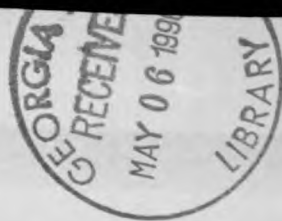

## Freaknik Weekend Provides Olympic

Traffic is bad enough in the metro Atlanta area but it's likely to be extremely heavy around the Georgia Tech campus during Freaknik Weekend in Atlanta.

Freaknik activities are expected to boost Atlanta's college student and automobile population significantly.

Students, faculty and staff have questions about Friday afternoon traffic and sports fans may wonder how to get to campus for the Georgia Tech Athletic Association's annual Springfest celebration on Saturday. Planning, patience and common sense will help considerably.

Institute officials are paying close attention to the plans being developed (at Whistle press time) by the Atlanta Police Department and are making provisions to deal with any major traffic disruptions on and around campus this weekend. Supervisors are encouraged to grant vacation time to employees who wish to take off Friday or leave early to avoid the expected high volume of traffic, according to Provost Mike Thomas. The campus will remain open, unless traffic patterns warrant further consideration and review.

Sports fans and Athletic Association boosters planning to attend Saturday's Springfest should plan to enter the Tech campus from Northside Drive at either 10th Street or the Georgia Tech Parkway, thereby avoiding expected heavy congestion on Peachtree Street and North Avenue. Springfest activities include a football scrimmage at 11:00 a.m. at the Rose Bowl Field, a bar-b-que and carnival for attendees also starting at 11:00 a.m., and the Yellow Jacket Baseball team takes the field at Russ Chandler Stadium for a game against North Carolina at 2:00 p.m.

Additional Georgia Tech police will be on duty throughout the weekend to expedite the flow of traffic in and around the campus. Certain streets may be closed off to prevent or ease traffic jams but only if the need arises. No streets will be closed in advance of the weekend, but barricades will be available at key intersections.

## Visiting Professor Endorsed by NSF

Dr. Cornelia E. Demers of Worcester Polytechnic University arrived on the Tech campus last fall to pursue her research at the School of Civil and Environmental Engineering and serve as a role model for other women scientists and engineers.

Demers was one of 25 professors around the country to receive the National Science Foundation's 1995 Visiting Professorships for Women (VPW), designed to allow female scientists and engineers the opportunity to conduct research at academic institutions of their choice.

The award provides funding for travel to the host institution, basic research expenses and salary for a period of 6 to 15 months. The recipients of this year's awards, which total about \$3.21 million, are geographically distributed across 15 states and represent 16 scientific fields.

## Tech Partnership Benefits Community

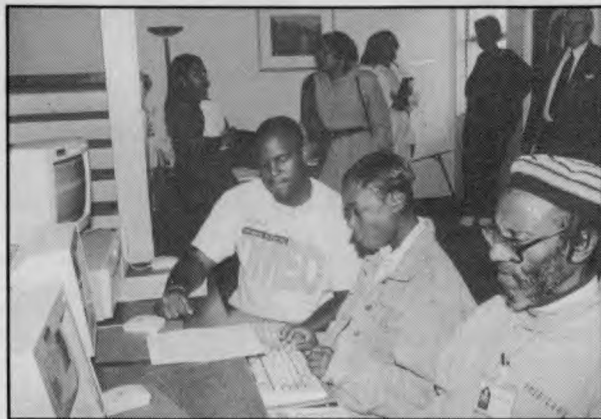
A young mother's smile, tears of joy on the face of a recent high school graduate, and a thank you letter from a group of elementary school children are all in a day's work for Tom Hamall and Teressa Warfield. Hamall and Warfield, Office of University Partnerships, are in the business of helping make dreams become reality through community involvement.

Over the past two years, both have devoted many hours to coordinating and facilitating an ongoing support program to help residents of south Fulton County turn their hopes into action.

Tech's connection with BoatRock Townhomes, a public housing development located near Fulton Industrial Park in southwest Fulton, dates back to 1994 when residents first vocalized their desire to reclaim a neighborhood overrun with violence and crime.

Residents of the 240 unit complex joined with county officials and Tech representatives to devise and implement a plan of action that has evolved into a multilevel project yielding remarkable results.

The first phase of the Boat Rock/Tech connection resulted in a play park located where drug deals and gang fights used to be commonplace. Charles Rudolph, assistant professor, College of Architecture, led a graduate studio class in their quest to design the

playground mirroring the ideas of parents and children. Volunteers from student and alumni groups, local businesses and community service organizations worked alongside residents to turn the county's \$75,000 planning and construction budget into a first-rate play area valued at \$325,000. The park was dedicated last December.

