Outlook

The Georgia Tech women's track and field team tallied a pair of Top 25 finishes at the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championships and finished runner-up at the indoor and outdoor Atlantic Coast Conference Championships last season. This year, the Yellow Jackets will once again be a force on the conference and national scenes.

"We're looking forward to another exciting year for Georgia Tech women's track and field," said head coach Alan Drosky. "We've had a very consistent level of success over the last few years, with our first conference championship and Top 25 finishes at the NCAA Championships [15th outdoor, 21st indoor], plus strong second-place finishes at the outdoor and indoor ACC Championships last year. We start every season with the idea that we're going to win the conference championship and that's the standard that we shoot for. It's not an easy feat, it never is, but that's what we start training for at the beginning of every year."

"We lost some valuable points at the conference meet, but have a good core group returning and with the addition of some very talented athletes, we feel like we could improve on last year's performances. That being said, ACC's are going to be totally different this year. We add two quality track programs in Virginia Tech and Miami. The Hurricanes are a Top 10, Top 15 team nationally, so that makes winning the conference meet that much harder. I would say that North Carolina will be the favorite, with Miami and us behind them and the rest of the conference not far behind."

Sprints

Sprints will continue to be a strength for the Yellow Jackets. Senior Dana Rogers and junior Andriane Lapsley will be the frontrunners for Tech in the 60- and 100-meter dashes.

"Both of them have done well at the conference level," said Drosky. "Lapsley had a tremendous year last season and she continues to get better and better, as does Dana."

Newcomer Shantrell Moss was a runner-up at the Florida State Championships as a senior in the 100-meter dash.

"Shantrell is in the basketball program and will join the track team during the outdoor season," said Drosky. "She will add another quality sprinter to our program."

Headlining Tech in the 200- and 400-meter events will be sophomore ACC champion Ashlee Kidd. Kidd became a U.S. Junior champion last summer in the 400 and qualified for the World Junior Championships.

"Ashlee had a fabulous freshman year," said Drosky. "Winning the 400 at the U.S. Junior National Championship, she gained a ton of experience competing in that event and going over to Italy for the World Junior Championships. We're looking for Ashlee to continue her success and establish herself on the national level."

Redshirt freshman Lindsay Vincent and freshman Antoinetta McKay will also run the 400 for the Jackets.

"Lindsay sat out last season with an injury," said Drosky. "She is very talented and will add another quality 400-meter runner to the program. Antoinetta can run anywhere from the 100 to the 400. She will be part of relays and we're looking for big things out of her this year."

Hurdles

The Rambling Wreck has a plethora of talented athletes in the hurdles. Leading the pack will be Rogers, who finished runner-up in the 60- and 100-meter high hurdles at last year's indoor

and outdoor ACC meets. Joining her will be Lapsley and junior Chaunte Howard.

"This is one of our strengths," said Drosky. "You have Dana and Andriane who are proven, and then Chaunte who finished third in the 100 hurdles at the outdoor meet. Also adding talent to the mix will be freshman Shantia Moss, who was the fastest 100-meter high school hurdler in the nation last year. She ran a time of 13.39 at the U.S. Junior National Championships and won the Florida State Championship."

Senior Priscilla Reed will lead Tech in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles. "She finished fifth in the 400 hurdles at the conference meet last year and we're looking for her to have a great final season," said Drosky.

Middle Distance

Sophomore Jennifer Sims and senior Jennifer Lentz lead the pack in the middle distance group.

"They were fourth and fifth indoors in the 800 meters last year and struggled a little bit during the outdoor season," said Drosky. "They are very talented and capable of competing at the conference level and we're going to need them to have good seasons."

Freshmen Maria Hampton and Nisha Kurian will also see action for Tech in the middle distance events. "Maria and Nisha are talented athletes and we're anxious to see what they can do at the conference level," said Drosky.

Distance

The distance group returns sophomores Ann Armsby, Kirby Cross and Mary Chind. "The distance events are probably the deepest and strongest events in our conference," said Drosky. "This group continues to get better and we hope to see improvement at the ACC meets."

Senior Neta Ezer returns for her final season for Tech and will highlight the Jackets in the 5,000- and 10,000-meter events. Joining her will be newcomers Elena Linn and Emily Yandle.

"Neta didn't have the fall cross country season and used the fall to train for track," said Drosky. "She has the ability to score for us in the 10,000 at the ACC Championships. Elena and Emily are new to our program and improved throughout the cross country season."

Relays

Tech broke the school record in the 4x100-meter relay and finished seventh in the nation with a time of 44.0. At the Outdoor NCAA Championships, the Tech 4x100 finished sixth and garnered All-America honors. Rogers, Lapsley and Kidd return for the Jackets off that relay team.

"We have three returning for this relay and other capable athletes who can join the mix," said Drosky. "Shantrell and Shantia Moss both ran on the Florida State champion high school relay teams."

Six or seven Tech competitors could compete in the 4x400 relay. Howard, Kidd, Rogers, Lapsley, Vincent, Smith and McKay all could comprise the 4x400 team this year.

"We're excited about the prospect of having a more consistent 4x400 relay team," said Drosky.

The Distance Medley Relay team could consist of junior Misty Dirksen, Kurian, Lentz, Sims, Kidd and Cross.

"We didn't finish as high as we could have last year and I feel like we are going to improve immensely in this event at the conference championship," said Drosky.

Jumps, Pole Vault

Junior standout Chaunte Howard returns for the Jackets in the jumps. Howard captured national titles in the high jump at the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championships, won two ACC titles and a total of seven All-ACC honors en route to being named ACC Most Valuable Performer for both indoor and outdoor seasons. The Riverside, Calif., native then finished second at the U.S. Olympic Trials to qualify for the Athens Olympics.

"Chaunte does all the jumps for us," said Drosky. "She has a career full of accolades and we're looking for her to add more this year. She established herself, not just as the top collegiate high jumper, but also as one of the top jumpers in the U.S. last year. Her 6'6" jump was the second highest mark by a collegian ever and went on to qualify for the Olympics. She had a rare off day in Athens, Greece, where she couldn't get her timing down, but gained a wealth of experience over there."

Junior Brandy Depland and senior Shanta Smith will lead the Jackets in the long and triple jump events.

"Brandy is a proven scorer at the conference meet, earning all-conference honors in the triple jump last year," said Drosky. "Shanta is a two-time ACC champion in the triple jump and finished second in the 400 behind Ashlee last year. She had surgery in the offseason and will miss the indoor season, but we'll have her back for the outdoor season."

Senior Ashley McNeill will add more strength and stability to an already loaded lineup in the long and triple jump events.

"Ashley is someone who had a really good year and made some solid improvements at the end of the year," said Drosky. "If she picks up where she left off, she will improve at the conference level."

Freshman Raenard Dillard will also leap for Tech in the long jump. "Raenard is an excellent long jumper from the Atlanta area and has a tremendous upside," said Drosky.

In the pole vault, Tech will turn to Kira Barcus. "Kira struggled a little bit so far in her career, but we feel like she is making progress and can really come into her own this year," said Drosky.

Throws

According to coach Drosky, Tech will lack depth in the throwing events heading into the indoor and outdoor seasons. "We're a little thin in the throws, but it's an area that we're looking to develop," said Drosky. "Dore Madere is a senior and is very talented. She was a transfer from Miami and had to sit out until last year. She struggled getting back into the flow of competition, but had a great fall and we're looking for her to be competitive at the conference meet in the weight throw and discus."

Junior Jewel Welch walked onto the squad last season. "Jewel used last year to train and will compete in the discus and the hammer throw for us this season."

Combined

Junior Alex Van Heuven is coming off a third-place finish in the heptathlon at the outdoor ACC meet and will lead Tech in the combined events.

"Alex was All-ACC in the heptathlon and was fifth in the pentathlon," said Drosky. "She is very talented and had a good first season after redshirting her freshman year."

