

Tech Accepts Sugar Bowl Invitation

Charlie Griffin, business manager of athletics, accepted, in behalf of Georgia Tech, an invitation Wednesday evening to play in the Sugar Bowl football classic on New Year's Day.

Bobby Dodd, athletic director and head coach of the undefeated Yellow Jackets, was very pleased over the acceptance and said, "We are very happy to have this opportunity to play in the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans because the New Orleans game seems to be the choice of our student body." The Southeastern Conference must give its approval before Tech can go, but this is only a formality and should come within a few days.

The bowl trip is the second in as many years for the Jackets. Last year they nosed out a strong Baylor eleven in Miami's Orange Bowl, 17 to 14. It is also the ninth bowl appearance for Tech and the fourth for Coach Dodd, who has never as head coach had one of his teams lose a New Year's Day game nor had one of his teams play

in the Sugar Bowl.

Throughout the years Tech has posted an impressive bowl record. The Jackets were the first football team in the nation to compete in all of the four major bowls: the Rose, Sugar, Orange, and Cotton Bowls. The first team to fill a New Year's Day engagement was the famous undefeated and untied squad of 1928 which went to Pasadena's Rose Bowl and conquered California 8 to 7. Since that initial bowl visit the Jackets have made seven more and have lost only twice. The following is Tech's complete bowl history:

- 1919 Rose Bowl—Tech beat California 8-7.
- 1940 Orange Bowl—Tech beat Missouri 21-7.
- 1943 Cotton Bowl—Tech lost to Texas 14-7.
- 1944 Sugar Bowl—Tech beat Tulsa 20-18.
- 1945 Orange Bowl—Tech lost to Tulsa 26-12.
- 1947 Oil Bowl—Tech beat St. Mary's 41-19.
- 1948 Orange Bowl—Tech beat Kansas 20-14.

1952 Orange Bowl—Tech beat Baylor 17-14.

An opponent for Tech in the Sugar Bowl has not as yet been named and some difficulty may be encountered by the bowl in obtaining a suitable opponent. Maryland, Oklahoma, Michigan State, Villanova and Penn State top the list of qualified challengers, but the first three are all forbidden to participate in a post season bowl because of conference rulings. Michigan State is seeking entrance into the Big Ten and can definitely be counted out of the bowl picture. Maryland and Oklahoma could attend and give Tech fine competition should their respective conferences change their ruling.

Tech students will have the opportunity to purchase tickets as soon as the Sugar Bowl officials send the ducats to Atlanta. The school will receive 13,000 tickets, most of which will be sold to students, alumni and faculty members. Coach Dodd made certain that the location of the seats would be in as favorable a position as possible.

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Navy Midshipmen Plan Ring Dance

The annual Navy Ball, one of the biggest and most colorful social functions of the school year, will be held on Saturday, Nov. 15. Decorations and arrangements are now being completed by the Navy Activities Committee, who has planned the entire function from favors to refreshments. This dance is a traditional affair modeled after the dance held annually at the United States Naval Academy, at which time the graduating Midshipmen receive their school rings, which are presented by girls of their choosing.

The event will be held at the gymnasium and will last from eight until twelve, with a brief intermission at ten-thirty. A wide variety of refreshments will be served by wives of the unit faculty throughout the evening.

The music for the occasion will be presented by the Rhythmairs, an accomplished Army band stationed at Ft. MacPherson. All of the musicians playing for the Rhythmairs are professionals, and many of them played for big name bands before entering the Army. Although this will be the second time that they have appeared on the Tech campus, the Rhythmairs have a very favorable reputation

in this section of the country. The group is a twelve-piece band, and includes a vocalist.

Dress for the evening will be formal, and the Midshipmen will appear in their dress blue uniforms, as will the officers present. Altogether, approximately three hundred midshipmen, officers, and their wives and dates are expected to attend.

