 season, Malul set a school record and win the ACC 100-breast title. Hamburger was also instrumental in helping Sousa set a school record and "B" cut in the 50-free. Under the guidance of Hamburger, Sousa and Malul were part of the record-setting 200-medley relay team while Sousa, Jacob Kwasnik and Robberson were part of the record-setting 400-free relay team. Malul was also the 400-medley relay team that set a new school record.

Lisa Pucci who was part of two record-setting relays (400-medley and 400-free) and two more (200-medley, 200-free) that recorded the second-best times in school history.

In 2006-07, Hamburger helped Ryan Bishop to an All-ACC finish and an NCAA "B" cut in the 400 IM. He was also instrumental in guiding the group of Jason Bourgeois, Jacob Kwasnik and Mauricio Sousa to the school record in the 200 freestyle relay. During his first season, Hamburger guided Bishop and Alex Williams to NCAA "B" qualifying standards. Bishop clocked NCAA "B" cut times in the 200 IM and 400 IM events for the Jackets. He also qualified for the championship finals of the 200 IM, 400 IM and 200 breaststroke for Tech at the ACC Championships.

Williams posted a personal-best and first ever NCAA "B" standard in the 100 breast at the ACC meet, finishing a career-best fifth in the finals.

Hamburger worked with the Dynamo Swim Club from 1999-2004, charged with all aspects of daily operations, administration and marketing for the Masters program. While at Dynamo, Hamburger produced over 100 nationally-ranked, national champion and All-America swimmers, four World record holders and five American record holders. Hamburger's Dynamo Masters led the Georgia Masters team to a National Championship in 2000. Along with working with the Dynamo Swim Club, Hamburger also assisted with three-time defending NCAA men's national champion Auburn and its Tiger Masters Swim Camp from 2000-04. He was part of the development of Master swimmers, covering topics of race strategy and developing a successful lifestyle as a competitive athlete.

Hamburger has also worked with U.S. Olympic coaches Eddie Reese and Mark Schubert at the Texas Longhorn Swim Camps in Austin, prior to coming to Tech.

Hamburger, a native of Fort Dodge, Iowa, graduated from the University of Iowa with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1991. He resides in Decatur with his wife, Amanda Johnson and two sons: six-year old Ellis, and three-year old Reese.



Chris DeSantis

Assistant Coach Third Season Colby College, 2006

In his first season on the Flats, DeSantis made an immediate impact with the breaststroke and IM group. Specifically, DeSantis helped Matt Vaughan to go from a non-scorer to a Top-8 finisher at the ACC Championship meet in the 100 breast, he aided Lisa Pucci record the second best 100-Breast time in Tech History and assisted Jordan Evans as she scored in three events at ACCs for the first time, establishing herself as the No. 2 all time 200-IMer and school record holder in the butterfly.

DeSantis continued his success into his second season at Georgia Tech by coaching Anton Lagerqvist to an All-ACC third place finish in the 200-Breast as he recorded the second fastest time in school history. Lagerqvist also took ninth in the 100-Breast and 10th in the 200-IM. While coaching, DeSantis landed three male recruits (Nico van Duijn, Andrew Kusic, and Andrew Chetcuti) in the Collegesswimming.com top-50 recruits for the class of 2015, and contributed to the men's 2011 recruiting class being ranked sixth in the country by that same website.

DeSantis, a 2006 graduate of Colby College (Maine), has spent the last two years as an assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania and just completed his Master's Degree in Applied Positive Psychology.

At Penn, DeSantis was involved in every aspect of the program including recruiting, on-deck coaching and administration. DeSantis' group of nine student-athletes was responsible for 10 of the 12 school records broken last year.

DeSantis was a contributor to Floswimming.org where he wrote weekly columns on a variety of swimming topics, but has since moved on to become a contributor to Swimming World Magazine, then partner with The Athlete Village, a swimming technique website, before founding the popular swim blog, "The Swim Brief".

