The Press Box

The Georgia Tech Press Box is for working members of the media only and admission is by credential only. The Press Box is located underneath the upper deck in the West Stands. It is accessible by entering the West concourse and taking the elevator to the press level. Also located on the press level are the photo deck, radio and TV booths, and stadium operations/security.

Press Credentials

Press credentials will be issued to members of the working media only. Working space in the Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field Press Box is limited, and children and other non-workers are not allowed in the Press Box.

Requests for credentials should be made in writing on letterhead stationery to Director of Communications Allison George well in advance of each game. Requests via e-mail are also acceptable. Requests are accepted from Sports Editors and Directors only.

If time permits, passes will be mailed. If not, they will be held at Media Will Call.

Media Will Call is located at the Georgia Tech Ticket Office at the North End of Bobby Dodd Stadium, near the corner of Techwood Drive and Bobby Dodd Way.

Photo Credentials

Sideline passes will be issued only to photographers on assignment and working members of the television media. For admission to the sidelines at Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field, a press credential and an arm band must be displayed. Photographers must present their credential in the Press Box to receive an armband. All sideline photographers must stay behind the dotted restraining line that surrounds the playing field and are not permitted in the team bench areas.

Telephones

The Bobby Dodd Stadium Press Box is equipped with 10 telephones, which require credit card or collect calls. Writers or photographers desiring their own phones should make the request to Bell South (800-356-3093) using Mike Stamus as the local contact for phone placement. Please inform the Sports Information Office at least two days prior to the game if you have ordered your own phone.

Press Box Services

Game notes, statistics, play-by-play, and postgame coaches quotes are provided in the Press Box. An inside public address announcer keeps the media abreast of play-by-play, records and game notes. A pregame meal is served two hours before kickoff with refreshments available throughout the game.

Parking

Media parking at Bobby Dodd Stadium is extremely limited. Requests for parking passes should be made well in advance. Media parking is located in Peters Parking Deck across Bobby Dodd Way at the

north end of Bobby Dodd Stadium, or at Alexander Memorial Coliseum in the AMC and O'Keefe Lots.

Post-Game Interviews

Coach Chan Gailey and several Tech players will meet the media after each home game in the new Football Players Lounge in the north end of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field. The Tech post-game interview area is accessible from the service drive at the northwest corner of the field. Please note that this location is a change from previous years.

Tech's football locker room is closed immediately after each game but will be open to the media 30 minutes after Coach Gailey has left the locker room for his press conference, in accordance with Atlantic Coast Conference policy.

The visitor's locker room is located on the field level of the Wardlaw Building in the south end zone.

Admittance to all post-game press conferences is by credential only. The Press Box Elevator will leave the Press Level at the four-minute mark of the fourth quarter for anyone going to the locker rooms.

Interview Policy

Tech players and coaches will be available to the media throughout the season. All interviews must be arranged through the Sports Information Office. To insure availability, please allow 24-hour notice. Player interviews are permitted through Wednesday during the week of a game.

Attending Practice

Georgia Tech practices are generally open to the media, subject to change. Media planning to attend

practice must call the Sports Information office in advance. A member of the Sports Information staff attends all practices to assist the media.

Practices are normally held at Rose Bowl Field, located on Fowler Street adjacent to Chandler Baseball Stadium. Media should enter Rose Bowl Field at the corner of Fowler and Fifth Streets and identify themselves to the manager on duty at the gate.

There is no parking available inside the gates of Rose Bowl Field.

Tech players and coaches can be made available just prior to the start of practice with prior arrangement, although for media other than television, this is discouraged. Coach Gailey and Tech players are also available after practice.

Filming at Practice

Television crews are permitted to film at Tech's practices provided they adhere to certain guidelines. Video access is available at selected times during fundamental and individual drills at the beginning of practice, with no filming during team work, including pass skeleton. Also, no audio taping of the snap count is allowed. Tripods are not permitted on the practice

field, and media must stand at least five yards off the sidelines and not in the end zones. At all times, filming at practice is at the discretion of Sports Information personnel and the coaching staff.

Weekly Press Luncheon

A press luncheon with head coach Chan Gailey and Tech players will be held each week during the football season. Although Coach Gailey and Tech players are available at selected times during the week, this is the best time for interviews.

The press conferences are normally held on Tuesdays at 11:30 a.m. in the new Football Players Lounge, followed by lunch in the Edge Center dining hall.

For Tech's Thursday games, the weekly press conference will be held on Monday.

Coach Gailey will make daily comments regarding his team's progress on tape. The Hotline begins August 2, and the number is 404-894-5507.

RADIO NETWORK

THE GEORGIA TECH ISP SPORTS NETWORK

The multimedia rights for the Georgia Tech Athletic Association are handled by International Sports Properties of Winston-Salem, N.C. ISP Sports and the GTAA are in a multi-year agreement that coordinates the radio broadcasts of Tech football and basketball as well as the coaches' radio and television shows. The package also includes the marketing of Georgia Tech athletics through corporate sponsorship stadium and arena signage, publications and other avenues. Ben C. Sutton, Jr., is the president of ISP Sports, while Jeff Salisbury is the general manager of the property in Atlanta.

he radio broadcast team is headlined by play-by-play announcer Wes Durham and long time analyst Kim King, who celebrates his 30th anniversary with the broadcast this season.

King's insightful comments have been a part of over 300 Tech broadcasts since he joined the network in 1974 alongside the legendary "Voice of the Rambling Wreck," Al Ciraldo. It was Ciraldo who dubbed King "The Young Left-hander" when he starred at quarterback for Bobby Dodd in the 1960s and led the Jackets to appearances in the Gator and Orange Bowls.

A 1996 inductee into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame, King is a highly successful real estate developer in Atlanta. In 1998, King received the Athletic Association's highest alumni honor with the Total Person Award. He was also named in the fall of 2000 as one of the "50 Greatest Tech Athletes of the 20th Century."

The 37-year old Wes Durham is in his ninth season as the "Voice of the Yellow Jackets." Durham arrived in Atlanta in 1995 to handle football, basketball and baseball playby-play after spending three seasons at Vanderbilt. Named the 1999 Georgia Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sportcasters and Sportswriters Association, Durham has also worked at Marshall and Radford.

A 1988 graduate of Elon, Durham is the son of North Carolina announcer Woody Durham, who is in his 33rd season with the Tar Heels. The younger Durham is also the host of the weekly call-in and television shows featuring head coach Chan Gailey.

The football broadcast team also includes veteran engineer and producer Miller Pope and long-time spotters Al Ciraldo, Jr., and Tommy Barber.

Each broadcast begins two hours prior to

kickoff with "Yellow Jacket Countdown," and following each game, head coach Chan Gailey will break down the contest with Durham and King, and fans will get statistics and scores on "The Locker Room Show."

WQXI-AM, Sports Talk 790 The Zone, is in the third year of a four-year agreement as the flagship station for Georgia Tech football and basketball. Recognized as "Atlanta's sports leader," the station has been managed by Big League Broadcasting since 1997. Andrew Saltzman is the President/General Manager of The Zone.





Yellow Jackets Christen New & Improved Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field

rom four national championships to one of the nation's top bowl records, from 47 first-team all-America players to 16 members of the College Football Hall of Fame, Georgia Tech's football tradition is second to none.

Nowhere is the Tech tradition more evident than at Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field. Originally built in 1913, the home to Yellow Jacket football is the oldest on-campus stadium in NCAA Division I-A, and yet, thanks to the just-completed expansion and renovation project, it is a beautiful, modern facility.

Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field now seats 55,000 and is filled with numerous amenities, making it one of the nation's most unique venues. The North end zone now features a new locker room, a state-of-the-art players' lounge and media area, and football coaches' offices that overlook the playing field.

"I wake up every day excited about this program and the direction we are headed," says Georgia Tech's second-year head coach Chan Gailey, a 29-year veteran of the coaching profession at the collegiate and professional levels.

In his first season at Tech, Gailey led the Yellow Jackets to a schoolrecord sixth straight bowl game. In fact, Tech is one of only 13 schools in the nation that have played in a bowl game each of the last six years, and Gailey is just the second head coach in Tech's storied history to take the Jackets to a bowl in his first season.

The Jackets, who posted a record of 7-6 overall, 4-4 in the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2002, have faced adversity in the last 18 months, including major injuries to key players in Gailey's first campaign. Tech overcame these obstacles to post a sixth consecutive winning season and earn a school-record sixth straight bowl berth, highlighted by a win over eighth-ranked NC State.

"We have faced some adversity, but we tell our players all the time, It's not whether or not you are going to have adversity, it's how you handle it," said Gailey, whose squad returns 12 starters and 45 letterwinners. "I'm excited about the players who will take the field for us this fall."

Tech's top offensive weapons should be versatile receiver Jonathan Smith and an offensive line that returns four of five starters, including all-America candidates Nat Dorsey at left tackle and Hugh Reilly at center.

The Rambling Wreck defense performed well last fall, and many of the key players return, led by the linebacker tandem of Daryl Smith and Keyaron Fox. Tech also welcomes back all-America defensive end Greg Gathers, who missed most of last season due to a kidney ailment and was granted a medical hardship.

Tech's biggest losses on defense were in the secondary, where three of four starters graduated, including three-time all-ACC free safety Jeremy Muyres. The Jackets also graduated all-ACC linebacker Recardo Wimbush.

The Jackets must completely rebuild their kicking game following the graduation of record-setting placekicker Luke Manget, punters Dan Dyke and Chris Morehouse, and punt return specialist Kelley Rhino.

Because of Tech's lack of depth, the incoming freshmen will be looked upon for contributions in several areas.

"The incoming freshmen start off much higher on the depth chart than anyone had anticipated," said Gailey. "They will get a lot of reps, and they will get a lot of opportunities. We are going to have to scrimmage maybe more than we would have wanted in order to let them see how they react at the speed of this game as opposed to the game they have been playing for the last few years."

Tech will be working with a restructured coaching staff, particularly on offense. Gailey hired his former Dallas Cowboys' assistant Buddy Geis to be Tech's passing game coordinator and receivers coach, while Patrick Nix was elevated to running game coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Both will be involved in developing the game plan, with Gailey expected to handle the majority of the play-calling duties.

"You might see a little bit more two back than we've used in the past and there will be some other subtle changes," said Gailey of this year's offensive system. "The terminology is different, but many of the plays are the same and we're still going to use a lot of formations and a lot of movement with different personnel groupings."

The Jackets tackle one of the nation's most difficult schedules, facing eight teams that played in bowl games last season. In addition to the ACC slate, which features nationally ranked teams Florida State, Maryland, NC State and Virginia, Tech's non-conference schedule includes top 10 teams Auburn and Georgia as well as a trip to Brigham Young.

QUARTERBACKS


1 Starter, 3 Lettermen Returning

II eyes will be on the quarterback position when Tech opens preseason camp because Gailey has said that the job is wide open. Senior A.J. Suggs returns after starting all 13 games in 2002, but the Jackets seek more consistent play under center. Sophomore Damarius Bilbo took the majority of the first-team reps during the spring and but did not win the job outright. Two highly-touted, athletic freshmen join the fray in Patrick Carter of St. Petersburg, Fla., and Reggie Ball of Stone Mountain, Ga., while heady senior Brian Camp also returns.

Suggs threw for 2,242 yards and completed 57.3 percent of his passes, but he threw just 12 touchdown passes against 15 interceptions. He played well at times, particularly in leading Tech to back-to-back victories over a pair of bowl-bound teams in Virginia and eighth-ranked NC State, but the 6-4, 215-pounder was inconsistent at other times.

Bilbo, a 6-3, 225-pounder with very good arm strength and athleticism, displayed great skills and play-making ability at times last fall, but he, too, must play with more consistency and fewer mistakes. Bilbo saw his most extensive action in the final game of 2002, playing the entire second half against Fresno State in a performance that could be considered a microcosm of his season. He tossed a pair of touchdown passes but had four interceptions in the Jackets' 30-21 loss. For the season, Bilbo threw for 487 yards and three touchdowns while rushing for 118 yards and two scores, but he must improve on his 43.3 percent completion rate and five interceptions.

Carter, the younger brother of New York Giants wide receiver Tim Carter, stands 6-3 and 185 pounds. Ball, 6-0, 180, was one of the top prospects in the state of Georgia at Stephenson High.

Camp, 6-1, 225, is a dependable backup who saw action in two games last fall but did not throw a pass.

Quoting Coach Gailey:

"The quarterback position is still an open position, which we have said all along, and it will be up until the first ball game, when we will make a decision and go. We have not ruled out the possibility of playing more than one quarterback in a ball game. Right now we're open to whatever happens in preseason.

"Any time you talk about the quarterback position, you're talking about consistency and accuracy. Those will be two of the biggest issues that we'll continue to evaluate.

On the possibility of playing a freshman quarterback: "I've only done this one other time and that freshman had come in January, so we had

gone through spring practice with him and had a great idea about him. This will be a new experience, and it's not like handling a rookie, who has a lot more practice time with the team than a true freshman does."

RUNNING BACKS

O Starters, 3 Lettermen Returning

pair of sophomores will counted upon at tailback in Ajenavi "Ace" Eziemefe and P.J. Daniels.

Eziemefe stepped in as a true freshman last fall and was named Atlantic Coast Conference Rookie of the Week for his first start, when he rushed for 136 yards to lead the Jackets to a win at North Carolina. But he was then hampered by a sprained ankle and finished the season as Tech's third-leading rusher with 282 yards and two touchdowns, averaging 4.0 yards per carry. With his size and power, the 6-1, 225-pound Eziemefe could also play fullback.

Daniels, a 5-10, 205-pound former walk-on who has earned a

scholarship, rushed for 255 yards and two touchdowns, highlighted by a 95-yard performance in Tech's win over Virginia, when he was named ACC Rookie of the Year.

Senior Jermaine Hatch, 6-2, 210, could also be a factor if he can return to the form he displayed before a knee injury in 2001. Hatch played in three games last fall and gained 79 yards on just 18 carries.

True freshman Rashaun Grant, 5-11, 190, a highly regarded prospect from Tampa, Fla., will get a chance to play.

Quoting Coach Gailey:

"Ace Eziemefe and P.J. Daniels will both have to share some of the load. Jermaine Hatch has still not had an entirely healthy spring or fall since his knee injury. So we'll see how one of our incoming freshmen, Rashaun Grant, does."

FULLBACKS

O Starters, 2 Lettermen Returning

t fullback, Tech lacks a proven player. Juniors Jimmy Dixon and Johnathan Jackson saw most of the action there last fall, though neither carried the ball much as Tech primarily used one-back sets, and both are coming off injuries.

Dixon, a former tailback, entered the spring as the top fullback, but suffered a broken ankle. The 6-1, 220-pound junior caught two passes for eight yards last fall. Jackson, who had three carries and two catches, suffered a broken ankle late in the season against Duke and did not participate in spring practice.

With Dixon and Jackson sidelined in the spring, redshirt freshman Michael Matthews moved from defensive end to fullback and showed promise in his limited time on offense. He has excellent size (6-4, 260) pounds, and with continued progress, should be a contributor at fullback.

Sophomore Brian Johnson, 6-3, 240, who was hampered last fall by a sprained ankle and did not see any game action, and senior walk-on Gavin Bourgeois, 6-2, 230, a converted tight end, provide depth. Incoming freshman Kyle Pupello, 6-1, 230, could be a factor.


Quoting Coach Gailey:

"The fullback position is very important for us and what we want to do offensively, but we're still searching for that guy. I don't know who our starting fullback will be. There have been some injuries with Jimmy Dixon and Johnathan Jackson both coming off the injuries. Michael Matthews was moved there in the spring to see if he could play the position and did fairly well. Brian Johnson has not played up to the hype that surrounded him when he came here so that job is another one that is open."

WIDE RECEIVERS

1 Starter, 4 Lettermen Returning

ven with the graduation of two of the top receivers in school in Kerry Watkins and Will Glover, the Jackets still boast potent weapons at this position, most notably senior Jonathan Smith. The versatile Smith, who also lined up at tailback and quarterback at times last fall, is one of four returning letterwinners, along with juniors Nate Curry, Levon Thomas and



Mark Logan. Redshirt freshman Xavier McGuire, Tech's tallest receiver (6-3, 215), should also be a factor.

Also in the receiver corps are redshirt freshman Eddie Ivery, 5-10, 165, who is coming off a knee injury, and walk-ons Robbie Rollins, 6-2, 185, and Charlie Saunders, 5-9, 160. Freshman Chris Dunlap, 6-0, 185, joins the group this fall.

Smith, 5-10, 189, should be one of Tech's top offensive weapons this fall. Last season he totalled 626 all-purpose yards, including 430 yards on 36 receptions, along with 118 yards rushing and 78 punt return yards.

Curry, 5-10, 190, caught just one pass as he continued to recover from 2001 knee surgery that was compounded by a broken kneecap in the offseason.

Thomas, 6-0, 205, has good size and excellent speed but needs to be more consistent in catching the ball. He had 20 receptions for 222 yards (11.1 yards per catch) and one touchdown. Logan, 5-11, 200, a former quarterback, added six catches for 55 yards.


Quoting Coach Gailey:

"Jonathan Smith is probably our biggest playmaker this time. He had a good year despite playing all last year with a nagging injury. He has proven that he gives us a big play threat when the ball is in his hands.

"We think Nate Curry will be back to 100 percent and will be a big contributor. Levon Thomas played some and played well at times last year, and Mark Logan has some experience. So we have a little bit of skill and depth. Xavier McGuire has to continue to develop as a young player."

TIGHT ENDS

1 Starter, 1 Letterman Returning

ech graduated senior starter Will Heller, but the Jackets return an experienced and talented performer in John Paul Foschi.

Tech will need to develop some depth to go along with Foschi, 6-4, 270, and that could come from George Cooper, a 6-6, 260-pound redshirt freshman, or junior Darius Williams, who at 6-6 and 265 pounds has excellent size but has yet to see any game action. In the spring, 6-3, 270-pound sophomore Gavin Tarquinio moved here after two injury-plagued seasons on the offensive line. Senior walk-on Joseph Rearden, 6-0, 235, another offensive line convert, add depth.

Quoting Coach Gailey:

"J.P. Foschi is a very good tight end. I'd love for him to be an important part of our offense this year. That doesn't necessarily mean numbers and passes caught; just an important part to our overall offense.

"We need someone to step up behind J.P., and we have several candidates, but nobody proven: Darius Williams, George Cooper and some others who will be vying to provide depth."

TACKLES

2 Starters, 3 Lettermen Returning

The tackle position is one of the strengths of the Tech squad with both starters returning, including all-America candidate Nat Dorsey at left tackle. Dorsey's opposite number, right tackle Kyle Wallace, is also an all-conference candidate, and Jeremy Phillips provides a high quality backup.

Dorsey, Tech's largest player at 6-6 and 324 pounds, is a two-time all-Atlantic Coast Conference selection who should be one of the top linemen in the ACC and the nation this time around. He has tremendous talent, and he has worked in the offseason to drop a little weight from his massive frame.

Dorsey is backed up by fifth-year senior Will Hardy, 6-4, 295, a former walk-on who has earned a scholarship.

The 6-6, 285-pound Wallace enjoyed a solid season in 2002 and should also be one of the league's top tackles in the coming season.

Phillips, 6-7, 285, is a remarkable story after returning last fall from a year-and-a-half battle with a left knee injury. In fact, last summer his career was in doubt, but he made his Tech debut in the second game of the season at Connecticut and developed into Tech's top backup at tackle,

including two starts.

A pair of newcomers, sophomore Kenton Johnson, a 6-6, 315pound, transfer from Morris Brown, and incoming freshman Eddy Parker, 6-5, 280, add depth.

Quoting Coach Gailey:

"We have two talented returning starters at tackle. We need Nat Dorsey to stay closer to the playing weight of his freshman year, and we've been working very hard to get that done.

"Will Hardy made a nice move in practice and proved that he might be able to help us. We were hoping to get some more look at Salih, but he was injured. We have to continue to work and search for depth."

GUARDS

1 Starter, 4 Lettermen Returning

he one vacancy on the offensive line occurred at right tackle with the graduation of Raymond Roberts-Blake. Sophomore Brad Honeycutt earned that position with a strong spring, joining returning starter Leon Robinson at left quard.

Robinson, a 6-4, 320-pound junior, has started 18 of Tech's last 19 games. A 6-4, 305-pounder, Honeycutt was a backup tackle last season, including one start.

Junior Andy Tidwell-Neal, 6-4, 295, who can also play center, is Tech's top backup at guard. Sophomore Salih Besirevic, 6-7, 290, could also earn playing time at guard. Senior Garren Findlay, 6-5, 290, redshirt freshman walk-on Travis Kelly, 6-0, 255, and incoming freshman Matt Rhodes, 6-4, 275, add depth.

Quoting Coach Gailey:

"Brad Honeycutt made a big jump in the spring. The best part about it is he got to work with Kyle Wallace and Hugh Reilly the whole spring. Those three got to work together, which really helped Brad's jump to get better. He is a good athlete who just needs a lot of work and a lot of time at the position to become comfortable there."

CENTERS

1 Starter, 2 Lettermen Returning

he anchor of the offensive line and the leader of the offense is senior center Hugh Reilly, an all-conference and all-America candidate. A two-year starter, the 6-4, 285-pounder moved from guard to center last season and earned honorable mention all-ACC honors in his first year at the position. Reilly actually started his Tech career on the defensive line.

Senior Clay Hartley, 6-4, 280, is an experienced backup who can also play guard. True freshman Kevin Tuminello, 6-4, 285, is slated third here.

Quoting Coach Gailey:

"Hugh is a very solid football player; I hope he takes the next step to be a great player and a great leader. I really expect some great things from him this year."

DEFENSIVE ENDS

2 Starters, 3 Lettermen Returning

he return of all-America defensive end Greg Gathers would be a tremendous boost to the Tech defense.

Tech's all-time leader in sacks (31) and tackles for loss (57), Gathers can provide veteran leadership and toughness to the defense along with his outstanding pass rush skills. He missed almost all of the 2002 with a kidney ailment and was granted a medical hardship. He is expected to be able to play this season, but exactly how much he will be able to contribute will be a question mark.

With Gathers, 6-1, 270, sidelined, Eric Henderson stepped in and enjoyed a very good season as a freshman.


The 6-3, 265-pounder earned Freshman All-America honors with a team-leading 15 tackles for loss and five sacks. He added 58 tackles and two pass breakups.

A pair of true freshmen will be in the mix in Adamm Oliver, 6-4, 250, and Joe Anoai, 6-3, 235. Junior Chirod Williams, 6-4, 235, adds depth.

Quoting Coach Gailey:

"Again, we'll rely on speed and quickness, not bulk. We got some productive play out of Eric Henderson, and we're looking for him to continue to improve.

"Greg's return would be a huge plus. With the great things that he's done in the past what it will be wonderful to have that kind of player on the field for us. We'll know more the closer we get to camp about exactly what he'll be able to do. We did get him into some pads and drills in the spring but no full speed scrimmaging. We hope to get a full release so we can get him on the field and get going."

DEFENSIVE TACKLES

1 Starter, 2 Lettermen Returning

ith sophomore Travis Parker as the only returnee with any experience, Tech will have look to true freshmen to help man the defensive line. Parker is somewhat undersized at 6-5 and 270 pounds but has good quickness and was very productive as a freshman last fall. He contributed 49 tackles, five tackles for loss and two pass breakups.

Tech will look to redshirt freshman Brad Brezina, a 6-2, 275pounder who is the son of former Atlanta Falcon great Greg Brezina, and sophomore Omar Billy, 6-2, 270, for contributions.


Freshmen Mansfield Wrotto, 6-4, 310, of Snellville, Ga., and LeShawn Newberry, 6-0, 310, of Port Orange, Fla., will also be relied upon for immediate help.

Quoting Coach Gailey:

"Travis Parker may have been our most productive lineman last year. He and Eric Henderson played a lot of football as freshmen. These guys are good football players, they play the game the way it's supposed to be played, they stay after it every snap. So, we'll just have to continue to let

them play and get better.

"We have some young guys who are going to have to contribute in Brad



"We have several freshman on the defensive line who are going to have to come in and play. It's a good thing we signed four of what we feel like are quality football players at that position, and they will have to come in and make an immediate contribution."

LINEBACKERS

2 Starters, 5 Lettermen Returning

inebacker has been the strength of the Tech defense the last several years, and this season should be no exception as the Jackets return a pair of all-star candidates in seniors Daryl Smith and Keyaron Fox.

Smith, 6-2, 235, has led the Jackets in tackles two of the last three years, including last fall, when he boasted 99 tackles, 15 tackles for loss, five sacks, one interception and five pass breakups.

The 6-3, 220-pound Fox had a breakout season in 2002 with 92 tackles, 13 tackles for loss, three sacks, an interception and six pass breakups, despite missing time with a sprained ankle. He was also Tech's most versatile defender, lining up at defensive end at times in addition to his outside linebacker duties.

Fifth-year senior Ather Brown, 6-3, 230, is a key member of the linebacker corps as an experienced and very versatile player who can play all three linebacker positions.

The leading candidate to replace four-year starter Recardo Wimbush is sophomore Gerris Wilkinson, 6-3, 230, who made great strides in the spring.

The Jackets also have some experienced depth in junior Tabugbo Anyansi, 6-1, 220, who has good speed. Also providing depth is redshirt freshmen walk-on Jay Forester, 5-10, 200.

Tech also signed three talented linebackers who will get a chance to earn playing time, led by Nick Moore, 6-1, 225, of Arlington, Texas, who will work at middle linebacker. Slated at outside linebacker is another Texan in KaMichael Hall, 6-1, 205, of Houston, as well as Philip Wheeler, 6-2, 215, of Columbus, Ga.

Quoting Coach Gailey:

"Daryl Smith and Keyaron Fox are proven veterans and we're going to have to have them step up and really play well this year. They both do some very good things and they both get a lot of production on the field.

"Gerris made as big a jump as anybody this spring practice. He really made a lot of improvement, and we need him to carry that improvement that he made in spring practice onto the field this fall, and then on into games.

"Ather is a veteran player who has played almost every position, and gives you some versatility and is a great special teams player. So, we get a plus with him as well with some experience."

SAFETIES

O Starters, 5 Lettermen Returning

his position was hit hard by graduation as the Jackets said good-bye to three time all-ACC free safety Jeremy Muyres and three-year starting strong safety Cory Collins. Junior James Butler, 6-3, 210, Tech's most experienced returnee, steps into the starting lineup at free safety

after making 19 tackles and one pass breakup last fall. The other starter is sophomore Dawan Landry, 6-2, 215, a former quarterback who moved to defense last season, when he made eight tackles.

Junior free safety Nathan Burton, 6-2, 200, and sophomore strong safety Chris Reis, 6-0, 210, a pair of special teams standouts, should also earn playing time. Walk-ons Jack Rogers, 6-1, 205, another special teams contributor, and Jerry Coffee, 5-11, 180, and true freshmen Avery Roberson, 6-2, 190, and Joe Gaston, 6-0, 200, add depth.

Quoting Coach Gailey:

"We lost four very good players out of the secondary, but I really like James Butler and Dawan Landry stepping into starting roles at the safeties. I think everybody anticipated that they would be good safeties, but they came on faster in the spring than maybe we had anticipated. We could have a very young secondary, but a very athletic secondary. They will need to get some experience in a hurry. Chris Reis is another fine young player, and I'm looking forward to seeing what he can do."

CORNERBACKS

1 Starter, 4 Lettermen Returning

enior Jonathan Cox returns at one corner, while sophomore Reuben Houston steps in at the other cornerback position, replacing threeyear starter Marvious Hester.

Cox, 5-10, 190, started every game in 2002, making 51 tackles and eight pass breakups. Houston, 6-0, 195, gained experience as Tech's nickel back last fall, when he collected 33 tackles, three tackles for loss, one interception, four forced fumbles and three pass breakups.

In Houston and backups Dennis Davis, 6-0, 185, and I-Perfection Harris, 5-10, 175, the cornerback position features a trio of track standouts. One of Tech's fastest players, Davis earned all-ACC honors with a second-place finish in the 200 meters at this year's ACC indoor meet. Houston placed fourth in this year's triple jump after an all-conference performance in 2002, while Harris finished fifth in the long jump.