Tickets are available only to Navy personnel here on the campus and may be obtained from any member of the Activities Committee. Two dollars includes the price of a ticket and invitation, plus a favor designed in the shape of a miniature Naval Officer's crest for the dates.

The Activities Committee is headed by chairman Bob O'Grady, with Tal Williams as Vice-Chairman and Bud Bauchspies as secretary. The advisor for the committee is Lt. Cobb, USN.

In the past, the Mechanics' Ball has proved to be a fine and entertaining affair. The dance will begin at 8:00 p.m., and music will be furnished by the Rhythmairs. The group consists of a seven-piece orchestra composed of bandmen from Fort McPherson. The Rhythmairs are known for their excellent music and will demonstrate their abilities from eight to twelve.

The main purpose of the dance is to help acquaint freshman co-ops with upperclassmen in the co-operative department. This does not imply that only co-op students are allowed to attend the affair; everyone is invited to the dance. The price of admission is \$1.50 per couple and tickets may be purchased at the door.

Briarean Society

The honorary organization of the Cooperative Department, the Briarean Society, will have its formal tapping of new members just before intermission. The Briarean Society draws its members from students in the Cooperative Department who have shown outstanding ability in their academic and extracurricular work. A student with the required academic standing becomes eligible at the end of his sophomore year. The function of the society is to initiate and further projects for the improvement of conditions and opportunities for cooperative students. Besides giving members opportunities for leadership, the society sponsors dances in conjunction with the Co-op Club and holds various other social functions.

Organized In 1915

The Co-op Club is one of the oldest social organizations on the campus. It was organized in 1915 for the purpose of promoting interest in co-op activities and fostering a spirit of fellowship among students in the Cooperative Department.

The club is composed of two sections, and each section sponsors numerous activities for co-op students. At the beginning of the summer and fall quarters a smoker is held for all entering co-op freshmen. For the benefit of all co-op students, Section One sponsors the "Miss Perfect Lips" Dance each summer, and the "Mechanics' Ball" is sponsored by Section Two in the fall. The two sections operate jointly under the Co-op Loan Fund to provide financial aid to seniors in the Cooperative Department.

Members in the club are selected from upperclassmen in the Co-op Department who are outstanding in leadership and character and who have manifested an active interest in co-op activities.

Be Present

First Trials Monday

Put a red circle around Monday, November 10, on your calendar. It's a red-letter day for every student on this campus, for next Monday night at 7 p.m. the Student Trial Board will hold its first hearing of the year. In addition to the students whose cases are being heard, the Trial Board itself, along with the effectiveness of Student Government, will be on trial. Only students and faculty members are allowed to witness the Trial Board in action; we strongly urge that you utilize this privilege.

Perhaps you don't know what this Board is. Read on and become the wiser.

Established under the Constitution of the Student Government, the Board is composed of ten members, elected to this office by the Student Council, though membership is not restricted to Council. At least six members are required to be seniors. The others may be juniors or seniors. The Vice President of the Student Council is the Chairman of the Board, who is Pete Silas this year. Present membership includes six seniors—Dean Davidson, Pete Dunlap, Ben Bishop, James White, Don Gordon, and Gus Randolph—and four juniors—Deck Hull, Cab Childress, Scott Shaw, and Tom Newberry.

Offenses subject to trial by the Board are: Offensive or excessive drinking, stealing, gambling, destruction of property, sexual offenses, illegal use of fire arms or explosives, and any other offense bringing discredit to the school or the Student Body. Any person duly summoned to appear before the Trial Board who fails to appear at the specified time is subject to penalty at the discretion of the Board.

The accused is allowed to present evidence and speak in his own defense. He may waive trial by the Trial Board and submit his case directly to the Executive Dean. All results of the Trial Board are reviewed by the Executive Dean of the school.