In 2006-07, DeSantis served as head coach of the Kiski School in Saltsburg, Pa. He was also a faculty member and taught classes in Modern World History and U.S. History. DeSantis spent the summers of 2007 and 2008 as an assistant director and coach at the Harvard Technique Swim Camp.

At Colby, DeSantis was a four-year letter-winner culminating his career as captain of the team in 2005-06 and holds the Colby College pool record in the 400 freestyle relay. At Colby, he also served for three years as both captain and coach of the school's water polo club. In 2006, the club qualified for the Division III National Tournament.

A native of Wellesley, Mass., DeSantis currently resides in Atlanta, Ga. with his wife Katherine and their dog Emmy.

Robert Pinter

Assistant Coach First Season Wisconsin-Madison, 1994

Pinter enters his first year with Georgia Tech coming to the university from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Pinter started his coaching career in 1999 as the head coach of the Oregon Community Swim Club in Oregon, Wisc. In 2002 he moved on to be the Co-Head Senior Coach of the Badger Aquatics Club in Madison until he moved on to his first collegiate coaching position at the University of Iowa in September 2004 where he remained until 2008.

While at Iowa, Pinter assisted in coaching two NCAA qualifiers and 10 provisional qualifiers while helping the Hawkeyes to a top-25 finish, six new school records and a women's recruiting class that was named the best freshman class in school history.

In 2008, Pinter returned "home" as an assistant coach at the University of Wisconsin where he has excelled over the past three seasons. In his first year with the program (2008-09), Pinter helped coach the Badgers to 11 NCAA qualifiers, 16 school records, five Big Ten titles and 21 Olympic Trial qualifiers. The next season saw four more school records go down, five more Big Ten titles, nine NCAA qualifiers and two individuals make the 2009 USA Swimming National team.

Last season, the Badgers saw the most success since Pinter returned to his alma mater as the women finished in 11th place and the men in 24th at the NCAA Championships. The season culminated with the success of Maggie Meyer's 200-Backstroke National title, eight other swimmers who achieved All-American status, one Big Ten record and 10 more school records en route to six Big Ten titles.

Pinter started his own personal swimming career off at an early age and in 1986 realized that his dream of garnering an education and athletic career at the same time would not work out in his native country of Romania. At that time, all young men of age were drafted into the army for a 15-month stint and Pinter found himself to be a swimmer for Romania's notorious Army Club, Steaua Bucuresti, serving his 15 months.

In 1988, he defected to Hungary where he found temporary shelter. Using the advice of a relative in Wisconsin, Pinter applied to UW where he was accepted in 1990 on a full athletic scholarship. While at UW, Pinter accumulated many accolades, including multiple All-American honors, election as team captain, multiple school records (one of which lasted 17 years, only broken in 2009 under his personal tutelage), and Big Ten runner-up standing in several events. He was also able to compete for Romania in the 1992 Olympics, where he was a finalist in the 200 butterfly and ended the year with a ranking of seventh in the world, in that event.





Dr. G.P. "Bud" Peterson President Third Season Kansas State, 1975

Dr. G. P. "Bud" Peterson became Georgia Tech's 11th president on April 1, 2009. Under his leadership, the Tech community has developed and begun the implementation of a 25-year strategic plan that envisions what the Institute might be like on its 150th anniversary.

Peterson came to Georgia Tech from the University of Colorado at Boulder, where he served as chancellor. Prior to that, he served as provost at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in New York. He served on the faculty and in leadership positions at Texas A&M University for 19 years. He has worked for NASA and the National Science Foundation.

Throughout his career, Peterson has played an active role in helping to establish the national education and research agendas, serving on numerous industry, government and academic task forces and committees. A distinguished scientist, he was appointed in 2008 by U.S. President George W. Bush to serve through 2014 as a member of the National Science Board, which oversees the National Science Foundation (NSF) and advises the President and Congress on national policy related to science and engineering research and education. In 2010 he was named by U.S. Secretary of Commerce Gary Locke as a member of the National Advisory Council on Innovation and Entrepreneurship. This group is focused on helping the U.S. develop policies that foster entrepreneurship and identify new ways to take innovations and creative ideas from the laboratory to the marketplace in order to create jobs, develop new businesses and drive economic growth.