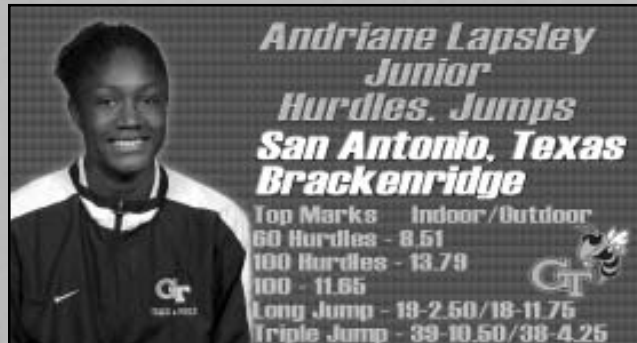

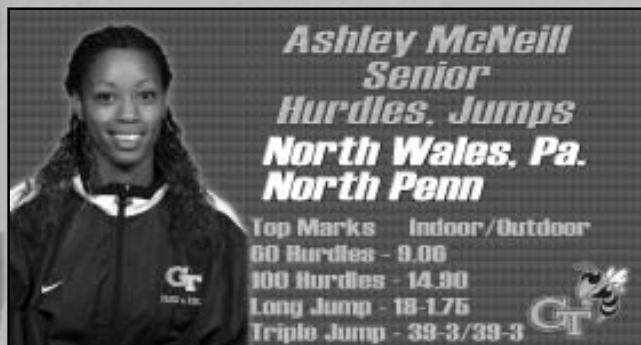

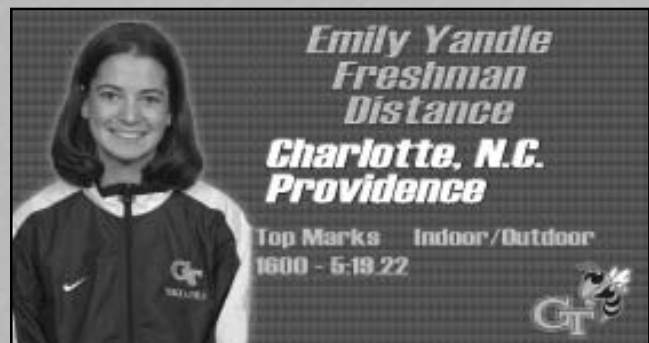

Head Coach Alan Drosky • 14th Season (10th as head coach) Georgia Tech, 1987



Alan Drosky is entering his 10th season as the head coach of the Georgia Tech women's track and field team. He also mentors the distance runners for the Yellow Jackets' men's track team.

Additionally, Drosky recently completed his 14th year as the head coach of both the men's and women's cross country teams at Georgia Tech.

Drosky, a two-time All-American and five-time track All-ACC performer, has been head women's coach since the 1995-96 season. He has been a part of the Yellow Jacket coaching staff since 1987, when he took a graduate assistant position while working towards a master's degree in management. After completing his graduate studies in 1989, Drosky became a full-time assistant for the 1990 season and took over the helm of the cross country program in '91.

Prior to earning a Bachelor of Science degree in industrial management in '87, Drosky was one of the most decorated middle distance performers in Tech history. He competed for the Yellow Jackets from 1985-87, serving as team captain three times. He holds the Tech school record in both the 1000 (2:22.78) and 1500 (3:43.37) meter indoor events, and is a member of Tech's outdoor record-holding 4x1600-meter relay (16:32.98).

Drosky earned All-America honors twice at the NCAA Championships, finishing sixth in the indoor mile in 1986 and 12th in the outdoor 1500 meters in 1987. He was also the 1987 ACC champion in the indoor mile.

Following his distinguished career, Drosky was inducted into the Georgia Tech Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996.

Since taking the reins of the women's program, Drosky has guided the Yellow Jackets to six top-three finishes in the last seven years at the Indoor ACC Championships, including the program's first - men's or women's - Atlantic Coast Conference title at the 2002 indoor ACC meet. It was just the second ACC title by any women's program at Georgia Tech and snapped nine consecutive indoor titles by North Carolina. Drosky was named Indoor ACC Coach of the Year for the second time in his career (1999).

After winning the program's first ACC crown, Drosky guided the Yellow Jackets to a runner-up finish at the 2003 Indoor ACC Championships. Tech freshman Chaunte Howard, along with junior teammate Amandi Rhett, claimed ACC crowns at the conference meet. Howard finished 10th in the high jump at the Indoor NCAA Championships to earn All-America honors.

The Rambling Wreck followed the indoor season with a fifth-place finish at the Outdoor ACC Championships. Howard claimed her second ACC title in the high jump and tallied a runner-up finish in the high jump at the Outdoor NCAA Championships, garnering All-America honors. Tech finished 36th at the championships.

In 2004, Drosky coached the Jackets to a pair of runner-up finishes at the indoor and outdoor ACC Championships, finishing a mere 15.5 points shy of North Carolina at the indoor ACC meet. A total of six ACC championships were won by Tech athletes as sophomore standout Chaunte Howard earned indoor and outdoor ACC Performer of the Year honors.

Nationally, Drosky led the Yellow Jackets to their highest NCAA outdoor finish at the 2004 Outdoor NCAA Championships, finishing in a tie for 15th place in Austin, Texas. Tech posted a second Top 25 finish at the Indoor NCAA Championships, finishing in a tie for 21st place in Fayetteville, Ark. Howard became the first women's athlete to capture back-to-back national titles, winning the high jump at the indoor and outdoor NCAA meets.

Drosky has led the Rambling Wreck to eight top-30 finishes, including two top-15 finishes during his tenure at Tech.

Howard became the first women's athlete to qualify for the Summer Olympic Games, finishing second at the 2004 U.S. Olympic Trials in the high jump to stamp her ticket to Athens, Greece. On a rare off day, Howard finished in a tie for 28th place at the XXVIII Olympiad.

In addition to his mentoring of the women's program, Drosky has also coached several of the nation's top men's distance performers. Headlining that list is David Krummenacker, who ranks as the fastest American 800-1500-meter doubler of all-time. He also owns a pair of U.S. 800-meter titles (2001-02) and set the American record in the indoor 1000 meters in 2002. While at Tech, Krummenacker won the 1997 and '98 NCAA indoor 800-meter national titles. He still holds four different school records and was named the 1997 and '98 ACC Indoor and Outdoor Championship MVP. In all, Krummenacker won 12 individual ACC titles.

Recent graduate Brendon Mahoney ranks among Drosky's finest proteges. He was a three-time All-American and finished seventh in the mile at the 2002 NCAA Indoor Championships. He also finished eighth in the 800 at the 2002 U.S. National Outdoor Championships, a race won by Krummenacker. In 2004, Mahoney won ACC titles in the indoor 800 and mile, and the outdoor 800 and 1500 meter races en route to being named ACC Performer of the Year for both the indoor and outdoor seasons. He went onto to earning All-America honors in the 1500 at the Outdoor NCAA Championships.

Drosky's top women's competitors include Tech assistant coach Becky Megesi and former standout Renee Metivier. Megesi garnered All-America honors with an eighth-place finish in the 1500 meters in 1999 and was a member of the seventh-place distance medley team in 2000. She won the ACC outdoor 1500-meter title in both 1998 and '99 and qualified for the NCAA championship meet in both the 800 and 1500 meters in 1999, as well as the 800 in 2000.

Metivier had an outstanding 2002, becoming the first Jacket to earn All-America honors in cross country, indoor and outdoor track. During the indoor season, she earned that status in the 3000 and 5000 meters. She also claimed All-America accolades with an eighth-place finish in the 5000 at the outdoor NCAA meet. Metivier now holds four school records.

Beth Mallory also earned All-America honors under Drosky, placing sixth in the mile at the 1996 NCAA Indoor Championships.

In his career, Drosky has coached his athletes to four individual national titles (Krummenacker and Howard) and 43 NCAA All-American performances. On the conference level, he has coached 60 league champions and 114 All-ACC performances.

In cross country, Drosky has also led the team to success in one of the nation's top cross country conferences. He has guided the women's team to a pair of NCAA Championship appearances (2000, 2001), with a top finish of 26th in '01. That same season, he coached the women's to their first-ever NCAA South Region crown, and was named South Region Coach of the Year. The Jackets' men's team also enjoyed a program-best finish of fourth at the 2001 regional championships. His top ACC finishes came in 1994 with both teams finishing third at the conference championships in Atlanta.

Drosky has mentored three cross country All-Americans and seven NCAA individual qualifiers. Additionally, he has guided Tech runners to 15 All-ACC and 33 all-region performances.

Metivier enjoyed the top season in Tech cross country history in 2001, finishing second at the NCAA Championships, winning the NCAA South Regional title and placing second at the ACC Championships.

