LIBRARY CREATES STUDENT ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Library has taken the unprecedented step of creating a Library & Partners Student Advisory Council to provide an important link with the GT student body. In Fall 2004, several students approached the Public Services division with the offer to assist us with enhancing the literature / fiction collections. Together, we realized that a structure was required to support and sustain this collaboration. More significantly, we understood that a student group could assist us with other critical initiatives related to the renovation of Library spaces, initiatives that also involve our important partner, OIT. And so the Student Advisory Council was born.

The Student Advisory Council, appointed in January, is comprised of 9 students representing key majors at Georgia Tech. One of the individuals is a graduate student. Several of the students have strategically important responsibilities on campus. As leaders, they bring a wonderful energy and commitment to the Council.

The Council is facilitated by Crit and Linda Cabot (OIT). Rich is an ex officio member of the group, and other Library and OIT staff will join the group from time to time to assist with the Council's agenda.

The Council is currently involved in two tasks:

• to identify strategies and options for students to contribute literature / fiction resources to the Library (this fiction / literature task force of students is working with Nancy Simons and Leslie Madden), and
