Tech Maintains Top Rank in Research and Development

Once again, the National Science Foundation ranks Georgia Tech among the nation's top universities in the volume of research it conducts.

For fiscal 1994—the latest year for which comparison statistics are available—Tech ranked fourth among all U.S. colleges and universities in the dollar volume of research conducted in two key categories: engineering and computer science. While the federal government provides the largest portion of its research support, Georgia Tech ranked sixth among all U.S. colleges and universities in the amount of industry-sponsored research received.

Within specific engineering disciplines, Georgia Tech ranked second nationally in the amount of electrical engineering research, fourth in aerospace engineering, sixth in mechanical engineering, ninth in metallurgical and materials engineering, and 14th in civil engineering. Among the physical sciences, Georgia Tech ranked 14th in the amount of physics research.

Overall, Georgia Tech ranked 29th nationally in total research and development expenditures with \$193 million in 1994, up slightly more than 10 percent from the \$175 million reported in fiscal 1993. The growth moved Georgia Tech up two notches, from 31st place in 1993.

"In an era of uncertainty for research and development funding, Georgia Tech continues to gain market share," said Dr. Jean-Lou Chameau, Georgia Tech's vice-provost for Research and dean of Graduate Studies. "This says a lot about the quality of our work, faculty, researchers and students. We are very pleased with our continued historic strengths in engineering but also with the rapid improvements we are making in the sciences."

Pointing to Georgia Tech's expanding relationships with industry, he added, "We are indebted to our industry partners who are critical to our success, and plan to increase our interaction and research activities with industry."

Because they are collected in a consistent manner, the National Science Foundation statistics are considered the most reliable indicator of research volume at U.S. colleges and universities.

Georgia Tech Celebrates Spring, Technology and the Arts

Age-old wisdom tells us the whole is greater than the sum of its parts. There is no better example than the Georgia Tech Spring Arts Festival. Organized by the Tech College of Architecture, the Festival is the umbrella over a number of events from the April 25 DanceTechnology Project through the world premier of the multimedia opera *Starchild* in June.

"Each year, the number of events and the intensity level of the Arts at Georgia Tech grows," said Music Department Chair Bucky Johnson. "With the Festival, we've taken another step forward, in a very logical way, and are able to leverage a number of individual events into a larger celebration of the arts and technology."

The Festival is made up of the DanceTechnology Project, International Cultural Performances, the annual Masterworks Concert (this year, music from five continents representing the Olympic rings), DramaTech's *Miser*, Concerts on the New Tech Olympic Plaza, the Savoyards Light Opera Company's *Orpheus in the Underworld*, the School of Literature, Communication, and Culture's Video Art Festival, and the multimedia Opera *Starchild*.

Festival goers can view the premieres of contemporary video artists from Tech and beyond at "Videopticon," the April 29 video segment of the Festival.

"Videopticon" will feature classic and contemporary video art by Vito Acconci, John Baldassari, Bill Viola, Gary Hill and Chris Burden, and many of Tech's own family.

"Videopticon" offers a look at video's progression by screening both new works and recognized classics, explained curator Mathew Causey, professor, School of Literature, Communication and Culture (LCC). "It is our hope that 'Videopticon' will become an annual event growing to include video sculpture, installations and theoretical debate," Causey said.

"One of the most rewarding things you see in this type of Festival, said Johnson, "is the student interaction. Not only do the performers get to work with world class composers, directors, and other artists, there are hundreds of things going on behind the scenes. To work with Syd Meade (designer for the films *Blade Runner*, *Star Trek the Motion Picture*, and *Aliens*), composer in residence James Oliverio, and other internationally known artists is an opportunity that they will never forget."

Statewide Tuition Increase Lightens Taxpayers' Load

The Board of Regents (BOR) approved a 6 percent tuition increase, effective July 1, 1996, for all undergraduates attending state colleges and institutions.

At Tech, this amounts to a \$40 difference over last year's resident undergraduate rate of \$665 per quarter. Out-of-state students will

reform, Georgians paid 25 percent of non-resident student costs. By 1998 out-of-state students will assume 100 percent of the total cost.

Chancellor Stephen R. Portch said the System's new rates allow Georgia to maintain its status as a low-tuition state, without sacrificing quality.