Sophomore Venice Gilliam, 5-10, 195, who lettered last year on special teams, adds depth.

True freshman Kenny Scott, 6-1, 175, of Daytona Beach, Fla., is one of the most highly regarded members of Tech's 2003 recruiting class and will be looked upon for a contribution in the secondary. Freshmen Sam Williams, 5-11, 170, and Brian Fleuridor, 5-11, 180, also will get a look.


Quoting Coach Gailey:

Quoting Coach Gailey:

"In the kicking game, Dan Burnett ended up a little bit ahead in spring. He could do both jobs, or he could just be the field goal and extra point kicker with David Jordan as the kickoff guy."

O Starters, 1 Letterman Returning

he Jackets were blessed last season with not one, but two, very effective punters in Dan Dyke and Chris Morehouse, who shared duties last fall. Senior Hal Higgins, who has lettered as Tech's holder the last two years, will get a shot at punting, along with junior walk-on Andy Thomson, a lefty who joined the program last fall. Tech could also look to an incoming freshman for help here in the fall.

Quoting Coach Gailey:

"The punting job is still open right now, and we're looking for consistency there. Hal Higgins and Andy Thomson will be vying for the job, but a freshman could be in that mix as well."








a stripe and a GT logo.





SIX STRAIGHT BOWL BERTHS

Georgia Tech has tied a school record by earning six consecutive bowl berths, a first for the program since the 1950s and the halcyon days of legendary head coach Bobby Dodd, who guided the Yellow Jackets to six consecutive bowl games—winning them all—from 1951-56.

On their current streak, the Yellow Jackets have played in the 1997 Carquest Bowl, the 1999 and 2000 Toyota Gator Bowls, the 2000 Chickfil-A Peach Bowl, the 2001 Seattle Bowl, and the 2002 Silicon Valley Football Classic.

ELITE COMPANY

Georgia Tech is one of just 13 schools in the nation that have played in a bowl game each of the last six years.

Florida State is the only other Atlantic Coast Conference school in this elite group. The list also includes Florida, Georgia, Kansas State, Marshall, Michigan, Nebraska, Oregon, Purdue, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia Tech and Washington.

GATHERS GATHERS SACKS

Defensive end Greg Gathers is Georgia Tech's career leader in sacks (31) and tackles for loss (57). The senior all-America led the ACC with 10 sacks in 2001 and ranks sixth in ACC history in career sacks.

Gathers broke the previous Tech records of 28.5 sacks and 52 tackles for loss set by all-America Coleman Rudolph from 1989-92.

NFL HEAD COACHING EXPERIENCE

Georgia Tech's second-year head coach Chan Gailey is a veteran with 28 years of coaching experience, including 14 years in the National Football League. Gailey spent two years (1998-99) as the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys, compiling an 18-14 regular-season record and leading the Cowboys to the playoffs both years, including the NFC Eastern Division title in 1998.

Gailey is one of nine current head coaches in NCAA Division I-A who have previous head coaching experience in the NFL. The others are Rich Brooks (Kentucky), Pete Carroll (Southern California), Mike Riley (Oregon State), Al Groh (Virginia), Lou Holtz (South Carolina), June Jones (Hawaii), John Mackovic (Arizona) and John Robinson (UNLV).

Of those nine, only Gailey, and Robinson (Los Angeles Rams) have led a team to the NFL playoffs and compiled a winning NFL record. Mackovic (Kansas City Chiefs in 1986) also made one playoff appearance but did not post a winning career record, while Groh (New York Jets in 2001) had a winning record in his one NFL season but did not reach the playoffs.

GRADUATION RATE HONORED

Georgia Tech was honored by the American Football Coaches' Association (AFCA) in 2003 for graduating at least 70 percent of its freshman class from 1997-98. Tech was one of 32 Division I-A schools so honored.

BOWLING 'EM OVER

Georgia Tech owns the nation's third best winning percentage in bowl games. Tech's record now stands at 20-11 for a winning percentage of .645 in postseason play. The Jackets trail Oklahoma (.653) and Penn State (.667) for the highest bowl winning percentage among all teams with at least 15 bowl appearances.

Tech ranks sixth all-time in bowl victories with 20 and 13th in appearances with 31.

In 1955, the Jackets were the first team to win each of the four traditional major bowls-Rose, Orange, Sugar and Cotton.

Sixteen different states are represented on Georgia Tech's 2003 roster. The bulk of the roster—44 players— is, of course, from Georgia. Florida is next with 19 Yellow Jackets, followed by Texas with eight and Louisiana with six. California, Colorado, Illinois, Minnesota, Mississippi, New York, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Utah and Virginia have also produced current Yellow Jackets.

The roster also has an international flavor with two foreign countries represented. Junior linebacker Tabugbo Anyansi (pronounced tie-BOO-bo on-YON-zee) is a native of Nigeria. Sophomore offensive lineman Salih Besirevic (pronounced SAH-lee buh-SHEER-uh-vich) left war-torn Bosnia with his family in 1997 and settled in Denver, Colo.

Georgia Tech enters the 2003 season with an all-time record of 616-415-43 (.594). Now in their 111th year of intercollegiate competition, the Yellow Jackets rank 19th among all Division I-A teams in all-time victories.

OLDEST, AND WINNINGEST, I-A STADIUM

Built in 1913 and now in its 91st season, Georgia Tech's Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field is the oldest on-campus stadium in NCAA Division I-A. In fact, the only older on-campus facilities in the nation are Harvard Stadium and Penn's Franklin Field. The next oldest I-A stadium is Mississippi State's Scott Field, built in 1915. Tech has a record of 405-169-23 (.698) at its home facility.

Not only is Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field the oldest on-campus stadium, but it is also the site of more victories by the home team than any other facility. Since 1913 Georgia Tech has 405 wins at Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field, leading Tennessee (392) and Harvard (386).

THURSDAY NIGHT LIVE

For the 11th year in a row, Georgia Tech will participate in ESPN's Thursday night, national television package. This fall, the Yellow Jackets have two Thursday night games. Tech opens the season at Brigham Young on Thursday, Aug. 28, and then the Jackets host Maryland on Thursday, Oct. 23.

Georgia Tech has been selected to play in more ESPN Thursday night games—16—than any other school in the nation.

Tech has a 7-7 record when playing in ESPN's Thursday night games, and all but three of the games have been in Atlanta. Two of Tech's last five Thursday night games have gone to overtime.

Maryland has been Tech's most frequent Thursday night opponent as this year's game will be the sixth such affair between the two schools since 1995. Maryland has won the last two Thursday night contests to take a 3-2 lead.

In addition to the 14 ESPN dates, the Jackets have also played two other Thursday prime-time games in recent years, defeating Virginia, 31-27, in 1983 on TBS and falling to Arizona, 20-19, in 1995 on Prime. Counting Thanksgiving, Tech's record on Thursday is 28-19-2.

NFL RELATIONS

A pair of redshirt freshmen, wide receiver Eddie Ivery and defensive tackle Brad Brezina, are the sons of former NFL standouts.

Ivery's father, Eddie Lee Ivery, Sr., is one of the top running backs in Rambling Wreck annals. The elder Ivery, who is now on the Tech strength and conditioning staff, is the third-leading rusher in Yellow Jacket history with 3,517 yards from 1975-78. He set the then-NCAA single-game rushing record with 356 yards against Air Force in 1978 and went on to play 10 years with the Green Bay Packers.

Brezina is the son of longtime Atlanta Falcons linebacker Greg Brezina, who played collegiately at Houston and then played for the Falcons from 1968-69 and 1971-79, including a Pro Bowl selection in 1969.

Incoming freshman Patrick Carter is the younger brother of New York Giants wide receiver Tim Carter.

TOUGH SLEDDING

Georgia Tech's 2003 schedule is easily one of the nation's toughest slates, including eight games against teams that participated in bowl games last season: Auburn, Florida State, Clemson, NC State, Wake Forest, Maryland, Virginia and Georgia. Six of the eight were ranked in the final ESPN/USA Today coaches' poll for 2002.

In fact, College Football News ranks Tech's schedule as the third toughest in the nation. Only Florida State and California face tougher slates, according to the website's calculations.

Among the four games against non-bowl teams are a road test at Brigham Young and a home game with ACC rival North Carolina. Road games at Vanderbilt and Duke round out the schedule.

WINNING RECORDS VS. SEVEN ACC FOES

The only Atlantic Coast Conference school to post a winning record against Georgia Tech is Florida State. Tech's all-time records against each ACC school: Clemson, 43-22-2; Duke, 40-29-1; Florida State, 7-11-1; Maryland, 10-5; North Carolina, 19-16-3; NC State, 14-8; Virginia, 13-11-1; Wake Forest, 18-7.

Higgins Overcomes the Odds

Ollege football is filled with inspirational stories of walk-on players who battle the odds to earn playing time and contribute to their teams.

Hal Higgins, Georgia Tech's holder the last two years who will also compete for the punting job this fall, takes that a step further.

In April of 1999, just a few weeks after he joined the Tech squad as an aspiring punter, Higgins ceased to be a typical walk-on.

"I got sick right before spring practice started," recalled Higgins. "I wasn't feeling well, and one night, I was running such a high temperature but still getting cold, too, so I called the campus police and had them take me to the hospital. I stayed six days, but they never knew what was wrong. They thought I had some kind of virus. Finally, I started feeling better, and then two weeks later spring practice started."

Higgins went through 15 sessions of spring practice, competing with fellow walk-on Dan Dyke for punting duties.

"I was feeling pretty good until the last day," he said. "I got a big knot right here [pointing to his neck] that swelled up. It was the same place they had aspirated before because my lymph nodes were swollen. The aspiration had been negative, but this time took they took it out and sent it off for a biopsy, and it came back positive.

"That's when the doctor told me I had Hodgkin's disease."

Higgins admits that at the time, he had no idea what to expect.

"I didn't know what Hodgkin's disease was," he said. "I thought it was some kind of virus or something, so I was like, OK, treat me and I'm out of here. But the doctor said, no, it's a type of cancer and you need chemotherapy. He told me that it was going to be serious, but he also told me it's one of the most curable types of cancer."

Higgins dropped out of school and began chemotherapy treatments.

"It was rough," he recalled.

"I went on Thursdays every other week for about four hours. I got four different drugs. The worst part was going in the room and seeing

everybody else. It was a big room full of recliners. You go pick one out, and you might sit beside a guy who's dying. It's not a very happy place."

Still, Higgins chose to focus on the positive.

"It gave me a shock, but I read up on Hodgkins," he said. "Mario Lemeiux had it, and Andres Galarraga had a form of it. So I just took a positive attitude, and told myself I'm going to get through this and try to get back to playing football.

"I always had the mindset that I wasn't going to let this win. I never thought dealing with cancer would get the best of me. I never thought, I just want to be healthy; I always wanted to play football. The whole time I thought about staying in shape and making it back as quick as I could. I always kept in my mind that I wanted to play football for Georgia Tech."

Higgins tried to stay involved with the program, working in the football office, but even that was difficult at times.

"The lowest point, besides finding out, was coming around in the fall and seeing the guys out on the field for the first time," said Higgins. "I felt like I wasn't part of the team as much any more. I wasn't in school, plus that was about my 10th or 11th treatment [out of 14], so that really starts getting you down and discouraged."

But there was a light at the end of the tunnel.

"I finished chemo in December, and then in January (2000), I got cleared by the doctor to resume physical activity," said Higgins, who dropped about 15 pounds during his illness. "I had to get checkups once every three months for that whole year, then once every six months, and now once a year."

Once he was in remission, Higgins set his sights on playing football, rejoining the team for spring practice in March of 2000. That fall, he was Tech's third punter, but did not get into a game.

"Honestly, it was the summer of 2001 when I finally felt that nothing was wrong and that I was fully recuperated and had gotten all my weight and strength back," said Higgins, a native of Cornelia, Ga.

With the punting job filled, Higgins sought another way to get on the field. "One day in a team meeting, the coaches asked who could hold."

After what he had been through, Hal Higgins certainly wasn't afraid to raise his hand.

Quarterbacks, Scott, Grant Highlight Tech's Incoming Class

eorgia Tech head football coach Chan Gailey and his staff addressed several positions, particularly quarterback and on defense, with the signing of 20 prospective studentathletes to national letters of intent to play for the Rambling Wreck.

Headlining the class is *USA Today* prep all-America cornerback Kenny Scott of Daytona Beach, Fla., as well as running back Rashaun Grant of Tampa, Fla., quarterbacks Reggie Ball of Stone Mountain, Ga., and Stephenson High, and Patrick Carter from St. Petersburg, Fla., and linebacker Nick Moore of Arlington, Texas.

"We covered a lot of areas, and we were able to get some quality players at a lot of positions, particularly on the defensive side of the ball," said Gailey.

Tech's class of signees includes five defensive backs, three line-backers, four defensive linemen, three offensive linemen, two quarterbacks, one running back, one receiver and one combination fullback-linebacker. Tech signed six players from Georgia, as well as nine from Florida, four from Texas and one from Ohio.

The Yellow Jackets have added three talented quarterbacks to the program. In addition to Ball and Carter, who both signed on National Signing Day, Al Peña of Leander, Texas enrolled at Tech this semester.

"None of the quarterbacks that we are recruiting and will continue to recruit are just drop-back passers," said Gailey. "They all have the ability to move and make some things happen with their feet as well as their arms."

Ball, 6-0 and 180 pounds, was a first-team all-state selection and a member of the Super Southern 100 by the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution*. He passed for more than 2,000 yards as a senior with 19 touchdown and just two interceptions. Carter, 6-3, 185, was rated the No. 19 quarterback in the nation by Tom Lemming and the No. 12 dual-threat quarterback in the country by Rivals. He threw for 2,304 yards and 21 touchdowns as a senior. Pena, 6-3, 205, was an honorable mention all-region selection by *PrepStar* while passing for 1,800 yards and rushing for 1,200 yards as a senior at Leander High.

Scott, 6-1, 180, was a second-team prep all-America by *USA Today*. He was rated the fifth-best cornerback in the nation by Rivals and the eighth-best by Tom Lemming. He earned first-team all-state honors at Seabreeze High.

Scott is one of five talented defensive backs signed by the Yellow Jackets, who graduated three of four starters in the secondary. Also signing with Tech were cornerbacks Sam Williams of Atlanta's Mays High and Brian Fleuridor of Boca Raton (Fla.) High, as well as safeties Avery Roberson of Atlanta's Washington High and Joe Gaston from Marietta's Wheeler High.

Roberson and Gaston were both named to Top 50 in Georgia and honorable mention all-state by the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution*. Roberson, 6-2, 190, was rated the No. 19 safety in the nation by Rivals while accumulating 324 tackles, 14 interceptions and 13 sacks in this career. Gaston made 80 tackles and four interceptions as a senior, when he also scored 13 touchdowns as a running back/kick returner.

Williams, 5-11, 170, and Fleuridor, 5-11, 180, bring very good speed to the cornerback position.

Moore is one of four linebacker prospects signed by the Jackets, along with Philip Wheeler of Shaw High in Columbus, Ga., and KaMichael Hall of Houston, Texas, as well as Kyle Pupello of Plant High in Tampa, Fla., who can play linebacker or fullback.

Moore, 6-1, 225, was a second-team all-state selection in Class 5-A at Arlington (Texas) High and was rated among the Top 100 players in the Dallas-Fort Worth area by the Dallas Morning News. He recorded 183 tackles as a senior, leading his district in tackles three straight years. Hall, another Texan from Klein Forest High, was rated the No. 67 linebacker in the nation by Rivals and was tabbed to Max Emfinger's Texas Super All-State team. The 6-1, 205-pounder registered 160 tackles as a senior. Wheeler, 6-2, 215, who had 106 tackles with 34 tackles for loss, was a first-team all-state selection by the Atlanta Journal-Constitution. Pupello made over 100 tackles each of the last three years.

On the defensive line, Tech signed two solidly built tackles in Mansfield Wrotto of Snellville, Ga., and LeShawn Newberry of Port Orange, Fla., as well as a pair of Florida defensive ends in Adamm Oliver of New Port Richey Ridgewood and Joe Anoai of Pensacola Escambia.

A first-team all-state selection at Brookwood High, Wrotto, 6-4, 310, was a member of the *Atlanta Journal Constitution's* Top 50 in Georgia and was rated the No. 46 player in the state by BorderWars. Newberry, 6-0, 310, was ranked No. 60 in Florida by BorderWars while earning second-team all-state honors.

Oliver, 6-4, 250, was a first-team all-state selection (Class 4-A) while registering a school-record 151 tackles as a senior. Anoai earned second-team all-state accolades (Class 5-A) and was rated No. 80 in Florida by BorderWars. He collected 119 tackles and 10 sacks as a senior.

Tech also added three offensive linemen in 6-4, 285-pound Kevin Tuminello of Youngstown, Ohio, and Boardman High, and a pair of Texans in 6-5, 280-pound Eddy Parker of Burnet and 6-4, 275-pound Matt Rhodes of Angleton. Parker was a first-team all-state selection and a member of Max Emfinger's Texas Super Team, while Tuminello and Rhodes were honorable mention all-region selections by *PrepStar*.

Regarded as one of the nation's top running backs, Grant rushed for 1,003 yards and 13 touchdowns in just eight games before his season was ended by a broken ankle. He was rated the nation's No. 2 all-purpose running back and No. 64 prospect overall by Rivals, as well as the No. 13 running back in the nation by Tom Lemming and No. 16 by TheInsiders.

"He has the kind of breakaway speed that you're looking for to make big plays," said Gailey of Grant.

Wide receiver Chris Dunlap of Miramar (Fla.) High School was an honorable mention all-region selection by *PrepStar* while catching 38 passes for 715 yards and eight touchdowns.



CHAN GAILEY

At Tech: 7-6, 2nd Year

Overall: 31-17, 5th Year

Named the Georgia Tech head coach on Dec. 29, 2001, Chan Gailey is just the second Yellow Jacket head coach to lead Tech to a bowl game in his first season.



han Gailey, a 29-year football coaching veteran, including 13 seasons in the college ranks and 16 years in the professional football, was named the 11th head coach in Georgia Tech football history on Dec. 29, 2001.

In his first season at the helm of the Tech program, Gailey steered the Yellow Jackets through adversity, including season-ending injuries to the team's top offensive and defensive players, to a school-record tying sixth consecutive bowl berth in the 2002 Silicon Valley Football Classic. His first Yellow Jacket edition posted a sixth straight year of seven or more wins, highlighted by an improbable victory at 8th-ranked NC State.

Gailey is just the second head coach in Georgia Tech history to lead the Jackets to a bowl game in his first season, joining Bill Fulcher, who guided his 1972 Tech to the Liberty Bowl.

Gailey, 51, brought to Tech a history of success at every stop in his coaching career, including three seasons as a college head coach at Troy State University and Samford University in Alabama, as well as two years as the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys in the National Football League and two at the helm of the Birmingham Fire of the World League of American Football. He made a name for himself as an innovative offensive mind during NFL stops in Pittsburgh, Dallas and Miami, among others.

In four years as a college head coach, Gailey has compiled a record of 31-17 (.646), including a 19-5 mark in two years at Troy State and a 5-6 slate at Samford.

"Chan Gailey is the right fit for Georgia Tech at this time," said Tech Director of Athletics Dave Braine upon Gailey's hiring. "Besides all the great qualities he possesses as a football coach, he's an even better human being."

Gailey came to Tech after two seasons (2000-01) as offensive coordinator for the Miami Dolphins under head coach Dave Wannstedt.

"How many times does a guy like myself get a chance to come to an institute like this?" said Gailey on the day he was introduced. "It's something that you can believe in, and when you talk to somebody you know what you're selling and you know what you're talking about. What's up

here with the alumni and the people that are involved, every day I get to go to work with people that exude character and class. That's an enjoyable situation.

"I did ask, 'Do we have the ability to win a national championship?' because I want to win and that's part of the process. I want to win a championship and that's why you play, that's why you line up and that's why you go out and work and lift weights in the off season, to have a chance to be the best of the best and that's one of the goals. I get a chance to come back to my home state and I get an opportunity to work in a great city and to be involved with an unbelievable institute."

Gailey joined the Dolphins after spending the previous two years (1998-99) as the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys. Under Gailey, the Cowboys compiled a composite regular season record of 18-14 in his two seasons, qualified for the playoffs both years, and captured the NFC Eastern Division title in 1998. In addition, the Cowboys finished in the top five in the NFL in both fewest turnovers and fewest interceptions in each of Gailey's two seasons as head coach, including a number one ranking in both categories in 1998.

In Gailey's first season with the Dolphins, he helped guide a running game which amassed 1,894 yards, the most by a Dolphin team since 1984. Lamar Smith finished tenth in the AFC with 1,139 yards rushing, the second-highest single-season total by a Dolphin, marking just the seventh time (fifth player) that a Dolphin has reached the 1,000-yard rushing plateau.

In seven of the eight seasons that Gailey was either a coordinator or head coach in the NFL, he had a player attain the 1,000-yard rushing mark each time, including Jerome Bettis of the Steelers and Emmitt Smith of the Cowboys.

Before joining the Cowboys in 1998, Gailey spent the previous four seasons (1994-97) with the Pittsburgh Steelers, including each of the last two as offensive coordinator. His first two years there were spent tutoring the club's wide receivers. In Gailey's four seasons with the Steelers, the team won the AFC Central Division crown each time, appeared in the AFC Championship Game on three occasions and made one trip to the Super

Bowl. Pittsburgh finished second in the NFL in rushing offense in 1996, averaging 143.7 yards per game. In Gailey's final season with the Steelers, he presided over the league's top-ranked rushing team, one that amassed an average of 154.9 yards per contest.


The NFL team with which Gailey coached reached postseason play each of his last eight years in the league, and 11 of his 14 seasons overall.

Gailey is one of nine current NCAA Division I-A head coaches who have previously been head coaches in the NFL. The others are Rich Brooks (Kentucky), Pete Carroll (Southern California), Mike Riley (Oregon State), Al Groh (Virginia), Lou Holtz (South Carolina), June Jones (Hawaii), John Mackovic (Arizona) and John Robinson (UNLV).

Of those nine, only Gailey, and Robinson (Los Angeles Rams) have led a team to the NFL playoffs and compiled a winning NFL record.


Gailey got his start in the NFL coaching ranks as an assistant with the Denver Broncos in 1985. He served as a defensive assistant and special teams coach in his first season there before moving to the offensive side in 1986. He served two years (1986-87) as the Broncos' special teams and tight ends coach prior to taking over the task as quarterbacks coach in 1988. He was promoted to offensive coordinator/receivers coach in 1989, and served two years in that position.

During Gailey's six-year stay in Denver, the team finished first or second in the AFC West on five occasions and made three Super Bowl appearances. Following his tenure in Denver, Gailey was named head coach with the Birmingham Fire of the World League in 1991, and in his

two seasons there, the Fire qualified for the playoffs both times. A stop as head coach at Samford University in 1993 preceded his stint with the Steelers.

Gailey began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at the University of Florida in 1974, where he spent the next two years. From there, he moved on to his first full-time position, as secondary coach at Troy (Ala.) State, where he served from 1976-78. That was followed by a four-year stint (1979-82) at the Air Force Academy, the final two as defensive coordinator under Ken Hatfield. He returned to Troy State in 1983 and spent the next two seasons there as the school's head coach. He led the team to a Division II national championship in 1984.

Born January 5, 1952 in Gainesville, Ga., Gailey was an all-state quarterback at Americus High School, and went on to letter three years (1971-73) as a quarterback at the University of Florida. He graduated from Florida in 1974 with a degree in physical education. Gailey and his wife, Laurie, have two sons, Tate and Andrew.


oe D'Alessandris, who possesses a wide range of experience at the collegiate and professional levels, enters his second season as Georgia Tech's offensive line coach.

D'Alessandris' offensive line helped the Tech rushing attack remain productive in 2002 despite numerous injuries to the Jackets' tailbacks, and he coached all-Atlantic Coast Conference tackle Nat Dorsey.

D'Alessandris came to Tech in 2002 after coaching the offensive line at Duke the last five years (1997-01). Five linemen that he coached during that time have gone on to the NFL in center Patrick Mannelly (5th round, Chicago, 1998), guard Lennie Friedman (2nd round, Denver, 1997), center Troy Andrew (free agent, Miami, 2001), Shawn Lynch (free agent, Kansas City, 2002) and John Miller (free agent, Houston, 2002).

In addition, D'Alessandris coached on the Gray squad at the 1999 Blue-Gray Classic.

He went to Duke after serving as offensive line coach at the University of Pittsburgh in 1996, and with the Memphis Mad Dogs of the Canadian Football League in 1995. Prior to his Memphis position, he was the offensive line coach at Texas A&M in 1994, helping the Aggies to a 10-0-1 record. He has also held posts with the World League Birmingham team (1991-92) and the CFL Ottawa team (1990).





A native of Aliquippa, Pa., D'Alessandris, 48, was a four-year letterman and a three-year starting offensive guard at Western Carolina, where he earned a bachelor's degree in 1977 and added a master's degree in 1979. As a senior, he received the Catamounts' Big Cat Award as the football team's most valuable player and served as team captain. He began his coaching career at Western Carolina as a graduate assistant before moving on to Livingston (1979-83), Memphis (1984-85) and Chattanooga (1986-89).

He and his wife Toni have three daughters, Anna, Kelly, and Emily.

Wide Receivers / **Passing Game Coordinator** 1st Year at Tech

ayne "Buddy" Geis, formerly an assistant coach with the Dallas Cowboys, joined the Georgia Tech staff in February of 2003 as passing game coordinator and wide receivers

Geis reunites with Tech head coach Chan Gailey, under whom he worked in the National Football League.


Geis spent three seasons with the Cowboys, coaching the Dallas quarterbacks in 1998-99 under Gailey and then directing the offensive nickel package under Dave Campo in 2000. During his stint as quarterbacks coach, the Cowboy signal callers threw only 21 interceptions in two seasons, the lowest total in the NFL during that span. In 1998, the quarterback trio of Troy Aikman, who missed five games due to injury, Jason Garrett and Mike Quinn totalled just eight interceptions, fewest in the league. The following year, Aikman and his backups were second in the NFL with just 13 interceptions, and Aikman passed for 2,964 yards despite missing two games.

Before going to Dallas, Geis spent two years (1996-97) as offensive assistant and assistant quarterbacks coach with the Indianapolis Colts, where he worked with Colts' quarterback Jim Harbaugh, who recorded the second-best quarterback rating of his career under Geis in 1997.

Geis broke into the NFL as receivers coach for the Green Bay Packers from 1988-91 under Lindy Infante. While with the Packers, Geis tutored

all-pro receiver Sterling Sharpe, who led the NFL with 90 receptions in just his second season (1989) in the league. Under Geis' tutelage, Sharpe totaled 281 receptions for 4,280 yards and 23 touchdowns in four seasons. Geis also coached in the

Canadian Football League, serving as offensive coordinator for the Memphis Mad Dogs in 1995 on the staff of former Tech head coach Pepper Rodgers, and in the USFL with the Jacksonville Bulls, spending two years (1984-85) on Infante's staff.





Haley coached the Yellow Jackets' top three tacklers in 2002, the linebacker trio of all-Atlantic Coast Conference honoree Recardo Wimbush, who signed a free agent contract with the Atlanta Falcons, as well as Daryl Smith and Keyaron Fox.

Haley joined the Tech staff in February of 2002 after three seasons as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Baylor.

A native of Gadsden, Ala., Haley entered the college ranks full-time as the defensive line coach at Austin Peay State from 1991-93. He became the defensive line coach at Troy State in 1994 and remained there through the 1996 season. He was named defensive coordinator after the 1996 season, but moved on to Houston to coach outside linebackers in 1997.

Haley also coached outside linebackers at Clemson for one year (1998) before taking the position at Baylor.





Haley, 37, graduated from Emma Sansom High School in Gadsden in 1984, and went on to play linebacker for the football team at Alabama A&M, where he earned a bachelor's degree in physical education with a minor in telecommunications in 1989.

