Summer Registration Reaches Enrollment Of Over 2,500

Mr. Lloyd W. Chapin, head of the Georgia Tech Registrar's Office, announced last Wednesday that approximately 2,550 undergraduate students had registered for attendance of the summer quarter. He stated that this would not be the final tabulation due

to the fact that one more day remained in the late registration period, this period closing at four o'clock on Thursday afternoon. The number of students attending amounts to almost sixty per cent of the 4606 men that were enrolled during the last quarter.

At the present time no count has been announced as to the number of men enrolled in each of the individual major departments for this session, nor has the number of graduate students been tabulated as yet. Today is scheduled as the final day for the registration of graduate students.

The expectation of a number greater than that enrolled in the Spring Quarter is held for the Fall Quarter, Mr. Chapin added, and approximately one thousand of these students will be first term freshmen. There were no regular first term freshmen registered for the Summer Quarter but a sizeable group of Cooperative Students were matriculated.

With the probable completion of new dormitory space and temporary class rooms on the Tech campus by the Fall Quarter, hopes are that even with an enlarged student body relief will be found to some extent from the extremely crowded conditions.

Strite Made Assistant To President; 28 Other Faculty Members Promoted

Promotions of 29 faculty and administrative members of Georgia Tech were announced Saturday, June 14, by President Blake R. Van Leer. All of the promotions will be effective as of July 1, 1947.

Robert Strite, who is now comptroller, was named to fill the newly created post of Assistant to the President. Among the duties of the new position will be the coordination of the activities of all divisions and departments in new physical projects, revision with the faculty committee of the advance planning report, assistance in the development of the research program of Georgia Tech, supervision of faculty personnel and retirement fund records, execution of policies involving several departments, and relieving the President as much as possible of matters of administrative detail. Prior to assuming the office of comptroller in 1946, Captain Strite was commandant of the U. S. Navy units at Georgia Tech and Emory University. He is a graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy, class of 1920.

James R. Anthony, who has been purchasing agent of the School for more than ten years, has been appointed to the position of acting comptroller.

Mrs. Frances S. Krollenstein, secretary to Cherry L. Emerson, Dean of Engineering, was advanced to the rank of administrative assistant.

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Proposed Increase For Married Vets Is Before HVAC

The House Veterans Affairs Committee has ordered a bill (HR 3584) to raise subsistence allowances for married veterans reported out of committee. The bill now goes to the Rules Committee but does not necessarily go to the floor of the house unless that committee acts to permit it to do so.

This bill raises the subsistence allowances for married veterans from \$90 to \$105 a month, with \$20 a month additional for the first child and \$15 a month additional for each additional child. Single veterans receive no increase under this bill.

The Ga. Tech AVC chapter urges that all Tech veterans write to their congressmen without delay concerning this bill. Single men should also ask that the provisions of the bill be altered to provide a similar increase to them.

The Yellow Jacket baseball squad, with a .500 average during the regular conference season, swings into action again next Wednesday against Dortch Bakery on Rose Bowl Field at 4 p. m.

The Techsters resumed practice this week in preparation for a 10 game summer schedule.

No announcement is available as yet in regards to the teams to be played. However, it is known that the list of opponents will come from independent nines in and around Atlanta. No collegiate squads will be encountered, since the Techsters will be the only group in the conference to have an organized team.

A recap of spring play shows the Jackets winning the opener here against Georgia Teachers College. This was followed by a trip to Vanderbilt where the local lads split a pair with the Commodores. On the following week-end the Techmen staged a repeat performance, winning the opener while losing the tail-end encounter to Georgia. Visiting Auburn, the Jackets found trouble in solving the Tiger pitching slants and dropped two more.

At mid-season the records gave Tech three wins against four losses. Going around the loop again netting an even break with Auburn and Vanderbilt while the Georgians fell twice to make the season totals seven wins against six losses. In conference play, the won-loss record stood at 6-6.

The big problem currently on Coach Pittard's mind is how to get a new infield. Pete Leonard, Lewis Hook, Bobby Jordan and Henry Schoening, last spring's mainstays, will be out for the summer. "We've had some good prospects come out for practice," says Coach Pittard, "and I believe we can dig up a good combination amongst them."
