Sexual Violence Resources, Support Continue to Grow

As sexual assault on college campuses continues to be in the national spotlight, Georgia Tech is working to enhance survivor support programs, campus resources, and prevention initiatives to make Tech a safer place for all students.

VOICE, an initiative of the Women's Resource Center and Office of Health Promotion, spearheads Tech's advocacy, support, and prevention services. VOICE's newly revamped website provides information about the definition of various types of sexual violence, contact information for those who have experienced sexual violence or know someone who has, and tips for how to be an engaged member of the campus community on this subject, including ways to prevent sexual violence and policy and legal resources.

The Sexual Violence Task Force convened by President G.P. "Bud" Peterson in April finalized a set of recommendations for the campus in August. Recommendations included mandatory education on sexual violence

for all new students, faculty, and staff; the establishment of an office that will focus on sexual violence issues; and implementing a Sexual Violence Survey. Several campus units, including the offices of Strategic Consulting, Campus Services, Student Affairs, and Legal Affairs and Risk Management, are currently reviewing Task Force recommendations and making plans for implementation. Georgia Tech's new Title IX coordinator will start on campus Nov. 24 and begin working with the campus community to ensure Tech is in compliance with new federal recommendations and regulations.

GETTING INVOLVED

All faculty, staff, and students can join the Sexual Violence Prevention Alliance (SVPA), a volunteer group that aims to increase awareness of sexual violence and increase the number of students who seek assistance and utilize campus and community resources. The group represents departments across campus and meets monthly.

"The SVPA is a great way for faculty and staff interested in sexual violence prevention to get involved and learn more about programs and policies on campus," said Melanie DeMaeyer, coordinator and

Faculty Senate Approves New Law Master's

As early as next fall, Tech students could enroll in a new joint program with Emory University that lets them earn both a bachelor's and juris master's degree in as little as five years.

The new program allows students to pursue any bachelor's degree at Tech, followed by one year of coursework at Emory School of Law. Once students complete coursework at both institutions, they will receive both degrees. The program was approved at the meeting of the Faculty Senate on Nov. 18.

"This is ideal for students who decide early on that they want a career path which will require expertise in law," said

Site Preparation Begins on Joint Library Service Center

Construction to be complete in 2015

Georgia Tech and Emory University will break ground soon on a new joint Library Service Center (LSC). The LSC will house a shared collection of materials, provide delivery services, and free up space on the main campuses at both universities.

The majority of collections in the Georgia Tech Library will move to the LSC, providing space for the Library Renewal Project, a multi-year plan to reimagine Tech's library spaces and services for the 21st century.

Site preparation for the LSC, located at Emory's Briarcliff Road property, is underway, with building construction starting this fall and completion expected in fall 2015.

The ultimate goal of the LSC partnership is to create a seamless collection with all Tech and Emory resources available

to students, faculty, and staff in both institutions, according to Catherine Murray-Rust, vice provost for Learning Excellence and dean of Libraries at Georgia Tech.

The intent is to collaboratively manage a single collection while providing the best possible service and access to materials with a focus on user needs.

"By relocating the collection to the LSC, we're able to maximize the utilization of campus space and transform the Georgia Tech Library into an inspiring place

for people to create their best scholarly work," Murray-Rust said.

The Library Service Center will feature:

- A secure, climate-controlled facility with state-of-the-art equipment and technology to house library collections, provide access to them, and ensure long-term preservation.
- A first module to house approximately 4 million volume equivalents at a site that can accommodate additional modules as needed.

- A reading room, allowing users to consult materials on site, so that they can make more precise selections of materials to be delivered to a campus library for use.
- Multiple deliveries per day of print materials to campus locations, and electronic delivery of scanned content such as journal articles and conference papers.

Tech has already seen demand for legal education among undergraduates on campus. Current offerings include a pre-law certificate and a minor in law, science, and technology offered by the School of Public Policy; a law and ethics program in the Scheller College of Business; and, for the first time this year, a pre-law section of the GT1000 first-year seminar course.

Students will be able to apply for the law master's program during their junior year and will be required to take either the Law School Admission Test or an internal exam from Emory for admission. Applicants also will be interviewed by Emory faculty and asked to sit in on an Emory law class session, at which point they may be offered a provisional acceptance. Students will then continue into their senior year to complete their undergraduate degree requirements at Tech, along with five to seven credit hours of law classes at Emory. Performance in these classes will be evaluated prior to an official acceptance from Emory, where students will spend two semesters to complete the master's degree.

Participants in the program will receive a discounted tuition rate from Emory, which will charge the equivalent of Tech's out-of-state rate rather than its own rates, equating

to a scholarship of around \$10,500 per year. In addition, six credits of law courses will be counted as free electives toward the bachelor's degree.

Students will be able to specialize in areas such as intellectual property, environmental law, real estate, architecture/construction, and mergers and acquisitions. The master's degree does not qualify students to practice law, nor is it a pathway to a juris doctor degree, but is meant to supplement their professional pursuits with legal studies.

"We expect this to give students a leg up on certain career paths, particularly those where legal expertise will enhance their skills," said Girardot. "It will give them a technical understanding and the ability to develop professional knowledge of legal principles and issues."