After remaining at Alabama A&M as a student assistant coach for spring practice, Haley became an assistant coach at Enterprise (Ala.) High School, coaching tight ends, in 1989. He took a graduate assistant position at the University of Arkansas, working with the defensive line in 1990, before earning his first full-time position at Austin Peay State the following year.

CURTIS MODKINS

Running Backs 2nd Year at Tech

urtis Modkins begins his first year as Georgia Tech's running backs coach and his second year on the Tech staff after working with defensive backs last fall.

Modkins coached Tech's only first-team all-Atlantic Coast Conference honoree in 2002, free safety Jeremy Muyres.

Modkins joined head coach Chan Gailey's staff in January of 2002 after four seasons as cornerbacks coach at the University of New Mexico.

In 2001, Modkins' cornerbacks helped New Mexico rank 18th in the nation in total defense and haul in 15 total interceptions, and senior Stephen Persely was named to the all-Mountain West Conference team with six interceptions.

From 1998 to 2000, UNM's passing yardage allowed declined each year.

In 1999, Modkins served a summer internship with the Dallas Cowboys, whose head coach at the time was Chan Gailey.

Modkins went to New Mexico from Texas Christian University, where he was a graduate assistant for one year (1995) and a full-time assistant coach for two years (1996-97).





Modkins was a three-year starter at running back at TCU, where he rushed for 2,763 yards and caught 54 passes during his career. He was a second team all-Southwest Conference selection in 1992 and ranked third on the Horned Frogs' career rushing list at the end of his career.

Upon the completion of his playing career, Modkins served for three years on Pat Sullivan's staff. He was a graduate assistant in 1995, the secondary coach in 1996 and the tight ends coach in 1997 before moving to New Mexico.

Modkins received his bachelor's degree in criminal justice from TCU in 1993 and then earned his M.L.A. degree from TCU in 1997. Modkins is married to the former Kristi Ford, and the couple has a son, Jett, age 7, and a daughter, Mariah, 3.

Quarterbacks / Running Game Coordinator 2nd Year at Tech


ntering his second season at Georgia Tech, Patrick Nix will serve as the running game coordinator while coaching the quarterbacks, his former position as a player.

Last fall, Nix was Tech's running backs coach and recruiting coordinator. He helped the offensive backfield overcome the season-ending injuries to its top three tailbacks.

Nix came to Tech in 2002 after one year as wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at Samford University.

Prior to his one season at Samford, Nix was the head coach at Henderson State University, an NCAA Division II school in Arkadelphia, Ark., for two years (1999-2000). Under Nix, the HSU offense set 18 school records, four Gulf South Conference records and three national records.

Nix began his coaching career with a three-year stint at Jacksonville





State University, serving as running backs coach in 1996 and as quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator in 1998. He helped the Gamecocks improve from 1-10 in 1997 to 7-4 in 1998.

A native of Attalla, Ala., Nix was a standout quarterback at Auburn, where as a sophomore he was part of the Tigers' 1993 squad that posted a perfect 11-0 record. In 1995, as captain and starting quarterback, he led Auburn to an 8-4 record and received the team's Pat Sullivan Award for Offensive Player of the Year as well as the Cliff Hare Award as the school's Student-Athlete of the Year. He finished his playing days as the Tigers' career passing efficiency leader and ranked among the top five in school history in numerous other statistical categories.

Nix, who earned a bachelor's degree in secondary education from Auburn in 1995, is married to the former Krista Chapman, and the couple has three children, Emma, Bo, and Caleb.

TOMMIE ROBINSON

Tight Ends 2nd Year at Tech

n his second season at Georgia Tech, Tommie Robinson will coach the Rambling Wreck tight ends after working with wide receivers last season.

Robinson came to Tech in 2002, reuniting with Tech head coach Chan Gailey, for whom he played at Troy State and worked as an assistant coach with the Dallas Cowboys.


Last fall, Robinson worked with standout receivers Kerry Watkins and Will Glover, who both finished among the top five receivers in Georgia Tech history. Watkins earned all-ACC honors.

Robinson, 39, has served NFL coaching internships at New Orleans,






St. Louis and Dallas.

GLENN SPENCER

Defensive Line 3rd Year at Tech


n his third season as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Glenn Spencer is in his second season on the defensive staff, coaching Georgia Tech's defensive line. He also spent one year as the Rambling Wreck's running backs coach.

Last fall, Spencer worked with a very young defensive front that started two freshmen and two sophomores and remained productive despite the loss of its top player, all-America defensive end Greg Gathers.

As Tech's running backs coach in 2001, Spencer tutored all-Atlantic Coast Conference tailback Joe Burns, who became just the fifth 1,000-yard rusher in Georgia Tech history and is now with the NFL's Buffalo Bills.

Spencer returned to Tech in 2001 after 11 years at West Georgia, including a very successful three-year stint as head coach. He compiled a 28-7 record from 1998-2000, including two Gulf South Conference titles and two appearances in the NCAA Division II playoffs. With an .800 winning percentage, he left as the winningest coach in Gulf South Conference history.

In 1998 Spencer was named the NCAA Division II Regional Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association after guiding the Braves to a 10-2 record, the conference championship and a playoff berth in his first season as head coach. West Georgia also posted a 10-2 record





in 2000, following an 8-3 mark in 1999.

Spencer began his coaching career in 1990, when he was hired as an assistant coach at West Georgia. Spencer coached the Braves' defensive line and linebackers for seven seasons and then was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1997, when he helped the Braves to a share of the school's first Gulf South Conference title as his defense allowed fewer points than any team in West Georgia history.

Spencer, 37, lettered four years as a defensive tackle for the Rambling Wreck, including Tech's 1985 All-American Bowl season, when he was a member of the "Black Watch" defense.

A native of Douglasville, Ga., Spencer was a prep standout at Lithia Springs High School. He earned his bachelor's degree in Management from Georgia Tech in 1987.

Spencer and his wife, the former Angela Folds of Carrollton, Ga., have two sons, Luke, 7, and Abraham, 4.

JON TENUTA

Defensive Coordinator / Defensive Backs

2nd Year at Tech

on Tenuta is entering his second season as Georgia Tech's defensive coordinator and his first coaching the Tech defensive backs. This will be Tenuta's 23rd season coaching the aggressive, attacking defensive style that has become his trademark.

In 2002, two Tech defenders, free safety Jeremy Muyres and linebacker Recardo Wimbush, earned all-ACC honors after thriving in Tenuta's system.

Tenuta came to Tech in 2002 after one season at North Carolina, which he guided to become the top-rated defense in the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2001. Under Tenuta, the Tar Heels led the ACC in total defense and pass defense while ranking third in run defense and scoring defense. Two members of that defense, Julius Peppers and Ryan Sims, were first-round picks in the 2002 NFL draft.

Tenuta coached at Ohio State from 1996-2000, where he was promoted from defensive backs' coach to defensive coordinator in 2000.

He developed several Ohio State defensive backs into NFL players, including first-round draft picks Shawn Springs, Antoine Winfield, Ahmed Plummer and Nate Clements. Springs was the 1996 Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and a first-team all-America, while Winfield won the 1998 Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back.





Ohio State's pass defense was consistently ranked among the nation's best during Tenuta's tenure.

Tenuta has previously served as a defensive coordinator at five other schools, including Marshall (1987), Kansas State (1988), SMU (1990-94), Ohio State (2000) and North Carolina (2001).

Other coaching stops for Tenuta include: graduate assistant at Virginia (1981-82) and Maryland (1983); assistant coach at Vanderbilt (1984-85); assistant coach and then defensive coordinator at Marshall (1986-87), defensive coordinator at Kansas State (1988); assistant coach and then defensive coordinator at SMU (1989-94) and assistant coach at Oklahoma (1995). In 1992, SMU led the Southwest Conference in pass defense.

The Columbus, Ohio, native graduated from Virginia, where he lettered three years as a defensive back. He earned the team's John Acree Memorial Football Trophy for leadership, service and spirit during his senior season. He also won the Kevin Bowie Award as the 1980 spring football Most Valuable Player.

Tenuta, 46, and his wife Dori have three sons, Zach, Matt and Luke.

DAVID WILSON


Special Teams / Recruiting Coordinator 2nd Year at Tech

avid Wilson is in his second year at Georgia Tech but his first on the coaching on the coaching staff as a special teams coach and recruiting coordinator.

Wilson came to Tech in 2002 and spent one year as the Yellow Jackets' Director of Football Operations before moving to a coaching position.

Wilson joined the Tech staff after five years at Mississippi State, including the last year as the Bulldogs' Coordinator of Football Operations. He also spent two years (1999-00) as Mississippi State's tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator and two years (1997-98) as administrative assistant after arriving in Starkville in 1997. Director of Football Operations 6th Year at Tech

utch Brooks, a member of the Georgia Tech athletics staff since 1998, was named director of football operations in February of 2003.

Brooks, 56, came to Tech in 1998 as director of high school relations after spending 18 years as head football coach, athletics director and head golf coach at Washington-Wilkes High School in Washington, Ga. During that time he compiled a football record of 144-55, a .723 winning percentage, earning berths in the state football playoffs in 13 of his last 17 seasons at Washington-Wilkes.

In 1985, he was named the Atlanta Touchdown Club AA Coach of the Year, and in both 1991 and 1997, he was named the state AA Athletic Director of the Year.

During his time at Washington-Wilkes he coached the football team to six region championships and four appearances in the state championships while leading his golf teams to eight region titles.

Prior to his tenure at Washington-Wilkes, Brooks spent nine years (1971-80) as an assistant football coach and six years (1974-80) as



head baseball coach at Valdosta High School. He entered the Georgia high school ranks in 1970 as an assistant coach at Northside High School in Warner Robins.


Griffith, who served two years in the U.S. Army, is a 1968 graduate of Virginia Tech, where served as co-captain of the football team in 1967.







THE INSTITUTE

Technological Leadership In a Changing World

haped by the work of generations into one of the nation's most prominent public universities, the Georgia Institute of Technology has entered an unprecedented time of opportunity for innovation and leadership. "Although technology may have helped create many of the global problems we face, technology is also essential to many of the solutions," says President G. Wayne Clough. "The world needs scientists and engineers who understand the social and political implications of the technology they create. It needs management strategies, public policies, and structures that put technologies to positive, effective use."

Georgia Tech's goal is to become a source of the innovation that creates a sustainable, prosperous future for the Earth's inhabitants, and there are many signs that the Institute is on the fast track. U.S. News & World Report ranks Tech among the nation's top ten public universities, its College of Engineering among the top five programs, and its College of Computing among the top fifteen. The Almanac of Architecture and Design puts the College of Architecture in the nation's top five.

Factors like strong national rankings, a rigorous curriculum, a world-renowned faculty, and endowed scholarships enable the Institute to recruit outstanding students. Admission test scores and grade point averages are among the highest at the nation's public universities. Over the past two years Tech students have won virtually all of the world's most prestigious scholarships, including the Rhodes, Fulbright, British Marshall, Churchill, Truman, Gates Cambridge, and Goldwater scholarships.

As the caliber of its students has increased, the Institute has worked deliberately to strengthen and improve the undergraduate experience. At many major universities, research takes priority over teaching. However, Georgia Tech views itself as a community of learners, all engaged together in the discovery of knowledge. All faculty, even senior eminent scholars, are directly engaged with undergraduates in an effort to offer them the

best of both worlds: the attention to quality teaching of a liberal arts college and the exciting dynamics of discovery in the research lab

The faculty is also achieving new levels of excellence, and 54 new faculty chairs endowed by the Campaign for Georgia Tech are enabling the Institute to attract some of the brightest minds in science and technology. Young faculty won nine CAREER Awards from the National Science Foundation during the past year, bringing and the total number of CAREER Award winners on the Tech faculty to 81, second highest in the nation. Senior faculty also continue to win awards, many of them the highest honors offered in their fields.

Diversity is the key to creative thinking, innovation, and problem solving in a global environment, and Georgia Tech is the national leader in graduating African American and Hispanic engineers. Last year the Institute marked the 50th anniversary of the enrollment of women, and Tech also leads the nation in graduating female engineers at all degree levels combined.

The Institute opened its doors in 1888 with 129 students—all white males, all but one from Georgia. Today, Tech's enrollment of more than 15,000 includes students from all 50 states and more than 3,000 international students from some 124 nations. Female enrollment has grown from two in 1952, when the first women students were admitted, to nearly 4,500, and minority enrollment is over 5,000.

Since 1888, when only a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering was offered, Tech's academic programs have expanded to include six world-class colleges: Architecture, Computing, Engineering, Liberal Arts, Management, and Sciences. Tech now offers degrees in 31 undergraduate programs, 45 masters degrees and 26 doctoral degree programs.

While most Tech students pursue their studies in Atlanta, a growing number earn degrees without ever setting foot on the Midtown campus. GT Lorraine, Tech's campus in Metz, France, enrolls 240 graduate students

and has begun an undergraduate degree program. Georgia Tech degrees can also be earned in Singapore through a partnership with the National University of Singapore, and in southeast Georgia, where more than 400 students are enrolled in the Georgia Tech Regional Engineering Program. Other students earn master's degrees in engineering over the Internet through programs designed specifically for online delivery.

Another aspect of Georgia Tech's enlarged vision is reflected in the Institute's increasing involvement in national policy discussions. Beyond creating new technology, Tech seeks to put it to work in responsible ways to promote a sustainable quality of life for all people. This effort to place technology in its broader societal context begins with President Clough, who serves on President Bush's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology and the executive committee of the U.S. Council on Competitiveness, and extends to faculty members like Aris Georgakakos, whose computerized monitoring system for the Nile River is designed to guide the nations through which it flows in making responsible policy decisions about water usage.

More than a century ago, Georgia Tech shops produced castings, fittings, and gears for industry. Today Tech helps industries with the innovation that will keep them competitive in the new knowledge economy of the 21st century. Georgia Tech ranks among the nation's top universities in the percentage of research it conducts with industry and is considered the nation's best at transferring new technology from the research lab into practical applications and commercial products.

To shape a campus worthy of its aspirations, Georgia Tech continues not only to build

innovative state-of-the-art facilities, but also to gather related programs in strategically located interdisciplinary "neighborhoods" in a sustainable, "living" campus. Technology Square, which opens this fall, expands the campus across the interstate and places the DuPree College of Management, distance learning and continuing education programs, and economic development activities in the middle of the Midtown business community. It also includes the new and expanded Georgia Tech Bookstore and other retail outlets.

Closer to the heart of campus in the new Life Sciences and Technology Complex, the Ford Environmental Science and Technology Building, the largest academic structure in Tech history, has opened and the Whitaker Biomedical Engineering Building is nearing completion. Toward the western end of campus where many residence halls are located, a new student recreation center surrounds and encloses the Olympic swimming pool. Next door in the new Joseph B. Whitehead Building, the Dr. Edward Roe Stamps III Health Services offers expanded health and wellness programs. And of course, the magnificent expansion of **Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field** gives Tech fans one of the most unique venues in college football.

But even in the midst of change, Georgia Tech continues to hold fast to the best of its traditions. "We are moving rapidly in our quest to become a leader that others want to emulate," Clough says, "but our success will come from balancing that quest with a steadfast commitment to the core values and traditions that have made Georgia Tech great."

OLYMPIC GAMES LEGACY

Georgia Tech's role as the site for the Olympic village in 1996, as well as venues for boxing and aquatics, provided a unique opportunity to showcase the Institute to the entire world.

nd Georgia Tech did just that, with thousands of news reports about the Institute broadcast or published around the United States and throughout the world. From its unique role as host of the Olympic village, to studies of the impact of sports drinks on Olympic athletes, to the analysis of world class divers from the 10-meter platform, Georgia Tech was spotlighted around the world.

The centerpiece of Georgia Tech's Olympic efforts was the Olympic Village. The majority of the more than 10,000 Olympic athletes were housed on the Tech campus during the Games. In preparation, Tech's housing facilities underwent a \$170 million facelift that resulted in the construction of 4,700 new student beds.

The new housing features apartment-style accommodations with private bathroom, kitchen and sitting area in each suite. New facilities include the Undergraduate Living Center, Graduate Living Center, Eighth Street Apartments, Sixth Street Apartments, Center Street Apartments, Hemphill Apartments and Fourth Street Apartments, as well as the University Apartments, now used by Georgia State University. Existing housing facilities were also renovated for the Games.

FutureNet, the largest fiber optic cable system on any college campus in the country is being used to supplement teaching, tap the Internet, and improve electronic delivery of information.

The Georgia Tech Plaza was constructed on the Tech campus to provide recreational and social activities for the athletes. The seven-acre

plaza is located at the heart of campus and includes the Alumni Fountain, a 150-foot tall campanile, a 300-seat amphitheater and a large lawn area to accommodate outdoor events.

Olympic competition was held on the Tech campus in boxing and aquatic events, which included swimming, diving, synchronized swimming, water polo and the swimming portion of modern pentathlon. These events featured nearly 1,500 athletes competing in 50 medal events.

To host the aquatic events, a new state-ofthe art natatorium was constructed on the west side of campus. Located adjacent to the Callaway Student Athletic Complex (SAC), the Georgia Tech Aquatic Center was officially dedicated August 1, 1995, at a cost of \$21 million, funded entirely by ACOG. The facility was covered but open-air for the Games, seating 14,000 and providing a dramatic setting for the competition.

Tech now reaps the benefits of a worldclass aquatic facility capable of hosting major competitions. Opening in 2003 is a new student recreation center surrounding and enclosing the swimming facility.

Tech's prominent role in the Olympics enabled the Athletic Association to upgrade practically every one of its major facilities in a very short period of time.

Boxing was held on campus in the recreated Alexander Memorial Coliseum at McDonald's Center, the home of Georgia Tech basketball. Tech's historic arena, built in 1956, reopened on Jan. 21, 1996, after undergoing a

nine-month, \$13-million facelift that upgraded virtually every aspect of the interior and exterior. The result is a modern, first-class arena that seats 10,000 while preserving the intimacy and tradition of the "Thrillerdome."

Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field was not used for Olympics competition, but Tech's football facility provided a meeting and recreational area in the Village.

Also completed in time for the Olympics was the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance, a unique facility that offers athletes the latest technology to improve performance levels. Olympic athletes were treated in Georgia Tech's main training facility on the ground floor of the Center for Sports Performance.



TECH TRADITION



It was September 30, 1961. The opponent was Rice University for the home opener. For the first time, the official Rambling Wreck car was unveiled to 43,501 fans at Grant Field, leading the Georgia Tech football team onto the field. It has happened at every home game since.

he event did not establish a new tradition at Georgia Tech, but it cemented one. The vehicle, a restored 1930 Model A Ford Sport Coupe, was Tech's first official Rambling Wreck car.

Since that time, the Rambling Wreck car has joined a much older tradition—the Yellow Jacket—as an official school mascot.

The current Wreck is the latest in a line of distinctive white and gold cars on campus. Before the official Rambling Wreck appeared in 1961, several fraternities took turns driving such vehicles.

The first reference to a Rambling Wreck was applied to a 1914 Ford owned by Floyd Field, Dean of Men. The *Technique* student newspaper was the first published reference to the car as the "Rambling Wreck" in 1927. The paper spoke out against Field when he considered trading the car that year, but he disposed of it anyway.

The *Technique* maintained the tradition by sponsoring a yearly collegiate auto race from Atlanta to Athens, beginning in 1929, known as the "Old Ford" race or the "Flying Fliwer" race. As the years went by, though, the race became too dangerous, and it was discontinued.

In its place, the school instituted the familiar Rambling Wreck Parade, which is still held every year during Homecoming Weekend. The event challenges students to produce outlandish "mechanical monstrosities" capable of traversing a short course on campus.

Tech officials decided in the late 1950s that the school needed an official car that would be known forever as the Rambling Wreck. Vice President and Dean of Students James Dull began a search for a pre-1940 vintage model, and finally found one—parked in front of his apartment building. The owner, Capt. Ted J. Johnson, a Delta Air Lines pilot, had just finished restoring the 1930 Ford Cabriolet Sport Coupe, which he intended to give to his son as a gift.

Johnson decided to let Tech have the car for \$1,000 in May, 1961. He later returned the purchase price of the Wreck to the Athletic Association in the form of a contribution to the Alexander-Tharpe Fund, fulfilling a desire to go on record as having given the Rambling Wreck to Georgia Tech.

The Wreck was completely restored again in 1982, under the supervision of Tech alumnus Pete George, manager of the Ford assembly plant in Hapeville, Ga.

White & Gold

n the fall of 1891, before Georgia Tech organized a football team of its own, a game was scheduled between Auburn and Georgia. Due to the rivalry established in baseball games between Tech and Georgia, the Tech students were invited to the game to cheer, of course, for Auburn.

The students appointed a committee to recommend colors to be worn and cheers to be used at the game. The committee suggested white and gold, and about 200 students attended the game wearing those colors for the first time.

In 1893, when Tech's football team played Georgia for the first time, a group of young women from the Lucy Cobb Institute for Girls, dressed in white and gold, attended the game to cheer for Tech. These ladies were some of the earliest Tech supporters to show their allegiance by wearing white and gold.

Oh well it's up with the White and Gold Down with the Red and Black Georgia Tech is out for the victory We'll drop the battle axe on Georgia's head

When we meet her, our team is sure to beat her

Down on the old farm there will be no sound

Till our bow-wows rip through the air When the battle is over, Georgia's team will be found

Rat Caps

Tech has several customs especially created for its freshman class members. One of the oldest freshman traditions, wearing Tech's gold-colored rat cap, originated with the ANAK society in 1915. The term rat, originally used for first-year military students, gradually expanded to include all freshmen.

The rat cap has been a distinctive symbol of membership in Tech's freshman class. Freshmen are to decorate their rat caps by writing winning football scores upright, losing scores upside down, and tie scores sideways. Co-ops circle the top button.

"I'm a Ramblin' Wreck from Georgia Tech and a Hell of an Engineer . . . "

t is doubtful that anything has ever meant as much to an American college as has this Georgia Tech fight song, a curious mixture of words and music that grew out of an old folk ballad, "The Sons of the Gamboliers." Since the early 1900s, it has been one of the most important vehicles in making Tech's name known around the world and in the development of the school as one of the most cosmopolitan institutions of higher learning in America.

Howard D. Cutter, a member of the first four-year graduating class who earned his mechanical engineering degree in 1892, wrote in the November-December 1942 issue of the *Georgia Tech Alumnus* that the "Ramblin' Wreck" had its beginnings during the first two years after Tech opened in 1888, inspired when almost the entire student body traveled to Athens to see Tech's baseball team defeat Georgia.

By the early 1900s, "Ramblin' Wreck" was an established tradition. The earliest existing published version of the song appeared in the *Blueprint*, the Institute's yearbook, in 1908.

George P. Burdell

n 1927, a Tech tradition began when a mythical student named George P. Burdell appeared on class rosters, registration forms and grade reports, and he has since become one of Tech's most notable students.

The most accurate accounts claim that Burdell was the creation of student Ed Smith. While completing an application form, Smith was struck with the impish idea of enrolling a non-existent student. He even turned in separate exam papers for Burdell, convincing professors that George was a student in good standing. Burdell received a bachelor's degree from Tech and later a master's degree.

Since Smith's graduation, other students have kept George P. Burdell alive. In the spring of 1969, the first quarter that Tech used completely computerized registration, George beat the system by registering for every course the school offered—more than 3,000 credit hours.

Today, members of the Tech band delight in having George P. Burdell paged in opposing stadia.

In 1910, Michael A. Greenblatt, Tech's first bandmaster, discovered the band playing "Ramblin' Wreck" to the tune of "Sons of the Gamboliers," and made his first arrangement of the song in the form of a handwritten manuscript.

When Frank Roman succeeded Greenblatt as bandmaster in 1911, he wrote a new adaptation of "Ramblin' Wreck," accompanied by many trumpet flourishes, that was played by every name band in the country and became nationally known on radio. His is the version that continues to be popular today.

The fame of the song spread to such proportions that in 1959 it was sung by Richard Nixon and Nikita Khrushchev at their historic face-to-face meeting in Moscow.

In 1984, the law firm of Newton, Hopkins & Ormsby investigated the copyright situation as it applied to "Ramblin' Wreck" and found that a number of people have had vari-

ous versions of the song copyrighted.

The Yellow Jacket


The Yellow Jacket nickname and mascot are two of the most beloved trademarks of Georgia Tech athletic teams, but many conflicting accounts exist as to the origins and beginnings of the Yellow Jacket.

One thing that is clear, however, is that the nickname did not grow out of the familiar six-legged insect, but that the insect mascot, known as "Buzz," grew out of the nickname. As far as can be determined, the first reference to Tech students as "Yellowjackets" appeared in the *Atlanta Constitution* in 1905 and came into common usage at that time.

Historians say the name, spelled as one word, was first used to describe supporters who attended Tech athletic events, dressed in yellow coats and jackets. The actual mascot was conceived at a later date, still undetermined.

Other common nicknames which have applied to Georgia Tech teams include Engineers; the Tecks, the first known nickname which was phased out sometime around 1910; and the Blacksmiths, which was common between 1902 and 1904 and is thought to be an invention of sportswriters at the time.

The Golden Tornado is another former nickname thought to be created by sportswriters when John Heisman led Tech to its first national championship in football in 1917. Any Tech team thereafter which approached the same level of excellence was referred to as the Golden Tornado. The nickname was used as late as 1929, when Tech defeated California in the Rose Bowl.

riginally built in 1913 by members of the Georgia Tech student body, Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field is the oldest on-campus stadium in NCAA Division I-A, but the venerable stadium adds another chapter to its storied history with a new look and an expanded capacity.

Completed for 2003 is a two-year expansion and renovation that raised capacity to 55,000 seats and added numerous amenities. The \$70 million endeavor includes the expansion and renovation of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field and the rebuilt Russ Chandler Stadium, Tech's 4,157-seat baseball facility.

The focal point of the project is the new North end zone structure, which seats 15,678 in two levels and also includes 10 luxury suites as well as the Howard Ector Letterwinners Lounge. The North end zone also features a new locker room, a state-of-the-art players' lounge and media area, and football coaches' offices

that overlook the playing field.

In addition to the rebuilt seating area, the new lower East structure features 20 executive suites as well as 2,040 chair-backed club seats between the 25-yard lines and a private air-conditioned lounge for those patrons. The popular upper East stands remain in place with cosmetic improvements.

At the South end of Bobby Dodd Stadium, 2,970 seats were added in front of the Wardlaw Building, providing seating in the South end zone for the first time since 1985. The new South end zone seating and the lower levels of the East and North stands form a three-sided bowl.

Construction began immediately following the 2001 season, with the first phase completed for the 2002 season, when capacity was 43,719. The first phase saw the completion of the lower bowl seating in the South, East and North areas of the stadium.

Also as part of phase one, a new natural grass playing surface and drainage system was

installed, and the field was shifted approximately 30 feet to the north and 15 feet to the west.

Program management was provided by Carter/Turner, a joint venture of Carter & Associates and Turner Construction, while HOK Sport was the project's architect.

Georgia Tech's football facility was known as Grant Field until April of 1988, when the Georgia State Board of Regents voted to add the name Bobby Dodd Stadium in honor of the legendary coach who guided the Rambling Wreck to its most illustrious football era. The "Gray Fox," a member of the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame, compiled a 165-64-8 record from 1945-66, and tutored 21 all-Americas as he led Tech to 13 bowl trips during his 22-year stay as head coach.

Dodd served as Tech's director of athletics from 1951-76 and then worked as a consultant for the alumni association until his death in 1988 for a 57-year association with the Institute.

The name change was the first for the

facility since it was named Hugh Inman Grant Field in 1914 after a gift from John W. Grant, a member of the Tech Board of Trustees and a well-known Atlanta merchant.

The Grant family did not give the land on which Grant Field is built. However, they did give the initial \$15,000 used in 1913 to build the first permanent concrete stands on the west side of the field. In gratitude for the gift, the Board of Trustees named the field Hugh Inman Grant Field in memory of Grant's deceased son.

The students who built Grant Field 90 years ago wouldn't recognize the home of Georgia Tech football if they saw it now. Not only has the skyline around the stadium changed dramatically, but the facility has steadily grown and improved during its rich history.