Mallory earned All-America honors in 1995, placing 25th, and also earned All-ACC honors three times. Additionally, Megesi was an individual qualifier in '98.

On the men's side, Kevin Graham is the lone All-American in Tech history, finishing 32nd in '94. Senior Kyle Rabbitt earned All-ACC honors in cross country at the 2004 ACC Championships, finishing 14th. Rabbitt is the third Tech athlete to qualify for the NCAA Championships, doing so at the 2003 NCAA meet.

Drosky is a member of the United States Track Coaches Association and the NCAA Track Coaches Association and is currently serving as an at-large representative of the U.S. Cross Country Coaches Association.

A native of Riverdale, Ga., and a former Georgia state champion in the mile at Riverdale High School, Drosky is married to the former Kim Bohanon, who ran cross country at Georgia State. The couple has two daughters: Hayley, 12, and Hannah, 9.

Nat Page is in his ninth year as an assistant coach for the Georgia Tech track and field program. Page is responsible for coaching field events, including high jump, long

jump, triple jump, as well as the men's and women's sprint hurdle events.

Since joining the Tech staff in 1997, Page has mentored Tech student-athletes to 15 ACC titles and 19 All-America performances.

His latest prodigy, junior Chaunte Howard, captured consecutive national titles in the women's high jump at the 2004 Indoor and Outdoor NCAA Championships, and became the first women's athlete to compete in the Summer Olympics this summer in Athens, Greece.

For his efforts, Page was named 2004 Mondo Women's Jumps/Multi Events Coach of the Year.

Current Tech assistant coach Andria King was another highlight under coach Page's tutelage. Page coached King to four NCAA national runner-up finishes in the indoor 60-meter and outdoor 100-meter hurdles in 1998 and '99. She formerly held the American collegiate record in the 60-meter hurdles with a time of 8.00 in 1999. King was a five-time All-American and three-time ACC MVP.

Other Yellow Jacket All-Americans under Page are Eric Bowers (indoor long jump, 1997), Ashlee Kidd (4x100), Lynn Houston (indoor high jump, 1999), Malcolm Leason (outdoor triple jump, 2000), Montrell Person (110 Hurdles), Clayton Porter (indoor long jump, 2000), Dana Rogers (4x100) and Amandi Rhett (4x100, 100, 200).

On the conference level, he has guided three men to conference titles: Bowers (indoor long jump, 1997), Leason (outdoor triple jump, 2000) and David Riley (indoor triple jump, 1997).

On the women's side, Page has coached nine conference championship performances, in addition to King's three hurdle titles. Lynn Houston won both indoor and outdoor high jump titles in 1997. Mishanta Reyes won the indoor long jump crown in 2001, while Shanta Smith won the indoor triple jump and Jennifer Ledbetter claimed the outdoor high jump title in '02. Howard claimed the high jump in both the indoor and outdoor seasons in 2003 and '04.

In addition to his work at Tech, Page founded Nat's Athletic Training and Career Experiences in September 1993. He has coached seven World Championship team members and a trio of Olympians: Natasha Gibson, Howard and Tisha Waller, who is now the American indoor record holder in the high jump. Page has also worked with Wenda Vereen, who was a member of the U.S. 4x100 team, which won a Silver medal and set an American record at the 1993 World Championships.

Howard and Waller each made the 2004 U.S. Olympic Team in the high jump in Athens, Greece. Waller captured her second U.S. title, while Howard finished second at the U.S. Olympic Trials in Sacramento, Calif.

A native of Evanston, Ill., Page was an NCAA Champion high jumper at the University of Missouri in 1979. He was ranked in the top 10 in the world from 1979-81 and earned a spot on the United States' 1980 Olympic team after finishing second at the U.S. Olympic Trials.

Additionally, Page also competed at a world-class level in the both the high and intermediate hurdles from 1984-92. From 1990-92, he was ranked in the top 10 in the world in the 400 intermediate hurdles. A member of the United States' 1992 World Cup team, Page was a finalist at the U.S. Track and Field Championships every year from 1985-91.

He was inducted into the University of Missouri Athletic Hall of Fame in 1999, where he was a five-time All-American and a four-time Big 8 high jump champion. He was named outdoor MVP of the Big 8 Championship in 1978.

From 1988-91, Page served as assistant coach at California State Polytechnic University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in physical education.

Page resides in Atlanta with his children, Tyler and Ryan.

Andria King enters her fourth season as an assistant coach with the Yellow Jacket track and field program. She works with Tech's sprinters and distance hurdlers.

Under King's direction, freshman Ashlee Kidd captured ACC crowns in the 200 and 400 meters and earned a total of four all-conference honors during the 2004 indoor and outdoor seasons. Kidd posted a second-place finish at the U.S. Junior National Championships to qualify for the IAAF World Junior Championships in Grosseto, Italy. At the Junior World Championships, Kidd captured a Bronze medal with a third-place finish in the 400.

King tutored Sophomores Lauren Reimer and Alex Van Heuven to All-ACC honors last season. Reimer broke the school record in the pentathlon and garnered all-conference accolades at the indoor ACC meet during the indoor season. She went on to capturing her first ACC title at the outdoor meet in the heptathlon.

Van Heuven earned all-conference honors at the Outdoor ACC Championships with a third-place finish in the heptathlon.

A standout hurdler and sprinter for the Jackets, King earned All-America honors five times from 1997-99. She was a four-time national runner-up in the hurdles and was chosen as the Atlantic Coast Conference Championships Most Valuable Performer on three occasions. She holds seven school records.

King, who competed from 1996-99, was also a two-time Georgia Tech Female Most Valuable Athlete of the Year honoree. She was recently named one of the ACC's top 50 competitors in both women's indoor and outdoor track.

She earned her Bachelor of Science in Management from Tech in 1999.

Following her graduation, King competed internationally on both United States and Reebok teams in the 100- and 400-meter hurdles. She was a member of the 1999 USA Track & Field World Championships team and a gold medalist at the 1999 World University Games.



Becky Megesi

One of the top middle distance runners in Tech history, Becky Megesi enters her fourth year as an assistant for the Jackets cross country and track teams. She

primarily works with the distance runners as well as the cross country teams for both men and women. Additionally, she handles many administrative functions as well as being in charge of recruiting the women's distance events.

As an athlete, Megesi garnered All-America honors in the 1500 meters, finishing eighth at the 1999 Outdoor NCAA Championships in Boise, Idaho. She again earned All-America honors in 2000, anchoring Tech's distance medley relay to a seventh-place finish at the Indoor NCAA Championships in Fayetteville, Ark. Megesi also qualified for the Outdoor NCAA meets in 1999 and 2000 in the 800. In 1998, she became the third Tech individual qualifier for the NCAA Cross Country Championship in Lawrence, Kan. In 2000, Megesi was a qualifier for the U.S. Olympic Trials in the 800 meters.

Megesi won ACC Championships in the 1500 in 1998 and '99, earning All-ACC honors six times during her career. She currently holds school records in the outdoor 800 (2:04.63), the indoor distance medley relay (11:21.48), and the outdoor 4x800m relay (8:56.94).

She earned a Bachelor of Science in Management in 2001.

Allen Bradd enters his second season as assistant men's and women's track and field coach at Georgia Tech. Bradd

specializes in the throwing events, along with pole vault and multi events for the Jackets.

In his inaugural season as throwing coach, Bradd tutored juniors Zeb Sion and Marcus Canty to their first ACC Meet Championship titles in the shot put and javelin, respectively. Sion earned All-ACC honors in both the indoor and outdoor ACC Championships and Canty finished the season with the 23rd best javelin mark in the nation. Bradd also guided the Yellow Jackets to six All-ACC honors and 16 ACC Championship finalists.

Prior to coming to Tech, Bradd coached at Syracuse University. While guiding the Orangemen throwing events, Bradd led four athletes to NCAA Provisional qualifying marks in the discus, shot put and weight throw. He had a men's shot putter capture the Men's Big East Conference title and a ECAC Discus champion during his stint. He also led a pair of freshman to No. 2 and No. 3 NCAA national class rankings in the weight throw and a women's discus thrower to the 22nd best mark in the nation. Later that same season, she went on to qualify in the discus for the World Junior Championships.

