

Countless other gestures similar to this have been made by Colleges every where regarding the incomparable game of College Football. Despite the reports of the Carnegie Bulletin of some years since, college football, with its amateur standing and keen competition, has a most enviable place in the sporting firmament.

One of the evils that the game is confronting at the present time is not within the reach of the Athletes, the Athletic Association, or the school itself, and it is up to you whether or not this evil will be exterminated. This evil is the various pools that you are asked to bet in every week on the football teams throughout the country, as if they are horses, to win or lose.

This element of gambling surely cannot throw any glory into the game, and gambling once started grows shortly in alarming proportions, and what seems now a pastime will in a few years be one of the biggest detriments the game has ever contended in its long history.

It's up to you. "Racketeers" are a bit like vultures. They cannot, unless fed, live very long. As soon as this newer type of "racket" dies a natural death the better it will be for the game. Let's do our part. We can't all play football but we can be of real aid here.
