Tech falls to VT, 27-3

Junior Taylor Bennett had not thrown four interceptions in a single season coming into this year, let alone a single game. That changed last Thursday night as Bennett was picked off four times and opposing quarterback Sean Glennon threw for nearly 300 yards and two touchdowns on the way to the Hokies' 27-3 win.

"I thought he did a good job of just taking what was there; he didn't try to force anything," said Head Coach Chan Gailey.

After electing to receive on the opening kickoff, Bennett quickly called a timeout before the first offensive snap. Bennett made up for the mistake two plays later with a 37-yard deep throw to junior receiver James Johnson down the sideline. The Jackets were unable to move the ball further, however, as Jamaal Evans, getting his first career start at tailback, carried the ball twice for a yard.

The Jackets' defense looked excellent on the Hokies' first drive. Glennon missed a pass to start the drive and a false start penalty pushed the Hokies back five yards. A seven yard completion from Glennon to receiver Justin Harper set up a third and long. The following play was the first of the Jackets' six sacks of the day. A 43-yard punt from the end zone put the Jackets in Virginia Tech territory. Two long passes of 11 and 26 yards from Bennett to Johnson followed by a five yard run by Evans put the Jackets inside the Virginia Tech 10. Unfortunately, the lack of an established passing game allowed the Hokies to provide extra coverage on the receivers, forcing Bennett to pass down to Evans. The pass fell incomplete and the Jackets settled for a field goal—Tech's only points of the game.

The Hokies opened their drive with an 11-yard pass play from Glennon to Andre Smith. Glennon was sacked twice on the drive, but the Jackets were unable to stop the Hokies, both times after the sack, Virginia Tech was able to convert third downs. The Jackets did catch a break when junior defensive end Michael Johnson sacked Glennon on Georgia Tech's 12-yard line and forced a fumble, but the ball did not bounce the Jackets' way as Glennon recovered to set up a field goal.

The ensuing kickoff was the turning point of the game. With the score tied, Virginia Tech Head Coach Frank Beamer called for an onside kick. The kicker tapped the ball forward and recovered after 11 yards.

"I thought that was a big play in the game. I thought that was a gutsy call, I told Frank after the game that it was," Gailey said.

The drive led to a touchdown run in by Glennon. When Georgia Tech took the ball back, running back Jonathan Dwyer, getting his first carries, took the ball for back-to-back 14 yard gains.

"Just help [the offense] out as much as I can, that's what a running back's job is to be a tempo setter. I just tried to get the offensive line going and get [Bennett] going," Dwyer said.

Bennett then found Johnson for a short gain that put the Jackets at mid-field. On the next play, Bennett was looking for Johnson deep down the sideline, but the ball was picked off by a diving Victor Harris for Bennett's first interception of the game.

The half ended on a sour note, as the Jackets failed to score again and headed into the locker room trailing 17-3.

The second half started better for the Jackets as they forced two straight three-and-outs with one of their own sandwiched in-between. On the Jackets' second possession of the half, freshman quarterback Josh Nesbitt took the handoff, faked the run and dropped back to pass. There were no defenders around James Johnson running down the

Swim and dive battle Georgia

Georgia was a tough opponent before the Jackets heading off again in competition against ACC teams. Swimming in her first collegiate year, star freshman Christine Chuang stood out among the competition on Wednesday night.

She registered a NCAA B-cut time and personal best time of 2:01.71 in the 200-yard butterfly event.

Elizabeth Stowe, a senior who competes in long-distance events, finished just second in the 1000-yard free and finished third in the 500-yard free.

"[Wednesday's event] really boosts our confidences. ... Having a lot of

competition and really fast swimmers at the [next event] will really help our team prepare. ... These will be new opponents for me," Chuang said.

Mickey Malul took home another victory in the 200-yard breaststroke in just over two minutes.

"My freestyle was pretty good actually. My fly was like two seconds slower since last Saturday. I'm going to work on it and hopefully get a lot better for the next meet," Onur said.

The Jackets also hosted tough competition from

Tennis team ends season

Last weekend, the Jackets women's tennis team traveled to Columbus, Ohio for the Intercollegiate Tennis Association National Indoor Championships. Six members of the team made the trip and the Jackets had five players in the singles bracket, more than any other team in the tournament. The Jackets got off to an up and down start on Friday. Three of the five participants for Tech won their opening round matches.

"It's a tough tournament and only 32 girls make it, so it's most of the best players in the country. For us to have five girls in the singles and a team in the doubles was a great honor for us and a great opportunity to get that many girls in the draw," said senior Kristi Miller.

Seventh seed No. 60 Amanda McDowell, ITA's South Region Champion, defeated host school

Analysis

Head Coach Paul Hewitt pointed out many times last season that several players on the team are capable of scoring upward of 15 to 20 points per game. However, the problems Tech had last season stemmed mostly from the defensive side of the ball. Their inability to keep opponents from finding a soft spot on the defense was well documented in bad losses to UCLA, Maryland and Wake Forest in the ACC tournament.

