## Hoping for a 'Resurrection' Junior's Grill Closes its Doors

This isn't the first time Junior's Grill has had to shut its doors, and owner Tommy Klemis is hopeful that it won't be the last.

"All I'm asking for is for someone to help me find a way to keep Junior's going for another 37 years, so I can be around when we celebrate our 100-year anniversary," Klemis said. "I would be a part of any initiative that gets us there."

The grill has a long history of being "resurrected" — as Klemis likes to say — in the 1960s and again in the 1990s, which is why he is hoping for one more miracle.

In early April, Klemis came to the conclusion that he couldn't afford to keep Junior's open. April 21 was the "break-even" day in terms of the restaurant's expenses and revenue, so his intention was to quietly close and make a formal announcement to the campus community.

But news got out. Although Klemis wanted to avoid the publicity that would come with a public closing, he now thinks

that the outpouring of support from Tech's community may be for the best.

Klemis has been an important member of the Tech family for most of his life, said Georgia Tech President G. P. "Bud" Peterson.

"Through the way that he related to thousands of students, faculty, staff and alumni over the years, he has become a cherished part of the Junior's tradition," Peterson said.

According to Rich Steele, acting executive director for Auxiliary Services, conversations will soon get under way with Klemis to decide the future of Junior's.

For now, Klemis' first priority is ensuring that his former employees are taken care of.

"Then, maybe I'll start a weekly card game with [former Junior's icon] Anne, or I would love to be a greeter at Chick-Fil-A," he said. "But even as the doors to Junior's close, there's always hope that it will come back. We'll just have to wait and see."

## Changes Approved to Freedom of Expression Policy

Proposed changes to the Freedom of Expression Policy and Campus Use Procedures outlined in section 47 of the Faculty Handbook were approved during the April 26 meeting of the Academic Faculty and Senate and the General Faculty.

Some of the reasons Jeanne Balsam, acting chair of the statutes committee, provided for updating the section included a need to reflect actual campus practices and address findings from a legal review.

Modifications include providing a more comprehensive statement on freedom of expression, an updated method to invite speakers to campus, specific reasons for denying an application for campus use and an updated process for appeals. The revisions also create a committee on use of Institute facilities and designate facilities that have their own scheduling officer.

In other business, the following topics were addressed:

- Degree candidates were approved for spring graduation.
- Donna Llewellyn, director of the Center for the Enhancement of Teaching and Learning, discussed updates to the Course/Instructor Opinion Survey, which CETL hopes

## Take or Teach an Upcoming OPTIONS Class

By day, Kendra Albers is a research engineer for a lab at the Georgia Tech Research Institute. But in her spare time, she indulges her interest in less technical areas such as music and foreign languages — thanks to the Tech OPTIONS program.

"I chose to take OPTIONS classes because I graduated last May from the Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, and it was weird to not take classes last fall," said Albers, who works in the Electro-Optical Systems Lab at GTRI. "These classes offer a relaxing environment where you get to learn the things you have always been interested in but never got to take in college because you were too busy studying for your major."

Albers has taken both piano and Italian language classes through OPTIONS. However, the program offers courses that change each semester in subjects including dance, religion, art and life skills.

Tech began offering the noncredit courses about 20 years ago as a way to provide classes for students that were low-stress and "fun," said Tasha Myers, who oversees OPTIONS.

Most classes are held in the Student Center or elsewhere on campus. Anyone, including people from outside of the Tech community, may take the classes. The cost varies, with the fee structure being least expensive for students and then faculty and staff members.

Anyone may also propose and teach a course — as long as the person has experience or qualifications in the course area. The primary criteria for a class to be offered is whether it is of interest to students and whether they will pay the proposed price. Proposals may be submitted at any time online at the OPTIONS website, with the deadline for fall courses being June 30.

Instructors have creative freedom when it comes to designing the course and setting the price. They receive 80 percent of each registration fee paid, Myers added.

"I've done ad design and photography for a few years and was help-

ing the Student Center Programs Council (SCPC) with some promotional material in the Adobe suite," said Stephen Lester, an IT support professional in the School of Physics. "That was when Tasha said that I should teach a class on Photoshop. Working with the SCPC was fun, and they made the process easy."

Giorgio Calanni is a postdoctoral fellow in aerospace engineering and began teaching Italian language classes for OPTIONS in 2005.

"A lot of the bureaucratic work is taken care of by the OPTIONS staff, while space and equipment are easily available," he said. "From that point of view, working with this program has always been a smooth and pleasant experience — the staff makes such an exciting and rewarding experience effortless."

The course schedule for the summer session, which will run from May 16 to July 22, will be posted on the OPTIONS website by May 6.