The original concrete West Stands were largely built by Tech students and seated 5,600. The concrete East Stands were completed in time for the 1924 season. A year later, the South Stands were finished, bringing the seating capacity to approximately 30,000.

Growth of the stadium has been steady through the years. In 1948, the West Stands were rebuilt, which raised the capacity to 40,000, and a new press box, then the largest in the South, was constructed. The all-steel North Stands were erected in 1958 to bring the seating to 44,105.

A second deck was added to the East side in 1962, increasing the stadium capacity to 53,300. The facility was expanded again in 1967, when the West Stands were double-decked to bring capacity to its high of 58,121. That project also included new press and photo

levels, including an elevator. New scoreboards were added prior to the 1982 season.

Following the 1985 seasons, the historic South Stands, which formed the familiar U-shape on North Avenue, were razed. In their place is the William C. Wardlaw Center, a multi-purpose facility for Georgia Tech's athletic and academic departments that was opened for the 1988 season. Seating capacity was reduced to 46.000.

A major renovation of the stadium was completed prior to the 1992 season with the construction of the Bill Moore Student Success Center behind the West Stands, as well as the addition of 32 executive suites and the renovation of the President's Box and press level.

This project also included the Roy Richards Festival under the West Stands, a unique concession and concourse area modeled after the design of Underground Atlanta. The Georgia Tech Letterwinners Club was housed on the Terrace Level of the Richards Festival before moving in 2003 to the North end zone.

Natural grass returned to Grant Field in 1995 after 24 seasons with artificial turf. The field was originally surfaced with Astroturf in 1971 and resurfaced in 1979, and then new artificial All-Pro Turf was installed in 1988.

Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field is located at the heart of the Georgia Tech campus on Techwood Drive, bordered by North Avenue on the south and Bobby Dodd Way on the north.

Tech has hosted numerous crowds which have exceeded capacity, the largest of which was the 60,316 spectators for the Georgia game in 1973.







WARDLAW CENTER

One of the cornerstones of the Georgia Tech campus, the William C. Wardlaw Center in the South end zone of Bobby Oodd Stadium / Grant Field serves many purposes for Rambling Wreck athletics and the Institute.

ntil the conclusion of the 1985 football season, the South end of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field was enclosed by a 12,000-seat grandstand. The familiar U-shaped South Stands, originally built in 1925, were torn down following Tech's season-ending victory over Georgia to make room for the Wardlaw Center, a multi-million dollar facility that was completed for the 1988 football season.

The Wardlaw Center took on a new look beginning in 2002 with the addition of appproximately 3,000 seats in the South end zone of Bobby Dodd Stadium.

The 70,000 square-foot, six-level, multiuse facility was built at a cost of \$12 million. Work on the project began in the summer of 1986, after the South Stands were razed in March of 1986.

The Wardlaw Center serves as the gateway

for the campus at North Avenue. The building is dedicated to 1928 Tech alumnus William C. Wardlaw, Jr., a long-time associate of the Georgia Tech Athletic Association as a member of the Athletic and Alexander-Tharpe Fund boards. He was also the past president of the Investment Committee of the Georgia Tech Foundation.

The ground floor of the building houses the Hugh Spruill Strength and Fitness Center, widely regarded as one of the top facilities of its kind in collegiate athletics. A locker room for visiting football teams is in the same area.

Television and photography studios are also located on the ground floor, while two levels of parking occupy the second and third floors.


The fourth floor, entered through an attractive plaza on North Avenue, houses the Georgia Tech Foundation offices along with the Frank Gordy Room, a large banquet facility. On this level, large windows and a terrace along the back side of the building allow guests to look out on Grant Field.

The fifth floor houses several Georgia Tech departments, including Development, while the sixth level is divided into 12 luxurious suites for viewing Rambling Wreck football.



The building now forms eral activities of the Placement Center, providing a centralized location for prospective students as well as those already enrolled at the

Institute. Another key feature is the Eugene M. Clary Theater.

The Bill Moore Student Success Center is the focal point of Phase II of the renovation of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field, which also included a new look for the West stands. Thirtytwo enclosed suites were added to the West

Stands prior to the 1992 season. The President's Suite was expanded and refurbished and integrated directly into the Success Center so that it can be used for numerous functions.

The Richards Festival concourse area under the West Stands connects Bobby Dodd Stadium to the Student Success Center.



STRENGTH CENTER

Outstanding Facility & Programs Help Student-Athletes Reach Their Potential

n integral component in Georgia Tech's 17-sport athletic family is the strength and conditioning program, and the most visible sign of Tech's commitment in this area is the Hugh Spruill Strength Center, one of the finest facilities in the nation.

The Hugh Spruill Strength and Fitness Center is a 10,000-square-foot weightlifting facility on the ground floor of the William C. Wardlaw Center, located at the South end of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field.

It houses the finest free weight and machine equipment, custom-designed and built to the needs of the strength and conditioning staff by Sorinex and also contains machines made by BodyMaster and Hammer Strength.

In addition to the weight equipment, audiovisual instruments have been incorporated to assist in technique instruction, and a computer system assists in handling data and developing weight programs.

A 3,000-square foot exercise room is also

a part of the complex, complete with an Astroturf surface for plyomet-ric, flexibility and agility drills.


Director of Player Development Ed Ellis is in his third year at Georgia Tech. The 2000 College Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year for the Atlantic Coast Conference by the National Strength and Conditioning Association, Ellis has set numerous world and national drug-free powerlifting records, including a world record in the bench press with a lift of 620 pounds.


The strength and conditioning staff also includes Scott Sinclair, Scott McDonald, Eddie Lee Ivery, Steve Tamborra, Tredell Dorsey and Ellie Rowland.

The facility, which was recently remodeled, contains a tribute to the late Dave Pasanella, Tech's former Director of Player Development and a Rambling Wreck letterman in 1983-84. The "Strongest Man in the World" and the holder of 14 world weightlifting records, Pasanella died tragically in an automobile accident in 1990.

The aim of the strength program is to aid the student-athlete's performance by improving his strength and conditioning level, thus allowing him to better perform particular sports skills.

"Strength and conditioning is as important as any sport we have at Georgia Tech," says **Director of Athletics Dave Braine.**





Center, the Hearn Center houses staff offices and facilities to support the academic endeavors of Tech student-athletes. The academic support unit includes seven advisors who are available throughout the day and evenings until 10 p.m.

The academic support program is under the direction of Jim Stevens, Director of Academic Services, a Georgia Tech graduate who lettered in football and basketball, a U.S. Air Force veteran and a former member of the Tech faculty. The staff includes eight academic advisors.


The Hearn Center, which originally opened in 1984, underwent a major renovation in 1995 and now includes over 5,000 square feet of open and self-contained work area. Eighteen rooms of varying sizes flank a glass enclosed computer cluster that contains both Macintosh and IBM-compatible hardware, Internet access and laser printers. A smaller computer room is available for tutoring courses that require computing or software to enhance learning. Hardware and software are continuously updated.

The staff of the Hearn Center coordinate scholarships, academic awards and honors for student-athletes. Assistance with graduate school applications and degree completion programs is also provided.

Study and tutoring rooms vary in size and offer secluded environments in which to work. Tutoring for classes ranging from calculus

to advanced engineering courses is scheduled nightly, Sunday through Thursday.

The Hearn Academic Center, staff and programs offer the finest and most innovative educational advantages in the country. Studentathletes are provided a convenient place to study, access computers, and meet with tutors and advisors.



DEGREE COMPLETION

One day the cheers from the stands will stop, but the support for Rambling Wreck student-athletes continues in the form of Georgia Tech's degree completion program.

eorgia Tech offers its studentathletes one of the most comprehensive academic support systems in the country. Academic support is available until a diploma is attained through Georgia Tech's degree completion program. This program allows former student-athletes to continue toward their degrees after they have completed their athletic eligibility or left Tech for professional athletics.

Former Tech athletes who have returned to school through the program and earned their degrees include NFL veterans such as Eddie Lee Ivery, Pat Swilling, Al Richardson, Gary Lee, William Bell, Ryan Stewart, as well as NBA standouts John Salley and Tom Hammonds and major league baseball player Riccardo Ingram.

The program provides for 100 percent reimbursement of academic costs upon earning a passing grade in courses required for graduation. In exchange for financial support, the students work as interns in the Athletic Association, thereby gaining valuable work experience.

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FACILITIES

HOMER RICE CENTER FOR SPORTS PERFORMANCE

In an effort to keep the Georgia Tech program at the forefront of collegiate athletics and carry the Rambling Wreck into the 21 st century, the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance, a unique, ultramodern facility for testing and improving athletic performance, opened in 1996.

ocated at the north end of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field, the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance is comprised of six sports performance clinics which occupy 44,000 square feet of the Arthur B. Edge Intercollegiate Athletics Center at the J.C. "Bud" Shaw Sports Complex. The \$8 million facility also includes the Howard Candler, Jr., Football Conference Center and the George Mathews Athletic Heritage Center, a museum of Tech's rich athletics history.

The Center is in partnership with the Institute to establish a research and development entity focused on the studies of human movement. The Center's efforts concentrate on performance enhancement for student-athletes participating in the sports programs of the Georgia Tech Athletic Association with services also available for Tech students, faculty and staff.

"The Sports Performance Center and the programs it encompasses will take us to the next level to provide our student-athletes with total development—academically, athletically, professionally and personally," said Rice, who retired in 1997 after 17 years as Tech's Director of Athletics.

The Center, under the direction of Rob Skinner, utilizes the philosophy that goals must first be defined before they can be reached. To accomplish this, a staff of highly trained specialists uses the latest in sports and medical technology to measure and record the current status of the athlete's physical and mental condition. The measurement data from each of the six performance clinics is combined to construct a comprehensive "performance profile" of the athlete. This detailed blue-print of each athlete's individual potential provides a specific starting point to customize and implement strategic goals as well as an optimum training regimen for reaching them.

The facility currently focuses on six areas related to performance: sports physiology, nutrition, sports medicine, psychology, motion analysis and vision.

The ground floor houses the Sports Medicine, Sports Physiology and Vision departments, while the second floor contains areas for Sports Psychology and Motion Analysis. Nutrition is located adjacent to the athletic dining hall in the Edge Center.

The Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance focuses on the following six areas related to athletic performance:

Sports Physiology

An athlete's undeveloped potential will be assessed by determining aerobic and anaerobic capacity, specific power outputs, biochemical profile, body composition and specific exercise tolerance levels. The optimum training regimen can now be established according to the current conditioning capacity of the athlete. Operated by Cardiology of Georgia, P.C., the medical clinic staff includes a sports cardiologist and an exercise scientist.

Motion Analysis

Athletes can fine-tune skills by comparing their motion dynamics for optimum standards. Through the American Sports Performance Institute, the clinic is staffed by a biomechanist and a senior research engineer, who use high-speed, motion-capture equipment to assess human movement in terms of speed, position, timing and force.

Sports Rehabilitation

Injury prevention and rehabilitation are delivered to achieve complete recovery while maintaining optimum conditioning, ensuring that peak performance is regained as soon as possible. The clinic is staffed by a sports physical therapist, athletic trainers and a consulting sports medicine surgeon.

Georgia Tech's sports medicine department offers an experienced staff and the finest equipment and techniques available to care for Tech's student-athletes.

eorgia Tech offers a comprehensive quality care package. All 17 varsity sports fall under the jurisdiction of Director of Sports Medicine Jay Shoop and his staff.

Shoop has more than 30 years of experience in athletic training at the collegiate and professional levels. His staff includes assistant athletic trainers Clay Farr, Tim Hansen, Carla Gilson, David Kloehs and Walter



Sports Psychology

By applying mental performance techniques to the "whole person," the sports psychology clinic, anchored by a sports psychologist, assists the athlete in opening a clear mental pathway for enhancing concentration and confidence.

Sports Nutrition

A personal plan is developed based upon a comprehensive computerized nutrition analysis and is supported by nutritional counseling. Body composition analysis and biochemical profile results from the Sports Physiology Clinic are used to address nutritional needs. The staff includes a registered dietitian as director, and a consulting nutritionist and nutrition scientist.

Vision

The latest addition to the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance is the Sports Vision Center. Through a partnership with Dr. Barry L. Seiller, M.D. of the Vision Institute of Vernon Hills, III., and CIBA Vision, student-athletes are provided with on-site vision testing, vision correction and vision training.

Smith and physical therapist Charlie Ridgeway. They are assisted by 12 or more student trainers.

Student-athletes are treated by team physicians Dr. Angelo Galante and Dr. Frank Pickens; Dr. John Xerogeanes, the team physician for orthopedics; and Dr. Aaron King, the team dentist who fits each football player with a custom-made mouthpiece. These specialists attend practices and games and are on call for all sports. Along with the Student Health Service on campus, Atlanta offers a number of facilities available 24 hours a day for emergency care, most within blocks of the Tech campus.

Headquartered on the ground floor of the Arthur B. Edge Center, Tech's sports medicine department moved into an expanded and improved facility in 1996 in conjunction with the opening of the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance. The training room now covers 5,000 square feet, housing the finest equipment available for the prevention, treatment and rehabilitation of athletic injuries.

The latest addition to the sports medicine department was the hydro-therapy area, which features an underwater treadmill and deepwater running and exercise tank. The facility also includes Cybex testing equipment for evaluating and rehabilitating joint and muscle injuries as well as many other state-of-the-art pieces of equipment.

Georgia Tech was one of the first institutions in the country to initiate a drug screening program for its athletes, a practice which has been followed by many other programs.

J.C. "BUD" SHAW SPORTS COMPLEX


ocated at the corner of Techwood Drive and Bobby Dodd Way, the J.C. "Bud" Shaw Sports Complex houses one of the most complete athletics facilities in the nation, encompassing the Arthur B. Edge, Jr., Center, the home of the Georgia Tech Athletic Association and the Alexander-Tharpe Fund; the Andrew Hearn, Sr., Academic Center, the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance, the George W. Mathews, Jr., Athletic Heritage Center, the Howard Candler, Jr., Football Conference Center, and the new North End Zone complex that now houses the football program.

A former Tech basketball player, J.C. "Bud" Shaw graduated from Georgia Tech in 1950 with a degree in Textile Engineering and has been affiliated with the textile industry since his graduation. He is currently Chairman of the Board Emeritus of Shaw Industries, the world's largest carpet manufacturer.

Landscaping for the J.C. Shaw Sports Complex was provided through the generosity of John A. Williams and Post Properties, Inc. Williams, founder and former Chairman of the Board of Post Properties, Inc., is a 1961 graduate of Georgia Tech in Industrial Management.







THE EDGE CENTER

The Arthur B. Edge, Jr., Intercollegiate Athletics Center is the headquarters for the Georgia Tech athletics family. The four-story, seven million dollar facility, which opened in February, 1982, is part of the J.C. "Bud" Shaw Sports Complex. The Edge Center contains more than 65,000 square feet of space and houses administrative offices, the Hearn Academic Center, training room, and dining hall, plus a number of other facilities.

Financed entirely by gifts and contributions from Georgia Tech alumni and friends, the Edge Center was dedicated on Oct. 30, 1982. Since then, the facility has undergone several facelifts, most notably the addition of the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance in 1996.

The latest renovation, completed in 1999 at a cost of \$520,000, involved the move of the Georgia Tech Ticket Office, which is now accessible from street level on Bobby Dodd Way. Directly above the ticket office are the administrative offices of Director of Athletics Dave Braine and his senior staff.

Offices for various administrative departments and sports programs are located on the first floor. The dining hall is located on the second floor, which connects to the Howard Candler, Jr., Conference Center.

The Andrew Hearn, Sr.,
Academic Center comprises the
majority of the third floor. Another
feature is a chapel, displaying an etched glass mural
of Tech athletes in a praying stance.

The ground floor of the Edge Center includes Tech's primary training room, which connects to the new North End Zone complex that houses the football offices and locker room.

Perhaps it is not what is in the Edge Center which makes it so unique, but the way the center houses it. A visitor can't help but be impressed upon entering the building through the entrance plaza to the first floor and seeing the lobby rise through the top floor to a glass atrium.

FOOTBALL COMPLEX

The newest addition to the J.C. "Bud" Shaw Sports Complex is the new complex in the North end zone of Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field, which now houses the football program. The ground floor of the two-story structure features a new locker room, equipment room and players' lounge. The second floor is a new office suite for the football coaches' and staff that overlooks the playing field. On the third floor is the Howard Ector Letterwinners' Lounge.

The lobby is decorated with the "Circle of Champions," an elaborate display honoring all of Tech's individual and team national championships, including four national football titles. The "Circle of Champions" leads to the George W. Mathews, Jr., Athletic Heritage Center, a museum that chronicles Tech's rich athletics history. The Heritage Center is part of the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance, which was built as an extension to the Edge Center.

The Edge Center is named in honor of Arthur B. Edge, Jr., a prominent Tech alumnus and former president of Callaway Mills.

mission of the George W. Mathews, Jr., Athletic
Heritage Center.

Located within the J.C. Shaw Sports Complex on the second floor of the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance, the Center chronicles Tech's history in all sports, with emphasis on the accomplishments of the football program. Static displays of trophies and

memorabilia are augmented by video kiosks and interactive displays that bring to life Tech's storied athletic past.

Opened in May of 1996, the Center also includes a theater where Tech fans can view highlight films covering achievements such as Tech's 1990 national championship in football, the 1990 NCAA men's basketball Final Four, and the 1994 College World Series.

A 1948 graduate of Georgia Tech in Industrial


Management, George W. Mathews, Jr., played football for two of Tech's legendary coaches, William Alexander and Bobby Dodd, participating in the Orange Bowl in 1945 and 1948 and the 1947 Oil Bowl. Mathews is retired from Intermet Corporation, the \$500 million company he founded and the largest independent foundry in North America. The George W. Mathews, Jr., Athletic Heritage Center was made possible by a gift from the Intermet Corporation upon Mathews retirement in 1994.



Fuller E. Callaway, Jr., Plaza & Gateway to Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field

he Fuller E. Callaway, Jr., Plaza and Gateway to Bobby Dodd Stadium/ Grant Field provides an attractive entrance to Georgia Tech's historic football facility. The Plaza was temporarily relocated during the stadium expansion but will return to the North end zone.

The Plaza was dedicated in memory of Fuller E. Callaway, Jr., an internationally-recognized leader in the textile industry and a 1926 Textile Engineering graduate of Georgia Tech. His personal gifts and contributions from the Callaway Foundation, Inc., totalling millions of dollars, have funded professorships, scholarships and numerous facilities for students on the Tech campus.



Howard Candler, Jr., Football Conference Center

The Howard Candler, Jr., Football Conference Center provides Georgia Tech with perhaps the best football conference center in the nation. In addition to eight meeting rooms of various sizes, the Conference Center also houses state-of-the-art video facilities which allow the entire Center to be connected together as one, or be used as separate meeting rooms.

The late Charles Howard Candler, Jr., was a lifelong Atlantan with widespread interests in business, real estate and education. He served for 27 years as a Director of the Coca-Cola Company and also sat on several Boards, including Trust Company Bank of Georgia and the Atlantic Steel Company. The Howard Candler, Jr., Football Conference Center, which opened in May of 1996, was funded by a gift from his widow, Lee Edwards Candler.

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TOTAL PERSON PROGRAM

From national titles to Olympic medals, Georgia Tech's nationally-renowned athletics program has produced many champions. But more importantly, as a result of the Total Person Program, Tech is developing well-rounded student-athletes who go on to winning performances in a wide range of endeavors.

hrough this multifaceted program, the brainchild of retired Director of Athletics Dr. Homer Rice, Rambling Wreck student-athletes have the opportunity to learn the elements of success beyond the classroom or playing field. Athletic careers are fleeting, but Tech student-athletes gain skills that remain with them for a lifetime, preparing for the career and personal challenges ahead.

During his 17-year stay on the Flats from 1980-97, Rice rebuilt Georgia Tech's athletic fortunes with an emphasis not just in fundraising and facilities but in equally important areas such as academic support, career placement and life skills.


Since Rice started the Total Person Program in 1980, it has developed into the most comprehensive student-athlete support system in the country. Rice's model has been adopted

nationwide as the foundation for the NCAA's Life Skills Program. Because of the success of the Total Person Program, Georgia Tech was one of three schools chosen to consult with the NCAA on this project.

Current Director of Athletics Dave Braine has built upon the foundation laid by Rice with a continued emphasis on all aspects of the student-athlete's life.

"The concerns of the student-athlete must always come first," says Braine. "I want to make sure that all student-athletes have an opportunity to graduate. It is always our goal to give back a better person than we brought in."

Addressing virtually every area of a wellrounded educational experience, the Total Person Program, under the direction of Rob Skinner, focuses on the following components:

Life Skills

The foundation of the Life Skills component is the ASPIRE program: Athletes' Successful Planning in Reaching Excellence. It is an interactive workshop that challenges studentathletes to live up to their potential in every area. Incorporated with the program is training and discussion on choices, habits, life mission and goals.

All freshmen student-athletes participate in the ASPIRE program by attending weekly seminars, on topics ranging from time

eorgia Tech student-athletes are encouraged to give back to the community through a variety of outreach programs. Student-Athlete Advisory Board members often spearhead these projects and coordinate participation by their teammates.

One area of emphasis is Tech's mentoring program, in which student-athletes establish a one-on-one relationship with a youth from an Atlanta public school, including nearby Centennial Elementary School, located just minutes from the Tech campus. Each participant receives intensive mentoring training in all areas of communication: listening, verbal expression, body language and attentiveness, skills that are crucial in demonstrating to these young people that they care.

Student-athletes also visit local schools to discuss the merits of staying in school, developing character, setting goals and living up to potential. Other service projects in which Tech student-athletes participate include Special Olympics, Habitat for Humanity, and the Institute's Team Buzz Day.

management and media training to drug and alcohol awareness and diversity.

Academic Support & **Degree Completion**

eorgia Tech offers one of the most comprehensive academic support programs in the country, giving every studentathlete the best possible opportunity to earn a degree that will open doors for a lifetime.

The centerpiece of the academic support program is the Andrew Hearn, Sr., Academic Center, an ultramodern facility for studying and tutoring located in the Edge Athletic Center. Tutoring is available in a wide range of subjects, and a highly-qualified staff of academic advisors monitor academic progress.

Academic support does not end when a student-athlete's playing career is over. The degree completion program focuses on studentathletes who have completed their eligibility and provides a means for returning to school and completing any remaining coursework in order to earn a degree. Numerous former athletes have benefited from this program.

Career Planning & Placement

he career planning and placement program, headed by Director of Student Life Lucius Sanford, provides guidance well before the student-athlete's graduating guarter. Programs are offered in resume writing, interviewing skills and dressing for success, and networking luncheons put students in contact with local business leaders. Student-athletes are assisted in the pursuit of summer employment opportunities that provide meaningful work experience to prepare them for the challenges of a competitive workplace.

Counseling & Wellness

he wellness program addresses a studentathlete's physical, mental, emotional and spiritual needs. In addition to a highly-qualified sports medicine program to treat and prevent injuries, student-athletes are educated in areas such as nutrition, drug and alcohol awareness, and stress management. Christian Fellowship meetings are held weekly.

Leadership

ech student-athletes have the opportunity to develop leadership skills through the Student-Athlete Advisory Board, a group of representatives from each team that meets with athletic department administrators to help shape policies and address issues of concern.

Honors

hrough institutional, conference and national awards, student-athletes are recognized for outstanding efforts in athletics and academics and are encouraged to pursue postgraduate scholarship awards. Through the annual Total Person Awards, two seniors are honored based on outstanding athletic achievement, scholarship and character, and a former student-athlete who utilized the principles of the Total Person Program is recognized. Other annual awards include the Bobby Dodd Scholarship, the Robert Cup and Director of Athletics Dave Braine's All-Academic Team.

Community Outreach

tudent-athletes are encouraged to give back To the community through a variety of service projects, including a mentoring program with local school children.

GIVING STUDENT-ATHLETES A VOICE


Advisory Coard is a channel for interaction between student-athletes and administrators.

he Georgia Tech Student-Athlete Advisory Board has three primary functions: to act as a conduit through which athletes may be heard within the Athletic Association, to foster good relations with the campus at large, and to provide service to the community.

The Board is made up of 16 student-athletes, appointed by their respective coaches, with at least one representative from each of Tech's varsity teams. The football team, with more than 100 members, has two representatives. Officers are elected by the Board itself.

For 2003-04, the football team will be represented by junior Nate Curry and sophomore Chris Reis.

Cross country standout Amy Dock was elected President for 2003-04, while swimmer Ashley Skala is the Vice President. Tennis player

With guidance from administrators such as Rob Skinner and faculty advisor Dr. Jerry Thuesen, the Board meets several times each month. In addition, each representative meets with Director of Athletics Dave Braine at least once a month to discuss issues of concern to his or her particular team.

Skinner, who works with the Advisory Board on a day-to-day basis, sees the Board as a key element of Tech's Total Person Program, which he also oversees.

"The Advisory Board provides the athletics administration with a sense of what the needs and concerns of the student-athletes are," says Skinner. "Then we can more effectively create programs, policies, and procedures to help them be successful as students and as athletes."

The Board also helps to build morale within the Tech athletic family through the Spotlight Awards. Board members nominate and select student-athletes who are deserving of recognition for their pursuit of excellence in athletics and academics.

Another key function of the Advisory Board is community service. They recognize that student-athletes are role models and have a responsibility to give back to the community.

The last two years, the Advisory Board has sponsored a holiday toy drive in memory of Michael Isenhour, the former Tech basketball player and Board member who died in 2002 after battling leukemia.

ADMINISTRATION

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DR. G. WAYNE CLOUGH


President, Georgia Institute of Technology

he chief engineer of Georgia Tech's determined effort to provide technological leadership in a changing world is Dr. G. Wayne Clough, the Institute's tenth president and the first alumnus to serve in that capacity.

His leadership has made undergraduate education more dynamic. He implemented a required computer initiative for all students, and oversaw the revision of the curriculum to include web-based enhancements. The next step was a broad initiative to engage students more fully with faculty in the classroom and research lab, and to create more student leadership opportunities. The positive impact is reflected in higher quality students and higher retention rates.

Sponsored research has also increased every year since Clough became president. Research expenditures now exceed \$340 million a year as Tech moves into exciting interdisciplinary fields like bioengineering, sustainable technology, and nanoscience.

Clough's skills as a civil engineer are evident in reshaping the campus to meet the needs of Tech's world-class programs and students. He has overseen the construction of more than a dozen academic and research buildings, with several more on the drawing board. The campus is fully wired with 1,700 miles of fiber-optic cable and offers a comprehensive wireless environment as well.



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
To provide the additional resources required to reach this goal, Clough engineered the Campaign for Georgia Tech, which raised a record \$712 million in five years for 54 endowed faculty chairs, 233 endowed scholarships, eleven new buildings, and a host of academic, research and athletic programs.

Beyond campus, he gives Georgia Tech a face and voice in Washington, D.C., as a member of the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology and the executive committee of the U.S. Council on Competitiveness, and as chair of the National Academy of Engineering committee on the Engineer of 2020.

Since Septemger, 2001, he has represented the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) on the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division I Board of Directors.

A native of Douglas, Georgia, Wayne Clough received his bachelor's and master's degrees in civil engineering from Georgia Tech in 1964 and 1965. He earned a Ph.D. in civil engineering from the University of California, Berkeley in 1969.

He was provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University of Washington in Seattle when he answered the call to return to his alma mater as president in September of 1994. Prior to that, he had spent a decade at Virginia Tech as head of the Department of Civil



Engineering, then as Dean of the College of Engineering. He also served on the faculties of Duke and Stanford universities.

A specialist in geotechnical and earthquake engineering, he is the author of more than 120 papers and reports, six book chapters, and several widely used geotechnical computer codes. He is presently a consultant to the San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit System for ongoing major seismic retrofitting. His other interests include technology and higher education policy, economic development, diversity in higher education, and technology in a global setting.

Closer to home, he serves on the Board of Advisors for Noro-Moseley Partners, the Southeast's largest venture capital fund, and on the Board of Directors of Total System Services of Columbus, Ga. He is a member of the executive committees for the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce and Central Atlanta Progress, and a trustee of the Georgia Research Alliance. *Georgia Trend* magazine routinely includes Clough on its list of the 100 most influential Georgians.