The cases to be heard Monday night involve scalping of football tickets. We cannot predict what the outcome of the trials will be, but we wish to call attention to the fact that violators of the rules governing football tickets are being called to account. It's widely known that some students are flagrantly violating these rules, in some cases even advertising their actions on public bulletin boards, and we call their attention in particular to Monday's trials.

LOCALLY, Too

"Time For A Change"

Someone has been tearing down election posters that have been placed throughout the campus by freshmen candidates. To say that this action is unfair, unbecoming to gentlemen, and unwise seems superfluous to us. The perpetrators of this vile act must be cognizant of their offense. If they are discovered they will be prosecuted.

One of the candidates informed us that several of his posters had been removed while those surrounding his were left intact. We interpret this to indicate that someone has departed from the democratic way of supporting his choice, and has adopted a policy that we think should deprive him of enjoying the privileges of our system of election. He is attempting to destroy the power of the vote by substituting lawless action. As a group we must not allow this.

We have also observed that the freshmen candidates are not heeding the regulations in posting their advertisements. Contrary to instructions from the Student Elections Committee, some of the candidates have put up signs in the Administration building, on the doors and sides of the post office, and in unauthorized places in department buildings. Candidates are supposed to receive permission from the head of the department in which they desire to place a poster before they put up their campaign signs. To coin a phrase that seemed to get national action, "Let's clean up this mess" on campus.

Letter Explains Summer Camps For Reservists

Georgia Institute of Technology
Dear Dean Griffin:

I have your letter of October 29, 1952, requesting information as to whether enlisted reservists with obligations under the Universal Military Training and Service Act may be excused from summer field training.

There is no one regulation covering this subject, which is based upon the Selective Service Act of 1948 as amended, and now entitled Universal Military Training and Service Act, but I trust the following information will serve your purpose.

Under the law all reservists with five year obligations are required to attend fifteen days summer field training and all six or eight year obligations may be called for thirty days annually.

Any reservist who can demonstrate that attendance at summer field training would result in hardship to him may be excused by the Military District Commander. If the individual is a member of an organized unit his request for excusal should be submitted to his Unit Commander. If a reservist who is assigned to a Control Group should be ordered to active duty for training he should address his request excusal to the Chief, Georgia Military District.

Hoping that this information will enable you to answer questions that may be brought up by your students, I am,

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First Army Invasion of Southland Pits Yellow Jacket Against Mule

The Cadets of the United States Military Academy come to Grant Field tomorrow to battle Tech's Yellow Jackets in one of the most colorful and popular games of the season. This spectacle, the first appearance of an Army team in the South and the first appearance against a Georgia Tech football team, has been a sellout for over a month despite the unsuccessful season Army is experiencing.

Coach Earl Blaik's squad, on the rebound from the cribbing scandals of two years ago, brings a 1952 record of 3 wins, 2 losses, and one tie into this fine intersectional clash against a Tech team that hasn't tasted defeat since the Alabama game of 1950. The Black Knights have beaten South Carolina, The Citadel, and V.M.I., have lost to Southern California and Pittsburgh, and have battled to a tie with Dartmouth.

Army Mules

Leading the Army Mules into this game are halfback Fred Attaya, fullback Paul Schweikert, quarterback Pete Vann, and another quarterback, Dick Boyle. Attaya has been a consistent threat with his running, which has accounted for six touchdowns in six games. After being out most of the season with injuries, Boyle will be back in the driver's seat of the Army machine, which has been in the capable hands of young Pete Vann during Boyle's absence. Vann, an 18-year old sophomore, has attempted 74 passes and has completed 33 for 559 yards and five touchdowns. Although the Cadet attack has been centered around a good running game, featuring Tech's own "belly play," the Tech coaches expect the Army aerial offense to speed up with the return of Boyle. End Lowell Sisson has been on the receiving end of most of the Cadet aerials, while another end, Neil Chamberlain, leads Red Blaik's defensive platoon.

