# **Social Courage Prize Honors African Lawyer**

# Mtetwa First Female to Earn \$100,000 Award

Georgia Tech will award its fourth Ivan Allen Jr. Prize for Social Courage to Beatrice Mtetwa, a lawyer who has devoted herself to human rights, social justice, and gender equality for more than 20 years.

"She permits us to connect, in a very dramatic way, the legacy of Ivan Allen Jr., for whom the award is named, to courageous social and ethical action as a global need and commitment," said Jackie Royster, dean of the Ivan Allen College of Liberal Arts and a member of the award's nominating committee. "As the official trustees of the Allen Legacy, we are very pleased to make this local connection to such an important global issue."

Mtetwa grew up in Swaziland with no electricity or running water. She became the first in her extended family to attend high school and went on to study law at the University of Botswana and Swaziland.

After pursuing a career as a government prosecutor, she became disillusioned by selective justice and moved into private practice, where she was able to conduct human rights work without

political interference.

Mtetwa was announced as this year's Allen Prize recipient in May and will be recognized at a symposium and celebration on Thursday, Nov. 13, at the Biltmore in Midtown.

The symposium will feature special guests:

Charlayne Hunter-Gault, an author, journalist, and the first African-American female to enroll at the University of Georgia; Sarah Hager of Amnesty International; Jeffrey Smith of the Robert F. Kennedy Center for Justice and

Human Rights; Deborah Richardson of the National Center for Civil and Human Rights; and John Stremlau of the Carter Center.

A documentary screening of "Beatrice Mtetwa and the Rule of Law" will take place in the LeCraw Auditorium, Scheller College of Business, on Nov. 11 at 6 p.m. The film tells the story of Mtetwa's life of being arrested, jailed, and beaten during the course of her work in Zimbabwe defending peace activists, journalists, and other citizens.

The Tech community will have the chance to meet and interact with Mtetwa at both the symposium and film screening.

"I hope that her story will inspire our students to be bold and courageous in what

Reporting ethical violations is 'everyone's responsibility'

As a public research university, Georgia Tech is a steward of taxpayer dollars, research funding, and tuition paid by students and their families. Because fraud and acts of unethical behavior deplete resources that could be used to fund programs and positions necessary for performing our jobs more effectively and advancing the Institute's strategic goals, each member of the Georgia Tech community has an obligation to help ensure that Institute resources are used responsibly.

"In addition to everyone's personal responsibility to be ethical, the Institute would like our students and employees to help Georgia Tech achieve the highest levels of ethical and fraud-free behavior across the board," said Steve Swant, executive vice president for the Division of Administration and Finance. "We are encouraging everyone to do the right thing: If you know something, please do something. Upholding high ethical standards and behavior is everyone's responsibility."

In conjunction with the University System of Georgia's efforts to promote International Fraud Awareness Week in November, Georgia Tech is launching a yearlong campaign to: raise awareness about fraud; provide resources to foster greater understanding about what consti-

# **Email, Calendars on the Move**

This fall, the Georgia Tech community will be able to migrate its Zimbra email, calendar, and contacts services to a new mobile-ready Outlookbased solution as part of the Microsoft Office 365 implementation.

This enterprise-class service will deliver better integration with Microsoft Office products, provide larger email storage capacity, offer strong data management, and enable secure sharing capabilities. It will be delivered through a secure hybrid solution consisting of the cloud-based Microsoft Office 365 and a locally hosted Microsoft Exchange server. Tech's current Zimbra service will continue to be available to departments as well but will no longer receive service upgrades.

"We have simply outgrown the

current Zimbra offering," said Jim O'Connor, chief information officer and vice president of Information Technology. "This new service is part of a larger effort to integrate all of our voice, data, and video services into a single unified communications service offering, and it supports the continuously evolving needs of our students, faculty, and staff. Additionally, it truly aligns with the Institute's 25-year Strategic Plan and the IT Master Plan."

The plan to provide a more robust and collaborative email service was approved by the Strategic Technology Investment Committee, which consists of faculty and administrators from across campus. The committee's goal is to champion technology that supports Georgia Tech's strategic goal of the pursuit of institutional effectiveness. In preparation for the move to the new email service, committee members have presented to many groups on campus, including the Faculty Senate Executive Board, to get feedback to be incorporated into this service migration.