Before coaching at Syracuse, Bradd was an assistant men's and women's track and field coach at Murray State University for one season. While at Murray State, he tutored three All-OVC honors in the shot put and discus at the Ohio Valley Conference Championships. Also garnering All-OVC honors under Bradd was a men's pole vaulter who finished runner-up at the OVC meet in back-to-back seasons. Bradd also guided an athlete who qualified for the 2001 U.S.A National Championships in the hammer and another to the 2000 Olympic Trials in the discus, finishing in 14th place.

As a professional, Bradd competed for the Mizuno Klub Kiehas during the 1999-2000 track and field seasons. In 1999, he finished 12th-place at the USA Outdoor National Championships in Eugene, Ore. and had a fourth-place finish in the shot put at the USA/Canada Challenge in Flag Staff, Ariz.

Bradd attended the University of North Carolina, where he became a two-time All-American in the shot put. He was a five-time individual ACC champion in the shot put and two-time hammer ACC champion. Bradd was elected team captain in the 1998-99 season and was a member of the UNC Student-Athlete Council Member board.

A native of Downs, Ill., Bradd graduated from North Carolina with a bachelor's degree in sport exercise and science in May 1999. He is married to the former Angie Joy.

Bobby Robinson enters his second year at Georgia Tech as Associate Director of Athletics. Robinson oversees facilities and game operations.

Robinson spent 17 years as Clemson's Director of Athletics, serving from 1985 until stepping down on June 30, 2002.

During his time at Director of Athletics, the Tigers won 56 Atlantic Coast Conference team titles as well as the 1987 NCAA championship in men's soccer, and Clemson student-athletes captured 24 individual national titles and over 400 All-America citations. The Clemson football team went to a bowl game in 14 of his 17 years, and the men's basketball program advanced to postseason play 12 of 17 years.

Over his career, 16 of the 19 Tiger sports programs had at least one final top 10 national ranking, and Clemson finished in the top 30 of the national all-sports rankings in nine of Robinson's 17 years.

Tiger student-athletes also made great strides academically during Robinson's tenure, thanks in large part to the construction of Vickery Hall, Clemson's student-athlete enrichment center. In addition to that facility, Robinson also launched an \$82 million fundraising project to enhance all of Clemson's athletics facilities, including Clemson Memorial Stadium and Littlejohn Coliseum.

Robinson first went to Clemson in 1970, working in the housing office until moving to the athletics department three years later. After serving the athletics department in various capacities, he was named business manager in 1975. He was promoted to assistant athletic director in 1977 and then associate athletic director in 1980. He served in that capacity until being named Director of Athletics in March of 1985.

Along with his administrative duties, Robinson served as Clemson's golf coach from 1974-83, guiding the Tigers to one ACC title and three NCAA Tournament appearances.

Dr. G. Wayne Clough President

The chief engineer of Georgia Tech's determined effort to provide technological leadership in a changing world is Dr. G. Wayne Clough, the Institute's tenth president and the first alumnus to serve in that capacity.

His leadership has made undergraduate education more dynamic. He implemented a required computer initiative for all students, and oversaw the revision of the curriculum to include web-based enhancements. The next step was a broad initiative to engage students more fully with faculty in the classroom and research lab, and to create more student leadership opportunities. The positive impact is reflected in higher quality students and higher retention rates.

Sponsored research has also increased every year since Clough became president. Research expenditures are now exceed \$370 million as Tech moves into exciting interdisciplinary fields like bioengineering, sustainable technology, and nanoscience.

Clough's skills as a civil engineer are evident in reshaping the campus to meet the needs of Tech's world-class programs and students. He has overseen the construction of more than a dozen academic and research buildings, with several more on the drawing board. The campus is fully wired with 1,700 miles of fiber-optic cable and offers a comprehensive wireless environment as well.

To provide the additional resources required to reach this goal, Clough engineered the Campaign for Georgia Tech, which raised a record \$712 million in five years for 54 endowed faculty chairs, 233 endowed scholarships, eleven new buildings, and a host of academic, research and athletic programs.

Beyond campus, he gives Georgia Tech a face and voice in Washington, D.C., as a member of the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology and the executive committee of the U.S. Council on Competitiveness, and as chair of the National Academy of Engineering committee on the Engineer of 2020.

Since September, 2001, he has represented the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) on the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division I Board of Directors.

A native of Douglas, Georgia, Clough received his bachelor's and master's degrees in civil engineering from Georgia Tech in 1964 and 1965. He earned a Ph.D. in civil engineering from the University of California, Berkeley in 1969.

He was provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University of Washington in Seattle when he answered the call to return to his alma mater as president in September of 1994. Prior to that, he had spent a decade at Virginia Tech as head of the Department of Civil Engineering, then as Dean of the College of Engineering. He also served on the faculties of Duke and Stanford universities.

A specialist in geotechnical and earthquake engineering, he is the author of more than 120 papers and reports, six book chapters, and several widely used geotechnical computer codes. He is presently a consultant to the San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit System for ongoing major seismic retrofitting. His other interests include technology and higher education policy, economic development, diversity in higher education, and technology in a global setting.

Closer to home, he serves on the Board of Advisors for Noro-Moseley Partners, the Southeast's largest venture capital fund, and on the Board of Directors of Total System Services of Columbus, Ga. He is a member of the executive committees for the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce and Central Atlanta Progress, and a trustee of the Georgia Research Alliance. Georgia Trend magazine has included Clough on its list of the 100 most influential Georgians for the last seven years.

Among his many national awards for teaching and research, Clough holds eight from the American Society of Civil Engineers and is one of a select few to have been twice awarded the Norman Medal, civil engineering's oldest honor. In 2001 he received the National Engineering Award from the American Association of Engineering Societies. He has been a member of the National Academy of Engineering for more than a decade.

Wayne and Anne Robinson Clough have been married for more than 30 years and have two grown children.



Administration Dave Braine Director of Athletics

As he enters his eighth year at Georgia Tech, Director of Athletics Dave Braine has overseen tremendous growth in the Yellow Jackets' overall athletics program while positioning Georgia Tech for the future with ambitious building projects.

Georgia Tech's overall athletics program has enjoyed unprecedented success during Braine's tenure, and the 2003-04 school year proved to be the most successful campaign in Tech history. Yellow Jacket teams combined for a school-record 31st place finish in the annual NACDA Director's Cup standings, which ranks the overall success of athletics programs based on NCAA finishes in each sport. Tech's No. 31 finish shatters its previous high of 45th place in 1994.

Highlighting the 2003-04 year was the remarkable performance by the Rambling Wreck basketball team, which advanced to the NCAA Championship game. Tech's women's volleyball and track and field programs also enjoyed watershed years, with the volleyball team reaching the NCAA Elite Eight, and the track team winning two national titles and placing 15th at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

Fifteen of Tech's 17 sports programs reached postseason play in 2003-04. In fact, Georgia Tech was the only school in the nation to win a football bowl game as well as NCAA Regionals in men's basketball and baseball, and one of only three programs to win a bowl game and at least one game in the NCAA basketball and baseball tournaments. Tech boasts 25 Academic All-America honorees in the last seven years, including three in 2003-04, while the football team placed a school-record eight student-athletes on the 2003 ACC All-Academic team.

The addition of women's swimming and diving in 2001-02 is further evidence of Georgia Tech's commitment to women's athletics under Braine. In U.S. News & World Report's inaugural ranking of collegiate athletics programs in 2002, Tech was rated number two in the nation in gender equity.

Braine currently serves on the NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee, and he previously served a two-year appointment as chairman of the NCAA Special Events Committee in 1995-96.

Winning records and all-star honors, however, are just part of the Braine athletics program. Just as he did earlier as director of athletics at Marshall and Virginia Tech, he emphasizes much more, especially the Total Person Concept, a comprehensive support program that stresses academics and life skills. Through the Total Person Program, Tech student-athletes benefit from a number of enrichment programs ranging from life skills and career planning to wellness and community outreach. Braine is also proud that Georgia Tech was named the recipient of the first-ever Atlantic Coast Conference Sportsmanship School of the Year Award in 2004.

Hired by President Dr. G. Wayne Clough, Braine was named Georgia Tech's director of athletics on June 3, 1997, succeeding Dr. Homer Rice, who retired after serving as AD from 1980 until 1997.

