#### Motorcade To Leave For Classic City At 8:30 A. M.

Georgia Tech students will move into Athens tomorrow in a monstrous demonstration of school spirit as the motorcade, consisting of a large number of gayly decorated cars, starts on the long, sixty-mile parade. Mayor Key will be in the procession; Governor Talmadge has not yet announced if he will join it.

The participants in this motorcade will meet on Techwood Drive facing south at 8:30 A. M. tomorrow. Each car will have a number on both front and back, corresponding to its position in the procession. All drivers are urged to take their proper places promptly and keep their position during the entire parade. Each driver should maintain a distance of 100 feet behind the preceding car. If forced to fall out due to some failure of the motor, the driver should signal carefully and drive out on the shoulder.

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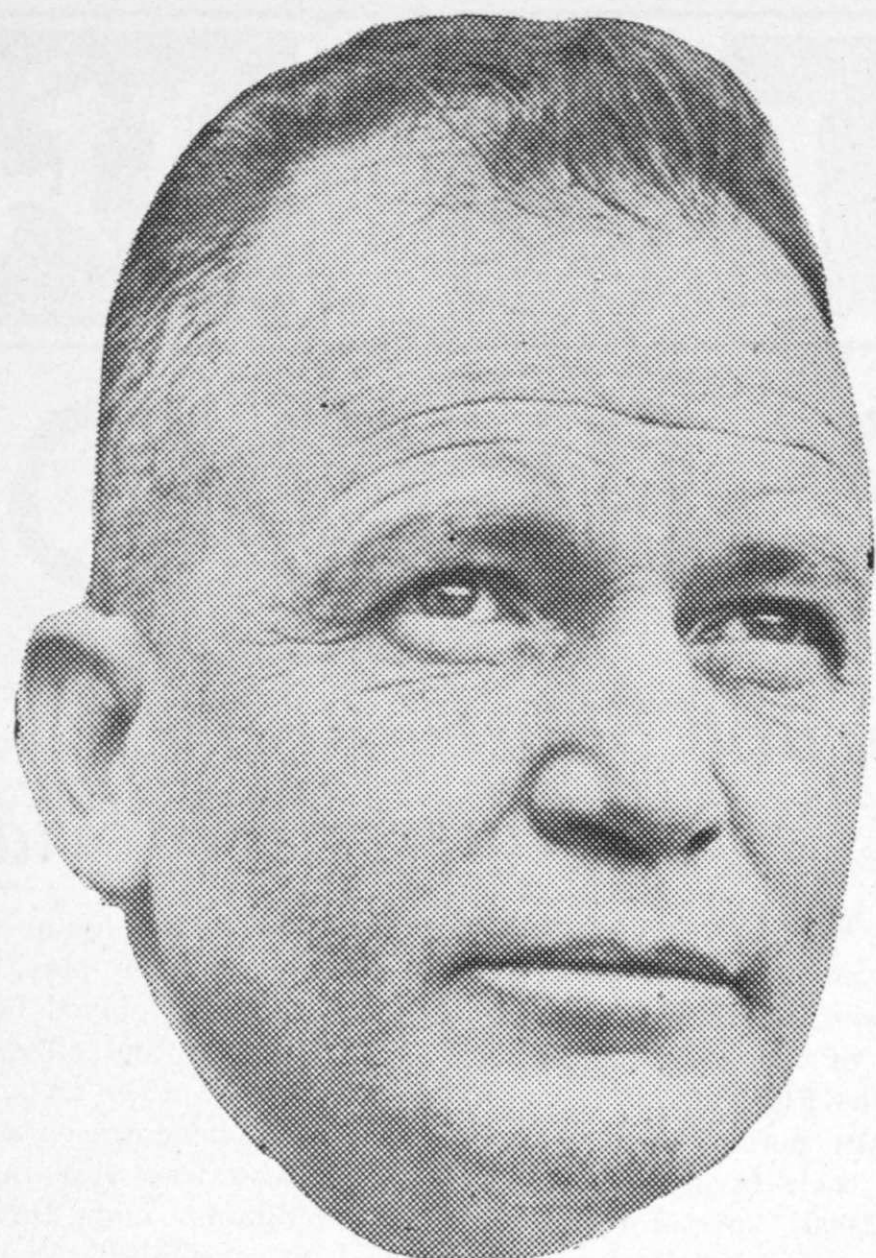
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COACH W. A. ALEXANDER