"In our strategic plan, we pledged to be responsible to the needs of Georgians first and foremost, and we are honoring that commitment," Chancellor Stephen R. Portch

pay 20 percent more after July 1, the 6 percent plus an additional amount to "close the gap" between what they pay and what the real costs of their education is. Prior to last year's tuition

"In our strategic plan, we pledged to be responsible to the needs of Georgians first and foremost, and we are honoring that commitment," said Portch. "I am pleased that we can continue to

provide an educational bargain for Georgia students attending System colleges and universities at the same time that we are investing increased resources in improving quality."

In a related action at its March Board meeting, the BOR voted in support of a tuition differential policy that will increase the cost of graduate tuition by 20 percent over undergraduate rates. The plan will be implemented over a four-year period, beginning this summer, at a rate of 5 percent annually.

"As I've said on many occasions, Georgia's System of public higher education is a real educational bargain," Portch said. "We just don't want to be a steal!"

Georgia is ranked 38th in the country based on out-of-state tuition charges.

CALL FOR RESEARCH PROPOSALS

Nominations are now being accepted for the **1996 William T. Pecora Award**. The award is presented annually to recognize outstanding contributions by individuals or groups toward the understanding of the Earth by means of remote sensing. The award is sponsored jointly by the Department of the Interior (DoI) and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

The award was established in 1974 to honor the memory of Dr. William T. Pecora, former director of the U.S. Geological Survey, and undersecretary, DoI. The award consists of a citation and plaque which are presented to the winner at an appropriate public forum by the secretary of the Interior and a NASA administrator. Any individual or group working in the field of remote sensing of the Earth is eligible to receive the William T. Pecora Award. Nominations are due May 1, 1996. 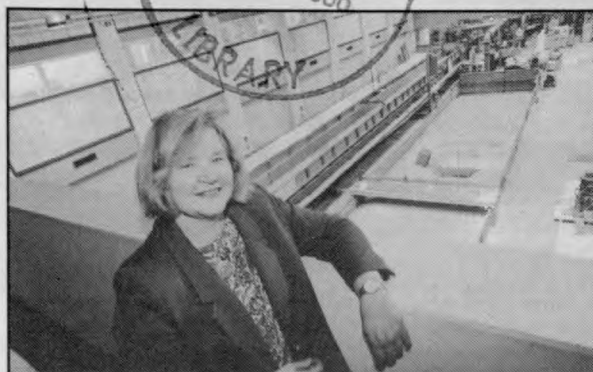

General Faculty Considers Amendments

The first reading of several proposed amendments to the *Statutes* will be an important agenda item at the spring quarter General Faculty meeting, scheduled for April 30, according to Marilyn Williamson, chair of the Statutes Committee. The proposed amendments cover three subjects: the change of title from executive vice president to provost and vice president for Academic Affairs; provisions for staggered terms for members of the General Faculty Assembly, the Academic Senate, and the Executive Board; and provision for a nonvoting member of the Executive Board to be appointed from among classified employees.

The first group of amendments, covering the changes of title, follows:

2.5. Article III, The Faculty. 2.5.1. The General Faculty

(Existing) The presiding officer of the General Faculty shall be the President. In the President's absence the Executive Vice President shall preside. In the absence of both the President and the Executive Vice President, the Chair of the Executive Board shall preside. All members of the General Faculty shall have the right to vote.

(Proposed) The presiding officer of the General Faculty shall be the President. In the President's absence the **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs shall preside.**

(Hereafter in these Statutes, the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs will be referred to as the Provost.) In the absence of both the President and the Provost, the Chair of the Executive Board shall preside. All members of the General Faculty shall have the right to vote.

2.5.1.1(b)(1)

(Existing) The President, the Executive Vice President, administrative and academic deans, the Registrar, the Director of Libraries, and those other persons in administrative positions who report directly to the President, and those persons in administrative positions who report to the Executive Vice President.

(Proposed) The President, the **Provost**, administrative and academic deans, the Registrar, the Director of Libraries, and those other persons in administrative positions who report directly to the President, and those persons in administrative positions who report to the **Provost**.

2.5.2. The General Faculty Assembly

(Existing) The presiding officer of the General Faculty Assembly shall be the President. In the President's absence the Executive Vice President shall preside. In the absence of both the President and the Executive Vice President, the Chair of the Executive Board shall preside....

(Proposed) The presiding officer of the General Faculty Assembly shall be the President. In the President's absence the Provost shall preside. In the absence of both the President and the **Provost**, the Chair of the Executive Board shall preside....