Now in his 21st year as an athletics director, Braine was AD at Marshall from 1985 through 1987. He moved to Virginia Tech and made a name for himself in a 10-year tenure in which he helped change the face of Hokie athletics. It was under Braine's leadership that Virginia Tech gained membership in the Big East Football Conference, which proved to be a stepping stone to full membership in the league. Braine originally came to Georgia Tech in 1974 as defensive secondary coach on the football staff of Pepper Rodgers and served in that capacity for two years.

A native of Grove City, Pa., Braine earned his bachelor's degree (1965) as well as a master's of arts and teaching (1966) at the University of North Carolina, where he was a three-time football letterman.

After teaching and coaching at Manatee High School in Bradenton, Fla., he joined the Virginia Military Institute football staff as a freshman coach in the spring of 1967. Later he coached at Richmond from 1971-73 before his stint at Tech. Braine moved to Virginia as administrative assistant and secondary coach in 1976. In 1978, he became assistant athletic director at Virginia. He took a similar position at Fresno State in 1983 and was promoted to associate athletic director in 1984. From there moved on to become the athletics director at Marshall in 1985.

Braine, 61, received a high honor in 1993 when he was inducted into the Mercer County Hall of Fame in the area where his hometown is located.

The Tech AD has four children and seven grandchildren.

The Atlantic Coast Conference

The Tradition

Now in its 52nd year of competition, the Atlantic Coast Conference has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 91 national championships, including 47 in women's competition and 44 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 116 times in men's competition and 57 times in women's action.

2003-04 in Review

The 2003-04 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and six individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 48 national team titles over the last 14 years.

The ACC's 2003-04 national champions were Wake Forest in field hockey, North Carolina in women's soccer and Virginia in women's lacrosse. Overall, 66 ACC teams took part in postseason play compiling a 101-66-4 (.596) record.

A total of 169 student-athletes from the ACC earned first, second or third-team All-America honors this past year. In addition, the ACC produced nine national Players of the Year, two national Rookies of the Year and three national Coaches of the Year recipients.

The ACC placed at least one team in the top 10 nationally in 17 sports. In all, 31 ACC teams finished their season with a top 10 ranking.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2004-05



Georgia Tech was named the recipient of the first-ever Atlantic Coast Conference Sportsmanship School of the Year Award.

The Yellow Jackets won sportsmanship awards in 2004 in women's indoor track and field, women's tennis and men's and women's outdoor track and field.

The concept of the sportsmanship awards was created by the ACC Student-Athlete Advisory Committee to recognize teams who earned the utmost regard from their peers during competition.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981. Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and

the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting with the 2005-06 academic year.

George C. Griffin Track



The George C. Griffin Track and Field Facility, already considered one of the top sites in the Southeast for outdoor collegiate track competition, was improved as part of Georgia Tech's preparation for the Centennial Olympic Games.

Griffin Track was renovated with a state-of-the-art Mondo surface, similar to those used at Olympic Stadium and at the sites of the World Championship, U.S. Track and Field Indoor Championships and NCAA Indoor Championships.

"Our track was the workout track for the Olympic Village," said Georgia Tech head coach Grover Hinsdale. "Of course, this was a great honor, but I was also excited that the Olympics offered us the opportunity to renovate our facilities."

Fifteen Griffin Track records (eight women's and seven men's marks) were set at the 1996 Georgia Tech-Reebok Invitational, the first event held on the new surface.

The Georgia Tech track team's locker rooms were also renovated as part of the \$10 million re-creation of the Alexander Memorial Coliseum at McDonald's Center, which served as the boxing venue during the Games.

In addition to Griffin Track's state of the art surface and locker rooms, the facility is enhanced by a scenic location, which combines natural beauty with Atlanta's modern skyline. The eight-lane, ultramodern Griffin Track is located between Tech's Rose Bowl practice football fields and the Bill Moore Tennis Center on Fowler Street.

Griffin Track was originally built in the summer of 1985 and remains one of the

few tracks in the United States that meet international standards.

The facility is named after national Hall of Fame coach George C. Griffin, who guided both the Yellow Jacket track and cross country programs from 1921-25 and 1934-43 and remained the cross country coach until 1974.

The Tech track and field program experienced unprecedented success during the Griffin era, winning six Southeastern Athletic Association Championships and one Southeastern Conference Championship.

Griffin also guided the cross country team to new heights, winning 10 SEC titles, including six in a row from 1935-40.

Two of Griffin's athletes competed in the Olympic Games. Homer Welch competed in the javelin in 1924, and Ed Hamm won a gold medal and set a world record in the long jump in 1928.

The state of Georgia honored Dean George Griffin on May 16, 1964, with the following proclamation...

"His service to amateur athletics as a track and cross country coach at Georgia Tech, and as a guiding force behind the Georgia AAU track meets, has established him as one of the State's most important figures in the promotion of physical fitness among our youth.

"Because of his great and sincere love of people, his unflinching sense of humor, and his ability to deal with others, he has become the best-known and most-loved personality in the 76-year history of the Georgia Institute of Technology."



Morris Bryan Stadium



Morris Bryan Stadium, which completes the George C. Griffin Track and Field Facility, provides the Ramblin' Wreck with the one of the finest total track and field complexes in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The facilities at Morris Bryan Stadium include a 1,500-seat grandstand along with judges stands, a press box, concession stands, storage areas and restrooms.

The grandstands bring fans close to the action and give them an excellent view of the track as well as the Atlanta skyline.

"I think the area the track is situated in is absolutely magnificent," said men's head coach Grover Hinsdale. "You can see the Atlanta skyline and the Tech Tower, and you're in a perfectly green oasis."

The stadium's namesake, the late Morris Bryan, is the former president of the Jefferson Mills.

A 1941 graduate of Georgia Tech, Bryan competed for three years as a hurdler on leg-

endary coach George Griffin's track teams.

Bryan was widely known as the "Father of the Georgia Olympics," an all-classification state high school track and field championship meet that has been held in Jefferson, Ga., since 1972.

"The family and company wanted to make this a first-class facility," said Tom Bryan. "We are highly honored to name the stadium in memory of my brother."

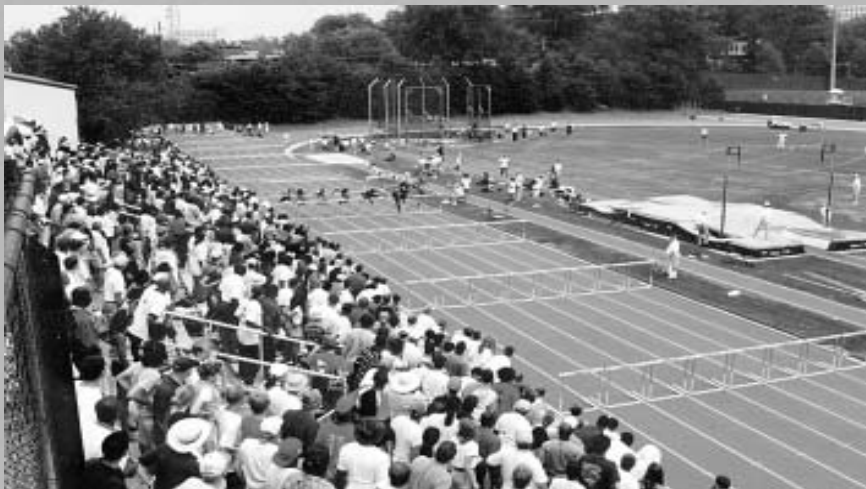
The stadium was officially dedicated when Tech hosted the ACC Outdoor Track and Field Championships for the first time in school history in April 1987.

A contribution from the Bryan family and the Jefferson Mills in large part funded the building of the stadium.

Former Director of Track Buddy Fowlkes also solicited donations from Tech track and field alumni. Donors have had their names etched on a plaque and were honored at the dedication ceremony.