In June 2011 he was named by President Barack Obama to the newly created Advanced Manufacturing Partnership steering committee. The partnership is bringing together industry, universities and the federal government to identify and invest in the key emerging technologies to help U.S. manufacturers improve cost, quality and speed of production in order to remain globally competitive.

He is a fellow of both the American Society of Mechanical Engineers (ASME) and the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics (AIAA), and received the AIAA Distinguished Service Award for 2011. His research has focused on phase change heat transfer and spacecraft thermal control. He is widely published, authoring or co-authoring 14 books or book chapters, 175 refereed journal articles, and more than 140 conference publications. He also holds eight patents with two others pending.

Peterson earned a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering, a second bachelor's degree in mathematics, and a master's degree in mechanical engineering, all from Kansas State University. While an undergraduate at Kansas State, Peterson lettered three years as a tight end/wide receiver for the Wildcats football team. He earned a PhD in mechanical engineering from Texas A&M University.

President Peterson and Tech's first lady, Valerie H. Peterson, regularly participate in campus and community events, meeting and working alongside alumni, faculty, staff, students, parents, and civic and government groups. They have become familiar faces within the Georgia Tech community. Students might find them listening to a Yellow Jacket Marching Band performance after a game, supporting the swimming and diving team, or joining in a clean-up day in neighborhoods surrounding the campus. In addition, they have served as ambassadors for Georgia Tech throughout the state, the region, the nation, and even on Tech's international campuses. The Petersons have been married for 37 years and have four adult children.

As the newest member of the Association of American Universities and a top ten public research university, Georgia Tech has outstanding programs in architecture, computing, engineering, liberal arts, management and the sciences. With more than 21,000 students and 125,000 living alumni who work in business, industry and government throughout the world, Tech has become internationally recognized for the quality of its educational and research programs.



Dan Radakovich Director of Athletics Sixth Season Indiana (Pa.), 1980

Now in his sixth year as Director of Athletics, Dan Radakovich has helped take a Georgia Tech program rich in athletic tradition to a higher level of excellence and national respect.

Since Radakovich arrived on the Flats in 2006, Georgia Tech has competed for conference and national championships across the board, Yellow Jacket student-athletes have excelled in the classroom and Tech's facilities rate among the finest in the nation.

The 2010-11 academic year was another extremely successful campaign in Georgia Tech athletics:

- Tech hosted NCAA postseason regionals for men's tennis, women's tennis and baseball. The Yellow Jackets also served as host of the ACC Softball Tournament and Swimming and Diving Championships.
- The women's basketball team enjoyed a record-setting season in 2010-11. The Yellow Jackets won a school-record 24 games, earned a fifth straight NCAA Tournament berth and a five seed, and 7,325 fans flocked to Alexander Coliseum when the Jackets hosted Connecticut.
- In the spring, the baseball team reached the 40-win plateau and tied Virginia for the ACC regular season championship. The softball team won its third straight ACC regular season title and played in the NCAA Tournament for the 10th time.
- The men's tennis team finished ranked 13th nationally after earning its 10th NCAA Tournament berth and advanced to the round of 16. The women's tennis team earned its 12th consecutive NCAA Tournament bid, advanced to the round of 16 for the sixth time and finished ranked 13th in the national polls.
- The golf team grabbed the spotlight by winning its third consecutive ACC championship. The Yellow Jackets finished second in the NCAA East Regional, second in NCAA Tournament medal play before losing to eventual champion Augusta State in match play. Tech finished ranked as high as No. 2 in the national polls.
- Academically, Georgia Tech's Academic Progress Report (APR) improved for the fourth consecutive year. The ACC recognized James White (golf), Christy Jones (softball) and Guillermo Gomez as the ACC Scholar Athletes of the Year for their respective sports. Four athletes – Zach Brewster (baseball), Hannah Krimm (diving), Travis Wagner (swimming) and Jen Yee (softball) – were awarded 2011 ACC Postgraduate Scholarships for their hard work in the classroom.
- In total, Georgia Tech teams have combined to win 10 ACC championships and seven ACC regular season titles in Radakovich's tenure. In addition, Yellow Jacket teams have combined to make 29 NCAA postseason appearances and captured a national championship in women's tennis.
- Over the last five years combined, Tech coaches have been named ACC Coach of the Year 10 times and National Coach of the Year three times. Thirty-five student-athletes have been named first team All-American, 12 have been named ACC Player of the Year in their respective sport, and 24 have earned Academic All-America honors from at least one source.