2.5.2.2. Ex officio Members. 2.5.2.2(a)

(Existing) The President and the Executive Vice President.

(Proposed) The President and the **Provost**.

2.5.3 The Academic Faculty

(Existing) The presiding officer of the Academic Faculty shall be the President. In the President's absence, the Executive Vice President shall preside. In the absence of both the President and Executive Vice President, the Chair of the Executive Board shall preside. All members of the Academic Faculty shall have the right to vote.

(Proposed) The presiding officer of the Academic Faculty shall be the President. In the

President's absence, the Provost shall preside. In the absence of both the President and the **Provost**, the Chair of the Executive Board shall preside. All members of the Academic Faculty shall have the right to vote.

2.5.4 The Academic Senate

(Existing) The presiding officer of the Academic Senate shall be the President. In the President's absence, the Executive Vice President shall preside. In the absence of both the President and the Executive Vice President, the Chair of the Executive Board shall preside....

(Proposed) The presiding officer of the Academic Senate shall be the President. In the President's absence, the **Provost** shall preside. In the absence of both the President and the **Provost**, the Chair of the Executive Board shall preside....

2.5.4.2. Ex officio Members. 2.5.4.2(a)

(Existing) The President and the Executive Vice President.

(Proposed) The President and the **Provost**.

2.5.5. The Executive Board of the Institute. 2.5.5.1(a)

(Existing) The representatives of the Administration shall be the Executive Vice President and a second Vice President designated annually by the President.

(Proposed) The representatives of the Administration shall be the Provost and a second Vice President or **Vice Provost** designated annually by the President.

2.5.7.2 Faculty Status and Grievance. 2.5.7.2(c)(2)

(Existing) The Committee shall... concerned, with copies to the Faculty member, the appropriate Dean, the Executive Vice President, and the President. ...

(Proposed) The Committee shall... concerned, with copies to the Faculty member, the appropriate Dean, the **Provost**, and the President. ...

2.5.8 Rights and Responsibilities. 2.5.8.11 Appointments. 2.5.8.1(a)(3)(a)

(Existing) Recommendations by the Department Chair, Dean of the College, Executive Vice President shall be essential elements.

(Proposed) Recommendations by the Department Chair, Dean of the College, **and the Provost** shall be essential elements.

2.5.8.1(a)(3)(c)

(Existing) The Executive Vice President shall consult with selected senior Faculty members before making recommendations to the President.

(Proposed) The **Provost** shall consult with selected senior Faculty members before making recommendations to the President.

2.5.9 Departments of Instruction. 2.5.9.2

(Existing) ...In appointment of a Chair the President shall receive the recommendation of the Executive Vice President and of the Dean of the College of which the Department is a subdivision...

(Proposed) ...In appointment of a Chair the President shall receive the recommendation of the **Provost** and of the Dean of the College of which the Department is a subdivision.

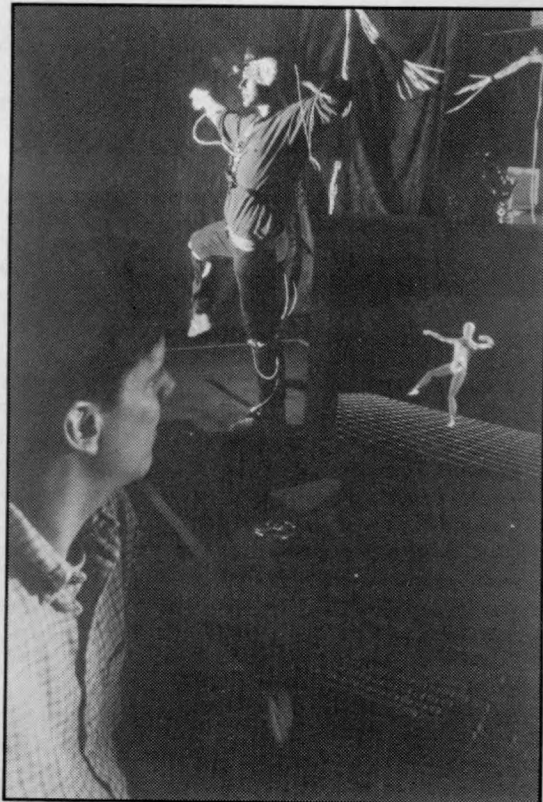
