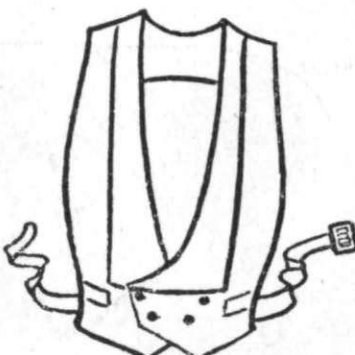
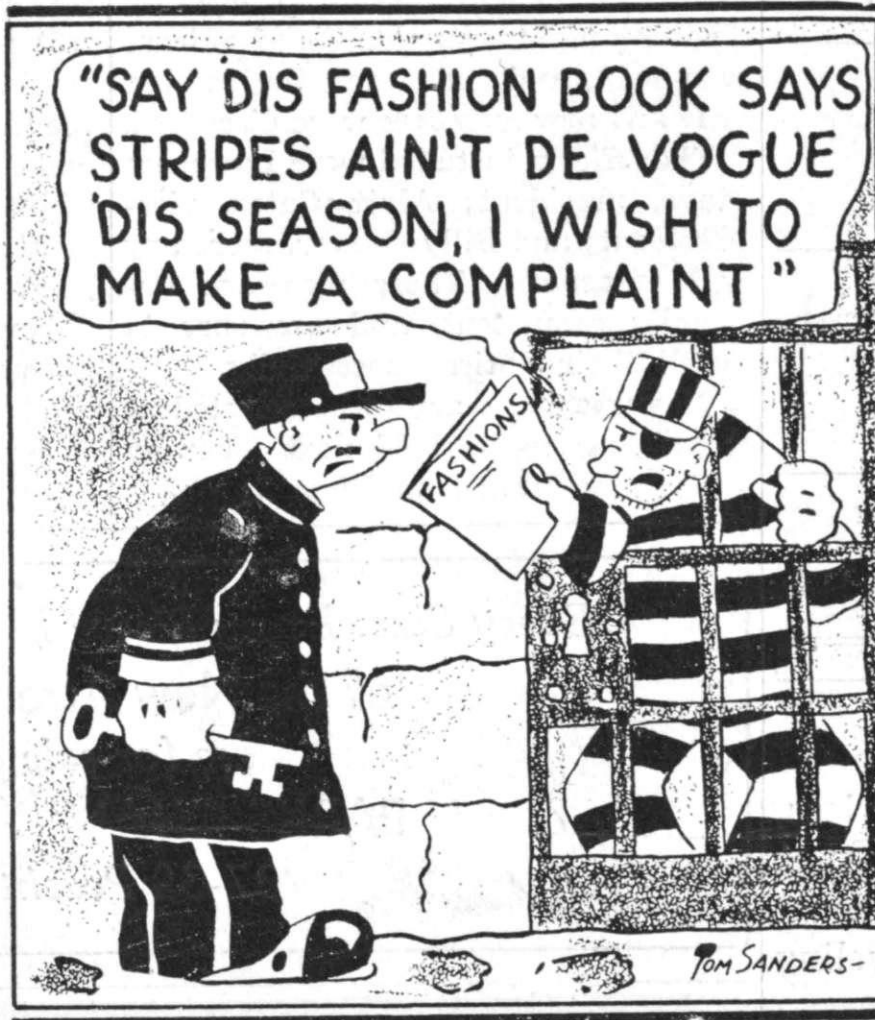

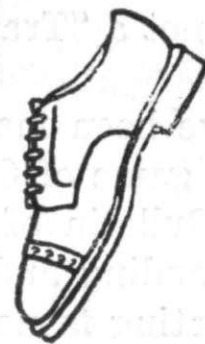

supplemented by an additional coil spring placed in the middle of the two elliptic springs and connecting them to the chassis.

In high speed railway work it has been found that by using a coil (helical) spring in conjunction with the conventional flat spring the best results were to be obtained. "Sidesway" has been eliminated by a ball bearing lever arrangement from one end of the chassis to the saddle of the helical spring with the safety factor also being increased.

The shops division of the M. E. Department is to be commended on their resourcefulness, and it is hoped that this will stimulate further research, bringing still more honors to Ga. Tech.