Named Georgia Tech's Director of Athletics on Feb. 22, 2006, Radakovich came to Georgia Tech after five years as senior associate athletics director at LSU (2001-06). He previously served as the Athletics Director at American University in 2000-01. That followed stints as associate athletics director at South Carolina (1994-2000) and Long Beach State (1989-94) as well as two years as the athletics business manager at Miami (FL) (1983-85).

Just the seventh Director of Athletics in Tech history, Radakovich was named to succeed Dave Braine, who retired after nearly nine years in the post. Radakovich also follows in the footsteps of storied names such as John Heisman, Bobby Dodd and Homer Rice.

He is married to the former Marcie McDonald, and the couple has two children, Christian, 21, and Grant, 17. Christian is a senior Industrial Engineering major at Georgia Tech.

Sixth Season

Theresa Wenzel enters her sixth season as the Senior Women's Administrator at Georgia Tech and also holds the title of Associate Director of Athletics. She oversees women's basketball, volleyball, softball, golf, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's track and field, men's and women's cross country and the men's and

women's swimming and diving teams in her role.

Wenzel is the athletic department non-academic liaison to the Office of Student Affairs. She is also a member of various committees including the Georgia Tech Women's Resource Center Advisory Board, the Title IX Compliance Committee, the GRAA Compliance and Equity Committee, and the NCAA Athletic Certification Steering Committee. For her hard work, Wenzel was recognized by the United State Postal Service with the Sports Award at the 2008 "Women Putting their Stamp on Atlanta Luncheon".

Wenzel possesses a wide range of experience in athletic administration and coaching. She joined the Georgia Tech Athletic Association staff in October of 2005 after an eight year stint at Siena College (N.Y.), where she served as Assistant and then Associate Athletics Director of business operations while also coaching the women's golf team.

While at Siena, Wenzel served one year as the school's intramural director and assistant facilities director before being named Assistant Athletic Director for business operations and head women's golf coach in 1998. In seven seasons as head golf coach, Wenzel led the Saints to five-consecutive Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference titles from 2001-05. She relinquished her coaching duties following the 2005 season when she was promoted to Associate Athletics Director.

Prior to her time at Siena, Wenzel spent three years (1994-97) as an assistant women's basketball coach at Canisius College in Buffalo, N.Y., and she also served on internship with the National Invitational Tournament.

A basketball letterwinner at Marquette University, Wenzel earned a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration from Marquette in 1991. She added a master's degree in sport administration from Canisius in 2000.

The Atlantic Coast Conference

The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 59th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since its inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 123 national championships, including 65 in women's competition and 58 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 140 times in men's competition and 99 times in women's action.

Men's swimming and diving has been a league-sponsored sport since the ACC's berth in 1953, while women's swimming and diving saw its first season in 1979, but both programs continue to bring new heights of success to the ACC each year. The 2010-11 season marked a campaign that saw the league's swimmers and divers help distinguish ACC swimming and diving on a national level both academically and athletically.