## Professor Has 'Head Start' at Reaching Students

When it comes to engaging students in the classroom, Wendy Rogers is thankful that she has a head start because of the subject she's teaching.

"Psychology is the science of human behavior — so most students start off interested," said Rogers, a professor in the School of Psychology.

Other strategies she employs include linking

research studies to real-world examples students can relate to and providing context for the research by covering who the researchers were, who funded it and why it is important.

"And I encourage the students to voice their own views and learn to be critical consumers of research results," Rogers added.

Recently, The Whistle sat down with Rogers to learn more about her and her time at Tech. Here's what we learned:

**How long have you been teaching, and how did you get to Tech?**

I received my Ph.D. in experimental

psychology from Tech in 1991 and then worked in faculty positions at the University of Memphis and the University of Georgia. When the position here opened, I jumped at the chance to return. The opportunity to join the Tech faculty was exciting. Plus, it allowed my husband, Dan Fisk, who is also a member of the faculty, to live in Atlanta — not halfway between Atlanta and Athens.

**Tell us about your area of research.**

My early research concerned understanding how well older adults could acquire new skills and the conditions that best facilitated such learning. But then I began to address questions involving older adults' interactions with technology. For example, I've assessed user challenges for a range of technologies including automatic teller machines, blood glucose meters, computers and personal robots.

**What is the greatest challenge you face associated with teaching, and how have you dealt with it?**

Understanding the individual needs, capabilities and motivations of students and helping them succeed is a challenge. For example, at the undergraduate level, I try to use everything from multiple-choice tests to oral presentations to assess performance, since certain evaluations work better for some than for others.

**What piece of technology could you not live without as an instructor?**

PowerPoint really changed the nature of lecturing in large classrooms. It makes it

easier to provide content in an interesting, engaging way, and it helps to keep the students' attention focused on the learning goals of each lecture.

**What are three things everyone should do while working at Tech?**

Enjoy the beauty and character of the campus. For example, I like to sit in the garden behind Skiles under the Mickey Mouse clock. Attend a football game or other sporting event on campus. Take in an event at the Ferst Center, since it's an intimate venue where you can see world-class performances.

**Where is the best place to grab lunch (on or off campus), and what do you order?**

I like Ferst Place. The food is always good, the staff is pleasant and the environment is nice for hosting off-campus guests. I usually eat a little bit of everything on the buffet.

**Tell us something unusual about yourself.**

I am the youngest of six children, with only nine years separating the oldest to the youngest. We lived with our parents in a small three-bedroom — one-bathroom — house and still are very close today. I also climbed Mount Kilimanjaro in 2007 with my husband and friends to raise money and awareness for the 22Q13 Deletion Syndrome, which a friend of my son's has.

**If you weren't in your current line of work, what would you be doing?**

I think I'd be a good copyeditor. I can't help but notice grammatical and typographical errors — to the dismay of my students.

### And the Oscar Goes to... Georgia Tech

In honor of Tech's 125th birthday year, we're partnering with Georgia Tech Alumni Magazine to highlight a piece of Tech history. This issue's topic: the Freeman Oscars.

The following excerpt is number 109 on the list "125 Pieces of Tech History," featured in the September/October 2010 issue of Georgia Tech Alumni Magazine:

Y. Frank Freeman, who headed Paramount Pictures for two decades in his career as a film producer, received two Oscars, which are now housed in the library's archives. The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences awarded Freeman the first Jean Hersholt Humanitarian Award in 1957 and an honorary award in 1966 for his distinguished service to the film industry.

Freeman was the Alumni Association president from 1921 to 1923, and he received its Distinguished Service Award in 1939, when the Association said, "As executive vice president of Paramount Pictures in Hollywood, his salary is among the highest paid in the country, even if through tax laws it is largely taken over by the government."

to implement this summer.

- A change that was approved at the Feb. 15 meeting was reversed. When a formal hearing committee is generated by the Faculty Status and Grievance Committee, the number of potential members will once again be 24, not 25. Also a statement has been added to the section on the formulation of a hearing committee that clarifies that the Faculty Status and Grievance Committee is not involved in formal dismissal hearings.
- Changes to the Grounds for Removal section of the Faculty Handbook were approved, including the addition of a paragraph stating that the president may at any time remove any faculty member or other employee "for cause." A change was proposed to another section of the handbook that would eliminate a list of reasons why a tenured faculty member could be dismissed and instead direct readers to the section on grounds for removal. In addition, a sentence would be deleted that states that, "Unless legal considerations forbid, any such relief from duties will be with pay." These changes must be read at the next meeting before further action can be taken.