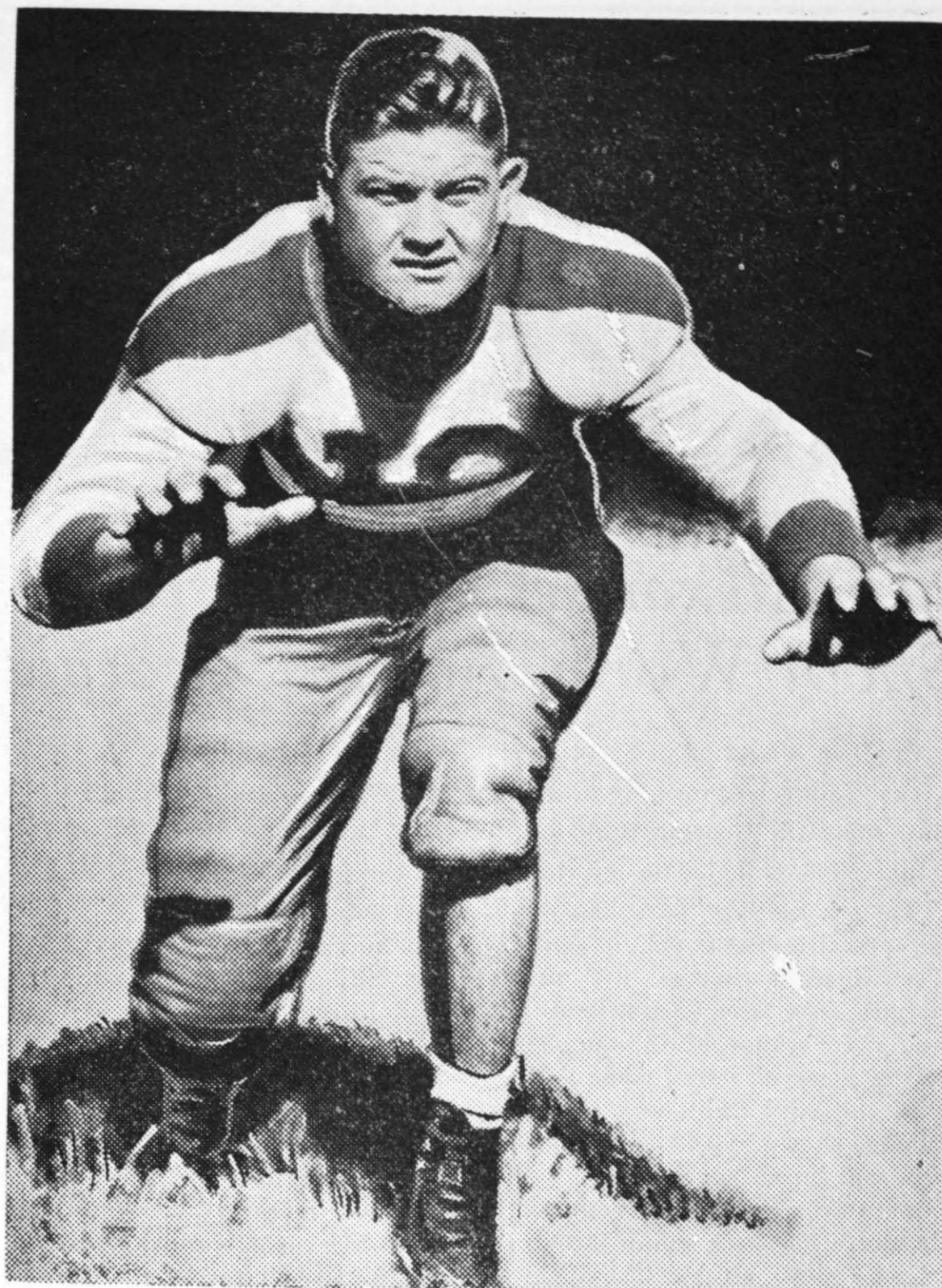

# JACKETS OUT FOR BLOOD

## Coach Alexander Prepares to Shoot Works Against Georgia

Tomorrow on Sanford Field in Athens, the Yellow Jackets from the Tech Flats meet the Georgia Bulldogs in the most colorful battle of the season. Though neither team has an impressive record, the game, like all other Tech-Georgia clashes, will attract visitors from the entire South, who come not because of the importance of the game or its outcome, but because of the hard fight, and spirit, that is always shown by the two teams. Tomorrow will be no exception.

If comparative scores were counted for their worth, Georgia should be almost twice as good as Tech. They held Alabama to a 20-point margin and University of North Carolina to 14 points, while Tech was defeated 40 and 20 points respectively by the same teams. However, such computing has no value in a Tech-Georgia classic. The underdog always rises to the occasion and time and time again in the past years has overpowered the public favorite. This year Tech as the

underdog offers more promise for an upset than on any previous occasion. Hounded by injuries and hard luck all season, the scores posted as the result of the past scheduled games do not tell the real worth of the Jacket gridsters. All the speed, power, and deception that is available in each Tech man will be put forth in an attempt to bring Georgia's scalp back to Atlanta. All the technique, cunning, and knowledge of football strategy will be brought to bear to earn Tech its first conference game. If the team is successful—the past defeats are forgotten and the season is a success; if unsuccessful—well, it's a Tech-Georgia game.

The final whistle tomorrow will bring to a close the football careers, under the White and Gold, for Captain Phillips at fullback, Jerry Perkerson at half, Shorty Roberts at quarter, Pee Wee Williams and Norris Dean at tackles, Dave Wilcox at guard, and Carl Shaw at center.