Among his many national awards for teaching and research, Clough holds seven from the American Society of Civil Engineers and is one of a select few to have been twice awarded the Norman Medal, civil engineering's oldest honor. In 2001 he received the National Engineering Award from the American Association of Engineering Societies. He has been a member of the National Academy of Engineering for more than a decade.

Faculty Representative for Athletics

eorge Nemhauser, a professor in Georgia Tech's School of Industrial and Systems Engineering, is in his ninth year as the Rambling Wreck's Faculty Representative for Athletics.

Nemhauser, who has served on the Georgia Tech Athletic Association Board since 1989, has been a member of the Tech faculty since 1985. He came to the School of Industrial and Systems Engineering as the A. Russell Chandler Professor and was appointed Institute Professor in 1991.

The author of three books and more than 100 research papers, Nemhauser's principal research interests lie in the area of discrete optimization. He is currently working on several applications for large-scale mixed integer programming problems, especially in the area of crew and fleet scheduling in the airline industry, and he is one of the developers of MINTO, a software system for solving mixed-

integer programs.

His software has been used to develop basketball schedules for the Atlantic Coast Conference and other leagues.

Nemhauser's distinctions include membership in the National Academy of Engineering as well as the Kimball Medal and the Lanchester Prize, which he received twice from the Operations Research Society of America.

Nemhauser began his academic career in 1961 as Assistant Professor of Operations Research and Industrial Engineering at Johns Hopkins University. In 1970, he was appointed Professor of Operations Research and Industrial Engineering at Cornell University, where he later served as School Director from 1977-83.

He has also held visiting faculty positions at the University of Leeds, U.K., and the University of Louvain, Belgium, where he worked at the




Center for Operations Research and Econometrics while serving as Research Director for two years.



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

CARRYING ON THE LEGACY OF HEISMAN, ALEXANDER, DODD & RICE

One of America's most respected athletics leaders,

Dave Braine has taken the Georgia Tech program into
the new millenium in successful fashion, using the Yellow
Jackets' storied past as a guiding light along the way.

national leader in his field, Georgia Tech Director of Athletics Dave Braine has made a career out of building successful programs. As he enters his seventh year at Tech, he has overseen tremendous growth in the Yellow Jackets' overall athletics program while positioning Georgia Tech for the future with ambitious building projects.

Braine, 60, has steered the Georgia Tech Rambling Wreck into the new millennium in successful fashion, using the Yellow Jackets' rich tradition as a guiding light along the way. He follows in the footsteps of four Tech greats of the past–John Heisman, William Alexander, Bobby Dodd and Dr. Homer Rice.

The centerpiece of Tech's current building campaign is the expansion of the historic football facility, Bobby Dodd Stadium at Grant Field, which will be complete this fall. The \$70 million project that raises capacity to 55,000 while adding numerous other amenities and improvements was completed in less than two years.

Also part of the project is the new Russ Chandler Baseball Stadium, a \$9.1 million facility completed in 2002 that seats 4,157 and is one of the nation's finest baseball parks.

This fall, Tech's men's and women's swimming and diving programs will move into one of the nation's most impressive aquatics venues. The Georgia Tech Aquatics Center will feature the competition pool from the 1996 Olympic Games in an enclosed, 2000-seat arena capable of hosting major national events.

Georgia Tech's overall athletics program has enjoyed unprecedented success during Braine's tenure, highlighted by a school-record bowl streak for the football program as well as remarkable growth in women's athletics and continued excellence in sports such as baseball and golf.

The Rambling Wreck football team has played in a bowl game in each of Braine's six seasons on the Flats, an accomplishment that places Georgia Tech along with only 12 other schools in the nation. Tech's current streak ties a school record originally set from 1951-56 under legendary head coach Bobby Dodd.

More importantly, the Georgia Tech football program was honored in 2003 by the American Football Coaches' Association (AFCA) for a graduation

rate of 70 percent or better for the freshman class of 1997-98. Fewer than one-third of NCAA Division I-A schools can make that claim.

Other athletics highlights during Braine's tenure include six Top 10 national team finishes, No. 1 national rankings in baseball and golf, and nine Atlantic Coast Conference team titles in six different sports. Individual accomplishments range from Troy Matteson's 2002 NCAA title in golf to four NCAA runner-up finishes in women's track and cross country to Angelo Taylor's gold medal in track at the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games.

Matteson is also among Tech's 22 Academic All-America honorees in the last six years, including three in 2002-03 following a school-record five selections the previous year.


The addition of women's swimming and diving in 2001-02 is further evidence of Georgia Tech's commitment to women's athletics under Braine. In U.S. News & World Report's inaugural ranking of collegiate athletics programs in 2002, Tech was rated number two in the nation in gender equity.

The major role Georgia Tech plays on the national collegiate athletics landscape under Braine's leadership has never been more evident following a highly successful run as the host of back-to-back NCAA Basketball Championships with the 2002 Men's Final Four and the 2003 Women's Final Four in Atlanta. Tech now prepares to serve as the host institution for NCAA men's basketball regionals in 2004 and 2006 as well as the 2007 NCAA Men's Final Four, meaning that Tech will host three men's basketball regionals and three Final Fours in a seven-year period.

Braine currently serves on the NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee, and he previously served a two-year appointment as chairman of the NCAA Special Events Committee in 1995-96.

Total Person Concept

Inning records and all-star honors, however, are just part of the Braine athletics program. Just as he did earlier as director of athletics at Marshall and Virginia Tech, he emphasizes much more, especially the Total Person Concept, a comprehensive support program that stresses

academics and life skills and thrives on innovations.

"Everything we do is designed to enhance the college experience of the student-athlete," says Braine. "We want to make sure that all Georgia Tech student-athletes have an opportunity to graduate. It is our goal to give back a better person than we brought in."

Braine takes special pride in the Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance. "We are doing things there for our student-athletes that are totally unique," he said. "No other school in the country has the wide variety of Total Person programs that we do."

Through the Total Person Program, Tech student-athletes benefit from a number of enrichment programs ranging from life skills and career planning to wellness and community outreach. The Homer Rice Center for Sports Performance offers a motion analysis lab, a medical clinic and psychology lab which features the latest cardiology techniques, a nutrition center and a sports vision center.

Second Tech Tour of Duty

ired by President Dr. G. Wayne Clough, Braine was named Georgia Tech's director of athletics on June 3, 1997, succeeding Rice, who retired after serving as AD from 1980 until 1997. Tech's other fabled leaders of the past included Heisman (1904-1919), Alexander (1920-1950), and Dodd (1950-1976).

This is a second tour of duty for Braine at Georgia Tech. He originally came to the Flats in 1974 as defensive secondary coach on the football staff of Pepper Rodgers. He served in that capacity for two years, coaching one of the nation's top secondaries in 1974 which featured three-time all-America Randy Rhino.

Now in his 20th year as an athletics director, Braine was AD at Marshall from 1985 through 1987, during which time he oversaw the revitalization of a football program which had not had a winning record in many years. In Braine's last season, Marshall advanced to the I-AA national championship game before losing to Northeast Louisiana.

He moved to Virginia Tech and made a name for himself in a 10-year tenure in which he helped change the face of Hokie athletics. It was under Braine's leadership that Virginia Tech gained membership in the Big East Football Conference, which proved to be a stepping stone to full membership in the league.

In addition to spearheading a vast athletics building campaign, Braine saw the Hokies vault into national prominence in football while winning the National Invitation Tournament title in men's basketball and capturing the Atlantic 10 all-sports trophy five straight years.

Football Standout at UNC

native of Grove City, Pa., Braine earned his bachelor's degree (1965) as well as a master's of arts and teaching (1966) at the University of North Carolina, where he was a three-time football letterman. He was a defensive back and placekicker on the Tar Heel team that defeated the Air Force Academy in the 1963 Gator Bowl.

After teaching and coaching at Manatee High School in Bradenton, Fla., he joined the Virginia Military Institute football staff as a freshman coach in the spring of 1967, kicking off his long career in collegiate athletics. Later he coached at Richmond from 1971-73, highlighted by the Spiders' 1971 Southern Conference title and Tangerine Bowl berth.

After two seasons as an assistant coach at Tech, Braine moved to Virginia as administrative assistant and secondary coach under Dick Bestwick in 1976.



The Louisville, Ky., native attended the University of Kentucky and also served as an Infantry Officer in the United States Army. He has three children: Jay, Scott and Tracy.





Skinner is married to the former Barbara Zomberg.







The A-T Fund's primary purpose is to provide funding for the grants-in-aid for Georgia Tech student-athletes in all sports. With the increasing cost of tuition, the A-T Fund continues to face a greater challenge with every coming year. The Fund is responsible for 100 percent of the scholarship costs for student-athletes.

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SEASON REVIEW

Gailey Leads Tech to Sixth Straight Bowl in First Season


eorgia Tech, with a record of 7-6 (4-4 ACC) in 2002, equalled a school record under first-year head coach Chan Gailey by earning the school's sixth straight bowl appearance.

Gailey and the Tech seniors steered the Rambling Wreck through adversity, most notably season-ending injuries to the team's top offensive and defensive stars, to a sixth straight year of seven or more wins and a berth in the Silicon Valley Football Classic. Tech's bowl appearance gave the Jackets six in a row for the first time since the 1951-56 seasons.

That mark of consistency is notable because Georgia Tech is the only Atlantic Coast Conference school other than Florida State to play in a bowl game each of the last six years, and only the Seminoles have compiled more overall and conference victories during that time than Tech.

In fact, Georgia Tech is one of just 13 schools in the nation to play in a bowl game each of the last six years, and Gailey became just the second head coach in Tech history to guide the Jackets to a bowl game in his first season on the Flats.

Tech's 2002 edition featured a strong defensive unit, led by all-ACC free safety Jeremy Muryes and all-conference linebacker Recardo Wimbush, an offense that evolved throughout the season due to injuries in the backfield and boasted the receiving tandem of seniors Kerry Watkins and Will Glover, and a solid kicking game.



LUKE MANGET finished his career with a Tech-record 322 points, including an ACC-record 160 consecutive extra points.

Muyres led Tech with five interceptions and, with 76 tackles, finished as Tech's career leader in tackles by a defensive back. Wimbush (94 tackles) and fellow linebackers Daryl Smith (99) and Keyaron Fox (92) were the Jackets' top tacklers on a defensive unit that allowed just 20.5 points per game.

Watkins, a second-team all-ACC selection, caught a school-record 71 passes for 1,050 yards and five touchdowns, becoming just the second Yellow Jacket receiver to record a 1,000-yard season. Glover added 47 receptions for 434 yards and three scores. Sophomore tackle Nat Dorsey also earned second-team all-ACC honors.

All-ACC placekicker Luke Manget became Tech's all-time leading scorer with 322 points and made an ACC-record 160 consecutive PAT, just missing the NCAA record of 161 in a row. Senior punter Dan Dyke was a four-time Verizon Academic All-America.

The Jackets opened the 2002 season with victories over Vanderbilt (45-3) and Connecticut (31-14). In those two contests, an offensive star emerged in the person of junior tailback Tony Hollings, a converted defensive back who made his debut on offense with 297 yards and six touchdowns on just 31 carries. Tech also got solid play from quarterback A.J. Suggs, the junior transfer in his first season of eligibility, while the defense began to display the aggressive, attacking style installed by first-year defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta.


After a 24-19 loss at Clemson, the complexion of the Jackets' season began to change.

First, all-America defensive end Greg Gathers, Tech's career leader in sacks and tackles for loss, was lost for the season to a kidney ailment. Then, while the Jackets were putting the finishing touches on a 28-19 win over Brigham Young, Hollings went down with a season-ending knee injury. He was the nation's leading rusher and second-leading scorer with 633 yards (158.2 pg) and 11 touchdowns in four games. Tech also played virtually the entire year without backup tailback Sidney Ford, who was limited to one game due to a concussion.

Despite those blows, Tech managed a 21-13 road win at North Carolina in which true freshman Ajenavi Eziemefe rushed for 136 yards as the Jackets improved to 4-1.

After losses to Wake Forest (24-21) and Maryland (34-10) left Tech's record at 4-3, the Jackets regrouped to win three of the next four, including impressive victories over Virginia (23-15) and eighth-ranked NC State (24-17), and become bowl eligible.

Against the Cavaliers, another freshman running back, P.J. Daniels, provided a lift with 95 yards rushing, and Muyres' interception in the final

minutes sealed the win.

Suggs, who passed for 2,242 yards with 12 touchdowns and 15 interceptions on the season, put together his best two games in the back-to-back wins over Virginia and NC State, hitting 47 of 76 passes for 431 yards. Against the Wolfpack, he led Tech's comeback from a 17-9 fourth-quarter deficit.

But Tech's defense was the story, holding NC State 23 points below its scoring average and allowing just 57 yards rushing. The defense also performed well the following week in a 21-13 loss to Florida State, holding the Seminoles to just 279 yards, but the Jackets were undone by turnovers and a pair of big plays by FSU.

Tech earned its seventh victory with a 17-2 win over Duke in which the Blue Devils' only points came on a safety, capping a four-game stretch in which the Jackets allowed an average of 13.8 points.

In the second half of the season, senior tailback Gordon Clinkscale emerged as Tech's top ball-carrier. Little-used before this fall, Clinkscale rushed for 468 yards and averaged 6.2 yards per carry, including a career-best 94 yards and the winning touchdown against NC State. But he, too, fell victim to the injury bug, suffering a career-ending knee injury in Tech's final regular-season game.

Following a very disappointing 51-7 loss at fifthranked Georgia to close the regular season, the Jackets looked forward to the chance to face Fresno State in the Silicon Valley Football Classic. Redshirt freshman quarterback Damarius Bilbo sparked Tech's second-half comeback, but the Jackets could not overcome seven turnovers in a game that was played in a muddy quagmire. Tech fell to the Bulldogs, 30-21, to close its season with a 7-6 record.

GEORGIA TECH 45, VANDERBILT 3

Aug. 31, 2002 • Bobby Dodd Stadium at Grant Field

A.J. Suggs threw three touchdown passes and Tony Hollings ran for 153 yards, helping new coach Chan Gailey and Georgia Tech defeat Vanderbilt, 45-3, at Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field in the opener for both teams.

Hollings, a converted defensive back, became the first running back in school history to run for more than 100 yards in his first game. Suggs, a transfer from Tennessee, completed 10 of 13 passes for 132 yards in slightly more than a half.

The Yellow Jackets lost the shutout when Greg Johnson hit a 37-yard field goal with 3:26 left in the game.

It was Gailey's first college game since 1993, when he led Division I-AA Samford to a 5-6 record. Tech's 42-point margin of victory equalled the third-largest margin of victory by an Atlantic Coast Conference coach in his first game at a conference school.

In the first quarter, Gailey decided to punt on fourth-and-one from the Vanderbilt 37, drawing boos from the sellout crowd. But the move paid off when Dennis Davis downed Dan Dyke's punt at the one-yard line.

That helped set up Georgia Tech's first touchdown, a two-yard pass from Suggs to Will Glover on the first play of the second quarter. Suggs lofted the ball

to the back corner of the end zone, and Glover outjumped Dominique Morris for a 7-0 lead.

The Yellow Jackets scored on their next five possessions, taking a 38-0 lead. Hollings ran for two of the touchdowns, including a 56-yarder early in the third quarter, and Suggs threw touchdown passes to Glover and Kerry Watkins.

Luke Manget added a 37-yard field goal in the second quarter.

Backup quarterback Damarius Bilbo played with the second-team offense all night and ran five yards for his first career touchdown in the third quarter.

Vanderbilt failed to generate much offense in the first three quarters and finished with 225 yards, 78 of which came in the fourth quarter. Neither starting quarterback Jay Cutler nor backup Benji Walker were effective, combining to go 13-for-28 for 116 yards and two interceptions.

Tech punt return specialist Kelley Rhino had five returns for 110 yards to raise his career total to 798 yards, breaking the Tech career record that was set by his father, Randy Rhino (749 yards, 1972-74).

GEORGIA TECH 31, CONNECTICUT 14

Sept. 7, 2002 • Memorial Stadium • Storrs, Conn.

Tony Hollings ran for four touchdowns to tie a school record and had all 144 of his rushing yards in the first half as Georgia Tech defeated Connecticut 31-14 at Memorial Stadium in Storrs, Conn.

It was the second straight 100-yard game for Hollings, the former defensive back who moved to tailback last spring. He rushed for 153 yards in his debut in Tech's 45-3 win over Vanderbilt.


Hollings' four touchdowns matched a single-game school record held by five other Yellow Jackets. Joe Burns, the fourth-leading rusher in Tech history, last did it against North Carolina in 2000.

"No one doubted (Hollings') ability. It was just a question when it would all mesh," Gailey said.

Hollings scored on runs of 34 and 46 yards, and his other two touchdowns each came from a yard out.

The game was the first between the two teams. UConn (0-2), playing its third year in Division I-A, opened its final season at the 16,200-seat Memorial Stadium.

The Huskies were outmatched from the start by the quicker, stronger Yellow Jackets. Tech cornerback Marvious Hester recovered a fumble in UConn's opening

drive and scored three plays later on Hollings' 34-yard run three minutes into the game. The Jackets scored on three of their first four possessions.

Hollings' second TD was a one-yard run that capped a 61-yard, nine-play drive. His 46-yard score came as time ran out in the first quarter.

Georgia Tech took a 28-0 halftime lead on Hollings' one-yard run with 1:04 left in the second quarter.

Georgia Tech had 415 yards of offense, compared to UConn's 249. Tech had 226 yards on the ground and held the Huskies to 64 yards rushing.

Tech quarterback A.J. Suggs completed nine of 14 passes for 136 yards. He had high praise for his tailback Hollings.

"That's back-to-back weeks where he's come out and just opened it wide open for us," Suggs said. "It's great to have somebody of his caliber behind us." UConn finally got on the board in the fourth quarter against Tech's reserves.

Quarterback Keron Henry hit Tommy Collins for a two-yard score with 2:55 left in the game. UConn quarterback Dan Orlovsky, who started the game, threw a nine-yard touchdown pass to Brandon Young with 25 seconds remaining.

Sept. 14, 2002 • Clemson Memorial Stadium • Clemson, S.C.

Clemson's Derrick Hamilton accounted for 256 all-purpose yards, including a 77-yard touchdown run and a 79-yard punt return to set up another score to lead the Tigers to a 24-19 victory over Georgia Tech in the Atlantic Coast Conference opener for both teams at Clemson's Memorial Stadium.

Trailing 24-6, Tech got back in the game as quarterback A.J. Suggs hit tight end John Paul Foschi for a seven-yard touchdown pass late in the third quarter and then tailback Tony Hollings scored from one yard out with 3:43 to play to bring the Jackets within five points. A two-point conversion would have brought Tech within a field goal, but Suggs' pass to Foschi was short of the goal-line.

With the Yellow Jackets out of time-outs, Clemson tried to run out the clock. But quarterback Willie Simmons fumbled a shotgun snap near midfield, giving Georgia Tech its final shot. Tech linebacker Recardo Wimbush recovered to give the Jackets possession at the Tech 38-yard line with 2:07 on the clock.

Suggs hit Kerry Watkins for 14 yards and then Lekeldrick Bridges for 19 to give the Jackets a first down at the Clemson 29 with just over a minute left, but Suggs next pass was intercepted by Eric Sampson.

Hollings had his third straight 100-yard effort for the Jackets with 147 yards on 23 carries, including a 72-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. Kerry Watkins caught seven passes for 139 yards.

Suggs completed 17 of 31 passes for 201 yards and one touchdown, but he was sacked five times.

Once again, the game was decided by a single score, though the previous six games between the teams were all decided by three points.

Clemson scored on its first possession. After a Tech penalty on a punt allowed the Tigers to retain possession, Aaron Hunt's 34-yard field goal put Clemson ahead, 3-0.

After a Tech punt, Hamilton ran 77 yards for Clemson's first touchdown and a 10-0 advantage. Simmons, who was 18-of-31 for 176 yards and two touchdowns, threw a key block near the five-yard line that helped Hamilton into the end zone.

Tech responded on its next play from scrimmage as Hollings raced 72 yards around right end for a touchdown. A fumbled snap on the PAT made the score 10-6 with 5:24 left in the first quarter.

The score remained that way until late in the half, when Hamilton fielded Dan Dyke's punt at the 16-yard line and raced 79 yards before he was knocked out of bounds at the Tech five-yard line.

The Tech defense stiffened, forcing two incomplete passes and a three-yard scramble by Simmons to bring up fourth-and-goal at the two with the clock winding down. Clemson sent its field goal unit onto the field, but after a Tech timeout, the Tigers elected to go for it.

Simmons ran a naked bootleg to the left, but the Yellow Jackets had it sniffed out, so Simmons shoveled the ball to freshman Bobby Williamson in the end zone to give Clemson a 17-6 lead at half.

On their first possession of the second half, the Tigers boosted their lead to 24-6 on Simmons' 44-yard touchdown pass to Tony Elliot.

Georgia Tech responded with an 11-play, 78-yard drive capped by a sevenyard touchdown pass to from Suggs to Foschi that cut the Yellow Jackets' deficit to 24-13.

Simmons fumbled a snap away on the next possession, but Tech fumbled the ball back. Simmons then threw an interception to Kelley Rhino, but the Tigers forced a punt

Clemson's Yusef Kelly, again playing for injured starter Bernard Rambert, ran for 89 yards on 20 carries.

Tony Hollings ran for 189 yards and three touchdowns, including two fourth quarter scores, to help Georgia Tech rally past Brigham Young 28-19 before a sellout crowd at Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field in the first meeting between the

Hollings finished the game as the nation's leading rusher but sustained a knee injury late in the fourth quarter that later proved to be season-ending.

Hollings scored his second touchdown with 13:08 left, giving the Yellow Jackets the lead for good, and he added an insurance touchdown with five minutes to play.

He originally left the game in the third quarter, hurting his right knee on a two-yard run on the first drive of the half, then returned for the next series.

BYU played most of the game without leading rusher Marcus Whalen, who left early in the second quarter with a pulled groin. Freshman Curtis Brown replaced Whalen and ran for 32 yards.

Reserve quarterback Lance Pendleton took over for starter Bret Engemann in the first half and played the rest of the way, throwing for a touchdown and

running for another. The Cougars piled up 197 yards in the first half, but they were stymied by four turnovers, including three by Engemann.

Pendleton threw a 17-yard touchdown to Reno Mahe late in the third quarter to give BYU its last lead at 19-14, but Mahe was stopped short attempting a two-point conversion on a swing pass.

Georgia Tech then drove 73 yards for the go-ahead score, with Hollings chewing up 50 on the ground. He rambled in from the two, giving the Yellow Jackets a 21-19 lead.

Hollings added his third touchdown with 5:03 left to seal it.

Engemann completed his first five passes on the game's opening drive, moving the Cougars 53 yards to the Tech 27-yard line. But he threw into double coverage, and safety Jeremy Muyres intercepted the pass in the end zone.

Muyres grabbed another errant pass from Engemann late in the first quarter, leading to Hollings' first touchdown and a 7-0 lead. Engemann also lost a fumble.

Matt Payne kicked a 48-yard field goal to cut the lead to 7-3, and Pendleton ran for a two-yard touchdown on his first series to give BYU a 10-7 halftime lead.



GEORGIA TECH 21, NORTH CAROLINA 13

Sept 28, 2002 • Kenan Memorial Stadium • Chapel Hill, N.C.

Despite playing without its top offensive player, its top defensive player and its record-setting placekicker, Georgia Tech used 136 yards rushing by true freshman Ajenavi "Ace" Eziemefe and a standout performance from its defense to defeat North Carolina, 21-13, for the fifth straight year.

Eziemefe stepped in for the nation's leading rusher, Tony Hollings, out for the season with a knee injury. He went over the 100-yard mark midway through the third quarter and finished with 32 carries without a fumble as the Yellow Jackets dominated the line of scrimmage against the nation's 106th-ranked run defense.

Tech quarterback A.J. Suggs completed 15 of 27 passes for 166 yards, including a 27-yard touchdown pass to Will Glover, while backup Damarius Bilbo was 4-for-6 for 45 yards with a 10-yard scoring pass to Kerry Watkins.

The Rambling Wreck defense, playing without all-America defensive end Greg Gathers, held the Tar Heels to just 299 total yards, including only 68 yards rushing, on 52 plays. Tech's defense came up with several big plays, the biggest of which was by redshirt freshman cornerback Reuben Houston, who stripped the ball from UNC tight end Bobby Blizzard at the one-yard line, preventing a touchdown.

North Carolina trailed 14-13 at halftime and had a chance to regain the lead on its first drive of the second half when quarterback Darian Durant connected

with the 276-pound Blizzard over the middle. Blizzard warded off several tacklers and was headed for a 61-yard touchdown, but Houston stripped him of the ball at the one-yard line. It was recovered in the end zone by Jonathan Cox for a touchback.

The Jackets then drove 80 yards on 18 plays, consuming eight minutes, capped by Eziemefe's one-yard touchdown run.

Tech was stopped on the five and settled for a 23-yard field goal by backup kicker Dan Burnett, subbing for all-ACC place-kicker Luke Manget, who strained a groin muscle in warmups. But Derrick Johnson was called for running into the kicker to give the Jackets a first down at the three.

Two plays later, Eziemefe dove over the pile from the one for his second career touchdown, putting Tech ahead, 21-13.

The Tar Heels drove to the Georgia Tech 18 with less than five minutes left and trailing by eight, but Durant was dropped for a three-yard loss by defensive end Eric Henderson on third down and then sacked by linebacker Recardo Wimbush on fourth down to stop the drive.

Suggs then completed two key third-down passes that helped the Yellow Jackets run out all but 14 seconds of the clock. UNC had a chance to force a punt when Watkins caught a short pass on third down and appeared to be tackled well shy of the first down marker, but the senior managed to break a tackle and get the first down.

Georgia Tech had 125 yards of offense in the first quarter, including 41 on the ground from Eziemefe. But Suggs threw an interception on the first series and Burnett missed a 38-yard field goal on Tech's second drive as the Tar Heels grabbed an early 3-0 lead.

Suggs redeemed himself late in the second quarter with a nice play-fake on third-and-three as he found a wide open Will Glover from 27 yards out for a 14-

Backup quarterback Damarius Bilbo, who kept North Carolina's defense offbalance with a variety of draws and sprint outs, also added a first-half touchdown pass to Watkins for Tech's first score.

WAKE FOREST 24, GEORGIA TECH 21

Oct. 5, 2002 • Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field

Tarence Williams' 10-yard scoring run with 5:29 to play lifted Wake Forest to a 24-21 victory at Georgia Tech for the Demon Deacons' first victory in Atlanta since 1994.

Georgia Tech went ahead 21-16 when backup quarterback Damarius Bilbo threw a 69-yard touchdown pass to Kerry Watkins with 10:04 remaining.

But James MacPherson connected on a pair of 14-yard passes - one to Jason Anderson, the other to Fabian Davis - to move Wake Forest into scoring position.

Facing fourth-and-two at the Tech 10, the Deacons decided to go for it. Williams burst through a hole on the right side, going all the way for his first score of the season. Williams also ran in the two-point conversion to give Wake Forest a three-point cushion.

The senior running back, a 1,000-yard rusher in 2002 whose playing time had been limited while recovering from a broken foot, rushed 19 times for a season-high 99 yards.

Wake Forest, sixth in the country in rushing, piled up 209 yards on a staggering 60 carries. The Deacons finished with a 447-332 advantage in total yards and dominated the time of possession, holding the ball for nearly 38 minutes and running 92 plays to Tech's 51.

Georgia Tech twice crossed the 50 in the final five minutes, but couldn't get close enough for Luke Manget to attempt a field goal.

Starting quarterback A.J. Suggs fumbled a snap at the Wake Forest 30 to squander a 59-yard kickoff return by P.J. Daniels. Montique Sharpe recovered for the Deacons.