The Engineers, with a major

bowl bid tucked away, go into this game with the distinction of being the nation's eighth ranking team in total offense with an average of 380 yards per game. Glenn Turner, Leon Hardeman, Bill Teas, and Dick Pretz maintained their 5-yard rushing averages with a spree against Duke last Saturday. Hardeman now has accumulated 670 yards rushing in seven games to place first in the SEC and fourth in the nation in that department. The 108 yards gained last week by "Hopalong" boosted his total over his rushing aggregate for the entire 1951 season.

Coach Whitey Urban's seven mules in the offensive line, paced by All-American candidates Hal Miller, Pete Brown and Buck Martin, will be back in top form after last week's fabulous job against Duke. Much of the credit for the

success of the Yellow Jacket ground attack is directly due to the outstanding blocking of Miller, Martin and Brown in addition to that of Ed Gossage, Jake Shoemaker, Matt Lyons and Jeff Knox.

Perfect Record

Pepper Rodgers, Tech's automatic toe, will very likely meet his match this Saturday in Rox Shain, a lad who has booted 19 points after touchdown out of 19 attempts, a record that is perfection itself.

The Jackets, rated number three in the nation in the latest AP poll, will be looking for their eighth win in a game in which the Black Knights could catch Bobby Dodd's squad "flat" after the season's mental peak last Saturday against Duke. If mental state has any bearing on Saturday's game, the Cadets should get at least a tie due to the tremendous spirit and tradition behind every Army team. These intangibles have had a hand in quite a few great Army football victories in the past.

Right Halfback Bill Teas Flashes Amazing Speed

Bill Teas, Tech's standout right halfback, has compiled a rushing average this year of over five yards per carry, which puts him in the upper bracket of SEC backs. Not only does he play an excellent game from his halfback post but is also called on frequently by Coach Bobby Dodd for punt return duties. His outstanding characteristic on the playing field is his amazing speed; he is one of the fastest backs in college football today.

Baylor Schoolmates

Bill feels right at home in the Tech backfield, because he played alongside Glenn Turner, Tech fullback, and Leon Hardeman, star left halfback for Tech, at Baylor Military Academy, where the three were classmates. Bill won posts on both the All-City and All-State teams while playing for Baylor. Before attending Baylor, Bill starred for Andrews High School in his home town of Andrews, North Carolina.

Bill has other athletic interests beside football. While he was at Baylor, he was on the track and boxing teams in addition to the football team. Except when football interferes, Bill runs track for Tech, too. Bill enjoys hunting and fishing; he is especially proud of his bird dog, Jack, with whom he goes hunting when he has the time.

Younger Brother

Bill's younger brother Floyd also plays football. In fact, he plays end for the Vanderbilt

freshman team, and played in Grant Field with the Vanderbilt frosh the Friday night before the Vanderbilt-Tech game at Homecoming.

When Bill isn't playing football or pursuing his hobby of hunting, he may usually be found with his fiancee, Virginia Hall. Wedding bells will ring for the two some time next June.

Bill, whose birthday was November 4, election day, says his greatest thrill was playing starting half-

Frosh Runners Top Druid Hills Squad In Meet

The Georgia Tech freshman cross country team defeated the Druid Hills High School team Wednesday afternoon by a score of 15-45. This is the first time since the season of 1949 that a Tech frosh cross country team has beaten Druid Hills.

Joe Jarrard led the massive attack on the runners from Druid Hills, placing first in the two mile marathon in 11:09.5 minutes. Jack McFarland, a former Druid Hills runner tied for second place with Ted Cook, also of the Tech frosh team. McFarland and Cook covered the course in 11:21.5 minutes.

