# Roll Call Wrap-up: \$7 million goal surpassed

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lumni, faculty, staff, students, parents and friends of Georgia Tech have once again demonstrated their loyalty. The 51st Annual Roll Call, which ended June 30, has surpassed its goal of \$7 million.

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"Georgia Tech is fortunate in that it receives such strong support from so many individuals," said Jim Shea, director of Annual Giving. "We have a volunteer base of more than 400 individuals, so it seems as though anything is possible."

More than \$190,000 was contributed by 443 faculty and staff donors. "That is an important statement," said Laura Bennison, assistant director of Annual Giving with responsibility for faculty and staff solicitations. "The message is that those closest to the Institute have expressed their confidence in what Georgia Tech has accomplished and where it is headed."

Roll Call is the single largest source of unrestricted funds at Georgia Tech. It also represents the broadest base of support for the Institute with more than 23,000 participants. State funding and tuition account for just 53 percent of the cost for a Georgia Tech

education. The remaining 47 percent is provided by private funding sources, such as Roll Call.

"Roll Call provides Georgia Tech with unrestricted funds that can be used to create new programs, attract and retain a superb faculty, and provide financial aid and scholarships to the brightest students," said Shea. "It provides a foundation of support that is critical to Georgia Tech."

It is the volunteers, however, who make reaching the Roll Call goal possible. More than 200 alumni serve on their class committees, while an additional 125 assist with the matching gift program. In addition, Roll Call uses upwards of 45 student callers as part of the phonathon program.

museum opened in the plaza along with an area for face painting, cartoon characters, and interactive games. However, high energy entertainment that would spur fan participation was needed. So the Braves contacted Johnson to coordinate a pep band. Johnson and Chris Moore, assistant band director at Georgia Tech, contacted music students throughout the state of Georgia to participate.

"Today, Georgia Tech, Georgia State University, Valdosta State University and Columbus College and State University are represented in the band. Nineteen people, eight of whom are

Tech students, perform on a rotation schedule to comprise the seven-member band," said Johnson. There are 80 home games this season for the Braves, so a professional band performs the weeknight games during the school year, and the pep band performs for the weekend games. "This is a wonderful job for someone who enjoys music," said trumpeter Benjamin Defnet, who will begin graduate school this fall at Georgia Tech. "The children love the band. I have the most fun playing in Cartoon Alley where all of the children and Cartoon Network characters hang out. And, the fans enjoy it. It gives them something to do while waiting for the gates to open and for the game to start."

The pep band performs a mix of cartoon themes, Latin and '70s/'80s music three hours prior to game time—and, naturally, the "Tomahawk Chop" is included. There have been a few adjustments made to the show this year. The band has added a new segment called "Rockin' Rally," a pep rally before the game that includes fireworks, cartoon characters, player interviews and Blues Brothers music.

Trumpeter Scott Jones enjoys providing entertainment and excitement for spectators. Jones, who just graduated from Columbus College and State University, will be the band director at Peachtree Middle School in Dunwoody. "I love the atmosphere. [The pep band] is very out of the ordinary for a baseball game—you expect hot dogs and peanuts at a game but not a band," said Jones.

# Tech students get 'edge' on learning

T EDGE, a program designed to provide a more well rounded experience for Georgia Tech students, is gearing up for the new academic year—and hoping for greater participation from both students and campus departments and organizations.

The co-curricular transcript program encourages students to explore learning outside the classroom, focusing on six developmental areas: academic and intellectual competence; career development; appreciation of diversity and world issues; leadership development; wellness and personal balance; and volunteerism/community service.

Students who are enrolled in the program will receive GT EDGE credit for attending certified activities. The GT EDGE transcript will list all of the activities attended by the student and will

be signed by the dean of students. In addition, any honors or awards that a student receives while at Georgia Tech will be listed. Co-curricular transcript programs have been established at many colleges and universities across the country to help provide students with an "edge" when applying for jobs or graduate schools.

GT EDGE-certified activities are sponsored by Georgia Tech departments and organizations. Examples may include career services seminars, aerobics classes, ODK leadership seminars, volunteer outings, diversity seminars, culture breaks and study seminars. Several departments on campus already have submitted activities for certification, including Career Services, International Student Programs, Student Center Options and the Counseling Center.

Students who enroll in the GT EDGE program commit to attending 18 EDGE-certified activities—three activities from

each of the six developmental components. To participate in the program, students complete a short application form. The activity sponsor maintains an attendance sheet to ensure that each student receives EDGE credit.

The Student Center Programs Area started the GT EDGE Program two years ago. The program generated a lot of interest from students, but the format was difficult to follow and could not accommodate such a large population of students. The program previously focused on mentors, and "it was difficult to recruit mentors, which limited the number of students we could accept into the program," said Andrea Hoffer, Student Center Programs Area. Based on C.L.U.E. (College Life Unit Experiences), a program established at the College of Staten Island, City University of New York, the new format does not include mentors, but "we do plan to bring the mentoring component back once the program has gained recognition," Hoffer said. This fall the program will be offered to the entire student body with an emphasis on freshman participation.