Tech had one more chance to at least send the game to overtime, but the drive was stifled by a penalty when Suggs threw after crossing the line of scrimmage. On fourth-and-15 from the Wake 38, Suggs' final pass was batted away by Eric King.

The Jackets were too far away for Manget to attempt a tying field goal. The kicker missed the previous game with a strained groin and was only cleared to play in pregame warmups.

Suggs completed 15-of-24 passes for 178 yards. He had a pair of touchdown passes, including a 29-yarder to Jonathan Smith on the first drive of the game.

Suggs also threw a 24-yard scoring pass to Lekeldrick Bridges with just over a minute left in the first half to give the Yellow Jackets a 14-10 halftime lead.

Matt Wisnosky missed a 42-yard field goal on the final play of the half, leaving Georgia Tech ahead.

MARYLAND 34, GEORGIA TECH 10

Oct. 17, 2002 • Byrd Stadium • College Park, Md.

Chris Downs ran for a career-high 212 yards and three touchdowns as Maryland scored 28 second-half points for a 34-10 victory over Georgia Tech in a Thursday night game at Byrd Stadium in College Park, Md.

Held to 29 yards on seven carries in the first half, Downs ran for 109 yards and two scores in the third quarter as the defending Atlantic Coast Conference champions turned a 6-3 lead into a 20-3 advantage.

Maryland coach Ralph Friedgen said his staff made several adjustments in the blocking scheme at halftime, and Downs did the rest.

After digging a huge hole for the Yellow Jackets in the third quarter, Downs put the game out of reach with 7:40 remaining, running 64 yards down the right sideline for a touchdown to make it 27-3.

Scooter Monroe had five catches for 106 yards for Maryland (5-2, 1-1), which won its fourth straight game.

A.J. Suggs went 28-for-45 for 272 yards, and Kerry Watkins had nine receptions for 127 yards to lead Georgia Tech (4-3, 1-3).

The Yellow Jackets, in their first season under coach Chan Gailey, endured their most lopsided loss since a 34-7 defeat against Florida State in 1998.

"The third quarter was obviously our undoing," Gailey said. "I don't really know what happened. I think we had guys in the right spots, but we just weren't tackling."

The Yellow Jackets were also without linebacker Keyaron Fox, who leads the team in tackles but sprained an ankle in the first half and did not return.

"He's one of our best players. Obviously, that hurts," Gailey said.

Georgia Tech also played the second half without running back Ajenavi Eziemefe, who sprained an ankle after gaining 16 yards on five carries. He's been filling in for standout Tony Hollings, whose season ended with a knee injury on Sept. 21.

Limited to 33 yards rushing in the first half, the Terrapins amassed 54 yards on the ground, all by Downs, in their opening drive of the third quarter. Downs capped the 76-yard march with a 15-yard TD run.

After a Georgia Tech punt, Downs capped an 80-yard drive by scoring from the one to make it 20-3.

The Yellow Jackets trailed at halftime despite compiling more yards (241-140) and first downs (11-7). But six penalties and a fumble in the red zone negated the edge.

Georgia Tech's first possession featured a 51-yard run by Gordon Clinkscale but ended with Luke Manget missing a 45-yard field goal.

Maryland then moved 55 yards in six plays before Nick Novak kicked a 35yarder for a 3-0 lead.

The Yellow Jackets mounted a promising drive early in the second quarter, but Eziemefe lost a fumble at the Maryland 22, and the Terrapins put together a 67-yard march that resulted in a 27-yard field goal.

Suggs then took Georgia Tech to the Maryland two before Manget kicked a 19-yard field goal. Suggs was 4-of-5 for 41 yards on the march.

GEORGIA TECH 23, VIRGINIA 15

A.J. Suggs passed for 220 yards, and Georgia Tech ran for 211 in a 23-15 Homecoming victory over Virginia at Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field that snapped the Cavaliers' six-game winning streak.

Georgia Tech (5-3, 2-3 Atlantic Coast Conference) had lost its last two games, but the Yellow Jackets built a 23-0 lead at halftime and withstood another comeback by the Cavaliers (6-3, 4-2).

Virginia, which had outscored opponents 192-76 in the second half, rallied the previous week to beat North Carolina after trailing 21-0 at halftime. The Cavs almost did it again, getting close when quarterback Matt Schaub scored on an eight-yard run and converted a two-point play with 2:58 remaining.

Virginia had a final chance, but on third-and-one from the Tech 49-yard line, Jeremy Muyres made an interception falling out of bounds at the Tech 14 with 1:25 remaining to seal the Jackets' win.

Suggs threw a 12-yard touchdown pass to Kerry Watkins, P.J. Daniels scored on a one-yard run and Luke Manget kicked three field goals to give Georgia Tech its halftime cushion.

Virginia made another second-half charge, beginning with its first possession. Schaub hooked up with Jason Snelling on a 12-yard scoring pass.

The Cavs had other chances but the Tech defense held. Schaub threw incomplete on fourth-and-four at the Georgia Tech six-yard line on the first play of the fourth quarter. Virginia also drove to the Tech 23 in the second quarter and the Tech 25 in the fourth quarter before being stopped on downs.

Georgia Tech held off Virginia with a punishing ground game. Daniels rushed for 95 yards and Gordon Clinkscale added 74.

Schaub completed a school-record 41 of 58 passes for 372 yards, but the Cavs managed just 53 yards rushing.

Georgia Tech set the tone with its first possession. On the Jackets' first play from scrimmage, Clinkscale broke free around left end for a 37-yard gain; two plays later, Daniels powered over from the one to make it 7-0 less than three minutes into the game.

After Manget kicked field goals of 25 and 40 yards, Georgia Tech surprised the Cavs by going to a no-huddle offense. Clinkscale went 13 yards with a pass from Suggs, then Daniels ripped off runs of 14 and 12 yards. Finally, Watkins broke free over the middle and hauled in the 12-yard touchdown pass that put Tech ahead 20-0 with 2:46 to play in the first half.

After forcing a three-and-out by Virginia, the Yellow Jackets tacked on another field goal on the final play of the first half. Suggs drove the Jackets 77 yards on 14 plays to set up Manget's 19-yard field goal, which gave Tech a 23-0 halftime lead.

Playing his best game to date in a Tech uniform, Suggs completed 26 of 41 passes for 220 yards.

A.J. Suggs, Gordon Clinkscale and the Georgia Tech defense put an end to North Carolina State's dreams of an unbeaten season.

Suggs directed Tech to a tying score, and Clinkscale provided the go-ahead touchdown with a 14-yard run with 9:23 left as the Yellow Jackets rallied to beat the eighth-ranked Wolfpack, 24-17, at Carter-Finley Stadium in Raleigh, N.C.

The Yellow Jackets (6-3, 3-3 ACC) worked their game plan to perfection for most of the night, controlling the ball and keeping the Wolfpack offense on the sideline. But when they fell behind, they opened up the offense and stunned the Wolfpack (9-1, 4-1), winning for the seventh time in the last eight meetings between the teams.

"I told the team I've been involved in some great victories, and this one is certainly at the top," coach Chan Gailey said. "This was a tough situation and a tough arena for our guys to come into, but we felt very good coming into it, and we really had our confidence."

NC State had gotten off to the best start in school history after beating Clemson the week before. Only the 1967 Wolfpack team came close, starting 8-0 before losing two of its last three games.

GAME SUMMARIES

"This is the best team we've played all year, and we knew that coming in," said Wolfpack quarterback Philip Rivers, who threw for 277 yards. "We played good at times, but that wasn't enough."

NC State came in averaging 41 points per game, ranking sixth in the country. But Georgia Tech's defense allowed few big plays, and the offense did its part by keeping the chains moving and avoiding drive-killing miscues.

"We can't have the defense on the field the whole game," Clinkscale said. "Keep the defense fresh and off the field, they'll go out there and put it to any offense."

The Wolfpack took a 10-9 lead on Rivers' 19-yard touchdown pass to Jerricho Cotchery with 1:35 left in the third quarter. NC State made it 17-9 when freshman T.A. McLendon ran eight yards for a touchdown early in the fourth quarter.

But the Yellow Jackets answered quickly. Suggs directed a nine-play, 80-yard scoring drive that ended with a two-yard toss to tight end John Paul Foschi. Suggs' conversion pass to Jonathan Smith tied the game at 17-all with 10:54 to play.

The Yellow Jackets also had some good fortune. On the drive, a delay-ofgame penalty against the offense nullified an NC State sack on third down. Facing third-and-19 from his own 11-yard line, Suggs hit Smith down the sideline on the next play for a 28-yard gain and a first down.

Later on the drive, Greg Golden dropped a sure interception in the end zone after the receiver had fallen down. Suggs found Foschi for the score four plays later.

After the Wolfpack went three-and-out on its next possession, Kelley Rhino returned the punt 26 yards to give the Yellow Jackets the ball at the NC State 22.

After an eight-yard Suggs pass on first down, Clinkscale took the handoff,

started right, then reversed field and took it down the left sideline for the go-ahead score – the first career touchdown by the fifth-year senior.

NC State had plenty of time left to come back, but Tech's defense came up with several big plays, two of them by freshman nickel back Reuben Houston.

First, strong safety Cory Collins knocked the ball loose from McLendon and Houston recovered for the Jackets at the Tech 31-yard line. An interception—Suggs' first after 126 pass attempts--gave the Wolfpack the ball back at the Tech 46, but Houston knocked away Rivers' pass on fourth down.

The Wolfpack had one final chance, taking over at their own 17 with 1:16 to play, but free safety Jeremy Muyres intercepted Rivers on fourth down to seal Tech's victory.

Clinkscale ran for 94 yards, while Suggs completed 21 of 36 passes for 211 yards.

McLendon, who came in averaging 101.6 rushing yards, managed only 49 yards as Tech held the Wolfpack to just 57 yards rushing.

As it has all season, NC State started quickly, getting a 48-yard flea-flicker from Rivers to Cotchery on the first play from scrimmage down to the Tech 32-yard line. The Wolfpack moved to the 16, but the Tech defense held, forcing State to settle for a 33-yard field goal by Adam Kiker.

Saddled with poor field position most of the first half, Tech consumed the final seven minutes of the second quarter on a 16-play, 70-yard drive that ended with Manget's 30-yard field goal on the last play of the half, tying the score at 3-3 at the intermission.

The Jackets took a 9-3 lead on two more Manget field goals in the third quarter, the first one set up when long-snapper Andrew Economos recovered Cotchery's fumbled punt at the State 41-yard line.

FLORIDA STATE 21, GEORGIA TECH 13

Stanford Samuels had two interceptions, including a game-saving pick in the end zone with 20 seconds left, as 17th-ranked Florida State held off Georgia Tech, 21-13, at Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field.

Adrian McPherson threw two touchdown passes, including a 72-yarder to Craphonso Thorpe, and tailback Nick Maddox tied his career high with 122 yards, but Samuels' interceptions proved to be the difference. He returned his other one 82 yards for a tying touchdown in the first quarter.

Samuels was suspended from the previous week's victory over Wake Forest for breaking unspecified team rules, and he got back into the lineup just in time. Florida State (7-3, 6-0 ACC) has won 11 straight in the series and hasn't lost to Georgia Tech since joining the ACC in 1992.

"Every year that I've been here, we've played them pretty hard," Tech linebacker Daryl Smith said. "They always seem to make more plays than we do."

The Yellow Jackets (6-4, 3-4), looking for their third straight victory and second over a Top 25 opponent, drove to the Seminoles' nine-yard line before Samuels' interception. Quarterback A.J. Suggs was trying to get the ball to Jonathan Smith in the back of the end zone, but he underthrew the pass.

Maddox, starting in place of injured tailback Greg Jones, gained 59 yards in the fourth quarter when Florida State played conservatively.

McPherson was making just the second start of his career and was ineffective for much of the game, often throwing well off-target. He finished 8-of-24 for 139 yards.

But he found Thorpe a step ahead of cornerback Marvious Hester on the left sideline, throwing a perfect spiral that hit Thorpe in stride for the Seminoles' longest play of the season. The catch and run gave Florida State its first lead at 14-7.

After Georgia Tech closed to 14-13 on two field goals by Luke Manget, McPherson threw a 32-yard touchdown pass to Anquan Boldin near the end of the third quarter. Boldin caught the ball in the middle of the field at the 20 and used two crushing blocks to reach the corner of the end zone.

The Yellow Jackets took a 7-0 lead on a 20-yard touchdown pass from A.J. Suggs to Levon Thomas. They were driving for another score early in the second quarter, but Samuels stepped in front of Jonathan Smith and ran it back for the tying score.

Samuels broke an attempted tackle by Suggs at midfield and went the rest of the way untouched.

Suggs threw another interception in the third quarter and finished 22-of-44 for 211 yards. Gordon Clinkscale ran for 89 yards on just 10 carries.

"A close second doesn't get it done in our business," Georgia Tech coach Chan Gailey said. "It doesn't get it in most businesses."

GEORGIA TECH 17, DUKE 2

Nov. 16, 2002 • Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field

Gordon Clinkscale ran for two touchdowns and the Georgia Tech defense turned in an outstanding performance as the Yellow Jackets defeated Duke, 17-2, at Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field.

The win was Tech's eighth in a row over Duke and extended the Blue Devils' ACC-record losing streak to 24.

The Tech defense, led by linebacker Keyaron Fox, held Duke scoreless as the Blue Devils' only points came on a safety. The Jackets held Duke to just 284 yards of offense and allowed the Blue Devils across midfield only three times.

Clinkscale, who ran for 71 yards on 22 carries, scored on a two-yard run on the Yellow Jackets' first drive. Taking a pitch and running to his left, Clinkscale avoided the Duke rush by turning right and reaching the end zone easily.

Georgia Tech (7-4, 4-4 ACC) had Jonathan Smith at quarterback on the first play of its third possession, when the ball was snapped from the six and out of the end zone for the Duke safety.

The Blue Devils (2-9, 0-7) converted only six of 20 third-down opportunities. Adam Smith completed 13 of 33 passes for 146 yards and two interceptions, the first of which Fox returned 35 yards to the Duke 21 with 2:03 left in the first quarter.

Four plays later, Luke Manget's 32-yard field goal made it 10-2.

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GAME SUMMARIES

On their next drive, the Yellow Jackets had second-and-goal at the Blue Devils 10 when Kenneth Stanford stepped in front of Will Glover and intercepted Suggs' pass at the two.

Georgia Tech went ahead 17-2 midway through the second quarter on Clinkscale's four-yard run. Kerry Watkins set up the final score by jumping at midfield and turning to catch Suggs' 31-yard pass over the middle.

Each team blocked a field goal. Jonathan Cox took advantage of a high snap and blocked a 19-yard attempt by Duke's Brent Garber with 2:15 left before halftime. The Yellow Jackets' Hal Higgins bobbled the snap on Manget's 36-yard attempt in the fourth, which allowed Shawn Johnson to make the block.

Chris Douglas rushed for 77 yards on 12 carries for Duke. Alex Wade ran 13 times for 61 yards.

Suggs completed 18 of 28 passes, including a 34-yarder that Jonathan Smith caught in the third.

GEORGIA 51, GEORGIA TECH 7

Nov. 30, 2002 • Sanford Stadium • Athens, Ga.

Fifth-ranked Georgia built a 34-0 halftime lead against Georgia Tech and cruised to a 51-7 victory at Sanford Stadium in Athens, the Bulldogs' most lopsided win in the series, which began in 1893.

Georgia Tech (7-5), already eligible for its sixth straight bowl appearance, endured its worst defeat since a 49-3 rout by Florida State in 1996.

"It was a very poorly played game in all phases by our football team," said Tech's first-year coach, Chan Gailey. "Obviously, I didn't get these guys ready to play."

Musa Smith ran for 121 yards and became the first Georgia back since Garrison Hearst in 1992 to reach 1,000 vards in a season.

Georgia quarterback David Greene completed 10 of 14 passes for 205 yards and a touchdown. Senior fullback J.T. Wall, normally a blocker, added a couple of touchdown runs.

Georgia marched down the field on its first possession. Smith started the drive with a 22-yard run, then finished it off by sweeping in from the one.

Billy Bennett kicked a 46-yard field goal to give the Bulldogs a 10-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. Then things really unraveled for Georgia Tech.

D.J. Shockley, Georgia's backup quarterback, scored on an eight-yard run to make it 17-0. Greene returned on the next possession and completed two straight long passes to push the lead to 24-0.

The first was a 31-yarder to Terrence Edwards, who snatched the ball away from Jeremy Muyres as the Tech defensive back was poised to make an interception. Greene followed with a 49-yard touchdown pass to Fred Gibson, who made the catch when cornerback Marvious Hester turned the wrong way on a slightly underthrown ball.

Edwards, who was expected to miss the game with a separated shoulder, returned a week early and made two catches for 48 yards.

A 26-yard punt return by Sean Jones and another 22-yard run by Smith set up Bennett's second field goal, a 30-yarder that made it 27-0.

Georgia got the ball right back when P.J. Daniels fumbled a short kickoff. Wall rumbled into the end zone on an 18-yard run.

In the first half, the Yellow Jackets fumbled twice on kickoff returns, and A.J. Suggs threw an interception. Georgia Tech's only scoring threat was a 49-yard field-goal attempt by Luke Manget; it was blocked by Boss Bailey.

Tech committed five turnovers on the day with three fumbles and two interceptions.

Tyson Browning added a 19-yard scoring run for Georgia with about four minutes remaining, giving the Bulldogs their most points ever against Tech. Twice before, Georgia had scored 48 points.

Wide receiver Jonathan Smith, who took several snaps at quarterback and was Tech's leading rusher in the game with 47 yards, caught a four-yard touchdown pass from Suggs early in the fourth guarter for the Jackets' only points.

FRESNO STATE 30, GEORGIA TECH 21

Silicon Valley Football Classic Dec. 31, 2002 • Spartan Stadium • San Jose, Calif.

Rodney Davis ran for 153 yards and two touchdowns and Fresno State held off Georgia Tech's second-half rally to defeat the Yellow Jackets, 30-21, in the Silicon Valley Football Classic.

Asen Asparuhov kicked a 33-yard field goal with 3:43 left, one of his three in the game, and Davis, who carried the ball 37 times, secured the win with a 28-yard touchdown run just over a minute later for the Bulldogs (9-5), who won their first postseason game since 1992 with a depleted roster. Seven players, including five starters, did not participate because of academic problems.

The Fresno State defense weathered the strong second-half comeback attempt by Georgia Tech freshman backup quarterback Damarius Bilbo.

Bilbo passed for one touchdown and ran for another after replacing A.J. Suggs, but Bilbo also threw four interceptions as the Yellow Jackets (7-6) committed seven turnovers.

Tech entered the second half trailing 13-7, but Bilbo put the Jackets ahead, 14-13, with a one-yard touchdown run midway through the third quarter. Bilbo began the drive, which started at the Fresno 39-yard following a 16-yard punt return by Jonathan Smith, with a 37-yard completion to Lekeldrick Bridges.

Fresno answered on its next possession with Davis' three-yard touchdown run, which capped a six-play, 80-yard drive that was highlighted by Paul Pinegar's 68-yard completion to Gilbert.

Tech regained the advantage on Bilbo's 42-yard touchdown pass to Smith, putting Tech ahead, 21-20, with just 51 seconds left in the third quarter.

Midway through the fourth quarter, the Bulldogs put together a 12-play, 63-yard drive that not only resulted in Aparuhov's 33-yard field goal and a 23-21 Fresno State lead, but ate up more than seven minutes on the clock.

Tech took over at its own 20 with 3:38 to play, but the Jackets were unable to move the ball and the possession ended when, on fourth-and-two at the Tech 28, Bilbo's pass fell incomplete. On the next play, Davis sealed the win by going 28 yards for the touchdown and a 30-21 advantage.

The Jackets got the ball back two more times, and Bilbo moved Tech to the Fresno 33 with a 47-yard pass to Bridges, but both possessions ended with interceptions.

The game was a muddy mess from the start after hard rain fell Monday night. It took only a few plays for Georgia Tech's gleaming white uniforms—the Jackets wore their traditional white jerseys with white pants for the first time since 1994—to turn a dull brown, and there were plenty of slips and missed plays.

Suggs hit Kerry Watkins for a 35-yard touchdown pass late in the first half, and with Fresno managing only a pair of field goals, Tech led 7-6 and appeared ready to take the advantage into the intermission. But on second-and-six from the Tech 24-yard line with just 26 seconds left, Suggs' pass down the right sideline was underthrown and intercepted by Dee Meza, who returned its 48 yards for the touchdown and a 13-7 Fresno State lead at the half.

After its school-record sixth straight postseason appearance, Georgia Tech is now 20-11 (.645) in bowl games after coming into the game tied with Penn State with a national-best .667 bowl winning percentage.

Tech placekicker Luke Manget made three extra points to give him 160 straight PATs, one shy of the NCAA record for consecutive extra points of 161, set by John Becksvoort of Tennessee from 1991-94.

onsistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Having celebrated its 50th year of competition a year ago, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 88 national championships, including 44 in women's competition and 44 in women's. NCAA individual titles have been won by ACC student-athletes 114 times in men's competition and 51 times in women's action.

The conference had an immediate impact on the national college football scene in the fall of 1953 when Maryland captured the first of what would eventually be four national football titles for the ACC. Clemson laid claim to the league's second national title in 1981, Georgia Tech followed suit in 1990 while Florida State pocketed the ACC's fourth and fifth national titles in 1994 and 1999.

The nine schools that take to the field this fall under the ACC banner have produced 386 first or second team gridiron All-Americas and 61 first-team academic all-Americas.

ACC teams have had 1,520 players selected in the annual professional football draft, including 113 first round selections. A year ago, the nine ACC institutions had 145 former players on NFL rosters during the regular season or playoffs.

The ACC is the nation's winningest bowl conference as the nine current teams are a combined 92-82-5 (.528) in post-season play.

A year ago, the ACC set an NCAA record when seven of its nine teams (78 percent) received bowl bids. Over the past two years, 13 of a possible 18 ACC teams (72 percent) have received bowl bids.

Georgia Tech and Florida State are among the nation's winningest bowl teams. Among teams with 20 or more bowl appearances, the Yellow Jackets stand with a 20-11 (.645) post-season record, while the Seminoles are fifth at 18-11-2 (.633).

Last season, the ACC had one consensus all-America and over the past five years has produced 25 consensus all-Americas.

For the third straight year, the ACC set new attendance marks in football. Over 58 home games, ACC teams drew 2,944,936 fans, breaking the existing record of 2,776,724 set in 2001. In addition, in its 50th season, the ACC averaged over 50,000 fans per game for the first time, breaking the mark of 49,673 set one year earlier.

2002-03 In Review

uring the 2002-03 academic year, the ACC won three national team titles and nine individual NCAA crowns. The conference has won 45 national team titles over the last 13 years. The ACC's 2002-03 national champions were Wake Forest in field hockey, Virginia in men's lacrosse and Clemson in men's golf. Overall, 95 ACC teams took part in post-season play and compiled an 84-64 record. Twenty eight ACC teams finished their season with a Top 10 national ranking.

The Championships

The ACC will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during in 2003-04, including 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954 a NC State. The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship held in tennis at Wake Forest,

On May 8, 1953, the Atlantic Coast Conference was formed in Greensboro, N.C. In the 50 years since, the league has developed into a national leader in intercollegiate athletics. During the 2002-03 season, the ACC commemorated 50 years of excellence in intercollegiate athletics. Fiftieth Anniversary Teams were selected in all of the conference's sports.

Former Tech standouts Ken Swilling, Marco Coleman and Joe Hamilton were named to the ACC 50th Anniversary Football Team.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C. when the seven charter members—Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest—withdrew from the Southern Conference. On June 14, 1953, those seven schools met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of by-laws was adopted and the name officially became the Atlantic Coast Conference, which was suggested by Duke's Eddie Cameron and unanimously approved.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971 when South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The conference operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.



















Georgia Tech 8, California 7

January 1, 1929 Rose Bowl, Pasadena, Calif.

The Golden Tornado of Georgia Tech completed a perfect 10-0 season by stunning California, 8-7, in one of the strangest Rose Bowl games ever played.

The margin of victory for Tech was provided in the second quarter. With the score tied 0-0, Tech's Stumpy Thomason was hit by the Golden Bears' Benny Lom and fumbled around the Tech 35-yard line. California center Roy Riegels scooped up the ball and raced for the end zone. But in the confusion, Riegels got turned around and was heading toward the wrong end zone. He ran 64 yards, reaching the California one-yard line before he was tackled by his own teammate, Lom. On the next play, Tech's Vance Maree broke through the line and blocked Lom's punt for a safety.

Thomason scored on a 15-yard run early in the third quarter but his extra-point try was no good. Still, Tech led 8-0. California added a late score on Lom's 10-yard touchdown pass.

Georgia Tech 21, Missouri 7

January 1, 1940 Orange Bowl, Miami, Fla.

The Yellow Jackets made their first of five trips to the Orange Bowl a successful one, defeating Missouri, 21-7, behind the heroics of 147-pound Johnny Bosch, who outran and outpassed the Tigers' all-America Paul Christman.

After an early Tiger score, Howard Ector completed a long, determined drive to knot the score at 7-7. Rob Ison raced 59 yards for a second-quarter Tech touchdown to give the Jackets the lead for good.

Earl Wheby went around the end for 34 yards and another Tech TD in the third period.

Missouri drove once to the Jackets' one-yard line in the fourth quarter, but Tech snuffed out the attack and finished its season with an 8-2 record and a No. 16 national ranking by the Associated Press.

Texas 14, Georgia Tech 7

January 1, 1943 Cotton Bowl, Dallas, Texas

A gallant comeback effort fell three yards short for the Yellow Jackets as Texas held on to win the Cotton Bowl, 14-7, marking Georgia Tech's first loss in three bowl appearances.

The Longhorns took a 14-0 advantage into the fourth quarter, with the help of a 60-yard punt return, when Tech began to make its move. Davey Eldredge scored for the Jackets on a fourth-down Statue of Liberty play, and Tech drove to the Texas 3-yard line in the closing seconds, but threw three incomplete passes. Tech completed the season ranked fifth in the nation by the Associated Press with a 9-2 record.

Tulsa opened a 20-0 lead behind Ed Shedlosky's two touchdowns and held on to win. The Jackets scored on a 51-yard pass from Broyles to Johnny McIntosh and a two-yard run by Rumsey Taylor to complete an 8-3 season.

Quarterback Jim Still threw two touchdown passes to Jim Patton and one to Billy Queen, and finished the day with 129 yards passing. Georgia Tech completed the season 10-1, having lost only to Alabama, and ranked 10th by AP.

Tech came back twice in the game, the first time on Leon Hardeman's three-yard run which tied the score, 7-7, in the first quarter. Quarterback Darrell Crawford threw a touchdown pass to Buck Martin with six minutes left in the fourth to knot the game at 14-14.

The Jackets' defense also had a hand in the victory, shutting out the Bears in the second half and intercepting all-America quarterback Larry Isbell three times.

The decisive score came after Pittsburgh fumbled the second half kickoff and Tech's Wesley Gibbs recovered. That set up a 37-yard drive, capped by Paul Rotenberry's five-yard touchdown run to give Tech a 21-7 lead.

In the second half, Pitt never drove past the Jackets' 32-yard line, which it reached at the closing gun. The Panthers collected 313 yards in total offense but were hurt by two fumbles and two interceptions.

Ken Owen scored the first Tech touchdown on a two-yard dive with 8:39 left in the opening period. George Volkert took a pitchout from quarterback Toppy Vann and hit Jerry Nabors for the second score with 2:02 left in the half. Stan Flowers led the Tech ground attack with 63 yards on just four carries, setting up the Jackets' second TD with a 34-yard iaunt.

Tech's Wade Mitchell was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

Mississippi, which lost to Georgia Tech in the Sugar Bowl in 1953, coasted to the win this time after building a 38-6 halftime lead in the Yellow Jackets' first Peach Bowl appearance.

Despite near equality in total offense (317 for Tech to 318 for Ole Miss), the Jackets suffered from five turnovers, including two interceptions by quarterback Eddie McAshan. Rob Healy scored all three Tech touchdowns, and rushed for 27 yards on 17 carries. McAshan completed 13 of 26 passes for 151 yards.