At the conclusion of the season, a total of eight new men's records, including two ACC Championship meet records, had been set, and 17 new women's marks, including ten ACC Championship meet times, had been rewritten into the ACC's record book.

A combined 15 teams – eight men and seven women – saw action at the NCAA Championship meet last season, with the men placing six ACC teams among the top-28 team finishes nationally and the women placing five in the top-25. The 2010-11 season marked the seventh consecutive season that the men's programs have had five or more teams compete at the national meet, while the women had at least six teams for the fourth-straight year.

As has been the case for the past several seasons, the ACC again made its presence known on a national level with 16 men and 12 women winning All-America honors. Additionally, four student athletes won individual national championships: Miami's Brittany Viola in the 10-meter platform dive, Duke's Abby Johnson in the three-meter dive, Virginia's Matt McLean in the 500-yard freestyle, and Duke's Nick McCrory in platform diving.

Virginia's Scot Robison turned in six All-American performances at the NCAA championship, placing second in the 800 FR, fifth in the 200 Free, sixth in the 400 Free, seventh in the 400 MR, eighth in the 200 FR, and received Honorable Mention All-America for his 10th-place finish in the 100 Free as the Cavaliers finished in a league-high eighth place. Duke's Nick McCrory, who set an ACC record in the three-meter dive at the league championship, was the NCAA champion in the platform after tallying a meet record 548.90 points. He also placed fourth in both the one- and three-meter dives.

Also on the national level for the women, ACC Champion Virginia posted a league-best 13th-place finish with 105 points. The Cavaliers were led by Lauren Perdue, who was a five-time All-

America at the NCAA meet, placing among the top-eight in two individual events and one relay event, and earning Honorable Mention in two more events.

Overall, the men's programs have seen 277 participants honored as All-Americans, 19 national individual champions, and one national championship relay team in its 58 years. In 33 years of existence, women's programs have had 298 All-Americans and nine individual champions.

Beyond the collegiate level are numerous former ACC swimmers and divers who have made an impact on the international stage. North Carolina alum Thompson Mann was the first male to compete at the Olympics when he won gold at the 1964 Olympic Games in Tokyo, Japan, and Sue Walsh, also a former Tar Heel, became the first female from an ACC institution to compete at the Olympics as a member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team. Mann also set a world record in Tokyo by becoming the first person to break one minute in the 100-meter backstroke with a 59.80 showing.

Duke alum Nancy Hogshead became the first female from an ACC institution to win an Olympic medal with first-place finishes at the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles, California in the 100-meter freestyle and 400-meter freestyle and relay teams, and a silver-medal performance in the 200-meter individual medley.

2010-11 In Review

The 2010-11 academic year concluded with the league pocketing two more national team titles and 18 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has now won 45 national team titles since the beginning of 2000, and won two or more NCAA titles in 29 of the past 31 years.

The ACC's 2010-11 national champions were Maryland in field hockey and Virginia in men's lacrosse. Overall, 132 ACC teams placed in NCAA championships during the past season. Nine teams competed in football bowl championships, with four teams claiming victories – Florida State (Chick-fil-A Bowl), Maryland (Military/Northrop-Grumman Bowl), North Carolina (Franklin American Mortgage MCB Bowl) and NC State (Champs Sports Bowl).

The ACC placed at least one team in the final top 10 nationally in 19 of the 25 sponsored sports for which polls were available. In all, 40 ACC teams finished their season with a top 10 ranking, including two at the No. 1 spot.

For the 2010-11 campaign, seven of the 12 ACC schools finished in the top 50 of the NACDA Director's Cup, which is awarded annually by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and honors the top institution maintaining a broad-based athletic program and achieves success in many sports.

A total of 306 ACC student-athletes earned first-, second-, or third-team All-America honors this past year. In addition, the ACC produced three national Players of the Year, four national Freshmen of the Year, and four national Coach of the Year honorees.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2011-12 academic year - 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing, while volleyball determines its champion in regular season play.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.
