## *Tempest* proves solid student effort

Any Shakespeare play performance has the potential to be very good or very bad. At first blush, it would seem that performances by trained Shakespearean actors would fall among the very good and performances by amateurs would fall among the very bad. DramaTech, with their production of The *Tempest*, however, proves that even student thespians can do justice to ol' William's work.

The Tempest was Shakespeare's final play and it tells the layered story of Prospero (James Lentini), an ousted Italian noble; his daughter, Miranda (Aubrie Lee); Prospero's usurpers and a handful of other characters. Prospero was the Duke of Milan until his jealous brother, Antonio (Mathew Drake), along with a group of confederates, banished him and his young daughter to a remote island where they lived for many years. The play opens as a ship is caught in the throes of a fierce storm. The passengers on the boat include Prospero's brother, the King of Naples (Patrick Brandt), his son and several other individuals who are all implicated in the development of Prospero's plan to regain his dukedom.

We soon discover that it was Prospero who caused the storm and the

## Death metal rides Dozer packs punch for GBA again with Sexy

The new album from the Eagles of Death Metal has forced me to consider that very question. Death by Sexy, the follow up to their 2004 debut album, is pure '70s rock, raucous and hedonistic to a fault.

Jill, not one to stand by idly, hops into her Drill Dozer to recover the gemstone and show the Skullkers the business end of her machine's drill.

Drill Dozer treads familiar platform game territory, but with a twist. The Drill Dozer is a powerful machine capable of demolishing almost anything in its path. The L and Ř shoulder buttons

operate the drill, with each one turning it in a particular direction, clockwise or counter-clockwise. It can also be upgraded by pickmake you think and act quickly to find the treasures hidden within the areas. For a portable game, this does have a fair amount of content and replay value.

## Cartoon utilizes violence as art

As a kid I remember the highlight of my Saturday mornings consisting of watching cartoons all day—*Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles, Animaniacs, Captain Planet, Talespin.* Ah, the good old days: where talking animals and violence could entertain for hours.

In *Cartoon*, Steve Yockey attempts to reinterpret the stereotypical joys of childhood. Think: *Toy Story* meets *V for Vendetta*. The story begins with some toys peacefully sleeping—2 girls in matching outfits with pigtails, a ballerina, and a puppet on strings just to name a few.

Everyday they sing the same song and play the same games. Their routine life ends abruptly when a fellow named Trouble steals The Hammer from The Dictator.

Chaos is now the theme, with the toys doing whatever they want, bombs exploding, and a sweet-looking ballerina shooting people in a seemingly random fashion. The Dictator furiously orders everyone to find her hammer so that everything can go back to a peaceful, yet mundane life.

Ironically, the only character that seems to know everything also happens to be the puppet controlled by strings. Yockey manages to use cartoons to present some issues modern society struggles with while maintaining a humorous tone.

The applause sign seems to light up at the most inappropriate moments—a school bombing and the death of another character to name a few. Yockey also illustrates the

detached manner through which people experience violence on TV with the trigger-happy ballerina.

The play alternates between meaningful dialogue and humorous scenes that make you laugh out loud. Yockey does a great job maintaining balance between the two.

Overall, the actors' performances are wonderful—their cartoonish movements really make you feel like you are watching toys come to life. Some notable scenes include the puppet being freed from his strings, only to fall flat on his face, and a slide show of previous dictators (the most dangerous one resembling a marshmallow).

Although the violent scenes between the cartoons seem rather fake (no blood, quick, painless deaths), one man's murder ends realistically with grotesque blood. The actor seals the deal by groaning and writhing in pain.

This scene appears to illustrate how violence on TV always seems so quick and painless, as opposed to real life and the real suffering

that isn't portrayed in the media. Surprisingly, this play works well as social commentary.

Steve Yockey makes sure the play offers something for everybody: a violent brawl between 2 girls—complete with manipulation, hair pulling, and bodies slamming into walls; a love story between a toy and a coy ballerina; plenty of singing and dancing for the musical fans; and, of course, pretentious philosophical quotes about government, society, and life scattered throughout the play.

*Cartoon* is playing April 21-23, with the last showing this Sunday, so be sure to check it out. It is currently playing at the 7 Stages Theater located at 1105 Euclid Avenue in Little Five Points.