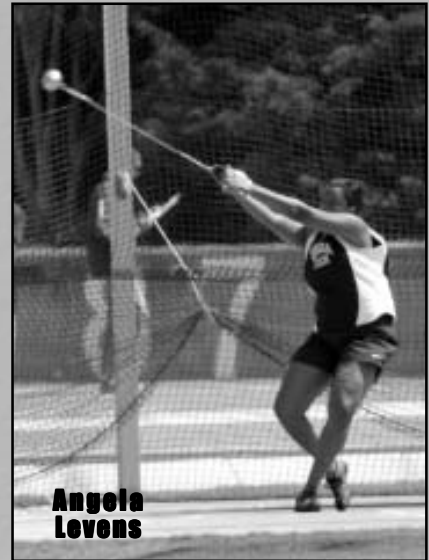

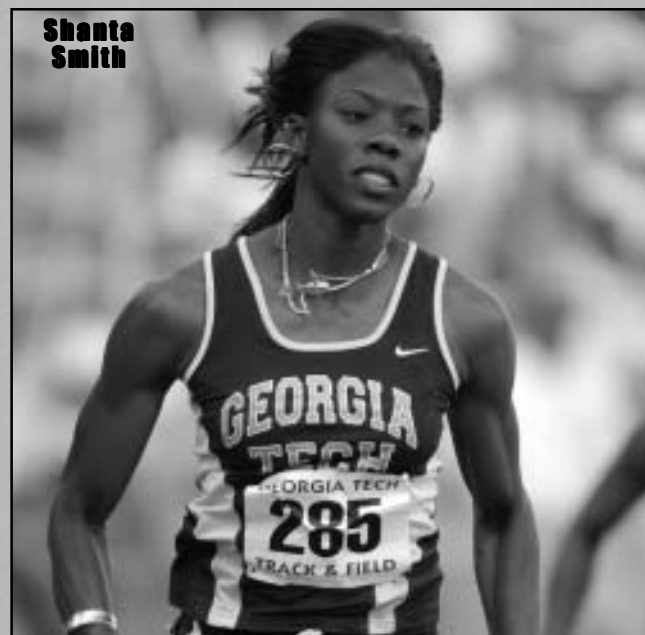

Georgia Tech fielded its first track and field team in 1986 under the direction of Dee Todd. Tech started the program with nearly 20 athletes on its squad, led by Kathy Harrison of Atlanta, Ga. In the Yellow Jackets first year of competition, Tech tallied 28 points and finished in sixth place in the league standings. Even more amazing was the fact that Tech's Harrison scored all 28 points as she finished either second or third in four different events.

Tech hosted the Outdoor Atlantic Coast Conference Championships on April 15-18, 1987 at the new George C. Griffin Track. The Jackets welcomed Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, NC State, Virginia and Wake Forest in its first opportunity to host an event since joining the league in 1979.

In 1987, Virginia became the first ACC school to clinch both indoor and outdoor conference titles. UVa won the inaugural indoor ACC meet with 132 points. Tech finished fifth that season, totaling 35 points. Harrison was tabbed ACC Meet Most Valuable Performer after winning the long jump.

In 2002, the Rambling Wreck reached a milestone as the Jackets captured the first ACC track and field - men's or women's - championship under the direction of head coach Alan Drosky. The Jackets outscored nine-time defending champion North Carolina, 122-113, in UNC's new Eddie Smith Field House.

In the modern era, Tech has become a force to be reckoned on both the the conference and national levels. The Yellow Jackets have finished in the top-three at the conference meet in six of the last seven years and tallied a pair of runner-up finishes at the indoor and outdoor ACC meets in 2004.

Junior Chaunte Howard posted first-place finishes at the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championships to become the first Tech athlete to win back-to-back national titles. Tech had a record seven All-America accolades earned at the outdoor NCAA meet and finished a program-best 15th. Tech finished inside the Top 25 at both the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championships in 2004.

Dee Todd (1985-88)

Todd joined the Georgia Tech staff in August, 1985, to become the first women's head coach for track and cross country teams. In her initial season, Todd guided Tech to a sixth-place finish at the Outdoor ACC Championships, coaching two-time All-ACC performers Kathy Harrison (track) and Bridget Koster (cross country). Todd was later recognized by the league by being named ACC Coach of the Year in 1987.

After coaching for three seasons at Tech, Todd left the Yellow Jackets to take over as assistant commissioner at the Atlantic Coast Conference.

During her tenure, Tech posted three top-five finishes at the Indoor ACC Championships and two straight top-four finishes at the Outdoor ACC Championships. Harrison won four ACC titles, two All-America honors and was the first Jacket to qualify for the NCAA Championships.

Buddy Fowlkes (1989-92)

The Director of Georgia Tech Track and Field, Buddy Fowlkes oversaw the women's track and field team for four seasons. During that time, Fowlkes guided the Jackets to four consecutive top-five finishes at the indoor and outdoor ACC Championships.

Under Fowlkes' watch, Natasha Alleyne became the first national champion in program history. Alleyne won the 1992 indoor high jump at the NCAA Championships with a then-school record mark of 6'2.50".

That same season, the Yellow Jackets tallied their highest indoor finish ever at a NCAA Championship meet, posting a seventh-place finish in Indianapolis, Ind. Tech finished in a tie for 29th place at the Outdoor NCAA Championships in Austin, Texas.



Wendy Truvillion (1993-95)

Truvillion took over the reigns as head coach of the Tech program in 1993. During her stint, she tutored five All-Americans, 13 ACC champions and 14 All-ACC honorees.

Nelrae Pasha and Janeen Jones earned a total of five All-America honors and six ACC titles between them under Truvillion's direction.

Alan Drosky (1995-present)

A two-time ACC Coach of the Year, Alan Drosky has brought the women's track program into the spotlight in his nine seasons as head coach. The former Tech All-American and Hall of Fame inductee, took over the program in 1995.

On the national scene, Drosky guided the Jackets to Top 25 finishes at the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championships a season ago. The Jackets had a record-setting eight All-American performances and finished a program-best 15th at the outdoor NCAA meet.

At the conference level, Drosky has led the Jackets to six top-three finishes in the last seven years, including the program's first - men or women - ACC title in 2002. In 2004, Tech finished runner-up at both the indoor and outdoor ACC meets.

During his tenure, Tech athletes have earned two national titles, 43 All-American honors, 60 ACC titles and 114 All-ACC honors.

Along with serving as women's head coach, Drosky also mentors the men's track distance runners and is the head coach for men's and women's cross country. In cross country, Drosky has led the women to two NCAA Championship appearances (2000, '01) and a 26th-place finish in '01. That same season he led Tech to a NCAA South Regional crown and was named South Region Coach of the Year.

Highlighting the men's distance runners under Drosky is David Kruppenacker. One of the United States' top distance runners today, Kruppenacker won two national titles at Tech.

Recent graduate Brendon Mahoney ranks among Drosky's finest proteges, becoming a three-time All-American, a seven-time ACC champion and an ACC Most Valuable Performer in 2004.