Apart from the migration, a new service-level email data protection policy has been developed to govern the use of the email, calendar, and contacts features within the new solution. This policy, which is currently open for campuswide comment, will ensure that all Georgia Tech data is protected throughout the transition. It will also guide use going forward.

Representatives from the implementation project team, led by the Office of Information Technology (OIT), are meeting with interested campus departments to identify a transition window and strategy to best address departmental needs. A number of departments have already offered suggestions for the implementation, including enabling the ability to store mail at Georgia Tech and forward to other services as well.

# Safety App Gets Update, New Features

Three years after the initial implementation of the Jacket Guardian safety service on campus, it's been revamped and updated to offer new features for keeping the Tech community safe: The Jacket Guardian service is now a free downloadable app called Rave Guardian.

The app is designed to turn a mobile phone into a personal safety device during an emergency situation. It is equipped with numerous features that enhance responsiveness by providing 911 operators, police, and emergency medical services with user information, such as location via GPS, that is critical during an emergency.

"Having the Rave Guardian app is like having a blue light emergency telephone in your pocket," said Captain Randy Barrone, who oversees the Georgia Tech Police Department (GTPD) Crime Prevention Unit.

Set a Safety Timer - Set a safety timer and status to alert those you trust if you are alone or in an unfamiliar place



Manage & Message Your Guardians - Quickly and easily connect with those you trust to help you out when you need



Make Emergency Calls & Send Text Tips -Call emergency officials for help if you are in trouble, and send text tips - including photos - if you see something suspicious.

You can also upload a photo of yourself, medical conditions, information about your vehicle, and other pertinent information, which is only released to emergency responders in the event that help is needed. Plus, you can call for help with the simple tap of a

tutes ethical behavior; and encourage faculty, staff, and students to report suspected fraudulent and unethical behavior.

The campaign launches Nov. 5, with the campuswide event "Ethical Leadership for the 21st Century," featuring Cynthia Cooper, whistle-blower and former vice president of WorldCom as well as *TIME* magazine's 2002 "Person of the Year." President G.P. "Bud" Peterson will introduce Cooper, and a panel discussion will follow.

Other campaign elements will include training videos to educate the community on key Institute policy and compliance issues, and communications promoting the EthicsPoint hotline and the Policy Library.

The Georgia Tech Policy Library contains more than 500 searchable Institute policies ranging from purchasing to hosting campus events, making information on what constitutes the "right thing" accessible to everyone. All community members are encouraged to be informed on Tech's policies and how to report a violation, in order to protect Tech's resources and reputation.

Anyone who suspects fraud or unethical behavior is encouraged to file an anonymous report via the EthicsPoint website at **www.ethicspoint.com** or by calling 866-294-5565. EthicsPoint is a third-party vendor, available 24/7, that guarantees the anonymity of all reports.

## **Charitable Campaign Nears Conclusion**

The annual State Charitable Contributions Campaign has already raised more than \$200,000, and is more than halfway toward its participation goal.

# Theatrical Tension Keeps Engle Engaged

Last Monday night, Randy Engle got three hours of sleep.

He wasn't up at 4 a.m. to catch a flight, tend to a family emergency, or just to see the sunrise. Instead, it was because he knew at 8 a.m. he would be teaching a psychology of learning course - one he has taught dozens of times.

"I still obsess over this course," said Engle, professor in the School of Psychology. "Professional actors need a certain

amount of tension and anxiety to perform. For me, it's the same with teaching. It makes me prepare like crazy.'

This excitement, which he likens to being on a roller coaster, is what has kept him teaching, on top of his many other roles in academia, for his entire career.

"I like 8 a.m. classes because they're a challenge," he said. "Freshmen are great because they're not jaded yet. They still get excited.'

Engle recently won a Beckman Award, which honors professors for excellence in teaching and mentoring, and for which he was nominated by a former student.