"As we worked on the play park, more and more residents participated and began to openly share with us their hopes and ideas for a better life, which included a variety of dreams and goals Tech has the resources to help fulfill," Hamall explained. Top on the residents' priority list, said Hamall, was the need for entry-level job training to increase their employment opportunities.

With help from the Housing Authority of Fulton County (HAFC), Fulton County Parks and Recreation and Chapel Hill Harvester Church, Phase II—an on-site computer training lab—opened for business in June '95.

The lab, staffed partly by Tech students Tony Olinger and Tony Watts and partly by volunteers, offers an opportunity for residents to learn keyboarding, data entry and word processing without leaving their neighborhood.

"For years, residents have expressed interest in computer training," explained Tyronda Williams-Mintor, HAFC, "but until we brought the center to them there were too many obstacles getting in their way."

## Hard Hats and Dump Trucks Familiar Sights at Georgia Tech

A short stroll around the Georgia Tech campus quickly reveals numerous construction sites signaling the coming of the '96 Olympic Games. From the Olympic Security Fence to the construction on Student Athletic Complex (SAC) fields to the paving projects around campus, everyone in the Georgia Tech community is affected in some way.

The frustrated observer may wonder: What exactly is happening and why?

While the number of construction signs and hard hats may at times seem overwhelming, rest assured there is a method to the construction madness.

**Security Fencing**  
By now, everyone on campus has

become accustomed to the security fence, stretching across campus and running along sidewalks. During the Summer Games, the ten-foot fence, complete with poles for closed circuit television and lighting, will secure the entire Olympic Village from the outside world.

The next phase of security fencing, slated to begin April 15, will be the installation of the fence behind the Graduate Living Center and Callaway Apartments.

Faculty and staff can also expect to witness periodic light shows between now and the Games period as officials test the perimeter lighting system.

**Aquatic Center**  
Passersby might have noticed another new construction project, based at the SAC athletic fields. When completed, this area will provide 13,000 temporary seats to the current 2,000 seats of the

Aquatic Center.

A pool shell and 4,000 additional temporary seats are also being installed to accommodate water polo fans. The Georgia Tech pool shell is the same one that was used for the water polo events during the Barcelona Games. Aquatic construction is expected through Spring quarter.

Following the Games, the temporary seats and the water polo pool will be removed and the fields will be restored.

**Olympic Dining Area**  
In just a few months, the entire Management parking lot will be transformed into the main dining tent for the Olympic Village, with the Student Center parking deck serving as the main kitchen. The installation of temporary plumbing and electrical lines is already under way. Pavement excavation at this site is expected to go on through May.

**Recreational Pool**

The athlete recreation pool, which is designated for the use of Olympic Village residents, will be located in the grass area behind the Instruction Center. A completion date on this project has not been determined, but organizers anticipate the project to run from mid-April through early June. Following the Olympics, this pool will be covered and the area restored.

Finally, virtually no one has been able to escape the repaving projects on campus. So far, many streets have been completed including: Cherry Street, Bobby Dodd Way, McMillan Street, Sixth Street and sections of Ferst Drive. Other proposed paving projects include Ninth Street, Eighth Street, Curran Street, Turner Place and Hemphill Avenue. Following their completion, a number of parking lots, including the Student Health Center, Callaway and SAC, will be repaved. The projected completion for the paving project is April 26.

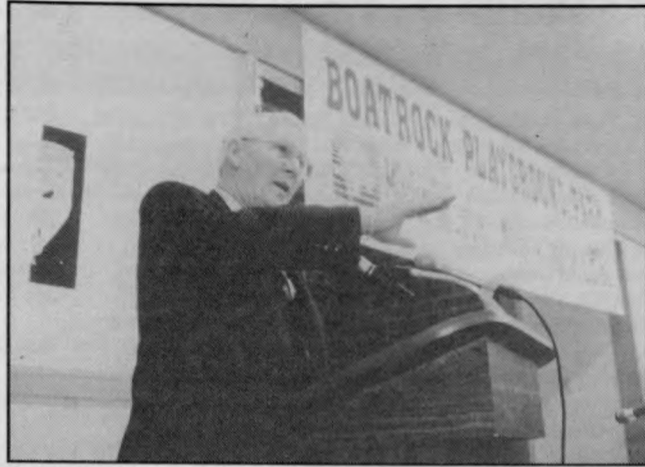

On December 19, 1995, a dream came true for hundreds of Tech alumni, students and employees including Tom Hamall, director, University Partnerships, as they dedicated a new play park at BoatRock Townhomes. The \$325,000 park is the result of a public/private partnership and a significant volunteer effort.

## Human Resources Two Places at Once

The Office of Human Resources (OHR), one of the most frequently visited offices on campus, will set up shop in two locations during the Olympic and Paralympic Secure Periods (July 1-August 27, 1996) in order to serve accredited and non-accredited employees.