Teams had their way with Tech's defense last season; Tech ranked 10th in the conference in field goal defense, allowing opponents to shoot 47.5% from the floor. Tech was excellent at securing offensive rebounds, but ranked very low against the conference at securing defensive rebounds. The Jackets averaged just 19.88 defensive rebounds per game, 11th in the 12 team conference.

Tech also turned the ball over more than a team of their caliber should have. The Jackets turned the ball over a whopping 25 times at Vanderbilt last season, 18 times at Clemson and 21 times at North Carolina. If the trend seems common, it is; Tech averaged 16.6 turnovers in nine road games and won just one. For Tech to find success on the road, it starts with not turning the ball over. In contrast, Tech turned the ball over an average of 17.75 times against conference opponents and won one out of eight games, which proves how important turnovers are on the road.

For the third straight season the Jackets will be breaking in a new point guard. Both freshman Maurice Miller of Memphis, Tenn. and Matt Causey, a senior transfer from Gainesville, Ga. will share the point guard duties. Tech has enough experience and depth between the other positions that serviceable point play will be enough to give the Jackets success. Both of the point guards on this team are distributors of the ball, which contrasts to Javaris Crittenton's scoring play at the position. Miller and Causey will be guards that average between five and 10 assists per game and around 10 points per game. Both guards have great poise and will be tested quickly with a road game at Tennessee State this Sunday as well as one later this month at ninth-ranked Indiana.

From the Coaches

"People who look at our roster are surprised at how deep we are. We lost three guys, including Mario West, who was a significant part of us getting to the tournament....We have enough depth to overcome it. I don't think about it much, don't talk about it much, because it's part of college basketball now....You feel fortunate to be able to recruit those types of players. They encourage other kids to come. It's a positive. We have enough depth."

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL PREVIEW

Analysis

Head Coach MaChelle Joseph has the team headed in the right direction. She finally got that elusive signature victory last season when the Jackets knocked off fourth-ranked Maryland at home. The Jackets also finished the season with a five-game win streak that included wins against ACC tournament finalist North Carolina State.

The Jackets secured a first round win against Miami in the ACC tournament. Miami had beaten Tech in the first round of the previous two ACC tournaments. With the win, Tech secured a birth in the NCAA tournament for just the third time in school history and Coach Josephs' first trip to the big dance. The Jackets also made school history with a dramatic last-second win against DePaul in the first round.

Tech finished 11-6 against non-conference opponents and finished 10-5 in the top-heavy ACC. The Jackets' main focus last season was their staunch defensive play. Tech ranked second in conference games limiting their opponents to just 59.1 points per game. For Tech to gain the consistency they have lacked, they will need to score more. The Jackets averaged just 60.9 points per game, 10th best in the conference. In fact, Tech was one of two teams outside the top four in scoring within the conference to have a winning record in the ACC.

Tech has great experience and increased depth from the last few seasons. The Jackets have a starting line-up that includes three seniors: Chioma Nnamaka, who has started every game since she arrived at Tech, Janie Mitchell, who was an All-ACC honorable mention last season and Stephanie Higgs, who was voted to the All-ACC third team last season.

Coach Joseph also had her most successful recruiting class. She inked two top-20 recruits in Iasia Hemingway of Newark, NJ and Alex Montgomery of Tacoma, Wash. Both are expected to make an immediate impact on the court helping Tech to win an ACC title and build on last-season's success as well as make a deeper run into the NCAA tournament.

From the Coaches

"I don't know that Georgia Tech was always the cool place to go. What we've tried to do is convince [recruits] that it isn't the path of least resistance and it is going to be difficult, but anything worth having is difficult. If you want to play in one of the best conferences in women's basketball, in the ACC, and if you want to go to one of the top-10 programs in the country, then Georgia Tech is a great fit."

Malul finished the 200-yard breast with a time of 2:07.20. He also swam the second leg in the victory in the 200-yd medley relay.

The diving teams took one-two finishes from both sides. They were led by Hannah Krimm and Evan Stowers.

"We need to get a better team in all parts: as long as you practice with your mind...think about every detail, you're going to step up your performance at every race," Malul said.

The Jackets next meet will be on Nov. 16 at the Georgia Tech Invitational.

"We just couldn't get it going on offense and we were giving up too many big plays when we got back out on the field. We weren't stopping them on third downs at first but then we got it going a little bit," said Phillip Wheeler, senior linebacker.

Georgia Tech did find a glimmer of hope in Virginia Tech's next drive as they recovered an Brandon Ore fumble at Virginia Tech's 32 yard line. Dwyer took two handoffs for 13 yards before Bennett threw his third interception of the game. Brandon Flowers returned the interception to the Virginia Tech 44. Virginia Tech then rode Ore's running all the way down to the Jackets' 11. Dunlevy hit a 28 yard field goal to put Virginia Tech up 27-3.

With the loss, the Jackets are officially eliminated from ACC title game contention. The Jackets will attempt to right the ship against the 1-8 Blue Devils of Duke next weekend in Durham, Duke has yet to win a single conference game.