GT EDGE activities will be publicized through GT EDGE newsletters and electronic mailings. The program also will provide departments and organizations with the GT EDGE logo, which they can place on their publicity to indicate that the activity is certified.

Campus departments and organizations can sponsor an activity by completing an EDGE certification form, available from the Student Center Programs Area. The deadline for fall quarter activities is Aug. 21. For more information, contact Andrea Hoffer, 894-2805 or ah84@prism.gatech.edu.

# Future aerospace engineers tour Tech

R obert Prather is a pilot, a businessman and an aircraft designer with projects nearing the construction phase. He's also 16 years old.

"The designs are 100 percent feasible," said Prather.
"They're ideas to make flight safer and more efficient. The production-size models have made it through the preliminary phase and are now in the design phase. All we need is completion of the construction phase."

Prather, a junior at Forest Brook High School in Houston, Texas, was one of 850 students from all over the United States who traveled to Atlanta to compete in the annual Afro-Academic, Cultural, Technological, and Scientific Olympics (ACT-SO). Students in grades 9-12 compete in sciences, humanities, visual arts and performing arts. ACT-SO is coordinated by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) in conjunction with the organization's annual convention.

Prather, who plans to become an aerospace engineer, and approximately 40 other high school students took a break from the ACT-SO competition to spend an afternoon at the School of Aerospace Engineering. As NASA's guests of honor, the students were invited to take a "Tour of the Future." The visit included a stop in the helicopter lab with a presentation on unmanned aerial vehicles; an interactive demonstration of the Mars Global Surveyor Mission; a wind tunnel demonstration on laser flow visualization techniques; and a presentation on Georgia Tech's experiments in weightlessness conducted aboard a NASA KC-135 airplane.

Erian Armanios, director of the Georgia Space Grant
Consortium, coordinated the Tech visit in conjunction with
NASA's Higher Education Division. The Georgia Space
Grant Consortium, comprised of 10 institutions of which
Tech is the lead, promotes aeronautics, space and related
fields from pre-college to professional levels.

"Aerospace has inspired America's students for decades," said Armanios. "We would like to continue to engage them into exciting careers that fulfill their dreams for exploration, discovery and innovation."

The Georgia Tech visit concluded with Q&A and autograph sessions with NASA Astronaut Stephanie D. Wilson, one of three African-American females in the 44-member Class of 1996

#### Library databases

The Library and Information Center provides access to nearly 200 major databases, which are accessible through the Georgia Tech Electronic Library (GTEL®) and GALILEO. Both are available on the Library and Information Center's homepage at www.library.gatech.edu.

GTEL® contains GTEC, the catalog of books, journals, confrence proceedings and other materials in the Library and Information Center. Other GTEL® databases, selected specifically for Tech students and scholars, cover science, engineering, computer science, business, economics, psychology, public affairs and the general periodical literature. Also covered are patents, the NTIS technical reports and the Commerce Business Daily reports.

GALILEO is a statewide network of databases that provides access to nearly 40,000 journals and 300 newspapers on all topics and offers the full text of articles from 3,200 of these journals. Other GALILEO resources include almanacs, dictionaries, encyclopedias, directories and government publications. Several poetry databases also are included. GALILEO is funded by Georgia lottery proceeds.





# **OLAF** to improve purchasing process

entral Purchasing introduces OLAF, its new Web-based acquisition system. Using OLAF, which stands for online acquisition forms, Georgia Tech departments can create purchase requisitions and departmental purchase orders (DPO) directly from their computer.

Following electronic departmental approvals, purchase requisitions and DPO encumbrance requests immediately are routed to Central Purchasing for processing. The OLAF system will improve the procurement process by reducing the time it takes for a purchase requisition to be developed into a purchase order, sent to the vendor and received by the department.

OLAF will:

- expedite encumbrance and acquisition processes;
- reduce approval time within department;
- streamline work flow;
- communicate with Central Purchasing's GTAPS system; and
- reduce paper work.

The OLAF system was recommended by the Procurement

Redesign Team and built by the Georgia Tech Research Institute (GTRI). Team members were: Pat Ledon (Aerospace Engineering), Tom Pearson (Procurement Services), Kimsey Pollard (Microelectronics Research Center), Dennis Saylor (College of Management), Eric Trevena (College of Computing), Penny Walley (Management Services) and Judy Whitfield (Procurement Services). Initial users include GTRI, Microelectronics Research Center, School of Aerospace Engineering, College of Computing and Department of Health and Performance Sciences.

Training sessions will be offered in the Central Purchasing training room every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday through Aug. 13, from 9 - 11 a.m. or 1- 3 p.m. Alternate training dates and times are available if needed.