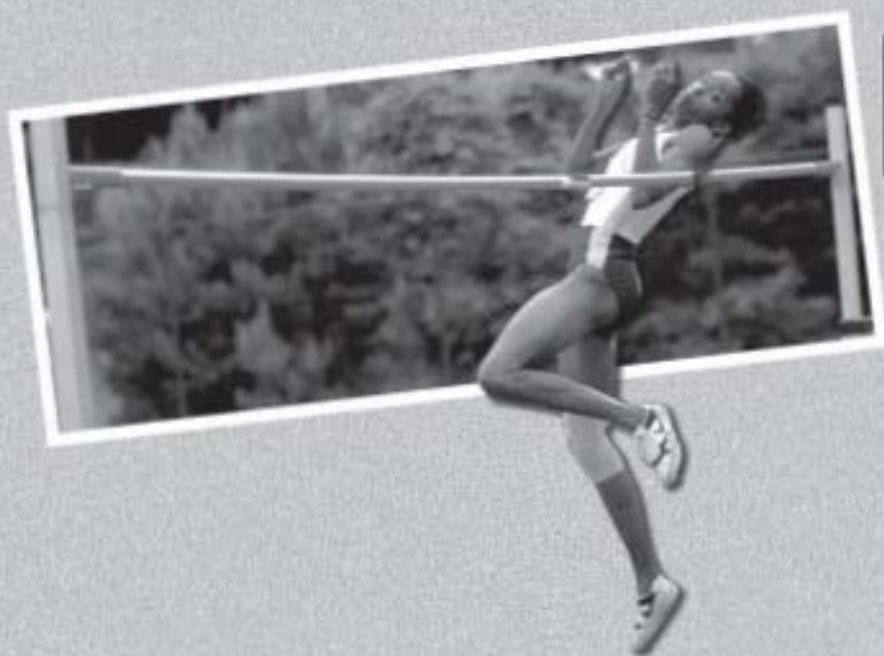

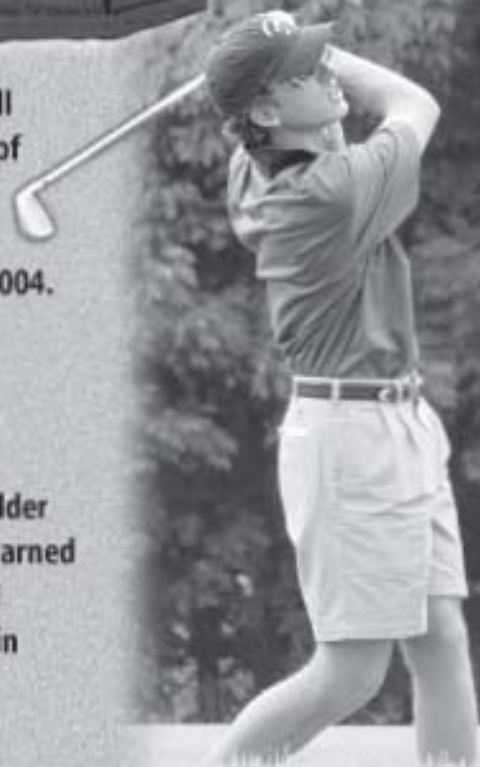

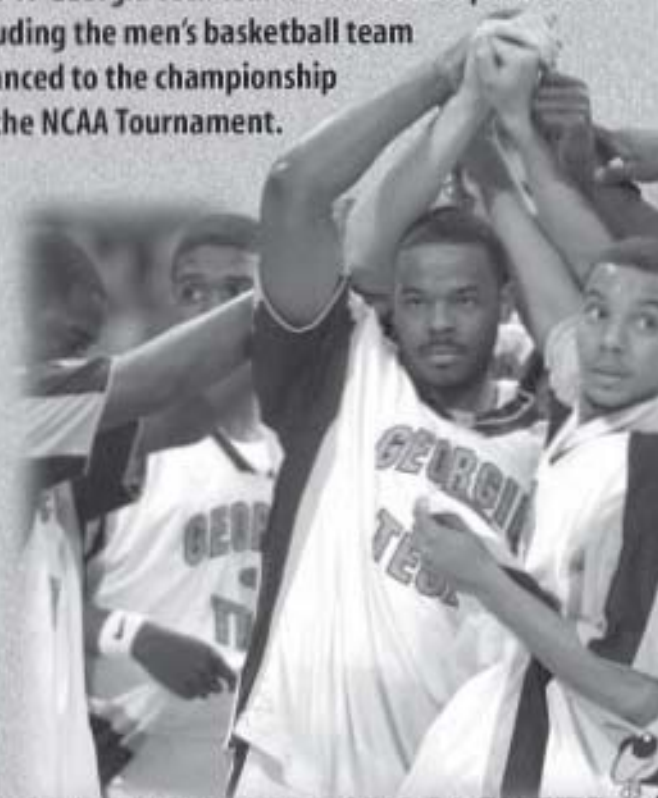

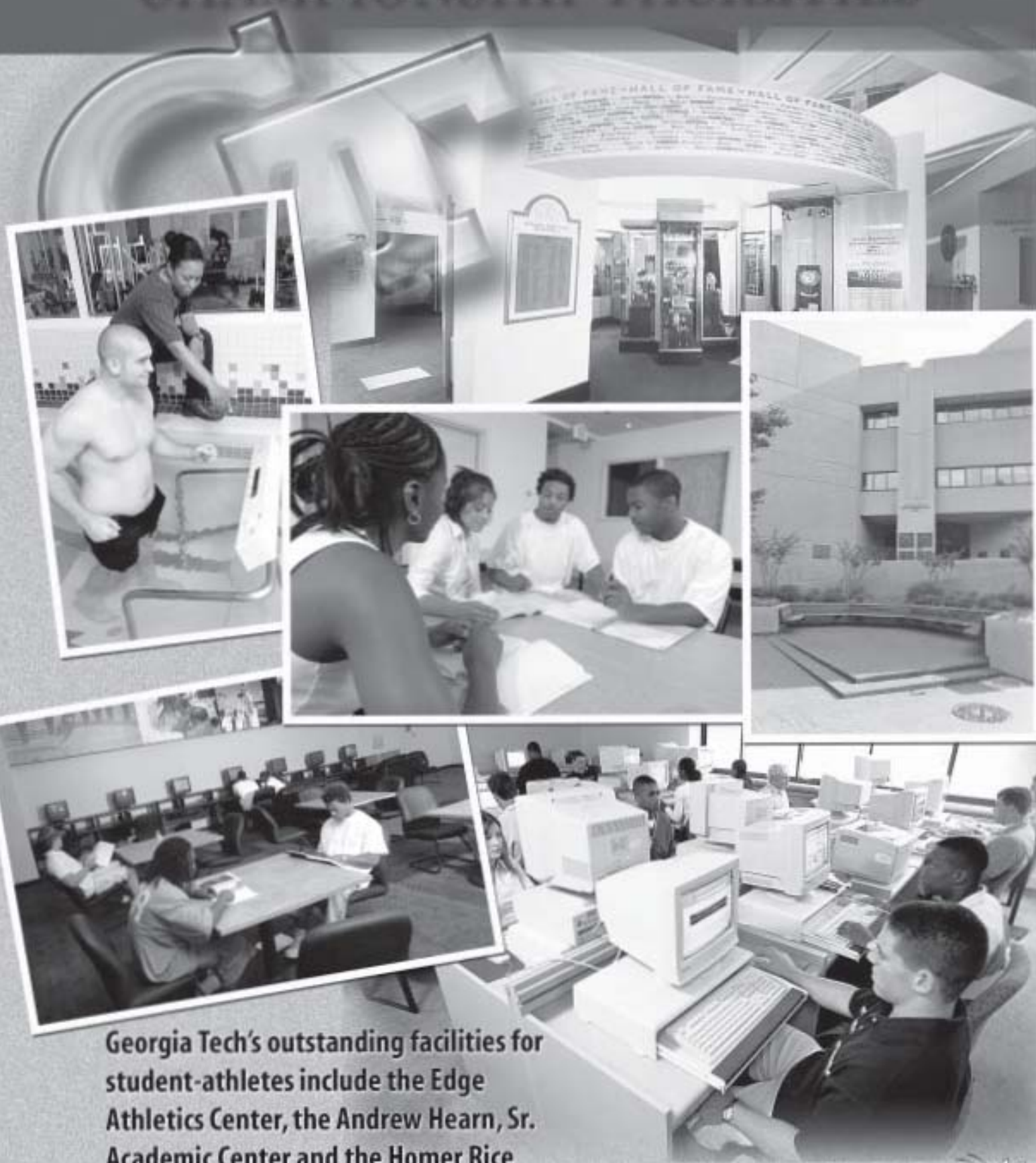

It was Sept. 30, 1961. The opponent was Rice University for the home opener. For the first time, the official Rambling Wreck car was unveiled to 43,501 fans at Grant Field, leading the Georgia Tech football team onto the field. It has happened at every home game since. The event did not establish a new tradition, but it cemented one. The restored 1930 Model A Ford Sport Coupe was Tech's first official Rambling Wreck, and it was an instant success.

Buzz

The Yellow Jacket nickname and mascot are two of the most beloved trademarks of Georgia Tech athletic teams. The origin is unknown, but one thing is clear, the nickname did not grow out of the familiar six-legged insect, but that the mascot, known as "Buzz", grew out of the nickname.