## Cross Country Squad Finishes Good Year

Last Saturday at Knoxville, Tenn., the Georgia Tech Cross Country Team ended a fairly successful season with a loss to the University of Tennessee, 25-30. This was the first defeat suffered by the Jackets' runners this year. Tennessee took the first three places, and the Jackets took the next five. Tennessee was unable to form a complete team, so Tech ran only five men to even conditions.

This year the Jackets defeated Auburn and Alabama before losing to Tennessee. The Jackets have no outstanding runners this year, but the team as a whole is very good. Even though Tech has not taken a first place this year, the team has won two of the three meets, and Coach Griffin is satisfied with the work of his boys.

The Freshman squad reported a very successful season, with several victories over the local prep schools. Starring for the Baby Harriers were Aldridge, Goldman, and Fambrough.

## Gibson and Shorty Roberts Win Praise of Floridians

The Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets, a team that has not converted an extra point this season, again lost a game by the margin of one point. The conquerors were the Florida 'Gators, who kicked an extra point to make the score 13-12 in their favor. The large crowd of 17,000 spectators were thrilled during the entire game, with all of the scoring being done during the last half.

It is easy to realize that Tech outplayed the 'Gators in every department but the punting by looking at the statistics. Tech made 12 first downs to 10 for Florida, and gained 299 yards to 195 for the 'Gators. It was Chase's punts and the inaccuracy of many Tech passes that kept the Jackets down to two touchdowns.

Shorty Roberts played his usual good game. He led Tech's offense with many excellent passes and runs. Hoot Gibson, who has played dependable ball throughout the season, was on the receiving end of many completed passes. Phillips returned to his form