In 19 years at Georgia Tech,

Engle has served as chair of the School of Psychology, founded the Center for Advanced Brain Imaging, helped establish the Honors Program, and twice overseen buildout for the School's

Engle's research focuses on working memory, or how much information you can maintain at once. On Oct. 30, he'll give a talk on "What does it mean to be intelligent?" that will focus on biologically based intelligence and how it plays into the ability to resist distractions.

Though Engle has conducted research in this area for 30 years, he's had a recent surge in interest from partners including the U.S. Navy, National Security Agency, and Pfizer, all seeking ways to measure or test a person's working memory and what happens when it is diminished.

"The ability to focus is highly connected to your ability to function in the modern world,"

With a workload that includes teaching, editing the journal Current Directions in Psychological Science, holding a visiting professorship at the University of Edinburgh, conducting research, and advising four graduate students and a postdoctoral fellow, Engle still finds his work with students to be some of the most gratifying.

"It demands that you love what you're doing," he said.

When he's not in the classroom, or losing sleep over being in the classroom, he likes to hike or build things, particularly

furniture. He first picked up the habit in a high school shop class. When he lived in South Carolina, his farm provided a ready supply of wood. He's made several of the pieces in his office, including his desk, and is now sharing the hobby with his grandchildren.

"When they visit, I try to have a wood project cut out — to avoid power tools — and we assemble it together," he said.

Engle also spends time hiking, and is having a mountain home built in North Georgia. It won't replace the home he loves in Avondale Estates, though, where he and his wife can partake in nearby neighborhood events and have a room for each grandchild.

"I like to pick up the grandkids on Friday mornings before school and take them to breakfast," he

said. "They are both amazing conversationalists."

Leaving his former academic home, the University of South Carolina, for Tech meant leaving the farm behind — initially to live in a Midtown condo — but he's never regretted it.

"Coming here was the best professional decision of my life," he said. "I've had great students and great facilities, and have worked for some of the best people of my career."

## Department of Health Offers Ebola Response Guidelines for Universities

As Ebola cases continue to be reported in numerous countries, government agencies continue to take steps toward being better prepared to combat the virus.

Georgia Governor Nathan Deal signed an executive order Oct. 20 to establish a team of local experts, including representatives from the University System of Georgia, to issue recommendations on the virus.

The Georgia Department of Public Health has also offered guidance to colleges and universities on precautions to take regarding Ebola.

1. Be aware of students and their families, faculty, staff members, and visitors who have traveled to Ebola-affected West African countries, including

Liberia, Sierra Leone, and Guinea, within the previous 21

2. Know the signs and symptoms of Ebola, which may appear anywhere from 2-21 days after exposure. These include:

- Fever (including low-grade)
- Severe headache
- Muscle pain
- Weakness • Diarrhea
- Vomiting
- Abdominal pain • Unexplained, unusual bleeding or bruising
- 3. If someone presents to your campus health clinic with a fever, immediately ask if he or she has traveled to or come into contact

with someone who has traveled

to an Ebola-affected region. 4. If you encounter individuals you believe meet the case definition described in (1) and (2) or (3), immediately separate the individual from contact

with others, and report it to the Department of Public Health (DPH) at 1-866-PUB-HLTH or the DPH Epidemiology section at 404-657-2588.

5. Hand washing is still the best, most effective method at your disposal to protect you from the spread of infectious disease.

The 2014 Ebola epidemic is the largest in history, affecting multiple countries in West Africa. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and partners are taking precautions to prevent the further spread of Ebola within the U.S. by working with other government agencies, the World Health Organization, and other domestic and international partners. This includes implementing enhanced entry screening at five U.S. airports that receive over 94 percent of travelers from Guinea, Liberia, and Sierra Leone.

Still, Tech faculty offer the

reminder that, although Ebola is dangerous, Americans are more likely to become hospitalized, or even die, from many other illnesses, such as influenza. Professors Ozlem Ergun, Pinar Keskinocak, and Julie Swann wrote a joint blog post on the topic at amplifier.gatech.edu on Oct. 21.

"For Ebola, you should direct what resources you can to Africa out of compassion and a concern for further spread," they said. "But for yourself, you should take simple measures like getting appropriate vaccinations to reduce the impact of diseases that are much more likely to affect you and your family."