Ole Miss tailback Greg Ainsworth led all rushers with 119 yards on 28 carries, and Jimmy Porter rushed for two scores.

1972 LIBERTY BOWL

Georgia Tech 31, Iowa State 30

December 18, 1972 Liberty Bowl, Memphis, Tenn.

Backup quarterback Jim Stevens completed 12 of 15 passes for 157 yards and three touchdowns and was named the game's Most Valuable Player as Georgia Tech won a thriller over Iowa State in its only Liberty Bowl.

Stevens was nearly the goat, however, when the Cyclones recovered his errant pitchout and drove 33 yards for a touchdown with 1:36 left in the game. But Iowa State quarterback George Amundson threw a two-point conversion pass away under pressure and left his team trailing by a point. Tech's Mark Fields recovered the ensuing onsides kick, and the Jackets ran out the clock to seal the win.

Tech, ranked 20th, struck first after recovering an Iowa State fumble with a 32-yard field goal by Cam Bonifay. But the Cyclones then scored twice for a 14-3 lead after one quarter. Tech rallied on a Stevens-to-Jimmy Robinson pass and a Gary Faulkner interception return to trail at the half, 21-17.

Stevens passed to Rob Healy for a touchdown in the third quarter to give the Jackets' the lead again, 24-21, then hit Kevin McNamara for a score in the fourth period for Tech's final points.

With record-breaking tailback Eddie Lee Ivery sidelined with an ankle injury, Georgia Tech failed to get untracked in its second Peach Bowl appearance.

The Yellow Jackets mustered but 12 yards rushing and had to rely on the passing of quarterback Mike Kelley, who completed 17 of 38 passes for 168 yards and two touchdowns. Fullback Rodney Lee scored the other Tech TD on a one-yard run. Drew Hill and Gary Hardie caught four passes each for Tech.

The Boilermakers led 34-7 at the half, mainly behind quarterback Mark Herrmann, who completed 12 of 24 passes for 166 yards and two scores.



December 31, 1985 Legion Field, Birmingham, Ala.

Reserve quarterback Todd Rampley, sophomore tailback Malcolm King and a stingy Georgia Tech defense made this a New Year's Eve to remember in Birmingham, Ala., as the Rambling Wreck scored a 17-14 come-from-behind victory over Michigan State and its outstanding tailback Lorenzo White.

King ran for 122 yards on 16 carries, including the decisive touchdown with just 1:50 remaining in the game to complete the comeback. King's five-yard burst capped his best game of the season, and his 56-yard jaunt in the second quarter set up Tech's other touchdown, a one-yard sneak by Rampley.

Rampley, a sophomore replacing starter John Dewberry, completed 12 of 23 passes in his first collegiate start, while David Bell connected on a 40-yard field goal in the fourth period, his eighth consecutive successful attempt.

Tech's defense allowed White, the nation's leading rusher, his due with 158 yards but limited the rest of the Spartans to just 75 total yards.

The victory gave Tech a 9-2-1 record, its best since the Bobby Dodd Era, and gave the Rambling Wreck a No. 18 ranking in the final national poll.



1991 FLORIDA CITRUS BOWL

Georgia Tech 45, Nebraska 21

January 1, 1991 Citrus Bowl, Orlando, Fla.

Underdog Georgia Tech clinched the UPI national championship with a dominating 45-21 win over 13th-ranked Nebraska in Orlando, Fla., on New Year's Day as MVP Shawn Jones collected 318 yards of total offense and running back William Bell gained 127 yards on the ground. Tech completed a storybook season as the nation's only undefeated team with an 11-0-1 record.

"This is the greatest team I've ever coached," said national Coach of the Year Bobby Ross. "To me, they'll always be national champions."


Jones, who threw for a career high 277 yards and two touchdowns, directed Tech to a 21-0 lead with scoring tosses to Bell and Emmett Merchant in the second quarter. A Scott Sisson 37-yard field goal gave the Jackets a 24-14 halftime lead.

Nebraska threatened on its first possession of the second half, but Keith Holmes blocked a field goal attempt which led to a one-yard touchdown run by Jones. Bell added two touchdown runs, including a brilliant 57-yard jaunt. The 45 points is the most ever scored by Tech in a bowl game.

Strong safety Thomas Balkcom was voted the defensive MVP with two sacks. Also contributing to the outstanding defensive effort were linebackers Calvin Tiggle and Marlon Williams and cornerback Willie Clay.

1991 ALOHA BOWL

Georgia Tech 18, Stanford 17

December 25, 1991

Aloha Stadium, Honolulu, Hawaii

Jimy Lincoln's two-point conversion run with just 14 seconds remaining in the game provided Georgia Tech with an 18-17 come-from-behind victory over Stanford, making the final game of the Bobby Ross era a successful one before 34,433 fans at the 10th annual Jeep Eagle Aloha Bowl in Honolulu.

Willie Clay's 63-yard punt return set up Tech's game-winning 31-yard, seven play drive which was capped by a one-yard touchdown run by quarterback Shawn Jones with 14 seconds remaining. Disdaining the game-tying kick, Jones optioned to his right, pitching the ball to Lincoln, who cut back inside and dove across the goal for the game-winning points.

The win was Tech's third straight in bowl game competition and its second bowl victory in two seasons, boosting its all-time bowl record to 17-8 and its NCAA-best bowl winning percentage to .680. The game was also the final contest at Tech for Ross, who on Jan. 2 accepted the head coaching position with the San Diego Chargers of the NFL.

Stanford, ranked 17th, jumped to an early, 7-0 lead marching 48 yards in 6 plays for the score, a six-yard touchdown run by fullback Tommy Vardell.

The Jackets responded on their first possession, marching 60 yards in 10 plays for the tying score, a two-yard TD toss from Jones to tailback Michael Smith and with 8:33 remaining in the first quarter, the score was tied at 7-all.

Tech broke on top with 22 seconds left in the opening stanza when a Scott Sisson 24-yard field goal capped off a 74-yard, 11-play drive, all on the ground.

Stanford evened the game on its opening possession of the second half with a 38-yard field goal by Aaron Mills at the 9:21 mark for a 10-10 tie. Then Vardell, who rushed for a game-high 104 yards on 21 carries, put the Cardinal on top, 17-10, with a two-yard TD run with 5:50 to go in the quarter.

The Jackets saw one potential scoring threat thwarted on the final play of the third quarter when freshman fullback Rodney Wilkerson fumbled at the Cardinal one. Stanford's defense then held Tech to just three first downs in the second half until the game-winning drive.


Georgia Tech 35, West Virginia 30

December 29, 1997 Pro Player Stadium, Miami, Fla.

Sophomore quarterback Joe Hamilton ran and passed for 356 yards and three touchdowns to lead Georgia Tech to a 35-30 victory over West Virginia in the 1997 Carquest Bowl at Pro Player Stadium in Miami, Fla.

Hamilton was named the game's Most Valuable Player after completing 19 of 36 passes for 274 yards and a touchdown while rushing for 82 yards on 14 carries, including scoring jaunts of nine and 30 yards.

Tech, which piled up 484 total yards, built a 28-14 halftime advantage, then withstood a West Virginia comeback in the second half to claim its fourth straight bowl victory and increase its all-time bowl record to 18-8, the best winning percentage for teams with 10 or more bowl appearances.

GEORGE O'LEARY was involved in six Tech bowl appearances and four wins as defensive coordinator or head coach.

The Jackets held Amos Zereoue, who entered the contest as the nation's third-leading rusher, to just 84 yards, 66 below his average.

Tech took the opening kickoff and marched 80 yards in 15 plays. Hamilton set up the touchdown, scrambling for 21 yards to the WVU nine on fourth down and 17. Four plays later, on fourth and goal, freshman fullback Ed Wilder scored from one yard out for a 7-0 advantage with 9:05 remaining in the quarter.

The Mountaineers wasted little time in retaliating, taking just six plays to cover 61 yards for a touchdown. Quarterback Marc Bulger, who completed 25 of 40 passes for 353 yards and two scores, completed three passes on the drive and Zereoue scored from 14 yards around right end to knot the score at 7-all with 6:26 remaining in the quarter.

The Jackets came right back on their next possession, driving 76 yards in seven plays with Hamilton completing a 17-yard, third down pass to tailback Charlie Rogers to keep the drive alive. Hamilton then covered the final 30 yards for the score on a quarterback draw at the 2:58 mark of the quarter, giving Tech a 14-7 lead it would not relinquish.

After Tech's defense stopped the Mountaineers, Hamilton engineered a 94-yard, 12-play drive which culminated in a three-yard touchdown pass to tight end Mike Lillie as Tech opened a 21-7 advantage with 19:11 remaining in the first half.

West Virginia trimmed the margin with a 51yard, seven play drive late in the second quarter. A 15-yard personal foul penalty gave the Mountaineers a first down at the Tech 21, and three plays later Bulger connected with wide receiver Jerry Porter for a 21-yard touchdown pass to cut the Tech lead to 21-14 with 4:45 to play before intermission.

The Jackets quickly marched 74 yards in 11 plays with Hamilton scoring from nine yards out with just 27 seconds on the clock to carry a 28-14 lead into halftime. The 28 first half points by Tech were its most in any half in its 26 bowl appearances as well as a Carquest Bowl record.

West Virginia began its comeback in the third quarter as Zereoue accumulated 63 yards and Bulger threw for 249 yards after intermission.

Zereoue scored from 19 yards out on a Statue of Liberty play with 9:26 remaining in the third quarter to trim Tech's lead to 28-21. Late in the quarter, West Virginia drove 93 yards, only to stall at the Tech three as linebackers Keith Brooking and Ron Rogers came up with big tackles to keep the Mountaineers out of the end zone. Jay Taylor's 21-yard field goal with 42 seconds left in the quarter made the score 28-24.

Tech regained control in the fourth quarter as Hamilton led a 66-yard, seven-play drive, capped by a five-yard touchdown run by tailback Charles Wiley with 4:44 remaining in the game for a 35-24 lead.

West Virginia needed just 55 seconds to score as Bulger completed a short pass to Porter, who dodged two Tech defensive backs on the near sideline and sped 74 yards for a touchdown with 3:49 still remaining in the game. The Mountaineers elected to go for the two-point conversion, but the pass failed, leaving Tech with a 35-30 advantage.


Georgia Tech 35, Notre Dame 28 January 1, 1999

Alltel Stadium, Jacksonville, Fla.

Quarterback Joe Hamilton threw three touchdown passes and caught another one and split end Dez White hauled in two long scoring passes to lift 11th-ranked Georgia Tech to a 35-28 victory over No. 17 Notre Dame in the 1999 Toyota Gator Bowl.

The win, before 70,791 fans at Alltel Stadium in Jacksonville, Fla., gave the Yellow Jackets their first 10-win season since the 1990 national title and just their second since 1956.

White, playing in his hometown, and Hamilton shared the Most Valuable Player honors after hooking up for the game-winning score on a 55-yard pass with 7:55 to play. That pass capped a nine-play, 91-yard scoring drive after Notre Dame had roared back from a 21-7 halftime deficit to tie the score on tailback Autry Denson's third touchdown of the day early in the fourth quarter.

Notre Dame dressed in green jerseys for the first time since the 1995 Fiesta Bowl, but the Jackets jumped in front early. On Tech's second possession, Hamilton, who completed 13 of 20 passes for 237 yards, led a 12-play, 87-yard drive that ate up nearly five minutes. The junior signal caller hit four passes on the drive, including a 28-yarder to tight end Russell Matvay and a 19-yard strike to White, before he found himself on the receiving end of a five-yard touchdown pass. On second and goal at the Notre Dame five, Hamilton pitched to freshman tailback Joe Burns on a toss sweep to the right, and Burns threw back across the field and found Hamilton alone on the left side of the end zone. Brad Chambers added the extra point, and the Jackets led 7-0 with 6:22 left in the first quarter.

Notre Dame answered by driving 65 yards in six plays for a nine-yard touchdown run by Denson, who rushed for 130 yards on the day. Quarterback Jarious Jackson, returning from a sprained knee suffered in the Irish's 10th-game, keyed the drive with a 33-yard pass to Bobby Brown.

Tech dominated the remainder of the first half with a pair of long touchdown drives.

First the Jackets ate up 5:20 with a 10-play, 78yard drive, highlighted by a 26-yard pass from Hamilton to Charlie Rogers. Phillip Rogers capped the drive with a two-yard dive over the top, giving Tech a 14-7 lead with 13:45 in the half.

Later in the second quarter. Hamilton drove the Jackets 84 yards on 10 plays, almost exclusively on the ground, including Charlie Rogers' 26-yard scamper around the left end. On second-and-five from the Irish nine, Hamilton hit senior Mike Sheridan for the score and a 21-7 lead with 4:26 left in the half.

Aided by a personal foul penalty after the Jackets had stopped Notre Dame on third down, the Irish threatened late in the first half, but Jim Sanson was short and wide on a 44-yard field goal attempt.

After the intermission, Notre Dame took the second half kickoff and drove 80 yards, all but eight of them on the ground by either Jackson or Denson, who scored on a one-yard run to cut Tech's lead to 21-14 with 10:47 remaining in the third quarter.

Fullback Virgil Johnson fielded Hunter Smith's high, short kickoff and rambled nine yards before fumbling, and Tony Driver recovered for Notre Dame at the Tech 26-yard line. The Irish took advantage of the turnover, using eight plays to cover the 26 yards as Jackson scored from two yards out.

Kofi Smith raced around the right end to block Sanson's extra point, but at 7:23 of the third quarter, Notre Dame had pulled within 21-20 without allowing Tech an offensive play in the second half.

The Jackets took over on their own 29 and quickly moved into Notre Dame territory. Tech faced third-and-10 at the ND 44 when Hamilton hit White, who beat cornerback Ty Goode down the left sideline for a 44-yard touchdown. The seven-play, 71-yard drive took 3:41 and gave Tech a 28-20 advantage with 3:42 to play in the third quarter.

But Notre Dame continued to run the ball on Tech's defense and drove to midfield when, on the



final play of the third quarter, Jackson hit Jay Johnson for 27 yards and a first down at the Tech 28.

Three plays later, Tech appeared to have the Irish stopped after Jackson threw incomplete on third-and-eight at the Tech 26, but a controversial personal foul penalty gave Notre Dame a first down at the 13. Denson covered the final 13 yards on three plays, the last a one-yard scoring run. After Jackson hit Brown for the two-point conversion, the score was tied at 28 with 11:56 to play. The drive took 88 yards, 12 plays and nearly seven minutes.

Tech again had trouble handling the kickoff as the ball popped out of Sean Gregory's arms, but Mel Whatley recovered for the Jackets at the nine-yard line, where Tech began its game-winning march.

Twice Hamilton kept the drive alive by connecting with Charlie Rogers for third-down conversions. Then on first down at the Tech 45, Hamilton froze the defense with a play-fake and found White open over the middle, and the speedy sophomore raced past safety Benny Guilbeaux and cornerback Deveron Harper for a 55-yard touchdown. After Chambers added the PAT, Tech was back in front, 35-28, with 7:55 left in the game.

Notre Dame had three possessions in the final 7:55 but netted minus-11 yards. On the Irish's final play, Tech defensive end Nate Stimson sacked Jackson for a two-yard loss and knocked the ball loose, and Tech's Jesse Tarplin recovered at the Notre Dame 10-yard line with 49 seconds left to seal the win.

Tech's fifth straight bowl victory and third Gator Bowl win improved the nation's best bowl record to 19-8 (.704).

January 1, 2000 Alltel Stadium, Jacksonville, Fla.

Freshman tailback Clinton Portis ran for 117 yards on just 12 carries, including a 73 yard touchdown run in the second quarter, and junior tailback James Jackson added 107 yards on 21 carries to lead Miami to a 28-13 victory over 16th-ranked Georgia Tech in the 55th Annual Toyota Gator Bowl in Alltel Stadium before a crowd of 43,416 fans.

Tech's all-America quarterback Joe Hamilton was harried throughout the game by the Hurricanes' pass rush and managed to complete 20 of 40 passes for 245 yards but had two intercepted.

Miami took the opening kickoff and drove 66 yards in seven plays for the game's first score. James totaled 50 yards on five carries on the drive, including an eight-yard burst around left end for the score and a 7-0 lead with 12:23 left in the opening quarter.

Tech's defense twice held the Hurricanes in Yellow Jacket territory following an interception and a blocked punt. Tech drove 52 yards on seven plays before stalling at the Miami 27, and placekicker Luke Manget was wide left on a 44-yard field goal attempt.

Miami quickly moved 73 yards on seven plays as quarterback Kenny Kelly hit Santana Moss for a 30-yard completion and then found Andre King for a 15-yard touchdown pass on the first play of the second quarter, giving the Hurricanes a 14-0 lead.

The Jackets finally got on the scoreboard late in the second quarter with a 77-yard, 10-play drive. Hamilton completed three passes on the drive to junior split end Dez White and then scored the touchdown on a 17-yard option run to cut the deficit to 14-7 with 4:12 remaining before intermission.

But Miami wasted little time in answering. Just two plays later, Portis broke two tackles at the line of scrimmage and then outran Tech's defenders to the end zone for a 73-yard jaunt that gave the Hurricanes a 21-7 lead with 3:09 left in the half.

The Jackets took the opening kickoff of the second half and moved 69 yards on 11 plays as Hamilton completed three passes for 39 yards. But the drive stalled at the Miami eight-yard line, and Tech was forced to settle for Manget's 25-yard field goal that trimmed the Hurricane advantage to 21-10.

With the help of a pair of 15-yard penalties and a 13-yard option run by Hamilton, the Jackets moved to the Miami 24, but on fourth down, Manget's field goal attempt was blocked by UM's Chris Campbell. Tech, though, got the ball back in just two plays as Jamara Clark intercepted a Kenny Kelly pass at the Miami 44. After Tech advanced to the Miami 19, Manget booted a 36-yard field goal to cut the score to 21-13.

Miami reasserted itself early in the fourth quarter, marching 63 yards in 12 plays. Portis made clutch runs and backup quarterback Ken Dorsey completed four passes, including a 17-yard touchdown to split end Reggie Wayne with 9:18 remaining in the game for the final 28-13 margin.

The Jackets, who saw their five-game bowl winning streak snapped, would threaten twice in the game's waning moments, but one possession ended with an interception and the other fizzled when White, who made eight catches for 100 yards on the day, was stopped short on fourth down.

Miami's defense, which limited Tech to its lowest point total in 16 games, sacked Hamilton three times and held the Heisman Trophy runner-up without a touchdown pass for the first time in 14 games.

2000 CHICK-FIL-A PEACH BOWL

LSU 28, Georgia Tech 14

December 29, 2000 Georgia Dome, Atlanta, Ga.

Rohan Davey, taking over at quarterback in the second half, threw three touchdown passes to lead LSU to a 28-14 upset of No. 15 Georgia Tech in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl before a record crowd of 73,614 in the Georgia Dome.

Quarterback George Godsey and the Tech offense struggled after the month-long layoff since ending the regular season with a 27-15 victory at Georgia, committing six turnovers on four fumbles and two interceptions. Tech had only 12 turnovers during the regular season, six interceptions and six fumbles, one of the reasons the Yellow Jackets were able to average 435 yards and 33.8 points per game.

Despite the loss, Georgia Tech finished with a 9-3 record in what many had expected to be a rebuilding year. The Jackets' fourth straight bowl was a first for the program since 1951-56.

LSU (8-4), playing in its first bowl since 1997 under first-year coach Nick Saban, rallied from a 14-3 halftime deficit.

After managing just 117 yards in the first half with starter Josh Booty at quarterback, the Tigers

turned to Davey, who had been injured since October, to start the second half. He also had more protection up front as right tackle Brandon Winey, who wasn't even dressed in the first half because of a wrist injury, donned his pads to beef up LSU's line.

With Davey completing five passes, the Tigers went 70 yards in nine plays for their first touchdown, a three-yard completion to Tommy Banks.

LSÚ scored the go-ahead touchdown in the opening minute of the fourth quarter on a brilliant catch by Josh Reed, who jumped as high as he could to pull down the nine-yard pass, his right foot tapping inside the line just before he fell out of bounds.

John Corbello kicked a career-best 49-yard field goal, set up by a Tech fumble at its own 17-yard line before Davey finished the comeback with another three-yard touchdown pass to Banks. The scoring play with 3:12 remaining completed a 13-play, 91-yard drive that consumed more than seven minutes and clinched the offensive MVP award for Davey, who was 17-of-25 for 174 yards.

The Jackets slumped to their lowest-scoring game of the year and were shut out in the second half. They had two turnovers, managed just 100 yards and cross midfield until a drive in the waning minutes reached the LSU four-yard line.

But Godsey was knocked out with a knee injury and the drive stalled.

Godsey threw for 2,906 yards and 23 touchdowns during the regular season with only six interceptions but was just 19-of-36 for 177 yards, throwing two interceptions and losing two fumbles.

Georgia Tech could have buried LSU in the first half if not for four turnovers and a motion penalty that wiped out a 59-yard touchdown pass from Godsey to Kelly Campbell.

Instead, the Jackets settled for a 14-3 lead. Joe Burns' 32-yard run capped a nine-play, 80-yard drive and gave Tech a 7-3 lead with 5:32 left in the first quarter. A nine-yard scoring run by Baton Rouge native Jermaine Hatch extended the lead to 14-3 with 1:15 remaining before halftime. Meanwhile, the Tech defense held firm despite the turnovers and held the Tigers to seven yards rushing.

LSU linebacker Bradie James, who missed nearly a week of practice after the death of his father, was selected the defensive MVP. He recovered two fumbles and had a sack.

2001 SEATTLE BOWL

Georgia Tech 24, Stanford 14

December 27, 2001 SAFECO Field, Seattle, Wash.

George Godsey passed for 266 yards and a touchdown, Kelly Campbell scored twice and the Georgia Tech the defense made a key goal-line stand as the Yellow Jackets defeated No. 11 Stanford, 24-14, in the inaugural Seattle Bowl.

The Jackets, under interim head coach Mac McWhorter, made their fifth straight bowl appearance before a crowd of 30,144 at Safeco Field. Tech (8-5) improved its bowl record to 20-10 for a winning percentage of .667 that ranks first in the nation.

"There had been so much negative attention given to this team," said Godsey, who was named the Most Valuable Player of his final game in a Tech uniform. "We pulled together. We wanted to salvage this season."

Campbell's second touchdown was a two-yard run on a reverse play with 1:29 left, capping a 13-play, 63-yard drive that sealed the victory after the Cardinal had pulled within three points.

"When the play was called, I knew then that I was going to score," said Campbell, Tech's all-time leading receiver who finished with 10 catches for 106 yards. "I got the ball and there was nothing in front of me but the end zone."

Tech dominated the first half to take a 17-3 lead at the intermission, but Stanford (9-3) drew to 17-14 with 11:39 remaining when backup quarterback Chris Lewis threw a four-yard touchdown pass to Teyo Johnson, then added a two-point pass to Ryan Wells.

The Rambling Wreck defense set the tone on the game's first drive, stopping Stanford three times at the Tech one-yard line. Brian Allen was stopped on

two runs from the one, and linebacker Daryl Smith dropped Kerry Carter for a two-yard loss on fourth down.

Tech took over and drove 97 yards, their longest drive of the season that used 16 plays and 6:16 on the clock, capped by Will Glover's five-yard touchdown run.

"When the defense stopped them, we knew the offense had to make a statement," said Georgia Tech running back Sean Gregory, who rushed for a gamehigh 91 yards in place of all-ACC back Joe Burns, who was academically ineligible for the bowl. "We did. There is nothing more beautiful than a 97-yard touchdown drive."

Godsey, who completed 23 of 37 passes on the day, set the tone on Tech's first snap with a playaction pass from his own end zone, hitting Gregory for 14 yards. The senior signal-caller connected on seven of nine passes for 80 yards on the drive, the key play a 26-yard completion to Jonathan Smith down to the four-yard line.

Stanford needed 16 plays and seven minutes to drive from its own 20 to the Tech 18, but again the Rambling Wreck defense held, forcing the Cardinal to settle for Mike Biselli's 35-yard field goal at the start of the second quarter.


Godsey engineered another long drive, this time covering 81 yards on seven plays as he teamed with Campbell for a 34-yard touchdown pass to give Tech a 14-3 lead with 9:33 left in the half. One play earlier, Godsey and Campbell hooked up for an 18-yard completion on fourth-and-10 to set up the score.

After forcing a Stanford punt, Tech took over on its own 20 with a new wrinkle, inserting backup quarterback Andy Hall to run a series of option plays. Hall gained 18 yards on three carries, sandwiched around a 54-yard jaunt by Gregory to set up Luke Manget's 20-yard field goal with just two seconds left in the half. That sent Tech to the locker room with a 17-3 advantage.

Both offenses stalled in the third quarter, when Tech defense came up with another goal-line stand. The Cardinal had a first down at Georgia Tech's two but managed a 26-yard field goal by Biselli.

Trailing 17-6, Stanford started the fourth quarter by inserting Lewis in place of starting quarterback Randy Fasani, who was 11-for-21 for 115 yards and was sacked three times. Despite three false start penalties on his first five snaps, Lewis managed completions of 41 and 34 yards to move the Cardinal to the Tech five-yard line, setting up Johnson's leaping touchdown catch. Lewis finished 6-for-13 for 110 yards and one TD.

After an exchange of punts, Tech took over on its own 37-yard line, clinging to a three-point lead with 6:26 to play. Just as it had all afternoon, the Tech offense mixed run and pass to move the chains, including a key conversion on third-and-one when Godsey lineup up in the shotgun and hit Smith for a seven-yard gain. A 16-yard completion to Smith moved Tech to the Stanford six, and two plays later, Campell took a reverse pitch from Godsey and raced into the end zone untouched for the clinching score.

Asen Asparuhov kicked a 33-yard field goal with 3:43 left, one of his three in the game, and Davis, who carried the ball 37 times, secured the win with a 28-yard touchdown run just over a minute later for the Bulldogs (9-5), who won their first postseason game since 1992 with a depleted roster. Seven players, including five starters, did not participate because of academic problems.

The Fresno State defense weathered the strong second-half comeback attempt by Georgia Tech freshman backup quarterback Damarius Bilbo.

Bilbo passed for one touchdown and ran for another after replacing A.J. Suggs, but Bilbo also threw four interceptions as the Yellow Jackets (7-6) committed seven turnovers.

Tech entered the second half trailing 13-7, but Bilbo put the Jackets ahead, 14-13, with a one-yard touchdown run midway through the third quarter.

Fresno answered on its next possession with Davis' three-yard touchdown run, which capped a six-play, 80-yard drive that was highlighted by Paul Pinegar's 68-yard completion to Gilbert.

Tech regained the advantage on Bilbo's 42-yard touchdown pass to Smith, putting Tech ahead, 21-20, with just 51 seconds left in the third quarter.

Midway through the fourth quarter, the Bulldogs put together a 12-play, 63-yard drive that not only resulted in Aparuhov's 33-yard field goal and a 23-21 Fresno State lead, but ate up more than seven minutes on the clock.

Tech took over at its own 20 with 3:38 to play, but the Jackets were unable to move the ball and the possession ended when, on fourth-and-two at the Tech 28, Bilbo's pass fell incomplete. On the next play, Davis sealed the win by going 28 yards for the touchdown and a 30-21 advantage.

The Jackets got the ball game two more times, and Bilbo moved Tech to the Fresno 33 with a 47-

yard pass to Bridges, but both possessions ended with interceptions.

The game was a muddy mess from the start after hard rain fell the night before. It took only a few plays for Tech's gleaming white uniforms—the Jackets wore their traditional white jerseys with white pants for the first time since 1994—to turn a dull brown, and there were plenty of slips and missed plays.

Suggs hit Kerry Watkins for a 35-yard touchdown pass late in the first half, and with Fresno managing only a pair of field goals, Tech led 7-6 and appeared ready to take the advantage into the intermission. But on second-and-six from the Tech 24-yard line with just 26 seconds left, Suggs' pass down the right sideline was underthrown and intercepted by Dee Meza, who returned its 48 yards for the touchdown and a 13-7 Fresno State lead.