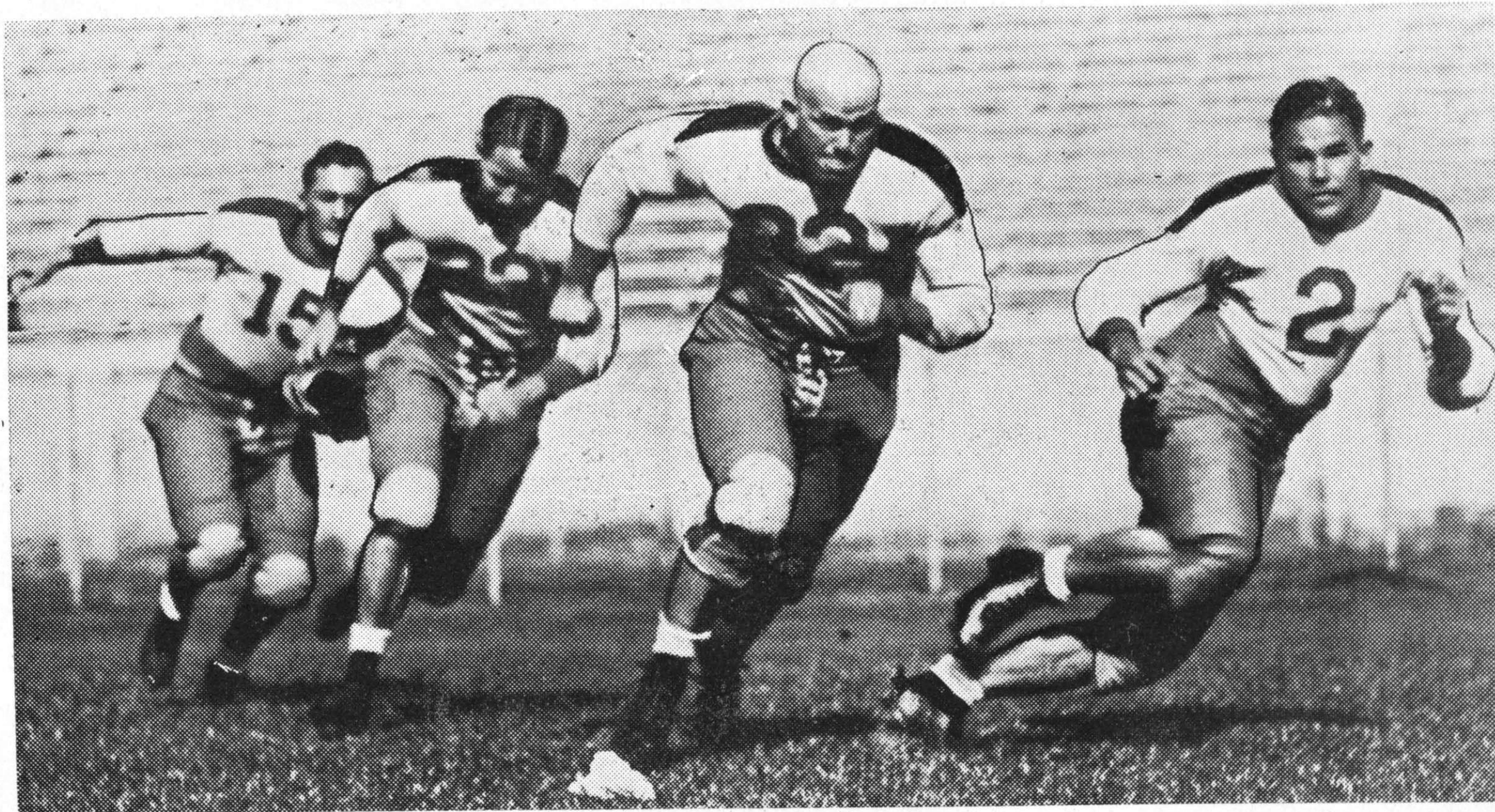
of last year in this game by hitting the line, play after play, for many gains. Thompson played both an excellent defensive and offensive game. He caught pass after pass, and made Tech's first touchdown on a pass from Roberts, who was standing in mid-field. Williams and Dave Wilcox showed up especially well in the line.

Chase, triple threat sophomore half-back, was the star of the game. He romped down the field for several long runs, did some fine punting, and threw excellent passes. Rowe and Stolz showed their ability as line plungers by making many gains through the line.

The Yellow Jackets threatened several times in the first and last quarters. Just before the final whistle, Roberts passed to Gibson over the goal line, but the official said that Perkerson had touched the ball and the play was brought back. This last play is still the subject of much discussion.

