Inter-Fraternity Songfest To Be Held Friday, June 3 Contest Winner To Receive Trophy, Seven IFC Points

The 1955 Inter-Fraternity-Council-sponsored fraternity singing contest will be held Friday, June 3, on the volley ball courts. Twenty-two of the twenty-six fraternities on campus have already signed up for participation.

Judging of the contest will be based on tone quality, precision, content, diction, presentation, and togetherness. Judges will be three faculty members, as yet unselected.

Each fraternity entering the contest must sing three songs. The first will be a fraternity song, the second an optional song, and the third will be the song, "Drink to Me Only With Thine Eyes."

No more than twenty-five percent of any singing group may belong to the Tech Glee Club. A group may consist of not less than ten nor more than twenty-five members. All must be members of the fraternity which they represent; however, a piano player is not required to belong to the fraternity. No music will be allowed.

The winner of the event will receive a trophy and seven IFC points. Second and third place awards are five and three IFC points, respectively.

Chairman of the singing contest, Bill Cheek of Kappa Sigma, says, "If the present interest in this event is continued, this will definitely be one of the most successful contests of its type ever held on the Tech campus."

WSF Contributions Break All Foregoing Records For Drive

Existing records of high collections for the World Student Fund were shattered this week when the total money collected and pledged reached \$2,000.23. This is the first time in the history of the Georgia Tech World Student Fund that the goal set before the drive has ever been exceeded. This year's goal was \$1,800. Money may still be donated to any WSF member or turned in at the YMCA desk.

The largest total of money donated from any one student group on the campus was \$150 from APO.

Tech fraternities contributed a total of \$690.84. Phi Kappa Tau donated the highest per capita of any fraternity, and was awarded a trophy at the Wednesday, May 13 meeting of the Triangle Club. The average of this fraternity was \$1.36 per member.

Phi Gamma Delta was second in per capita donations. Their average was \$1.20 per man. Other high fraternities were Phi Sigma Kappa with \$1.11; Phi Epsilon Pi with \$1.00; Kappa Alpha with \$.77; Sigma Chi with \$.76, and Sigma Phi Epsilon with \$.72. Kappa Alpha had the highest total with \$90.00.

Coach Lanoue Gets Honor, Recognition For Swim Program

Among Georgia Tech's many coaches and athletes who have received fame ranging from honorable recognition to the most outstanding in their fields, is Freddy Lanoue. Coach Lanoue has been the swimming coach at Georgia Tech for the past twenty years.

The Georgia Tech swimming team and its coach is the first swimming group to ever receive publicity in a national magazine. Such publicity was given Coach Lanoue and his team in the May 21 issue of "The Saturday Evening Post." In that issue, Freddy Lanoue was saluted as the originator of his famous Georgia Tech Swimming Technique; a method praised by many of the sport's top competitors as being the most outstanding course in the new style of swimming today. This new style changes to old theory of teaching the student to swim a long distance to emphasizing the knowledge of how to stay afloat under any kind of condition.

Along with Coach Lanoue's fame in the south, he holds a position respected by swimmers everywhere; that of being national chairman of the swimming committee of next year's annual meeting of the AAHP. 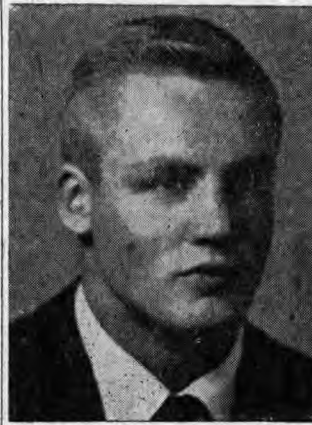
Ray is studying Industrial Management at Tech and has distinguished himself in many ways during his college career.

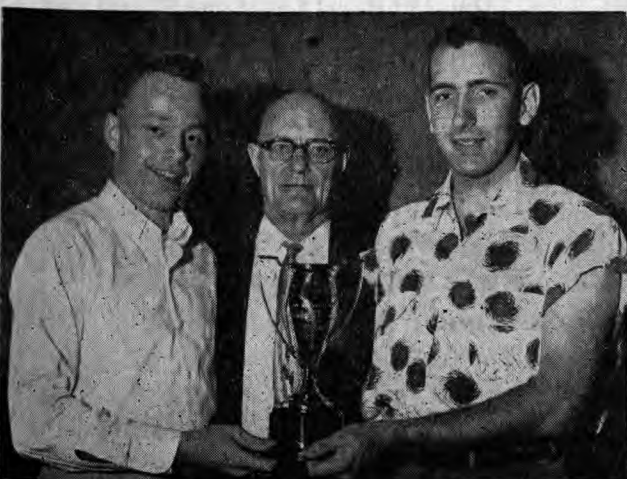

High School Question

Value Of College Education?