A satellite office will be staffed at Grady High School for employees without accreditation for the Boxing Venue Secure Zone and the general public. Services at Grady will include:

- Classified Employment
- Employee Benefits
- Faculty Staff Assistance (FSAP)
- Employee Relations
- Human Resource Development (HRD)

Employees conducting essential business with OHR during the Olympic Village secure period and who must personally visit the OHR facility on Fowler Street, must have accreditation to gain access.

Employees should call in advance for an appointment at the currently listed campus phone numbers to transact any business with OHR staff during this period. Faculty and staff who are not accredited can call the main number at 894-3245 to receive instructions on how to access various services.

Departments are encouraged to complete all hiring actions prior to May 31, 1996. Since this date is the final day for submission of an application for accreditation to enter the Village or Venue Secure Zones, no employee hired after this date (regular and temporary) will be able to work inside these Zones during the Village Secure Period.

During the Secure Periods, new hires will be processed only on an emergency basis with certification by a dean or vice president that the new hire is critical to their operations and that the proposed start date cannot be delayed until after August 27, 1996 without major detriment to their operations. Even when such an emergency hire is approved, the new employee will not be able to access the Village or Venue Secure Zones, until August 27.

The OHR staff encourages all departments to use campus mail or the satellite location at Grady High School whenever possible for business transactions during the security period and hold the number of individuals visiting our Fowler Street offices to a minimum.

The staff also advises employees to request benefits and other OHR related forms prior to the Olympic period. The OHR staff will continue to update the campus concerning their Olympic services as plans are finalized. Twenty residents signed up for the first six-week session. Of those, 15 received certificates of completion and five were employed upon completion.

"One of the real problems with technology and society is the increasing gap that's created between the affluent and the poor. A part of what we're trying to do at BoatRock and other public housing facilities is narrow the gap by giving residents access to the same equipment others have available," Hamall explained. Computers, printers, monitors and software were all contributed by Georgia Power's GT club and Alumax, Inc.

BoatRock's computer training program is supplemented by job readiness courses offering insights on everything from preparing a resume to what to wear on the first day of the job. Other services provided on site include a pre-school reading program, employment assistance and affordable child care.

"The BoatRock project is a prime example of the double rewards that are associated with any community service program, explained Warfield. "The work we're doing here is changing the lives of residents and making a lasting impression on everyone involved."

The Office of University Partnerships and the College of Architecture are continuing to tap into community and campus resources to improve this and other economically challenged neighborhoods. At BoatRock, self-help housing upgrades and landscaping projects are next on the to-do list. Other Partnership outreach programs include the Red Oak project and the formation of educational collaboratives with WABE-FM and WPBA-TV.

Additional entities involved in the Boat Rock project are The Atlanta Project, Trees Atlanta, GT Alumni Clubs, the Fulton County Library System, the Office of Minority Educational Development and various faculty, staff and students who serve as volunteers.

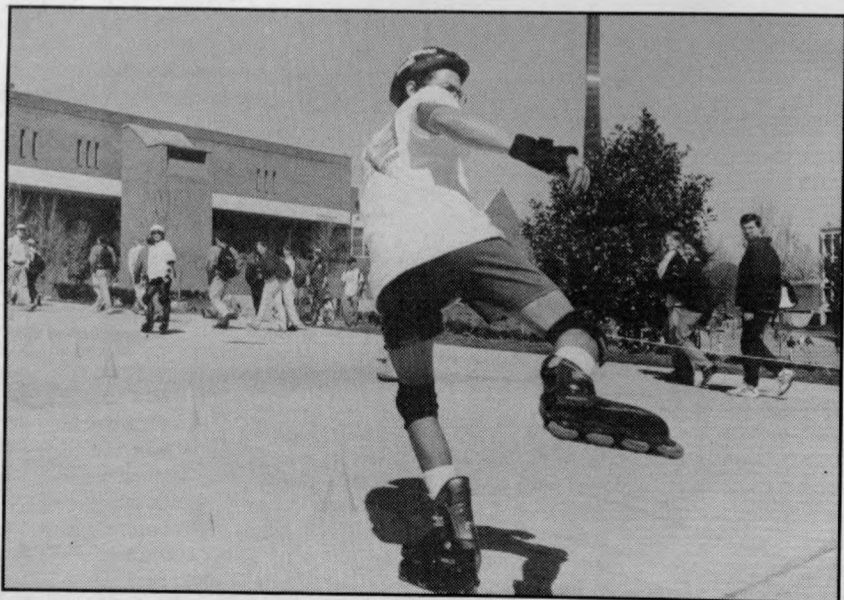