## '34 Grad Awarded A.S.M.E. Prize

"Dynamic Balance and Functional Utility Applied to Automotive Design," a paper prepared by H. Reynolds Hudson, won for him national acclaim and the 1934 national undergraduate student award of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers. The paper was awarded the local prize when it was presented before the Georgia Tech student branch of the A.S.M.E. last spring. Later it was entered into the contest for the national award. The annual meeting of the society in New York during the first week of December will witness the presentation of the prize. Mr. Hudson will be a guest of the council of the society at a dinner on December 4 and also at a luncheon on December 5 when he will be acclaimed for scientific honors befitting his work. Before returning to Atlanta he will attend the annual dinner of the A.S.M.E. at the Astor Hotel.

Mr. Hudson, an outstanding member of his class, received the Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering at Georgia Tech in June, 1934. For several years he has devoted himself to study and experimental work in the field of automotive design. The conclusions reached in this work furnished the basis for the prize-winning essay.

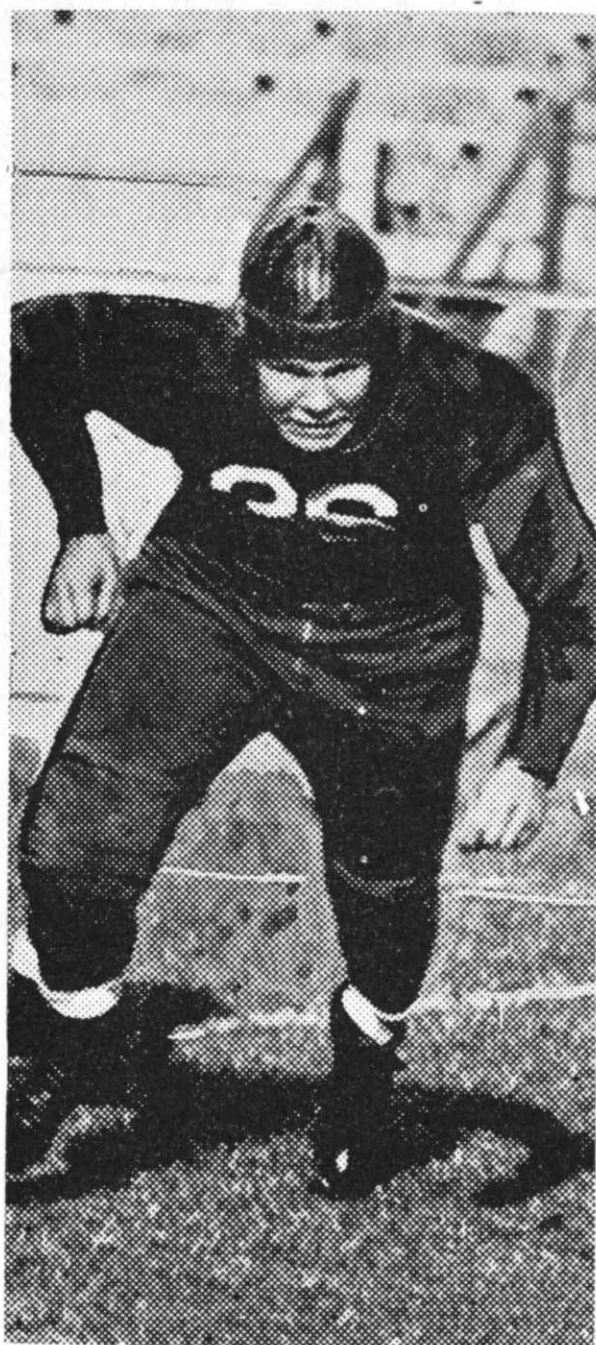
And that, my dear friends, was the team that was "rocked" out of Athens.