Ohio State's Angela Dipastina, 6-1, 7-5. Other first round action included sixth seed, No. 5 Kristi Miller defeating No. 7 William and Mary's Megan Moulton-Levy, 7-6 (4), 6-4. Maya Johansson continued her strong fall run with a win over No. 45 Cosmina Ciobanu of Notre Dame, 7-5, 4-6, 7-5.

Unfortunately, two Jackets did lose in the first round. No. 23 Kirsten Flower battled, but eventually fell to Oklahoma's Anna Marie Constantinescu, 5-7, 7-5, 3-6. Fifth seed and sixth ranked Zuzana Zemenova of Baylor came back from a set down to beat No. 42 Christy Striplin 1-6, 6-2, 6-0.

In doubles action, Miller and Whitney McCray, the tournament's third seed and the nation's third-ranked team, blew through Boise State's Polina Kokoulina and Pichitra Thongdach, 8-2.

The second day of play marked the end of the Jackets' Fall run. In singles action, McDowell defeated a familiar opponent, No. 14 Laura Vallverdu of Miami in a close match, 7-5, 1-6, 7-6 (2). Miller defeated No. 35 Samantha Murray of Northwestern in straight sets, 6-4, 6-3.

Johansson lost in the round of 16 to No. 21 Ani Mijacika, a player who has given the Jackets trouble this season. Johansson put up a fight only to lose 5-7, 6-2, 7-6 in a come-back win for Mijacika. Flower lost to No. 54 Laura Broosova of Baylor in the consolation round of 16, 6-0, 6-4. The Jackets other consolation bracket player, Striplin, lost a close game to Arizona State's

No. 24 Nadia Abdala, 6-1, 5-7, 5-7. In the Quarterfinals, both Jackets left were defeated. First, Miller lost to Mijacika, 6-3, 2-6, 5-7.

"She's a good player. The courts are really fast, she plays a very aggressive style. She has a big serve and she just comes at you. You have to play very well to beat her," Miller said. McDowell lost a three set decision to Baylor's Taylor Ormond, 4-6, 6-2, 0-6.

In the doubles bracket, Miller and McCray lost to TCU's No. 14 Macall Harkins and Anna Sydorska, 8-6. "Overall it was a pretty good tournament. We would have like to have had someone win it, but we had pretty good results," McDowell said.

In other Tech tennis action, freshman Noelle Hickey travelled to Florida State to participate in their invitational tournament. Hickey beat Kunigunda Dorn of Kansas, dropping just one game, 6-1, 6-0. In the second round, Hickey cruised

through Liset Brito of Florida International, 6-4, 6-1 to reach the finals.

Hickey fell in the finals against host school Florida State's Katie Rybakova in three sets, 6-4, 4-6, 4-6. The Jackets open the second half of their 2007-2008 campaign at the National Collegiate Tennis Championship in Las Vegas. They will also attempt to defend their ITA National Team Indoor Championship in early February. They won the title last year after knocking off defending champion and then No. 1 squad Stanford in the semifinals. They defeated Notre Dame in the finals and acquired their first ever No. 1 ranking.

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GEORGIA TECH (5-4, 2-4) VS. DUKE (1-8, 0-6)

Defense vs. Thaddeus Lewis

This season, the defense has allowed less than 100 yards rushing per game. Tech's opponents have averaged a mere 2.7 yards per carry. They have forced 20 fumbles, and recovered 10 of them. The defense has a total of 34 sacks this season, with an average of 3.89 per game. They rank first in the ACC and second nationally for sacks.

Thaddeus Lewis, a sophomore, played well last week against Clemson. Lewis was 15 for 16, for 160 yards and 1 TD. So far this season, Lewis has thrown for almost 2000 yards and 18 touchdowns. He will be under a lot of pressure from Tech's blitz-happy defense, and will spend a good part of the game throwing from his heels.

Offensive Line vs. Defensive Line

The Jackets' offensive line is led by veterans including junior Tackle Andrew Gardner and senior center Kevin Tuminello. On average, the offensive line allows only .89 sacks per game, the best in the ACC. The offensive line has also allowed Tech to rank first in the ACC in rushing offense.

Duke's Pass defense is ranked 106th nationally, allowing on average over 270 passing yards per game. If Tech can get the passing game going, and take advantage of Duke's porous pass defense, then the Jackets should be in a good position to score a lot more passing touchdowns.

Tashard Choice vs. Rushing Defense

Tashard Choice missed last week's game against Virginia Tech due to surgery on an injured knee. His absence was noticed as the Jackets struggled towards their second lowest rushing output of the season. Choice has led the Jackets' rushing offense to a national ranking of No. 20, and an average of 206 rushing yards per game.

Duke's rushing defense is ranked 75th, allowing an average of 167 rushing yards per game. With exciting youngsters like Nesbit and Dwyer, Duke's defense will have a difficult time stopping the rushing game. If Tech's star RB is able to return, Duke's rushing defense will have to step it up in order to keep Choice in check.