The program is designed to support Tech's strategic plan as well as build on its existing partnership with Emory, which includes the joint Wallace H. Coulter Department of Biomedical Engineering and the cross-registration program that lets students enroll in Emory classes while at Tech.

"We're both elite universities, right next door to each other — it's a great opportunity to strengthen our collaboration to the benefit of our students," Girardot said.

While the program has been approved by Georgia Tech and Emory Law faculties, the final step in the approval process will

be review by the Board of Regents and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges.

OTHER SENATE NOTES

The Student Regulations Committee (SRC) approved changing the deadline for withdrawal from a course from the 50 percent point of completion in the semester to the 60 percent point. This allows students two additional weeks to determine whether or not to withdraw from a course and aligns the single-course withdrawal deadline with the deadline to withdraw from all courses for the semester, which was already set at 60 percent.

Changes were also approved to wording in the policy regarding student email accounts. The policy now states that students must have a Georgia Tech email address and check it once a day, but not that they must have a Georgia Tech email account.

The last SRC item approved was a change in academic renewal for readmitted students, who now can receive renewal after three years of absence from Tech, rather than five. The Board of Regents recently changed its policy to allow flexibility in this area, so Tech chose to respond in kind. Academic renewal signals the initiation of a new grade-point average and allows students who earlier experienced academic difficulty to make a fresh start on their academic record.

victim advocate for the Women's Resource Center. A student subcommittee led by the Student Government Association was added as a branch of the SVPA this year and serves as the "eyes and ears" on campus to provide feedback to campus leadership.

Students also can request VOICE training for their organizations, which gives an introduction to the subject of sexual violence, as well as information on bystander intervention, healthy relationships, consent, sexual violence response, and survivor support.

The VOICE Peer Education Program lets students take the next step of involvement by becoming trained on how to educate others on sexual violence issues and prevention. Peer educators engage in a semester-long training program and make a multisemester commitment to training their peers. The second cohort of peer educators will undergo training this year.

A new student group, People Against Unwanted Sexual Experiences (PAUSE), is seeking approval as a chartered student organization on campus. This group will also be focused on preventing sexual violence and raising awareness of the issue on campus and is a good way for students to learn more and get involved.

SUPPORTING SURVIVORS

Those with friends, colleagues, or students who have experienced sexual violence should encourage them to contact the Women's Resource Center, Dean of Students Office, Health Promotion, or Georgia Tech Police Department, all of which are equipped to provide assistance and support.

Faculty and staff members are required to report sexual assaults to Georgia Tech's Title IX coordinator and can do so through the Confidential Reporting Form (CRF) found online at voice.gatech.edu.

"I'd recommend letting the student know that you have an obligation to report the violence, so that they are aware that someone from the Institute will follow up with them to make sure they know their options and are connected to resources for personal and academic support," DeMaeyer said.

In 2013, many faculty and staff received the Georgia Tech Sexual Violence Response Guide, or "Gold Folder," in 2013, which also contained the CRF. The folder is designed to equip Tech employees with information on how to assist in the event that a student discloses an incidence of sexual violence, intimate partner violence, or stalking. The folder's contents are also available at voice.gatech.edu.

If a student reports sexual violence, the first thing they should be advised to do is seek a safe place.

"After that, they may want to consider seeking medical treatment or reporting the violence," said DeMaeyer. "Long term, seeking out supportive resources like counseling or academic support, if they are a student, could be beneficial."

Class of 1964 Sets Reunion Giving Record

Philanthropy focuses on Wreck, need-based scholarship

Generous alumni from the Class of 1964 have set the bar for future Reunion Giving at its highest point ever — \$32.7 million — leading the way toward the most successful year in more than three decades of Reunion Giving at Georgia Tech.

"I couldn't be more proud of my fellow alumni from the Class of 1964," said William W. "Bill" George, a 1964 industrial management alumnus who chaired this year's 50th Reunion Committee. "Our classmates decided very early on that we wanted to make this the best year in Tech history for reunion gifts. Thanks to their determination, generosity, and love for Tech, we accomplished our goal."

In honor of their 50th reunion, the Class of 1964 supported a vital aspect of Georgia Tech's rich history and cherished traditions: the Ramblin' Wreck. This icon, a 1930 Ford Model A sports coupe, has led the football team onto Grant Field for every home game since Sept. 30, 1961.

Aside from football games, the Wreck makes numerous appearances throughout the year, at special Georgia Tech functions, alumni weddings, and many other events. The physical, financial, and mechanical care and maintenance of the Ramblin' Wreck are the responsibility of the Ramblin' Reck Club, and this endowment will provide the resources the organization needs to preserve and promote this beloved tradition on behalf of the entire Georgia Tech community.

The Class of 1964 also has funded a need-based scholarship that will bear the class name. More than one-third of Tech undergraduates have demonstrated financial need, and private philanthropy is critical in picking up where state and federal programs leave off.

This year's two other milestone reunion classes, the Class of 1974 and the Class of 1989, created Innovation and Entrepreneurship Endowment Funds as their class projects. These endowments are designed to support efforts that enable undergraduates to more fully develop their powers of creativity and enterprise — such as the annual InVenture Prize competition. The Class of 1989 also created a G. Wayne Clough Georgia Tech Promise scholarship in the class name.

In addition to funding class projects, gifts and commitments from alumni celebrating