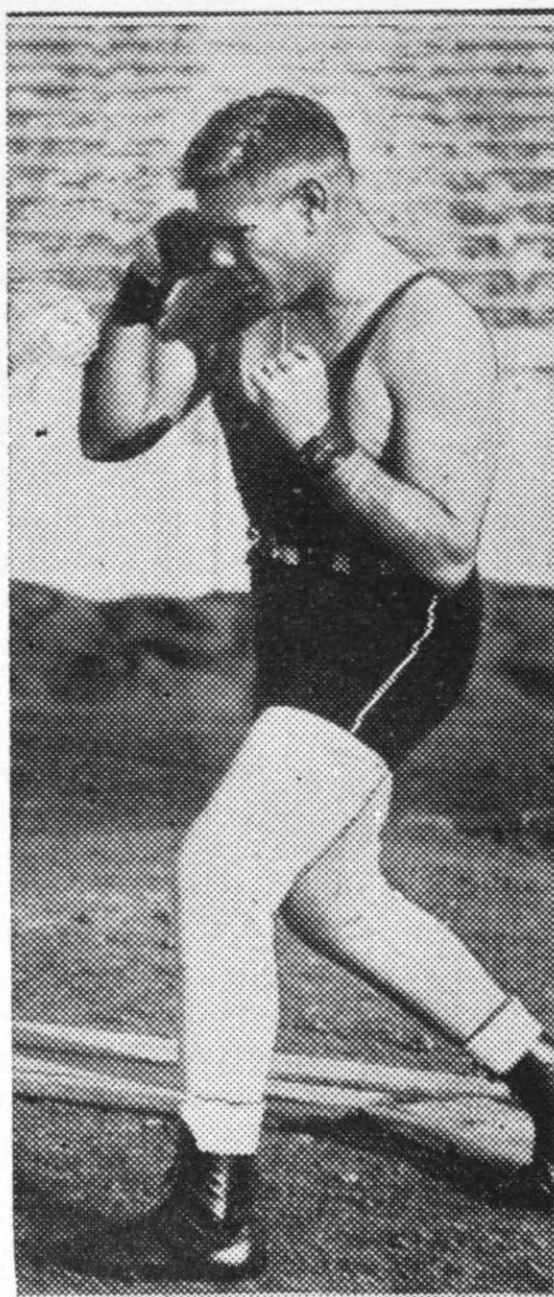

Group 2, under Prof. Lucas, of the Civil Engineering Department, meets in the Aeronautical Building. Group 3 meets in the Physics Lecture Room under Prof. Hill, of the Textile Engineering Department, while Group 4, directed by Prof. Ellis of the Electrical Engineering Department, meets in the Chemistry Building. Group 5 meets in the same building under Prof. Daniel.

The heads of each department will give lectures on their particular profession.

Through Professor Swigert's cooperation the various laboratories will be observed while in operation to give those interested a chance to see just what is going on. All students are asked to register ahead of time for the laboratory he wishes to see.

It is hoped that the freshmen will take advantage of these wonderful opportunities, for this plan has been worked out only after much painstaking labor on the part of interested faculty members. Further details will be announced at the next orientation classes.

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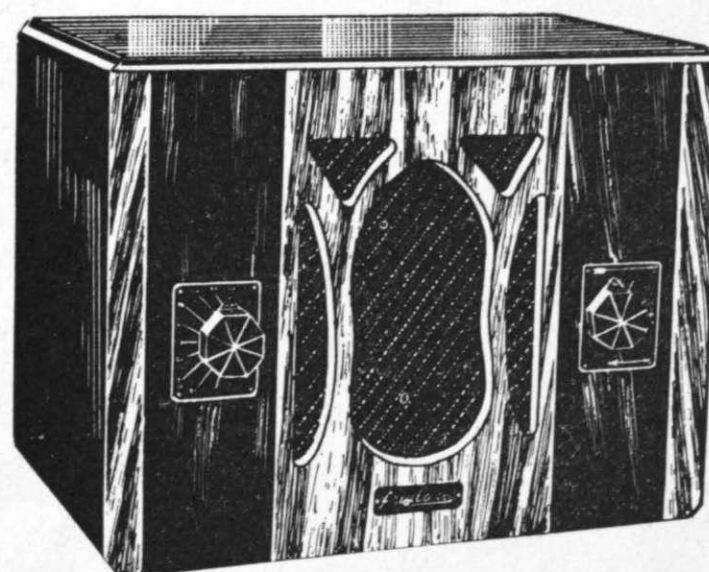