College and high school seniors who will graduate in June are looking for signs of the times for an answer to the question; "Just how valuable is a college education?"

As the need for more college trained personnel has grown in recent years, educators and employers have become convinced that a college or university, and especially an engineering education is invaluable.

Recently, an annual survey has just been completed. This survey of business and industry says that employers plan to hire more college and university graduates in 1955 than in 1954 and pay higher salaries. The starting salaries in all fields will average \$341.00 a month.

As for the economic value of a college education, surveys have scanned that factor from a number of standpoints.

The Alfred Politz research organization in July, 1952, reported that the average college graduate earns \$45,000 more over the normal working years than does the high school graduate who does not continue his school work. And he makes all of \$79,000 more in the same time, than the grade school graduates. Only 26 per cent of grade school graduates earn more than \$4,000 a year.

Of high schoolers, the report continues, 46 per cent scale that hurdle (\$4,000 annually) while 71 per cent of college graduates do.

The recent research project of the United States Chamber of Commerce makes it even clearer that college degrees pay off in dollars and cents.

Surveying men over 25 in two different salary brackets the Chamber



ber found that 52 per cent of those making \$10,000 or more a year had gone to college. At the other extreme, of those making less than

\$3,000 a year, only 8 per cent were college men. Thus, there is every indication that in 1955 as in all recent years the scramble to hire college graduates will be as urgent as ever.



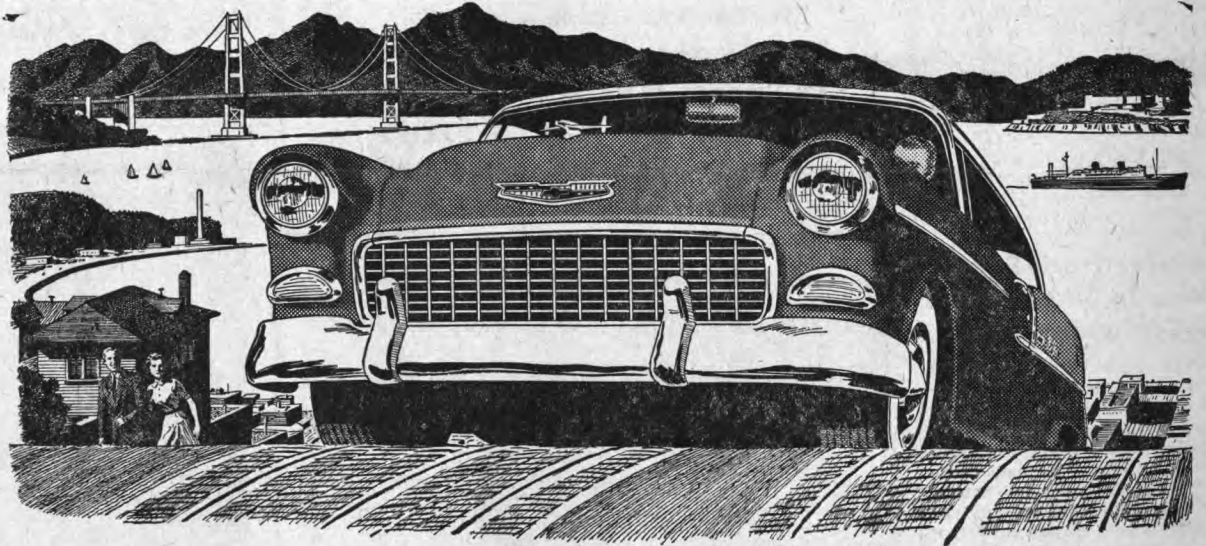

fast being accepted in colleges all over the country. It has actually changed the horizons of swimming, and the Red Cross, YMCA, and Boy Scouts of America, are in the process of changing their methods of instruction to the Lanoue style.

Coach Lanoue only has this to say of his course. "As long as you are on top, you may not be glamorous, but you will be alive." Of course he does not mean that staying on top includes floating on your back. That is a crime in his course. Why? Well, Lanoue explains that a victim at sea must contend with waves of water. "The two little nostrils soon fill up, your stomach having become full of brine, and therefore thou cup runneth over." That is very unpleasant he assures.
