Apple Crisp

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees

2. Mix Apples together with 2 tablespoons flour, white sugar, and cinnamon and put mixture in a 9x13 pan containing the $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of water.

3. Combine the oats, cup of flour, brown sugar, baking powder, baking soda, and butter together. Mix and crumble evenly over the apples. Bake for approximately 45 minutes.

- 6 oz. english toffee bits





Biological Safety Cabinet and Laminar Flow Hood Safety Alert

Environmental Health and Safety has stepped up to researchers' request to coordinate the inspection and certification of all biological safety cabinets and laminar flow hoods at Georgia Tech. Autoclaves are also being inspected to ensure they are operating to manufacturer's specifications.

All Facilities personnel should use care when servicing a biological safety cabinet or laminar flow hood. These hoods are designed to filter out potentially hazardous chemical and biological materials. **Handling HEPA filters, repairing motors, etc., could expose personnel to unknown hazards.** Safety-Plus, the cabinet and hood contractor EH&S has hired, can perform the needed repairs. They are able to send a technician out within 24 hours of being contacted. Also, after each maintenance procedure is completed, **it is imperative that the hood be recertified.** SafetyPlus will perform the recertifications. EH&S is in the process of creating safety signs to be placed on all biological safety cabinets and laminar flow hoods. The signs will alert employees to use caution when performing maintenance on the equipment. The signs will



also alert employees to contact EH&S afterwards, so we can set up the recertification process.

damaged ceiling tiles. The carpenter, electrician, and plumber will all address issues related to their fields. In the stadium proper, there are a plethora of different exterior light fixtures. The Area 4 maintenance workers replace all the burned out bulbs and ballasts to make sure this lighting is doing what it's supposed to do.

Building Services staff perform a major cleaning effort in all the suites and common areas including carpet cleaning and pressure washing the exterior of the President's Box. The Success Center suites are used throughout the year by Career Services and the heavy use takes its toll.

Game Day

Landscape Services staff are here first on game day to manage trash and landscape needs. They usually have between 8 and 10 staff present depending on the anticipated attendance at the game. Area 4 employees show up four hours before the game starts to run through the suites, put up the game flags, and attend to the various needs in the stadium as they come up. **There are eight skilled trade** workers and 1 manager from **GT Facilities here on game day.** We invite employees from the other Zones and U&E to fill in as schedules permit.

These eight trade workers will respond to any calls that come in that require their services. Some typical calls include suites that are too hot or cold, plugged or leaking restroom fixtures, tripped breakers, lighting issues, and elevator problems. Area 4 manages an agreement with a contractor to handle elevator calls just during the games.

Post Game Day

The day after the game requires a huge effort from Landscape Services to clean up the grounds and parking lots after the fans and tailgaters have had their fun. This clean up can extend to 2 days after the game or sometimes even 3 days with the attendance of a game like Notre Dame or UGA.

This all starts up again in the days before the next home game six times every year and sometimes seven times a vear. Our staff is professional, courteous, and makes the management team proud of our efforts. There is a general sense of good spirit among our staff. Even though it takes a huge effort to put on a football game; it's fulfilling to be part of something so great for the campus community. The entire effort builds a sense of teamwork amongst our staff and it is an honor to work along side these great employees.

Volunteerism is very rewarding experience. We at Facilities are very proud of our employees who very often do good work for the community and they never get notice. We say a big BRAVO to those who volunteer.

Bill Miller and John **DuConge** serve as volunteers on the Advisory Council of the Salvation Army Adult Rehabilitation Center on Marietta Street. The Advisory Council consists of sixteen to twenty citizens from a broad cross section of business, education, lawyers, architects, etc. in Atlanta.