After its school-record sixth straight postseason appearance, Georgia Tech is now 20-11 (.645) in bowl games.

Tech placekicker Luke Manget made three extra points to give him 160 straight PATs, one shy of the NCAA record for consecutive extra points of 161, set by John Becksvoort of Tennessee from 1991-94.



Tech 24, NC State 17 (11-2-02)

Gordon Clinkscale's 14-yard touchdown run with 9:23 to play capped Georgia Tech's fourth-quarter rally as the Yellow Jackets won 24-17 to hand eighth-ranked NC State its first loss. Trailing 17-9 in the fourth quarter, Tech drove 80 yards on nine plays, capped by a two-yard touchdown pass from A.J. Suggs to tight end John Paul Foschi. Suggs then added a two-point conversion pass to Jonathan Smith, who made the key play on the drive with a 28-yard reception when Tech was facing third-and-19 at its own 11. After forcing NC State to go three-and-out, Kelley Rhino's 26-yard punt return to the Wolfpack 22-yard line set up Clinkscale's go ahead touchdown two plays later. The Tech defense made several key plays down the stretch, including a fumble recovery and a fourth-down pass breakup by Reuben Houston and an interception by Jeremy Muyres on NC State's final possession.

Tech 31, Clemson 28 (11-4-00)


George Godsey passed for a school record 454 yards, including the gamewinning touchdown to Kerry Watkins with just seven seconds left, to lift Georgia Tech to a 31-28 victory at fourth-ranked Clemson, the highest ranked team that Tech has beaten since knocking off top-ranked Virginia in 1990. Clemson took a 24-21 lead on Brian Mance's 88-yard punt return at the end of the third guarter, but Godsey guided the Yellow Jackets on two 80-yard scoring drives in the final 10 minutes. First he hit Kelly Campbell for a 48-yard touchdown with 6:35 to play. After Clemson went ahead 28-24 on a Willie Simmons-to-Rod Gardner touchdown pass with 1:52 left, Godsey took over at his own 20 and completed seven of 11 passes for 72 yards, capped by a 16-yard touchdown to Watkins, who was knocked down on the play before making a spectacular one-handed catch in the corner of the end zone. Watkins caught four passes for 51 yards on the final drive, while Campbell finished the game with 209 yards receiving on a school record-tying 14 catches. The Tech defense held the Tigers to 354 total yards-138 yards below their average—and 14 points (Clemson had a punt return for a touchdown and a blocked punt that gave them the ball inside the one-yard line). On 14 offensive possessions, Clemson scored twice, and the Tigers ran 64 offensive plays to 97 for Tech.

Tech 51, Georgia 48, OT (11-27-99)

Luke Manget's 38-yard field goal in overtime capped a dramatic ending and lifted 16th-ranked Georgia Tech to a 51-48 victory over No. 20 Georgia. The Bulldogs overcame a 41-24 deficit in the second half and appeared to have the game won in regulation. After Tech tied the game at 48-all on Joe Hamilton's six-yard touchdown pass to Will Glover with 2:37 left, Georgia drove down the field to a firstand-goal at the Tech two-yard line with just 20 seconds on the clock. Rather than try the game-winning field goal, Georgia ran tailback Jasper Sanks up the middle, but Sanks fumbled in the pile, and Tech's Chris Young recovered to force overtime. After Georgia's possession ended with Marvious Hester's interception in the end zone, Tech opted for a 38-yard field goal try on third down. Manget's kick was blocked by Kendrell Bell, but holder George Godsey recovered the ball behind the line of scrimmage and returned it to the UGA 21. That gave Tech another chance on fourth down, and this time Manget's kick was good. The 99 points marked the highest scoring game in the 95year history of the series, and the two teams combined for 1,104 yards of offense.

Tech 31, North Carolina 24, OT (10-9-99)


Luke Manget's 36-yard field goal with five seconds left forced the first overtime game in Georgia Tech history, and Joe Hamilton scored the winning touchdown on a six-yard run, giving the Rambling Wreck a 31-24 win over North Carolina. After Tech stopped UNC on fourth-and-goal at the two-yard line, the drive for the tying field goal began with just 1:10 on the clock. Hamilton opened the drive with a 36-yard completion to Kelly Campbell, and then on third-and-four from the Tech 40, he hit Campbell for 35 yards down the right sideline to the UNC 25 to set up Manget. After Hamilton's touchdown in overtime, the Jackets held North Carolina on downs.






Tech 21, Georgia 19 (11-28-98)

Brad Chambers' 35-yard field goal with just two seconds left capped a 14-point fourth-quarter comeback and lifted 17th-ranked Georgia Tech over No. 12 Georgia, 21-19, in Athens for the Jackets' first win over their archrival since 1990. Tech trailed 19-7 when a one-yard touchdown run by Joe Burns and a two-point conversion by quarterback Joe Hamilton made the score 19-15 with 13 minutes to play. Chambers hit a career-long 49-yarder with 5:01 left to pull the Jackets within one, and after Tech stopped the Bulldogs on three plays, Chambers' game-winning field goal capped a 52-yard, 10-play drive.

Tech 24, Clemson 21 (11-12-98)

Freshman tailback Joe Burns' one-yard run with 1:00 left gave 23rd-ranked Georgia Tech a 24-21 victory at Clemson in an ESPN Thursday night game. Burns' score capped a 57-yard, seven-play drive engineered by quarterback Joe Hamilton, who completed three passes for 53 yards on the drive, including a 28-yard, third-down completion to Charlie Rogers to the Clemson 19. He then connected with Dez White for 15 yards to the four and ran three yards to the one.

Tech 41, Virginia 38 (10-17-98)

Georgia Tech rallied from a 21-point third-quarter deficit to upend sixth-ranked Virginia, 41-38, on Dez White's 54-yard touchdown reception with 4:40 left at Bobby Dodd Stadium. Tech trailed 38-17 when Delaunta Cameron's 34-yard fumble return, resulting from Nate Stimson's sack of UVa quarterback Aaron Brooks, cut the margin to 38-24 with 3:09 left in the third quarter. After Brad Chambers' 47-yard field goal made it 38-27, Tech quarterback Joe Hamilton hit White for a 35-yard touchdown with 8:13 to play, bringing the Jackets within 38-33. After forcing Virginia to punt, Tech began its game-winning drive at its own 31, and on third-and-seven from the Tech 46, Hamilton found White, who turned a short slant pass into his third touchdown of the game. Tech had to weather a final threat that ended when a 54-yard field goal attempt by Virginia's Todd Braverman fell just short with 21 seconds left. The Jackets forced the long field goal because one play earlier, Stimson wrapped up Brooks and drew an intentional grounding penalty that resulted in a 12-yard loss. White set a school record with 243 yards receiving and Tech won despite being outgained, 600-370.

Tech 23, Clemson 20 (9-27-97)

Backup kicker Brad Chambers kicked the game-winning, 20-yard field goal with just 1:54 left to lift Tech over 17th-ranked Clemson. The Jackets led for most of the contest until the Tigers tied the score at 20-20 with eight minutes to play. With less than four minutes left, Tech's Harvey Middleton set up the winning score as he returned a punt 21 yards to the Tiger 44, and then on first down, he made a diving 39-yard reception down to the five-yard line.

Tech 13, Virginia 7 (10-5-96)

Georgia Tech used outstanding special teams and a strong defensive effort that forced five turnovers to upset 12th-ranked Virginia, 13-7. Tech scored all its points in the game's first 20 minutes on a pair of field goals, including a 53-yarder by Dave Frakes, and a touchdown by C.J. Williams, and then held on despite managing only 32 yards of offense in the second half. Rodney Williams punted nine times for a 40-yard average, including a 77-yard blast, and six times pinned the Cavaliers inside the 20. Tech's defense came up with four interceptions and a fourth-quarter stand after the Cavs drove to the Tech 18-yard line in the final minutes.

Tech 27, NC State 19 (11-11-95)

Backup quarterback Brandon Shaw guided Tech to 21 fourth-quarter points as the Jackets rallied from 13 points down. Tech trailed 19-6 with 2:54 left in the third when starting QB Donnie Davis left with a shoulder injury. Facing third-and-17 from his own eight, Shaw moved Tech down the field in 17 plays, capped by C.J. Williams' five-yard run with 11:24 to play. On State's next possession, Ryan Stewart recovered a fumbled pitch at the NCS 28, and two plays later, Tech went ahead for good on Williams' eight-yard touchdown run with 10:04 left. He added another score, his fourth of the day, at the 4:50 mark.

Tech 16, NC State 13 (10-3-92)

Scott Sisson's 29-yard field goal on the game's final play, set up by a 54-yard pass from Shawn Jones to Keenan Walker, lifted 23rd-ranked Georgia Tech over No. 21 NC State. Tech had taken over on its own 34-yard line with just 11

seconds left after State's Steve Videtich missed a potential game-winning 51-yard field goal. Sisson also kicked a 36-yard field goal to tie the score with just 2:27 left in the game.

Tech 18, Stanford 17 (12-25-91, Aloha Bowl)

Quarterback Shawn Jones scored on a one-yard run with just 14 seconds left and tailback Jimy Lincoln added the winning points with a two-point conversion run to give Tech an 18-17 win over 17th-ranked Stanford in the Aloha Bowl. Stanford went ahead, 17-10, on Tommy Vardell's second touchdown of the game with 5:50 left in the second quarter, and the score remained that way until the game's final seconds. With 1:57 remaining, Stanford punted to Willie Clay, who fielded the ball at the Tech six and returned it 63 yards to the Cardinal 31, setting up the Jackets' seven-play drive for the win.

Tech 19, Furman 17 (11-9-91)

Furman held the ball and a 17-16 lead with less than two minutes to play when Tech OLB Marlon Williams sacked Paladin QB Hugh Swilling and caused a fumble that was recovered by Tech's Coleman Rudolph at the Furman 22. Three plays later, Scott Sisson kicked the game-winning, 37-yard field goal with 21 seconds left.

Tech 24, Virginia 21 (9-19-91)


Scott Sisson beat Virginia on a last-second kick for the second straight year, this time booting a 33-yarder on the game's final play for the 24-21 win. The Cavaliers tied the score on a 19-yard touchdown from Bobby Goodman to Aaron Mundy with just 1:56 left, but Shawn Jones drove Tech 58 yards in 11 plays, hitting a 19-yard pass to Jason McGill to set up Sisson's heroics.

Tech 6, Virginia Tech 3 (11-10-90)

Scott Sisson kicked two field goals in the final five minutes, including the game-winner from 38 yards out with just eight seconds left to keep the Yellow Jackets undefeated on the road to their 1990 national championship.

Tech 41, Virginia 38 (11-3-90)

In a game which has been called the greatest in Atlantic Coast Conference history, Tech fell behind the nation's No. 1-ranked team, 28-14, at the half before rallying to win on Scott Sisson's 37-yard field goal with just seven seconds left.

Tech tied the score at 28-28 in the third quarter on Jerry Gilchrist's 12-yard reverse and Shawn Jones' 26-yard touchdown pass to Emmett Merchant. After Virginia regained the lead on a 63-yard bomb from Shawn Moore to Herman Moore, Tech pulled even again on William Bell's eight-yard touchdown run, and then Sisson put the Jackets ahead, 38-35, with a 32-yard field goal with seven minutes to go. The Cavaliers had a first-and-goal at the one but were forced to settle for a tying field goal with 2:34 left to set the stage for Sisson's heroics.

Tech 21, Clemson 19 (10-13-90)

Eighteenth-ranked Georgia Tech used Kevin Tisdel's 87-yard kickoff return and a dramatic goal-line stand to knock off 15th-ranked Clemson for its ninth straight win. A pair of Shawn Jones touchdown passes gave Tech a 14-3 halftime lead, but Clemson chipped away with three second half field goals by Chris Gardocki. Tisdel's return set up T.J. Edwards' five-yard touchdown for a 21-12 advantage with 13:53 left. Clemson drove to the Tech one-yard line, but line-backer Calvin Tiggle keyed a goal-line stand on fourth down. The Tigers managed a touchdown two minutes later after recovering a fumble at the Tech 41, and then the Jackets weathered Gardocki's 60-yard field attempt, which fell just short with 59 seconds left.

Tech 13, Boston College 12 (11-25-89)

Scott Sisson kicked two 35-yard field goals in the final six minutes, including the game-winner with 42 seconds left, as Tech escaped with a 13-12 victory. Sisson's winning field goal capped a nine-play, 56-yard drive keyed by Shawn Jones, who had scrambles of 15 and 10 yards and completed an 18-yard pass to Brent Goolsby on the drive.

Tech 17, North Carolina 14 (10-21-89)

With Georgia Tech trailing 14-10 and facing third-and-11, Shawn Jones scrambled 30 yards for the winning touchdown with just 51 seconds left. Tech led 10-0 late in the third quarter, but UNC went ahead by recovering a blocked punt in the end zone with 6:35 left.

Tech 30, Clemson 14 (10-14-89)

Shawn Jones passed for 223 yards and two touchdowns and the Georgia Tech defense forced five turnovers to knock off 14th-ranked Clemson, 30-14, the Tigers' first homecoming loss in 19 years. Jones threw scoring passes of 81 yards to Bobby Rodriguez and eight yards to Jerry Mays, who also rushed for 97 yards and a score. Tech's defense had two interceptions, two fumble recoveries and a blocked field goal while holding the Tigers to 111 yards rushing.

Tech 28, Maryland 24 (10-7-89)


Shawn Jones threw four touchdown passes, three of them in the third quarter, as Georgia Tech overcame deficits of 14-0 and 21-7 to snap a 16-game ACC losing streak. Tech fell behind 14-0 before getting on the board with a touchdown just 18 seconds before halftime. Maryland regained its 14-point lead with a score early in the third quarter before Jones tossed three touchdowns in an eight-minute span, two of them to tight end Tom Covington.

Tech 34, South Carolina 0 (10-15-88)

Andre Thomas grabbed two of Georgia Tech's four interceptions, returning one 51 yards for a touchdown, as the Yellow Jackets stunned eighth-ranked South Carolina, 34-0, at Bobby Dodd Stadium. Thomas was named the national Defensive Player of the Week by *Sports Illustrated* and *The Sporting News*. Jerry Mays rushed for 130 yards and Stefen Scotton scored two touchdowns on the ground. Quarterback Todd Rampley completed 14 of 22 passes for 170 yards, including a 12-yard touchdown to Steve Davenport.

Tech 20, Georgia 16 (11-30-85)

Gary Lee's electrifying 95-yard kickoff return proved to be the game-winning play as Georgia Tech downed archrival and 20th-ranked Georgia on a foggy night at Grant Field. Tech jumped out to early leads of 3-0 and 10-3 before watching the Bulldogs dominate the second and third quarters by piling up 341 yards rushing. But after Georgia took a 16-10 lead with a field goal, Lee authored the game-winning play on the ensuing kickoff. Taking the ball at the five, the junior speedster raced down the East sideline and, after a crucial block from Damian Burke, sped untouched into the end zone for a 17-16 advantage with 4:25 left in the third quarter. The Jackets added insurance on David Bell's 46-yard field goal, but the game was not decided until Tech linebacker Jim Anderson recovered a fumble by UGA quarterback James Jackson at midfield in the closing minute.

Tech 17, Michigan State 14 (12-31-85, All-American Bowl)

Malcolm King, who rushed for 122 yards, scored the winning touchdown on a five-yard run with 1:50 left. With four players suspended, including starting QB John Dewberry and starting SE Gary Lee, Tech trailed 14-7 until David Bell's 40-yard field goal with 7:08 in the game cut the deficit to 14-10. The winning drive, covering 42 yards in eight plays, was set up when Tech's Pat Swilling recovered a fumble by Spartan tailback Lorenzo White at the MSU 42.

Tech 28, Clemson 21 (9-29-84)

Fullback Chuck Easley's one-yard plunge with just 33 seconds left capped a nine-play, 54-yard drive—all on the ground—to lift 18th-ranked Tech to a 28-21 upset of 12th-ranked Clemson, ending the Tigers 20-game ACC winning streak. Tech led 21-0 at the half, but Clemson stormed back to tie the score with 10 minutes to play.

Tech 24, Alabama 21 (9-12-81)

Robert Lavette scored the winning touchdown on a two-yard run with just 3:57 left as Tech shocked fourth-ranked Alabama in the season opener at Legion Field in Birmingham. Alabama led 10-0 and 13-7 early and took a 21-14 into the fourth quarter before Ron Rice's 28-yard field goal brought Tech within 21-17. The winning drive covered 80 yards, keyed by a 54-yard completion on third down from Mike Kelley to Ken Whisenhunt. Alabama's 50-yard field goal attempt on the game's final play fell short.

Tech 3, Notre Dame 3 (11-8-80)

In the second of three matchups with No. 1-ranked teams in 1980, Georgia Tech shocked top-ranked Notre Dame with a 3-3 tie at Grant Field. Freshman quarterback Ken Whisenhunt's 23-yard completion to Jeff Keisler set up Johnny Smith's 39-yard field goal with 6:11 left in the second quarter. Late in the game, Notre Dame's Stacey Toran intercepted Ted Peeples' pass and the Irish moved downfield for Harry Oliver's game-tying field goal with just 4:44 left to play.

Tech 6, South Carolina 3 (10-7-78)

Johnny Smith's 34-yard field goal with just 57 seconds left gave Tech a 6-3 win. With the score tied at 3-3, Tech took over with 4:55 to play and covered 53 yards in nine plays to set up the winning kick.

Tech 23, Notre Dame 14 (11-6-76)

With quarterback Gary Lanier directing Tech's wishbone attack, the Jackets knocked off 11th-ranked Notre Dame, 23-14, without throwing a single pass. Tech trailed 14-3 late in the first half when Drew Hill's 46-yard reverse set up a score by Lanier. In the second half, the Jackets held Notre Dame to just 21 yards rushing while scoring 13 unanswered points. David Sims led Tech with 122 yards and two touchdowns, while Eddie Lee Ivery added 81 yards rushing.

Tech 29, North Carolina 28 (10-12-74)

Adrian Rucker scored from seven yards out with just 36 seconds left and then Rudy Allen hit Jimmy Robinson for the two-point conversion to give Georgia Tech a 29-28 victory over North Carolina at Grant Field. The Tar Heels had gone ahead on Chris Kupec's five-yard touchdown with 2:34 to play, but Randy Rhino returned the kickoff 57 yards and then Allen completed three straight passes to Robinson for a first down at the UNC seven with 43 seconds left. David Sims, who rushed for 134 yards on 15 carries, scored twice and fullback Jimmy Murray added another touchdown to give Tech a 21-14 lead, before UNC answered with a touchdown run by Kupec to knot the score at 21-21.

Tech 31, Iowa State 30 (12-18-72, Liberty Bowl)

Tech trailed 14-3 after one quarter and 21-17 at the half before taking a 24-21 lead on a 22-yard pass from Jim Stevens to Rob Healy with seven minutes left in the third quarter. After Iowa State tied the game with a field goal, Stevens tossed the game-winning touchdown, a three-yard completion to Kevin McNamara with 11:28 to play. Iowa State had a chance to win the game, however, after recovering Stevens' errant pitch and then driving 33 yards for a touchdown with 1:36 left. But the Cyclones failed on the two-point conversion, and Tech's Mark Fields recovered the ensuing onside kick.

Tech 21, Michigan State 16 (9-23-72)


Georgia Tech quarterback Eddie McAshan threw for 239 yards and two touchdowns, including a 77-yard touchdown strike to flanker Jimmy Robinson on Tech's first play of the game, to lead the Yellow Jackets to a 21-16 victory at 18th-ranked Michigan State. McAshan, who completed 16 of 26 passes, also hit Robinson for a 36-yard touchdown that gave Tech a 21-3 lead at the end of the third quarter. The Spartans fought back with a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns and were driving for another score when all-America cornerback Randy Rhino ended the threat with an interception at the Tech 14.

Tech 17, Baylor 10 (9-27-69)

Tech scored the winning touchdown on a 21-yard pass from Charlie Dudish to Steve Harkey with just 44 seconds left. With the game tied at 10, an interception by David Polk gave Tech possession at its own 46-yard line with 1:37 to play, and six plays later the Jackets scored. Baylor then drove into Tech territory but Jeff Ford sealed the win with an interception at the Tech 11.

Tech 6, Georgia 0 (11-29-69)

Jack Williams sneaked over from one-yard out for the game's only touchdown in the second quarter as Georgia Tech upset bowl-bound Georgia at Grand Field, Tech's first shutout of the Bulldogs since 1956. Jeff Ford ended Georgia's only serious scoring threat with an interception in the end zone with six minutes left, while Bubba Hoats tied the Tech record with three interceptions.

Tech 23, Tulane 19 (10-26-68)

Jack Williams hit Kenny Bounds for a seven-yard touchdown pass with just 45 seconds left as the Jackets overcame Tulane's 12-point rally in the final six minutes. Tech led 16-7 late in the game but the Green Wave drove 80 yards for a touchdown with 2:52 left and then recovered the ensuing onside kick at the Tech 44, leading to the go-ahead touchdown and a 19-16 lead with just 1:59 to play before the Jackets began their winning drive at the Tulane 23.

Tech 21, Auburn 20 (10-19-68)

Tech trailed 14-0 at the end of the first quarter and 20-14 at the end of three quarters before scoring the winning touchdown on a three-yard run by Kenny Bounds with six minutes left. The Jackets withstood Auburn's 29-yard field goal attempt with 57 seconds left.

Tech 6, Tennessee 3 (10-8-66)

Bunky Henry's two second-quarter field goals, including a career-long 41-yarder, proved to be the difference as ninth-ranked Georgia Tech knocked off No. 8 Tennessee, 6-3, in a nationally televised contest at Grant Field. After Tennessee kicker Gary Wright gave the Volunteers the early lead with a 27-yard field goal, John Sias returned the kickoff 49 yards and then Tech quarterback Kim King, who was named National Player of the Week, hit three passes to Steve Almond down to the UT seven to set up Henry's first field goal from 22 yards out. On the Vols' next possession, linebacker W.J. Blane intercepted a pass at the UT 45 and returned it to the 32, leading to Henry's second field goal. Blane preserved the victory with his second interception of the day at the Tech 23-yard line with two minutes to play. Tech won despite being outgained, 244-127 yards.

Tech 7, Alabama 6 (11-17-62)

In a classic showdown that head coach Bobby Dodd called his greatest victory, underdog Georgia Tech ended top-ranked Alabama's 26-game unbeaten streak with a hard-fought, 7-6, victory before 52,971 fans at Grant Field, at the time an Atlanta record for football attendance. Tech dominated the first half, taking a 7-0 lead on Mike McNames nine-yard touchdown run with 4:22 in the second quarter while allowing the Crimson Tide to cross midfield just once. McNames had set up his score by intercepting a Joe Namath pass and returning it 26 yards to the Alabama 14. The Tide managed its only score in the fourth

quarter when Billy Lothridge bobbled the snap on a punt and was ruled down at the nine-yard line. Four plays later, Cotton Clark's two-yard touchdown made the score 7-6 with 5:31 to play. Alabama elected to go for two, but end Jack Hurlbut was tackled by McNames and Ed Griffin. After the Tide recovered the on-sides kick at the Tech 33, Namath's first pass was intercepted by Frank Sexton, who returned it to the Alabama 42, where his fumble was recovered by the Tide. Namath moved his team to a first down at the Tech 14 with less than two minutes to play. Rather than set up a field goal, Namath threw for the end zone and his pass was picked off by Don Toner with 1:05 left, preserving Tech's first win over a Bear Bryant-coached Alabama team.

Tech 14, Tennessee 7 (11-5-60)


Billy Williamson's 93-yard kickoff return late in the first quarter gave Georgia Tech the lead for good and the Rambling Wreck defense made it stand up as Tech recorded a 14-7 upset over eighth-ranked Tennessee at Grant Field. The Jackets returned a Tennessee punt 26 yards to the 16-yard line, and on the next play, halfback Chick Graning found the end zone for a 7-0 lead. After the Vols tied the score, Williamson's return gave the Jackets a lead they would not relinquish. Led by Billy Shaw and Larry Stallings the Tech defense limited the Vols to just 58 yards in total offense over the final three quarters of play and only 139 yards for the game.

Tech 16, SMU 12 (9-26-59)

Quarterback Fred Braselton passed for 73 yards and two touchdowns and rushed for 59 more to lead 16th-ranked Georgia Tech to a 16-12 victory over sixth-ranked SMU at Grant Field. With Tech trailing 12-7, Braselton set up the winning score with a 33-yard run and then hit Fred Murphy for a 10-yard scoring pass to put the Jackets ahead for good at 13-12 late in the third quarter.

Tech 17, Baylor 14 (1-1-52, Orange Bowl)

Pepper Rodgers' six-yard field goal with 2:56 left in the game broke a 14-14 tie to give Tech a 17-14 victory over Baylor in the Orange Bowl. The Yellow Jackets had tied the game on a touchdown pass from Darrell Crawford to Buck Martin with six minutes to play.



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COACHING HISTORY

GEORGIA TECH HEAD COACHES

Chan Gailey is the 11th full-time football coach in school history. Prior to 1904, when John Heisman became the school's first permanent head coach, the team was "coached" by professors, interested townspeople or one of the players.

Professor Ernest E. West, a Naval College graduate, directed Tech's first football team in 1892. In 1893 and '94, the squad was coached by volunteers Frank O. Spain, a Mathematics professor, and Lt. Leonard Wood (who later became famous as the colonel in command of Roosevelt's Rough Riders and as Governor General of Cuba), then stationed at Ft. McPherson in Atlanta. The rules were rather lax in those days, so Spain and Wood also played on the team.

The next volunteer coach of record was R.B. "Cow" Nalley in 1898, a "Mr. Collier" in 1899, Dr. Cyrus W. Strickler in 1901, and John McKee in 1902.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP RECOGNITION

Georgia Tech has won four national championships. Tech's four titles are by virtue of a national wire service (1952 & 1990) or by consensus of polls available at the time (1917 & 1928).

Tech's undefeated 1951 squad did not win a wire service title (Tennessee won the AP and UPI crowns), but the Jackets, along with Illinois, earned national championship recognition by the Boand System. William Boand of Tucson, Ariz., developed a mathematical formula that was published in newspapers from 1930-60.

Tech's 1951 and 1956 teams also earned national championship recognition by the Berryman system, a mathematical formula developed by Clyde Berryman of Washington, D.C. in 1990. Berryman named predated national champions from 1940-89.





GOVERNOR'S CUP

Trophy Presented to Winner of Rivalry Game Between Tech & Georgia

From 1933 through 1993, a freshmen and then in later years, a junior varsity football game was played between Georgia Tech and the University of Georgia to benefit the needy children at Scottish Rite Children's Hospital. This game was played annually at Georgia Tech's Grant Field on Thanksgiving Day and moved the Atlanta Constitution's legendary journalist Ralph McGill to coin the oft-repeated phrase, "Strong legs will run so that weak legs may walk." This became the motto for the game.

The idea for the charity game was fostered in 1930 with an all-star game by teams representing the Northern and Southern Divisions of the old Southern Conference. The quarterback that day for the Northern team just happened to be Bobby Dodd. In 1933, Georgia Tech coach William Alexander and Georgia coach H.J. Stegeman asked a group of Atlanta businessmen to form a committee to sell tickets to the freshman game and give the proceeds to Scottish Rite, and an Atlanta tradition was born.

The proceeds of this game actually met the annual operating expenses of the hospital and kept the doors of this nationally recognized institution open for years.

The winner of this game was given the Governor's Cup, which was kept by the winning school until the following year.

In 1993, NCAA mandated scholarship and total player limitations forced the discontinuation of the game and the Governor's Cup was retired. In 1994, a "Legends Game" was played between the two teams

to keep the tradition alive, and appeals were made by the two athletic departments to the NCAA to continue the Governor's Cup presentations with the Varsity football game.

The NCAA now recognizes the Georgia-Georgia Tech varsity football game as a "special event." Beginning in 1995, this allows the hospital, now Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, to present the Governor's Cup annually to the winner of this game. In addition, the seniors on both teams receive a watch commemorating their participation and the seniors on the winning team receive a personalized, engraved replica of the actual Governor's Cup.


