Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated was the first Greek letter organization established by black college women. Alpha Kappa Alpha was founded January 15, 1908 one the campus of Howard University. Since then, it has grown from one undergraduate chapter to an international organization with a membership of over 100,000 women. Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority was organized and continues to exist as a channel and instrument for the expression of sisterhood and friendship.

Alpha Kappa Alpha's national program theme for the next four years is Creative

Strategies for Action: Addressing the Crisis of the 1990's. The theme addresses six targets: Back to Basics in Education, Addressing Health Concerns, Attaining Economic Empowerment, Strengthening the Black Family, Focusing on the Arts, and Enhancing the Global Perspective. Sorors of Alpha Kappa Alpha all over the world will be implementing this theme and its targets into their chapter programs in order to address the critical issues of the 1990's.

Nu Beta Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. was founded on the campus of Georgia Tech, April 14, 1979. In addition to the national tar-

gets, Nu Beta's target has been to try to enhance the lives of the students at Georgia Tech and the surrounding community. To achieve this, Nu Beta has had several projects including a creative learning project at Fowler St. Elementary School, tutoring at Techwood Community Center, health displays, clothing and can food drives, seminars on pertinent issues, freshman mixers, and fundraisers for the Educational Advancement Foundation, National Council of Nearo Women, United Negro College Fund, and the Cleveland Job Corps.



These enterprising young ladies demonstrated a vital concern for social welfare, academic excellence, and cultural enrichment, de-emphasizing the social side of sorority life. Delta Sigma Theta, a public service sorority with over 175,000 members, was the largest Black Greek organization for women, with chapters well outside the United States. This past year Xi Alpha chapter was very active in the Techwood community where they tutored through the Techwood Tutorial Program, sponsored a Girl Scout troop, and participated in the Big Sister program. Also, members of the sorority held several executive positions in many campus organizations.






equal opportunity for African-Americans. The fraternity has grown steadily in influence throughout the years. Over 125,000 men have been initiated into Alpha Phi Alpha and there are now 400 college chapters on various campuses throughout the nation.

Nu Mu chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha was founded at Southern Tech and included Georgia Tech in its chapter base in 1978. The chapter has made some great accomplishments over the past twelve years including the Chapter of the Year for the state of Georgia and the award for most outstanding minority Greek letter organization the past two years. Activities during the 1990-1991 school year included participating in the Big Brothers, Big Sisters of Atlanta program, the Boy's Club of Atlanta, and

sponsorship of a Cub Scout troop in the Techwood Homes area. Campus activities included the Black and Gold Ball, the Miss Black and Gold Pageant, quarterly Attitude Adjustment parties, in addition to King Week activities honoring Martin Luther King Jr. and the annual Alpha Week to celebrate Alpha Phi Alpha and Nu Mu chapter.

On April 2, 1990 the Georgia Tech Colony of the Delta Chi Fraternity began with an interest group of twenty-five men. It was the first new fraternity on campus in over thirty years. On May 19, 1990, thirty-six Founding Fathers were initiated into the bond of brotherhood of Delta Chi. Since then the colony has expanded to over seventy members placing it in the top half of fraternities by size at Tech.

The Founding Fathers of the colony had a simple purpose in starting a new fraternity at Georgia Tech:

"To establish a fraternity

founded in brotherhood... To promote leadership and to strive for excellence in all aspects. To have a positive effect on Georgia Tech and the local community. To encourage participation, promote academic excellence and keep chivalry alive."

Delta Chi was initially founded at Cornell University in 1890. Today, Delta Chi has grown to one hundred twenty chapters and colonies across the U.S. and Canada with over 60,000 initiates.

By March 12, 1991, the Georgia Tech Colony had met all of the requirements established by the national fraternity and submitted a lone hundred seven page chartering petition to the Headquarters Office for approval. On

May 11, 1991 the Delta Chi Fraternity at Georgia Tech will receive its charter signifying its acceptance as a chapter.

Delta Chi is comprised of men who are willing to accept a challenge. We have developed into a productive fraternity at Georgia Tech promoting personal growth through brotherhood. With our goals and Ideals intact, Delta Chi will continue to be an active member of the Georgia Tech community as well as a positive influence for its members. The skills and abilities developed by Delta Chi's are unattainable in a classroom environment and prepare them for the challenges and opportunities they will encounter later in life. Delta Chi is truly a brotherhood of a lifetime.