Druid Hills' first runner to place, George Blackmer, came in sixth with a time of 11:43 minutes for the course. His teammate, Bill Shacklett, came in directly behind him. Other Tech placers were Fred DeJarnette, Jim Shannon, Mike

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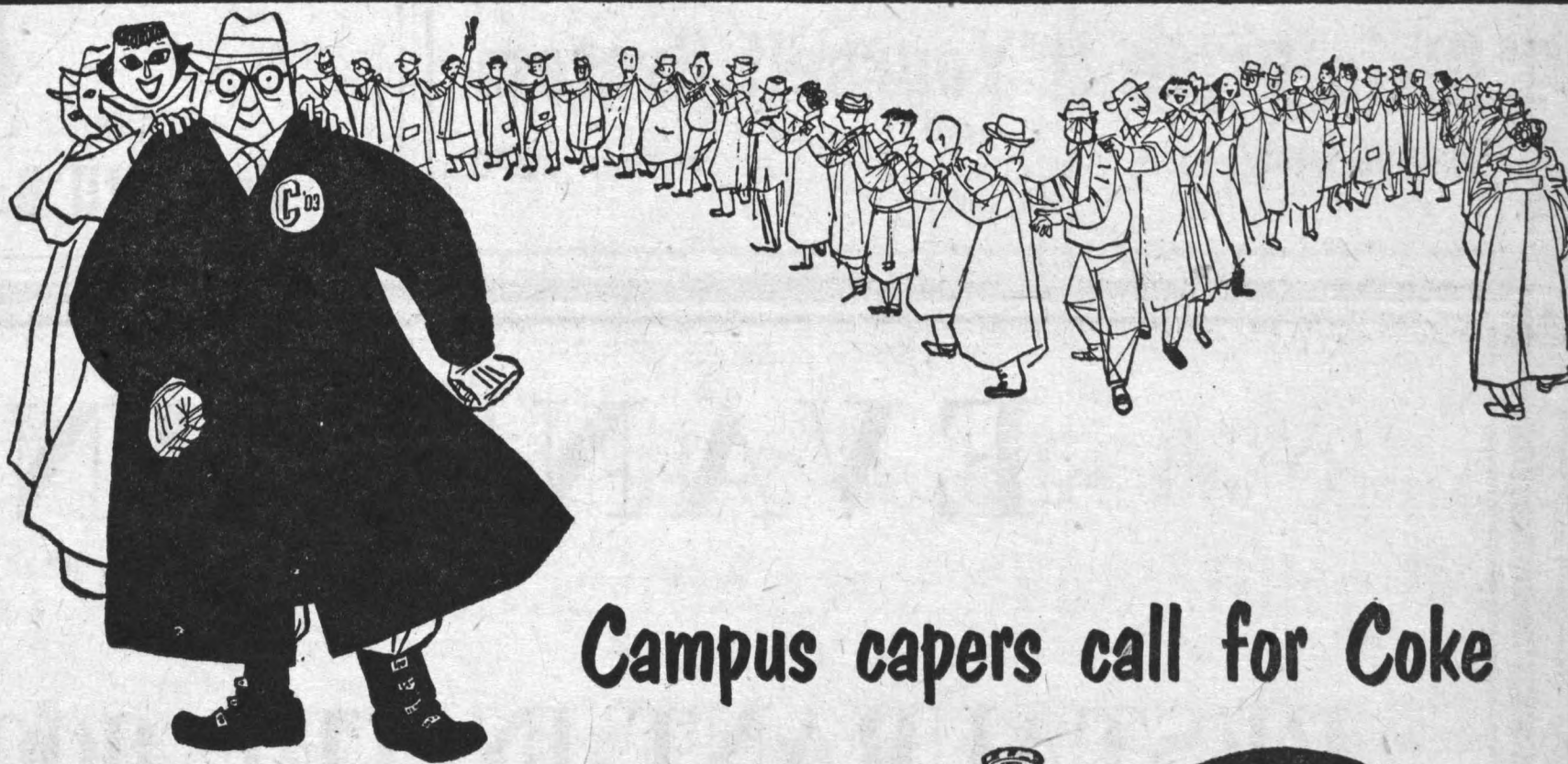