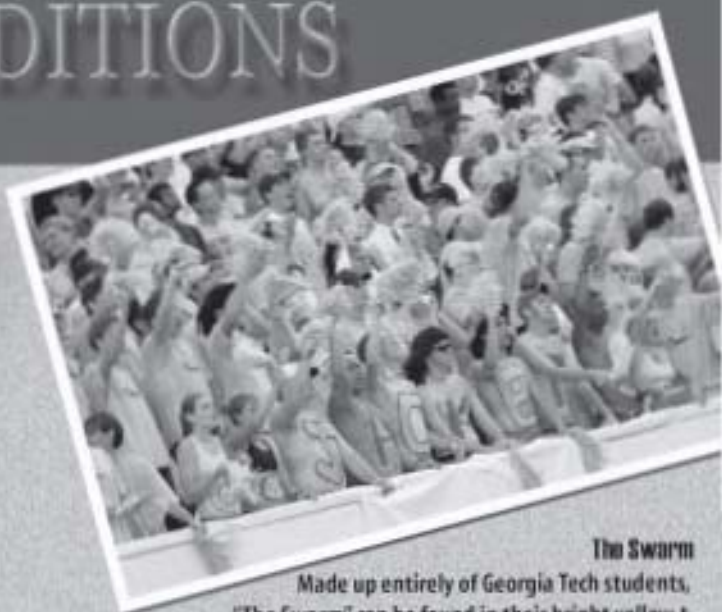

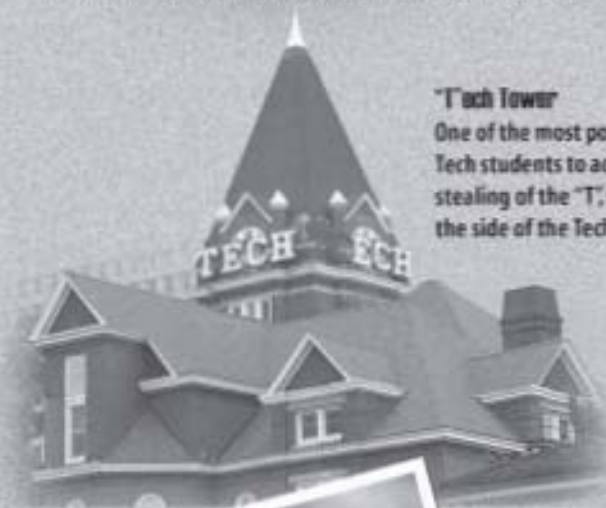
Homecoming Displays

George P. Burdell

In 1927, a mythical student named George P. Burdell appeared on class rosters, registration forms and grade reports. He has since become one of Tech's most notable students.

Burdell was the creation of Ed Smith, who actually turned in separate exams for him, convincing professors that Burdell was a student in good standing. Burdell received a bachelor's and later a master's degree from Tech. Since Smith's graduation, students have kept George P. 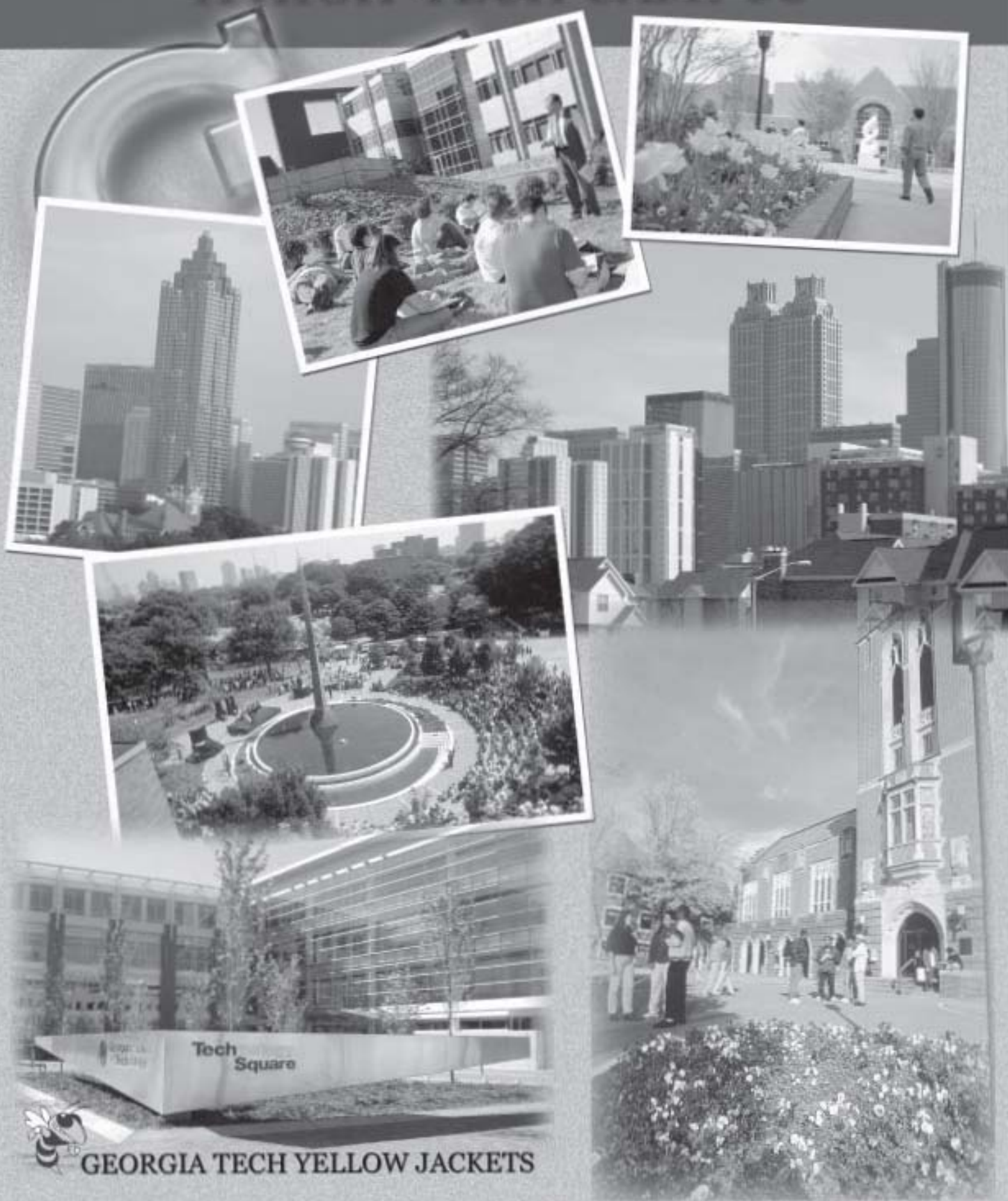
Mini 500

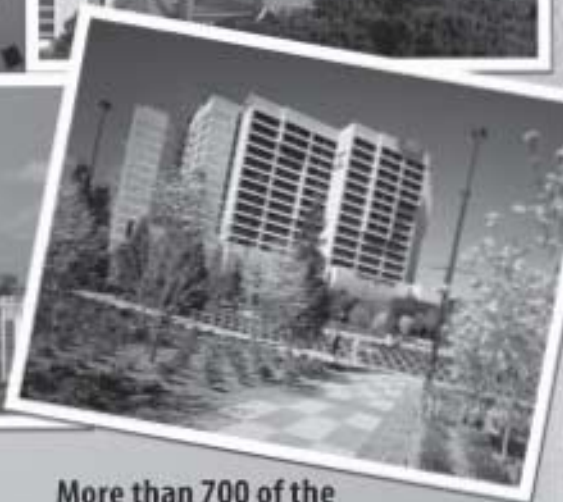
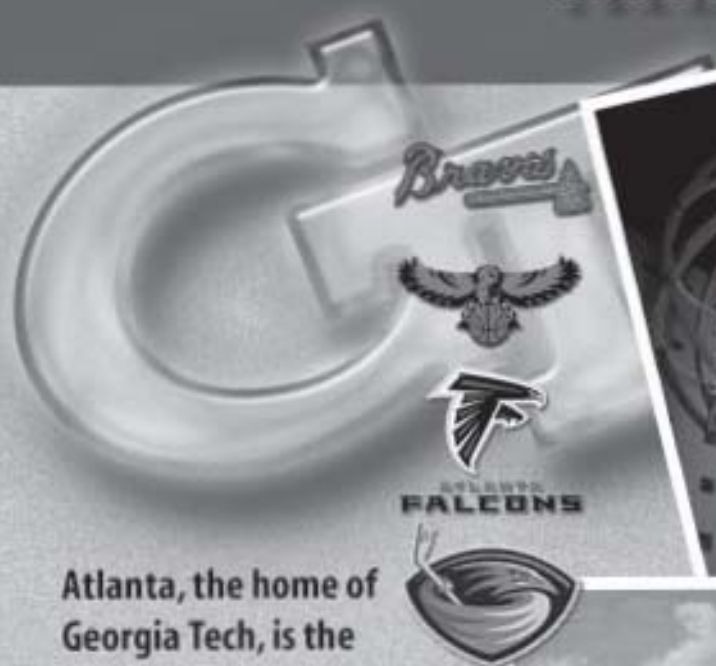
